CHARLTON – Four individuals are being considered to fill the vacant Town Administrator seat in Charlton. The Town Administrator Search Committee heard the recommendations during a meeting on Nov. 21 where four names were presented as candidates for the job with interviews to take place next month.

The candidates are Andrew Golas, who serves as the town administrator in Barre; Thomas Guerino, the former town administrator for Bourne; Kimberly Newman, who is the current Mendon town administrator; and Matthew Shelby, the land use and economic development director for

The candidates each bring differing levels of experience to the table. Golas has been Barre's administrator town for two years previously serving as an executive assistant in Palmer. Guerino spent 14 years with the town of Bourne before the two parties separated in 2019 and previously served nine years as executive director of the Massachusetts Rural Development Council. Newman has led the town of Mendon as administrator five years and was previously an administrator for the city of Lyndon in Kansas and the assistant town manager for Killingly, Connecticut. REGION — The Massachusetts Department of Transportation has announced a new highway exit sign numbering system set to impact the region and the state over the next three years.

Interstates 395 and 290 are among the many highways that will receive the renumbering which will conform to the mile-marker format of numbering rather than using sequential numbers. Connecticut also adapted its highways signs to represent mile markers several years ago. The change, which was announce on Nov. 18, is meant to conform with the requirements of the Federal Highway Administration's Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices issued in 2009 which seeks that all states adopt a mile-based sign numbering system. Massachusetts is one of only three states currently in noncompliance including New Hampshire and Delaware and failure to make this change could result in loss of federal funding according to the MassDOT.

The Department of Transportation released a pamphlet online detailing the finer details of the project which

confirms that the state has committed to making the transition by January of 2022. The change is expected to start in the western part of the state and working eastward one route at a time with the changes taking place from east to west or north to south depending on the roadway. As was done in Connecticut, "Old Exit" signs are expected to be included to help commuters with the transition for at least two years. Exits that lead to the same interchange, such as the current Exit 4 in Oxford off of I-395, would not be labeled with different mile markers but would maintain the single number representing the initial mile followed by letters like "a" and "b." Exit numbers will be rounded to the nearest mile with the lowest possible number being Exit 1. Only four corridors will remain unchanged through the plan, Route 213, Interstates 291 and 391 and the Lowell Connector. The Federal Highway Safety Improvement Program is providing 90 percent of the funds for the state to make the transition, with the other 10 percent paid for by state highway funds.

The DOT explained that there are several factors that play into this change. One major element involves calculating miles traveled and allowing drivers to better determine distance between destinations. It is also believed to help with reporthighway incidents more accurately and it would prevent the need for costly renumbering if new exits were added to routes. Most of all though change would bring Massachusetts in line with 47 other states and preserve funding on the federal level.

The interstate highway sign numbering transition is expected to commence in the summer of



Gobi testifies in support of Healthy Incentives Program

BOSTON — Sen. Anne M. Gobi (D-Spencer) was present today to testify in support of S.48 and H.145, An Act relative to an agricultural healthy incentives program, currently being heard in the Joint Committee on children, families, and persons with disabilities. These bills would establish the Healthy Incentives Program (HIP) in statute, ensuring this successful program's long term viability.

Asked for comment on the hearing,

Gobi, Senate Chair of the Massachusetts Food Systems Caucus and Senate Chair of the Joint Committee on Environment and Natural Resources, remarked, "HIP has been extremely successful with our farmers, playing a critical role in providing healthy foods to many of our most vulnerable neighbors. I appreciate the committee's attention in hearing the bill, and I look forward to seeing it moved out of committee in the near future."

The Food System Caucus has convened around three specific priorities this legislative session: increasing access to food and reducing food insecurity, protecting land and water resources used for agriculture and advancing economic development opportunities in the food system sector. furthers HIP all of these goals

since its inception in April 2017, HIP has provided vulnerable families and individuals across the Commonwealth with vital access to otherwise unaffordable fresh, healthy and local fruits and vegetables and spurred significant increases in sales for local farms across Massachusetts. To date, HIP has yielded \$12 million in sales of fresh fruits and vegetables for more than 200 farms in Massachusetts, providing 65,000 families in our Commonwealth with HIP incentives. This increased revenue to farms means farmers have an

easier time staying in business, which in turn ensures that their farmland stays as farmland.

The program demonstrates the exceptional results that occur when state agencies work together toward a common goal that connects their missions. The Department of Transitional Assistance, in their role as lead agency for HIP, is providing more and healthier foods for SNAP households. The Department of Agricultural Resources has helped farmers sustain their operations through increased sales, and the Department of Public Health has helped vulnerable communities move toward better health outcomes by healthier eating. Thanks to this collaborative effort, HIP is far exceeding expectations, demonstrating the need for continuation of this program, which both families and farmers have already come to depend on. This legislation directs the three departments to continue this collaboration.

HIP is not without challenges - most notably deficient funding levels which

have necessitated multiple month suspensions in FY18 and FY19 and closed the program to many farmers, families and individuals who want to participate. The FY20 Budget included \$6.5 million for HIP - \$3.6 million of that has been disbursed in just the first 4 months.

The ability to ensure consistent, uninterrupted operation of the program is essential to the success of HIP, as suspensions have limited farmers' ability to plan and sustain meaningful business as well as the program's ability to maximize effectiveness in changing consumers eating habits, and left vulnerable program clients without a precious resource. Passage of this legislation would be a significant step towards ensuring a long term solution to these challenges.

Title 5 Inspections

Greetings residents and readers! If you're new to the Purple Post, we welcome you warmly (and we need some warmth these days) and if you're back again... welcome back to our column. As you may know, we discuss real estate topics that are hopefully informative, fun, realistic and helpful.

Question du jour: What is a Title 5 and why do I need one? Well, let's start by saying, you only need think about this subject if you have an "on-site sewerage disposal system" on your property. In laymen's terms, if you have town sewer, then a Title 5 is not required when you sell your property. However, if you have a septic system by chance or even a cesspool you will need to know about Title 5.

Title 5 came about in the year 1995 when the state environmental code began requiring inspections on said sewerage systems. Basically, it's an evaluation of the working condition of your system to ensure that the public health or environment is not affected negatively in any way.

If you are selling your home, and it's been 2 years or more since your last Title 5 Inspection, then you will need to get a new one done in order to close on your home. But wait! There is one exception that extends the validity of your Title 5 for an additional year... That is if you can prove you have had your system pumped by a company within each year since installation, you could be granted a 3 year (instead of the 2 year) grace period.

Who maintains these records and issues these certificates you ask? Your local Board of Health of course. Your agent or Realtor will help you understand the process further when the time comes. Always a good idea to have a knowledgeable professional on your side. Like us at Purple Porch!

Nichols College announces final phase of historic campaign

DUDLEY — In 2015, Nichols College launched a \$45 million comprehensive campaign - the largest in its history - in honor of the institution's bicentennial. In June 2017, when the campaign had surpassed its goal with \$46.1 million, two donors were inspired to keep it

Nichols Board Chair John Davis '72 and his brother, Trustee Steve Davis '80, proposed to extend the campaign with a \$5 million conditional matching challenge and an additional \$20 million

Nichols President Susan West Ph.D. Engelkemeyer, recently announced that the \$5 million challenge has been matched, unlocking the Davises' commitment and raising \$10 million toward a \$20 million campaign extension goal. The matching donors are Keith Anderson '81, Bob Kuppenheimer '69, Peter Lynch '74, John McClutchy, Jr. '72, Tom Niles '63, Al Rock '63, and Robert Stansky '78.

Nichols is entering the final phase of the campaign to raise the remaining \$10 million and complete the now \$66 million campaign by fall 2020.

The Bicentennial Campaign, officially titled "Securing a Legacy of Leadership," has already been a considerable force of transformation on the campus. Funds raised supported the construction of the Fels Student Center and a state-of-the-art academic building and major renovations to athletic facilities. The number of endowed scholarships rose from 21 to its current 78. The college added academic specializations and created co-curricular initiatives such as the Institute for Women's Leadership and the Emerging Leaders Program.

The campaign prompted an unprecedented level of giving among alumni, friends, faculty, staff, parents and students, drawing some 15 gifts over \$1 million, including two gifts of \$5 million, and more than \$10 million in deferred gift commitments to help secure the college's future.

"The Bicentennial Campaign has shown what we can achieve with visionary leadership, an engaged community, and a compelling case for support. We are not done yet. Like the future leaders we educate, Nichols is still discovering its full potential and getting ready for its next milestone," said John

Davis, who co-chaired the Bicentennial Campaign with Gerald Fels '66.

The campaign extension will focus on growing the endowment, enhancing campus facilities, and investing in educational initiatives such as greater experiential opportunities for students and advanced technology.

'The Bicentennial Campaign began a new chapter in Nichols' unique history and provided an opportunity to both honor the past and shape the future," said Dr. Engelkemeyer. "The campaign extension allows us to renew and strengthen our commitment to offering students a dynamic and distinctive education that fully prepares them for their

bows have increased the success rate of harvesting deer. If a cross bow bill is passed for the 2020 hunting season, it will only make recovery of more deer, other than losing them to a bad shot. Hunting has become a dangerous sport, as some hunters over the years that have found out the hard way. It is not a wise idea to confront a hunter in the woods if you feel he is trespassing on private property, or doing something illegal. Thanks to cell phones, the matter is best left for the authorities. A simple call should keep you safe. A hunter recently confronted an ATV rider about trespassing on private property, and was run over by the machine. Best of all, there's a size for every home and occasion. Use miniatures as a place card holder at your next gathering. for added color in a terrarium or to brighten any small space. Dress up the dinner table, mantle or side table with one of the larger varieties. Large or small, they make wonderful party favors and hostess gifts. Place the plants in a decorative container, basket or colorful tin for an even more impressive display.

Grow your cyclamen in a cool bright location. These Mediterranean plants thrive in cooler temperatures and should be kept out of drafts

of hot and cold air. Consider moving your plant to an even cooler room at night to extend the bloom time.

Use your finger to monitor soil moisture. Water thoroughly when the potting mix that's just below the soil surface is starting to dry. Pour off any excess water that collects in the saucer, decorative basket or foil wrap. Allowing plants to sit in water leads to soggy soil and the decline of the plant's lth and beauty

Or set the plant on a saucer of pebbles. The excess water will collect in the saucer while the pebbles elevate the pot above the water. You'll reduce the risk of root rot and save time by eliminating the need to pour off this excess water.

Remove any yellow leaves to keep your plant looking its best. Adjust watering frequency and growing conditions if this is a frequent problem. Overwatering or allowing the soil to dry to the point of wilting can cause the leaves to yellow. Low light and drafts of hot and cold air can do the same.

Remove flowers as they fade. Gently twist and pull off or cut spent flower stems back at their base in the foliage. Regular deadheading will increase the number of flowers and length of bloom. With proper care, will be enjoying fl for four weeks or more.

Don't be alarmed when the leaves yellow and dry soon after the plant stops flowering. It is entering a natural dormant period. If you like a challenge, try forcing it into bloom a second time.

Simply cut back on watering when you notice the leaves begin to yellow. Then stop

watering once all the leaves have dried. Move the plant to a cool dark location for several months. After the rest period, bring your plant out of dormancy and encourage it to bloom. Begin watering, fertilize once new growth appears and place it in a sunny window. Then wait for a beautiful floral display.

Thanksgiving Leftovers

If the remains of Tom Turkey are still taking up half of your refrigerator space, it's time to use up all the leftover meat pronto or freeze it for future meals. According to the Center of Science in the Public Interest (CSPI), the Thanksgiving turkey can be eaten for

four days after cooking. This week's column will spotlight some delicious meals perfect for last minute suppers or beyond, if you have frozen the leftovers.

If you think hot turkey sandwiches and turkey noodle soup are your only options, read on. With a few extra additions, your post Thanksgiving meals can be as interesting as the memorable main event.

Leftover Turkey and Potato Casserole

This scrumptious recipe uses up turkey and mashed potatoes, and even that extra can of evaporated milk you have from baking!

Ingredients: three tablespoons butter; two tablespoons all-purpose flour; one (5 ounce) can evaporated milk; one cup cold water; one quarter teaspoon salt; one quarter teaspoon pepper; one quarter teaspoon onion powder; one cup cooked, diced turkey meat; one cup shredded cheddar cheese; two cups leftover mashed potatoes two tablespoons butter; one cup finely crushed herb-seasoned dry bread stuffing mix.

Instructions: Preheat oven to 350 degrees. For sauce: Melt three tablespoons butter in a saucepan over low heat. Add flour and stir until mixed. Slowly stir in evaporated milk and water, then season with salt, pepper and onion powder. Stir over low heat for five minutes; remove from heat. Place turkey in a lightly greased 9 by 13 inch baking dish. Pour sauce over turkey, then sprinkle with cheddar cheese. Spread mashed potatoes over cheese. Melt two tablespoons butter and add to stuffing mix; sprinkle stuffing over top of casserole. Bake, uncovered, in the preheated oven for 45 minutes.

Cream of Turkey Soup Forget boring clear leftover soups, this one is rich and delicious!

Ingredients: one quart turkey broth; one cup diced, cooked turkey; one half cup diced, cooked carrots (optional); one cup light cream; four tablespoons butter; four tablespoons flour; one quarter teaspoon salt; one eighth teaspoon white pepper; one eighth teaspoon nutmeg or mace; one tablespoon minced parsley or chives

Directions: Melt four tablespoons butter in a large heavy saucepan over moderate heat and blend in four tablespoons flour. Add broth and cream and heat, stirring constantly, until thickened and smooth. Mix in all seasonings, turkey meat and carrots; cover, let mellow over low heat for about ten minutes, Serve hot. Makes about four servings.

Slow Cooker White Turkey Chili

This Mexican crock pot dish that uses up lots of leftover turkey, is an award winning recipe from Mary Torell with the Nebraska Dept Agriculture.

Ingredients: one chopped onion; one cup chopped celery; four cups cooked turkey chopped; two 15.5 ounce cans Northern beans, drained; two 11 ounce cans shoe peg corn, undrained;; one four ounce can chopped green chilies; one quart turkey broth; one half cup mozzarella cheese, grated.

Directions: Place cooked turkey and all other ingredients in a slow cooker. Mix well and cook on low for 6 to 8

For a thicker sauce, remove the cover for the last hour. Sprinkle with Mozzarella cheese.

Turkey Timer Trivia: Pop up timers have saved many a Thanksgiving turkey from ruin. Have you ever wondered how they work? In case you

missed this in a previous column, here's everything you've always wanted to know about the handy plastic pop ups! A pop up turkey timer is typically

comprised of the outside case, a red stick that pops up, a metal spring and a dab of soft metal similar to solder. The soft metal is solid at room temperature and turns to a liquid at about 185 degrees (when a turkey is fully cooked). When the metal melts, it frees the end of the red stick that had been trapped in the metal. The spring pops the red stick up and you know the turkey is done! One little known fact is that these timers are reusable. If you dip the tip in hot water it will remelt the metal and you can push the pop up piece back into the metal. Then let it cool, and the pop-up piece will be back in its original position, ready to use again!

Maureen Wenk Hanigan, 93



Maureen Wenk Hanigan, 93, passed peacefully away surrounded by family at her home on Lake Quacumquasit (South Pond) in East Brookfield, MA. A Springfield native, Maureen attended

Classical High School and studied speech and drama at Emerson College in Boston. As an early female entrepreneur, she started her own speech studio and taught elocution. She was a speech therapist for the Agawam school system and had her own weekly radio program called The Children's Hour on station WTXL. Maureen married Thomas J. Hanigan

of Springfield. They raised three daughters in Springfield and then Longmeadow, MA. Maureen was a tireless volunteer running programs and raising money for the Boys and Girls Club of Springfield, the Holy Child Guild and other charitable organizations. She also dedicated endless hours to her church, her childrens' schools and activities, and several friends with special needs. During the 1960s she held a weekly story hour at the Longmeadow Public Library. With a deep love of, and concern for South Pond, she organized lake residents and began an advocacy organization that is now known as the Quaboag Quacumquasit Lake Association. She was one of the early presidents of the organization. After raising her children, Maureen

returned to her professional career delivering workshops for women on effective public speaking for corporations, trade associations and colleges. Maureen wrote the book, Secrets of Successful Speaking, published by MacMillan Publishing Company. She was interviewed on television and radio stations across the country in connection with her book. She later wrote and published, Forever Guilty: Zeena Frome's Story which was selected by the Edith Wharton museum as a featured publication. When Maureen moved full time from her home in Longmeadow to East Brookfield, she managed the Old Sturbridge Village Gift Shop at the Public House, and later became the wedding consultant at Old Sturbridge Village planning and

organizing weddings in the Village. Subsequently her role as a volunteer for Literacy Volunteers expanded and she was named Director of Literacy Volunteers in Southbridge, MA. She was predeceased by her husband of 66 years, Thomas Hanigan and her brother William Wenk, Jr. She is survived by her three daughters: Marie (Gary Gorbsky) Hanigan of Edmond, OK, Maury (Brian Edwards) Hanigan of New York, NY and Marietta (John Levy) Hanigan of Haddonfield, NJ; and seven grandchildren: Michael and Paul Gorbsky, Quincy Edwards, and Justin, Katelyn, Thomas and Martin Levy. 



Panthers end Tantasqua's journey in Division 4 State Semifinals

WESTWOOD — A total of 19 student-athletes on Tantasqua Regional's varsity football team are seniors, and that particular group has seen plenty of turnover over the course of their four years playing at the Reservation.

During their freshman year, Jon Hargis wasn't a member of the Warriors' coaching staff. Hargis then took over in 2017, but Tantasqua endured a losing season. Last fall, the Warriors made a run to the Central Mass. Division 4 Tournament final, where they lost to Nashoba Regional, 28-0.

And then this season — a special one, to say the least — the 19 seniors had a record of 6-2 in regular season play. Tantasqua then defeated Groton-Dunstable Regional and Fitchburg High in the Central Mass. playoffs for the Sectional title, before embarking on Xaverian Brothers High on Saturday, Nov. 23 in a Division 4 State Semifinal.

There, the Warriors played South Sectional representative Plymouth-South High for a right to play North Sectional champion Melrose High (10-0) at Gillette Stadium for the Division 4 State Championship.

Tantasqua's playoff run ended in Westwood, though, as the Panthers edged the Warriors, 26-14.

We had our opportunities. Couldn't punch it in. A couple of turnovers that hurt us, a couple of penalties as we were driving — but I couldn't be prouder of our kids," said Hargis. "The seniors, being my third year in the program, they've bought in since Day One. When they were sophomores most of them started and we were 3-8. Last year 7-4, and this year making the State Semifinals."

The Warriors had to punt as they opened the game with the football, but their defense came to play early on. On Plymouth-South's sixth offensive snap, quarterback Hunter Dean dropped back to throw. But Tantasqua's Tyler Hall shot through the gap in the line to pressure the QB. Dean's throw found the hands of the Warriors' Seann Lauritsen, who ran back the interception 30 yards for the touchdown. Jarod Spratt's point after touchdown kick made it 7-0 with 5:50 remaining in the opening quarter.

"Ty did a great job of putting pressure on the quarterback," said Hargis. "Seann Lauritsen made a nice pick and then returned it to the house. It kind of helped us there because we had to punt on the first drive. That flipped the momentum, so it helped us out a lot."

The Panthers regained the momentum on the final snap of the first quarter when Dean (9 of 16, 114 yards) connected with Hunter Budrow on a 10-yard scoring pass. Tyler Doyle kicked the extra point to even the score at 7-7.

Plymouth-South then grabbed a 13-7 lead on its next possession, finishing it off with 2:24 to go until halftime when Dean barreled into the end zone from a

yard out. Doyle's kick then hit the left upright.

Tantasqua looked to even the score before the half with a touchdown, but a late holding penalty forced the Warriors into attempting a 38-yard field goal. Spratt's boot may have been good from 37 yards, but the ball fell just shy of the crossbar.

"We got a holding call that put us behind the chains. Just probably a foot short on the field goal," said Hargis. "In a game like this, three points goes a long way, especially going into halftime."

The Panthers then padded their lead to 19-7 with 5:42 to play in the third quarter, which came after both teams were forced to punt. Nick Siegelman (26 carries, 104 yards) ran one in from 14 yards out, but Dean's two-point conversion throw fell incomplete.

Tantasqua then embarked on an all-important drive that took 11 plays to traverse 76 yards. Ryan Sears (24 carries, 117 yards) found the end zone from 11 yards out, twisting and spinning through Plymouth-South defenders

"Sears has been a warrior for us all year," Hargis said of one of the 19 seniors, and one of the four co-captains, along with Liam Gore, Kyle Boone and Noah Galonek. "He's been running the ball, averaged 100 yards every single game, 150 most of the time. He runs the ball hard, physical. He wants to score every single play; you can't ask for any more than that.'

Spratt's kick with six seconds to play in the third quarter cut the deficit down to 19-14.

But the Panthers scored next — Cillian Davis scampering in from 3 yards out, and Doyle made the PAT to grab a 26-14 lead with 6:03 to go.

Tantasqua had two more drives, but they couldn't produce any additional points to close the gap.

The Warriors dropped to 8-3 as they wished the Panthers (10-1) well going forward.

"Plymouth-South is a great team. I wish them the best in the States and hopefully they can take it home against Melrose," said Hargis.
