WHITINSVILLE — What is anxiety? Two students from the Whitinsville Christian School have taken on this challenging subject for their senior capstone projects and are inviting the public to an event at the end of the month that will offer an artistic perspective on mental health.

"I hope that this discussion will reduce the stigma surrounding mental health and help my peers gain access to support systems," said senior Rachel Cozzens. "I hope that the community will be better equipped to recognize and deal with anxiety when it occurs."

The event, titled "What is Anxiety?" will take place on Tuesday, March 26, at 6 p.m. in the Nehemiah Center at Whitinsville Christian School and is open to the public. A spokesperson from the school said that in their senior year, students can choose to do a capstone project or write a senior research paper; seniors Tori Paine and Cozzens have teamed up with their capstone projects to bring awareness to the topic.

Paine is creating an artistic display representing mental illness. She described her project as two rooms that act as the "brain" and "informational rooms."

# Douglas residents voice opposition to solar project

DOUGLAS — A large contingent of residents attended the Douglas Planning Board's late February meeting to vehemently oppose a solar project proposed near Wallum Lake.

The Board heard almost an hour of commentary from residents before finally voting to close the public hearing on the application of ASD Wallum MA Solar, the group that has pro-

posed a ground-mounted solar energy system on approximately 44.3 acres of vacant, wooded land in close proximity to Wallum Lake.

Citing concerns ranging from decreased home values issues to safety concerns to ground-water contamination, residents spoke one by one to address the Board and representatives from ASD Wallum.

### Local dog rescue finishes new isolation facility

UXBRIDGE — Rescued dogs being transported from out of state will now have a safe place to decompress at Pawfect Life Rescue, as members of the Uxbridge-based dog rescue have recently completed stage one of their new isolation facility project.

"We are a family-focused rescue so we focus on dogs who are good with kids and good with other dogs," said Julie Uthoff, founder of Pawfect Life. "We want the dog and the fam-

ily to be happy."

Uthoff said the new isolation facility is clean, bright, cheery, and everything the dogs need after a sometimes long trip from out of state. It also meets the state's Department of Agriculture guidelines. Pawfect Life will take in dogs on Saturdays and isolate them until Mondays in the new facility, which gives staff and volunteers a chance to emotionally and medically examine the dogs for adoption or fostering.

Uthoff opened Pawfect Life Rescue in 2013 and ran it out of her home until 2018. Previously, she had subbed space out of Forever Home Rescue in Medford for isolation purposes, but now, she is leasing a 4,000 square foot facility for the area, which is necessary for a foster-based rescue to socialize and desensitize dogs upon arrival.

"Are they shy with men, younger or older kids? What do [the dogs] know? You have to be able to check that out," she said. "You can look at a picture; it doesn't mean it's the right fit for you."

The isolation facility has new ventilation systems and everything is completely washable.

"It was great setting it up and working with everyone; isolation facility requirements now are very different," she added. "Everything has to be washable and non-porous. If you're going to do it, you need to do it right."

Uthoff added that while completing phase one is a huge accomplishment for the rescue, she has now begun planning and fundraising to complete

phase two of the project, which will include building the other half of the facility, an adoption center—a project that will cost around \$100,000, she said.

Pawfect Life rescues about 25 dogs a month, all pulled by temperament, to ensure that family-friendly dogs who are good with kids and other dogs are brought to the area.

"We really believe in the foster care network. We want to use foster care because you're basically training the dogs, socializing them, and desen-

# Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District touts innovative self-funded roof repair

IDEAL STRATEGY AVOIDS DEBT OBLIGATION AND COSTS BY OUR MEMBER TOWNS

UPTON - Following the district's commitment to live within its budget, Blackstone Valley Tech (BVT) continues to find ideal financial solutions to final phase of roofing repair project.

The district will self-fund the reroofing of the 54-year-old building with (more than 53 percent) reimbursement funds from the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) along with \$360,000 realized from the sale of the Trask Land on Chestnut Street. The land was sold last summer to Alfonso Builders of Milford. MSBA authorities have historically commented that for an educational system to embark and complete a project without

bonding is remarkable. This ideal strategy will avoid debt obligation and costs by our member towns.

"Blackstone Vallev Vocational Regional School District's financing plan for a needed roof repair utilizes state funds and in-house resources,' said Don Comastra, a long-term District Finance Committee Member. "This arrangement would eliminate the need for member town contributions to this expensive project, and seems to provide an ideal solution to this maintenance requirement."

The first three phases, which consisted of a self-funded restoration using a white knight system in 2006 [+/-53,000 sq. ft.] and two MSBA funded full-replacements in 2011 [+/-42,000 sq. ft.] and 2015 [+/- 37,000 sq. ft.], were successfully completed and have contributed to both energy efficiency and improved building integrity.

This fourth and final phase completes the restoration to the remaining section of the 29 year old Carlisle [black EPDM] roofing system and eliminates the need for maintenance and repairs. Since the old black roof surface has no reflective qualities and therefore absorbs solar heat, the occupied space below requires additional energy to be maintained at a comfortable temperature during warm weather. The installa-

tion or new insulation coupled with a highly reflective [white] surface will reduce the amount of heat transferred into (and out of) the building, resulting in energy efficiency and cost saving in both warm and cold

The completion of the critical roof repair project ensures the safety of the students at BVT, as well as the safety of the investment the District towns have made to make BVT an exceptional academic and vocational institution. This arrangement would eliminate the need for member town contributions to this expensive project and seems to provide an ideal solution to this main-

As far as the groundwater contamination concern, Turner said the array would not use any panels that have harmful chemicals and would be happy to have that as a condition of their site plan, if approved. He added that there would be multiple alarms on all electronics and the pad with inverters and batteries would be monitored around the clock.

For storm water concerns, he added that the group has been working closely with the Conservation Commission to increase wetland setbacks. The array would be located beyond the wetland buffer zones, however, the site plan is still designed as if it were located within those areas in a "more conservative design."

Turner fielded a few questions from the Board regarding the clear-cutting of trees that would be necessary if the project is approved and also the potential impact on the home values of abutters.

"While we don't love the idea of the trees going away, that is the necessary reality for the solar," he said. "I do not have an opinion on property values; I don't make the market, I can't put myself in a position to be responsible for it—up, down, left, or right.'

He added that the solar applicant has included in their site plan wooden fences and plantings to help shield the proposed solar farm visually, and the way the area naturally slopes downhill will keep the arrays visibly shielded as well.

Resident Louis Tusino was the first to address the Board after the hearing was opened up for public comment.

"All these people say they don't want it. OK?" he said, motioning toward the group of residents who audibly agreed. "It's allowed if you say it's allowed. If you want to go against all these voters...it's your business.'

Resident Jennifer Dautrich said prior to the meeting that she lives in the Wallum Lake area and said she believes the project, which would involve the clear-cutting of forest, would dramatically change the water quality of the lake, which serves as the drinking water supply for neighboring Burrillville, R.I.

'Fresh water is running out; I don't think the town of Douglas has the right to do anything that would damage another community's water," she said, adding that safety is a concern for abutters as well. "I'm not against solar but if it was being implemented as the law intended it would be in areas where they could deal with a chemical issue or a fire issue."

The Board also received a Citizen's Petition with a number of signatures and a letter from Senator Ryan Fattman and Representative Joseph McKenna. In the letter, the legislators said they had heard from a large delegation of concerned citizens, and raised points such as the project's location on a steep side slope draining directly into Wallum Lake, which is the town's largest resource and the drinking supply for at least one abutting town, and the impact on private residences and natural resources.

The public hearing was closed and the Board will have a possible vote on the proposed project during its next meeting.

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### Citizen scientists sought to protect vernal pools

REGION — Mother Nature is seeking citizen scientists to identify and protect vernal pools.

And the timing couldn't be much better, since those pools will be coming to life in the very near future. Sometime in March or April, as soon as the snow melts a bit, the temperature rises above 40, and there's a good rainy night, watch for frogs and salamanders crossing dark roads all over the region.

They're mostly going home to such pools to breed.

According to naturalist Matt Burne, contrary to common belief, vernal pool inhabitants "really do a good job of clearing out the mosquito population" if the system is healthy. For it to be, it needs two critical things - diversity, with as many native predators, insects, molluscs, frogs, plants, and invertebrates as it can handle; and a healthy surrounding ecosystem, the size of which varies on the species present. Treating them for mosquitoes tends to kill "an awful lot of the food web" in the pool, not just the target insects, he

He spoke recently and Norcross Wildlife Sanctuary to an audience of about 20 people. He's vice president of the Vernal Pool Association, Conservation Director of the Walden Woods Project, and spent 10 years with the state's Division of Fish and Wildlife focused on regulatory protection of ver-

Spotted salamanders, the earliest pool user, migrate from an average radius of about 400 feet, and "can't breed anywhere else," Burne noted. While people often don't see spotted salamanders because of their nocturnal habits, their "big, squishy softball" egg masses are very common sights in small woodland pools in early spring.

He said those come from "a remarkable mating ritual we call congressing,' in which dozens or hundreds of salamanders gather for a swirly swimming dance in which males release their sperm and females collect it without any direct contact between them. The egg masses themselves start out white. but turn green due to a symbiotic algae which eats the embryos' waste while providing them with oxygen.

Burne said several other species are also termed "obligate" vernal pool species - two related "Jefferson-complex" salamanders, the marbled (or Opacum) salamander, common wood frogs, fairy shrimp (which he described as "sea

monkeys, just bigger"), and a few insect types. Many others will use such pools when available, and the pools are often the linchpin of the nearby area.

'One of the really valuable features of vernal pools is production of leaf litter into high-value fatty frogs that will feed other species," including turtles, birds, snakes, raccoons and "all sorts of other stuff," Burne said. "It makes the ecological contribution of what's happening in that pool reach way out into the landscape.

Much of that complex process happens in a couple of months. By definition, vernal pools fill in fall (often at least partly with groundwater), freeze over winter, and come to life in spring, but dry out by mid-summer, and have no access for fish. But even that's a little simplistic, since permanent pools, even manmade ones, can attract the obligate species, as can some that do periodically become big enough to have fish. All of them are considered "wetlands" under state law, and do not need to be certified to be protected, he noted.

As one audience member later observed, "We assume if it looks like a vernal pool and acts like one in any way, we throw a buffer around it."

That, however, points to something Burne sees as a threat to vernal pools: development laws only require protecting 100-150 feet, so such pools tend to be effectively destroyed as vernal systems even when the pool itself still exists. Similarly, developers sometimes change the vernal pools into retention basins, with the same effect. Better use of conservation development guidelines that concentrate homes away from wetlands can help, he said.

Other threats come from climate change changing the rain and temperature cycles. For one example. naturalists have often found frogs killed by infections. For another, Burne showed images of a big pool full of tadpoles, but noted they were all dead the next day, after a huge rainstorm. Nobody's sure why, but he said they believe the sudden water temperature change might have stressed the frogs to death.

Even without sudden changes, warming can dry the pools out faster than frogs can mature. He noted recent years' trend of "really dry early spring and really wet early summer ... does not comport well with how the vernal pools evolved over the last 10-15,000 years."

Furthermore, he added, "the current situation for ephemeral wetlands is getting increasingly bad, with some legislation at the federal level that would

eliminate protection entirely." Add them together and you see why Burne hopes people will get involved to save them. Citizen science provides 'a great opportunity for community engagement and wetland protection,' he said, noting he's brought young people into such areas to identify species. Often, it's the first time they've ever seen such wetlands. He's also involved in "Bio-Blitzes" of various kinds in which naturalists and other specialists spend an afternoon doing that.

Technology can help the process. The state's Natural Heritage and Endangered Species program fairly recently set up an online Vernal Pool and Rare Species (VPRS) reporting system. For more casual users, a smart phone app called iNaturalist allows you to take photos of species and get a few options of what it is, then upload the photo to a Web site where specialists can check it for accuracy.

# Antiques, collectibles and estates profile: Philip Stanley



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ANTIQUES, some of the finest muse-ums, and wayne tuiskula some

m o s t knowledgeable people in the field of antiques. Phil Stanley, of Worcester, is one of these knowledgeable people. I've had the pleasure of knowing Phil for many years. He is an expert in antique tools and scientific instruments, and has been an appraiser for PBS "Antiques Roadshow" television show.

Phil has an engineering background, so it makes sense that he has an interest in antique tools. He first developed an interest in woodworking tools, and eventually grew interested in all types of tools. He estimates that he has been collecting for

50 years. He studied the major books that were available on antique tools when he began collecting. They are "Antique & Collectible Stanley Tools Guide" by John Walter, "British Planemakers from 1700" by William Louis Goodman, "Ancient Carpenters' Tools" by Henry Mercer and "A Museum of Early American Tools' by Eric Sloane.

Thanks to Stanley's research and writing, there are now two more books available to those who are interested in tools. Phil wrote "Boxwood & Ivory: Stanley Traditional Rules, 1855-1975" and "A Source Book for Rule Collectors." They are both out of print, but available on Amazon. com and other used book websites.

Phil also gained some of his considerable knowledge by attending antique tool and scientific instrument auctions and shows. He finds that many dealers are happy to discuss antique tools and share information. Although he notes there are fewer auctions

and shows for scientific instruments, there are still many events for tool collectors.

Mr. Stanley's tool research led him to also research patents. He informed me that a fire destroyed about 10,000 of the earliest patents in 1836. After the fire, the U.S. Patent Office contacted inventors who had been issued patents and they were able to restore 2,000 to 2,500 records. Phil has been delving further into early patents and documenting his finds. He plans to offer the results to the U.S. Patent office after "cleaning up the last bits and pieces of this database." He found additional information on some of the missing patents after researching court case documents and from reviewing articles in the "Journal of the Franklin Institute." His database will contain additional information on the 10,000 patents that were destroyed in the

Phil offers some good advice to fellow tool collectors. He recommends reading books and attending live events when you can. You can also search for tool auctioneers and dealers online. Phil said that Martin J. Donnelly sends emails twice a week offering tools for sale. You can sign-up for emails on Donnelly's Web site: mjdtools.com.

Mr. Stanley's additional advice applies to collectors of all kinds.

"It's always better to buy one good \$100 item than ten average \$10 items," he said. "You're going to be happier with the one good item and it's not going to depreciate in value, which the average stuff tends to do."

Phil said that one of the most interesting things he appraised while working on the "Antiques Roadshow" was a cracked airplane propeller marked DH-1. Charles Lindbergh was carrying mail when his deHavilland plane developed mechanical issues and Lindberg was forced to land on an Iowa farm. The family took photos with Lindbergh. Lindbergh later wrote them a thank you letter for their hospitality. The family was also left with



the cracked propeller. Mr. Stanley estimated that the propeller and related items could soar to \$15,000 or \$20,000 at auction.

walk into is the brain room. This area is meant to describe through the senses what anxiety feels like. In order to get this description as accurate as possible, I casually interviewed a select group of individuals about their anxiety," Paine said. "The interviews and their descriptions of anxiety helped me to interpret their mental state, emotions, and even physical symptoms into art."

The second room people will explore is the informational and "more hopeful" room, she added.

"This room focuses on four aspects of how people can learn how to cope with anxiety; community, spiritual, medication, and therapy. Every person is different, which means everyone has a different variant of anxiety and different ways of coping with it, but when all four of these things work with a person and there is a healthy balance, the person is usually in their best state," she said.

After visiting the exhibit, attendees will hear a presentation put together by Cozzens with speakers Ashleigh Hillier, Ph.D. and Linda Cozzens, M.D., to address mental illness.

Dr. Hillier is a psychology professor at the University of Massachusetts Lowell, according to event details. Her research focuses on adolescents and young adults on the autism spectrum, particularly adult outcome, college success, and mentoring. She is working with Cozzens on a study investigating anxiety among college students and will provide some background on anxiety disorders including prevalence, causes, and comorbidity.

"It's clear that this is rapidly increasing in prevalence, but the causes are unclear, as are the effects on the student experience," said Cozzens. "We wanted to find factors that buffer against anxiety, as well as predict it. The 'What is Anxiety?' lecture will briefly address the results of this study."

Cozzens' mother, Dr. Linda Cozzens, is a pediatrician with 26 years' experience who will also speak at the event. She treats children with anxiety and

makes recommendations for therapy and other modalities.

"Anxiety is skyrocketing in college students. The same is happening in high school students. Through this presentation, I'd like to bring awareness of this issue to students, teachers, and parents. In addition, I aim to provide resources and information to students or parents of students that are experiencing anxiety and don't know what to do about it," Cozzens added.

"I want to give the opportunity for people who don't struggle with anxiety to understand even just a little bit more what some of their loved ones and others may be going through. I also want to present a more hopeful outlook and give information and resources to people on how to live a better life with anxiety," Paine said. "My ultimate goal is to create a more aware and empathetic community that is able to surround these people with love and support."

School Faculty Member and Capstone Project Advisor Tahnee Kuder added that in recent years, teachers have become more aware of the emotional and mental challenges students are facing.

"Supporting and creating awareness for the overall health of the students has become more of a priority for our school because we want to prepare them for life after high school," she said. "We want our students to be well rounded and prepared academically, socially, and mentally both while they are with us and when they are on their own."

Students hearing and seeing the effects of anxiety and depression from other students creates more of an impact when the information is coming from someone their own age, she added, and allows the students who are creating the project to gain a greater understanding.

"Creating projects and talking about anxiety and depression is a step in the right direction in 'normalizing' these issues so that those that are affected can feel more comfortable talking about it and getting the help and support they need," Kuder said.



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

### celebration of great women in history

International Women's Day may seem like a relatively recent phenomenon; however, it stems back to 1909, when The Socialist Party of America organized a day for Women on Feb. 28 in New York. One year later, the International Socialist Woman's Conference announced that a day for women be held each year.

Fast forward to 1917 in Russia, where, on March 8, women were given the right to vote. The day was celebrated annually in communist countries. In 1975 the holiday was adopted by the United Nations.

The long and the short is that this day is a day to celebrate women past, present and future. With that said, we would like to take this occasion to highlight the women that we feel have had a standout role in influencing how our world operates today.

The first woman created a shift when she was just 15 years old. Claudette Colvin was arrested at the age of 15 in Montgomery, Ala., when she refused to give up her bus seat to a white woman, and was arrested and jailed for her act of defiance. Although Claudette's story would sadly become lost in the shadow of subsequent events, it was her example that gave the more celebrated Rosa Parks the courage to do the same. Colvin herself was one of five plaintiffs involved in the federal court case filed by civil rights attorney Fred Gray in 1956, in which they challenged bus segregation. The outcome was that a judge ordered that the local laws in regards to bus segregation were uncon-

Despite her significance to the history of the Civil Rights movement, to find Colvin's name in a history book is rare. This is, in part, because she was an unmarried teenager who apparently was with child at the time of the incident. Colvin went on to become a nurse's aid. In an interview in 2005, she said, "I feel very, very proud of what I did. I do feel like what I did was a spark and it caught on."

As for recognition, Colvin said, "I'm not disappointed. Let the people know Rosa Parks was the right person for the boycott. But also let them know that the attorneys took four other women to the Supreme Court to challenge the law that led to the end of segregation."

Colvin's family has been trying since 2016 to have her recognized and honored in the National Museum of African American History and Culture, to the opening of which she was, quite unjustly in our opinion, not invited.

Marie Curie is the next on our short list. Curie was a Polish and naturalized-French physicist and chemist who was the first to delve into radioactivity. Curie, who was born in 1867, was the first woman to win a Nobel Prize, and the only person to win it two times. Collecting several firsts, Curie was the first woman to become a professor at the University of Paris. In a time when most women spent their days in the home taking care of their children and husbands, Curie had to smash several ceilings for her own advancement. Curie was known for her honesty and moderate lifestyle. All of her prize money, she donated to scientific research and refused to copyright the radium-isolation process so that her fellow scientists could continue research unhindered. In 2011, Poland and France declared the year would be 'The Year of Marie Curie'. She became the first woman to be entombed on her own merits in the Pantheon in Paris in 1995.

We can't run a piece celebrating women without mentioning Joan of Arc. The warrior has been dubbed a heroine of France for her role in the Hundred Years' War. D'Arc was born to peasant parents in 1412 in the northern region of France. The story goes that Joan was driven to take up arms after experiencing visions of three saints, who instructed her to support Charles VII in the war. Joan of Arc, now one of the nine secondary patron

### Vinegar is a Big Help for Health and Home

For years, the virtues of vinegar have been overlooked. While our grandmothers touted the acidy brew as a valuable aid all around the house, flashy modern products have one by one replaced the modest bottle of vinegar for all but the most menial

cooking tasks. It's time we reevaluated that humble container crowded in the back of the cupboard. Believe it or not, vinegar packs such a punch it can alleviate the need for a myriad of expensive household and personal care products.

While this column has addressed the assets of vinegar in past pages, here are more interesting and cost saving ways vinegar can be put back in active duty.

Best Blooms: Springtime translates into vases of freshly cut flowers. Here's how to make your blooms last longer: Add two tablespoons of vinegar plus three tablespoons of sugar to each quart of warm water. Stems must be kept in three to four inches of the nutrient.

Dust Buster: To keep exhaust fan grills and air conditioner blades dust free, simply sponge with a cloth dipped in white vinegar periodically. The treatment helps repel future dust.

Ouch Relief: For natural sunburn relief, reach for the vinegar! Fill an empty spray bottle with straight vinegar and spritz on to sooth sunburn.

Mist Tryst: Make your own effective air freshener by mixing together the following ingredients: One teaspoon baking soda, one tablespoon vinegar, and two cups of water. After it stops foaming, mix well and transfer to a spray bottle to mist away odors.

As you work toward achieving your goals in life, you will need to make moves that contain financial, tax and legal elements, so you may want to get some help - from more than one source.

So, as you can see, the questions potentially raised by investment sales - "Should I sell?" "If so, when?" "If I take some losses, how much will they benefit me at tax time?" - may also be of importance to your tax advisor, who will need to account for sales in your overall tax picture. As such, it's a good idea for your tax and financial advisors to communicate about any investment sales you make.

Your tax and financial advisors also may want to be in touch on other issues, such as your contributions to a retirement plan. ### Trailer tribulations



THE GREAT OUTDOORS RALPH TRUE

By the time you read this column, most of the snow cover will be gone, according to the weatherman, and my boat will be in the back yard getting ready for the Wallum Lake opening day of April 13. This past Sunday, I was talking to Mike Guertin at the Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club from Uxbridge. Mike is a guy that loves fishing on the ocean almost as much as I do. The subject of fishing on the ocean with our boats over the years, revealed some of the problems we had encountered over the years, of which some could have ended in tragedy.

Owning your own boat and making every trip a memorable one and living to tell about it is not easy. It all starts with making sure all of your equipment on the boat is in good working order. Owning

boat owner can tell you. Purchasing insurance for your boat requires you to also take out insurance on the water, like Sea Tow or other towing services on the water. Getting a Coast Guard safety check in your home town for your boat is a good way to insure that you are in compliance with all safety regulations. It can also save you a safety check on the water by the Coast Guard, at a time when you should be fishing.

It all starts with the trailering of your boat to your fishing destination and back home. One of my not so memorable fishing trips while trailering my 20-foot MFG fiberglass boat to Westport River, to catch a few tautog with my brother Mel; could have cost us our lives. My brother met me at my home at 4 a.m., and we were anxious to get to the boat ramp. On the way to Westport, just before 20 minutes from reaching our destination, I thought my trailer had somehow become unattached from my vehicle. My side view mirror

a boat is not cheap, as had me looking at parts of my boat being scattered all over the highway.

I quickly applied the brakes and pulled over into the breakdown lane. As I was stopping, a couple of cars tried to pass me, but ran over my two outboard motors that were now lodged underneath there vehicles. Numerous other vehicles tried to pass, but were stopped by the State Police. My brother and I exited the vehicle and we realized that we had been rear-ended by a pickup truck, and his truck was on my boat trailer, with my boat partially on the roof of my van.

It sure ruined my fishing season, and fighting the insurance company for payment for the vehicle & boat was another fiasco. Never ever allow the insurance company to remove your boat or vehicle from the storage area that it was brought After they had it removed from the area to the insurance company's lot, they just strung me along for months, and I lost the entire fishing season. The accident obviously was not my

We were confronted by the State Police asking us if we were injured. I told them that we were OK, but that my brother Mel was recently released from the hospital after he had a heart transplant. He quickly ordered us to sit down on the guard rail, as he was calling two ambulances to take us to the hospital. It seemed that the truck driver fell asleep at the wheel. We were traveling at 60 miles per hour when he rear-ended us, and he evidently had the pedal to the metal. Fortunately, he had struck us dead center of the boat 's transom. The trooper stated that if the boat was hit on either side, we would have flipped our truck.

After we were released from the hospital, we took a cab ride to the yard that the vehicle and boat were being stored. Fortunately, we were able to get the van released, and we headed for home. We absolutely could have been killed or seriously injured that day. Those are only one

of the dangers about trailering a boat to go fishing or other forms of enjoying a boat. Keeping your boat in a slip is expensive, but does have its advantages. Trailering your boat does allow you to fish Mass. & Rhode Island waters, saving a lot of travel on the water to fish the hot spots at different times of the year. Next week, I will share a couple of experiences on the water that could have resulted in serious injury or death to myself and my fishing buddies. I got a couple of fishing trips in the fog that could have been a disaster. Stay tuned!

saints of France, was a woman who defied her gender role in truly bold fashion. Tragically, she died at the age of 19, captured following a series of military setbacks and turned over to the invading English, who tried and convicted her on trumped up charges of witchcraft in hopes of breaking the spirit of the French resistance by executing its leading light. In 1456, Pope Callixtus III re-examined the trial and reversed the charges. Joan of Arc was subsequently declared a martyr.

In 1933, Anna Eleanor Roosevelt turned the position of First Lady from benign symbol to an active and intellectually vigorous power center. Roosevelt served as the United States Delegate to the UN General Assembly from 1945 to 1952. Roosevelt was the topic of much controversy for her outspoken nature, especially in regards to civil rights for African-Americans. She was the first of our First Ladies to hold regular press conferences, host a weekly radio show and to speak at a national party convention. She was so bold to even disagree with her husband on certain policies.

After her husband's death, Roosevelt spent her remaining years in active politics. She was the first chair of the UN Commission on Human Rights and chaired John F. Kennedy's administration's Presidential Commission on the Status of Women. Roosevelt was nicknamed the 'First Lady of the

Last but not least is a true unsung hero, due to the fact that her name has never been known — Agent 355, who was instrumental to the Patriot cause during the Revolutionary War. Agent 355 was a part George Washington's Culper Spy Ring. With the fear of a trip to the gallows in the back of her mind every day, Agent 355 managed to continue to help funnel crucial information to the General. Unlike the women we mentioned before, Agent 355 used her role as a quiet, unassuming woman to make monumental gains that led to our freedom today. The identify of '355' is not yet known; however, she is referred to as 'lady' 355 in Washington's code book. The only direct reference to '355' was from ring leader Abraham Woodhull (known as Samuel Culper, Sr.) to Washington in which Woodhull described her as 'one who hath been ever

serviceable to this correspondence." We hope that one day her true identity will be discov-

While we pay homage to strong women who have done incredible things, this does not negate the influential women we come into contact with in our everyday lives. As women we don't have to smash ceilings or gain notoriety to make a difference. We can be positive, powerful and influential in our everyday lives which in turn creates a domino effect that can last years after we're gone.





FITCHBURG — Left winger Nick Locurto scored with 3:13 remaining in overtime to lead the Northbridge High boys' varsity ice hockey team past Lunenburg High, 2-1, in the championship game of the Central Mass. Division 3A Tournament at the Captain Kenneth W. Gaetz, Sr. Arena at Wallace Civic Center, on the campus of Fitchburg State University, on Sunday, March

The fourth-seeded Rams' come-from-behind upset of the third-seeded Blue Knights allowed Northbridge (along with student-athletes from Uxbridge High, Sutton High and Nipmuc Regional — as part of its co-op agreement) to claim its first Central Mass. hockey title in school history. With the win the 15-7-1 Rams advanced to the Division 3A state title game, where they faced Western Mass. champion Easthampton High, on Wednesday, March 13 at the Hart Center on the campus of the College of the Holy Cross (after press time).

Locurto's game-winning goal came on a slap shot from the right point and somehow didn't hit any of the five bodies camped out in front of the Lunenburg net.

"I didn't really see anything when I took the shot. Gilly [linemate Liam Gill] dropped it back to me and I played it between my [defender's] legs and I was just putting it on net to see what would happen," Locurto said. "I shot for the pipe and it was kind of weak but I got a lucky bounce and it went in. I thought it hit the post but then I saw Gilly celebrating and I said to myself, 'you just scored."

orea. Northbridge head coach Ryan Neville also didn't have a clean look at the game-winning goal.

"I didn't see much." Neville

"I didn't see much," Neville said. "I saw Nicky wind up and I knew we were going to have a good shot if he took the shot. I saw it sneak far post and I heard the clang and it looked like the puck went just inside the post and in the net."

Northbridge began the third period trailing 1-0, but the Rams started the final 15 minutes of regulation with 65 seconds remaining on a power play, the result of a late second-period penalty on Lunenburg (whose co-op includes athletes from Ayer-Shirley Regional).

With 15 seconds left in that power play, Gill tied the game, 1-1, somehow flicking the puck past Lunenburg goalie Nick


Granger.

corner.

"Nick Locurto makes it so easy for me," Gill said when asked about his game-tying goal. "He's my best friend; we've grown up with each other. We know where each other are on the ice so it's very easy to play with him."

Gill and Locurto had the chance to work their game-tying and game-winning magic thanks to the play of Rams' goalie Chris Wells. Wells finished with 29 saves, none bigger than his all-out, sprawling save on Matt Albert just 70 seconds into overtime.

"These guys have had my back all season so I knew I had to have theirs," said Wells, who was disappointed he allowed Lunenburg to take a 1-0 second period lead, but not worried about the outcome. "We've come back from more adversi-

ty than that. We had nothing but confidence in ourselves. We knew we were going to come back and win the game."

Neville, a former goalie, liked seeing that confidence in his netminder. "Chris has been phenomenal down the stretch, Neville said. "He's given us a chance to win every game."

To be called Central Mass. champions is pretty heady stuff for a team that started the season 2-5-1.

"That was all the motivation we needed; we knew where we had come from," Locurto said. "We came from absolutely nothing; we almost didn't have a team this year. We were working our butts off before the season to raise money just to have a team.

"Then we started 2-5-1 and we said, 'we've got to turn it up' and we did," Locurto added. "We knew we were good enough, that we had a good enough team to make it this far, we just needed a wakeup call."

Gill explained said wakeup call.

"We have a great group of guys in our locker room and we all want to play for each other," Gill said. "We're not all from the same school but we all believe in each other. It's a great atmosphere in there. We come together every practice and give it our all. That's how we turned it around."

Neville said part of the turnaround included a return to basics.

"It was slow going to start the year, but once the calendar turned to the new year we found something, found something we believed in," Neville said. "We started playing for each other and realized that it was going to take hard work and playing as a full unit for the full 45 minutes.

"Once we realized that we figured we could take the whole thing," added Neville. "I couldn't be more proud of these guys. They're a coach's dream. They're coachable, they work hard, they play for each other and they're very disciplined and respectful guys. I love every one of them."

SPORTS CORRESPONDENT FITCHBURG — When regular season becomes the postseason, the two most important components a high school boys' varsity ice hockey team wanting to make a long run in the tournament can have is a goal-scoring sniper and a hot goalie.

Against top-seeded Worcester in a Central Mass. Division 3A Tournament semifinal on Tuesday, March 5 at Wallace Civic Center's Captain Kenneth W. Gaetz, Sr. Arena, Northbridge High (a co-op team that also includes student athletes from Uxbridge High, Sutton High and Nipmuc Regional) had both and it resulted in a hardfought 3-1 win and a trip to the 3A championship game, where they took on third-seeded Lunenburg/ Ayer-Shirley.

Junior Liam Gill paced the Rams' offense with a part in all three goals.

He helped set up the first one and then scored the final two. In goal for Northbridge (14-7-1) was junior Chris Wells, who backboned a spirited defensive effort with 28 saves, nine coming in what turned out to be a pivotal third period.

Ryan Couture staked Northbridge to a 1-0 lead at the 5:37 mark of the first period, scoring a power-play goal after taking a feed from Gill and tucking it past Worcester goalie Jake Grampietro (26 saves).

Gill pushed the Rams' lead to 2-0 6:23 into the second period. Nick Locurto got the puck to Gill in the middle of the sheet and Gill did the rest, firing the puck past Grampietro and into the back of the net.

After Worcester (16-4-1) cut the Northbridge lead to 2-1 late in the second period on a goal by Daniel Sheeran, Gill came back and closed out the scoring with 57 seconds remaining on an empty-net goal.

With his two goals and assist against Worcester. Gill now has 59 points on the season (35 goals, 24 assists).

"Liam's had a ton of success this year, but he is the consummate teammate," Northbridge firstyear head coach Ryan Neville said. "The team is having great success."

Neville, by his own admission, is a defensefirst kind of coach and the Rams needed all the defense they could muster to hold off the hardcharging Wildcats in the third period.

"The third period was really where we kind of had to bear down," Neville said. "We knew there would be an increased onslaught of pressure from Worcester because they were playing from behind. We did a good job in the defensive end to make sure Chris got a good look at the puck and that we cleared the zone and got it back in their end when we needed to."

Neville knows of what

he speaks, having spent his playing days between the pipes.

"As a former goalie it's all predicated on defense and defensive zone coverage is huge," Neville said. "The reason being is that it doesn't take skill to defend in your own end; it only takes effort and accountability. We knew what Worcester liked to do was get the puck down low, do a heavy two-man forecheck and then create traffic in front of the net

and try to get rebounds. So, it was super important for our guys to be accountable and diligent in their responsibility in

the [defensive] end. "The defense defensemen needed to get their body in front so Chris could see the puck and clear away the rebounds so there wouldn't be any second chance opportunities," Neville said. "We needed to make sure there weren't any floating Worcester guys and

that there was no open net. That was huge; the defense did a great job of that all night.' In the end, however, it

came down to Wells.

"Chris gave us a chance to win," Neville said. "He's been, particularly in the last several games of the year and in the playoffs, rock solid. When he's locked in and focused on shutting people down he's as good as it gets out there."

# Bulldogs put the bite on Beavers in second half; oust Blackstone Valley Tech from D4 Tournament

WORCESTER — In what is quickly becoming the marquee rivalry game of the Large Schools Division of the Colonial Athletic League, the Blackstone Valley Tech (BVT) and Monty Tech (MT) girls' varsity basketball teams met for the fourth time this season on Wednesday, March 6 at Clark University's Kneller Athletic Center.

On the line in this matchup— a Central Mass. Division 4 Tournament semifinal round game— was a trip to the District Championship, where the winner would face perennial power Maynard High.

This game, like the two that preceded it, went to Monty Tech, 61-44. The top-seeded Bulldogs (23-3) then defeated to third-seeded Maynard (18-5) in the D4 final Saturday, March 9, at Worcester State University. The fourth-seeded Beavers finished their season with a 16-8 mark. BVT won the first meeting of the teams this year, 72-70 in double overtime, on Jan. 18 in Fitchburg.

Blackstone Valley Tech, despite never leading in the contest, played a spirited first half and trailed by just six points, 26-20, at halftime. Monty Tech — who finished the first half on a 7-2 run — scored the first seven points of

the second half to push its lead to 33-20 with 5:33 to play in the third quarter.

The Bulldogs' 7-0 run to start the second half was the work of senior guard Emily St. Thomas. St. Thomas, who became Monty Tech's all-time leading scorer during the game, finished with a gamehigh 28 points, 21 coming in the second half. St. Thomas opened the third quarter with a left-side 3-pointer, a baseline drive to the basket and a mid-court steal and layup.

After the Bulldogs pushed their lead into double digits, BVT could never get any closer than six points the rest of the way.

"I felt like we ran out of steam a little bit," Blackstone Valley Tech head coach Britt Kahler said. "The beginning of the third quarter we had some great looks — they were layups — and we just weren't hitting. I think fatigue had a lot to do with that. Monty Tech is quick, aggressive and physical, and I think they outhustled us at times. I think it all took its toll."

The Beavers' best chance to take the lead came midway through the second quarter. Trailing 19-13, BVT cut its deficit to four points (19-15) on a drive by junior Victoria Russian (a team-high 14 points) with 4:14 to play in the first half. Following a MT turnover BVT sophomore Brianna Carroll (12 points on four 3-pointers) drained a trey from the left side to pull the Beavers to within a point, 19-18, with 4:04 remaining

The Bulldogs, however, scored the next four points to give themselves some breathing room, going ahead, 23-18, with 58.6 seconds left in the first half.

Kahler said she didn't believe that Monty Tech made any specific defensive adjustments at halftime.

"I don't think they did. They played the same 3-2 defense they always play. They're just so aggressive in that 3-2," Kahler said. "Erica [Regan, a senior] does such a great job at the top of that 3-2 for them. She's tall and she's got that long wingspan; she makes it really hard for us.

"If we're turning the ball over against their 3-2, they're getting layups on the other end," Kahler continued. "We didn't do a great job in the third quarter of making baskets and that allowed them to run, so now we're getting them easy baskets."

After the game, as disappointed as she was that her team lost, Kahler couldn't stop smiling when she thought about the season that had just concluded.

"We made a lot of mistakes that we shouldn't have made, but a lot of it was because of

inexperience; we're such a young team," Kahler said. "We set goals at the beginning of the season, but we didn't think we'd be [in the Division 4 semifinals]. We were really excited to be here and with most of the team coming back, we're really excited for next year."

The biggest returning piece of the puzzle, arguably, is Russian, the Beavers' leading scorer this year. "Victoria is a leader by example. She works hard. She's a kid that really wants it; she wants to win," Kahler said. "You can see that on the court. Our girls follow her; they look to Victoria. If we need points or we need somebody to pick us up, we look to Vic. She worked her but off tonight, she really did. She did as much as she could."
