Emergency equipment purchased to serve pets

CHARLTON - It's always tough when tragedy strikes and impacts and entire population of residents. However, it's important to realize that it's not only the people that are affected, but the pets and animals as well.

That's the mentality that led to the town of Charlton being awarded a grant through Massachusetts Department of Health to fund assets for the town's emergency preparedness plan with specific emphasis on the local domesticated animal population.

Dudley Health Inspector Jim Philbrook Animal Control

Officer Ann Sellew appeared before selectmen on Tuesday, July 25, to reveal the details of the grant, which Philbrook said is part of an effort by the state to help towns stay prepared and ready for the added pressures and needs of the community should a disaster or incident occur. While keeping the people safe is, of course, a priority in such situations Philbrook said the funding received by Charlton helped purchase equipment to helped a different

demographic. "They decided that it was important for animals to also be housed and protected. They gave a grant, which is about

\$3,000," Philbrook told selectmen. "We received five large cages, two iPads, a pet kit, small crates, and five medium crates to house animals that would be brought

Philbrook said he helped write the grant and both he and Sellew were commended for their work bringing the funding to town. Philbrook presented photos of the new equipment purchased for the town and expressed his confidence that the new resources will make Sellew's job a lot easier under any circumstance. "This will help the

Charlton seeking grant for water infrastructure

CHARLTON - The Board of Selectmen has authorized Town Administrator Kobin Craver to seek out a grant to help fund the installation of water infrastructure along Route 20 going into the town of Oxford.

Selectmen attending the July 25 board meeting voted unanimously to grant Craver permissions to apply for and, if received, accept a grant through the Mass Works Infrastructure Program which would act as a reimbursement for the cost of installing water lines along Route 20. Craver told selectmen that this grant would be a significant part of the town's mission to provide growth opportunities for that part of town as the state begins to make progress on its own project along the roadway.

"What the project will do is a portion of Route 20 will be reconstructed in the next two years and what we're trying to do is make sure that we can put water infrastructure in. The Charlton water

system goes just so far down Route 20. We're now trying to connect to the Oxford system so that we can get water to that area, Craver said. an important project to the town.

Selectmen agreed that it would be important to get the infrastructure installed before the state completes its own reconstruction project as any sealing done to the roadway would be in place, by state regulation, for five years and would thus

Harrington DPH hearing draws criticism

STURBRIDGE - At least a dozen nurses and several board members, but only a handful of citizens, turned out for last Friday's public hearing on Harrington Hospital's proposal to close its birthing unit on Sept. 30.

None of the speakers liked the idea, although board members said they supported it rather reluctantly for "fiduciary" reasons on the grounds that the number of births had been sliding for years.

But nurses and the two citizen speakers were strongly opposed,

with Southbridge resident Scott Metras making an impassioned plea to keep it open and critical of a lack of information.

'It's not a minimal impact for me, not a minimal impact for my wife," Metras said, pointing out that his wife, Gina (who also attended) is 25 weeks pregnant. He said they already had other doctors at Harrington and looked forward to having their first child there, but felt closing the birthing unit violates the hospital's claim of providing "total local care."

Furthermore, Metras decried the lack of information and public outreach surrounding the pro-

"To continue to go to appointments and not get straight answers is unacceptable. Unacceptable," he said, having previously noted, "Apparently, there was a letter that went out to 'Friends of Harrington.' I guess I'm not a 'friend of Harrington'."

Nurse Lindsey Boulay, with nine years on the obstetrics ward, essentially agreed with him, saying "nobody outside the Board of Directors

Cemetery debate costs total more than \$47,000

DUDLEY - It's been several months since the issues of the proposed Islamic cemetery on Corbin Road was finally resolved, but now officials have made public the cost the town accrued throughout over a year of litigation and very public debate.

The request from the Islamic Society of Greater Worcester in early 2016 is still very fresh as the town faced accusations of passive-aggressive racism against the society, which the society in turn received accusations from the town of slander and liable that stained the community's image, all capped by several very public back-andforth debates between attorneys representing both parties.

The Islamic Society of Greater Worcester made its initial push for the cemetery in January of 2016, with the first public meeting drawing a capacity crowd to the town hall in February. The Zoning Board of Appeals turned down the project and in July a lawsuit was filed that lead to the early parts of an investigation and, eventually, a settlement in December. Despite reapplying for a special permit, the Islamic Society dropped their request in April, choosing instead to bring their cemetery to offered land in Worcester.

Dudley Town Administrator Greg Balukonis explained during a Board of Selectmen meeting Monday, July 24 that he compiled a cost total from the 16-month series

of debates and lawsuits to present to selectmen at their request, and make available for the public at their leisure.

"The board had asked me to give a summary of what the cost was for legal defense, not only for the lawsuit, but for the related investigations and the special permit action related to the Islamic Cemetery of Greater Worcester,' Balukonis said. "We spent \$47,298.70. These costs represent the cost of town council services. We also did have special council, which was covered through our insurance vendor. However, we did pay a deductible which is shown in the amount of \$5,000."

Selectmen offered little input and took no action on the document itself,



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Not all pleased Fahey is returning

SPENCER – After a year-plus roller coaster that included an investigation, suspension, rally, and much speculation, recently reinstated David Prouty High School Athletic Director Charles Fahey is eager to move past the turmoil and embark on a fresh start. But several residents aren't willing to dismiss last year's investigation so easily, claiming it is part of a growing problem for the

Fahey last served as AD in 2015. In April 2016, he found himself at the center of a lengthy investigation into mishandled vending machine funds and other accounts. Serving solely as a DPHS math teacher at the time, Fahey was suspended by then principal Patricia Jordan, who wrote a letter to Fahey demanding that he make a public apology and pay restitution.

The status of the investigation was a mystery to residents for several months, with school officials announcing last week that it has been concluded.

"The matter has been resolved and the report is a personnel document, not a public record," said Acting Superintendent Jodi Bourassa.

The AD selection process involved a seven-member search committee, which included parents and faculty

members, among others. Four candidates were interviewed, and David Prouty High School Principal Elizabeth York recommended the highest rated candidate for the position, officials said.

For Fahey, it is a relief to put the investigation in the rearview mirror and focus on the future.

"Everything has been settled and is behind us. It is good to be back, and I am happy I can help the students of David Prouty," Fahey told the New Leader.

Fahey's reinstatement was so sudden that it caught residents and educators alike off guard.

was never told he was coming back. I got a phone call from the principal saying they had chosen a better candidate," said Tab Bassett, who has served as AD since 2015. "It's a frustrating situation – I thought I did a good job. I did what the district asked of me, and I will continue to do what it asks.

Bassett will remain in his position as a physical education teacher at DPHS.

Meanwhile, Fahey's return and former superintendent Tracy Crowe's unexpected departure were announced within a week of each other in a summer of major changes for the district. School officials still have not explained why Crowe left suddenly or addressed the potential financial implications of her departure for the district. If her contract was bought out, parents have asked how that would affect the district moving forward.

Multiple attempts to reach Crowe over the last three weeks have been unsuccessful. Crowe was accused of not being transparent throughout her tenure, but now it is the SEBRSC which faces those same allegations from parents, residents, and staff members.

"They keep talking about transparency and how everything is open, but it is anything but transparent," said Spencer resident Bob Cirba, who served on the SEBRSC from 2010-11. "[SEBRSC Chairman Jason] Monette has always said his two biggest objectives were getting rid of Crowe and putting Fahey back in. I believe the reason she [Crowe] is gone is because she would not bring Fahey back."

Crowe's departure was one of many in what has become a carousel at the leadership levels of the district in recent years. Five superintendents have served the district in the last seven years, while David Prouty High School has seen four principals in as many years. The district has also experienced a mass exodus of students and staff, and even the town of East Brookfield, itself, is questioning whether it wants to remain in the district, a process that could last over three years.

"It's a big problem, and it's getting worse," said a Spencer parent who

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wished to remain anonymous. "People are afraid to ask questions and face the harassment. They just move their kids elsewhere, away from this poisonous situation.'

Asked what she meant by "harassment", the resident described several incidents in recent years, among them the circumstances reportedly surrounding former DPHS principal Eileen Belastock's departure. In the spring of 2016, reports surfaced of allegations that Belastock was threatened and assaulted in her office by unnamed school employees. No one was ever charged in the alleged incident.

Belastock left her position without explanation last fall, and she was ultimately replaced by Jordan.

Speeding trends draw concerns from Dudley resident

DUDLEY - Dudley's selectmen and emergency officials are being urged to take immediate action on reducing the threat of speeding in the community after a local citizen brought the issue to their attention at a recent meeting.

Airport Road resident Richard Clark took the time to make himself heard during the Dudley Board of Selectmen meeting on Monday, June 24, voicing his concerns about continuous speeding on his own street, which he noted is a concern for residents all over Dudley as motorists fly through back roads and main streets of the town. After seeing strategies presented for reducing speed in Worcester, Clark decided to bring his concerns to selectmen and ask that serious action be taken to crack down on speeding sooner rather than later.

"I would hope that the town would take this matter seriously. I would have for something tragic to happen. I think the law of averages are against us in that regard," Clark told selectmen who showed great interest in creating a plan of action to resolve the situation.

Selectmen called upon Dudley Police Chief Steven Wojnar to weigh in the on the concerns at which time the chief acknowledged there are many streets in Dudley where speeding and potential accidents are a threat.

Wojnar said speeding itself has become a growing concern in Dudley over the years that his department has worked hard with what recourses it has to resolve.

Selectmen Paul Joseph inquired about whether or not the police department had access to grants and other resources to help fund or provide assistance when it comes to traffic stops and speeding violations. While the chief said the department does received grants and does its best to have officers assigned to radar checks, there are limits to what his department is able to do.

"We do get grants for traffic enforcement. A lot of those are focused on a certain times of the year. A lot of times we get them around Memorial Day, Labor Day, Christmas, and New Years. We have grants that focus on those times. We have some specific to texting and driving and some more for impaired operators," said the chief. "It's hard to say when we might have someone else who can go and do something (like radar checks) because that depends on a lot of things. We try to get people out there to do traffic whenever we have people available, but it depends on call volume and other issues we are dealing with."

Richard Clark noted that his concerns are not just for himself, but for others on his street as well as he has noticed Airport Road specifically has become a hotspot for speeding and pedestrians walking the road, where there is little to no sidewalk, risk their lives when walking on their own street. Clark said that many have blamed the students of the nearby schools for the speeding, but noted that school is not in session and the prob-

lem persists. Selectmen asked both Clark and Chief Wojnar for any suggestions they had in resolving the perceived speeding epidemic in Dudley. Clark said he believes it's a matter of showing motorists that no speeding will be tolerated and establishing a reputation that speaks for itself.

"I think one possibility could be increased signage or moving the signs that we have because I think they've just become background noise at this point. People are so used to ignoring them they don't even see them any longer," Clark suggested. "Another thought would be a no tolerance policy. No more warnings, you get a ticket. I think we need to create a mindset. There are some communities not that far away (like Douglas) where if you speed you know you're going to be stopped. We need that sort of mindset here in Dudley.

Wojnar followed this up acknowledging that a shortage in personnel, which he said is not a problem unique to Dudley's police department, does play a factor in the ability for police to effectively eliminate the threat of speeding in town. However, Wojnar stated that there are many areas of concern throughout the community, even more significant and consistently problematic than Airport Road, and another part of the issue is making sure the town utilizing the money and manpower in the most effective way possible. He also restated the busy schedule and unpredictable work environment his officers have to endure while also trying to deter speeders and aggressive drivers.

'We try to do (radar checks) several times a week if we can, but again the problem becomes what happens. It's not a job where you can show up in the morning and say 'alright from seven until eight you're going to do this'. Things change at the drop of a hat. We try to focus it and I'm working with my sergeants to get regular people out there to do things. Several times a week we're out in different places doing different things," said the chief. "There are several problem areas we have to address and look at. The issue becomes if we're going to spend money or whatever we're going to do then how do we direct those resources? I know we've had a few discussions with Central

Massachusetts Regional Planning and those things have come up to have us identify areas that we can target. There are certain things in the mix that we have to address.

The chief said he is not taking Clark's concerns lightly and promised to consult his officers about how to more effectively deter speeders in the foreseeable future, however he said the solution may be more difficult to come to with manpower and funding limited.

"Certainly the staffing level is a huge issue because as issues come up during the day you have to deal with them and an average case comes along and gets tied up for four hours with something. They could be put doing something else, but they're tied up with the task at hand," said the chief.

While a final solution was not determined during the July 24 meeting, everyone involved seems content that the problem will be addressed again in the near future with a possible long-term resolution to help make Dudley a safer community for everyone on or around the roadways.

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
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Old setting, new school

STURBRIDGE – Could preparing for the future mean stepping into the

That's what founders of the new Old Sturbridge Academy hope, as they bring their first batch of K-3 students into a school combining computers with the living history of Old Sturbridge Village this fall.

"As a kid, I used to

come to camps here, and knew it was an incredible educational opportunity," said co-director Lisa DeTora. "But it was just for the summer, and I had to go back to the four walls of a classroom."

After years of being in more traditional classrooms, both as student and teacher. DeTora got tapped to realize her dream of blending the two together, of letting kids mix hands-on learning and "skillful play" "in one of my favorite places in the world."

She'll be running the show with Kristen Rhodes, who said they aim to "infuse elements of the Village into the classroom," having the various staff share their old-style skills and knowledge with the kids to learn all the things expected of modern education. The goal, she added, is to tie the for-

mal curriculum to reality "at a developmentally-appropriate pace" by doing "meaningful work."

"That brings joy. They really want to do these projects," DeTora said. "It's student-driven, but also standards-based..."

"... and they're learning despite themselves," marketing director Michael Arnum added.

Among other things, the trio foresees kids using real crops they animals plant. they see being born, snowshoeing across OSV's com-

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mon, and a host of other things as fodder for their own exploration of the world. First graders have already expressed interest in raising chickens, second graders in planting a garden, and third graders in doing something with the trails. A key part of that, they said, is ensuring the kids can translate it into the real world, communicate with others, and play a role as "leaders in their community."

Although classes don't start for a couple weeks, the kids have already been given summer reading (on animals, although dragons count). Meanwhile, the adult staff has been reading about community and the teachers start this week, DeTora said. She noted the academy will be part of the 150-school nationwide EL (formerly, Expeditionary Learning) Education network, which grew out of Outward Bound and has three key goals -- character education, mastery of skills and high-quality work. To her, that ties in well with the Wells family's intentions for OSV as a hands-on educational institution.

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The concept for a charter school came when Executive Director James Donohue took over his role in 2006, but it took some time to pull it together.

"I thought it'd be a great location for some kind of school. It lends itself to an active learning environment," Donohue said, noting OSV had a private, tuition-based school in the 1950s that lasted just one year.

After he reorganized OSV's offerings by restoring its commitment to costumed live staff, Donohue began looking into the school itself. A key impetus came from next door, when he noticed Southbridge's schools "were in disarray" and felt there was a need for "a public educational alternative," he said. Five years ago, OSV received a grant to study the concept's feasibility, and this year, that seed is germinating.

The academy will take 160 kids from kindergarten through grade 3, with two classes in each having 20 students. Every year thereafter, it'll add at the kindergarten level until it has eight grades with 360 kids and the

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current third graders become their first graduates. Although they've received "a lot of requests," there's plan no for now to expand into high school, so those kids will going elsewhere for

prospect has The already sparked some concern in Southbridge, from which the new charter is getting dozens of students. That will mean Southbridge loses at least \$800,000, and possibly over \$1 million, in state aid every year; the state is reimbursing 75 percent of that this year, but only 25 percent next year and none thereafter.

Southbridge officials have been talking with state education officials and legislators about this fiscal issue, but have no resolution yet. That means a statement included in the March town budget presentation remains valid. Town Manager Ron San Angelo then wrote, "State comments -- We need to make sure the district is successful. We will work with you to ensure the Town can deal with this funding issue."

But he continued, "If not, the Town will have to consider reducing funding to our local school district. The Town simply will not have the funds to send this much money to the Charter School and at the same time provide necessary increases to our own schools."

When asked about that, Donohue said, "The Village doesn't get to weigh in on how charter schools are funded." He said the school aims to "recruit students that are the most at risk and not succeeding in traditional public schools.'

When specifically asked if OSV would work with Southbridge and the state to change the funding formula, he added his priority is to get the school itself "off the ground," and he thinks OSV can share "best practices" with other dis-

prevent any business growth in the area if there was a need for a water connection under the roadway. The decision to apply for the grant came less than a week after the town played host to Lieutenant Governor Karyn Polito during which selectmen discussed several initiatives, including the Route 20 work. Selectmen said the discussions July 20 with the lieutenant governor also involved interest in any economic growth plans for that area of town, which Craver said is a discussion currently ongoing.

We have been working with the planning board," Craver said.

"(Town Planner) Alan Gordon is assisting in putting together the package - I believe he's spoken with three property owners on Route 20. I have spoke with one of them who would not be advantageous, but I believe Mr. Gordon has already approached someone."

Selectman Rick Swensen said he hopes the town receives the grant and appreciated the opportunity to speak with the lieutenant governor the week before to discuss some of the water quality issues the town has suffered over the years and drive home the significance of the water installation project.

"It's been observed that for years we have contamination on the east side of town caused by the state salt shed. We have contamination in the central portion of town that the state has at least partially coupled in with the Mass Turnpike incidents and we have contamination in the western side of the town that the state has responsibility in at the junction of 20 and 49," Swensen said. "So it's nice to see that the Lt. Governor was here and stepped up and her office and the DOT really seem to be generally concerns with working with us to make this right. It was very encouraging."

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


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Third annual Blueberry Fest biggest yet

Back in the world

Paul Shanley is back in public, living in a small apartment out in Ware. The announcement the defrocked priest is out, mostly because of his age, has had a lot of people disturbed.

Is it possible, even at his more advanced age (he is now in his 80s) he might reoffend?

There are a lot of safeguards in place, attempts to keep children safe from such people; announcements of where they live, and awareness by the police of who they are and where they are likely to be; where they work, where they

It's been a calmer, quieter few years in the Catholic Church; we can only hope it is because people have become more vigilant and they are also more likely to blow a whistle rather than accept someone they find is inappropriate. They won't just pass a sketchy person along to be someone else's problem either, the Church has become more responsible.

But, and it's a big "But", we can't let our guard down. Not with church groups, not with scout troops, not with sports teams, not in any place where we hope our children are safe and with other responsible adults learning something valuable...good lessons not bad

The possibilities are always there. unfortunately; it's up to all the rest of us to stay alert.

Along that same vein, there was a shooting close to home last week. As the facts unfold, we discover the man had a long, violent history; and his choice to wave what looked like a real pistol at Spencer Police (who know him and his history), was probably not a good life choice.

Now that he is no longer a threat to anyone, we have been told about his long history, his arrests for domestic violence, his repeat offenses.

The new guidelines for the departments to provide information on domestic calls has changed in the past few months. The addresses are not provided, but more importantly, the name of the person arrested for the domestic violence is also no longer available for publication.

The reasoning, we were told, is to protect the lives of the victims in the incidents.

No, it isn't.

It's blatantly to protect the perpetrators. The person, after all, is arrested. Arrests for all other crimes are public record.

And if this person has harmed someone, and might harm someone else, then the name should be public.

Period.

There's no protection of victims here. There's a good old boy decision to protect the guy who did the hitting.

One has to wonder if the fellow with the long history of domestic problems and who just lost his life for his idiocy just might have been less of a threat with all his neighbors aware of him.

Hints for fresh herbs

It's midsummer and most garden herbs are hearty and lush, just waiting to be plucked, pinched or snipped and brought to the table as a flavorful seasoning or garden fresh garnish. From adding a gourmet touch to BBQ rubs, sauces and marinades, to bringing a dash

of class to lemonade, soups and salads, freshly picked herbs are a seasonal delight!

Read on for some helpful hints to better enjoy homegrown herbs!

For best flavor, cut or snip herbs in the morning, after the dew has evaporated from the leaves but before the midday sun heats the plant.

Most annual plants can be harvested twice during the planting season. Cut plants back to about five inches above the ground and feed after cutting. Annual herbs can be harvested until

Perennial herbs may be harvested once during the first year and up to three times each season after the initial growth year. Here's how: Harvest up to 75 percent of the top growth in late spring and another quarter in late summer. Stop harvesting about one month before the frost date. Late pruning could encourage tender growth that cannot harden-off before winter.

***Flowering herbs should be harvested when the buds are apparent or when flowers are just opening. This is when their oil concentration is at its peak.

Storing Cut Herbs

Place freshly cut herbs in a bag in the salad crisper of the refrigerator. Or for or maximum freshness, cut an inch off the stalks and place them in a glass of water in the refrigerator. Try to avoid submerging the leaves in the water.

Note: Don't refrigerate basil as the leaves my turn black if they get too cold. Store cut basil in a bag in a cool, dark place or in a cup of water out of direct sunlight.

Bouquet Garni from the Herb Garden The herb bundle or bouquet garni (French for "garnished bouquet"), may have a fancy name, but it is simply a bunch of herbs bound together with string and dropped in soup stock or other cooking liquid to "season it up. Some cooks use a cheesecloth sachet or tea strainer to "steep" the fresh herbs. A fresh bouquet garni is never far if you have an herb garden. A classic fresh bouquet garni includes three sprigs of parsley, one sprig of thyme and a small bay leaf.

If you are using dried herbs, crush them and place in the middle of a cheesecloth square and tie with string. As with all bundles, be sure to leave a long enough length of string to hang out of the pot for easy retrieval. Herb bundles tied in cheesecloth can even be made ahead of time and frozen. Here are some suggestions for bringing out the best in dishes with a bouquet garni:

Poultry: celery stalk; one sprig each of parsley, marjoram, tarragon, and thyme.

Chicken soup: three sprigs each of parsley, thyme, tarragon; one bay leaf. Beef Stew: one sprig each of rosemary; thyme; parsley; one bay leaf.

Provencal: one sprig oregano, savory, thyme, marjoram, and rosemary.

Pork: one sprig thyme; six sprigs parsley, one bay leaf.

Seafood: two springs tarragon; one sprig dill; lemon zest.

Ingredients: 1/2 cup olive oil; 1/2 cup white wine vinegar; 1/2 cup chopped fresh basil; 3 tablespoons chopped fresh oregano; 2 garlic cloves, minced; 1/2 tea-

spoon seasoning salt; 1/2 teaspoon dried crushed red pepper; 1/2 teaspoon sugar

Directions: Combine all ingredients in a jar; cover tightly, and shake vigorously.

Ingredients: one stick butter, softened; 2 tbsp. chopped mint leaves;1 tbsp. lemon juice Directions: Cream ingredients togeth-

Lemon balm: Lemon balm is a relaxing herb that reduces restlessness, anxiety and irritability. It is also used to treat anxiety that causes digestive problems. Simply steep leaves, strain and drink as a tea.

Note: Do not use if you have thyroid problems.

Oregano: Oregano is a great skin remedy to aid in the healing of cuts, scrapes, rashes and even eczema. Simply steep Oregano leaves, strain and allow to cool. Soak a cloth in the "tea" and apply to skin a few times per day until skin is

Basil: Relief of a sore throat is as close as your garden. Pour boiling water over dried basil leaves, steep and strain. When cool, gargle with the liquid three

Passionflower: Passionflower is an effective depressant of the central nervous system which translates into a relaxing anti-anxiety effect. It not only helps general anxiety, but is especially touted as a remedy for nightmares and nocturnal anxiety.

Note: Those taking an MAO inhibitor should not take passionflower.

Skullcap: An herb with fewer side effects, Skullcap helps calm the "worrier" who has racing thoughts and constant fret. This herb is useful for all : types of anxiety but has also been hailed as an aid for stress caused by hormonal imbalances in women.

You have probably heard that diversification is a key to investment success. So, might you think that if

diversifying your investments is a good idea, it might also be wise to diversify your investment providers - after all, aren't two (or more) heads better than

Before we look at that issue, let's consider the first half of the "diversification" question – namely, how does diversifying your investment portfolio

Consider the two broadest categories of investments: stocks and bonds. Stock prices will move up and down in response to many different factors, including good or bad corporate earnings, corporate management issues, political developments and even natural disasters. Bond prices are not immune to these dynamics, but they are usually more strongly driven by changes in interest rates. To illustrate: If your existing bond pays 2 percent interest, and new bonds are being issued at 3 percent, the value of your bond will fall, because no one will pay you full price for it. (Of course, it may not matter to you anyway, especially if you planned to hold your bond until maturity, at which point you can expect to get your full investment back, providing the bond issuer doesn't default.)

Here's the key point: Stocks and bonds often move in different directions. If you only own U.S. stocks, you could take a big hit during a market downturn, but if you own domestic and international stocks, bonds, government securities, certificates of deposit and other types of investments, your portfolio may be better protected against market volatility, and you'll have more opportunities for positive results. (Keep in mind, though, that even a diversified portfolio can't prevent all losses or guarantee profits.)

So, it clearly is a good idea to diversify your investment portfolio. Now, let's move on to diversifying financial service providers. Why shouldn't you have one IRA here and another one there, or enlist one advisor to help you with some types of investments and a different advisor assisting you with others?

Actually, some good reasons exist to consider consolidating all your investment accounts with one provider. For one thing, you'll keep better track of your assets. Many people do misplace or forget about some of their savings and investments, but this will be far less likely to happen to you if you hold all your accounts in one place.

was consulted" and "our ideas have been ignored or nat-out rejected.

Afterward, she noted the nurses first heard of the proposal May 23, and if it happens, all 19 OB/Gyn nurses "will be out of jobs.

Speaking on behalf of the nurses, Boulay she tried to make a case that keeping the service had more ramifications than just the number of births. Among other things, she noted the emergency room often sees very rapid births due to opioids and other issues, and worried what effect not having someone with obstetric specialization available would have on such people. It takes two years to develop skill in the field, and if Harrington's doctors are on call at UMass Medical Center, they might not be available here in emergencies, she said.

She summarized the plan as "a disservice to all involved, and the constant transport will strain an already strained EMS system. To the board, it's all about the numbers. To us, it's about

the families.' In making his case for the closure, CEO Edward Moore agreed that the numbers were a key aspect. He said Harrington has seen a large decline in deliveries since 2007 (from 412 to 217), while the average for Bay State community hospitals is nearly 1,100 a year. That makes Harrington the third lowest statewide, with only Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket being lower, and he said some people surveyed said they went elsewhere because Harrington lacks a Neonatal ICU. (He and others noted very few deliveries need such a unit, however.)

"We don't have critical mass to continue the service going forward," Moore said, after listed several things the hospital has done to try to boost the numbers. One of those things was allowing deliveries at its Charlton location.

Overall, Moore added, "part of the decision-making process" was the fact the unit is losing \$1.8 million a year. If it closes, most of the doctors have already agreed to stay at Harrington, serve in Spencer, and will be on rotation at UMass. They will continue to handle pre- and post-natal care and gynecological surgery at Harrington, he said.

"That is the hardest part of this. I

know personally that we provide a great service," Moore said when he began his

Board member Laurence Morrison agreed, saying he voted for it "reluctantand only after a "methodical" look at the issue that found "a marketplace response which was thin." He said the "accumulated, hard, unblinking data ... proved compelling, like it or not."

Tony Detarando added that few votes in his time on the board "have been as emotional and impactful" as this, and it "was not a conclusion taken lightly." He noted the hospital tried to stave it off a few years ago, when the fiscal picture was similarly bad, by hiring two more OB/gyns and opening a unit in Charlton, but it didn't work.

To Dr. Susan Waters, the hospital's expansion is part of the problem. A former Harrington nurse now at Head Start, she urged Harrington to "discontinue areas that are empty -- offices and real estate," and put the funds into the birthing unit and other programs.

"They bought up all these little properties, and now they're empty," Waters said afterward. "They should be investing in the babies. They're expanding so big and fast, but not investing in what they have.'

"Most of our properties are occupied and utilized," Moore responded, noting, selling property "is not a great longterm solution to maintain long-term needs."

"We're not the first hospital not to have a maternity program" -- Mary Lane in Ware, Wing in Palmer, and Marlborough Hospital all disbanded theirs, he added. "There are models and solutions out there that we haven't publicized because we're still working out the details.'

The hearing, conducted by the state Department of Public Health, aimed to get testimony on whether keeping the maternity ward open "is necessary for preserving access to health service in the area," DPH representative Sherman Long said. DPH will make a decision within 15 days of Friday (that is, by either Aug. 12 or 18, depending on whether the requirement is calendar or working days) and is accepting further comments by email to stephen.davis@ state.ma.us.

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How Pierpont Pond came into being

Back In Time

When Massachusetts Bay Colony Governor Joseph Dudley died in 1720, he bequeathed his thousands of acres of land to his sons, Paul William Dudley, who began selling the land to English settlers. Governor Joseph Dudley also bequeathed his great grandniece, Ann Hilton of Cambridge (b. 1698, Roxbury), 500 acres of land located in what would become Dudley, Oxford, and Charlton. In 1722, Ann Hilton married Ebenezer Pierpont, a wealthy merchant from Roxbury.

Ann and Ebenezer sold some of her 500 acres, but the family retained 125 acres of land, including a large meadow. (A meadow at that time indicated a tract of moist, low-lying usually level grassland, often used for growing superior quality hay.) This land became known in the Pierpont family as "the Dudley farm." Located in the northeast corner of Dudley, the area abutted the Charlton and Oxford town lines. Ebenezer also held about 500 more contiguous acres just over the town line in Charlton. There is no evidence the Pierponts ever actually lived on the property. Ann died in 1745 and Ebenezer died in 1755.

In 1768, an attempt was made at a Dudley town meeting to approve a new town road running from the southwest corner of the Pierpont property to what is now Dudley-Oxford Road, but it failed.

The 125 acre "Dudley farm," as well as 49 contiguous acres in Charlton, were acquired by Ebenezer Pierpont (the son) in 1795, and at that time a map of Dudley showed no pond on the land. There was a seasonal brook running through the property.

Many of the old deeds mention as a landmark the "Pierpont stone wall (so called)" and there are still many old stone walls visible today through the water of Pierpont Pond from when the property was a "meadow."

was a "meadow. In 1803, the 174 acres (125 acres in Dudley plus 49 acres in Charlton) were sold to Ebenezer Brown. Brown then sold the 174 acres to Thomas Larned of Dudley in 1809 with no mention of a pond in the deed. By 1812, Pierpont Meadow Pond appears on a Dudley map for the first time. The pond probably originated with Thomas Larned. Larmed enlarged what he called his "Pierpont Farm" to 218 acres and in 1810 sold the property to William C Brown, who sold to Ozias Cortiss in 1826.

Henry Hale Stevens had started Stevens Linen Works in 1846 and by the late 1850s was buying up every water privilege in sight. In 1853, he bought 80 acres with a small mill at the north end of Pierpont Meadow Pond where it empties to the north (Charlton) and in 1866 bought the abutting 218 acres from Ozias Cortiss in Dudley.

It was announced in 1868 that Stevens had re-opened the old mill he owned in Charlton, was putting in new machinery, and planning to do some of Stevens Linen Works' beetling there. Shortly thereafter, he approached Dudley about making a new road from that mill to Dudley.

that mill to Dudley-Oxford Road. The town agreed and allotted \$2,500 to build the road, which was opened to the public in 1869 and was officially known as Pierpont Avenue. Two miles long, it cut 1-1/2 miles off the trip from Dudley to Charlton.

Because of money problems, Stevens signed his mill, Stevens Linen Works, over to corporators in 1868 and then left the mill in 1877. Stevens Linen Works, Inc. was thus created in 1868, followed by Stevens Linen Associates in 1939, organized to divest the mill of unwanted assets (land, buildings, etc.). The area of Pierpont Meadow Pond was sold off in several parcels. One large parcel sold to Leverne F. Lundberg included the land under the pond and the water rights. This parcel, with the land and water rights, then went in 1940 to Alvin L. and Esther D. Clark, who sold house lots on the pond for years. Alvin died in 1954 and Esther D. Clark died in the early 1970s.

In April 1960, after the catastrophic flood of 1955, the U.S. Government using a "land-taking" took possession of 93+ acres of land beneath Pierpont Pond, at the time still owned by Mrs. Esther D. Clark per the deed of 1940. This "taking" was part of the Buffum Dam Project. She was paid \$350. The 93+ acres were then placed under the management of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, who held a right-to-flood easement for Pierpont Meadow Pond. Although not used for 50+ years, if Buffumville Lake's water level rises to dangerous levels, this easement gives the Corps the right to flood Pierpont Meadow Pond to lower the water levels at Buffumville, the current capacity of which is 5.2 billion gallons of water. The Corps' office explained that some people who have built or rebuilt homes/camps on Pierpont Meadow Pond since 1960 are not aware that the easement may include the land they have built on, and that some foundations and footings have been built in the flood easement area. If your structures are close to the current shoreline, your property may be in the easement. The Corps' office in Oxford (48 Old Oxford Road) said if there are questions about this easement, the Corps may be



ARDLOCK PLACE: Henry H. Stevens lived next to his new linen mill on a triangle of land between what is now West Main Street and the mill. He desired a driveway to his new home and in April 1867 laid out and graded and improved the grounds at his residence and opened a street in the rear of his residence. running north and south. This private right of way belonged to Stevens Linen. The property around the right of way changed hands several times but the little road between West Main and the mill still remains a private way. About 1940 when the H. Wadsworth Crawfords took over much of the Stevens property, the road still remained property of the mill. It became known as Ardlock Place, probably named by the Crawfords, but to this days is still a private way held the owners of the Stevens mill.

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
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
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GO **FISH** DAN

What are you doing sitting at home? Head to Florida for sun, fun, and snakehead fishing!

Bullseye snakeheads were first documented in the Coral Springs area in 2000 and are now considered an invasive species throughout southern Florida. They're spawning at incredible rates and competing with native species for food. So, what does that mean for you and I? Well, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission makes it very clear: "If you catch one, do not release it!" Instead, you should "humanely euthanize" your catch and, if you like, eat it.

Snakeheads are not only tasty, they say, but they're "even said to have medicinal benefits in its native range by hastening the healing of wounds and internal injuries."

If protecting the Everglades isn't reason enough to make the trip this winter, you should know that snakeheads are a blast to catch because they put up a serious fight. I learned this firsthand when my friend Captain Shane Procell took me

Snakeheads "lock in like radar," Shane said. "They're like a heat seeking missile, just oblivious to everything else around them."

Luckily, I was finally able to experience it for myself when I caught my first ever snakehead, and my guy did not disap-

Shooting incident reveals long bistory of criminal activity

SPENCER - The man killed last week in an officer-involved shooting had a lengthy history of run-ins with the law, including a previous police chase and several domestic incidents.

Walter Lynde, age 49, of East Brookfield, was shot to death by a Spencer Police Department officer during a domestic incident on July 23. According to Worcester County District

Attorney Joseph Early's office, Lynde was shot as he approached a house at 160 Northwest Road. A replica handgun was located near him, which he allegedly pointed at the officer.

Lynde was transported to the University of Massachusetts Medical Center in Worcester, where he was pronounced dead.

Just after 8 p.m., Spencer Police initially received a call reporting a domestic dispute at 160 Northwest Road. When Officer Brandon Fullam arrived on scene, he spoke with a woman at the home who said the suspect had left. The woman was advised to seek a restraining order at East Brookfield District Court the next morning.

A short time later, Officer Fullam encountered Lynde in his vehicle heading back toward 160 Northwest Road. Fullam attempted to stop the vehicle, but it sped off. A chase ensued, with Lynde reaching speeds of 80 miles per hour before he ultimately returned to 160 Northwest Road.

In the driveway of the home, Lynde was ordered to stop and drop the gun, officials said. After Lynde reportedly pointed the ostensible firearm at Fullam, the officer fired one shot and Lynde collapsed.

The replica gun is a black pel-

let pistol, police said.

Officer Fullam is a six-year enforcement veteran, spending the last year with the Spencer Police Department. He has been placed on administrative leave, Early's office indicated.

Police said the victim of the domestic incident will not be identified. State Police detectives assigned to the Worcester County District Attorney's office continue to investigate the circumstances leading up to the shooting.

Meanwhile, documents obtained by the New Leader reveal Lynde's extensive history of charges dating back to 2001, when he was involved in a police chase and subsequent standoff at a North Brookfield residence. The chase began after Lynde was suspected of robbing and damaging a Sturbridge liquor store.

In 2014, Lynde was arrested in South Carolina following another domestic incident that led to a confrontation with police. He was charged with resisting arrest with a deadly weapon, criminal domestic violence, and third-degree arson. A year earlier, South Carolina police responded to his then girlfriend's workplace after she reported him making threats.

some similar skates can sell for as low as \$12. A closer look at these skates reveals some features that will make them more desirable to collectors though. The blades are signed "Dudley Fox Hockanum, Conn." Hockanum is a section of East Hartford. Some stamp collectors may know Fox because he was the Hockanum Postmaster who used a stamp cancellation shaped like a running fox according to the Connecticut Postal history website. He also commanded Hartford County's First Regiment from 1833-1836. Fox was listed as a silversmith or "tinner" (metal worker) in the Hartford City Register during the 1840's. Being an accomplished metal worker, he added a flourish to the ice skates he created. The metal curls on the front of the skates have a snake head design. It is unusual to see this and will increase the collector appeal. How large a difference will it make in the price? We will find out after they sell in our August 31st auction.

Getting 'a leg up, not a bailout'

A sign of the times in many communities is the fact they often have blight policies that require clean-up of potentially dangerous buildings.

While those are all too often owned by absentee landlords or distant banks. sometimes they're still home to longtime residents like Sutton's Robert Faulkner: seniors, veterans and others who would maintain them if they could afford to.

"I barely squeak by," the 77-year-old Army veteran said. "When my wife died, my income got even lower because of losing her Social Security.'

That made it difficult to address roof work, painting and porch work his house needed, as did the fact "I can't get up on a ladder now. Too risky.

At some point a couple years ago, he saw a blurb in the paper about Habitat for Humanity's Critical Home Repair program and gave them a call. His wife was then still alive, but their fiscal situation still wasn't great, so they qual-

'They did an excellent job," Faulkner

said. "I have to make payments, but I can handle them.'

"Our goal is to help people stay in their homes," said Habitat's regional CHRP director David Hamilton, who noted the application asks "a whole lot of questions" to determine income eligibilītv.

Specifically, the program is limited to people making 30-60 percent of the area's median income, live in the home and aren't using it for rental income, are current on mortgage and insurance, and meet certain other requirements. One of the latter is willingness to partner with Habitat, either by making payments on a zero-interest loan and/or putting "sweat equity" into their own project or some other Habitat work.

"We need a partnership for this to work. It's a leg up, not a bailout," Hamilton said, noting participants usually pay about 40 percent of the total cost over the course of three to six years. "... There's more money available for veterans than non-veterans."

Typically, projects stay on the outside, fixing things so the home meets health and safety codes. Roof and siding repairs, stairs, porch banisters, handicapped ramps and the like are common, but about half the time, Habitat will hire subcontractors to do interior work, particularly plumbing and electrical repairs, that state law doesn't allow their volunteers to do.

"We occasionally see projects that are bigger than we can handle," Hamilton added. Their goal is to keep it below \$15,000, and sometimes that means doing work in pieces. Sometimes, though, it means "painfully" making the decision to reject the project. They do 10 per year.

Since 2011, Habitat's Metrowest-Greater Worcester branch has done 23 repair projects on top of their better-known 52 home building projects, six of the latter are in progress. He said they're also looking for neighborhood revitalization projects, such as one they're doing in Marlborough.

According to Cara Fausset and others, "the specific obstacles that older adults encounter in home maintenance are not well documented," so her team tried to do so in a study called "Challenges to aging in place" at www.ncbI.nlm. nih.gov. In their research, depending on the question, 15-20 percent of the

participants identified home repairs as 'difficult to perform or likely to become difficult," especially if living alone. In some cases, they note, "participants mentioned not doing a task anymore; certainly, that is not an optimal solution in all cases an might even make a living environment dangerous."

For the most part, they preferred "person-related" solutions -- typically simply having help -- over technology or environmental changes, although there was some difference in responses between men and women and between singles and married couples, Fausset's team wrote.

By understanding the nature of home maintenance problems older adults encounter ... interventions and redesign efforts can more effective and address the areas of greatest need," they

Do I need to get a home inspection?

I get asked this question quite frequently and the answer is typically that the bank will not require you to get a home inspection in order to approve the loan you are getting with a few exceptions. If you are getting an FHA loan or USDA loan then you will need a pest inspection completed and for a VA loan you will need a termite inspection done. If you home is serviced by a private well then you may need a well quality test done. Certain banks may have other requirements as well. I always suggest checking with your loan officer to see exactly what the bank will require to ensure that they can approve your loan.

With all that being said, I always suggest that you get a home inspection. Even if we have extensive knowledge of homes we may overlook things

that we see as not a big deal because we want the home. The home inspector is objective and is just looking to find the defects in the home and they get paid whether you buy the home or This means there is no benefit to them for overlooking a repair or making a big deal about something minor. I have been at home inspections that took 45 minutes and others as long as 8 hours. I do think like anything else many times you do get what you pay for. I would ask around to friends or family if

they had a good experience with a home inspector. Your Buyers Agent should be able to refer you to a few Inspectors that they know and trust as well.

The purpose of a home inspection is to identify large ticket items and safety issues that you could not have had knowledge about at the time of the showing. A good example would be mold in the attic which maybe you didn't have the ability to see that during the inspection or High Radon levels in the water or air. Once you get the results then you need to decide if the price you are paying is fair based on the repairs needed and if you need to ask for repairs to be done or a credit given for the repairs to be done by you after closing.

The big blow for Webster-Charlton was delivered by shortstop Emilee Leber, who smashed a bases loaded twoout, two-strike pitch deep to right field, scoring teammates Madison Johns, Hailey Delphia and Olivia Sokowaski.

"I don't know what the pitch was," said Leber, who had both of Webster-Charlton's hits in the game, having also singled in the second inning. "I just know I had two strikes on me, so it was really nerve-wracking at that point because any close pitch could get called a strike and the at-bat would be over. The pitch was outside and when I made contact I was just hoping it would go past someone so I could get on base."

Leber said that she knew the magnitude of the hit the second it left her bat.

"I actually ended up tearing up on second because I saw the scoreboard with our three runs on it and I was like, 'Wow, I did that,'" Leber said. "It felt really good."

Johns was thrilled for his player.
"How about that?" The manager said of Leber's bases-clearing hit. "That is something she is going to remember for a long, long, long time. It brought us right back."

The fact that Webster-Charlton was even within striking distance of tying or taking the lead in the sixth inning is a credit to Madison Johns, who pitched out of one jam after another. New York left 11 runners stranded on base in the game, including the bases loaded in the first inning and two on in each of the third, fourth and fifth frames.

Johns finished the game allowing four runs on nine hits. She struck out six and walked five.

"I went up there just trying to swing at strikes," Delphia said. "The first one was a perfect pitch to hit. The second was a little high, maybe out of the strike zone even, but I was able to get a good uppercut swing on it and hit it out.

Despite her prowess at the plate, the biggest play Delphia made may have come in the top of the seventh inning. Maryland already had a run in, to cut the deficit down to 9-3, and had two runners on and no outs. Maryland cleanup hitter Grace Harkey drilled the ball to the right side, but Delphia fielded the hard line drive cleanly for the first out

of the inning. The next two Maryland batters went quietly to end the threat and the game.


