Doing Burpees for a cause

DUDLEY – Nichols College students accomplished quite the feat in late 2019 completing the "1,000 Burpees for \$1,000 Challenge" to benefit childhood cancer research.

In a release from the college last month, it was revealed that numerous students came together to complete the challenge raising \$1,000 on behalf of Weymouth resident Quinn Waters, a three-year-old boy battling a cancerous brain tumor. The challenge concept originated from Assistant Professor Priscila Alfaro-Barrantes and three of her students from her Sports Management and

Fan Engagement course, Melody Millett, Thomas Budzinski and Ethan Cayer all members of the class of 2021. Alfaro-Barrantes said she was drawn to Quinn Waters after his story received the attention of several big names including the Dropkick Murphys, New England Patriots and Boston Bruins but no colleges had taken the time to visit the young man. Local historian examines Trump's impact

WEBSTER – Local author Paul Macek sees President Donald Trump's activity in the White House as having an interesting literary parallel – Edgar Allan Poe's "Fall of the House of Usher." To him, this administration is damaging the executive branch in a way that it's cracking and bleeding, just as Poe's house does before it sinks into the dark, dank tarn.

Last weekend, at Booklovers' Gourmet, Macek talked about his most recent book, whose title borrows from that famous story – "Fall of the House of Trump." He admits it's both subjective and objective, using documentable historical, environmental, international, social and other issues to show what he feels Trump's presidency is doing. And he doesn't mince words about feeling it's nothing good.

One of his key concerns is Trump's regular attacks on the press as "fake news" when it reports almost anything he does.

"When Trump says the press is the enemy of the people, that is a biased statement," Macek said.

But he also noted "When you attack free press, to me it's un-American, but it is part of our history."

Indeed, most presidents have done so, to some degree; some 19th century administrations were particularly vitriolic about it. But Macek argued the "enemy of the people" concept is new in the US. It appeared in various forms in the Roman era, the French Revolution, the Stalinist USSR and elsewhere. Despite that, the country still has significant freedom of the press, with Macek noting he doesn't think he'd be able to publish a book this critical of the president of several other countries if he lived there.

To him, the US press is not very broad in terms of what ideas it will publish, but he feels the mainstream media has been trying to raise mportant issues.

That sparked some discussion within his audience. Resident Bob Crowther noted US courts have treated press freedom differently in different eras, sometimes jailing people for publishing

Dudley hits the ground running in 2020

DUDLEY – The town of Dudley is coming off of a strong year in 2019, but has already begun looking ahead to what is still to come for the new year and the new decade.

Town Administrator Jonathan Ruda sent out a budget memo to town department heads just before the Christmas holiday showcasing what he felt would be the biggest challenges of the next calendar year for the town. In an interview he stated that many of these items are being carried over from 2019 while others are meant to ensure Dudley is ahead of the game for the future.

"Our town faces big challenges, not the least of which is to replace and upgrade our water and sewer infrastructure, the mitigation of significant issues with some of our critical dams, a plan to deal with regulatory issues and mitigation plans in our storm water plan, the codification and legal review of our bylaws, a comprehensive assessment of our cyber security posture and physical security infrastructure, the rollout of our long-term Capital Improvement Plan and the classification, salary study and reorganization of some of our public facing, Town Hall departments," said Ruda

Oxford residents encouraged to join electricity aggregation program

OXFORD — The town will be reaching out to encourage more residents to join its electricity aggregation program, after hearing it has seen a total savings of "over \$1 million." About \$780,000 of that went to households in town since the program began in July 2017.

That came from Good Energy spokesman John O'Rourke, who told selectmen his firm recently negotiated another two-year term through December 2022 with Nextera Energy Services at a fixed rate of 10.316 cents per kWh. There's also a 100 percent renewable option at 12.366 per kWh.

"Going forward, we're not expecting the May adjustment for National Grid to be below that 10.316," he said, referring to the rate non-aggregators pay for energy. But, he notes, "savings are not guaranteed."

Oxford worked out a deal in cooperation with Charlton and Millbury in 2017 whereby residents and businesses sign up with O'Rourke's firm, who bids on the national level, rather than the more regional level and timeframe National Grid does. The Grid, however, still delivers the power.

one issue, he said, is that Oxford's participation is lower than most communities – just 65 percent vs 85-90 percent. He attributed that to two factors operating when it began: the fact the initial rate wasn't that much below

Boys & Girls Club receives GWCF grant

DUDLEY - Just before the Christmas holiday the **Greater Worcester Community** Foundation announced more than \$1.56 million in awards to 132 nonprofit organizations across the state, one of them house in Dudley.

In a press release issued in December, the Foundation announced all 132 chosen organizations which were chosen for their goals of building healthy, vibrant commu-

nities throughout Worcester County. Foundation President and CEO Barbara Fields said the grants are a reflection of the Foundation's commitment to improving the region both within and beyond the borders of Worcester.

"It is essential that our community's nonprofits receive the resources they need to continue their work. We're privileged to be an investor in so many life-changing organizations," Fields said.

Chair of the Greater Worcester Community Foundation Board Carolyn Stempler added that the Foundations mission is to continue to provide this aid to help communities and organizations become even stronger.

We look forward to seeing the impact of these grants in the coming year and are eager to continue our work serving Worcester in perpetuity," Stempler stated.

Locally, the Boys & Girls Club of Webster-Dudley, located on Oxford Avenue in Dudley, received \$5,000 from the foundation which will reportedly

be used for general operations. The Boys & Girls Club specializes in youth development programs providing opportunities for local youngsters to acquire and build on four basic senses: confidence, usefulness, belonging, and power and influence. This includes after school programs, athletic programs and leadership opportunities meant to educate and empower local children. The local Boys & Girls Club has been a staple of the community since 1958 with its current building opening in 2008. Overall 30% of the grant

dollars awarded through the **Greater Worcester Community** Foundation in 2019 helped support youth leadership, mentorship and summer learning programs like those hosted at the Dudley campus. Other local organizations receiving funding include Auburn Youth & Family Services which received \$7,500 and the YMCA of Central Massachusetts in Southbridge which received five separate grants totaling \$54,000.

Community Development grant projects off to quick start

DUDLEY With Community Development Block Grant funding in hand, the town of Dudley is taking the early steps to seeing two major projects through hiring separate firms to lead the planning for each of project.

At a Planning Board meeting on Wednesday, Jan. 8, Dudley's acting Town Planner, Bill Scanlan, recapped a recent gather of town officials where two planning studies were discussed that will be funded through \$274,225 the town received through the CDBG program, one focusing on ADA compliance and the other added infrastructure to a town roadway.

The first initiative Scanlan discussed is one that will lay out needed improvements to town facilities in order to make them more handicap accessible. This long-term initiative would see Dudley prioritize certain improvements as a long-term capital improvement plan to make its buildings more user friendly for all residents.

'It's an Americans with Disabilities Act self-evaluation and transition plan of town buildings and parks to identify what deficiencies exist for handicap accessibility. That project will be going out to bid soon. The town will be select-

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ing a firm and they'll submit a report probably late summer." Scanlan said.

This study will identify the needs of the town for ADA compliance and serve as an important tool for prioritization and cost analysis. The town will them map out a plan of action for funding in the years to come.

The second initiative will see the Jericho-Brandon area of town receive infrastructure improvements with another firm being brought in to lay out the groundwork for that project.

"The other project is an engineering planning study for the Jericho-Brandon area for water, sewer, drainage and road improvements. There's about 28,000 liner feet of roadway in the area," Scanlon said. "The town will be going out to bid to hire an engineering firm to prepare to identify all of the deficiencies of the infrastructure and priorities for improvements. They'll be working with town staff, the Highway Superintendent, the water and sewer representatives to identify those improvements.'

This process will reportedly include field work and testing of existing facilities. As with the ADA compliance projects, the study and subsequent testing will assist the town in creating a plan of action to see the project through.

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Dudley sets election calendar

DUDLEY - The year 2020 is a major election year, with presidential primaries, town elections and, of course, the election for the next President of the United States of America all on the docket over the next 11 months. Getting ahead of the curve, the town of Dudley has released its 2020 election schedule warning voters and potential candidates of important deadlines and voting days and locations.

It all starts on March 3 with the presidential primary, where registered Democrats and Republicans will have the chance to decide which candidate will represent the parties in the race for President of the United States. The last day to register to vote for the primaries is Feb. 12 by 8 p.m. with absentee ballot applications due by noon time on March 2. Early voting will take place the

week of Mon, Feb. 24 over the course of five days during normally Town Clerk Office hours. The official presidential primary will be help on March 3 from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m. and all voters must choose a party for the ballot.

After that the national stage is set aside briefly for local elections. The deadline for candidates for town offices to obtain and submit nomination papers is 5 p.m. on April 27 and the last day to withdraw nomination papers is May 13. The Last Day to register to vote is 8 p.m. on Tuesday, May 26. Absentee ballot applications are due by noon time on June 12 and a few days later is the big day. The annual town election will be held June 15 from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. at the town hall.


After the town election comes the state primary where state offices and representation candidates will be decided from each party. The last day to register to vote for these primaries is Aug. 12 at 8 p.m. and the deadline for absentee ballot applications is noon time on Aug. 31. The state primary will be help from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m. on Sept. 1.

Capping off the 2020 election cycle is the big day, Election Day. On Nov. 3, the entire country will be watching as ballot open and the next president of the United States is decided. The Last day to register for the election is 8 p.m. on Oct. 14. The absentee ballot deadline is Nov. 2 at noon. There are ten days of early voting from Oct. 19 through Oct. 30 during normal business hours at the Town Clerk Office. Finally, the presidential election will run from 7 a.m. through 8 p.m. on election day.

A legacy we must remember

Offices will close nationwide next Monday in observance of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. King was the chief spokesperson for nonviolent activism in the Civil Rights Movement from 1954 until his assassination in 1968. The federal holiday falls around the King's birth date, Jan. 15.

Republican President Ronald Reagan made the holiday official in 1983. In 1986, the first observation of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day took place. In the year 2000, the holiday was observed by all 50 states for the first time since 1986.

Labor unions in contract negotiations were the first to bring forward the idea of celebrating King via national holiday. Republican Sen. Edward Brooke of Massachusetts and Democrat John Conyers of Michigan brought forth the legislation in 1979 where it was five votes shy of passing in the house.

Those in opposition to the notion of adding yet another federal holiday to a calendar cited costs, arguing that it was ridiculous to ask taxpayers to shoulder the burden of paying for so many unproductive labor hours. Others stated that honoring a private citizen would go against tradition, given that King never held a public office.

In 1980, singer Stevie Wonder released the single "Happy Birthday" to shed light on the campaign. The largest petition in favor of an issue in the history of the United States gathered six million

Two Republican senators from North Carolina (Jesse Helms and John Porter) opposed the bill because of King's public opposition to the Vietnam War, and also accused King of being a communist, despite the fact that an FBI investigation dating back to 1963 had turned up no evidence that King had ever been under the influence of the Soviets.

The bill passed the House of Representatives, 338-90. Within the bill Luther King, Jr. Federal Holiday Commission. King's wife, Coretta Scott King, was made a lifelong member of this commission by President George H.W. Bush in May of 1989.

Martin Luther King Day is seen as a day to promote equal rights for all Americans. While there are few traditions surrounding the holiday, many educators use the day to teach their students about the struggle against racial segregation and racism. In New Hampshire and Arizona, the day is combined with Civil Rights Day. In Idaho, the day is referred to as 'Human Rights Day' and in Wyoming, 'Equality Day.'

King, who was born in 1929, was an American Baptist minister from Atlanta, Ga. In 1964, King was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his work in promoting nonviolent resistance and for advocating for Civil Rights.

On April 4, 1968, King was assassinated at the age of 39 in Memphis, Tenn. by James Earl Ray. Ray, 41, was sentenced to 99 years in prison. The assassin died in prison in 1998 from hepatitis.

As we prepare to celebrate the life of this great American and the principles of unity and inclusiveness for which he stood, which are arguably more important for us to cling to now than ever before, let us remember the words of one of his most famous speeches, delivered during the March on Washington

So let freedom ring from the prodigious hilltops of New Hampshire; let freedom ring from the mighty mountains of New York; let freedom ring from the heightening Alleghenies of Pennsylvania; let freedom ring from the snow-capped Rockies of Colorado; let freedom ring from the curvaceous slopes of California. But not only that. Let freedom ring from Stone Mountain of Georgia; let freedom ring from Lookout Mountain of Tennessee; let freedom ring from every hill and mole hill of Mississippi. From every mountainside, let freedom ring.

And when this happens, and when we allow freedom to ring, when we let it ring from every village and every hamlet, from every state and every city, we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sing in the words of the old Negro spiritual: Free at last. Free at last. Thank God Almighty, we are free at last."

Who can help you with your estate plans?



School busses at railroad crossings: pass, with caution

School busses are back in business after the holiday break. This past week, I was asked a question about these vehicles approaching railroad cross-Busses ings. are required by law to stop at all railroad crossings. Question

was, are cars approaching from the opposite direction required to stop when the bus stops? Since these vehicles transport hundreds of children each day and safety is always a concern, I was asked to provide some information on this subject.

The law covering school bus violations is contained in Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 90 Section 14. Drivers are required to come to a full stop when these vehicles have red lights flashing and children are entering or exiting the A first offense penalty for a violation carries a \$250 fine. Subsequent offenses can range from \$500 to \$2,000 and can also include a license suspension for a minimum of six months. Drivers must also keep their vehicles at least 100 feet behind a school bus. Busses are required to have the words "keep back 100 feet" prominently displayed on the rear of the bus.

Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 90, Section 15 provides the rules relative to railroad crossings. It requires school busses and "any motor vehicle carrying explosive substances or flammable liquids as cargo..." to stop at these crossings. School busses are required to open their service door to insure the crossing can be made with safety. The law provides no exemptions for abandoned tracks, as all these locations must be treated as "live" in the event a train or rail car may pass at some time. A violation of this offense for busses, or other required motor carriers, range up to \$500 in fines or a term of 100 hours of community service.

When these busses stop at railroad crossings, they will generally utilize their yellow flashing lights to signal other drivers. If the yellow lights are flashing, drivers may proceed past; however, they must do so with extreme caution and be prepared to stop if necessary. Similar rules apply to yellow lights at intersections. Bus drivers could activate red lights in order to pick up or drop off children at any point. Drivers must be aware of this fact and proceed accordingly.

It is important to note, there are many other vehicles used to transport school children that are considered outside the normal "large yellow bus." Passenger cars and vans are used quite often to transport students, particularly those who are disabled or with special needs. A number of these vehicles are out transporting children in our area. Due to their less than obvious appearance, many drivers fail to stop when required. The same bus rules apply to these vehicles. Please pay extra attention and be aware of their presence.

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

dissident views. He cited early 20th century Socialist presidential candidate Eugene Debs and the attacks of alternative views during the McCarthy era as examples. Often, such cases have been linked to various sedition laws, the earliest of which dates to the earliest days of the republic.

On several occasions, Macek or audience members referred to George Orwell's 1984 as a parallel to what they see today. Macek cited Orwell's character Winston Smith as "trying to figure out the history of the past" but running into roadblocks because the government was "constantly rewriting the history." While Macek did not say Trump is rewriting history in itself, he noted the president and his key officials often repeat lies and make up reasons for doing things, hoping by repetition they'll be seen as true.

'Orwell wrote 'Whoever controls the present controls the past,' and that past kept getting erased," Macek said later. "You won't find the words in your head to define [many ideas] unless you know

One audience member, who didn't give her name, saw that in the recent claims Trump and Secretary of State Mike Pompeo have made to justify assassinating Iranian Gen. Qassem Soleimani. Various online sources have noted Pompeo uses what's termed the Bethlehem Doctrine to define "imminent threat" in a way that does not require knowing anything specific

about it to claim "self-defense." After the killing, he claimed to have vague threats to four embassies, but has never cited how, where or when, and did not bring them up during Congressional briefings.

Macek agreed, saying it upsets him that most coverage of Iran only cites history back to 1979, ignoring such events as the US/UK overthrow of Iran's elected premier Mossadegh in 1953 to reinstate the brutal shah, whom we supported closely until 1979. He also noted the media ignores the fact we've been using drones in the Middle East since 2003, under both Democrats and Republicans.

Other audience members cited Trump rallies as an issue, with their widely-publicized attacks on various groups of people and some individuals. But one also noted his repetition of key talking points and word use is effective; she noted she sometimes questions her own views.

"If any one of us spoke in that manner, we'd be crucified," one woman

Crowther agreed, adding "He's normalized these kinds of behaviors.'

Macek said that really started with former Press Secretary Kelly Anne Conway's use of the term "alternative facts." which has often been taken up by various pro-Trump groups and internet

Over time, "The readers are getting inundated with this. It's overkill," he noted regarding how much coverage Trump gets in various forms.

The discussion covered a wide range

of policies, historical and present. One that's gotten a lot of ink lately is public health care, but Macek noted that has a long history - "it goes back to Dorothea Dix [1802-87]. She wanted to set up a government agency to deal with the insane and indigent. Both Houses of Congress passed it, but [President Franklin] Pierce vetoed it." Since then, the government tried to run hospitals for blacks in the South that were opposed by President Andrew Johnson; FDR wanted to attach health insurance to his creation of Social Security in 1935. but the American Medical Association killed it; and LBJ proposed expanding Medicare, which was by then supported by the AMA, but it never happened. Under Obama, Congress passed the Affordable Care Act, but Republicans and some court cases have been challenging its provisions. Today, Sen Bernie Sanders has a bill expanding Medicare to cover everyone over four years, while Rep Pramila Jayapal has a bill that would do it immediately.

Crowther said he lived in New Brunswick for several years and found the Canadian health system "excellent." It works on a triage system (which categorizes people based on severity) and hospitals have pharmacies builtin. Overall, he noted, the system is "a fraction of the cost" US citizens pay and "you're covered from birth," even though the taxes amount to 21 percent. Citing the ACA, he argued coverage for pre-existing conditions and the "individual mandate" are critical, comparing it to paying into Social Security. (One key difference is that Canadian

health taxes and Social Security go to the public government, while the ACA requires purchasing private insurance or getting public coverage, if you have low enough income.)

Macek also sees Trump playing on the common lack of understanding about economic issues.

'If you don't know about the history of tarrifs, and he says tariffs are great, you'll defer to what he says," Macek said. "... Most economists say tariffs are bad," largely because they end up being paid by the consumer. He cited two -1828's "Tariff of Abominations," which highly taxed imported goods and raw materials to protect Northern industries, but hurt the South, and 1930's Smoot-Hawley Act, which was primarily on agricultural goods that already had 40 percent tariffs since 1922. According to Britannica Online, "Within two years some two dozen countries adopted similar 'beggar-thy-neighbour' duties, making worse an already beleaguered world economy and reducing global trade.' That Act was the last time the US instituted tariffs before Trump resumed

Macek spent some time also talking about immigration history – we've seen similarly hostile attitudes toward many other groups before - climate change and nuclear weapons, noting the latter are "the two most important issues facing the world."

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
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Antique firearms

Firearms ufactured prior to 1899 are considered antiques. As with most other antiques, there are many collectors specializing in antique guns.

The first recorded use of a firearm dates back to 1364, according to the PBS "History Detectives" Web site. By 1380, handguns were "known across Europe." During the 1400's, matchlock guns came into use.

They "were fired by holding a burning wick to a 'touch hole' in the barrel igniting the pow-der inside." The principal of rifling was discovered in 1498. In 1509 the wheel lock or rose lock was invented. A spark was generated mechanically, and a wick no longer was needed for ignition. In 1540 more accurate rifles began being produced using the rifling that was discovered in 1498. "The first true flintlock" was made in 1630. According to PBS, a lid was added to firearms'

to be moved manually until the flintlock was created to "push back the lid and spark a flint at the same time." Proof marks were first used in 1637. From 1750 to 1850 dueling pistols were used. In 1777, a standard was even created for dueling pistols. They called for "a 9 or 10 inch barreled, smooth bore flintlock of 1 inch bore, carrying a ball of 48 to WAYNE TUISKULA the pound." In 1807 the percussion-detonating principal was patented.

By 1825 percussion cap guns were in general use. The back action lock appeared in 1830. The first Colt revolver was produced in 1835. According "History Detectives' "Samuel Colt developed the first mass-produced, multi-shot, revolving firearms." In 1840 pin-fire cartridges were developed. "True shotguns" came into common use in 1850 according to PBS. The first full rim-fire cartridge was introduced in 1859. Breech loading guns came into common use

in 1861. In 1873, Winchester began mass producing affordable rifles. 1877 saw the first effective double-action revolver. Firearm innovations continued through the 1900's and still continue today.

Antique guns often bring some great auction results. We sold a Colt revolver several years ago that brought \$2,000. Many of the most valuable guns that have sold at auction have a connection to someone famous. Some were valuable because of their rarity alone though. For example, one of the first repeating revolvers by Samuel Colt sold for \$977,500 according to Money Magazine's "The 10 Most Expensive Guns Ever Sold at Auction" list. A gold inlaid pocket revolver from 1849 went for \$1.1 million. WQAD of Moline, IL reported that a record was set when a rare "Walker" Colt revolver was auctioned for \$1.84 million. One set of guns with historical ties that brought six figure sums at auction were Simon Bolivar's (South American instrumental in revolutions against the Spanish Empire) flintlock pistols which




sold for \$1.68 million. George Washington's saddle pistols hit the mark when they sold for a little under \$2 million at auc-

Boucher scored 12 points and hit both of his 3-pointers in the first half. To go along with his scoring and rebounding totals the junior also found time to record 6 assists.

"I like when that is a big part of my game," Boucher said of his assist total. "I would way rather have more assists than points. I love getting my teammates involved and if it gets us the win, rather than me scoring, I don't care. I'd rather get the dub and if that means me being more assertive, then I'll be more assertive."

ssertive."
Bartlett scored 11 of the game's first

13 points, junior Dylan Grandmaison (17 points) dropping in 6 points in the run.

The Indians led by eight points at the end of the first quarter, 14-6. Oxford, however, went on a run of its own in the second period, opening the frame with an 8-2 run to cut the Bartlett lead to 16-14 on a put-back of an offensive rebound by junior Tyler Jacques with 4:57 remaining in the first half. Alex Duval (a game-high 25 points) had four points in the Pirates' spurt.

Bartlett led 25-22 at halftime.

"The talk at halftime was that the pace was not to our liking," Bartlett head coach Tony Paranto said. "The pace was more to their liking. Their game plan was to try and slow us down a little bit and it worked in the first half"

Boucher said slow starts have plagued the Indians so far this season.

"Our defense was good in the first half, but in the second half we really needed to pick it up on offense; get some more ball movement so we could get some easy buckets," Boucher said. "We

started off really slow again. We pulled away at the end, but we really need to focus on not starting so slow and pushing the tempo more, get up the court and play our game."

Bartlett came out running and gun-

ning in the second half, opening the third quarter with a 14-4 run that was capped by a Logan Paranto (5 points) right-side 3-pointer that pushed the Indians' lead to 39-26 with 3:20 remaining in the period.

"In the second half I thought we picked things up a little bit better and that created more open looks for us," coach Paranto said. "We just didn't take care of the basketball. If we had, it would have created more opportunities for us."

Once Bartlett pushed its lead into double digits in the second half, the closest Oxford would get to tying the game was seven points, 53-46, on a Duval fadeaway jumper from the right side, with 1:58 remaining in the game. Duval scored 17 of his 25 points in the second half.

The Indians sewed up the win from the foul line, hitting 7 of 8 free throws in the final 90 seconds. Boucher was 4-for-4 from the line down the stretch while Logan Paranto was 2-for-2.

Coach Paranto was pleased with the win, but it's clear he knows there is room for improvement.

"I think there's a different scheme to every game right now. It's early in the season and we're happy to be 8-1, but at the same time every game is a different look for us," coach Paranto said. "This was a rival game and it was a rock fight. It was a defensive battle and we came out victorious. Good teams can find different ways to win and we're finding different ways to win right now."

Oxford head coach Dave Aldrich also felt the slow start — by his team, not Bartlett — was the key to the game.

"We came out a little slow. We might have been a little intimidated; we didn't know if we were good enough," Aldrich said. "If we don't dig that hole in the first period maybe there's a different result. Every time we made a run, they responded. We have great respect for Bartlett and coach Paranto. He's got all those kids playing hard. No matter who

comes off the bench there is no drop-off in intelligence or intensity.

"They have an amazing shooting range," Aldrich continued. "We were trying to defend three feet outside the arc, and they were shooting from eight feet outside the arc. That was 32 minutes of hell for us. Bartlett played hard the whole game."

Punishing full-court press pushes Beavers out of slow start, into win column vs. Bay Path

UPTON — The Blackstone Valley Tech girls' varsity basketball team, despite its strong early-season record, hasn't shown the tenacity that head coach Britt Kahler is looking for. And when the Beavers

hosted Bay Path Regional on Tuesday, Jan. 7, she called an early timeout with her team, again, being outworked.

"Coming into this game we were 5-1, but we're a struggling 5-1. We've been battling every game. We're lucky because we're pretty talented this year,

but we've been out-hustled every single game," Kahler said. "We're learning to push ourselves and we're looking and searching for people to step up."

The Minutemen held a 4-2 lead early in the first, but that timeout sparked the Beavers. They scored the quarter's final 23 points — and embarked on an overall run of 29-0 bridging the first and second quarters — en route to a lopsided 72-21 victory.

"I saw things tonight that I haven't seen yet. They played as a team, they were talking, they were moving really well, passing really well," Kahler said of the turnaround, as BVT committed just three first-half turnovers as they held a 46-8 lead at the break.

And it was the full-court man-to-man press that worked wonders for the Beavers. They continually produced a steal, finished off a fast-break layup, and then repeated the process.

"Momentum, we needed it," Kahler said of the importance of the full-court press, which was only used in the first quarter as a big lead of 25-4 was established after the initial eight minutes of action. "They are fast. I think at the half we had 14 steals, so that's a big deal. We do much better when we're pushing the ball. But they know in order to push we have to get stops — it always starts with defense."

Bay Path head coach John Selen conceded that his youthful team hadn't seen a press that effective yet this season.

"We've got young players that aren't used to playing the up-tempo, the pressure, so this is their first experience of that," he noted. "They're a fast team, they're a good team, they're a well-coached team. We have trouble replicating that type of energy in practice. The older kids that were there that could help us replicate that aren't with us any longer, so with the younger kids we're not there. We're in a rebuild right now — we're all freshmen and sophomores with a couple underclassmen."

Blackstone Valley Tech then won the third (14-6) and fourth quarters (12-7) with all 15 rostered players getting plenty of minutes. In all, 13 of them scored. Victoria Russian led the way with 14 points, while Madison Magri (11), Mackenzie Vollmer (9), Maddison Mathieu (6) and Sarah Trumm (6) also chipped in offensively.

"I was really, really proud of them," Kahler said. "If you look at the box scores, we have a good eight kids scoring every night, if not more than that."

Now at 6-1, Kahler is hoping that her team has found its

Bay Path, meanwhile, slipped to 1-4. Kalyn Saez and Bethany Lasell each scored 6 points for the Minutemen.

discussions with the developers of the Stevens Mill property. In short, Ruda says officials are entering 2020 hitting the ground running.

"Our priority now is clear for all departments at all times. There is a common thread to many of our regulatory and maintenance, repair and upgrade issues including our capital planning inadequacies. Based on what I've been able to determine is available to communities like Dudley, I hesitate to say that it is a 'lack of funding,' but rather a 'lack of securing the necessary funding," Ruda said. "Whenever possible, we're going to change all that. To the extent possible, we're not going to continue the practice of leaving money on the table. It is not in the best interests of the Town, nor is it in the best interests of the Town's future. Our priority is to secure funding to address our critical issues and to develop long-term and sustainable ways to fund the required maintenance and upgrades.'

In his budget memo to department, Ruda requested that department hears

being "thoughtful and deliberate" in addressing service and organizational issues. These include maintenance, security and data protection as major highlights. It appears the Town Administrator's goal is to put everything on the table seeing attempts to hold off on addressing significant needs as a poor strategy.

"There is more than enough evidence to support that the past strategy of deferring these issues has created or is now dangerously close to creating significant liabilities for the Town and ultimately, for the taxpayer," Ruda wrote in the memo.

He also touched on this in an interview saving he and the Board of Selectmen do not abide by the "kick the can down the road" strategy of town operation.

(The Board of Selectmen) expect progress and for all of these issues to be dealt with in sustainable way. Addressing these challenges will take time and patience but in doing so, we can move these issues forward. We have a very clear, long-term objectives. Fixing these problems is absolutely attainable," said Ruda.

said in a press release.

This led Alfaro-Barrantes and her students to utilize one the grueling exercise of burpees in their challenge which resulted in student athletes completing 2,192 total burpees in only five minutes. "To be going through academics and a social life and to make time for a kid like Quinn is really unbelievable," Tara Waters said in a release. She also stressed the importance of

National Grid's rate and "a lot of misinformation put out over your very active social media in Oxford."

Residents can, however, join "at any time," he added.

Noting he "know[s] nothing about electricity," Chairman Dennis Lamarche asked something many people probably wonder: Why rates drop in summer and rise in winter. O'Rourke said National Grid and Eversource have to bid on power "at very specific times of year ... and the suppliers know that," while aggregators can do so "at strategic times."

Town Manager Jen Callahan said Good Energy agreed to three years when several other potential aggregators only offered rates for six months, citing uncertainty in energy prices.

"I wanted to put the town in for the long haul because I was concerned about that volatility," she said.

O'Rourke noted the state recently

added a new factor to that equation, by bumping energy firms' renewable energy portfolio minimum to 16 percent, and hiking it 2 percent per year hereafter.

"That slice, that 2 percent, is going to be a little more expensive," causing utility rates to keep rising, he said.

In other business, selectmen gave the green light to licenses for new and used vehicle sales for a new trash truck firm on Pioneer Drive.

Environmental Equipment Sales and Service spokesman Dan Cowher said the firm started in Sutton in 2016, but recently bought 10 acres in Oxford. Describing the business as "not like a high-volume car dealership," he said it'll have up to 12 trucks on site at a time, each being custom-made at about \$325,000 per truck. He noted they have seven employees, but hope to hire more.

Also, Callahan announced that Oxford's charter changes were recently approved by the Legislature, but she had not yet heard whether the governor had signed it. She later added the town's first Employee of the Year is DPW Director Sean Divoll.

Navigating garden catalogs to plan for the season ahead

As garden catalogs are piling up and online versions fill your inbox, your thoughts may turn to the growing season ahead. With so many choices of beautiful flowers and scrumptious vegetables it can be overwhelming and hard to resist buying more seeds and plants than you have space to grow and time to tend.

Start by flipping through the pages of various catalogs and searching gardening websites and online catalogs to gather ideas and inspiration. Narrow down your search by selecting plants suited to your climate and growing conditions.

Quality catalogs will list the cold hardiness zone of trees, shrubs and perennials and often include the Plant Hardiness Zone Map developed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. These hardiness zones are based on the average minimum winter temperature. The lower the number, the more cold-tolerant the plant

Sunset Climate Zones for North America may be new to many gardeners. A variety of factors beyond high and low temperatures were considered when the 45 hardiness zones were created. Microclimates, growing season, rainfall, humidity, wind patterns, and ocean currents were some of the other factors that went into defining these zones.

Read the plant description and select plants that match the light, soil and moisture in your garden. Make sure annual flowers and vegetables you select have time to flower and produce before your season ends. Those with a longer time to harvest than your growing season allows will need to be started indoors. You will need time and indoor growing space to start your own long-season plants from seed indoors.

Select the most disease resistant and low maintenance variet-

ies whenever possible. Make sure you have enough space in the garden or containers for all the plants you select and for each of them to reach their mature size. Overcrowding plants increases the risk of disease and can reduce flowering and productivity.

Look for award-winning plants when reviewing the catalogs. All-America Selections' winners (AAS) are tested nationally and selected for improved growth habit, flowering, pest resistance or some other unique feature for the home garden. Perennial Plant, Hosta and Daylilies of the Year are selected by members of the various organizations for their outstanding performance.

Consult your local University Extension service. Most create lists of plants and varieties that are best suited to your region. They often recommend planting dates based on the average local soil and air temperatures.

Your next step - inventory any leftover seeds saved from last season. When properly stored in a cool dark location many seeds can last for years. Longevity does vary with the type of seed, but you may be surprised to find you can get years of planting from one packet of seeds. Onions, parsley, verbena and salvia usually last about a year, whereas properly stored Brussels sprouts, cabbage and zinnias can last an average of five years.

Create your list and set it aside for a day or two before placing your orders. A bit of planning can save you money and increase success as you grow plants best suited to your climate and gardening space.
