Douglas Flea Market damaged during Halloween storm

DOUGLAS — A late-October storm that brought powerful wind gusts to the area last week left one local historic barn in need of minor repairs.

A large tree fell on the Bosma Barn, home of the Douglas Flea Market. Owner Marlene Bosma said the tree has since been removed and the barn suffered only minor cosmetic damages, however, it was unexpected and could have been much worse.

Bob Garrigan owns local company Bob's Tree Service in Uxbridge and responded to Bosma's call for assistance. Garrigan said it was a large pine tree that had fallen and two additional trees were removed so no further damage would be caused.

“It feels good just to be there when people need it,” Garrigan added. “It's always a good feeling to help someone out.”

Bosma said the barn is a historic Dutch Hoop Barn, the only one like it in the region. The barn was built in the late

1930s and housed a dairy farm prior to becoming the home for the Flea Market.

“It was a huge tree...he did a beautiful job taking it down,” Bosma added. “I need to have some shingles replaced, and some of the vinyl siding, but we were very lucky. The barn itself is very historic.—it's a beautiful barn.”

Garrigan and crew responded to at least five additional calls that day, indicating that wind damage was widespread across the region. Garrigan said it is much easier to remove a tree when it's standing, so any residents who feel they need a tree removed may call the group at 508-234-9663.

The Douglas Flea Market will be open for business as usual this weekend. The Flea Market is open every weekend year-round from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and features 40 vendor spots, consignment spots upstairs and dealers present downstairs, according to the Flea Market's website. Registry of Motor Vehicles (RMV) services unavailable Veterans Day Weekend

BOSTON — The Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) Registry of Motor Vehicles (RMV) is announcing that due to its final upgrade to new technology, ATLAS, no customer service transactions can be conducted starting at 6 p.m., Friday, November 8 and until 7 a.m., Tuesday, Nov. 12. Only law enforcement partners will be able to access Registry information. In addition, inspection station locations will not be able to conduct motor vehicle inspections on Nov. 9, 10, and 11.

“We appreciate the public’s patience, cooperation, and understanding as the RMV completes its transition to a new platform that will greatly enhance the quality and number of online vehicle transactions available to

our customers,” explained the RMV’s Acting Registrar, Jamey Tesler. “This transition began with the introduction of new customer credentialing and licensing service in March 2018 and, as with any major organization-wide technology change, we expect an initial learning curve for our staff, business partners, and customers. We encourage all customers to skip the line and go online to take advantage of the many new service offerings that will be available at mass.gov/rmv beginning Nov. 12.”

Registry customers are encouraged to plan for the shutdown of transactions between late in the day on November 8 and the start of business on Nov. 12. Customers may go online prior to Veterans Day, getting vehicles due for

November inspections into service stations prior to Nov. 8, and, if in-person transactions are required, visiting Registry and AAA customer service locations as soon as possible or waiting until later in November.

The first release of ATLAS, the Registry’s new Web-based system, was completed in March 2018, and enabled the Commonwealth to issue a customer option of federally mandated REAL ID credentials. The second, and final, ATLAS release on Nov. 12, pertains to vehicle services such as title and registration. ATLAS provides customers and business partners with new, modern, and more convenient ways to conduct business with the RMV.

With the new system, many new transactions will be avail-

able at mass.gov/RMV.

Customers can begin, and often complete, their transactions online, and are encouraged to go online first to get informed about required documents before they visit a customer service center.

To summarize the customer impacts from Friday, Nov. 8 at 6 p.m. until Tuesday, Nov. 12 at 7:00 a.m.:

- No RMV services, including registration or licensing services, will be available at the RMV, AAA, auto dealerships, or at insurance companies.
- No vehicle safety and emissions inspections will be conducted in Massachusetts.
- No RMV internet transactions or phone service will be available.

- No external interfaces for driver or vehicle services will be accessible.

Massachusetts Registry of Motor Vehicles Service Centers, transactions, and operations will reopen for business on Tuesday, November 12, at regularly scheduled times, following the observed Veterans Day federal and state holiday.

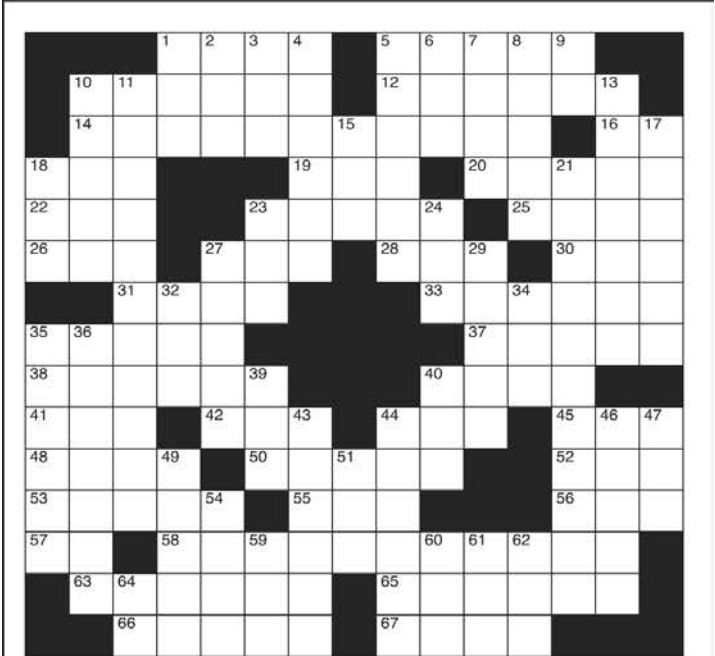

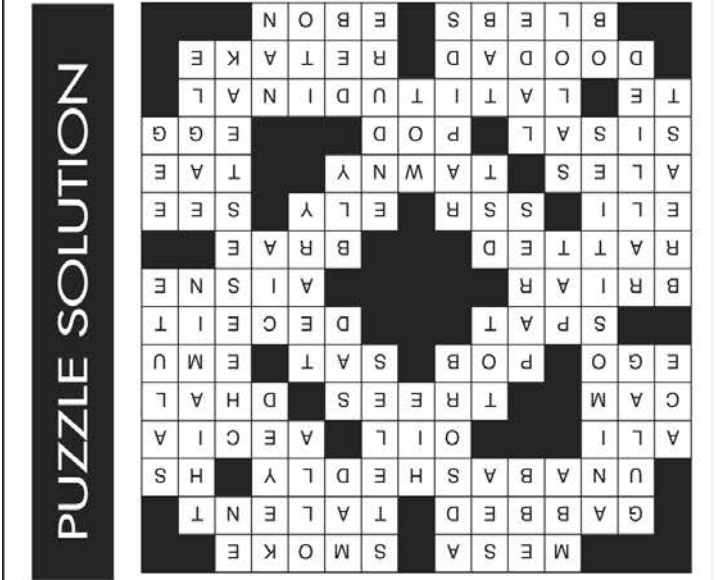

WHITINSVILLE — The Whitinsville Social Library is the public library for the town of Northbridge. “Social” in the Library name indicates it was originally a subscription library and only four libraries in the United States still retain social in their name.

Today’s Whitinsville Social Library has its roots in a meeting held in December of 1844 to discuss a \$100 legacy left by Miss Sarah Whitin “to take into consideration the establishment of a Social Library.” In February of 1876, the Library, then housed in the new Town Hall, was allocated the sum of \$300 by the town and opened as a free public library.

In 1913, the present building at 17 Church St.

was constructed through the efforts of Edward and Arthur Fletcher Whitin, who sold it to the town of Northbridge for \$1 in 1917.

In honor of its 175th Anniversary, the Whitinsville Social Library Board of Trustees invites the community to a cocktail party at the Library on Saturday, Nov. 16, from 6-8 p.m. Tickets are \$75 each including adult beverages and hors d’oeuvres catered by Pepper’s.

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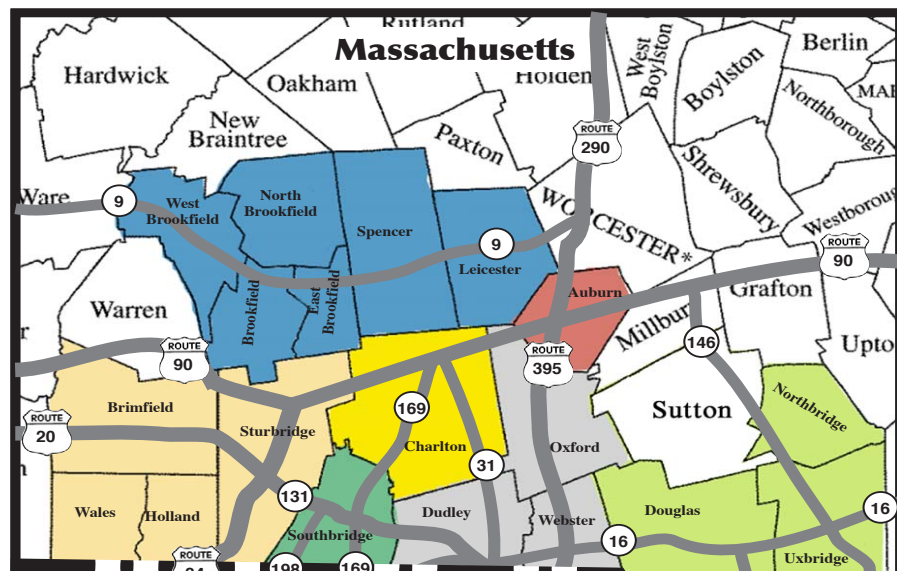
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Historical Society grateful for masonry work on school house

WEBSTER — The Webster – Dudley Historical Society would like to thank the Malser Trust for their generous gift to carry out important masonry work on the group’s 158 year old headquarters, the Little Red School House located near the intersection of Hill and School Streets in Webster.

When Webster formed in 1832, the first educational structure built was the Fenner School in 1835, today’s Little Red School House. The small one room structure continued on as an educational institution until 1935. Following its hundred years of educational service, the structure was relegated to a storage status by the Webster Public Schools, until the newly formed historical society was granted the right to use the structure as its headquarters.

Back in 1919, a century ago, the thought of forming a local historical society was introduced by Lucia Bartlett and strongly supported by Ruth Slater, a direct descendant of industrialist Samuel Slater. Lucia promoted the idea that



a local organization should be formed to preserve and chronicle the area’s history, but in fact it wouldn’t be until 42 years later in 1961, when

Mrs. Bennett Smith, head of the Webster’s Women’s Club, led the way in creating the Webster – Dudley Historical Society. When the group’s

plans were encouraged and approved by the local government officials and they were granted the right of the use of the former one room school

house at 451 School St.

As one can imagine, a structure being more than a century and a half old needs structural attention; in this case, some serious masonry issues had developed. With the funds supplied by the Malser Trust, the society hired local mason Jason Hall to carry out the much needed brick work. Hall did a wonderful job in repairing and painting the 158 year old structure. It should also be pointed out that this is not the first time that the Malser Trust has supported the Webster – Dudley Historical Society with repairs to the structure. Back in 2012 serious roof issues developed threatening the structural integrity of the school house, but with the generous support of the Malser group the repairs were made.

In 1991, the Little Red School House was designated and registered as a National Historic Place. Both Janet Malser and her brother Leonard were former members of the Webster – Dudley Historical Society.

Plan ahead for Amaryllis blooms all winter long



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Let amaryllis fill your home with flowers for the holidays and keep the blossoms coming all winter long. When you plant several different types of amaryllis bulbs, from both the southern and northern hemisphere, you can be sure to get a long-lasting, colorful show that will brighten your mood and surroundings throughout the winter months.

Kick off the holiday season with amaryllis bulbs that are imported from growers in Peru. As we enter autumn, it's springtime in South America, and these bulbs are eager to start blooming. Pot them up before early November for flowers in December.

Amaryllis varieties grown in the southern hemisphere include deep red Mandela, frosty white Denver, coral-pink Bolero and two-tone Charisma. Combine these impressive blos-

soms with greens, poinsettias, candles and other holiday décor, or give them as living gifts to friends, family and neighbors.

Most amaryllis bulbs that are grown in the U.S. are imported from Holland, and their natural bloom time is January through March. Exactly when the flowers will open is impossible to predict. The best strategy is to choose a number of different varieties and plant them 3 to 4 weeks apart during November, December and January. This way you will always have flowers coming into bloom.

Plan a winter filled with amaryllis blossoms by referring to Longfield Gardens' article, longfield-gardens.com/article/When-Will-Your-Amaryllis-Bloom, for insight on when different amaryllis varieties will bloom.

Start your indoor flower display with an early bloomer such as Evergreen, which is always quick to break out of dormancy. Its flowers have narrow, lime/chartreuse petals on 20-inch plants. Enjoy the impres-

sive display as each bulb produces two stems with four to six blooms.

Minerva's extra-large, cherry-red flowers have a white star in the middle and an apple green throat. They are eye-catching from afar and spectacular up close. Apple Blossom is a long-time favorite with snow-white petals brushed with pink and a lime green throat. Or grow a double amaryllis such as Double King with layers of burgundy-red petals and up to a dozen flowers.

Enjoy some of the more unusual amaryllis colors and flower styles by planting varieties such as Naranja, with its tropical red-orange blossoms or Sweet Nymph, a romantic double amaryllis with stunning, coral-pink petals. Add elegance to your indoor garden with Picotee. Its 8" flowers are white with a thin red line around each petal.

As winter turns to early spring, celebrate with an explosion of indoor blooms from Red Pearl, Spartacus and other proven performers. The velvety, burgundy-red flowers of Red Pearl have a deep maroon throat that sets off the glittering gold stamens. Spartacus

turns heads with its crimson petals and bold white stripes.

Display your amaryllis on a mantle, kitchen counter or entryway table where you can watch the amazing show as the first sprout appears, followed by buds and the spectacular trumpet-shaped blooms. Amaryllis are also beautiful, long-lasting cut flowers.

For best selection, order your bulbs early and store them in a cool, dry, dark place until you are ready to plant. Once you pot up the bulbs and place them in a warm, bright location, flower buds should appear in about six to 10 weeks.

Protect yourself from the winter blahs by investing in amaryllis. You can count on their big flowers and bright colors to lift your spirits and ease your way to spring.

types of emergencies that we respond to and train for," White said. "We also showcase the Emergency Medical Service and educate citizens on what the Fire Department does in the back of an ambulance. It's a family friendly event that has been highly successful over the past several years."

Each year, Fire Prevention Month is held in October. The goal is to raise awareness about fire safety and help ensure homes and families are prepared in the event of an emergency, according to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

This year's campaign was "Not Every Hero Wears a Cape. Plan and Practice Your Escape,"

which worked to educate residents about the small but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe.

"Home escape planning and practice may seem so basic that it's not even necessary, but in reality, these efforts can have tremendous impact," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of Outreach and Advocacy, in a statement. "We've seen time and again that advance planning can make a potentially life-saving difference in a fire situation."

NFPA statistics show that the number of reported U.S. home fires in 2018 is half that reported in 1980. However, the death rate per 1,000 reported fires has remained fairly steady, reflecting the continued challenges of safely escaping today's

home fires.

While home is the place people are at greatest risk to fire—approximately 80 percent of all U.S. fire deaths occur in homes—people tend to underestimate their risk, the statement reads. That over-confidence lends itself to a complacency toward home escape planning and practice.

"Most people don't recognize the true value of home escape planning until they've experienced a home fire, and by then it's too late to start developing a plan," said Carli. "The people who take the time to prepare in advance really are heroes—their actions can help make their families much safer from fire."

“Medicare for All” — not the best cure for our health care

To the Editor:

Making health care affordable and accessible is a top priority for many Americans as we approach the 2020 election. Many Democratic presidential candidates have proposed “Medicare for All” as the answer. It’s important to note that various candidates have differing versions of “Medicare for All,” and few have been candid about paying for any version of the proposal. The left-leaning Urban Institute and the right-leaning Mercatus Center both estimate it would cost \$32 trillion over the next ten years which would be borne by American taxpayers. That’s a lot of money – our money! Furthermore, the various proposals fail to address the very real issue of rising health costs whether the people or the government (the taxpayers really) foot the bill.

The leading Republican presidential candidate has stated he’ll propose his health care plan after the 2020 election. Whether a Democrat sponsoring “Medicare for All” or the Republican candidate wins, we won’t know the real provisions and actual costs of our health care until well after the next election.


To be candid, some people might save by reducing their private insurance. However, it is unclear if people can completely eliminate their private insurance costs. Even Medicare, as it currently works, only covers about 80 percent of patient costs. Some people who have excellent insurance coverage through their union or employer,

and who gave up other benefits to obtain that coverage, may not want to give up their hard-won gains, as some “Medicare for All” options could require. Massachusetts, and more recently Vermont, considered Single Payer Health Care proposals similar to “Medicare for All,” but officials in both states concluded it was unaffordable.

With a one-size-fits-all government insurance plan, and that’s “Medicare for All,” the level of government payments to health care providers might force some – especially small community hospitals and medical offices – out of business. After all, providers already complain that Medicare and Medicaid payments are inadequate. Furthermore, we often read media reports that the Medicare Trust Fund could be running out of money, and that’s only covering our seniors and younger people with disabilities at this point. “Medicare for All” is a popular concept that sounds too good to be true. It probably is! Before we all sign on to the new, untried “Medicare for All” proposal, why not work to improve the Affordable Care Act (ACA) that currently governs our health care? We should encourage our Congressional representatives make the ACA work better for all of us before they scrap a plan that has expanded access to affordable care. Neither our family’s health nor our country’s economic security should be sacrificed for some catchy, but unproven, political gambit!

Take greater control of your 401(k)

If your employer offers a 401(k) or similar plan, you’ve got a powerful retirement-savings tool at your disposal. And yet, how well you do with your 401(k) depends greatly on your choices and actions. What steps can you take to maximize the benefits of your plan?

For starters, be aware that your 401(k) may come with what might be called “standard” features, which you should review to determine their applicability to your situation. These features include the following:

Default deferral rate – When you take a job, your employer may automatically enroll you in the company’s 401(k) plan and assign a “default” contribution rate – the percentage of your salary you will put in to your 401(k). Many companies choose a default rate of 3 percent, although, in recent years, there has been a move toward higher rates, even up to 6 percent. Unfortunately, too many people don’t question their default rate, which could be a problem, especially if it’s at the lower end. If you want your 401(k) to ultimately provide you with as many financial resources as possible, you will likely need to contribute as much as you can afford. So, be aware of your default rate, and, if you can possibly afford it, increase that level. And every time your salary goes up, consider boosting your contributions.

Investment mix – When you’re automatically enrolled in your 401(k), the amount you might initially contribute isn’t the only “off the shelf” feature – you also might be assigned a default investment option. One common default investment is known as a target-date fund, which generally includes a mix of stocks, bonds and cash instruments. Your 401(k) plan provider, or your human resources area, will typically base this mix on your age and projected retirement date. Usually, this fund will grow more conservative over time, reflecting the need to reduce the portfolio’s risk as you get nearer to retirement. However, you may not be obligated to stick with the default option. Most 401(k) plans usually offer several options from which to choose. Ideally, you’d want to spread your investment dollars among a mix of these investments to give yourself the greatest growth potential, given your risk tolerance and time horizon. And always keep in mind that your 401(k) is a long-term vehicle, designed to help you prepare for a retirement that may be decades away. Consequently, try to discipline yourself to look past the inevitable short-term drops in your portfolio.

Matching contributions – If your employer offers a 401(k) matching contribution, you should certainly take advantage of it. Consider this: If you employer matches 50 cents for every dollar you contribute, up to 6 percent of your pay, and you contribute the full 6 percent, you would, in effect, be receiving a 3 percent pay raise (50 percent of 6 percent). That’s like a 50 percent rate of return even before you invest this added money.

Taking control of your 401(k) in the ways described above can help go a long way toward getting the most from your plan – and, as a result, may help get you closer to supporting the retirement lifestyle you’ve envisioned.

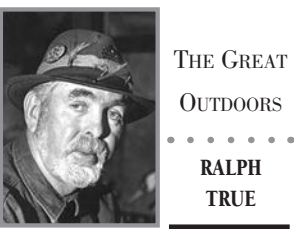

UXBRIDGE — The Blackstone Valley Tech (BVT) versus Uxbridge High girls' varsity soccer game on Tuesday, Oct. 29 appeared to be just another regular-season finale between teams headed to their respective Central Mass. Tournaments. A tune-up game, if you will.

Appearances can be deceiving, though. Especially when the teams involved are the defending Central Mass. Division 3 (BVT) and Division 4 (Uxbridge) champions.

Not surprisingly, it was a game that had the intensity and emotion of a tournament final — not the last game of the regular season. And it finished like a game between two of the area's top teams often finish, in a tie, this particular game ending 1-1.

"For us, the motivation was Senior Day. The seniors wanted the last regular-season game on their home field to end with a win. And I think we played well enough to have that happen," Uxbridge head coach Brian Linnehan said, referencing the fact that before the game the Spartans honored their six seniors — Ashley Greene, Sonila Murati, Elena Franzosa, Lindsey Moss, Jenny Frick and Sydney Bretana.

"I think the team was also motivated by the fact they were playing the Division 3 champions and they wanted to beat the Division 3 champions," Linnehan added. "In the first half we were clearly the better team. In the second half they came out a little bit more motivated than us."

Blackstone Valley Tech head coach Jay Porter acknowledged that his team was also motivated by the fact that the game was a matchup of reigning District champions.

"Whenever you have two teams trying to live off what they did last year to show that wasn't a fluke, you're going to have inspired play like we did today," Porter said.

Uxbridge took a 1-0 lead in the game's sixth minute, Franzosa scoring off an

assist from junior Haley Archambault. Archambault sent a long pass into the Spartans' offensive zone and onto the right foot of Franzosa, who advanced the ball in on the right side before unleashing a rocket of a shot that sailed into the upper left corner.

Blackstone Valley Tech tied the game, 1-1, in the second minute of the second half, senior Alana Johnson scoring off an assist from sophomore Emma Ballard.

On the play Ballard passed the ball left-to-right to Johnson, whose right-to-left shot was plucked out of the air by Bretana, Uxbridge's keeper. Bretana appeared to make a diving, airborne save. But the official closest to the play ruled that when Bretana came down with the ball, the momentum of the shot caused her to do so behind the end-line, which despite the save, made the shot a goal.

Linnehan protested the goal, saying that Bretana came down on the line, which would make Johnson's shot a save and not a goal.

"I don't think that was a goal. The whole ball has to be behind the line, and I don't think it was," Linnehan said. "I'm taping the game, so I'll take a look when I get home, but I don't think it was a goal."

Uxbridge had a golden chance to take the lead in the 13th minute of the second half, Franzosa getting loose on a breakaway. Franzosa's shot, however, which she was trying to get up and over BVT goalie Ella Gumienny, didn't get up high enough into the late-October air and Gumienny (nine saves) was able to stop Franzosa's hard shot from about 10 yards out.

"[Gumienny] might have taken a little step to Elena as she shot, but in my opinion I think [Elena] took one touch too many," Linnehan said. "When you're one-v-one on the keeper like that and the keeper is stepping backward, you just have to slide it by her."

Ballard appeared to give BVT the lead with 18:06 to play, scoring past Bretana (eight saves) into the upper left corner, but the goal was waved off, the official

closest to the play ruling that Ballard had pushed off of her defender with her forearm to make room to take the shot.

With 11:53 remaining in the game, Johnson appeared to be pulled down in the goalie box while she was attempting to corral the rebound of a shot from another BVT player, but no call was made. Had Johnson been able to get to the ball she would have had a wide-open net to shoot at.

"The ref did not help us when they called that one back and then did not call a penalty on the second one, but again for us the game was about consistency," Porter said. "I thought we were lucky to get away being behind just 1-0 after the first half. We did not show up

to play and we did not play with the intensity that we need to. The second half we did come out and we started getting into a rhythm, but again, it was up and down. We need to find that consistency for a whole 80 minutes and not rest for a half."

Now onto the postseason, where Uxbridge was awarded the No. 4 seed in their tournament. The Spartans will host a quarterfinal round game on Thursday, Nov. 7 at 2:30 p.m. Valley Tech, meanwhile, won the State Vocational Championship and then grabbed the No. 7 seed in their tournament. The Beavers will host No. 10 Littleton High in a first round contest played Tuesday, Nov. 5, after press time.

Spartans get the better of Blackstone Valley Tech in District opener

UXBRIDGE THEN FALLS TO HOPEDALE, 1-0

UXBRIDGE — When the Uxbridge High varsity field hockey team began its season 0-3, it was in its next matchup versus Blackstone Valley Tech that got the Spartans surging. Uxbridge beat the Beavers in that game, 3-0, and wound up 10-1-4 in its final 15 contests.

Their 10-4-4 record gave the Spartans the No. 7 seed in the Central Mass. Division 2 Tournament where, as fate would have it, they ended up paired off with Blackstone Valley Tech, the 10th

seed, in a first-round affair.

few minutes later when Kaeller struck again, this time collecting the ball amid a scrum and shooting into the far right corner.

The Beavers countered with the next goal, Abigail Clark scoring off a feed from Kirsten Dinsmore, but the Spartans took a 3-1 lead into halftime. Katelyn Jones scored that goal.

Then, in the second half, Uxbridge put the gam away with two more goals. Madison Ouellette scored on a penal-

ty stroke and Kaeller finished off a hat trick following a pass from Ashley Dube.

Hameline made 14 saves for BVT, as the Beavers finished the season 10-6-1.

Uxbridge then matched up with No. 2 Hopedale High in the quarterfinal round, where their season also came to a close. The Blue Raiders won the game, 1-0, ending the Spartans' season at 11-5-4.

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Gold and silver still lead the way at auction

The antique market has changed significantly since when I started in this business over 30 years ago. Back then many dealers were refinishing antique furniture and were making a good living reselling it. Brilliant cut glass, EAPG (early American Pattern glass), Heisey, Fostori and other glassware sold very well at shows and in antique shops. Limoges, Nippon and other china were also bringing strong prices. Baseball cards and comic books were selling well at local auctions, but not bringing the record prices we see today. Those who kept silver and gold they pur-

chased decades ago have seen their investment grow over time despite the changing market. Sterling silver hollowware and flatware, along with silver coins, have been among the best-selling items at auction for several years. Many people sold gold in 2001, when it reached over \$1,900 an ounce. Gold prices have been rising again, and it is now over \$1,500 an ounce. Many consignors have been selling their gold and silver again during this strong market. Pieces by silversmiths from the 18th and 19th century can fetch strong prices at auction. A

soup tureen by master silversmith Paul Storr brought \$26,000 at a 2014 auction. More modern pieces by famous designers like Tiffany are also very valuable. A pair of nine-candle Tiffany sterling silver candelabras sold for \$93,500 at auction in 2012. A set of Tiffany “Renaissance” flatware brought \$98,000 in a 2014 auction. Two Tiffany sterling center bowls with hand hammered ocean scene designs reached \$111,500 when they sold at auction in 2012. As you’d expect, gold items can bring prices that are even higher than silver. A 1795 \$10 Gold Eagle coin went for \$375,000 at auction in 2015. Gold jewelry can fetch astronomical prices, especially when combined with gemstones. A gold and diamond tulip

bangle by JAR sold for \$3.5 million at a 2014 auction. Most people don’t have 18th century silver or early 19th century gold coins, but more recent silver and gold have also been selling well at our Worcester auctions. A George Jensen Harald Neilsen Design sterling silver coffee and tea set sold for over \$2,000 in our August 2017 auction. A large Wedgwood pattern sterling silver flatware service by International Silver Company went for over \$3,000 in our August auction. A George Jensen flatware sterling set brought over \$4,000 in our January 2017 auction. A 1911 \$20 St. Gaudens gold coin brought \$1,400. A gold mourning locket went for over \$2,000 in our August 2016 auction. A set of 22-karat



gold Western miniatures by Jim Pounder brought bids of over \$20,000 in our May auction. Precious metals continue to remain precious to our bidders. 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Pearl Harbor casualty to be honored in Spencer

SPENCER – After going unidentified for more than seven decades, a Spencer sailor killed during the attacks on Pearl Harbor will be honored this month at a memorial service.

U.S. Navy Buglemaster 2nd Class Lionel Lescault was on the deck of the USS Oklahoma on Dec. 7, 1941, when the ship was attacked by Japanese forces. Lescault and his comrades were getting ready to play the morning colors aboard the battleship as part of the band. At just before 8 a.m., the first of nine torpedoes struck the ship from multiple Japanese aircraft, resulting in the deaths of 429 crew members and the capsizing of the ship.

Unidentifiable at the time, Lescault's remains were buried at National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific in Honolulu, as well as those of more than 300 fellow crew members from the Oklahoma. Lescault and his comrades went unidentified for decades, but closure was finally brought to many of their families 74 years later, when the graves were disinterred in 2015. Thanks to modern DNA technologies, Lescault was identified and members of his family were contacted.

"It means a lot to be able to honor him," said Lescault's nephew, Robert Berthiaume, of Spencer, who is organizing a memorial program in town next month.

On Nov. 10, a ceremony will be held at Powder Mill Park at 1 p.m. A plaque will be dedicated to honor the life of Lionel Lescault, who was 29 years old when he died. He was born in Spencer, and later lived in Worcester before enlisting in the Navy.

Lescault was buried at Arlington National Cemetery earlier this year. His name will be added to the memorial rotunda at Spencer Town Hall within the next year.

For Berthiaume, who never knew his uncle was born in Spencer, it means a lot

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Honoring all heroes this Veteran’s Day

Veteran’s Day, which is celebrated annually on November 11, commemorates the hardworking men and women who sacrifice their time and put themselves in harm’s way to defend the country’s core values of freedom and opportunity. While Veteran’s Day certainly is a chance to honor those who have donned the uniform during wars and military installments, it also can be a chance to recognize the unsung heroes of wartime — those who step into roles so that soldiers and strategists can focus their attention elsewhere.

Take for example Naomi Parker Fraley. In 1942, Fraley was a machine shop worker at the Naval Air Station in Alameda, Calif. She was one of scores women who worked in factories and shipyards during World War II, helping to produce munitions and war supplies. Parker was 20 years old in 1942 and served as the inspiration for what would become one of the most indelible images of the era, known as “Rosie the Riveter.” Parker unknowingly inspired the iconic image after she was photographed at work bent over

an industrial machine in a jumpsuit with her hair tied back in a polka-dot bandana. In 2018, Naomi Parker Fraley died at the age of 96, not nearly the household name she perhaps should have been.

Rosie the Riveter helped to tout the contributions of female war employees who were defending America by working on the homefront. Rosie was a successful morale-booster, and some may be surprised to learn that Rosie has various incarnations.


Norman Rockwell’s depiction of a female riveter, which appeared on the cover of the Saturday Evening Post on May 29, 1943, became an iconic staple of that time. Muscular, with a rivet gun on her lap, a sandwich in hand and a boot stomping on a copy of “Mein Kampf” — and timed perfectly to coincide with the release of a song called “Rosie the Riveter” by Redd Evans and John Jacob Loeb — Rosie became a household name. But another Rosie image actually predates Rockwell’s Post cover.

Naomi Parker Fraley was reportedly the inspira-


tion for an ad created by a lesser known artist named J. Howard Miller. Miller produced a “We Can Do It!” poster for Westinghouse Electric in 1942 aimed at boosting spirits among the company’s workers. The poster helped to recruit new female personnel, according to scholar James J. Kimble. This Rosie was portrayed in a red bandana with her bent arm flexed, rolling up her shirtsleeve.

Both Miller’s and Rockwell’s depictions of female war workers became ingrained in popular culture. Rockwell’s cover art was eventually loaned to the U.S. Department of the Treasury for use in war bond drives for the duration of the war. Miller’s version has been emulated for generations and still epitomizes a strong female presence in the workforce.


This Veteran’s Day is a prime time to delve into American wartime history, with interesting stories like the origins of Rosie the Riveter, and pay homage to all of the heroes that help ensure America’s reputation as a great nation.

to discover a fascinating chapter in his family's history. Several other members of the family also served in various branches of the military.
In addition to Lescault, 23 other Spencer residents made the ultimate sacrifice in the Second World War. Berthiaume enjoys tracing the history of his uncle and meeting others whose family members served.
"If you think about it, he was likely the first person from Spencer to be killed in World War II," Berthiaume said. "It is important for me to share his story with people."
Berthiaume, a member of the Spencer Exchange Club since the eighties, has done extensive research on Lescault's life and military service. He continues to seek naval records that will shine a brighter light on the service of Spencer's latest World War II hero.
The Nov. 10 ceremony at Powder Mill Park is open to the public. Town and regional officials will join in the celebration of Lescault's life and sacrifice.

Lt. Meagher served in Europe during World War II as a warrant officer. He re-entered Army service in 1948 as a lieutenant after serving as commanding officer of the Webster National Guard unit.

Explore the history of Veteran’s Day

Service members make numerous sacrifices in defense of their countries. While the debts to service members may never be the kind that can be repaid in full, paying tribute to veterans, on Veteran’s Day and throughout the year, can be a great way to show them just how much their efforts are appreciated.

VETERAN’S DAY BEGINS WITH ARMISTICE DAY

Veteran’s Day is a byproduct of the end of World War I, when Germany and the Allied Nations signed the Treaty of Versailles, formally ceasing fighting and establishing terms of peace. On November 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the signing of the treaty, the

first Armistice Day events were held. Armistice Day was initially a legal holiday to honor the end of World War I only, states History.com. The United States Congress passed a resolution in 1926 for an annual observance, and November 11 became a national holiday starting in 1938. However, in 1954, after the country had been embroiled in both World War II and the Korean War, Congress amended the Act of 1938 by renaming the commemoration “Veteran’s Day” to honor veterans of all wars.

VETERAN’S DAY IN OCTOBER?

According to Military.com, for a short time, thanks to the Uniform Holiday Bill, which in 1968 established three-day weekends for federal employees by celebrating national holidays on Mondays, Veteran’s Day was moved to the fourth Monday of October — the first being October 25, 1971. However, many people did not agree with this decision, continuing to honor the holiday on the original date. In 1975, President Gerald Ford signed a new law that returned Veteran’s Day to November 11 beginning in 1978. Since then, parades, memorial



events, volunteer efforts, and other celebrations revolving around veterans have been held on November 11.

VETERANS AROUND THE WORLD

Many countries, including the United States, celebrate veterans on or near November 11. America’s closest neighbor to the north, Canada, commemorates veterans on Remembrance Day (also November 11), as does the United Kingdom. Britain also has Remembrance Sunday, which is the second Sunday of November. Remembrance Day also is called Poppy Day, when people of the Commonwealth member states wear a red poppy flower in honor of military members who have

died in the line of duty.

PAYING TRIBUTE

There are various ways to honor veterans on Veteran’s Day and Remembrance Day. Federal government closings, educational efforts in schools, parades, and visits to military hospitals or cemeteries may take place. In Europe, it is common to observe two minutes of silence at 11 a.m. every November 11. Veteran’s Day and its sister holidays mark the honoring of veterans of all wars, with a particular focus on living veterans. It is a day to celebrate the dedication and selflessness of hardworking military men and women.



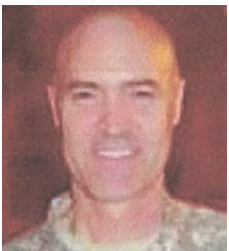
