

Douglas must confiscate entire family in danger

Buddy has already found a new forever home.

On Friday, Feb. 9 the Douglas Police Department received several phone calls reporting a loose dog running in the State Forest on SW Main Street. After a search by Douglas Police, regional Animal Control Officer Kevin Sullivan, and several residents, a St. Bernard dog was spotted multiple times, but, evaded capture throughout the night.

Early Saturday morning the search continued and by mid-morning the St. Bernard dog, Buddy, was captured. After an investigation by Douglas Police Officer Tony Yannino and Sullivan; 14 St. Bernards were located

at a residence and ultimately surrendered to animal control. As a result of the investigation charges of animal cruelty and misleading a police investigation were filed against 38 year old Steven Banville of Duval Road, Sutton.

The 14 St. Bernards included the one-year old male, Buddy, who was running loose on SW Main Street, a two-year old female St. Bernard (mom), and their 12 four-week old puppies. Buddy has already been adopted, while the two-year old female St. Bernard and 12 puppies have been placed in foster care.

Beginning March 6, the

mother St. Bernard and 12 puppies will be placed up for adoption through Pawfect Live Rescue in Uxbridge. Regional Animal Control and Douglas Police request all adoption requests go through Pawfect Life Rescue. Please do not call the police station or animal control if you are interested in adopting. All adoption inquiries must be handled through Pawfect.

Wing makes it her job to care for Millville

If you live in a town and are on Facebook, you probably are aware that each town has an unofficial Facebook page where folks can go and ask questions. Things like, "Do you know if the trash is getting picked up on Tuesday instead of the Monday holiday?" or "Hey, what's the best pizza place in town?" and "I saw a scared dog wandering around Main Street...anyone lose a black Lab?"

The most recent buzz on the Millville Matters page has been about misrouted mail. Millville Selectman Back in November, a post asking about misrouted mail drummed up a lot of conversation. The issue continued into the new year. People weren't getting Saturday delivery, but were getting Sunday delivery. Packages were getting routed to other homes. Letters with sensitive information was going to other homes. In some cases, mail was being

sent back to the sender as undeliverable. One particular case, a family was unable to receive their medicine because their mail was sent back to their health savings plan company as "undeliverable," therefore affecting their ability to get some much needed medication in a timely manner.

That's when Jenn Dean Wing, the admin of Millville Matters, and the vice chairman on the Board of Selectman, had

Opioids larger focus than pot

The US Attorney for Massachusetts recently appointed by President Donald Trump says his office is going to focus primarily on the worsening opioid epidemic in the state, not marijuana issues.

But Andrew Lelling wouldn't promise that those involved in Massachusetts' legalized marijuana industry will never be prosecuted since pot remains illegal nationally.

"The number one enforcement priority for my office is the opioid crisis. Twenty-one hundred people in Massachusetts were killed by opioid overdoses last year, not marijuana overdoses, so that is where my resources are going right now," said Lelling.

Lelling added he thinks marijuana is a dangerous drug and though voters approved launching the industry, he refused to specifically rule out prosecution. He said most federal

prosecutors look at marijuana issues on a case-by-case basis, adding his Bay State predecessors usually got involved primarily when bulk importation from foreign countries was involved.

As is the case in other states where pot is legal, industry officials in Massachusetts want to know exactly what Lelling's intentions might be. That might impact Winchendon since the town was among those which voted in favor of

a 2016 referendum legalizing pot and thus can be home to sales operations. Last month Attorney General Jeff Sessions said the Department of Justice was going to roll back Obama Administration policies which declined to get involved with marijuana operations in those states where it's legal.

Lelling has suggested, but wouldn't guarantee, he's likely to continue that approach. Additionally, he won't be meeting with the Cannabis Control

Commission because he's not allowed to meet with state regulatory bodies.

Meanwhile, the state District Attorneys Association is asking for a pause on licensing cannabis cafes, saying suggested regulations exceed the voter-approved marijuana law and "greatly increase the risks to public safety." In a letter to the Cannabis Control Commission, the DAs noted, "we have security concerns for

Harriet Tubman once said, "Every dream begins with a dreamer. Always remember, you have within you the strength, the patience, and the passion to reach for the stars to change the world."

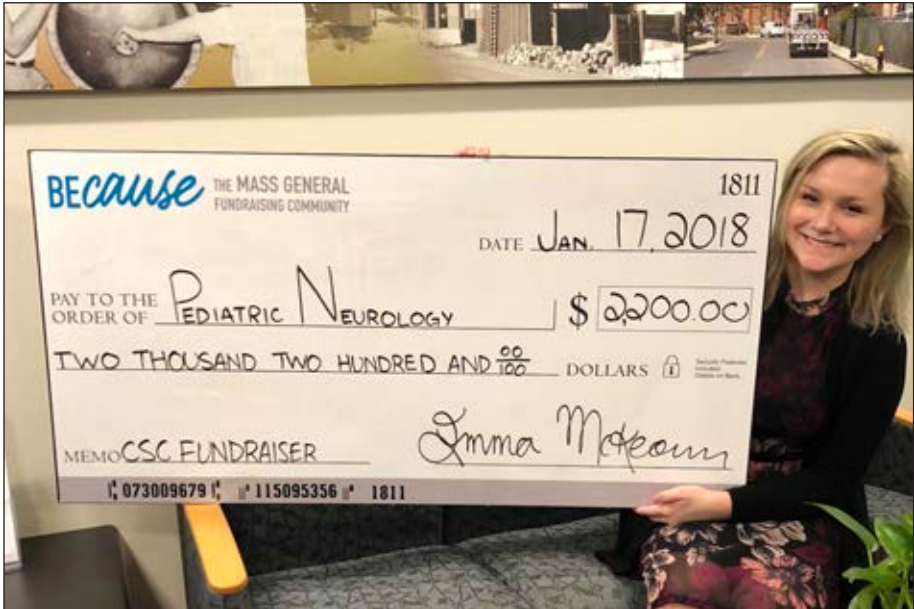

Uxbridge resident returns following intensive research project

WORCESTER — Timothy Tetreault of Uxbridge, a member of the class of 2019 majoring in mechanical engineering at Worcester Polytechnic Institute, was a member of a student team that recently completed an intense, hands-on research project in Worcester. The project was titled Creating a Tool to Measure Worcester Resident Perception. In their project summary, the students wrote, “The project team worked alongside the Worcester Regional Research Bureau in a combined effort to identify the barriers between Worcester residents and the Worcester city government.”

At WPI, all undergraduates are required to complete a research-driven, professional-level project that applies science and technology to addresses an important societal need or issue. About two-thirds of students complete a project at one of the university’s 40-plus off-campus project centers, which are located around the world. 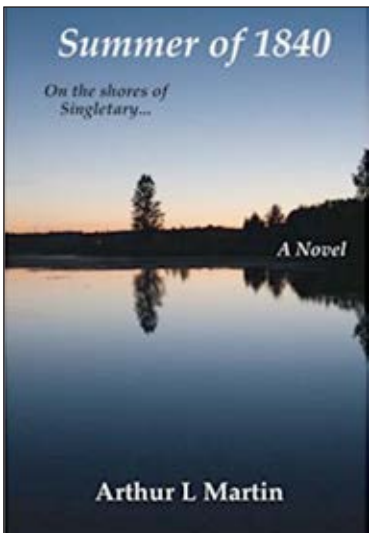

May 1: Arthur L. Martin, author of the novel *Summer of 1840, on the Shores of Singletary*, will discuss his novel.

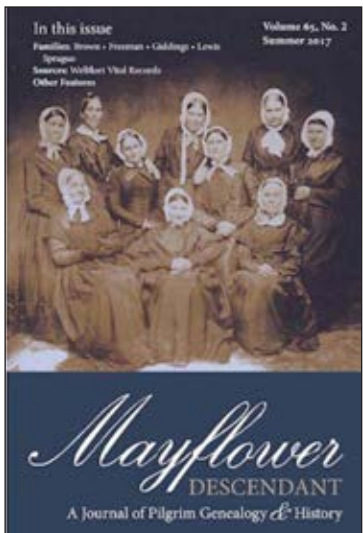

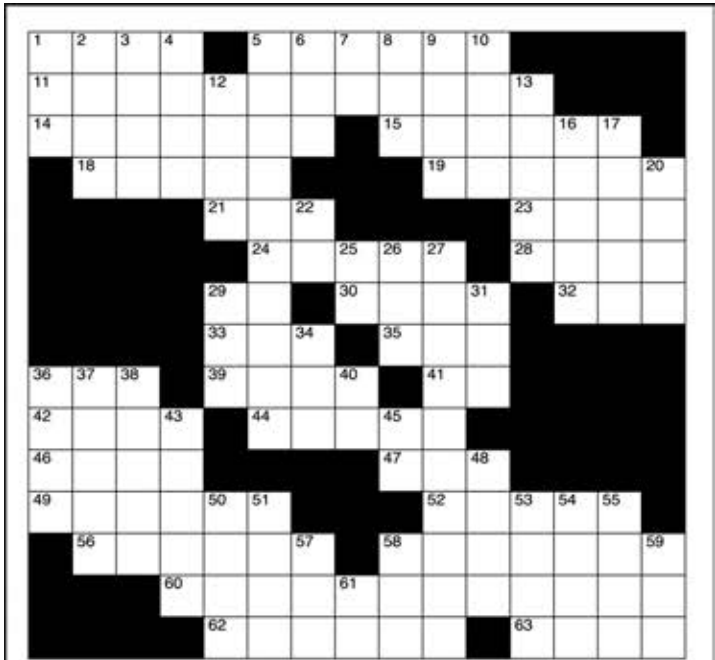

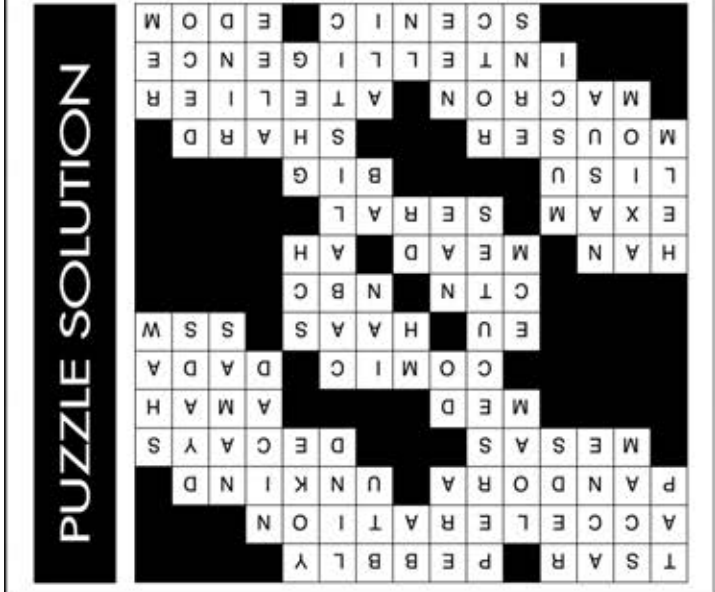

Proposed regulations would permit adults to use marijuana at fully licensed cafes and mixed-use facilities like the movies. Prospective home delivery rules are expected to be written as well.

Country Montessori preschoolers study France

SUTTON — Students learned about the culture, history and traditions of France during a week-long study at Country Montessori Early Learning Center of Sutton.

Young at heart?
Too much so

Another act of domestic terrorism. Among our own children. With a child pulling the trigger.

Don't for a minute think this young man was a "grown up" in any way that mattered.

Americans, as a rule, keep our children "young" much longer than most other countries. We do not place adult responsibilities and expectations on our younger people for many extended years beyond those expected as a rule by other developed countries.

Our children remain children well into their teens and twenties, not just for the sake of schooling; but for other expectations as well.

We do not, as a rule have very adult expectations of 18 year olds, or 19 year olds, or even 22 year olds.

No, we don't.

Not that some of them aren't very much their own people, very mature and very much young adults on their own; but they are an exception; not the rule.

Whenever Americans decided to extend the childhoods of our young people as we have, perhaps it was following the Great War, the first world war not the second, when so many young people were decimated from our population. It frightened us. We did not want to lose our children. And 20 years later, here was another war doing it again. Taking our young into a meat grinder once more. Then Korea. Then Vietnam. Then the deserts of the Middle East.

We fear for their lives, so we try to protect their young-ness. Keep them close to us by keeping them dependent and innocent.

Of course, it didn't (and doesn't) work.

They grow up anyway, and now, they grow up clueless.

They grow up without skills. Without necessary information. Without someone teaching them adulthood.

There are now classes in how to "adult."

How sad is that?

We have done our young people a horrible disservice.

By trying to give them a carefree youth, protect them from the ugly realities like chores, and responsibilities and losing even at (scoreless) soccer games, bolstering fragile egos instead of teaching resourcefulness; we've created a generation unsure of themselves. Unable to cope.

They can't cook, they can't sew on a button, they can't change a tire or balance a checkbook. They have been taught how to find facts but not how to learn.

They have been taught they are amazing, but not competent.

And when the real world knocks them down, a boss has expectations, a higher education teacher is not coddling, a real life experience leaves them helplessly, ineptly, unable to find someone else to fix the problem...

This is where we are. And not every parent has done this; but many have. Not every young person is a helpless wimp, but many are. And when they add a few years, and some experiences to their history, and feel competent enough to marry and have families, what examples will they have for parenting? What will the NEXT generation be?

We know, every generation thinks the current one is the end of the world, but when we see the unfortunate reality of the children who can only find the solution to their problems by buying an AK47, we really do have a problem.

Signs of Hope

Call me a contrarian. Or even a Pollyanna. But when everyone around me is filled with gloom and despair, seeing dire portents in every political headline, I try to find trends that encourage me.

And I'm finding them. It could be that my hopes outrun the realities. But I'm guardedly optimistic that's not the case.

If there's a single theme that ties them together, it seems to me that many people are beginning to view government with greater realism as to what it can do about improving the quality of life of our people. Don't get me wrong — there are still plenty of Americans who believe that government is best which governs least, and many others who reflexively turn to government to solve our problems. Including some who profess to dislike government.

Still, amidst all of the past year's political turmoil — in fact, in no small part because of it — there's been a renewed understanding that this country is a work in progress; that it's not yet finished creating itself. And so, Americans of all ideological stripes are determined to question and challenge features of the political environment that concern them.

They're looking at divisive issues like immigration with a dose of realism — an assessment of what should and can be accomplished — that hasn't always been evident before. They're standing up for better treatment of women and confronting the costs of past assumptions. They're marching and protesting. They're running for office. They're scrutinizing public figures more carefully than in the past. In other words, there's an energy and a vitality in the system that were hard to glimpse before.

Because politicians are pretty good at adjusting to the public mood, they're becoming a shade less divisive, less polarized, less partisan, and maybe even less intolerant of different opinions. I've even seen some strike a note of humility. It's possible I'm reading too much into this, but I think a growing number of Americans are tired of rancor, and are reasserting their respect for a nation founded on the principles of "out of many, one" and "freedom and justice for all."

And so there are signs of more flexibility in political life — of politicians and

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ordinary Americans shying away from implacable positions. They recognize that it's a big country and we have to make it work. They are beginning to see, I hope, what it means to be an American citizen: that you can't be too dog-

matic, that we need to accept differences and extend to everyone the opportunity to become the best they can be.

This is crucial, because the United States is changing in dramatic ways — becoming less white, less rural and suburban, more urban, more racially diverse, possibly a bit less religious. In many parts of the country there's an understanding that whether we like it or not, our daily lives are affected by globalization and by forces exerted from far outside our immediate communities.

Now, there are plenty of counter-trends to everything I just said, and these get a lot of attention — indeed, they dominate our view of where the country stands right now. But as I survey the country and speak to different groups, I keep getting glimpses of the more hopeful trends I outline. So the question I come away with is, can they be sustained, nurtured, and enhanced?

And there, I'm afraid, I'm less hopeful. Because the answer depends upon the quality of our political leadership. For the most part, I don't see our most prominent leaders stepping forward with the determination to move the country in a more unified direction. We've always risen to the challenge of deep-seated, fundamental change in the past, but that doesn't mean we always will.

So where does that leave us as citizens? I think it falls to us to push the hopeful trends forward, to make them so obvious that they can't be ignored. If we're not at a crossroads, we're certainly not far from one, and in the end, it's up to each of us which direction we'll take as a nation.

Is a managed account right for you?



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As an investor, you'll face many decisions over the years. How much should you invest? Where should you put your money? When is it time to sell some investments and use the proceeds to buy others? Some people enjoy making these choices themselves — but not everyone.

Consequently, the type of investor you are will influence your thinking about whether to open a managed account.

As its name suggests, a managed account — sometimes known as an "advisory" account — essentially is a portfolio of stocks, bonds and other investments chosen by a professional investment manager who makes the buy and sell decisions. Typically, each managed account has an investment objective based on your goals, and you may have some voice in investment choices — for example, you may be able to request that the manager avoid certain investments. Or, you might still work with a personal financial advisor who can help you identify and quantify your goals, define your risk tolerance, and track changes in your family situation — and who can then use this information to help guide the investment manager's choices.

Beyond this basic structure, managed accounts can vary greatly in terms of administration, reporting, fees and minimum balance.

So, assuming you meet the requirements for a managed account, should you consider one? There's really no one right answer for everyone. But three factors to consider are cost, control and confidence.

Cost — Different managed accounts may have different payment arrangements. However, it's common for a money manager to be paid based on a percentage of assets under management. So, if your manager's fee is 1% and your portfolio contains \$100,000, the manager earns \$1,000 per year, but if the value of your portfolio rises to \$200,000, the manager earns \$2,000. Because the manager has a personal stake in the portfolio's success, this arrangement could work to your advantage. Be aware, though, that other fees may be associated with your account.

Control — With any managed account, you will give up some, or perhaps all, of your power to make buy-and-sell decisions. If you have built a large portfolio, and you're busy with work and family, you may like the idea of delegating these decisions. And, as mentioned above, you can still oversee the "big picture" by either working through a financial advisor or, at the least, having your goals, risk tolerance and investment preferences dictate a money manager's decisions. But you will have to decide for yourself how comfortable you are in ceding control of your portfolio's day-to-day transactions.

Confidence — It's essential that you feel confident in a managed account's ability to help you meet your goals. And the various elements of a managed account may well give you that assurance. For example, some managed accounts include automatic rebalancing of assets, which, among other things, can help you achieve tax efficiency. Other features of a managed account — such as the experience and track record of the manager — also may bolster your confidence.

Ultimately, you'll need to weigh all factors before deciding whether a managed account is right for you. In any case, it's an option worth considering.

It looks as though ice fishing will stop early this year due to the recent rain and thaw. Although some ponds and lakes still have safe ice on them they need to be used with extreme caution. Lakes and ponds north & west of the valley have a bit more ice, but the warm weather predicted for this week will have a huge impact on their ice also.

Jerry Gareri of Milford headed out to his camp in Maine to do a bit of ice fishing and had a great time catching monster large mouth bass and huge brown trout. This week's second picture shows a 6 lb. 9 oz. largemouth bass he caught and released last week, along with numerous other big bass and trout.

The 2017 striped bass season in Massachusetts was about as good as

it gets according to a release by the Division of Marine Fisheries this month. A surprising catch of striped bass were caught the week before Memorial Day last year with a monster 64.6 fish on May 16. The 13 minute battle earned the angler a Mass saltwater derby winning fish. Indeed, it was a year for the books with some anglers stating it was the best striper fishing in decades.

On the other side of the coin were the many poachers caught with illegal fish by Massachusetts Environmental police on the banks of the Canal. Many were charged with criminal and noncriminal fines.

New interstate plan for Atlantic Menhaden: Revised Quotas, Same Reference Points, were released for this year's commercial catch. The DMF supported the fixed minimum approach for quota allocations this year. For a complete listing of the 2018 menhaden catch allocation, go to the DMF website to get

the full approved Amendment 3, which will take effect in 2018. The commercial trawlers that take thousands of pounds of menhaden each year have had strip-er sportsmen continuously fighting to keep the trawlers away from many sections of the bays, in both Massachusetts & Rhode Island waters. Menhaden are a valuable resource to migrating stripers and other fish that depend on them for food. The Providence River in Rhode Island had set new regulations on the areas that the commercial netters could go to a few years back, and the sportsmen enjoyed some of the best striper fishing ever. Schools of menhaden remained in the area for many weeks.

Did you know that softshell clams take two or three years to reach the legal size limit of two inches long in Massachusetts waters? Reproduction is determined by size not age and clams are able to reproduce at an average of 12,000 eggs annually, with some

female clams reproducing when they are only 3/4 of an inch in size. Female clams will release their eggs and sperm during a spawning event which happens when environmental conditions are just right. Female clams are capable of producing up to three million eggs annually according to a recent release by the DMF. Hopefully the clams will continue to enjoy a good life, as millions of Americans love to dine on these tasty saltwater clams, including this writer.

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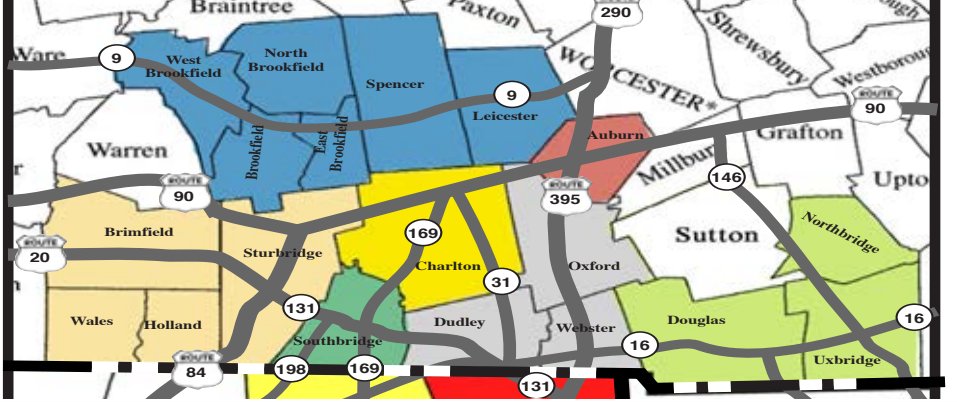
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Wax Museum teaches valuable lessons

“We were interested in a project that involved families and the community. We came across NPR’s StoryCorp project that involved interviewing a loved one or anyone else and recording the conversation to be archived with the Library of Congress. We really liked the idea of students interviewing an older relative and our twist on the StoryCorp was to have them take the information from the interview and create a narrative. We knew that would give our students an opportunity to connect with a relative and also give us an opportunity to connect with families when we invited them to the culmination ceremony.”

This year, the Family Memory Wax Museum, as the project is called, was held on Tuesday, Feb. 13, in conjunction with the sixth-grade Honor Roll Breakfast, a ceremony held to honor those who made honor roll. Several parents and families were in attendance to support their proud children. We love seeing how proud the children are to have their relatives at school with them and how loved and cherished the interviewee feels to be a part of the project.”

The students started the project in December. The teachers make sure to give them plenty of time to decide on someone to interview and then

“When we return in January, we begin the writing process which takes students from rough draft, through revisions, and finally the editing process. The culmination project doesn’t happen until February, so by that point we’ve committed over two months.”

“The project has made us more aware of how important family is in our lives. Even though families look different, there are many common themes throughout the narratives. One wish every relative has for the student is for them to grow up to be a healthy, happy person. When relatives are asked how they want to be remembered, we never read about materialistic ideas. All interviewees want to be remembered as kind and caring human beings. That has made such a powerful impact on us both,” said Adamz and Bourgerly.

Nathan St. Gelais interviewed his grandfather, James A. Keegan Jr. Nathan chose to interview his grandfather because he’s one of his favorite people in this world. He loves his grandfather and he has taught him so much. James A. Keegan Jr. hopes that Nathan is happy in life and continues to love God. Defense does well, but Spartans' Clark Tournament is cut short after loss to Maynard

WORCESTER — A strong defensive effort kept the Uxbridge High boys' varsity basketball team close, but a tough shooting night and a lack of depth at the end hurt the eighth-ranked Spartans in their 53-37 first round loss to top seeded Maynard High in the 79th annual Clark Tournament played Sunday, Feb. 18 at the Kneller Athletic Center.

Uxbridge shot just 25 percent from the field, but also held a very explosive Maynard team to just 39 percent shooting after a first quarter where the Tigers shot 59 percent. Defense was the key to success for Uxbridge and was the reason the Spartans kept it close for the first three and a half quarters.

"I just wanted our kids to play hard and keep fighting and not quit," Uxbridge head coach Ryan Hippert explained. "Going into that fourth quarter it was a game and that is what I told my kids, 'you guys played so tough.' I couldn't be more proud of their effort, hustling back on defense. They played relentless tonight, but Maynard is a great team obviously so it is going to take your best shooting night and we didn't have that the whole night. Defensively we made them work and that is what I wanted. I am very happy; the kids did a great job."

After a burst from Maynard right from the start to open the game up on a 10-0 run, Uxbridge began to find a defensive rhythm to slow down the Tigers enough to claw back into the contest. The Spartans outscored Maynard 11-6 to cut the lead down to just five going into the second quarter, 16-11. Uxbridge junior Hunter Mansfield hit two 3-pointers to get his team going offensively. "We knew we had to match their intensity because we knew they were going to come out strong," Hippert expressed. "I didn't want us to be too shell-shocked. We started chipping away and we hung in there."

After nine first quarter

points from Maynard star Corey Olivier, Uxbridge needed to make a change to slow him down so they could continue to fight their way back into the game. The change the Spartans made was to stick senior Scott Kaeller on Olivier like glue.

It was successful. Olivier scored only 10 more points from the second quarter on and made just three field goals when guarded by Kaeller.

"The game plan coming in was that it was going to be either me or Andrew Goyette covering him and it was my last Clark so I wanted to take over and stop him as best as I could, so that is what happened," Kaeller explained.

Uxbridge went into halftime down, 29-22.

Opening the third quarter, Olivier found his way to the free throw line and made both. Uxbridge's next possession resulted in a Goyette jumper, and what happened on Maynard's next possession

sparked a 6-0 Spartan run that cut the deficit down to just three, 31-28, their closest of the game.

Kaeller shuffled down the court shadowing Olivier, who lobbed a pass inside to an open Chris Bastien from the top of the key. Kaeller reacted quickly and swatted Bastien from behind. This gave Uxbridge momentum and forced Maynard to burn a timeout.

Kaeller recorded eight points, eight rebounds, a couple steals and a couple blocks for the Spartans, but most importantly slowed down Olivier.

Uxbridge eyed the fourth quarter still within reach only down 40-33, but a lack-luster offensive output and lack of depth hurt them in the fourth quarter, which allowed Maynard to pull away.

Playing tough and showcasing their defensive effort against the Tigers has the Spartans optimistic come time for the Central Mass. Division 3 tournament.

Westborough's defense too much for Rams to overcome in Clark Tournament defeat

WORCESTER — Making its first appearance at the Clark Tournament in four years, the Northbridge High boys' varsity basketball team did not get off to the start — in the first or second half — that it had hoped for.

The Rams' opponent, Westborough High, did start quickly however, scoring the first 10 points of the first half and the first seven points of the second half. The Rangers used both runs, and lots of points in between, to defeat Northbridge, 59-38, in the quarterfinal round of the Clark Large Schools Division.

With the win sixth-seeded Westborough (11-9) advanced to the semifinal round, where it will play seventh-seeded Groton-Dunstable Regional (11-10). The Rams, the No. 3 seed, finished the regular season portion of its schedule with a 13-7 mark.

"We came in knowing that Northbridge is a very good 3-point shooting team. We made it a point of emphasis for us on defense to pick them up at the 3-point line," Westborough head coach Brian Willar said. "That was the key to the game for us; our defense against them shooting the 3, and our overall defensive intensity."

Northbridge was just 4-of-17 from beyond the arc, including just 2-of-9 in the first half.

"They played very aggressive defense. They were up in our face the whole game. They played fantastic defense and we just couldn't get anything going," Rams' senior Jared Richardson said. "We knew they were going to be very aggressive and intense, but they came out maybe even a little more aggressive and intense than we expected."

Westborough jumped out to a 10-0 lead in the game's first two minutes and 41 seconds, hitting two jumpers — one being a 3 by Jake Hughes — and scoring on two drives, the second being an old fashioned three-point play by Dom Caspariello.

Northbridge regrouped at that point, calling timeout and immediately cutting the lead down to four points on a pair of baskets: a layup by Richardson and a foul-line jumper by Robbie Cannon (seven points).

After Caspariello scored on a drive to push the Westborough lead to eight, 12-4, Northbridge answered with a drive by Sean Rosenlund, to again trail by six, 12-6, with 2:59 to play in the first quarter. Westborough, however, scored the final four points of the period to take a 16-6 lead into the second quarter.

Northbridge, which has won five Clark Tournament championships, the last being in 2011, won the second quarter, 10-9, to trail by nine, 25-16, at intermission. Rosenlund scored five points in the quarter while Dillon Padula (a team-high 13 points) added a 3-pointer.

Westborough opened the third quarter with three straight baskets — a 3-pointer by Matthew Doherty (a game-high 16 points), a put-back by Jack Lentine (six points) and a drive by Michael Doherty (nine points) — to take a 32-16 lead with 4:48 left in the period.

On its first six possessions of the third quarter Northbridge missed four shots, had another one blocked and turned the ball over.

"We talked at halftime about

our defense. It was decent, but it wasn't really where we needed it to be against this team, so we just talked about getting after it a little bit more," Northbridge head coach Aaron Katz said "Offensively we didn't want to settle for outside shots. We wanted to keep driving to the hoop."

"The start of the second half we had three possessions where we were down nine and we couldn't convert," Katz added, "and then they turned around and hit two two-pointers and a 3-pointer. That changed the whole complexion of the game."

Westborough led, 38-20, head-

ing into the final frame.

The silver lining for Northbridge is that its loss came in the Clark Tournament and not the Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament. Despite their disappointing showing, the Rams will get a chance to play again and purge the bitter taste of this defeat.

"My mindset about the districts is we've got to get over what we did today and find a way to score the ball," said Richardson, who is the lone senior on the Northbridge roster. "Our defense is good and it will take us pretty far, but if we don't find a way to score the ball we're not going to be in

the districts long. If we do find a way to score the ball, however, and get back to playing how we've played earlier in the season, we're a team capable of making a long run in the districts."

Katz said that he, as well as his team, is looking forward to playing in the Central Mass.

Tournament.

"We're 13-7 now and we're hoping we can get a home game next week; that would be big for us," Katz said. "And, with Jared being our only senior, we're hoping our junior class can continue to develop. Making a deep run in the districts would help with that."

Northbridge defeats Dover-Sherborn in District tournament tune-up

NORTHBRIDGE — In a game that felt more like a postseason showdown than a regular season finale, the Northbridge High girls' varsity basketball team outlasted pesky and persistent Dover-Sherborn Regional, 43-30, on Wednesday, Feb. 14 at the Veterans Memorial Field House.

Freshman Hannah Lomonaco led the Rams, scoring a game-high 13 points, while senior Maria Cray added 10 points. Five of Lomonaco's points came in the final two minutes of the game, allowing Northbridge to maintain a double-digit lead despite the Raiders' best efforts to rally for a dramatic come-from-behind victory.

With the win Northbridge finished the regular season with a 16-4 mark. The Rams are now headed to the Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament, where they will be seeded among the top five teams that qualify for the postseason. Dover-Sherborn fell to 3-16 with the loss.

With her team ahead, 35-25, Lomonaco scored five points in a 32-second span to put to rest any comeback thoughts Dover-Sherborn had left. With 1:39 to play she put Northbridge ahead, 37-25, with a pair of free throws. After a 3-pointer by the Raiders' Sofia Federico cut the Rams' lead down to 37-28 with 1:27 remaining, Lomonaco drained a left-side 3-pointer to give the Rams a 40-28 lead with 1:07 to play.

Cassie Pryor pushed the Northbridge lead to 43-28 when she hit a triple with 10 seconds to play, and Federico closed out the scoring with a jumper as the final buzzer sounded to account for the 43-30 final.

"We talked at halftime about how someone needed to step up in order to get the whole team to raise up," said Lomonaco, whose team was ahead, 20-12, at intermission. "We needed someone to

get the offense going a little bit, so I started driving and seeing the lane a little bit more than I usually do."

It was no surprise to Northbridge head coach Matt Gauthier that it was Lomonaco who took charge of the game.

"Hannah gets us going," Gauthier said. "She's a freshman but she plays more like a sophomore now. She's gone through the full season. She gets us going; she gets us running. She was having trouble tonight making the right decisions, but when she's running she finishes and makes great passes, and that's when we really start scoring."

The game was close throughout, despite the teams having drastically different won-loss records.

"We knew coming from Eastern Mass. that their three wins was not like a team having three wins out here," Gauthier noted. "It's tough basketball out in Eastern Mass., they chew each other up. So we knew they would be better than their record."

"I just didn't think we

played very well tonight, especially on the offensive end, making decisions," Gauthier added. "I'm always happy with the win, I just thought we could have played a lot better. But this is good; as we're heading into districts we've got lots of stuff to work on."

While Northbridge's tenacious defense, its signature, was on display against Dover-Sherborn — the Raiders were the eighth team this season to score 30 or fewer points against the Rams — Northbridge's offense sputtered mightily.

"Offensively, we just didn't finish around the rim and then, when we started missing some 3's, I had some players who just couldn't dig themselves out of that," Gauthier said. "We've talked about that, being mentally tough, forgetting one play and moving on to the next, but I didn't think we did a good job with that tonight."

Lomonaco said, for whatever reason, the Rams' offense just couldn't get untracked against Dover-Sherborn.

"My mindset, offensively, is to push the game

forward and keep us scoring," Lomonaco said. "I'm always trying to feed the ball to my teammates so they can get good 3-point shots and other open shots, too, so we can start scoring more. "I don't know what happened tonight. Offensively I couldn't get to the basket tonight and we weren't hitting our

"I say all the time, confidence is contagious, but so is a lack of confidence.

When we all started missing our shots early it affected everybody; we all put our heads down. Sometimes that's the sign of a younger team and we do have three freshmen and a sophomore on this team," Gauthier said. "We told them, 'you've got to work through it.' When you get to Districts every possession counts; you can't put your head down. You've got to come out ready to go."

Light ‘em up now for better garden results

It's time to break out the seeds and potting mix to start your garden plants indoors. It's a great way to keep your green thumb in shape over winter. Plus, you'll save money, increase your variety of plants and jump start the growing season when you start seeds under LED grow lights.

Indoor growing conditions often offer limited light and that can mean tall leggy transplants with weak stems. You can greatly increase your success by investing in quality grow lights. Adding artificial light to your seed starting regime results in stout transplants with strong stems and deep green leaves. Invest wisely when shopping for indoor plant lights. Fluorescent tubes used to be the standard because they provided a wide spectrum of light needed for plant growth and flowering, were relatively inexpensive and readily available. Unfortunately, they used significant amounts of electricity and needed to be replaced every few years. Then many gardeners shifted to full spectrum

fluorescent grow lights. Many last longer than the older and larger fluorescent tubes, but new LED grow lights (gardeners.com) provide even better light intensity with much less energy. If you've looked at LED lights in the past, you may have suffered sticker shock. Fortunately, the prices have dropped. And if you consider LED plant lights typically use half the energy of fluorescent tubes, provide consistent light quality and last up to five times longer, the long-term savings outweighs the initial investment. Plus, they're mercury-free and won't add contaminants to landfills. When replacing fluorescent tubes with LED grow lights, look for compatibility. Some of the newer LED grow lights are compatible with existing T-5 light setups. You just replace the bulb, not your whole lighting system. You will get the most out of your investment and grow better transplants with proper use. Move seedlings under lights as soon as they start breaking

through the soil surface. Keep the lights about six inches above the top of seedlings. This means you'll need to raise the lights or lower the plants as the seedlings grow. Make your own light stand using adjustable supports to raise and lower lights as needed. Use a reflector above grow light tubes to direct the light downward toward the plants. Bounce light back onto seedlings by using reflective surfaces under and around the plants. Even easier, invest in a quality grow light stand like the SunLite® Garden. Set the lights on a timer. Seedlings need about 14 to 16 hours of light. Plants do need a dark period, so running the lights longer wastes electricity and is not good for the plants. If you are using grow lights to supplement natural daylight, you may only need to run the lights a few hours a day. Monitor plant growth and increase the duration if plants appear leggy or pale. Increased light along with proper watering, fertilizer and growing temperatures will ensure you have a bumper crop of transplants for your gardens and containers.


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enough and sprang into action. She had no issues with the post office, but the people in her town were being affected. Wing, a teacher in the Northbridge public schools, started looking for contact information for the United States Postal Service in Boston. This information is not easy to locate if you do a quick search on USPS.com. Some serious sleuthing was involved. She eventually figured out that the USPS uses a name format for their coded email. When she found a contact name in the Northeast, Edward F. Phelan Jr., she started sending out emails to all the possible coding formats. Example: Smith.John@email.com, Smith.J@email.com, etc. Three minutes after sending the last email she received a response. She was floored. She said, "I needed to do something

but I never actually thought I'd get a response. I was asked about the details and let the gentleman know that complaints were being made, but nothing was getting resolved and I wanted to know what we can do to fix this. I gave him all the information and he said he'd forward it to the district manager." Phelan then forwarded the information to George R. Kippenhan, manager of consumer and industry contact. Kippenhan had called Wing's home before he emailed her. After conversing with Wing about the issues at hand over the phone, he then spoke with the district manager for USPS Greater Boston, Mike Rakes. Per Kippenhan's follow-up email, he stated, "We are making sure that these issues are addressed and corrected in Millville. Please keep me updated if any issues continue to arise in your town. I appreciate you bringing this to our attention." "I felt pretty good about the outcome. I started [emailing] around 10-10:30 in


the morning and by 2:30 in the afternoon the family who had the issue with their medication the postmaster had gone to their house to talk with them," said Wing. She went on to say, "'Maybe it was the mother in me, or the school teacher in me, but I had to do something. It's serious, it's not waiting an extra day for your package, it's medicine, it's serious and it's not appropriate. That is why I said, 'I need to do something'. And the response, I didn't even expect it. I thought I would get an automated response saying I had to fill out a form letter. I just didn't expect it. After the calls, I called my husband and said, 'Guess what I did, honey', because I was just so happy. I mean, I haven't had a problem with my mail person, she's fantastic and there's never an issue. It was uplifting to know that they responded so quickly. Now they're going to be more aware of the quality of service they provide." Managing a town Facebook group

isn't an easy task. Wing is serious about it not becoming an unkind place. She reads and approves every post before it can be seen by everyone else. She will delete unkind and inappropriate comments. When she and her friend started it about five years ago, she was on the Board of Selectmen and her friend was on the school committee. They wanted to "promote better relationships between the school and the town, getting out information appropriately, making sure that the conversations are being held appropriately, that people are welcomed, not threatened, and there's no bullying." Wing is now the sole administrator and still manages to be able to provide a supportive environment for the 810 members of the group. It's clear that Wing loves the town of Millville. With a smile she said, "Millville is small, but we're mighty. We're people stepping up and doing it in that moment."



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

































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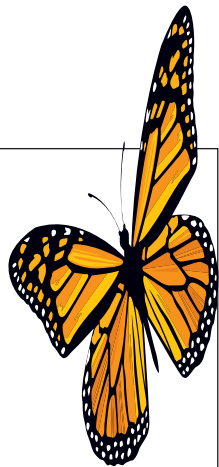
