Green will introduce the audience to Mary Rowlandson through Rowlandson's book and through the lens of Puritan thought and early Colonial times. The story of Mary Rowlandson is relevant today, not only as part of our colonial American history, but also because it invites reflection on present-day life and attitudes.

NORTHBRIDGE — Budding inventors and systematic experimenters at Northbridge High School have been hard at work perfecting their projects for two local science fair competitions. On March 7, Northbridge High School hosted its sixth annual Science Fair, which included 70 projects. Approximately 140 students participated in the fair that involved two specific categories, invention convention and overall science experimentation.

Pat Rossi, Science Department Chair at Northbridge High School, explained, "We bring in a panel of judges from local colleges including WPI, Worcester State University, and Assumption College, as well as local pharmaceutical reps. and other experts. Judges include engineers, biologists, chemists, and pharmaceutical professionals. We have a wide array of knowledge assessing each of the student projects."

Students were competing for first, second, and third place honors, as well as a student choice category, and an honorable mention category. After an extensive day of student presentations at NHS, judges chose the winners. In the Invention Convention category first place was awarded to Tyler Trudell and Jon Mellor; second place was awarded to Anthony Camponelli and Nate Satkauskas; third place was awarded to Noelle Haas; Nick Cuba won the Student Choice category; and Alina Daraphet received Honorable Mention.

In the Science Experiment category first place was awarded to Kelly Heffernan and Chloe Frabotta; second place was awarded to Isabelle Creteau; third place was awarded to Marcus Babiy and Bartek Szymanski; Andrew Kinney and Allison Salamack won the Student Choice category, and Maria Cray and Timothy Haverty, Rianne Cooney

Creating smiles on the other side of the globe

WHITINSVILLE — Many of us consider a routine cleaning at the dentist necessary for good oral hygiene, yet we take for granted the plethora of dentists to choose from, and the ease of scheduling the every-six-month appointment. But there are so many in the world who don't have access to basic dental care. For the fifth year in a row, Dr. Jason Tubo, along with his assistant, Jennifer Sanches, traveled across the globe to provide dental care to patients in the remote and underserved regions of Chile.

Dr. Tubo, of Whitinsville Family Dentistry, explained, "I serve as visiting faculty at the University of Connecticut

School of Dental Medicine. Each year I bring a group of dental students from UConn to Chile where I teach restorative and oral surgery techniques "in the field." The USA students are paired up with Chilean dental students from Universidad de Desarrollo Concepcion, and the teams provide dental care to patients in Chile. This year, we were providing care in a remote region of Neltume, Chile."

Dr. Tubo, who received his doctoral degree in dental medicine from the University of Connecticut School of Dental Medicine, said, "I helped pilot the program in 2008 where we had only 12 members total on the

To the Editor:

I am writing in because I think this issue should be brought to attention immediately. My husband and I have a 6-year-old autistic son, who we are trying to get Social Security benefits for. So, like everyone else, we went down to the office, applied, and received a denial letter - only to find that the information on the letter was incorrect! They have my husband's information correct, but listed as the other party (supposed to be me, my information, and my income) is the wrong person! The letter includes this other woman's full name and social security number on it. When we called to address the issue, the representative simply told us that there was an error in clicking the correct name, and that this other woman has the same first name and year/place of birth in their system.

This, to me, seems extremely disturbing. Her first name is "Stephanie", so is mine. However, I spell mine differently. That should have been a red flag to begin with. They treated it as such a casual mistake, saying we need to bring those

documents into the office as soon as possible to hand them over. So, my husband left to turn the documents in - of course not being able to make an appointment or jump to the head of the line - only being instructed to choose "other" on the machine and wait the however-many-hours to speak with someone.

My question still stands, if the Social Security office has sent ME the wrong woman's social security number - who, if anyone else, has been sent MY social security number? How many other cases are there where the incorrect social security number has been sent to the incorrect household? Identity theft is a REAL problem. More and more people are falling subject to this issue and the one place you expect your social security number to be safe is the Social Security Office.

I have reached out to many news stations regarding this issue and hope to hear back from someone very soon.

Help protect older adults from financial abuse

Financial exploitation costs older Americans billions of dollars per year, according to several sources, including the National Council on Aging. If you have older parents, could they be vulnerable to financial scams and rip-off artists? And, if so, what can you do to help protect them?

Unfortunately, it is possible for anyone to become a victim. For a variety of reasons, older adults may be easier targets than younger people. And that is why, when interacting with your parents, you should look for these warning signs:

Suspicious new relationships - If your parent mentions something about a new friend, a romantic partner or some type of caregiver who seems to have taken a great interest in your parent's financial situation, you may have reason to be suspicious. Do not be afraid to ask some questions.

Multiple checks written to same person or entity - If you think your parents may be making questionable financial moves, ask to see their checkbook. If you see several checks written to an unfamiliar person or business, you might be viewing evidence of a financial scam. If so, you will want to intercede before your parents get victimized again.

Changing power of attorney or beneficiaries - If your parents suddenly decide to name someone new as their "agent" (the person responsible for carrying out a power of attorney), you may need to investigate. And the same is true if your parents change the beneficiary designation on their investment accounts or insurance policies.

Unusual urgency to make an investment - If you learn that your parents want to make some type of investment "immediately," you should be concerned. No reputable financial professional would ever pressure them - or anyone else - to "act now" on an investment.

Apart from watching out for the above signs of trouble, what else can you do to help guard your parents from fraudsters?

For starters, urge your parents - repeatedly, if necessary - to never give out personal information over the phone or online. Scammers have gotten quite clever at impersonating legitimate businesses or organizations - for example, unless you are looking closely at the email, you might think the logo of a bank or another company is being accurately depicted. Again, though, reputable businesses typically don't send messages that are demanding, threatening or otherwise employing some type of extreme language.


Also, stress to your parents that they should never wire money to a random account. Plus, remind them about the truth of "no risk" offers: Any financial offer that sounds too good to be true is just that - untrue. Every legitimate investment carries both risks and rewards.

Here's another suggestion: Older adults who have debt problems may be especially vulnerable to offers that claim to "clear up" all their debts. But there's no quick fix to this problem, and any caller who claims otherwise is likely being deceitful. Encourage your parents to discuss their debt situation with an honest, professional debt counselor or a financial advisor.

Finally, if your parents don't already work with a trusted, qualified financial professional, introduce them to one.

Your parents worked hard all their lives. Do what you can to help them enjoy their "golden years" in dignity.

After the church service, they were invited to the former president's home. They looked through the album together and spent around 40 minutes visiting with Mr. Carter and former first lady, Rosalyn. Carter enjoyed reliving the memories at his uncle's home. Mr. Triplett said that Mr. Carter smiled and waved as the Triplett's car was pulling away from the home after their visit. Danny said that it was a "surreal" experience and that his family couldn't believe their good fortune in finding the photographs that gave them the opportunity to meet with a former president.

A lesson in pot-any and hemp-istory

LEICESTER — Last fall, a majority of Bay State voters approved legalizing recreational marijuana, and did the same for medical use a couple years earlier. But there have been far more years of misinformation about the plant, in part based on the lack of legal ways to study it.

University of Massachusetts Professor Lyle Craker hopes to change that, and base its use on good science rather than what he calls “myth.”

“Our ancestors knew this had medicinal effects,” and included marijuana (then usually called cannabis) in the U.S. pharmacopeia from 1850-1942 for labor pains and other ills,” Craker told a few dozen people at Leicester Senior Center March 8.

Its use goes back much, much farther, though: In “High Points: A Historical Geography of Cannabis,” University of Kansas geographer Barney Warf notes it probably originated in the high steppes of central Asia about 12,000 years ago and gradually spread around the world, with the first recorded medicinal use about 4,000 years ago in China. The article itself is behind a pay wall at wiley.com, but was reported upon by Agata Blaszczyk-Boxe at the Live Science website.

She erroneously states, however, that it reached North America in the early 20th century. By contrast, Craker observed it was here in colonial days, when it was very

commonly grown for both medicinal and general use. That’s because the most common subspecies of the plant, *Cannabis sativa*, exists in two forms: a psychoactive one we call marijuana, and one lacking such capacities widely known as hemp. They’re genetically the same; the only major difference is in hemp’s very low concentration of THC. Both share a wide range of non-drug purposes, including fabrics, oils, paper, rope and food (the seeds are highly nutritious), and can grow in many areas not well suited to other crops.

Sativa, however, is only one of three subspecies, Craker noted. The other two are *C. indica* and the rare *C. ruderalis*, which is mostly found in China and Siberia.

“If you have a specific disease, it can be tailored” for various concentrations of THC or, maybe, any of the 483 other constituents so far identified in the plant, Craker said. While many are probably basic chemicals necessary for the plant’s life without particularly useful properties, science has little data on most of them to say which ones have certain effects and how they interact.

One woman who didn’t give her name pointed to one aspect of why pot has medicinal effects.

“We have natural cannabinoids in our bodies ...if the brain is injured, the cannabinoids focus there to fix the brain,” she said. She cited rat-based research showing the

molecules “flowed” from other parts of the body to injured areas.

“It’s a natural fit and a worthwhile medicine,” she added. “But there are lots of plants and lots of medicines come from plants. If we can explore them, we’ll probably find more.”

Craker definitely agreed with that, noting about 30 percent of modern drugs come from botanical chemistry.

Another audience member who just gave her first name, Heather, argued that’s why science shouldn’t be tinkering with the plant’s genome. She said she feels it evolved its chemical balance to be a natural medicine, and “I think they’re going to make it worse.” Instead, she’d like to see the government “just butt out” and let people experiment.

“I’ve just been reading up on it and know a lot of people who have ailments helped by cannabis,” Heather said afterward. “I’ve been an avid gardener for years, and this is something I’ve been considering getting into. You couldn’t do it legally before.”

Among other things, she hoped to hear about foreign research on growing plants in various ways that promote their medicinal properties, but Craker didn’t touch on that issue.

Instead, he talked quite a bit about the political and regulatory atmosphere surrounding pot during the 20th century.

“Marijuana gives rise to insanity,” he said, quoting an old propaganda poster. “Some people really hate this material. It’s not the users [who go

crazy], but the policies that have been directed against it.”

Many such policies were fueled by ego and greed. The ego part came from Harry Anslinger, who saw himself as the next J. Edgar Hoover in the 1930s and used his position as Commissioner of the Federal Bureau of Narcotics to “really push this thing of cracking down on marijuana,” Craker said.

The greed came from competing economic interests, particularly newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst, who owned a large forest he wanted to turn into paper, and DuPont, which had recently devised a way to turn petroleum into fabric (nylon and rayon). Both saw legal hemp production as competition.

Featuring a wide range of false, exaggerated and fear-mongering claims, often targeting Mexicans, blacks and other minorities, their propaganda campaign was successful. In 1937, it culminated in the Marijuana Tax Act, which effectively outlawed the plant’s cultivation or possession nationwide. The actual effort to ban pot in the US began right here in Massachusetts, which did so in 1911, Craker said.

Prohibition was not particularly effective, however, since it just drove marijuana into the black market. As Craker noted, over the years the fact more pot was being eradicated by various government agencies was obvious evidence more of it was being grown. People simply planted it in public forests rather than on their own land.

“It wasn’t working to keep it [illegal]. It just wasn’t work-

ing,” he said, later adding that the current restrictions on research are also creating problems. Today, just one researcher (in Mississippi) has federal permission to grow pot for study, but state-level legalization is increasing the push to eliminate that monopoly. Legal sales last year alone totaled about \$5.4 billion, and are projected to climb to \$21 billion by 2020 and \$50 billion by 2026, he said.

President Trump’s administration, however, has said it’s considering re-imposing a crackdown. To Heather, that seems contradictory. If Trump’s the businessman he claims to be, she said, he ought to embrace legalization and reach out to paper, petroleum, coal and other industries to help them retrain their people for jobs in a legal cannabis industry.

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team, including five students from the United States, five Chilean students, and two faculty. This year, we had a team of 65 students and faculty from United States and Chile.”

Dr. Tubo went on to say, “One of my colleagues, Rodrigo Haristoy, was an oral maxillofacial radiology resident at UConn in 2008. He was from Chile and had the vision for creating a program like this in his home country. I was just fortunate to be tapped to help pilot the program that he envisioned. He now practices as an oral radiologist in Concepcion, Chile and organizes the Chilean student participation of the program each year.”

In the five days that the team worked in Neltume, Chile, they treated a total of 354 patients, performing a little over 2,000 procedures on those patients.

Dr. Tubo explained, “All patients receive screening for oral disease, and education on

proper hygiene. Most patients received basic restorative care, such as fillings, if they had minor decay present. Children with no decay received sealants and fluoride treatments, and a fair number of extractions of other oral surgery procedures were performed for more significant dental problems.” All services and treatments were performed free of charge.

The most rewarding part of the trip for Dr. Tubo was the transformation he witnessed in his dental students from the beginning of the week to the end.

He said, “They are more capable, confident, and better able to work independently. They see the difference they are making in this one remote community, and you can see how these students begin to understand that their commitment to exceptional care will transform their patients’ lives back at home too.”

Dr. Turbo went on to say, “I have an affection for teaching students. I enjoy teaching

students how to do amazing dentistry under difficult conditions. I enjoy helping them grow through the week of difficult work, and watching them become better and more confident future dentists. And I especially enjoy teaching students the importance of giving back to their local, professional, and/or global communities. I am a very busy business owner in Massachusetts; and it is difficult to walk away from my practice for over two weeks to teach and work in another country, and my students understand this. That, however, is one of the most important lessons I enjoy teaching my dental students. I want them to become amazing dentists and professionals, but I also want them to recognize the importance of giving back, of inspiring other students to do amazing things, and to think beyond their future workplace.”

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and Marisa McComiskey, Annemarie Haas and Madeline Green, Megan Lindgren, Meg Dowd and Sadie Gareau.

Ciara Naughton and Caroline Harland all received Honorable Mention.

Rossi said, “The winners from the NHS Science Fair then qualify to compete against the schools in the Southern Worcester County League Science Fair, which includes students from Auburn High School, Millbury High School, Grafton High School, Tantasqua High School, Leicester High School, Oxford High School, David Prouty High School, and Quaboag Regional High School. This year Northbridge sent a total of nine projects to the SWCL competition.”

Rossi said, “There were amazing projects from each of the competing schools at the SWCL fair, and it was great to see how well and how the students performed, and how seriously all of the students took the event. When the results were in, Northbridge High School students took first and second place from both the Experiment division and the Invention division.”

The NHS winners in the experiment division were Bartek Symanoski and Marcus Babyi, who won first place for their salt and ice experiment, Isabelle Croteau who won second place for her body of water experiment.

In the invention category, Alina Daraphet won first place for her twist bottle invention, and Anthony Campanelli and Nate Satkauskas won second place for their rapid capo invention.

Rossi said, “All projects in the Inventions category must have a working prototype and students are required present a pitch to sell their invention.”

Rossi explained that the science fair project is assigned through the science classes in grades nine through twelve.

“We assign the project just before Thanksgiving break and its due right after

February break. We don’t provide any class time for the project. It’s an independent study that requires students to come up with either a testable experiment that generates real data and comes to real conclusions, or they have to develop an invention that solves a problem and it must be more than just a hypothetical, it must work and come complete with a sales pitch, including a profit margin based on the expenses of making the invention.”

Rossi added, “Both projects are two very different, in depth set-ups, but students take their projects very seriously and we have some phenomenal projects as a result.”

Rossi said completed projects are submitted by students in every level of academics, “We have freshmen through seniors, submitting their ideas and students could be in advanced placement, honors, or college prep classes. It’s great because it’s an even playing field for everyone and its really all about who puts the most effort in, and who knows their research the most.”

He added, “It’s a great experience as a teacher to see how much the students’ hard work really pays off.”



Gary Raymond Beauchamp, 57

NORTH GRAFTON — Gary Raymond Beauchamp, age 57, formerly of Uxbridge, Northbridge, and “The World” passed away on Thursday, March 2, 2017 at the Rose Monahan Hospice House in Worcester.



Gary's boundless energy and passion for life extended to many fields. He died after a protracted but spirited bout with health issues during which he lived fully with grace, style, and optimistic determination. He lived in a world of euphemisms. Gary was the youngest adopted son of the late Walter “Butch” and Irene (Duvernay) Beauchamp and was to turn 58. He grew up in the village of Linwood, on the border of the towns of Northbridge

and Uxbridge. Gary would like to apologize for any indiscretions he may have been involved in during his years. He claimed to never have worked a day in his life. His “career,” was something between a butterfly and a lap dog.

His education began with the Sisters of the Presentation of Mary at the Church of the Good Shepherd in Linwood. It was with the good Sisters that he learned how “not to lose recess, throughout his life.” After the school closed, he entered the Uxbridge school system where he was very involved. He served as a class officer, student council officer, and representative to the Uxbridge school committee on behalf of the student body.

While not actually athletic, he did manage a number of teams during his years at UHS allowing him to receive numerous varsity letters. As a sophomore, he was awarded the un-sung hero award. Gary's love of all things historical began at a very early age. He became a member of the Uxbridge Historical Society at age 13. He was a member of the Bi-Centennial committee, along with the 250th anniversary of the town of Uxbridge.

At the age of 15, he began the transformation of what is now known as Capron Park in Uxbridge center, acting as a one-person committee. Thirteen years later, he was present when the park was officially dedicated by the Massachusetts Governor Edward King.

As his time at UHS came to a close, he became the first male in Massachusetts history to be awarded the DAR Good citizen Award (Wheelock Chapter – Uxbridge). Upon graduation, his classmates chose Gary as having done the most to enhance daily life for the student body.

Gary's love of history of the birth of the Industrial Revolution in the Blackstone Valley brought on his years of working for the Scotts Mill complex. The Scotts Mill, in the Elmdale section of Uxbridge, is the second oldest woolen mill site in America.

He continued his education at Wilbraham & Monson Academy, Wilbraham. While at the Academy, he was elected class president and student senate president. Upon graduation, he was awarded the Pieria Prize by the faculty. Over the many years since his departure from Wilbraham, he was known as the honorary trustee, always on hand to help.

Gary matriculated to Framingham Teachers College with emphasis in political and historical studies. The late FTC president, D. Justin MacCarthy, stated that Gary left a mark at the college that would be a standard for years to come. With his interest in the hospitality industry taking hold, he further received training in hotel/travel management from Southern College, Winter Park, FL. While at FTC, Gary was awarded for the best collegiate poem in America.

Throughout his life, Gary was a champion of progressive political causes. He was a member of the Democrat, Libertarian, and Republican national committees. Gary served as a legislative aide, on Capital Hill, to the late United State Senator, Edward Brook (R-Massachusetts). On Beacon Hill, he served as a Legislative Aide to Senator Richard Moore. At the age of 19, Gary became the youngest elected selectman in Massachusetts's history. He defeated 12-year incumbent, Michael Fean, who the Worcester Telegram & Gazette called the most powerful man in Northbridge history.

After an eight year quest, Gary was elected to the Board of Library Trustees, of the Grafton Public Library. Gary was instrumental in the formation of the Grafton Public Library Capital Campaign, along with overseeing the 90th anniversary celebration of the GPL, planned for June, 2017. While public service played a role in his life, it is through the hospitality industry that he made his greatest impact. Over a career of 30+ years, he learned how to affect people's lives.

Gary began a nearly 25-year association with the Bowden Family (formerly of Holden). He served as manager of the former Howard Johnson's hotel complex at College Square, Worcester and at the Norwood Country Club Resort Hotel. Gary also served as the first general manager of the former Landlord Ben's Colonial Tavern restaurant in Sterling, assisting the Higgins family, the late

Maureen & Dick Higgins, along with the late Tina Sullivan Higgins.

When the Bowden family ventured north, he joined them as managing director of the historic Chebeague Island Inn. The inn is located on Great Chebeague Island, Casco Bay, Maine. During his 16year association with the 1925 hotel, he assisted nearly 400 weddings. Many of the brides and grooms still had communication with him these many years later.

In 1998, during his years with the Chebeague Island Inn, a young girl from Great Chebeague Island entered a national contest sponsored by the American Red Cross. The topic, Who Has the Biggest Heart. She wrote 150 words about Gary Beauchamp and won the national contest.

When the Bowden family decided to sell the Chebeague Inn, Gary returned to central Massachusetts and assisted with the management at Maxwell Silverman's Toolhouse and Club Maxines, Lincoln Square, Worcester. One of Gary's strongest traits was loyalty; too bad that was not the same with all he came in contact with.







The Blackstone Valley Art Association (BVAA) has paired up with the Sutton Writing Group and the Worcester Writers Collaborative to present an intriguing pairing of art and poetry. Eighteen artists and poets were paired up in an interpretation of works.

The unique pieces will be on display at the Worcester Public Library main branch for the entire month of March.

Lisa Shea, vice president of the Blackstone Valley Art Association, and organizer of the show, explained "Each visual artist was teamed up with a poet. The artist gave that poet a work of art. It might be a photograph, a watercolor, an oil painting, an acrylic, or anything else. The poet then had to write a poem about that work. Happening at the same time, the poet wrote an original poem on anything they wanted. It might be

an ode to snow, a haiku about raindrop, or whatever the poet chose to write, the artist now had to represent those words visually. The artist interpreted that poem in any way they wished."

Shea added, "In some cases the artist did their best to literally portray the scene laid out in the poem. In other cases, the artist explored the mood or feeling of the written work. The same was true for the poets. Some poets described what might be happening in the visual image. Other poets delved into the feelings that the piece of art brought about."

Since 1957 the Blackstone Valley Art Association members have offered a cultural dimension in the Valley by fostering interest in the arts through exhibitions, demonstrations and meetings.

Since its inception, professional galleries, old mills, public buildings, assisted living facilities and even a flower farm have been the venue for the many shows per year the BVAA has held.

Shea said, "The BVAA has had a thriving activity calendar. We have monthly workshop meetings through the fall, spring, and winter. We host a number of art shows during the year. We also arrange field trips, plein air

painting trips, fun photography shoots, and much more. We have a great mix of art styles represented."

She added, "This is our first art-poetry pairing. Judging from the enthusiasm, we'll be doing it again!"

Douglas' Cordani of Ithaca College wins two national championships in two days

NAPERVILLE, Ill. — Ithaca College junior Taryn Cordani, a 2014 graduate of Douglas High, became a national champion as she set an NCAA Division 3 meet record in the 5,000-meter run with a time of 16:28.15 at the Indoor Championships on Friday evening, March 10, at the Al B. Carius Track.

Cordani topped the previous D3 record by 4.7 seconds, which was set by Lenore Moreno of La Verne in 2014 with a time of 16:32.85. She also shattered her own school record and the facility record at North Central College by 30 seconds.

Through eight minutes of the race, Cordani sat comfortably in second place. She then made her move to the front of the pack on the 12th lap, and by

the 10:30 mark, began to lap the field.

The Douglas native clocked splits between 37.65 and 41.19 seconds, but then turned it on during the final lap and finished in 35.56 seconds.

She is the 25th student-athlete at Ithaca College to secure a national title, and is the first indoor track and field member to do so since Emma Dewart won the pentathlon in 2011-12.

Cordani then competed the following day (Saturday, March 11) in the 3,000-meter

run, where she won her second national title in as many days. She bested the 3,000-meter field of 17 entries with a facility record time of 9:42.43, again at the NCAA Division 3 Indoor Championships at Al B. Carius Track.

Cordani won the race by nearly two

seconds and set the Al B. Carius Track record by nearly five seconds. She also re-established her own school record by .42 seconds.

She jumped out in front of the pack on the opening lap and paced the field until the eighth lap. The eventual runner up, Felicia Koerner, of Johns Hopkins, pulled ahead of Cordani by just .017 seconds as they completed the ninth lap. Koerner led by nearly a second after 11 laps, and held onto that lead, until Cordani blew by her on the final lap to win by 1.89 seconds.

It is now the 37th all-time individual national title in Ithaca College history, and the first time that an individual student-athlete has won multiple national championships in the same year since Lindsey Mazer of the gymnastics team claimed two titles during the 1997-98 season.

Cougars fall to Cathedral in Coach Lanier's last game

SPRINGFIELD — Millis High and its hard-to-break defensive press was conquered by the Quaboag Regional girls' varsity basketball team in a Division 4 state semifinal, but the Cougars had a much tougher time when they took on Cathedral High of Boston — another full-court pressing team — at Springfield College's Blake Arena on Saturday, March 18 in the D4 state championship game.

There, the bigger and faster Panthers (19-4) defeated Quaboag, 61-32, for their second straight state title, while the Cougars' season finished with a record of 18-7 after competing in their ninth state final in program history.

"This team was bigger, longer, quicker than the Millis team," Quaboag head coach Cliff Lanier said of Cathedral. "Millis has a good press, and this team has a seriously good press. They were so active [and] we got in some bad spots. There were a few stretches where we seemed to get flustered."

Lanier, who is set to retire from teaching at the school district in June, also coached his final game. In addition, the team will lose five seniors to graduation in Shaylah Dorman (6 points, 16 rebounds), Kayla Klein, Cassidy Paquette, Lexi Paquette and Emma Stanton.

"For me, this year it was really important that we got past Millis," said Lanier, as the Cougars had lost to the Mohawks three years in a row in the state semifinals. "I really thought it was our year to beat Millis."

And things started off strongly for Quaboag versus Cathedral, too, as they built a 4-0 and 6-5 lead. But the Panthers soon embarked on a 10-0 run to grab the lead. Their press, as well as the interior presence of senior Masseny Kaba and freshman Mackenzie Daleba, took over. Kaba and Daleba scored all 21 of Cathedral's first quarter points and pulled down a combined 14 rebounds as they led, 21-10, after the initial eight minutes.

"We got killed on the offensive boards," explained Lanier. "When you give them two, three, four shots a possession, they're more than likely going to score on you."

"We were height-deprived a little," added Lexi Paquette, the team's center who had to deal with Kaba (15 points, 10 rebounds) and Daleba (16 points, 10 rebounds) but still managed a 13-point, 7-rebound performance. "They were really tough to defend."

The Panthers then won second quarter scoring by a 17-5 margin to surge ahead, 38-15, at the halftime break.

Needing a strong third quarter to stay in the game, Quaboag instead continued to turn the

ball over and Cathedral scored the first 13 points to make it 51-15.

"They're built, they're good, they're fast, they're tall," Lexi Paquette said of why it was so tough to keep up with Cathedral.

To the Cougars' credit, though, they finished the game on a 17-10 run and the five seniors finished their careers on the court. Afterward, Quaboag paid respect to the Panthers, a team that was simply the better squad on this day.

"I was really proud of my kids. I thought that they played really hard," said Lanier. "When the game is on it's war and then when it's over with you need to acknowledge when a team has played great against you, and my girls did that."

"If we're going to lose, it was really good to lose to them," added Lexi Paquette. "They're an amazing team."

As Lanier is set to leave the Quaboag program, he said that he will "remember my seniors. Lexi number one because she was with me since eighth grade. Emma [Stanton] I thought really came into her own as a player. Shaylah [Dorman], Cassidy [Paquette], Kayla [Klein], they all really did great jobs and we became a real team and Kayla said earlier in the week that she can trust anyone on the team, and I thought that was pretty cool."

Lanier said that he will "keep tabs and if I'm around I'm definitely going to watch some of their games. I'm definitely going to miss the kids that are staying here and playing."

Lanier's first year coaching the Quaboag varsity girls was in 1986-87, when they also reached a state final and lost. That stint was for eight years and then he returned in the 2012-13 season for the past five years.

For Paquette, reaching the state final was a moment that she'll never forget.

"I'm proud that we got here. We had a great couple nights and made some memories. I couldn't ask for anything better," she concluded.

DIVISION 3 BOYS' BASKETBALL STATE SEMIFINAL

Palmer plays Bartlett's game to take down Indians, 80-65

WORCESTER — Known for beating its opponents with a lightning-quick offense and a tight man-to-man defense, the Bartlett High boys' varsity basketball team made it all the way to the Division 3 state semifinals. There, on Monday, March 13 at the DCU Center, the Central Mass. champion Indians met their match in the form of Western Mass. winners Palmer High, who displayed many characteristics similar to Bartlett's winning formula.

The Panthers came out gunning and hit more 3-pointers (10) than the Indians (9) — a 10-5 advantage was had through three quarters — and they were able to contain Bartlett's high-flying offense. As a result, Palmer moved on to the state final after defeating the Indians, 80-65. The Panthers later lost the championship game to Hanover High.

"We didn't get our tempo going like we usually do," said Bartlett head coach Tony Paranto, noting that the Panthers' quickness had something to do with that. "Coming off 96 points in our district championship game, I thought their speed was a lot better than I thought."

It also hurt the Indians that Palmer "shot the ball particularly well," according to Paranto.

Leading the Panthers' charge was junior Matthew Niemczura, who scored a game-high 28 points, including 18 in the second half.

"He killed us in the second half," Paranto said of Niemczura.

"We just stayed under control, we didn't let the setting and the scenery in there bother us," added Niemczura, who had scoring help from senior Ryan McCarthy (15 points, 10 rebounds), sophomore Dylan Tenczar (14 points, 7 rebounds) and senior Jack Cookish (13 points).

Paranto gave props to McCarthy, the point guard, who possessed the same skills that Bartlett floor general Anthony Grzembki uses to help benefit his team.

"Their point guard is special. He's a great athlete, strong with the basketball and he creates a lot of opportunities for their team," said Paranto.

And McCarthy was able to either dish the ball inside to Tenczar — similar to what Grzembki oftentimes does to fellow senior Tyler Davern — or beyond the arc to Niemczura — similar to when Grzembki drives into the lane and finds either sophomore Cody Adams (7 points) or freshman Logan Paranto (13 points) for a 3-point opportunity.

"They were very similar," said Tony Paranto of the Bartlett and Palmer court styles. "We knew going in that they had great guard play and had some inside presence that did a great job. I think the key to the game was that we gave up too many second chance opportunities, especially when we had opportunities to make some runs."

The Panthers outrebounded the Indians, 38-30.

Bartlett actually started the game with a nice run, jumping ahead 9-2. But Palmer rallied and Tenczar's buzzer-beater gave the Panthers a 22-21 lead after the first quarter.

The Panthers then won second quarter scoring by an 18-9 count to grab a 10-point halftime lead, 40-30. That period included back-to-back 3-pointers by senior Matthew Remillard and Niemczura, as Palmer knocked down six first half triples to Bartlett's two.

The 3-pointer continued to aid the Panthers in maintaining their lead in the third quarter, as they knocked down four more — including two by Niemczura — to go ahead, 63-49, with just the final frame to go.

"I thought Cody Adams did a pretty decent job defending him," Tony Paranto said of Niemczura, "he was just giving up six or seven inches and he hurt us."

Bartlett never backed down, though, as they cut the deficit down to nine points on two occasions, courtesy of 3-pointers by Davern (17 points, 12 rebounds) and Adams.

Then, with 2:30 to play, Grzembki (21 points, 5 assists) hit a deep jumper to make it a seven-point game, 69-62.

"To their character they didn't quit, they didn't give in, and as seniors and leaders they did a great job of getting us back into the game," Tony Paranto said of Davern and Grzembki.

"Holy cow, they can put up some points and they proved it out there. Down the stretch they were hitting 3 after 3 from way out in NBA range," added Niemczura.

But Niemczura made sure that the Panthers wouldn't relinquish the lead, as he scored the next seven points to put Palmer ahead, 76-62.

[Grzembki], two 1,000-point scorers," said Tony Paranto. "It's tough to swallow the pill right now with the loss, but it doesn't take anything away from what these kids accomplished throughout the season."

Grzembki said that the feeling of losing was bittersweet since he won so many games with Davern and fellow senior starter Kyle Anderson (7 points) — they have been playing basketball together since third grade — but that they wanted to reach the state title game.

"We had a good group of seniors this year. We have a really close bond with each other and it just stinks that we couldn't get the win and move on for each other," he concluded.

"When it came down to crunch time, he was able to make shots," said Tony Paranto.

Moments later the Panthers (23-1) were able to celebrate reaching the state championship game for the first time in school history, while the Indians — playing in their first state semifinal in 10 years — finished a remarkable 22-4. Their accomplishments included an undefeated run (11-0) through the Southern Worcester County League, a Clark Tournament Large Schools championship and a Central Mass. Division 3 title.

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Childhood memories of fishing bubble up during spring

Hopefully the weather will be soon. The April 8, opening of Wallum Lake for trout fishing, is rapidly approaching. Wallum Lake is the only opening day for trout fishing in Massachusetts, and although it does not draw the crowds of the '60s, it is still enjoyed by many anglers and their families.

years another parking lot was built to accommodate all of the fishermen and even that was not enough! Cars were lined up the whole length of the entrance road to the boat ramp many years ago on opening day. Today you can arrive at 7 a.m., unload your boat and park your car only a few hundred feet away. You may even be lucky and park right in front of the boat ramp.

Back in my younger years my two brothers and I could not sleep for days awaiting the arrival of opening day for trout fishing. My dad always took a few hours off from work to take us fishing at a few local brooks. Getting our fishing rods and live bait ready for our early morning fishing adventure was a big deal. As we climbed into my dad's 1937 Pontiac around 5 a.m. it was only a short drive to our first fishing spot. Prentice Brook was one of our favorite spots to fish and was only a couple of miles down the road from our home on Main Street in Whitinsville. We also fished Purgatory Brook which was stocked with 6 to 10 inch trout annually by MFW!

The trout were raised at the old Sutton fish hatchery which was closed around the '80s. Using a small worm on a single hook and a \$5 fishing rod and reel, we often caught our limit of trout in a couple of hours.

My brother Mel and I used an old vest from one of our Sears & Roebuck suits to fish in. We often kept our worms in an empty Old Kentucky Club flip can from our dad's smoking tobacco. Everything was great until I forgot the worms in my inside pocket of the vest and my mother hung the vest in the clothes closet. After a week or two the smell of the rotting worms had every one looking for the problem. When my mother found the reason for the awful smell she chased me around the house with her old corn broom. The next day she went to church and asked for forgiveness for her actions!!!!

We were allowed to take the day off from school to go fishing, but dad dropped us off at the house to clean the trout, and he went back to work. My brother Mel and I quickly headed for Meadow Pond to go fishing for the rest of the day to catch pickerel, bass, bluegills & yellow perch. When our dad came home from work he helped us clean all of the fish, and he cooked up one of the best fish chowders we ever had.

Arcade Pond was also a fishing hot spot for pickerel and bass, often landing pickerel in the 20 inch class & large-mouth bass in the 4 to 6 pound class. The water was so clear that you could walk the edge of Arcade Pond and watch huge baas guarding their nest during the spawning season. It was illegal to catch and keep bass during the spawning season back then.

They sure were the good old days. As we got older we often fished Wallum Lake in Douglas, and opening day was a blast. It was a carnival like atmosphere, with many families camping out. Many fishing stories were told around the camp fires as everyone eagerly awaited the sunrise of opening day. Numerous camps around the lake held their private fishing derbies and also invited their friends to enjoy fishing at their beachfront properties. Louis Tracino (owner of GBI) of Douglas was a very generous man allowing numerous fishermen the use of his private boat landing and the use of his home to enjoy great food, and a warm place to get out of the sometimes cold temperatures.

The parking lot at Wallum Lake's state ramp was full by 4 a.m., so in later

The fishing public has dropped significantly over the last 20 years or more. The kids are now locked into their computers. What a Shame.

303 wood duck boxes were cleaned and checked by MFW this winter in the Central District. The Massachusetts Division of Wildlife has already started to stock trout in local lakes and ponds that annually receive them. Anglers are reminded that Wallum Lake is closed to all fishing until April 8. Stocking trucks continued to stock trout this week. For stocked waters go to the MFW website.

The bald eagle population is growing each year in the Blackstone Valley with new sightings being reported daily. Webster Lake has a pair nesting at the same site for a few years, but reports of this magnificent bird have also been spotted at Meadow Pond in Whitinsville and at rivers and ponds in Uxbridge this year.

The Captain of the Yankee Fleet on the North Shore was at the saltwater fishing show a couple of weeks ago, and had a bit of good news for halibut. Numerous halibut were caught last year and he hopes that the trend continues. Take a peek at the photo this week to see what we mean.

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



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
