Blackstone Valley Music celebrates 10-year anniversary

UXBRIDGE — This May will mark Blackstone Valley Music's 10-vear anniversary.

Ask Doug Williamson what he loves about the business, and he'll enthusiastically reply, "It's about the lessons and community. It's not about the gear and being a salesman. I enjoy the teaching parts the best. There is no cookie-cutter approach. You have to become in tune to the different learning styles and approach each differently. It's the best when that one day comes along that moment when a kid looks at you and gets it. You can see that light bulb go off. It's cool to watch them progress...and it's a little rewarding that I had something to do with that."

Formerly The Gig Stop, Blackstone Valley Music is less gear-based, and focuses more on lessons and fostering a music community.

Walk in the front door, and immediately to your right, there is a lending library full of books. The books are not necessarily music related. BVM is home to a small showroom, a handful of classrooms with glass doors, an analog music library with more than 1,600 CDs, cassettes, and vinyl options for students or parents interested in the medium. There's a classroom in the back where students are able to do homework while they

BVM offers music lessons for all ages. During school vacations and summer, they offer band camp, which teaches students how a rock band forms and works together to create music they love. Blackstone, a band comprised of veterans of the band camp program, performs regularly at events and establishments in the area. They'll also be performing at the April 6 Coffeehouse. Once a month. there is a Coffeehouse where students and members of the community can come and perform at an open-mic night or listen to a featured musician or group. Saturday, Feb. 2, Sax Around The Blackstone will be performing at the Coffeehouse. If you'd like to play during the open mic times, signups for that night start at 6:30 p.m., and the event begins at 7 p.m.

Northbridge to host public forum on local historic district initiative

NORTHBRIDGE Town of Northbridge is exploring the idea of creating a Local Historic District within the Village of Whitinsville and will be hosting a public forum on the topic on Tuesday, Feb. 26, at 7 p.m. at Northbridge Memorial Town Hall.

In 2015, a Local Historic District Study Committee

(LHDSC) was established to study and recommend properties for inclusion, as well as draft a local bylaw ordinance for Town Meeting adoption. The proposed Whitinsville Local Historic District tells the story of how the Industrial Revolution transformed Whitinsville into one of New England's leading mill villages between the late 1700's to the mid 1900's. The properties selected represent industrial, civic, religious, governmental, recreational, and business $commerce\,during\,the\,growth\,of$ the village of Whitinsville, said Northbridge Town Planner R. Gary Bechtholdt II.

'The Village of Whitinsville reflects the growth of a paternalistic mill village from the beginnings of the industrial Revolution. The mill village was planned and developed by the Whitin Family," said Ken Warchol, Chair of the Northbridge Historical Commission and Vice Chair of the LHDSC. "They built and operated the mills that were the principal source of labor in the mill village.'

Whitinsville contains well preserved examples of economic, social institutions and recreational of mill village life, said Warchol, adding that

Whitinsville has been chosen as one of the four nodes of the Blackstone River Valley National Historical Park by Congressional Act in December of 2014.

"Whitinsville presents a remarkably complete picture of one of the distinctive by-products of the Industrial Revolution in New England;

Uxbridge Boy Scout troop now welcoming girls

UXBRIDGE — The Boy Scouts of America announced in 2017 their mission to broaden membership to include girls on a national level, and starting in February, Troop 25 in Uxbridge will be registering girls as official members of the organization for the first time in history.

Girls are now invited to sign up to share in the same scouting adventure that boys have enjoyed for years.

'I think that is such a valuable life skill for all childrento feel empowered, to feel supported, to be able to work on something on a professional level," said Adele Miller, whose 11-year-old daughter, Scarlett, will be joining Troop 25. Her son has been a part of Troop 25 for two years.

"I am excited to be brave and try something new," said Scarlett. "I am excited to go

to summer camp. I think the a few other local girls checking camping merit badge will be it out. The Scoutmaster of the fun."

According to a release from the BSA, the National Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America has confirmed a scheduled February 1, 2019, launch date for the program to serve girls, ages 11-17. The official name of the older youth program will become Scouts BSA, effective with the scheduled launch in February

The Board also approved the option of a linked troop structure that would allow existing boy troops and future girl troops the opportunity to be linked through a shared troop committee.

Troop 25 will be a linked troop, which means the separate boys' and girls' troops will share a committee, of which Miller is the Chair. She said her daughter and three other girls have joined Troop 25, with

girls' troop will be Jeff Graves, who previously served as the Assistant Scoutmaster of the boys' troop.

"No one is trying to take away being a boy from a boy, and no one is trying to add masculinity to the girls. We're just saying all kids deserve a scouting opportunity and that's the kind of program we offer," Miller added.

According to the Family Scouting website, www.scouting.org/familyscouting, the priority is to bring the benefits of Scouting to more youth while remaining true to their mission

"The BSA's mission is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Scout Law," the website reads. "By welcoming both girls and boys into the pro-



gram, even more youth will have access to the character development and values-based leadership that Scouting prom-

ises." The Web site provides additional information about the

specifics of the changes. In the past, the Cub Scouts program was open to boys ages five to 10. Now, as of June 2018, it is open to girls and boys, ages five to 10, as part of separate "dens." Dens are smaller groups within the larger pack. Dens meet several times a month between pack meetings, and the new BSA rules will have girls and boys in separate dens, with girls joining the larger pack for hikes, pack meetings, and an array of other activities. Likewise, the Boy Scouts used to be open to boys ages 11-17; now, the organization is open to boys and girls ages 11-17 in separate Troops. BSA pro-

"It's a proud moment to look back in history when this all started," said Post 33 Commander Chuck Ewing. "I am so proud to be part of the American

While the Uxbridge Post is on the smaller side, they still are deeply rooted in the community. Ewing said they host an event at the B-24 Bomber Crash site every year, host several ceremonies in town, and are involved in the renovation of 1918 cannon on the town common. They also help fund scholarships and a student trooper program.

"We do whatever we can to help within the community," Ewing added. "We all step up and help wherever we can."

Ewing added that currently, his biggest goal is to try and grow the Post; he is seeking new members and is starting to expand the recruitment side of Post operations, as well as make building improvements to beautify the Post headquarters itself.

"The original part of forming [the Legion] was a place for the veterans to gather and be able to talk with each other; we still want that to be a place for them to come, and I also want this place to be accessible to the public," he said. "I enjoy watching everyone laugh and have a good time with each other.

The American Legion is encouraging local Posts to not only reflect on what they have achieved but to chart a course for the second century.

"New generations of veterans depend on the kind of vision shared and expressed by the World War I-era founders. That vision proved timeless. How will your post extend the same vision and values to future generations?" states the Legion's Centennial Web site, www.centennial.legion.org.

In Sutton, Post 414 is heavily involved in their community. Business Manager Dave Karacius said the Post recently celebrated its own 70th anniversary and, during that time, have raised funds for many uses across town.





the company town," he said. "It is quite an honor that Whitinsville is considered such an important part of our nation's history...we have one of the best preserved mill villages in the nation."

At its meeting in January, the LHDSC identified twelve properties located at the main crossroads of the village of Whitinsville, focused along Memorial Square and the Mumford River locus area. The twelve properties include Fletcher House, Paul Whitin Mill, Granite Cotton Mill, Northbridge Memorial Town Hall, Aldrich School, Whitin Community Center, Whitinsville Savings Bank, Town Common, Whitinsville Social Library, Trinity Episcopal Church, Village Congregational Church, and Congregational Parsonage.

The LHDSC will host a Public Forum/ Property Owners' Meeting on Feb. 26 to discuss and review justifications for the selection of the twelve properties identified and to provide opportunity for the public to offer input on establishing a local historic district within Whitinsville. Attendees will also be asked to complete a brief survey to gauge the public's thoughts and opinions on this ongoing initiative, as well as identify potential exemptions from a local historic district bylaw review, said Bechtholdt. Following this public forum, the Committee will begin to draft a local historic district bylaw.

A local historic district study committee has been established for the purpose of investigating and reporting on the historical significance of buildings, structures, sites, and surroundings within Whitinsville. The committee shall prepare and submit a final report with its recommendations on a proposed bylaw to the Board of Selectmen, to be presented and acted on at a Town Meeting. Assisting the LHDSC is R. Christopher Noonan of Preservation Services, Inc., a historic preservation consultant hired to prepare the Historic Study Report for establishing a local historic district within Whitinsville. The Preliminary Study Report will include an introduction, methodology for selection of properties, significance, justification of boundaries, and options and recommendations on a draft local historic district bylaw. Once completed, the Preliminary Study Report shall be submitted to the Massachusetts Historical Commission and the Planning Board for review.

The LHDSC hopes to submit the study report to MHC and the Planning Board by June 2019 in time for the October Fall Annual Town Meeting. 

Fighting the Deep Freeze

Recent frigid temperatures call for strategies to manage the hassles of a New England winter. From keeping warm despite the big chill, to driving safely in the snow, the following common sense winter tips are geared to keep us save and sound until spring makes its highly anticipated appearance.

Correct Layering to Keep Warm: We all know the best way to keep warm while outside in the freezing cold is to wear layers. But do you know the correct way to layer up?

First off, it's important that the layers of clothing are loose fitting, which will trap body heat.

The layer closest to your skin should be a wool or synthetic material not cotton, which is absorbent. Sweating, as well as exposure to moisture in the air can cause skin to become cold, so a first layer of wicking fabric is critical.

The next layer should be a warm layer such as a sweater or fleece garment, again avoiding cotton fabrics. Lastly, don a weatherproof coat that is insulated. Be sure to keep your head and face covered. Mittens are often a best choice over gloves if dexterity of your fingers is not required.

Did you know?: Depending on the temperature and wind chill, frostbite can set in quickly: Know the symptoms of frostbite: The first sign is a prickly or itchy sensation on skin. As frostbite progresses, numbness sets in and skin can feel waxy, and flush gray, white. blue or yellow. Signs of hypothermia include confusion, dizziness, exhaustion and severe shivering.

Up Your Internal Temp: When temperatures drop low, it can be a challenge to keep cozy, even while indoors. Instead of cranking up the thermostat dial, whey not turn up your internal thermostat? Donning a lightweight, long sleeved shirt averages two degrees of warmth, while putting on a heavy or wool sweater can propel your warmth quota four degrees

Old Tricks for Plumbing Pipes: To reduce the odds of water pipes freezing, simply open cabinet doors below sinks and open any doors adjacent to pipes. Allowing warm air to reach the pipes (especially those in which a sink is located against an exterior wall) can keep pipes from freezing. Also, run a thin stream of water from any faucets that are at risk of freezing.

Be Prepared on the Road: Being comfortable while stranded in a snowstorm or deep freeze requires pro active planning; Every vehicle should have an emergency supplies. A kit should include a portable battery jumper or cables; flashlights and batteries; phone charger; snow brush, ice scraper, small shovel; blankets, extra clothing; nonperishable food; energy bars and bottled

Make sure your battery is strong. Batteries that are more than three years old or that are on the verge of going dead often can't be jump-started once they have been exposed to temperatures below zero for an extended period.

Gas up before a storm. Keeping the tank filled prevents fuel lines from freezing and also provides enough fuel to keep warm during an emergency.

Weak antifreeze can freeze. As a pre-



antifreeze every two Don't wash your car. The run-off water could freeze your TRAINOR doors, windows, and trunk. If doors or

locks get frozen, use an alcohol-based spray made specifically to open frozen cars; do not use hot water.

Make sure the tire air pressure is at the proper level. When the temperature drops below zero, tires can lose up to a pound of pressure, making them unsafe and causing unnecessary wear and tear.

Tires are your number one weapon against slipping and sliding. Make sure you have enough tread on your tires. The drive tires must provide traction to push your vehicle over wet pavement and through snow. The steering tires must have traction to steer the vehicle. Enough tread is especially important in winter conditions. Experts say you should have at least one eighth inch of tread to plow through snow effectively. Since tread is measured in 32ndfractions, here is the official rundown from Michelin: For proper tract ion you must have at least 4/32 inch tread depth in every major groove on front tires and at least 2/32 inch on other tires. More would be better. Use a gauge to determine if you have enough tread for safe driving.

No gauge? Common coins can be substituted for a tire tread depth gauge as tires wear to the critical final few 32nds of an inch of their remaining tread depth. Here's how:

Place a penny into several tread grooves across the tire. If part of Lincoln's head is always covered by the tread, you have more than 2/32" of tread depth remaining.

Place a quarter into several tread grooves across the tire. If part of Washington's head is always covered by the tread, you have more than 4/32" of tread depth remaining.

Place a penny into several tread grooves across the tire. If the top of the Lincoln Memorial is always covered by the tread, you have more than 6/32" of tread depth remaining.

If snow covered roads are a concern, you should consider replacing your tires when they reach approximately 6/32" of remaining tread depth to maintain good mobility

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
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
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

OXFORD — Playing against a desperate team in Oxford High, the Northbridge High boys' varsity basketball team found themselves in a dogfight on Thursday, Jan. 31. The Rams did lead the Pirates after one quarter, 16-13, and at the half, 30-25, but they could never extend the lead to double digits.

Oxford came into the contest with a record of 5-9 and one more loss would eliminate them from playoff contention. But Northbridge, firmly qualified for both the Clark Tournament and Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament

because of their 13-2 record, played their brand of basketball and won the third quarter, 24-14, as the Rams went on to

"We really stressed being where we want to be to do the things we want to do because it put our playmakers in position to have it a little more," Northbridge head coach Aaron Katz said of the halftime talk leading to the successful third quarter. "When we space right we have four or five guys who can do something with the ball. In the first half we were all on top of each other."

Added Robbie Cannon, one of the Rams' 10 seniors: "In the third quarter we finally spaced the floor better. We got to the paint, too; I got a couple of easy layups. All year that's what we've been preaching, we just didn't do it in the first half."

Northbridge finally extended its lead to double figures for the first time, 38-28, with 4:49 to play in the third quarter following four quick points from senior Dillon Padula on an inside hoop and two free throws — who finished with a team-high 17 points.

But it wasn't all Padula. as Cannon finished with a double-double (15 points, 11 rebounds), and the other three starters (senior Sean Rosenlund, senior Jefferson Wermuth and freshman Cam Boucher) all scored at least eight points.

'The depth on our team is one of the most important things," said Cannon. "We'd rather have eight guys go for 10 points."

"It's like a coaches nightmare," Katz added in jest before pointing out that he added another player to his rotation in sophomore Jared Wielsma. "That was his first game with us."

Wielsma scored four points and pulled down four rebounds in limited action to give Wermuth a breather. Wielsma (6-foot-4, 260 pounds) and Wermuth (6-foot-4, 240 pounds) offer size to Northbridge's guard-oriented lineup.

"With all our little guys moving, those two add a little dimension to us," said Katz.

But, with the Rams playing so well and the Pirates trailing, 54-39, going into the fourth quarter, Oxford didn't go down quietly. They outscored Northbridge, 21-15, and cut the deficit down to five points, 63-58, following a 3-pointer from senior Caleb Nfodjo with

But the Pirates, in foul trouble for most of the game, could get no closer, as the Rams made some free throws to finish off a nine-point victory.

"I thought we executed good,

but then [when we picked up fouls] we reached instead of beating them to the spot. Every time they would give a wiggle-jiggle we would react to the wiggle and we'd be the reaction," explained Oxford head coach Dave Aldrich, whose team dropped to 5-10.

The Pirates kept themselves in the game thanks to 11 made 3-pointers, with junior Alex Duval (23 points) an Nfodjo (14 points) doing the bulk of the scoring work.

"We just don't know how to win, we panic. We're learning,

but unfortunately we're not going to be able to go to the [district] tournament. It's tough for my seniors," said Aldrich. Northbridge, now 14-2, has

its sights set on the Clark Tournament.

"Our resume is done for the Clark. It's going to be a 2 seed, or at worst a 3," said Katz. "We're sort of just doing our thing and 14 wins is a lot of wins with three [regular season games] left plus postseason. I'm fine being quiet and doing our thing.'

'Friends of Lasell Field,' group seeking to renovate athletic complex, regroups in Northbridge

NORTHBRIDGE — A group of local volunteers have come together as the result of the deplorable conditions at John Whitin Lasell Memorial Field, Northbridge Public Schools' athletic complex located at 171 Linwood Avenue. The field, dedicated to Lasell's memory, houses the school district's track, football, soccer lacrosse and field hockey games.

John Whitin Lasell, born in 1897, an extended member of the well-known Whitin family of Northbridge, was a man committed to public service. He was a member of the Board of Selectman in 1925 and went on to become a State Representative and eventually a Captain in the United States Army. Lasell was killed in action in World

War II where he flew an Observer for the US Army Air Force. Soon after, his family made a generous donation to the construction of what is now the Northbridge Middle School and the town dedicated the athletic complex in

Lasell Field Athletic Complex is long overdue for a facelift. Friends of Lasell Field was originally formed by community volunteers nearly 10 years ago with the goal of a capital improvement project for the field, which did not pass. The track, which has been too dangerous for competitive use due to bubbling and surface breakage, has forced the high school's track team to forgo home meets for years, raising expenses for the program.

Additionally, the grass field in the middle of the track, which hosts football, lacrosse, field hockey and soccer games, is in the worst shape the school has ever seen. The west side of the field frequently floods, despite rest periods the grass does not grow or fill in, and even the fans are put in danger with bleachers that wouldn't pass today's standards.

These conditions are not just impacting the sports teams. The high school's marching band, which community members can see practicing in the high school parking lot daily, was forced to cancel many of their halftime performances at football games due to field conditions. Given the amount of work this dedicated group of musicians put in, it was a shame to see them limited to the sidelines.

With the declining field conditions year over year, volunteers for the Friends of Lasell Field, this time spearheaded by Northbridge resident Tim have funded the start of the project by Labrie, are anxious to make improvements. The new scoreboard is a great start to the project, but according to Labrie, much more has to be done in order for Lasell's namesake to hold the honorable meaning it deserves.

"The track and field are in the worst condition I have seen. I have visited nearly every field in Central Massachusetts watching my four kids play sports — and what it boils down to is our fields are an embarrassment. For a town that puts so much pride into our sports programs, these kids deserve better. I see the great care given to so many veteran monuments and sites in this town, Lasell Field should be at the heart of that," said Labrie. "We truly want this to be a place of pride for all members of this community."

Labrie and a small group of community members have come together to put the wheels back in motion and renovate Lasell Field. Ultimately, the goal of Friends of Lasell Field is to replace the track, turf the sports field within the track, replace the existing lights with improved, cost-effective LED lighting, as well as replace the bleachers. Together with local sports groups they

hiring a local engineering firm to put together a quote for the renovations.

'This project is gravely needed and will benefit not only students, but the community," said Northbridge High School Principal Tim McCormick. "Friends of Lasell Field has a well conceived plan which includes funding for continued maintenance of the complex, so that future budget cuts will not impact the care of the facility. I truly believe Lasell Field should shine as a centerpiece of the community and with this proposal, I believe we can get

"We know that this won't be easy, but we are all very motivated and committed to this community. We look forward to fundraising and putting this idea in front of the community for support and backing," added Labrie.

Friends of Lasell Field is an organization formed to research, plan and promote a capital project to renovate and upgrade the Lasell Field Complex located at 171 Linwood Avenue, Whitinsville,

Strong man-to-man defense helps Rams outlast Blackstone Valley Tech

Two days after seeing its five-game winning streak snapped by Leominster High, the Northbridge High girls' varsity basketball team got back on the winning track, holding off a determined and scrappy Blackstone Valley Tech team, 41-30, on Wednesday, Jan. 30 at the Veterans Memorial Field House.

With the win the Rams improved to 12-3 and snapped the Beavers' six-game winning streak. Valley Tech fell to 9-3 with the loss.

Northbridge was led, as it usually is, by senior captain Jackie Puda and sophomore Hannah Lomonaco, who tied for team-high scoring honors with 10 points each.

"Puda and Lomonaco have been doing the bulk of the scoring for us and then we try to get, here and there, four-tosix points from anyone else we can," Rams' head coach Matt Gauthier said. "Hannah, lately, has not been finishing as much as she has in the past, but that will come. She also has had, and will have again, those little spurts where she can all of a sudden get 18 or 20 points on a given night.

"Jackie is just that senior captain who, when we need to control a situation or slow things down, or do something specific, I'm going to look to get the ball in her hands; there's no question about that," Gauthier continued.

The Rams led, 12-2, after the first quarter, 19-9 at halftime and 27-16 after three quarters. The Beavers rallied in the final frame, using a 10-4 run midway through the period to pare their deficit to single digits, 35-28, following a 3-pointer by sophomore Brianna Carroll. Valley Tech got to within seven again, 37-30 with 1:22 to play, on

a short turnaround jumper in the lane by sophomore Madison Deppe, but Northbridge closed out the game by scoring the last four points on layups by Puda and Lomonaco.

In the early going the Beavers struggled against the Rams' defense, committing 10 first-half turnovers, four coming on shot-clock violations. On several other possessions, BVT took hurried shots as the shot clock was winding down.

"We haven't seen a lot of man-to-man, Valley Tech head coach Britt Kahler said, alluding to Northbridge's signature defense. "Man is still new to us as a group and because we're so young [five sophomores, two freshmen] we still don't really know each other yet when facing a man defense. We're still trying to figure it out.

"I thought this was great for us," Kahler continued. "I thought we improved a lot on our man defense just from the beginning of the game to the end of the game. This was a great test for us. We started to get a little momentum, especially offensively in the fourth quarter."

Gauthier was pleased with the play of his defense.

defense. "Defensively we're not going to let you in the middle," Gauthier said.
"And, if you try to get there, we're not going to let you. You could see it was frustrating them; they were trying to get the ball into [juniors Victoria Russian and Gabrielle Muscatell]. That's what we practice all the time; you're not getting to the middle. I was happy to see all the shot clock violations because that means we're doing a good job controlling the middle. I thought we did a

good job of that tonight."

The rap on

Northbridge, if there can
be a rap on a 12-3 team, is
that they don't finish well
offensively, be it while
attacking the basket or at
the end of games.

"You could see that tonight a little bit," said Gauthier, who has five sophomores and two freshmen on his 12-player roster. "We just have to keep working on finishing strong when we get contact, and just finishing stronger at the basket in general. We learned those lessons from playing Leominster and Shrewsbury — two very physical basketball teams. You have to take it strong to the basket. If you don't, you don't have a chance of finishing."

Gauthier was candid about his team not always finishing at the end of games, too.

"We go into funks; we had 12 points in the first quarter tonight and then seven in the second and eight in the third," Gauthier said. "When that happens, we have to do a better job offensively. We specifically have to run a little better. We didn't run very well tonight, but when we did we were effective, so we've got to do a better job of running."

Valley Tech was led in scoring by Russian, who scored 10 points.

"Victoria is a junior captain who works very hard; she has been stepping up at practice and in games," Kahler said. "She's come up big for us in several games. Against Monty Tech she scored 33 points and we won the game in double overtime after being down 15 in the third quarter."

The Beavers' three losses have all come to non-conference foes — Northbridge, Millbury and Sutton.

"They are out-of-league losses against really good teams, really tough teams," Kahler said. "Those [losses] have only made us better. I'm very positive coming out of this game. I'm proud of my team; they worked very hard tonight."

Recent milestone maker Hicks gets hot as Uxbridge outlasts Indians

WEBSTER — Fresh off scoring the 1,000th point of her high school career, Uxbridge High's Olivia Hicks remained hot in the Spartans' next game when they took on the Bartlett High girls' varsity basketball team on Monday, Feb. 4.

Hicks scored a game-high 22 points and, at times, took over control of the game to help Uxbridge defeat the Indians,

"She's got the grit, the perseverance, the heart, the hustle — she just doesn't stop," Spartans' head coach Tracy Larkin said of Hicks. "She's the most selfless athlete I've ever coached."

Hicks got to 1,000 points versus Grafton High on Friday, Feb. 1 on a 3-pointer from the left side.

"It was something else," the 5-foot-3 Hicks said of the scoring plateau. "Getting 1,000 wasn't something that I was expecting through my four years. Soccer was my main focus and I stopped playing high school soccer and this became my focus for school [sports]. I learned at the end of last year that I was close and that's when I started focusing.

As Hicks alluded to, basketball isn't even her main sport. In the fall Hicks will attend the University of Maryland to play Division 1 collegiate soccer. Her current club team, NEFC, doesn't allow players to compete on their respective high school teams, so she only gets to play with her friends during the winter season when soccer isn't in session.

"High school is where you get to spend time with your friends and build more relationships,' Hicks said of the importance of remaining a Spartan, at least in the wintertime.

Hicks opened the game with Bartlett with a 3-pointer. She also made a free throw and a pair of layups in the first quarter as Uxbridge led, 12-6, after the initial eight-minute period.

The second quarter saw only seven points — four by the Spartans, three by the Indians - as Uxbridge took a 16-9 lead

at halftime. Then, in the third, Bartlett mounted a comeback. They scored nine points to the Spartans' six as the Indians made it a game, 22-18, heading

into the final frame.

"It was a four-point game late third quarter and we had all the momentum in the world, and then Hicks just has a gear that most high school basketball players around here just don't have," said Bartlett head coach Anthony Pukalo. "While basketball is not her main sport, she's a D1 athlete. She's dangerous from every single spot on the floor."

With the Spartans having pushed their lead to 29-20, Hicks came up with a steal and coinciding layup to make it 31-20 the first double-digit advantage of the evening — with 5:30 to play. Then, on a set inbounds play, Ashley Dube heaved a long pass to a streaking Hicks, who finished off another layup. A third layup gave Uxbridge an insurmountable 35-20 lead.

With the 22 points, Hicks has now scored 1,024 in her illustrious career. Hicks became the third girls' player in school history to reach 1,000 points, with the predecessors being Carol Albin (Class of 1989, 1,127 points) and Allison Cahill (Class of 1999, 1,446 points).

Not lost in the shuffle was how important the victory was for the Spartans. Having improved to 6-10, they surpassed last year's win total and are still mathematically alive for the Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament as of press time.

"We're beating last year's record, we were 5-15," said Larkin. "Building a program is what we're all about."

"We needed it, we needed this win," added Hicks. "It was good all around, everyone played well."

Grace Orr added 6 points and 9 rebounds for Uxbridge, while Maggie Streichert (14 rebounds) and Dube (7 rebounds) helped on the boards. All players, according to Larkin, contribut-

ed defensively.

'We have come so far defensively and that's got to be our strong point at this point of the season," she said. "The girls have come so far. Grace Orr, my eighth grader, doesn't quit under the basket. Grace and Maggie hustled under the bas-

The Indians, meanwhile,

dropped to 3-14 as their shots simply weren't falling. Bartlett was 0 for 18 on 3-point attempts, but most of them were open looks. Camden Heenan led the Indians with 9 points and 8 rebounds, while Allison Grzembski added 6 points and 9 rebounds, and Gabriela Piwowarczyk pulled down a team-best 11 rebounds.

Safety measures for winter drivers



Winter weather causes many people to retreat indoors until the spring thaw. However, for those who embrace the cooler temperatures or find that life must go on despite snow and ice, taking inventory of their vehicles is a must before the first snowflakes start to fall.

Tire care is an especially important area of vehicle maintenance. The tire experts at Michelin say that regular tires may be ineffective for winter driving. Summer tires are made from materials that are optimized for warm conditions. When the mercury drops, these same materials

can harden, reducing their ability to grip the road. That lack of traction can be compounded by the presence of snow or ice. Even all-season tires, which are designed to be driven year-round, can be insufficient in severe weather conditions. Winter tires can help drivers safely navigate winter roadways.

Bridgestone Tires says that having the right snow tires matters when driving in winter weather conditions. It's important to look for tires that can disperse water sufficiently and also grip the road. Snow tires are designed to remain softer and more flexible to conform to the road better in cold conditions. Some winter tires are even studded to provide better traction.

Unfortunately, even the best winter tires cannot provide perfect traction on slippery roadways. That is why it is essential — in conjunction with the use of winter tires or snow chains — to modify driving techniques to navigate

· Drive slowly. Slow down on winter roads. Allow a greater distance for stopping than for dry conditions. Slippery conditions can make it more challenging to stop, and excessive speeds can make the situation

 Shift into low gear. On hills, rely on low gears to maximize traction to travel up and down hills. This can minimize skids or sliding.

• Get the vehicle a tuneup. In addition to tires, be sure the braking system, battery and other major components of the vehicle are in good working

· Replace windshield wipers. Reduced visibility can compromise the safety of drivers and their passengers. Replace windshield wiper blades before

winter arrives. Consider purchasing winter-rated windshield blades.

 Know how to recover from a skid. When skids occur on black ice or slush, drivers should take their feet off of the pedals and steer gently in the direction they want to go. As the vehicle regains traction, only then should the brakes or accelerator be applied.

Winter weather requires making some vehicle modifications, and drivers may want to alter the way they drive to be more safe on the road.

Prepare vehicles for harsh weather

As the seasons change. motorists must take steps to safeguard their vehicles, especially when the season changes from fall to winter. Each winter. many vehicles are subjected to sub-zero temperatures, snowfall and icy roads, and such conditions can take their toll on vehicles over time. Taking steps to prepare vehicles for winter weather is a vital step that can make cars and trucks safer for drivers and their passengers.

BATTERY

Old batteries should be replaced before winter begins. Without a strong, properly functioning battery, engines cannot turn over. Most batteries last between three and five years. However, extreme cold can compromise batteries, especially those that have been around awhile. Batteries are made up of acid and water, and cold temperatures can freeze the water, thereby affecting battery performance. According to AAA's Automotive Research Center, at 32 F, the average battery loses 35 percent of its strength.

Newer batteries can be protected by starting the vehicle each day to warm up and recharge the battery. Let the car run for at least 10 minutes if you cannot take an extended drive.

EXTERIOR MAINTENANCE

Keeping a car waxed and sealed can help maintain a durable exterior finish. This includes not only the paint, but the rubber and vinyl parts of



the car's exterior. Winter is a good time to switch to a heavy-duty synthetic wax that can shield against water and road salts. High-quality sealants can be used on bumpers, trim and rubber door seals as added protection. Speak with an automotive retailer or even the car dealership if you are unsure which products will make your

car's parts most durable for winter weather. Do not stop washing your car just because the weather is cold. Slushy, wet roads and snow-melting salts can speed up the formation of rust or other decay on the undercarriage of the vehicle. These materials will need to be periodically cleaned off. Flush the underside of the vehicle whenever possible, taking advantage of any dry, slightly warmer days.

TIRE PRESSURE

According to the automotive retailer Pep Boys, vehicle tires lose a pound of air pressure for every 10-degree drop in temperature. Many modern cars will alert to changes in air pressure, and drivers should be diligent in maintaining the proper tire pressure. Fuel economy as well as handling ability can decline when tires are not inflated properly. Tires can be refilled at many gas stations for little cost.

WIPERS

Visibility is key in hazardous weather conditions, and keeping the windshield clean is a priority. This means ensuring there is enough windshield wiper fluid in the car and that it is a product that will not freeze.

Wiper blades can freeze and crack in the winter. Older blades may be more susceptible to damage. It's a worthy investment to replace existing wiper

blades at the start of each winter. When vehicles are parked, pull the wipers off of the windshield to safeguard them from sticking and cracking.

Cold weather requires drivers to amp up their vehicle maintenance routines. Consult with a mechanic or automotive retailer for more ideas and products that can help your vehicles operate safely and efficiently this winter.
