OSV announces spring guest speakers

STURBRIDGE—Old Sturbridge Village has announced that it will be hosting three guest speakers of the next few months, a golf historian, a historical biography author, and a magazine editor, as part of its 2019 Spring Speaker Series.

Taking place at the village for over a decade, the Spring and Fall Speaker Series bring six distinguished academics, writers, artists, or musicians to the Fuller Conference Center each year. A committee decides on which speakers will be featured and each event somehow relates to American history or the New England region.

"These three speakers are really bringing diversity to the series," said Michael Arnum, Director of Marketing & Public Relations at Old Sturbridge Village. "We have something for everyone. Sometimes people get the perception that you have to be a history buff to attend, but that's not the case. These topics are relevant to more than just history and everyone can be a part of it."

On Thursday, May 9, golf writer, historian, and archaeologist Anthony Pioppi, a descendant of Dr. Pioppi in Southbridge who is currently based in Middletown, Connecticut, will talk about his 2018 book The Finest Nines, which highlights

the twenty-five finest nine-hole courses in the North America and details how to play each one. His presentation will include a discussion of two local golf courses, including Cohasse Country Club in Southbridge and Whitinsville Golf Club in Whitinsville. Pioppi has also written To the Nines, a book on nineteen nine-hole layouts across the country, "Haunted Golf: Spirited Tales from the Rough," a book on supernatural golf stories, and two books on club histories, "The History of the Minikahda Club and Shoreacres: the First 100 Years, 1916-2016."

On Thursday, May 23, historical nonfiction author Christian Di Spigna, who is based in New York city and Williamsburg, Virginia, will discuss his 2018 biography of Dr. Joseph Warren, "Founding Martyr: The Life and Death of Dr. Joseph Warren, the American Revolution's Lost Hero." Warren was American physician who was deeply involved in American Patriot organizations during the American Revolution. The book follows Warren's life from beginning to end and covers everything from his farming childhood and years at Harvard College to his professional success, role in the colonial rebellion, and death at the Battle of Bunker Hill. Di Spigna is a regular speaker and volunteer

Charlton selectmen bid farewell to Szafarowicz

CHARLTON – The Charlton Board of Selectmen bid farewell to one of their own on April 23, as it was the final meeting for outgoing Selectman Joe Szafarowicz.

Szafarowicz has been a staple of town politics for the last few years serving as a selectman for several terms and even chairing the board for a time. Szafarowicz has decided not to pursue another term in office leaving the door open for a new candidate to fill his seat in this weekend's municipal election. Before Szafarowicz's departure, though, the members of the board of selectmen took the time to offer their compliments to a man they say has helped the town through some rough patches flawlessly over the last decade.

Board Chair John McGrath was the first to share his comments thanking Szafarowicz for his service, and for serving as a guide for McGrath when he took over as chair of the board.


"Joe has from a young age been very involved in the town Finance Committee and with the Board of Selectmen. He's been a stellar member of this board even before I got on it. He has always tried to do the right thing and has always listened to everybody's discussion. He's eloquently explained his reasoning one way or another why he has voted that way. I, as chair, just want to thank him for the time I spent on the board when he was chair or vice chair. I learned a lot from watching Joe. He's very even tempered, very understanding and has done a very good job for the town," McGrath said.

The compliments didn't end there. Selectman Deborah Noble admitted she was emotional knowing Szafarowicz would no longer be beside her at the table during meetings but kept her composure as she complimented his character and commitment to the job.

"There are people who sit on the sidelines and throw arrows and barbs and then there are people who actually get up and do something. That's Joe. He got up and did something and he still will, and he always will. It's in his DNA," Noble said. "It has been my privilege to sit next to him for two years."

Selectman David Singer complimented Szafarowicz track record bringing to light his accomplish-

LEICESTER — Residents and business owners got a taste of community service last week, as an annual fundraiser supported several local organizations.

On April 26, A Taste of Leicester featured food from multiple local restaurants and businesses. Held at Leicester Country Club, the event enabled guests to sample dozens of entrees and desserts, then vote on their favorites at the end of the night.

Funds generated by the event are used throughout the year.

"We receive unbelievable support from the community, and tonight was no different," said Deja New member Linda Colby.

There were so many restaurants represented at the fundraiser that guests' stomachs were filled before they could complete the tour of entrees and desserts. For executive chef Shane Anderson, of Eller's Restaurant in town, it was a thrill to return

Mobile Whip another example of Nichols 'Bison Building Brands'

DUDLEY — One thing's for sure: If you want to be a business leader, you've got to first become a Bison.

Jared Williamson is one of many entrepreneurial students at Nichols College taking what they learn in the classroom and applying it to build a business and a brand for übersuccess.

When the Falmouth native embarked on his business education journey at Nichols College in August 2017, Williamson knew he would thrive on The Hill. The eager 19-year-old sophomore has become driven to find success within the College's culture of entrepreneurship and leadership.

The summer after his first year at Nichols, Williamson was thinking about how soon fall would come. He was excited to return to Center Road, because he would finally have a vehicle (a five-passenger GMC Sierra 1500) on campus for his sophomore year.

In pondering his future, Williamson knew he wanted to someday be his own boss, and getting a business education at Nichols College would be an excellent place to start.

"Nichols classes in marketing, management, business law, and financial accounting have helped me form an understanding of how I could create a successful business," he said. "After learning from my

professors and doing my own research outside of class, I felt comfortable to start my own

With car in hand, business and marketing principles in his head, and a passion for driving in his heart, Williamson thought more about how to combine his interests into a business. He also thought about how Nichols is located in the small town of Dudley; carless students often want to venture off campus to check out restaurants, shopping, and the latest Hollywood blockbuster.

But, without a car, how do they get there from here? And, most importantly, safely?

Enter Mobile Whip.

Seeing a transportation problem for many of his peers, Williamson launched Mobile Whip in January to provide only Nichols students with a reliable service that is affordable, safe, and easy to use. All the student has to do is log onto https://mobilewhip.comto reserve a ride. A Nichols student-contracted with Mobile Whip and whose vehicle is insured-picks up the customer and brings them to wherever they want to go within a 20-mile radius and then back to campus. The pricing for one-way and round-trip transportation can be found on the service's website.

"I thought creating a business that would let me be my

own boss, drive my car, and help Nichols students safely get to where they want to go would work for me," said the criminal justice major. "Mobile Whip is the company that wants its friends to be safe."

Incidentally, where does the name come from?

"Mobile, as in a phone, and 'whip' is slang for 'car,'" explained Williamson.

In his first month of operation, Williamson had more than 100 student customers. And due to the success of Mobile Whip, he launched this spring Mobile Eats, a food delivery service.

Mobile Whip's hours of operation are: Thursday 6 p.m. to 2 a.m.; Friday 6 p.m. to 3 a.m.; and Saturday noon to 3 a.m. Mobile Eats' hours of operation are: Sunday through Wednesday, 4 p.m. to midnight; Thursday 4 p.m. to 2 a.m.; and Friday and Saturday 4 p.m. to 3 a.m.

Mobile Whip has a range of up to 20 miles. Restaurants, bars, and clubs in Worcester, which is about 20 miles away from campus, have been the farthest rides for Williamson and his drivers. Mobile Eats has a five-mile radius, and the delivery fee is \$5.

"The closest location I have driven someone to is Family Dollar, just a mile down the road," he said.

Approximately 850 students live on campus, and not all

have a car. One Mobile Whip customer, junior Lyanna Rose, Student Government Association vice president for the Class of 2020, frequently uses the service.

"Mobile Whip is such an awesome service, because it's students helping students," said the criminal justice major from Lincoln, R.I. "Due to the fact that Nichols College is such a small community, it's nice to see a familiar face pick you up from your location as opposed to a stranger. It's also always affordable and reliable."

Rose said she and her friends use Mobile Whip once a week.

"Mobile Whip has brought my friends and me to and from local restaurants," she said. "Aside from that, SGA is planning for Mobile Whip to help us with our upcoming end-of-semester events to pick up our food."

Professor Luanne Westerling, Nichols College's associate dean for business, said that Williamson is just one example of a Bison building a brand.

"Nichols students learn the ins and outs of starting their own small business," she said. "We feel that Nichols College's focus on leadership, entrepreneurship, and business essentials is helping our students, so we do see quite often students starting their own businesses.

"We're very proud of Jared,

and all of our students, and proud of our faculty, who bring the practical experience to the classroom," added Westerling.

"That's what helps our students develop these businesses, in addition to receiving faculty encouragement to pursuing their passion. Obviously, Jared is a highly motivated young man, but he had that idea and that passion, and I like to think that we help support that."

Owning and operating Mobile Whip has created an opportunity for Williamson to help current and future students. He also contracts with 12 other drivers (also Nichols students), who have their own insured cars. Williamson expects his contracted drivers to clean and maintain their vehicles; arrive promptly to pick up the customer, drive safely, obey speed limits, avoid texting while driving; and to report in when the drive service is complete.

"By continuing on a successful path, I hope that Mobile Whip could expand to other schools across the United States," he said.

Williamson finds inspiration in his family and friends who have run their own successful businesses.

"I learn from their experiences and apply that to what I'm doing," he said.

Old Sturbridge Academy participates in Better World Day

STURBRIDGE — Students at Old Sturbridge Academy, an EL Education school, are changing the world by participating in the second annual "Better World Day" on Friday, May 3. Contributing to a better world is the norm at Old Sturbridge Academy, and at more than 160 EL Education schools across the country, where academics are joined to character and service.

Created in celebration of EL Education's 25 years of transforming classrooms across the country, the Better World Project showcases 18 student projects that are making positive change in their communities and the world; Old Sturbridge Academy's project is one that will be highlighted by the national organization.

Old Sturbridge Academy students will lead a procession, grouped by their hometowns, for a morning ceremony at 9 a.m. on May 3, on the Old Sturbridge Village common. The guiding question for the students is "What do we have in

common?" Students will lead the opening ceremony with song and poetry; Kindergartners will sing a rendition of "American Chestnut" in reference to their Chestnut tree planting, to the tune of Guess Who's 1970s pop song "American Woman." Jim Donahue, President and CEO of Old Sturbridge Village, will share his remarks.

"Now more than ever, doing work that matters is important for students, their communities, and the nation. The Better World Project joins character and scholarship, spotlighting the work of students who are taking ownership of their learning and building bridges of understanding across differences," said Scott Hartl, President and CEO of EL Education.

"The students of Old Sturbridge Academy are infused with the desire to improve their communities, because self-improvement is at the core of their learning experience. Better World Day is their chance to share and implement what they've learned with the broader community," said Jim Donahue, President and CEO of Old Sturbridge Village.

Following the ceremony, students will fan out to different locations in the Village where they will prepare a field for a fall planting of American Chestnuts, work on a pollinator garden managed by the students, and build bat boxes to provide shelter for those creatures.


Library hosting program on 19th century home care

STURBRIDGE Christie Higginbottom will return to Jacob Edwards Library to present a program titled "The Family Nurse: Home Medical Care in the Early Nineteenth Century" Thursday, May 23 from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m.

The presentation will consist of an illustrated program portraying the role played by home-grown, wild-gathered, and purchased herbal remedies in the treatment of common health problems in Early American households. Christie will describe plant varieties and preparation methods including infusions, decoctions, ointments, poultices, fomentations, and tinctures. Both traditional European and Native American remedies will be described with documentation from 19th-century published sources, diaries and letters.

Christie Higginbottom is an established presenter in the horticultural field with years of experience at Old Sturbridge Village, both in research and creating authentic historical gardens. She has attained an excellent reputation as a presenter at many historical societies and garden clubs, as well as delivering lectures at the Thomas Jefferson Center for Historic Plants at Monticello, Society for the Preservation of NE Antiquities, the Garden Club Federation of MA and Massachusetts Horticultural Society among others.







Local artist looks to expand his reach

WALES-Local artist Ryan Jacque has been filling the walls of local homes with pencil drawings of New England wildlife and nature scenes, pets, and people for most of his life and is looking to get his art name out to the local community for more commissions.

Drawing has been his passion for most of his life, with graphite pencil being his sole medium, and even after a hunting accident that left him seriously injured a little over 10 years ago, Jacque never put his artwork to the side.

"I've been doing pencil drawing since I was six years old, and I'm 47 now," said Jacque. "I draw pets and local animals such as birds, deer, horses, things like that. I would eventually like to go out west and draw things like bison and elk, but not yet. My dog commission worked out very well last year and it has helped me because I'm disabled."

Jacque broke his femur and the back of his skull when he was bow hunting by himself in November of 2008 and fell more than 25 feet out of a tree. He was blinded in his left eye and suffered from a brain injury, taking him over six years in addition to a month-long induced coma and rehab to get the right side of his body functioning properly.

"I was hunting by myself and I didn't tell anyone where I was going," he said. "I went out at 4:40 in the morning, and I'm usually back by 10am. I guess my brother and parents were out looking for me because I was supposed to be home for an early dinner with everyone and never showed up. They found me at 4 in the afternoon at the base of the tree. I'd be fine if I had just done things the right way."

Despite everything has been through, Jacque has a positive outlook and his pencil drawings have not only helped him with income, but have also been good for his mental health and given him an outlet for the creativity he has had since he was a young child. It's something he has been able to do even during his years of recovery after the fall.

"It's not going to get better if I'm angry about it forever," he said. "I've learned to have a sense of humor about it. I'm thankful. They put a long metal rod along my femur but I can walk fine now."

Jaques has taken thousands of pictures of nature, animals, and people all over Massachusetts and the rest of New England, using them as a reference for his work rather than sketching in person. He likes drawing dogs more than anything else and has made canine portraits his least expensive commission, hoping that more people will reach out to him for drawings of their

"With dogs, it's so easy for people to send me photographs and if the dog has passed away I can still do the drawing," he said. "I enjoy drawing dogs so much that I don't mind selling them for less than another portrait might be. I'd like to be able to do more of them.'

Jacque said he is thankful for the support he has had from his mother and stepfather, brother, wife, and two daughters, who he says have been exceptional in helping him heal and pursue his artwork.

Fire displaces dozens, injures one

STURBRIDGE—An early morning three-alarm fire on Sunday, April 21 at the 1738 House apartment complex at 489 Main St. displaced 80 residents and caused smoke-related damage to 42 apartments, sending one resident to a local hospital with a minor injury and causing several others to suffer from smoke inhalation.

The fire was determined to be caused by the improper disposal

of smoking materials off," and was contained to the one room it started in. However, because the smoke conditions were said to have made building unsafe, Sturbridge Fire the Department said that they decided a total evacuation was necessary to ensure the safety of the residents.

"At first it was 14 apartments, but we ended up closing down the building temporarily due to concerns of hygiene and we had to shut the power

said Sturbridge Fire Chief John Grasso. "Currently, 80 residents from all 42 apartments are being provided temporary housing from the American Red Cross."

Firefighters from surrounding towns including Charlton, Spencer, Brookfield, North Brookfield, Warren, Brimfield, Webster, Auburn, and Southbridge helped on and off duty Sturbridge firefighters fight the flames and assist with search and evacuation. They were

able to stop the fire and also offered the people make sure everyone was safe very quickly.

"All responding crews did an excellent in preventing the spread of this fire," wrote the Webster Fire Department on their

Facebook page. On the day of the fire, the Red Cross immediately set up at the Sturbridge Senior Center to offer shelter and assistance to displaced residents and the property manager of the apartment complex put residents up in a local hotel. BT's Smokehouse affected by the fire to eat at the restaurant for free and Cumberland Farms provided additional food and beverages.

The Sturbridge Fire Department is unsure displaced will be able to go home but hopes that things will keep moving so that their lives can go back to normal as soon as possible.

"As of right now, we don't have an estimate on when that will be," said Grasso. "It all depends on how quickly the cleaning crew can get through through it and how quickly the health department can approve the premises."

Until the displaced residents can return to when those who were their apartments, the Red Cross has set them up with temporary housing and resources.

New contract ends Stop & Shop strike

STURBRIDGE—After nearly three months of negotiations and 11 days of striking, members of the United Food & Commercial Workers Local 1445 who are employed at Stop & Shop returned to work on Monday, April 22 after they reached a contract deal with and the grocery store.

The new contract, which was agreed upon on Sunday, April 22 and ratified by the union members on Wednesday, April 25, provides a continuation of health care and retirement benefits, wage increases, and time-and-a-half pay on Sunday for current members among other things.

"We have a good, solid contract, worlds apart from the company's original proposal," said Stacianne Scarafoni, an employee at the Sturbridge Stop & Shop and a UFCW Local 1445 Shop Steward. "More importantly, the company did not succeed in breaking the union, which appears may have been their ultimate goal. As our UFCW Local 1445 president Jeff Bollen said, we now have a lot of power in our pockets. We stood up to corporate greed and brought them to their knees in 11 days. We should be so proud and grateful.

UFCW Local 145 and the Stop & Shop have been trying to make a deal since Feb. 23, when their three-year contract expired and the grocery store did not promise a continuation of the wage levels or the pension and health insurance benefits its employees were receiving. The strike was formally authorized on Feb. 24 and launched on April 11.

"In the beginning, we all thought this was going to go on for a short period of time," said Scarafoni. "Later, however, many of us felt uncertainty, believing that if we went past Easter, we would be in it for the long haul."

The store was run by management at the beginning of the strike, but eventually brought in temporary help during the final days of the dispute. No orders were received for the entire week and a half, and the grocery store was reported to have lost millions of dollars over the

The company released a statement on Sunday, April 21, announcing the new tentative agreements with the union and saying that the chain is "glad to have our associates return to work as

the strike has ended.' "Our associates' top priority will be restocking our stores so we can return to taking care of our customers and communities and providing them with the service they deserve," said the company. "We deeply appreciate the patience and understanding of our customers during this time, and we look forward to welcoming them back to Stop & Shop.

The Sturbridge Stop & Shop union members said that they are grateful for the support they received from the community during the strike and want customers to come back despite this struggle with the company.

"The positive support from the community overwhelmed those of us on the picket line," said Scarafoni. "Every day, customers dropped off coffee and food and offered us words of encouragement. We thank them from the bottom of our

hears. We won this strike because they refused to cross our picket line."

The UFCW Local 145 members have said they they are satisfied with the outcome of the strike and the new conditions of the contract, believing that their success has a wider significance for all workers.

"We made history," said Scarafoni. "It was a huge victory, not just for Stop & Shop workers, but for unions and working class people throughout this country.



I first noticed him as he stood at the rear of his car, trunk open, slipping his chest protector over his head. He's tall, slender and an athletic appearing African American man. He had white hair and a white moustache. It made a striking appearance against his dark skin. I'm guessing he was

at least six feet five inches tall and slender. Maybe sixty-five years old. Dignified. Deliberate. Purposeful.

Our little family entourage headed toward the baseball field, not giving the apparent umpire another thought. Caleb prepared for his little league game. At 8 years old, Caleb is focused. Determined. Ready. He loves baseball.

As both teams warm up, the old umpire walked onto the field, looked at his watch and bellowed. "It's time. We gonna play ball or warm-up all night?"

The two young teams casually move into place.

"We can play ball, or I can go home. It's up to you." The ump looks at both managers. It seemed to be the casualness that the ump finds irritating.

I see the managers and coaches glancing at each other. They seem caught off guard by his directness.

Before taking his place behind the plate, he calls the coaches over and gives them stern instructions. "Keep the kids in the dugout behind the fence. If you are not in a defensive position or up to bat, you'll remain in the dugout. Get the dropped bats off the field, fast. I don't want anyone tripping or getting hurt. And I wanna see some hustle. I ain't gonna hang around here all night."

The managers agree and walk back to their teams.

I was surprised by his abrupt nature. "These are kids," I mumble.

The first eight-year-old batter cautious-

ly approaches the plate. Head down. Shirt untucked.

"You don't walk up to this plate with your shirt untucked. You hustle up to bat and you act like a ball player. Tuck in your shirt."

The young man looks at the ump, then back to his manager.

"Don't look at him," the ump complains. "It's not his job to dress you. Now tuck in that shirt and step up to the plate," the ump says, this time with a changed voice. Soft. Encouraging. Mentoring.

He is old school. A bit crotchety but in his heart, I sense that he believes he's protecting a sacred tradition. There is no question who is in control. The ump runs a very tight ship.

The young ball player swings and seems surprised he made contact. He drops his bat, looks at the ump who smiles and makes a 'shooing' motion with his hands. The batter runs to first base. The ump nods his approval towards first, as the next young boy walks up to the plate.

The ump raises his hands and bellows. "I need some hustle here!"

The managers on both sides begin pushing their kids to run, not walk to the plate. There is a change in both dugouts. A sense of importance. Purpose.

The ump looks down at the next batter and shakes his head, then looks at the manager. "Hey coach, don't send these ball players up here with their shoes untied. Somebody is gonna get hurt!"

The boy seems frightened and just stares down at his untied shoes. Frozen.

The ump, three feet taller than the boy. drops to a knee and ties the youngster's shoe. I can't hear the conversation, but I see a smile spread across the young boy's face as the ump stands up and pats him on

A turkey bunting tale



Turkey hunting opened this past Monday in Mass. under somewhat ideal conditions. I can remember my first turkey hunt a number of years ago at a farm in Brookfield. I headed out early to be in my ground blind before first light. The birds were gobbling early from there roost, and as I sat in my ground blind, I could hear the rest of the wildlife awakening from their night's sleep. Numerous song birds were making my early morning stay extremely pleasant, away from the hectic day that the commuters were experiencing. It was getting light fast, and I could make out much of the landscape around me. I was getting anxious, as I knew things were going to happen any time now. A sudden heavy flutter of a turkey dropping down from his roost had my heart pounding and my chest became a bit heavy. This sport of turkey hunting is not for anyone with a bad heart or for the elderly that have health

Peaking out the widow of my ground blind, I could see movement at the far end of the field. I quickly grabbed my binoculars to take a better look, and I could make out at least three birds slowly working my way. Two of them were big toms displaying for the two hens that were in the flock, as they fed on kernel's of corn left by the farmer after the fall harvested of his crop. I decided to wait for the birds to get closer to my setup of decoys before calling them with my box call. Sitting comfortable in my blind I quickly grabbed a couple of sips of coffee from my thermos bottle which is one of the pleasures of sitting in a ground blind, and not on the ground.

As I looked to my right, I had two hen turkeys also coming in with a couple of tom birds displaying and constantly gobbling. I gave one small hen call and the birds went nuts. Now my heart was really pounding. I was pretty sure I would not need my annual stress test with my heart doctor that year. Suddenly, a couple of hens spotted my decoys and stated to leave the others behind. That is all it took to make the two big toms

chase after the two hens which were all headed in my direction. I barely had time to stick my gun barrel out of the small window of my ground blind, and the toms were all around my decoys. Both birds were displaying and they both had short beards, but I was not as picky as I am today. After all, it was my first turkey and I was lucky to have the opportunity to harvest a bird.

Choosing the bird I wanted did not take long, as I placed the crosshairs of the gun scope on the bird I chose to harvest, I slowly squeezed the trigger. As the gun discharged the huge bird dropped in his tracks, and the roar of the shotguns discharge echoed throughout the valley. The smell of gun powder filled the air for a few seconds. The rest of the birds exited the area very quickly flying in all directions. I exited my ground blind as quickly as I could, which was not very fast, and this year I am even slower. As I walked over to my prize turkey, I took a moment to appreciate all of the open area around me, and for the farmer's permission to hunt there property. Placing the tag on the turkeys leg, I carried the bird & my gear back

Upon arrival at home it was necessary to clean the bird as soon as possible. It is best to remove the beard and tail feathers first, then remove the



two feet up to the first joint if you plan on saving the spurs of the bird. Next, the easiest method is to skin the bird with all of the feathers, remove the legs and breast, and discard the rest of the bird. Do not forget to register the bird on line before cleaning it.

The breasts are great eating, but the legs may be a bit stringy due to the tough tendons, because of the constant scratching and digging that a turkey does daily to locate food. I am sure you can find a great recipe in any game book or on line for cooking the legs, but the breast can be cooked or smoked like any other domestic or game bird. They are actually very good table fair.

The Whitinsville Fish & Game Club held there annual fishing derby this past Saturday. Although the turnout was very light, every angler caught fish with numerous big rainbow trout taking some of the top prizes.

Repots of good tautog fishing on the Cape & at the Westport River, is good news for saltwater anglers. Captain John Boats out of Plymouth Mass. were able to get out fishing only one time this spring because of bad weather, and the bite was slow. They are hoping for a break in the weather soon, as are all other charter boats. This week's picture shows a young unidentified angler holding a nice haddock.

Deer ticks are out big time. Be sure to keep your pets on preventive medication, and be sure to check the family daily for tick bites.

That gesture ... this giant of a man, stooping down and tying an eight-yearolds shoes ... then standing and patting him on the head ... told me everything I wanted to know about him.

The managers quickly began inspecting their players. They seemed unsure what to think about the umpire, but his spirit is contagious. The ump expects discipline and hustle. I said aloud to no one, "He's teaching them life-skills."

This all took place at a little league game in Sierra Madre, California. My

daughter and son-in-law live there with my two grandsons. We try to visit four times a year and always during spring and fall baseball. Both my grandsons, six- and eight-years old play. At this game I had the pleasure of meeting and watching Mr. Isreal "Dino" Charles in action as umpire and a loving mentor to a group of kids he has never met.

After the game, I introduced myself and complimented him. I asked why he

"I love baseball and I want the kids to learn to respect each other and respect the game. What I try to teach them through baseball are life skills they need on and off the field. Be on time. Hustle. Be prepared. Look sharp. Try hard and be the best you can be.

I shook his hand and thanked him. I wanted to say more but the words didn't come out, but now they are. As I walked away, the phrases "thundering kindness and tough love" kept sounding in my head.

Contagious hit parade helps Beavers beat Auburn, remain undefeated

AUBURN — With apologies to KC and the Sunshine Band, whose disco hit "Boogie Shoes" peaked at No. 35 on the Billboard Hot 100 chart back in 1978, the undefeated Blackstone Valley Tech (BVT) varsity softball team had its "Hitting Shoes" on during a game versus Auburn High on Thursday, April

The Beavers (5-0) pounded out 20 hits, including two long home runs, and scored in every inning but the second en route to a 14-4 win over the Rockets.

Sisters Abby and Alyssa Clark led BVT's offensive assault. Abby, a junior, was 3-for-4 with two singles, a two-run homer and three RBI while Alyssa, a senior, was 3-for-5 with a solo home run and two RBI.

The Clark sisters' home runs came in the same inning, the five-run fifth, which began with BVT clinging to a 4-3 lead and ended with the Beavers comfortably ahead, 9-3.

Alyssa Clark led off the inning with her solo shot over the fence in straightaway center field. Three batters later Abby Clark hit a 3-0 pitch out to the same spot, only farther. A longtime Auburn High softball fan said it was one of the longest home runs he's seen hit out of the Rockets' home field.

'When I saw my sister hit her home run I knew I had to try and match it when I got up; we like to compete against each other," Abby Clark said with a laugh. "The pitch I hit out, I just saw it coming right to me and I just loved the spot it was in, so I went for it."


Blackstone Valley Tech head coach Peter Cardoza said Abby Clark's round-tripper wasn't just the result of a wild swing on a 3-0 count.

"Abby did what we ask them all to do. We tell them on 3-0 counts look for your pitch. Don't just take the pitch because it's a 3-0 count," Cardoza said. "She did that. She was ready, she got a great pitch to hit and she made contact. It was a good job by her.

you have a 3-0 count," Cardoza continued. "Just see it and hit it. Don't look for the walk; don't worry about making a mistake. You're here to hit and hitting is fun, so go have fun. Abby crushed that ball, absolutely, but they all hit the ball very well today. Hitting is contagious. If one girl is aggressive up there, then they all are. It just takes one to break through, one girl who is not worried about getting up and making a mistake."

Trinity Gibbs also had a good day at the plate for the Beavers, with three singles and two RBI, while Jillian Newcomb, Hailey Lisak, Audrey Karyabdi, Megan Metzger and Abby Behrikis all finished with two hits each. Hallie Arpin also helped the winning cause by driving in two runs with an RBI single and a sacrifice fly.

Every member of BVT's starting batting lineup hit safely in the game.

We've been hitting the ball well all year," said Cardoza, whose team has scored 67 runs in its five games this season. The Beavers have had as many as 16 runs in a game and no fewer than nine. "We've been pounding the ball. Almost everyone on this team plays travel ball and the one girl who doesn't, she hits all winter long. The girls work very hard on their hitting.

Auburn (4-3) scored its four runs on eight hits. Izzy Therrien and Ava Novakoski both went 2-for-4 with a single, double and an RBI. Jaycie Opuda, Corrie Hammond, Emily Wambach and Emma Gervais all singled as well.

The Rams trailed at the half, 9-6, and found themselves down, 11-8, with 17:46 to play when the Rockets' Shea Jarvis found the back of the net. That was when first-year head coach Meg Dunn inserted Hannah Cushing, who had scored two goals out in the field, into the net to take over for Emily

Stelmach at the goalie position.

Cushing wasn't tested often, she made two saves and allowed one goal, but the team received the boost that they needed. Shepherd Hill proceeded to score five of the game's final six goals to rally past Auburn, 13-12.

Another second-half adjustment saw midfielder Megan Burdett get moved back to defense, and she stole the ball away from a Rockets' attacking player on their final offensive possession.

"The second half they just fought," Dunn said of what it took to win. "They knew coming in it was going to be a battle.

Reduce maintenance and increase success with self-watering gardens

Raised beds and containers expand our planting options. They allow us to grow edible and ornamental plants even where there is no plantable space to garden. Use them to make planting, tending and harvesting convenient by bringing the garden to your back door. And fill them with pollinator-friendly plants to enjoy the colorful hummingbirds and butterflies that visit and flit past the window, deck and balconv.

Their need for frequent watering may have discouraged you from growing in raised beds and containers. The limited soil mass and increased exposure to wind, heat and sunlight make fast-draining potting mixes dry out more quickly than in-ground gardens.

Self-watering raised gardens are now available, making these gardens a realistic option; even for the busiest gardener. Consider one with a large built-in water reservoir, like Gardener's Corrugated Metal Self-Watering Raised Bed, that extends time between watering.

Create mixed plantings of edibles and flowers for beautiful combinations in raised beds. Include some edible flowers like nasturtiums, pansies and calendulas that you, the

hummingbirds and butterflies will enjoy. Lettuce, parsley, kale, Swiss chard and red cabbage combine nicely with most flowers and chives provide an edible vertical accent. Select compact vegetable varieties like Patio Choice yellow cherry tomato, Patio Pride peas, Mascotte bush beans and Astia zucchini suited to container and raised bed culture. And if concerned about maintaining the integrity of the patio or deck surface consider a Patio Raised Bed with Base (gardeners.com) that protects the underlying surface.

Elevated gardens raise your plantings to a comfortable height. No bending or kneeling needed to plant, weed and harvest. These are basically containers on legs. Many have wheels so you can move them out of the way or into the sunlight as needed.

Look for those with built-in trellises and supports when growing vines like cucumbers, pole beans and Malabar spinach and tall plants like tomatoes, dinner plate dahlias and cosmos. But like containers, they dry out more quickly than in-ground gardens and need frequent irrigation.

Look for easy care, self-watering containers like the Self-Watering Standing Garden with large reservoirs to maximize the time between watering. Look for those with fill tubes and water-level indicators to help you determine when to water. These features help keep your garden looking and producing its best. You'll have plenty of fresh greens for salads, herbs for seasoning drinks and meals, and flowers to dress up your table.

Don't fret if you already have a raised bed or elevated garden that lacks these easy-care features. DIY irrigation kits are available and easy to design for these types of gardens. Select systems that allow you to customize and fit the irrigation layout to your gardening

Further reduce maintenance by incorporating a slow release fertilizer at planting. These types of fertilizers release small amounts of nutrients over a longer period of time. No weekly mixing and applications needed. Just give them a mid-season boost if needed and according to the fertilizer label.

Reducing ongoing maintenance of raised beds and container gardens makes it practical to expand your gardening space. Just be sure to fill them with a quality potting mix and plants suited to the growing conditions and in no time, you'll be enjoying the flavor and beauty these gardens pro-

DYI Fix-It Tips for Vintage Finds

It's flea market season and while great scores can be exciting, few vintage treasures are perfect. In fact, most require a little TLC to be at their best. For the "Do it Yourselfer" a little effort and elbow grease on an aged piece can pay off in increased value (not to mention the satisfaction of a job well done)!

Read on for some easily applied "do it yourself" ideas to fix up your less than perfect flea market finds.

*Note: The information below is offered as a suggestive guideline only and not meant as instructional. Any application should be tested first and applied strictly at the user's own risk and responsibility.

Doll Up: Childhood toys are hot collectibles and few are as endearing as vintage dolls. Many dolls from the 1920s to the 1940s, especially baby and Mama type dolls have a body or limbs made from composition material, which is a combination of molded wood pulp and glue and not always easy to clean.

It's important never to clean these dolls with water, as water can seep into crazing and cracks, which can cause damage to the material. The alternative? Try waterless hand cleaners such as Goop. Apply it with a clean cloth in a circular motion to rub off dirt and grime. Wipe off immediately.

Always apply Goop cleaner carefully over facial features to avoid removing painted areas. Apply with a cotton swab to dimples, nose crevices and ears. Or, try the trick some restorers use and apply petroleum jelly or cold cream to surface clean composition.

If you must use a stronger cleaner, such as household cleaners with ammonia, apply with the corner of a soft cloth one section at a time and dry immediately. Avoid areas with crazing or cracking. Once clean, buff it up with a careful application of clear paste wax. Apply wax to the palm of your hand, rub your hands together and apply to the surface, buff and wipe for a finished look.

Gussie up Glass: Glass pieces such as decanters, cruets or vases sometimes develop cloudiness or stubborn stains from liquid that settled in the bottle. If a wash in sudsy water doesn't work, try dropping a denture tablet or two inside with water for a self scrub treatment. If that also fails, pour household vinegar into the glass piece,

covering the stain. Allow it to soak overnight. Before spilling out the vinegar, add some uncooked rice and shake vigorously to scour the stain. Repeat if necessary.

If homemade treatments don't thoroughly remove bottle stains, try commercial products made for porcelain such as Lime Away.

Pro Tip: The U.S. General Services Administration Historic Preservation Technical Procedures Manual suggests cleaning old glass as follows: To wash the glass with a solution of non sudsing household ammonia in water. Or wash in vinegar and water (do not mix the two). For discoloration, wash clear glass with a non toxic detergent and very fine 0000 steel wool. Do not apply too much pressure or it will break the glass or scratch the surface of the glass.

Salt cellars are another great collectible that are not always found in tip top shape. Oftentimes the top and bottom of a salt cellar has corroded together. Usually a good soak in warm water will loosen the bond. If that doesn't work and If the piece is sturdy glass with metal top, try this method: Soak the salt cellar in a rust breaking penetrating oil (from the hardware store). It may take several days. Once the pieces come apart, remove corrosion first with a rag, then with sandpaper. To prevent the problem in the future, be sure to store salt cellars in a dry environment and periodically remove the top to clean.

Furniture Fixes: Don't be too hasty to refinish an antique piece. Remember that an original finish on vintage wood is more desirable than a refinished surface. Before you delve into any refinishing project, try cleaning and polish-

ing the wood first. You may TAKE be surprised at how good a vintage piece can look with THE a bit of effort. HINT

If white cloudy marks or

rings from careless drinks **KAREN** set on the surface have **TRAINOR** marred the top of a dresser or table, try removing the stain before resorting to a

cover up job. Pour some denatured alcohol (available at the hardware or paint store) on a folded piece of cheesecloth and wipe over the offending stain. Be careful not to overwork your strokes. When done, be sure to polish with a good wax and buff.

Mineral spirits or paint thinner can be an effective wood cleaner, but you must test it first to make sure the wood responds well. After removing dirt and grime with the thinner, clean the wood with a weak solution of mild dishwashing liquid and water. Rub a small section at a time with cheesecloth or rag, turning rag to work with a clean area. If the wood is inacceptable condition, proceed with a good wax and buff. If the cleaning reveals a dull surface or cracks, lightly sandpaper to rejuvenate the surface. Just be careful not to sand so deep that you damage the original finish. Use a wood wax in a brown hue to brighten and camouflage any tiny imperfections. Apply wax as directed and use a soft cloth to buff to a pleasant

Revitalizing Veneer: Old wood dressers are a common flea market offering, but the bureau you find at your flea market may have suffered moisture or heat damage. Since veneer is typically sensitive to temperature fluctuations, such wood is often found loose or bubbled. Before you rip off the veneer to start anew, try this tried and true method for a relative easy repair: If veneer on old furniture is loose, use a razor blade to make a small slit in the wood, working in the direction of the grain. Work a small amount of wood glue under the veneer and weight down to press until dry. If the veneer is bubbled up, place a piece of stiff cardboard on the wood and press with an iron set at medium heat.

Press until you the heat softens the glue and you can feel the wood give a bit. Then press down and weight the area

until the glue has dried.

SOS for Drawer Pulls: Damaged drawer pulls and knobs are another common defect in old furniture. Happily, there are easy and effective ways to remedy the problem. If a wood knob is loose, you can simply cut two small doughnut pieces from medium grade sandpaper to act as washers. Glue the pieces back to back and fit it between the knob and the drawer. If a knob is loose because the screw hole in the back of it has become enlarged, fill the hole with plastic glue and reset screw immediately.

If the nut on your drawer knobs pulls off because the threads on the old metal are worn, try replacing with a smaller nut. If that fails, rub liquid steel onto threads, tighten the old nut and coat the joint between the nut and bolt with more of the liquid steel.

Library to host novelist Lisa Lieberman

STURBRIDGE—The Joshua Hyde Library will be hosting "The Making of Burning Cold", a talk from author Lisa Lieberman on her historical novel "Burning Cold" and the process of writing a mystery, on Thursday, April 25 from 6:30 until 8:30 p.m.

The novel, which is set in Budapest during the 1956 revolution, was inspired by the British film noir "The Third Man," based on a story by Graham Greene and starring Orson Welles. Lieberman will discuss her choice of setting for the novel, give a summary of the revolt and its place in history, and disclose how she placed her characters in significant historical events.

"Those who attend will learn a lot about Hungary during the 1956 revolution,' said Lieberman. "I took the basic arc of the story and set in Budapest in 1956 and approached it as a historian, making everything in the book historically accurate. Part of the discussion is also about the actual writing and I talk about the random things that happened in the course of writing a book."

Prior to her career as a novelist and Vice President of the New England chapter of Sisters in Crime, Lieberman was trained as a modern European cultural and intellectual historian and has written on postwar Europe and translated Jean-Paul Sartre 's essay, "Paris Under the Occupation" and Simone de Beauvoir's

essay, "An Eye for an Eye." She taught history at Dickinson College, directing their Center in Bologna, Italy, has held visiting fellowships at Ohio State and the University of East Anglia in Norwich, England, was the recipient of a Bourse Chateaubriand for research in Paris and has given many talks and written a plethora of essays for various publications.

"I abandoned the academic career when I realized I could actually make something of a living writing mysteries and other books," said Lieberman "A lot of my more serious historical interests and work their way into my novels."

In preparation for writing "Burning Cold," Lieberman actually traveled Hungary to visit the major sites of the revolution, seeing places such as

cemeteries, walls with bullet holes and the place where a journalist was killed. She even found out more about her own Hungarian heritage and that her father's family was from a town about 30 miles from a synagogue site she uses in her novel.

"My husband and I went to Hungary on a walking tour that took us to all the places that had a history during the 1956 revolution, so when I was writing about it, I could really describe the places," said Lieberman. "I enjoy doing research, not just book learning, but also on the ground research.'

Lieberman hopes that those who attend her talk will not only learn about the history of Budapest during the 1956 revolution, but also show them how writing a historical mystery is

an unpredictable and fascinating adventure in itself.

"My books are serious, but they're also kind of escapist and I want people to have fun," said Lieberman. "Part of the delight is discovering what you didn't expect to find and having the book go in a direction you didn't intend it to. I just fasten my seatbelt and go along for the ride. This talk is not a totally serious talk. I have these moments of sheer, crazy inventiveness, and that's what I want to share with the audience.



- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh thyme

- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon each garlic and onion powder

Preheat oven to 400° F. Oil 9-by-13-inch baking pan or 21/2- to 3-quart casserole dish. Layer half of sweet potatoes in dish, mixing colors. Sprinkle with half of cheese. Add remaining sweet potatoes and set aside. In small saucepan over medium-high heat, combine cream with herbs and spices. Cook until bubbles appear at edges of saucepan. Pour cream mixture over sweet potatoes. Sprinkle with remaining cheese, cover loosely and bake until almost tender, about 45 minutes. Uncover and continue baking until tender, about 15 minutes.

Explore your culinary curiosity with Creole jambalaya

You don't need to live in Louisiana to enjoy jambalaya. But perhaps nowhere is jambalaya more serious business than it is in the Pelican State. Cajun jambalaya might be the dish most familiar to the masses, but Creole jambalaya is just as tasty.

Creole chefs in New Orleans serve this type of jambalaya, which is different from the Cajun dish due to the inclusion of tomatoes. Tomatoes might have been hard to come by in the Louisiana bayous, which might be why there were not included in traditional Cajun jambalaya recipes. Mardi Gras and its focus on food and drink is a perfect time to explore one's culinary horizons, and those curious about Creole jambalaya can do just that by whipping up this recipe from Neal Corman and Chris Peterson's "Virgil's Barbecue Road Trip Cookbook" (St. Martin's Press).

JAMBALAYA SERVES 4 TO 6

Seasoning Mix

- tablespoon dried parsley flakes 1/4 teaspoons cracked black pepper
- 11/4 teaspoons cracked black pepper
 2 teaspoons kosher salt
 11/4 teaspoons sweet paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon dried basil11/2 teaspoons dried thyme
- teaspoon ground white pepperteaspoons onion powder
- teaspoons garlic powder teaspoons garlic powder

Jambalaya

- 2 pounds boneless, skin-on chick-
- en thighs 12 shrimp, peeled, deveined, tail
- on 6 tablespoons unsalted butter,
- divided
- 1/4 cup olive oil, divided 5 ounces andouille sausage, fine-
- ly diced 4 ounces Tasso ham, finely diced
- cups finely diced yellow onionscup finely diced celery
- 11/2 cups finely diced green bell pepper
- tablespoon chopped garlic
- 3 dried bay leaves 134 cups converted rice
- 2 cups finely diced fresh plum tomatoes
- 1 cup clam juice

- 2 cups chicken stock Salt and pepper, to taste
- 1. In a small bowl, blend the seasoning mix together and set aside.
- 2. Cut each chicken thigh in half, and evenly dust the thighs with 11/2 table-spoons of the seasoning mix. Dust the shrimp with about 11/2 teaspoons of the mix.
- 3. In a low and wide 6-quart (or larger) stockpot, add 1 tablespoon of the olive oil. Sauté the shrimp for about 1 minute per side. Remove the shrimp and set aside.
- 4. Repeat the process with the chicken, using the remaining oil. Remove the chicken and set aside.
- 5. In the same pot, brown the sausage and ham. Add the remaining butter, onions, celery, bell pepper, garlic, and bay leaves, and cook for 4 minutes.
- 6. Add the rice, stirring to coat it with the mixture. Sauté for 2 minutes. Add the tomatoes and cook for 3 minutes more.
- 7. Add the clam juice, chicken stock and chicken thighs. Bring to a boil, and then reduce to a simmer. Cook for 30 minutes, and then check the rice for tenderness and ensure the chicken is cooked through.
- 8. Fold in the shrimp and cook for another 3 minutes. Remove the bay leaves, taste, add salt and pepper, as desired, and serve.

You don't need to live in Louisiana to enjoy jambalaya. But perhaps nowhere is jambalaya more serious business than it is in the Pelican State. Cajun jambalaya might be the dish most familiar to the masses, but Creole jambalaya is just as tasty.

Creole chefs in New Orleans serve this type of jambalaya, which is different from the Cajun dish due to the inclusion of tomatoes. Tomatoes might have been hard to come by in the Louisiana bayous, which might be why there were not included in traditional Cajun jambalaya recipes. - 3. In a low and wide 6-quart (or larger) stockpot, add 1 tablespoon of the olive oil. Sauté the shrimp for about 1 minute per side. Remove the shrimp and set aside.
- 4. Repeat the process with the chicken, using the remaining oil. Remove the chicken and set aside.
- 5. In the same pot, brown the sausage and ham. Add the remaining butter, onions, celery, bell pepper, garlic, and bay leaves, and cook for 4 minutes.
- 6. Add the rice, stirring to coat it with the mixture. Sauté for 2 minutes. Add the tomatoes and cook for 3 minutes
- 7. Add the clam juice, chicken stock and chicken thighs. Bring to a boil, and then reduce to a simmer. Cook for 30 minutes, and then check the rice for tenderness and ensure the chicken is cooked through.
- 8. Fold in the shrimp and cook for another 3 minutes. Remove the bay leaves, taste, add salt and pepper, as desired, and serve.

Sweet Potato Casserole with Herbs, Walnuts and Brown Butter Serves 8 to 12

- 5 lb. orange- or yellow-fleshed sweet potatoes, or a combination, halved lengthwise
 - 1/2 c. butter
 - 2 shallots, chopped 1/4 c. fresh sage leaves
 - 2 T. fresh rosemary leaves 2 T. fresh thyme leaves
 - 11/2 c. cream 1 c. shredded Asiago cheese
 - Salt and pepper large eggs, lightly beaten
 - c. chopped walnuts
 - c. panko

Preheat oven to 350° F. Arrange sweet

potatoes on two large rimmed baking sheets, cut side down, and bake until tender, 1 to 11/2 hours. Set aside. Increase oven to 400° F. In medium saucepan over medium heat, combine butter, shallots and herbs. Cook, stirring occasionally, until butter browns, shallots are tender, and herbs are crisped, about 6 minutes. Scoop flesh from sweet potatoes into large bowl. Add half of butter mixture, mash. Add cream, cheese, and salt and pepper to taste. Stir in eggs. Transfer to 2-qt. baking dish and bake until almost heated through, 20 to 25 minutes. Stir walnuts and panko into remaining butter mixture, sprinkle on casserole, and continue baking until heated through and browned on top, 5 to 10 minutes.


