Water and Sewer Superintendent George Patrinos appeared before selectmen in late January seeking permission to examPatrinos explained that the town has been examining the possibility of a fourth water source for years but now that one of the pumps are unusable the town needs to give serious consideration to new options in the immediate future.



Dudley Library seeking landscaping bids

DUDLEY - The Dudley Library is officially seeking qualified bidders to perform landscape improvements on the property in an effort to beautify one of Dudley's signature public facilities this spring and summer.

Library Director Drusilla Carter received approval from the Library Board of Trustees in late January to release an **RFP** seeking interested parties to perform landscape archi-

tecture work on a vacant lot adjacent to the library at 40 Schofield Avenue. According to the RFP, the project is intended to provide a multiuse outdoor space for patrons and programs of the Library to utilize. Bidders can be expected to take on several responsibilities including preparation and adjustments in elevation to the property, design work, preparation of cost estimates and more. Carter said that once the bids are received it will be up to herself and the Board of Trustees to pick a contractor.

"The plan is that (town officials) will do what they need to do on their end but the walkthrough, assuming there's not a lot of snow, would be handled by me," said Carter. "The opening of bids would actually be me and whichever trustees the board wishes to designate to be there to actually open them and then the board would review them. It would not be unlike anything that happens at the town hall. It has to go to the selectmen, but the comment I was given was that the town administrator would

strongly recommend whatever choice the board and I made."

According to Carter this bidding process is a unique one for Dudley as she was unable to find any examples from the past of Dudley as a town seeking proposals for landscape work. She worked with the Board of Selectmen's office to draft an RFP using examples from other libraries as inspiration.

"I'm eternally grateful to those libraries that have not taken down their RFPs from previous projects," Carter

ioked.

The RFP and information concerning submissions are available on the Town of Dudley website. A pre-submission meeting is to be held on Feb. 21 at the Pearl L. Crawford Memorial Library. The proposal deadline is set for March 20. After proposals have been received and the library decide who they will be working with a timeline for the project will be determined.



Fattman, McKenna, Dabrowski family announce legislation closing loophole

BOSTON – State Sen. Rvan Fattman (R-Sutton) and Rep. Joseph McKenna (R- Webster) filed legislation on behalf of the Dabrowski family of Webster to close a loophole that allows contract work agencies to terminate employees who miss work due to injuries sustained from episodes of domestic violence.

In April of 2019, Amanda Dabrowski was brutally attacked in her home by a man whom she had briefly dated. She was able to successfully defend herself from the attacker, but sustained severe injuries that sent her to the hospital. Consequently, she was unable to attend work at a local pharmaceutical company. Her family notified her employer

that she wouldn't be able to go to work, and within a few short days, she was notified of her termination.

"Amanda essentially lost her job as a result of being a victim of domestic violence.' said Fattman while on the floor of the Senate, before filing the legislation.

The ability of the temp agency and the pharmaceutical company to terminate Amanda's contract in this manner was protected by a loophole in the current law.'

Under the current victim protection laws, businesses are not able to terminate victims of domestic violence. However, these same protections are not extended to contract employees. Because Amanda worked at a temp agency, the loophole allowed the agency and the pharmaceutical company to terminate Amanda, even while she recovered from her injuries.

As Fattman began to conclude his speech, he said, "Victims of domestic violence need to be protected, and this legislation will be one step in strengthening our laws to make sure that happens. What happened to Amanda Dabrowski should never be allowed to happen again."

After the Senate Session, Fattman, McKenna, and the Dabrowski family gathered in Senator Fattman's office to formally file the legislation.

"Our daughter was a leader and fighter who cared for all people, so we are doing exactly what Amanda would have done to help those in need and advocate for change," the Dabrowski family noted. "In her memory, we know we can change the law to make sure a victim and their family never are disadvantaged due to domestic abuse or violence enacted upon them. This is our mission because it would have been Amanda's.'

It is because of this sentiment and a desire to close the loophole to protect victims of domestic abuse, that attman and McKenna are filing this legislation.

'In the wake of this tragedy, I was stunned to learn that employees of temp agencies contracted to work for other

companies were not covered by the Commonwealth's existing victims' protection laws," added McKenna. "All employees, whether employed directly or contracted through an agency, deserve to be protected from losing their jobs if they miss work as a result of suffering as a victim of domestic assault. This legislation closes that loophole and will protect all workers in the Commonwealth."







source. They tried all areas of town. They even tried over the west side of town. They pinpointed certain areas that looked like good potentials but ran into many readblocks. These readblocks

into many roadblocks. Those roadblocks are still there today," said Patrinos. Luckily, while talking with engineers and the late Ken Butkiewicz who was a significant supporter of the Dudley Rail Trail Patrinos was made aware of a 17-acre plot of town owned land behind Edwards Road. This led to an idea to possibly set up the new water source in that location if it proves to be viable. "The idea is to pipe it directly downtown into the West Main Street area, possibly a supply tank in the process before that point," Patrinos said. "A lot of people seem to like the idea. It's not going to happen right now - It's going to take some time." Selectmen granted Patrinos permission to perform tests on the property which the superintendent said would allow him to utilize contractors and personnel when they are in town for other purposes. While the question remains if this town-owned property will in fact be the solution to the towns water source needs Patrinos called it an important first step to finding a solution to an increasingly relevant dilemma. "It's just a starting point. It may not work, but it's better than doing nothing," Patrinos said.

Thoughts on striper season



Saltwater anglers are patiently waiting for the final results on striped bass sizes and limits for the 2020 fishing season in both Massachusetts and Rhode Island. The winter 2020 public hearings are scheduled for three dates, and are as follows: March 10 at the Coolidge Middle school, 89 Birch Meadow Dr., Reading, starting at 6 p.m.; next meeting will be held on March 12 at 9:30 a.m., Tisbury Town Hall, Katharine Cornell Theater, 51 Spring St., Vineyard Haven, Mass.; and the final meeting for public input will be on March 12, at 6 p.m. at the Mass. Marine Academy, Admirals Hall 101 Academy Dr., Buzzards Bay.

It is very important that all striper anglers attend one of the public hearings to voice their concerns and suggestions to the Mass. Marine Fisheries board at the above mentioned hearings. Slot size limits, daily bag limits and use of circle hooks are the major concerns of most striper anglers. Use of devices to remove striped bass from any waters will be discussed. Also on the agenda are Bluefish recreational possession limits, striped bass commercial seasons, fishing days and size limits. Sea bass commercial possession limits and by catch allowances,

Summer flounder commercial possession limits, Menhaden commercial limits and permitting, and numerous other housekeeping items will be discussed.

Removal of menhaden by commercial fisherman is a hot topic annually. The removal of tons of menhaden annually has had major impacts on striper populations, because the stripers feed heavily on them. In past years, areas that once had big striper populations were negatively impacted by the removal of menhaden. One area was the Providence River. What once was a fantastic fishery for recreational anglers back only a few years ago, was extremely poor for the last few years. Removal of tons of Menhaden annually has also impacted the bluefish population in the area.

Bluefish populations are also in big trouble. Their numbers have plummeted dramatically over the last 10 years, and Marine Fisheries is final-



If you're single, ignore society's ideals that we have to be involved in a relationship to find happiness. It's simply not true, and there are millions of people across the globe who find themselves skipping happily down the sidewalk of life solo. If you do have a sweetheart, enjoy the day and all of the happiness that goes hand in hand as a result of Cupid's arrow.

We think, as we often do, that the best part of any holiday is of course the music. Music is something we can enjoy regardless of our relationship status. Love has been the fuel for some of the greatest songs to pass over our ears. Below we came up with some favorites, and dug deeper to find the meaning behind the lyrics or how the songs came to be.

"Fly Me to the Moon" was originally titled "In Other Words" (for obvious reasons), and was written in 1954 by Bart Howard. In 1964, Frank Sinatra put a new spin on the old jazz standard and it has become a favorite classic. The song was written at the request of Howard's publisher for a simpler song. Howard wrote the song in 20 minutes.

"I Say a Little Prayer," another romantic classic with an unexpectedly deep message, was written by Burt Bacharach and Hal David in 1967 for Dionne Warwick. The song is about a woman's concern for her significant other, serving in the Vietnam War. The song became one of the most successful hits of that era.

'What a Wonderful World" was written by George David Weiss and Bob Thiele and recorded, most famously, by Louis Armstrong in 1967. The writers originally had Tony Bennett in mind to record and release the song however Bennett turned it down. Weiss later admitted that he wrote the song expressly for Armstrong because of his ability to bring people of different backgrounds together. The song was a huge hit in the United Kingdom before it reached more fame in the United States almost ten years later. The reason for the halt, was the hesitation of ABC to promote the song. "The Greatest Love of All" just might be the best song to belt out while driving down the highway, or in our minds, at the very least a close tie with Queen's "Bohemian Rhapsody." The ballad was written by Michael Masser and Linda Creed in 1977. The first to record the tune was George Benson who brought the song to number two on the charts. Whitney Houston took the song to a new level in 1985 where it reached the number one spot. The message is a good one, 'learning to love yourself is the greatest love of all'. 'At Last" is a classic that was written in 1941 by Mack Gordon and Harry Warren for the movie "Sun Valley Serenade." The lyrics were ultimately never heard in the movie, but the powerful vocal laid down by the legendary Etta James for Chess Records in 1960 led the song to the Grammy Hall of Fame in 1999. We can't have a list of favorite love songs without including a power ballad from the 1980's. What better band to honor today than Def Leppard. After all, nothing says "I love you" like big hair and fluorescent colored tank tops...at least, to us. In 1987, the song "Love Bites" was released, offer-ing a tongue in cheek view of the pitfalls of romance. The song was written by five people, but it was celebrated producer Robert John "Mutt" Lange who brought the song to the attention of the band. The song was originally written with a Country artist in mind; however, Def Leppard added the rock flare that made the song climb the charts. 'Your Body is a Wonderland," written by John Mayer in 2001, was apparently about Mayer's first girlfriend at the age of 14. The original title was "Strawberry Wonderland," but was later changed. Last but not least to make our list is perhaps the definitive love song — "My Girl" by the Temptations. This classic was recorded in 1964. The song was written by Smokey Robinson and Ronald White. The inspiration for the song came from Robinson's wife Claudette Rogers Robinson.

Keep those hands free

February marks the start of hands-free cell phone use while driving in Massachusetts. The law was passed last year, and it takes effect in just a few weeks. Since this is an important

safety related change, I was asked to provide some details for drivers. Texting and

Texting and driving had been prohibited for several years in Massachusetts. This was very difficult to enforce, however; especial-

ly with the prevalence of smart phones. In those instances, it is always difficult to determine the difference between a person sending a text or dialing a phone number. Since distracted driving is a major concern, particularly involving cell phones, this change to a hands-free system is an important public safety measure. Most states had hands-free laws in place for quite some time. Massachusetts is now up to speed with everyone else. As of Feb. 23, drivers can be stopped for a using phone other than in hands free mode. From that date until the end of March, drivers are only subject to a warning for a violation. After that time, they can be issued a citation.

According to the new law, drivers can only use electronic devices and mobile phones in hands-free mode, and are only permitted to touch devices to activate them for that purpose. They cannot hold or support any electronic device/phone, and it should be properly mounted to the windshield, dashboard, or center console in a manner that does not impede with the operation of the vehicle. Emailing, using apps, watching videos, internet use, etc. is also prohibited. Activation of GPS navigation is allowed when the device is installed or properly mounted in the vehicle as mentioned previously. Handheld use can only occur if the vehicle is both stationary and not located in a public travel lane. It is not allowed at red lights or stop signs. Voice to text and other communication of electronic devices is legal, again, only when device is properly mounted in the vehicle. The use of a headphone for one ear is allowed. Drivers may use a phone in the event of an emergency to call 911 or for help; however, everyone is still encouraged to pull over to a safe location whenever possible. The penalty for a first offense violation carries \$100 fine. A second offense calls for a \$250 fine, plus the mandatory completion of a distracted driving educational program. A third or subsequent offenses carries a \$500 fine, plus an insurance surcharge along with the mandatory completion of the distracted driving educational program. The hope is drivers will limit any unnecessary cell phone use. Everyone should take advantage of this time to equip their vehicles with the appropriate hands-free mounts to make certain any phone use is both safe and in compliance with the law. Please do your best to limit distractions and try to only use phones when necessary. If the call or message can wait, let it. Thanks again for your questions and comments. Valentine's Day: Financial protection can be a great Valentine's Day Gift


On Valentine's Day, you can give your spouse or life partner a traditional gift such as candy or flowers. But once you've done that, why not think about something that can provide longer-lasting

benefits for your loved one?

Specifically, think about ways to provide a lifetime of financial protection.

You can do this in several ways, including:

Protection while you're alive - As you know, it's usually necessary for both partners or spouses to work to maintain a household - so if your income were to disappear, even temporarily, it could present a big problem. Your current employer could offer disability income insurance as an employee benefit, but it might not be enough for your needs, so you may want to consider purchasing your own policy. Keep in mind, though, that disability coverage typically only lasts for a few years, and, in any case, probably won't completely replace your income. Consequently, it's a good idea to build up your financial resources in other ways, so contribute as much as you can afford to your 401(k) and IRA during your working years. If you do become disabled, it may be possible



for you to tap into these funds without incurring a tax penalty, though regular taxes may still be due.

Protection if you need care – If you were ever to need some type of longterm care, such as an extended stay

in a nursing home or the services of a home health care worker, you might find the costs to be considerable – and possibly a severe burden on your spouse or partner. In fact, the average cost for a private room in a nursing home is about \$100,000 per year, while a home health aide costs about \$50,000 per year, according to Genworth, an insurance company. And Medicare typically pays only a small percentage of these expenses. To protect your spouse or partner not to mention your grown children from possibly having to deal with these costs, you might consider purchasing long-term care insurance. As an alternative, you could purchase a "hybrid" policy that combines long-term care benefits with those offered by a traditional life insurance policy. So, if you never needed long-term care, your policy would pay a death benefit to your spouse or partner or another beneficiary you've named.

It's been over a month since my last report on antique and collectibles news. Collectibles articles top the recent news.

A very rare Hot Wheels Camaro white enamel prototype made in 1968 was recently found and purchased by a dealer, according to the Robb report. The car was a prototype that was painted in white enamel. The white painted cars were used by the

designers to check for imperfections and weren't intended to reach retailers. A 2020 Camaro manufacturer's suggested retail price is \$25,000. The Hot Wheels car is estimated to be valued at \$100,000, 4 times the value of a new Camaro. Hot Wheels cars from this era originally retailed for 59 cents. The article didn't report how much the dealer paid for it.

An Air Force Veteran recently had a watch that he purchased in 1975 evaluated by

appraiser according to People Magazine. The man was stationed in Southeast Asia where he admired the Rolex watches being worn by many of the pilots. He began scuba diving when he transferred to another base and learned that the watches were also good in water. That convinced him to purchase the watch through the base WAYNE TUISKULA exchange for \$345.97, with his 10 percent discount. It was a sizable

purchase when most monthly salaries were then only \$300 to \$400 per month. He found the watch was too nice to use in salty water. He kept it in a safe deposit box since then, along "with the paperwork, receipts, and original box." The watch face is marked "Oyster Cosmograph" and is referred to as the Paul Newman watch. Newman wore a similar Rolex in the movie "Winning." The appraiser informed the owner that watches like his have been



selling for \$150,000 to \$200,000 at auction. Because he never wore it and because he kept the original box and paperwork, the appraiser said that his watch should sell for even more. He estimated it could bring \$500,000 to \$700,000 at auction.

For those of you who want a collectible you can imbibe, Glenfiddich Scotch is offering 100 bottles of their single malt scotch that were produced in 1975. Maxim reports that 100 bottles of the 44-year-old scotch were created only for the U.S. market. The 100 bottles were produced from 2 different casks. Cask 4706's description is "distinctive and rare rich gold whisky has a lively and vibrant bouquet imparting notes of oak, antique leather, tannin and crisp parchment, while maintaining its intriguing zestiness with hints of green apple and citrus." The scotch in the cask 5114 bottles is described as "a beautifully

rich and complex dark amber whisky envelops the nose with an intense spicy oak character and layers of dried fruits." The bottles are priced at \$9,000. Doing the math, that is a little over \$380 for just one drink.

Keep your Valentine flowers looking their best



Nothing says Happy Valentine's Day like a fresh bouquet of flowers. Make sure your gift provides many days of enjoyment by selecting the freshest flowers and providing the best possible care.

Take some time to evaluate the quality of

the cut flowers you plan to purchase. Select fresh flowers with upright and perky flowers and lots of firm buds that are just starting to open. Avoid flowers sitting in foul smelling water with drooping leaves and discolored slimy stems.

Consider color and fragrance as well as freshness. Many people love the sweet fragrance of roses, carnations and lilies. Some varieties are more fragrant than others, so you'll need to do the nose test. Other individuals prefer to look at and not smell their beautiful arrangement. For them, select non-fragrant varieties and other flowers like hydrangea, alstroemeria, gerbera daisies and lisianthus that lack a strong fragrance.

Select their favorite color or perhaps one that sends a message. Red is often used to represent love and passion, pink for hanningss and sometimes low low for friendship and cheer, and peach for gratitude. Include a card to make sure the message and sentiments are received. Roses are a Valentine favorite, but a dozen may be out of reach for your budget. A single rose in a bud vase or large bloom floating in a shallow vase can bring a bit of beauty and lots of enjoyment to you or the recipient. Or add a few roses to your bouquet of other colorful flowers. Once you make your selection, ask the florist to include a packet of floral preservative and wrap your flowers. This protects them from extreme temperatures and jostling during the ride home. Extend the life of your floral gift with a few key steps before placing the flowers in a vase.



This minimizes bacterial growth that can shorten the vase life of cut flowers. Recut the stems and arrange your blossoms in a clean vase filled with fresh water and floral preservative. Cutting the stems on an angle increases the amount

of exposed surface area to absorb water.

Change the water, clean the vase if needed, recut the stems and add floral preservative every two to three days. Remove any flowers that have faded to keep your arrangement looking its best. Doing this can double the life of your cut flowers.

Further extend the vase life of cut flowers by displaying them in a cool, draft-free location. Or move them to a cooler spot at night and back in a prominent spot during the day.

Even if you do everything right, roses sometimes bend or droop at the neck and disappoint. This can happen if they have not received enough water at some point between harvest and your vase.

Fortunately, there is a way to revive roses. Remove the roses from the vase. Recut the stems and submerge the whole rose - stem, leaves, flowers and all – in a sink or tub of warm water Leave the roses submerged for 30 minutes.

Adding a few roses to bouquets with less fragrant flowers, like hydrangea, will add the aroma that many people desire when receiving a floral arrangement.

Remove the lower leaves, so just the leafless stems are sitting in the water.

Clean and refill the vase with fresh water and a bit of floral preservative. Recut the stems on a slant, underwater if possible, and place the roses back in the vase. You will have perky fresh roses to enjoy for a week or more.

And pick up an additional bouquet for yourself. Fresh flowers are a great way to brighten your home and lift your spirits.

Webster resident Daniels helps St. John's dispatch Bartlett

SHREWSBURY — The boys from Bartlett High were a glum lot as they filed out of the St. John's High Coaches Pavilion on Friday, Feb. 7, having come out on the wrong end of a 92-40 defeat to the Pioneers' varsity basketball team.

There was one Webster resident who played in the game who couldn't wipe the smile off his face, however.

Charles "Charlie" Daniels, a 6-foot-senior guard, who referred to the land on the lake as "my hometown" after the game, had a night to remember for St. John's, scoring a gamehigh 16 points and grabbing 15 rebounds, 12 off the offensive glass.

"It was pretty good to see them; I haven't seen those guys in a while," Daniels said of the Bartlett players. "It was good to just battle back and forth. I've gone to camps with a few of them, so I knew what they were like and how they like to play."

Daniels said this game got his attention the first time he looked at the Pioneers' upcoming schedule during the offseason.

"This was definitely one of the biggest games for me; just because it was my hometown," Daniels said. "I was very surprised when I saw it was on the schedule. We haven't played them in a while, certainly not since I've been here at St. John's "

Bartlett head coach Tony Paranto seemed to grimace when Daniels' name was brought up after the game.

"Charlie never played at Bartlett; he's been at St. John's since his freshman year," Paranto said. "He played very, very well. We know him very well. He plays in our summer league program once in a while."

Paranto said in the first half — after which St. John's led 43-13 — it wasn't T.J. Power, St. John's 6-foot-7 sophomore forward that hurt the Indians as much as it was Daniels.

"Daniels had 10 offensive rebounds in the first half," Paranto said. "Our kids isolated on the Power kid a little too much and that opened up more space for Charlie."

Bob Foley, the longtime St. John's head coach, was effusive in his praise of Daniels.

"Boy, does he play. He plays fantastic defense — he played the star on the other team," Foley said, referring to Bartlett senior Logan Paranto. "What people don't realize is the job he does on the offensive boards. He had a lot of offensive rebounds and put-backs. I'm really thrilled for these kids."

St. John's improved to 16-1 with the win, its fifth straight, while Bartlett dropped to 16-2 with the loss, which snapped a 14-game winning streak.

The Indians' fate was sealed in the first quarter. Bartlett trailed 6-4 with 5:14 remaining in the period, but proceeded from that point to miss shots, many of them open 3-pointers, on seven consecutive possessions. St. John's led 16-6 at that point and finished the quarter

ahead 22-5.

"We shot the ball very poorly," Paranto said. "Their speed and length were our nemesis; we were one and done each time. We had open looks; we just couldn't make shots. We had a lot of open 3-pointers, we just couldn't knock them down."

St. John's opened the second quarter outscoring the Indians 17-5 to take a 39-10 lead with two minutes remaining in the first half. The Pioneers' largest lead of the game was 46 points, 67-21, with 1:54 left in the third quarter. St. John's led 69-24 as play headed to the final period.

Senior Wilson Aybar led Bartlett with 15 points, 12 coming on 3-pointers. Logan Paranto and junior Brandon Boucher each finished with 7 points and freshman Ethan Minarik added 6 on a pair of 3-pointers.

"They're a very good team," coach Paranto said of St. John's. "They're long and they're quick. They've got all the pieces, and they're young and athletic. We knew going into the game we were going to have to shoot the ball well and we came out and shot the ball poorly."





Sports Oxford's Williams wills team to important victory over Spartans

UXBRIDGE — When the Oxford High boys' varsity basketball team visited Leicester High on Tuesday, Feb. 4, Elijah Williams — the Pirates' second-leading scorer — was held without a point during the entirety of the first half. Head coach Dave Aldrich then challenged Williams at halftime to perform better, and he took the message to heart

From there, Williams scored 13 points and grabbed 8 rebounds as Oxford lost a tough one to the Wolverines. But just two days later, when the Pirates played at Uxbridge High on Thursday, Feb. 6, Williams carried that momentum into the game with the Spartans.

Williams scored a career-high 35

points - netting at least 6 points in each quarter — and pulled down 10 rebounds for a double-double as Oxford defeated Uxbridge 66-52.

"We talk about ripping and going," Aldrich said of telling his players to catch the ball and make the initial step toward the basket. "Elijah quickstepped tonight."

"My first step, he always tells me I have the quickest first step he's ever seen," Williams added.

The quick step was so successful because in the early going the Pirates were hot from downtown. After a two-point basket by Even Remington, 3-pointers were made by Remington (10 points), Evan Brindisi and two more from Williams as Oxford surged to a 14-4 lead.



The Pirates led 20-12 after the initial eight minutes.

Then, in the second quarter, Williams produced 9 straight points on a pair of 3-pointers, a free throw, and an offensive rebound followed by a layup, as Oxford continued to lead big at that point, 29-16.

The Pirates finished the first half with seven made 3-pointers and led 34-20 at intermission.

Williams then hit a 3-pointer from long range early in the third quarter and finished the frame with another trey, this one coming off a screen as the buzzer was about to sound. Oxford was now up 52-34 with only a quarter to play.

"If I feel my shot, it's going in," explained Williams before talking about his triple to end the third. "I saw the clock running down, so I crossed over, pulled up, I faded away and [I knew it] was in.'

Alex Duval was the Pirates' third double-digit scorer with 12 points.

On the defensive side, Aldrich was content with Uxbridge 6-foot-7 threat Jaideep Sidhu scoring and pulling down rebounds - Sidhu finished with 15 points and 10 boards — and wanted the focal point to be on Luke Schollard, the Spartans' 6-foot-2 important piece who averages 12 points and 12 rebounds a game.

"We knew Jaideep was going to do his thing, so we flipped my five and my four. We put my five on Schollard," Aldrich explained of having his center defend Schollard and then having smaller athletes play on Sidhu. Schollard was held to a single basket plus 11 rebounds.

"If we stop Schollard, we're going to be OK," Aldrich remembered telling his team.

Now at 8-8, Oxford thought that they were fighting toward a Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament berth, but they actually qualified by beating Uxbridge. That finished their Southern Worcester County League slate at 6-5, and rival Millbury High lost a pair of games over the weekend to finish at 5-6 in the league. So, the Pirates wound up at C Division champions, and they earned the automatic playoff berth.

"We had a huge meeting in the locker room before we got on the bus," Aldrich said, expressing that it was a must-win game, which proved to be true. "We broke it down to four-minute intervals, trying to win them all. We did well.

The Spartans are also 8-8 as they are striving for the same goal: to qualify for the CMass D3 Tourney.

"I'm just disappointed," head coach

3 Tournament with a 10-8 record. And Uxbridge lost to Northbridge High 51-44. The now 8-9 Spartans must win their final two games after press time to reach the playoffs. And with the Rams winning, they finished 10-9 and have, like Auburn, also punched their ticket into the CMass D3 Tournament.

Pirates secure postseason spot by defeating Uxbridge in nail-biter

OXFORD — A lot was on the line when the Oxford High girls' varsity basketball team hosted Uxbridge High at the Roger D. Bacon Gymnasium on Friday evening, Feb. 7. And a lot was on the line when Pirates' senior Micaela Perry stepped to the free throw line with 16.8 seconds to play and her team leading 37-35.

Perry connected on both attempts and made two more with 4.3 seconds remaining as Oxford pulled away for a 41-35 victory. The win propelled the Pirates' record to 10-8, as they have officially qualified for the Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament.

Perry said that she didn't feel like a lot was on the line when she shot those free throws. Instead, she treated it like a practice.

"I don't slow down or speed up and I just take it as a normal routine — like practice, basically," Perry said when asked if she felt the pressure before the all-important trips to the charity stripe.

"At the end of the game Micaela said, 'we're not going to lose tonight," added Oxford head coach Joe Pietrzak. "Her play showed me that she was saying 'give me the ball and I'm going to ride it out.' She wanted to be at the line. We want her with the ball, she's a pure shooter."

Perry was held to just 9 points, but all came in the second half.

The game was also an important one for the Spartans, who dropped to 8-10 following the loss.

"It was a battle; we knew it'd be a battle," said Uxbridge head coach Jeff LaCure. "They closed it out and we didn't close it out."

The Spartans must win their final two games — at Northbridge High and versus Blackstone-Millville Regional, both after press time — to gain a berth into the same CMass D3 Tourney.

"We have two games left and we feel real good about both of them," said LaCure.

The first quarter of play showed that this contest was going to be a back-and-forth affair. Oxford jumped ahead 6-0, but Uxbridge went on a 10-5 run as the Pirates held a slim 11-10 lead as play moved to the second period.

There, the Spartans had the first run. They scored 8 of the first 10 points to regain the lead 18-13, only for Oxford to end the frame on an 8-0 run to jump ahead 21-18 at halftime.

Uxbridge then scored the first 7 points of the third quarter, but the Pirates countered with the next 6. The Spartans' Ella Correa (10 points) then made a 3-pointer to put Uxbridge ahead 28-27 at the end of three.

After some back-and-forth scoring to open the final frame, Correa canned another 3 to tie the score at 33-33. And teammate Grace Orr made a runner with 3:38 to play to give the Spartans a 35-33 lead.

"We took control early in the third quarter and I was bummed we gave it back. In the fourth quarter we had a little control and they went on an 8-0 run to end the game," said LaCure.

That 8-0 run began when Chloe Davis (10 points, 12 rebounds) grabbed two offensive rebounds and finished the last one with a layup. With 1:30 to play, Carly Cornacchioli hit a midrange jumper for the eventual winning basket. It was the freshman's second winning bucket of the season, having done so versus Quaboag Regional with just seconds to spare.

"How about my freshman Carly Cornacchioli, knocking down another big shot," said Pietrzak. "Her basketball IQ is well beyond a freshman and she makes good decisions when she's out there."

Perry then made her four free throws to put the game away and send the Pirates into Districts for the fifth straight year after 10 straight seasons away from the tournament.

"It was just an absolute war out there and I thought that our kids withstood the last run that they had in the fourth quarter when they retook the lead," said Pietrzak. "I'm so proud of this group. We had the hardest practice we've had in years Wednesday night preparing for this one. We talked about mental toughness and I challenged the girls and said, 'this is a test that you're prepared for and you need to go out and ace the test.' They did that."

And Oxford is tournament-bound after a slow start to the season.

"Everyone doubted us this year because we started 0-5," said Perry. "We just knew we had to pick it up and get on a winning streak."

"I have to credit Lauren Pietro, my assistant coach, because she was able to connect with them in terms of morale," added Pietrzak. "That was huge."

For Uxbridge, they can only look back at their 1-12 performance from the free throw line as to the main reason behind the loss.

"The foul shooting killed us," said LaCure. "We have a chance to extend that lead and we missed and we missed and we missed. We teach our girls to get to the rim and when we get to the foul line, we win. When we don't, we lose. When we beat Douglas [four days prior] we had 32 foul shot attempts and we made 18 or 19."

Sarah Johnston led the Spartans with 12 points, while Orr scored 8 points and added 12 rebounds.


O'Brien and Ambrosia both signed NLIs to attend



Auburn's defense clamps down on Minutemen in order to take home victory

CHARLTON — Not only were shots not dropping for the Auburn High girls' varsity basketball team in first-half action versus Bay Path Regional last Wednesday, Feb. 5, but the Minutemen were also putting together some of their best basketball of the season. Add all that up and Bay Path held a 17-15 lead over the Rockets at intermission.

The halftime break helped Auburn, as they regrouped and came out recharged. The Rockets not only scored 25 points in second-half play, but they also limited the Minutemen to 7 thanks to a scorching hot defense.

"I am very glad that we turned around that way because in the first half I felt like we were doing the things that we needducing," Auburn head coach Nicole LePrevost said, as the Rockets ultimately won a 40-24 decision. "I told them to keep up with the defensive intensity — that was keeping us in the game — and offensively to just keep working the ball, taking open shots and following your shot."

With 5:36 to play in the third quarter, a string of three straight Bay Path turnovers — due in large part to Auburn's pressing defense led to two baskets by Hanorah Murphy and two more by Olivia Mathews. That gave the Rockets the lead for good at 23-17.

Auburn eventually scored the first 17 points of the frame to pull ahead 32-17, and they led by a 33-19 count as play entered the fourth quarter.

The Rockets then won the

a 16-point victory.

"My senior captains, Mick Sampson and Liv Mathews, they both had over five steals each and they really led us with their intensity," LePrevost said of the defense being such a big factor in the second-half turnaround.

Eight Auburn players scored in the game, who were led by Murphy's 11 points. Mathews was close behind with 9 points.

LePrevost is hoping that the Rockets can continue to play strong basketball, as their record moved up to 7-8. They need to finish at 10-10 or better to qualify for the Central Mass. Division 2 postseason tournament.

"We're clawing. We have five games and we need three of them to make districts," she said. "They want it and if they want it they'll keep working hard."

On the other end of things, Bay Path head coach John Selen was ecstatic with the way his team played in the first half, but also that it was a total tale of two halves.

"We played as good as we could play in the first half. [In the second half] we just started making fundamental mistakes, young mistakes, and the kids understand that we're just not there yet," he said. "We're working toward it. We're growing."

After essentially losing their entire starting five from a year ago, the Minutemen have struggled this season to the tune of a 3-12 record.

Selen noted that after breaking the press with some ease in the first half that things changed over the final two quarters.

"The kids played hard, we just couldn't put a second half together," he concluded.

Bay Path's scoring was balanced, as Jackie Ross and Olivia Bowes both finished with 6 points, which were team-high totals.

CHARLTON — Both individually and collectively, there are hot starts and then there are hot starts. The Auburn High boys' varsity basketball team enjoyed both kinds — individually and collectively — in its 72-48 win over Bay Path Regional on Wednesday, Feb. 5.

Collective heat: The Rockets winners of five consecutive games to improve to 9-8 with two regular-season games remaining — needed just four minutes and 22 seconds to score the first 17 points of the game. Comfortably ahead, Auburn cruised to leads of 22-8 after the first quarter, 49-17 at halftime and 60-27 after three periods.

Individual heat: The Rockets' firsthalf assault on the basket was led by senior Coleman Picard, who scored 23 of his game-high 29 points before intermission. Justin Skaparas, Picard's classmate, did his part in the first 16 minutes, too, scoring 15 of his 19 points before the break, all his first-half points coming on five of the six 3-pointers he buried in the game.

"I don't think we've gotten off to such

a fast start in any of our other games this year. Everything we were doing was working — kick out 3s, fast breaks, driving to the hoop — everything was dropping," Picard said. "It's nice to have a night like this. We've worked so hard in practice and the games leading up to this, it was nice for everything to come together like it did tonight."

Auburn head coach Dan Koen said he could feel his team's sense of purpose right from the start of the game.

"We came in focused tonight, knowing if we want to have a chance to get into the Clark Tournament this was the game we needed to have," said Koen, whose team ended up falling just shy of qualifying for the Clark despite the win. "From the tip we definitely had the mindset that nothing was going to stop us; that we were going to do whatever it takes to win this game."

Auburn's point total was its third highest this season and increased the Rockets' average points per game to 56.1.

"We do have the potential to score," said Koen, whose team defeated Bay Path earlier in the season, picking up a 65-58 win in that game, played on New Year's Eve. "The shots we were hitting were all in the flow. We got some offensive rebounds and some defensive stops that led to some baskets in transition. You could see the kids' confidence grow and the shots just kept falling. The kids have bought in and they want to keep playing."

Picard said the Rockets are a much different team during this five-game winning streak than the three-game losing skid that preceded it.

"Truthfully, it's just the team coming together. The start of the season was slow; most of us are multi-sport athletes so we came in having taken less shots than some of the teams on the early part of our schedule," Picard said. "Now we're playing with a different type of swagger and confidence. We can go out any night and perform and execute. We believe in coach and everything that has worked for us and we're excited for what's coming up."

Bay Path head coach Al Greenough said he knew right away that the game was going to be a 32-minute struggle for his team. "From the get-go we were flat; we didn't have it," said Greenough, whose team dropped to 3-12 with the loss. "It's disappointing because we came off what I thought was our best win of the season. On Monday we knocked off [11-5] Parker [Charter, 74-61] who is in first place in our league. The kids were excited about this game, both in practice yesterday and during warmups before the game.

"[Auburn] hit a couple of shots right off the bat — I don't know what they shot tonight but it had to be around 70 percent — and I think that just deflated us early and we never really ever got started," Greenough continued. "If you dig a hole that big, obviously you're not going to come back. They shot well and we couldn't get our offense going and we couldn't break the press. We didn't have anything going for us and by the time we did it was just too late."

The Minutemen were led by sophomore Dylan Cotton, who scored a teamhigh 17 points and hit four 3-pointers, and senior captain Ben LaPointe, who added 7 points.
