Was it a Wright? You might be wrong

WEBSTER — If you're not an aviation aficionado, and maybe even if you are, you've probably never heard of Gustave Whitehead. But he was probably really the first person to fly an airplane.

At least Chronicle reporter and author Ted Reinstein thinks the evidence points that way, although one crucial piece that would clinch the story is missing — a

clear photo of Whitehead's flight. That's what cemented the Wright Brothers' claim to fame in 1903, but witnesses and a newspaper story in Bridgeport CT two years earlier say Whitehead flew earlier, higher and longer.

"He knew he needed a photograph, but didn't want a photograph" for a reason many people in today's America can commiserate with, Reinstein said. Whitehead was an immigrant and "was

deathly afraid somehow they'd end up deporting him" because had come from Germany at a time when anti-German sentiment was building.

"This was the feud that led me to write the book," Reinstein said, referring to his Wicked Pissed: New England's Most Famous Feuds, while speaking to a small

Dudley plans to improve Pattison Avenue pump station

DUDLEY — Plans are in motion to improve a pump station in Dudley now that a price has been acquired by the town's Water and Sewer Department.

The commission previously discussed improvements to a pump station on Pattison Avenue in October, when Water & Sewer Superintendent John Meehan explained that RH White and Ruby Electric had been hired to provide prices to the town for the work. Earlier this month Meehan told commissioners

the quote came in at \$35,000 and was described as a ballpark figure price.

"Come to find out that we have to run a two-inch water main and sewer main 840 feet up the street to tie into a manhole. That's not included in that \$35,000," Meehan told commissioners.

The Pattison Avenue pump station has been a constant part of Meehan's updates to the commission as of late. In October, he revealed that a motor was pulled from that station and a back up was operational. The work planned would bring the station "like

new" status according to Meehan and it was noted that because this is only an estimate there are steps and other portions of the project that could positively impact the town's investment going forward. Overall commissioners felt the quote was a good price to the work and Meehan agreed.

"I think it would be a real good project," Meehan said, "I'm thinking when the spring time comes — I can take \$3,000 right out of operations of the sewer department and we can lay that pipe down there."

One issue was brought forward by commission member Scott Zajkowski concerning recent changes to rules within the town at the fall annual town meeting, a change he opposed openly during that meeting. "After this last town meeting we have a \$20,000 limit. We have to go to capital improvement,"

said Zajkowski showing concern that this may slow the process going forward. It should be noted that prior to the changes at town meeting commis-





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Webster Police launch annual toy drive

WEBSTER – It's that time of year again as local communities are beginning to seek donations for local toy drives to help families. The Webster Police have officially launched their toy drive with a collection bin at the police station headquarters.

Deputy Chief Michael Shaw said the tradition spans around 20 years and helps to offer something for families in the Webster community who may have fallen on hard times or have to face the decision of paying the bills or giving their children a Christmas.

"We collect new, unwrapped toys here at the station and various businesses at the town also collect for us. The town hall and the assessor's office are usually drop-off points. The gifts go to kids in Webster who have been identified by various resources, whose families might need a little help this

Christmas. We try to help them out and give them some stuff for Christmas day," said Shaw.

Over the years the program has expanded from humble beginnings and the dedication of local community members has been impressive, especially for Shaw, who has seen the program flourish throughout his entire 21-year career with the department. He said he and his fellow officers are always humbled to see the turnout and generosity that comes with their annual drive.

"It's not only just the generosity, which is so nice to see this time of year, but also the people that benefit from it. The need is out there, and you don't really realize it until you are a part of something like this. You see the kids who might need a little help for whatever reason and it's tough to see sometimes, but doing something like this is rewarding because we know we're doing something good for them,"

Shaw said.

"You know people aren't usually happy to see police officers, so to have a more positive interaction with some of these families is great and that brings its own rewards down the road."

On average each child gets two or three gifts from the department's drive. The department helps serve children 15-years-old or younger and package the gifts for each family using age and gender to help them pick out the right items for each child. In 2016 the department brought in more than enough to fill their quota, filling a garage station in the building full of toys for clients in need. For 2017 the police officers will package the gifts the week before Christmas and distribution is expected to take place on the 21 or 22 of December before the holiday weekend.

"It's always an awesome time of year. We've had years in the past where we were afraid we weren't going to have







All Saints Academy honors its veterans




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

The interest rates have continued to fall due to low inflation and global political risks. Last time rates were this low were near the end of 2016. According to Bankrate.com as of 11/13 the rate on a 30 year fixed loan was 3.80% compared to 3.95% just 2 months ago. Today we have 1846 single family homes for sale in Worcester County compared to 6 months ago where we had 1663 homes for sale or about a 11% increase in homes for sale over that 6 month period but is down 8% from 2 months ago. It is a good sign to see the inventory dropping this month which is caused by homes selling but also many people taking their homes off the market with the intention on waiting till the spring to sell again. The average days on market is currently 120 days while it was 121 days in May which tells me we are continuing to cycle through

the inventory but slightly slower than 2 months ago. If we look at homes sold over past 12 months compared to the same time for the previous year there is an almost 1.1% increase in sales and a 6.0% increase in sales price while it is taking over 20.6% faster to sell the homes this year than last year in Worcester County. This shows that prices are still rising and homes are still selling quicker than a year ago. However, the percentage increase in amount of sales and days to offer is slowly decreasing which just may mean the market is starting to stabilize.

These numbers are important to continue to review and they will show the direction that the market is going in so we are prepared when a shift in the market happens. At this point the numbers still are extremely healthy and it is a great sign to see our days on market only slightly increase and to see a slight inventory drop. 

sions and boards had to consult capital improvement for expenses over \$25,000.

Commission Chair Jay Spahl said regardless of the process they have to follow, something has to be done at the Pattison Avenue station as it is very much out of date.


"The bottom line is we've been babying a 1950s installation and we spent a ton of money already this year problem solving," said Spahl.

The estimated cost of maintaining the station currently was quotes at \$400 of water every three months and over 30 hours of overtime pay not to mention repair expenses and other investments to keep the station operations. The Water & Sewer Commission decided to hold off until the spring to see where the town's budget sits, but members agreed this is a project worth investing in.

Parking when it snows and blows

Even though we have enjoyed an extensive period of warm weather, the threat of light snow reminds us, unfortunately, winter is just around the corner. Before it begins in all its glory, I wanted to take this opportunity to once again remind residents of the winter parking regulations. This is always a hot topic of conversation with our local Highway Superintendent. Most people are unaware of the difficulties involved in keeping the streets clear. I hope to provide everyone with a little further information.

Article Ten of Dudley's By-laws contains the parking regulations. Section three, in part, deals with snow removal operations. Vehicles are not allowed to park on any town controlled way so as to interfere with snow removal operations. The Superintendent of Streets may remove or cause to be removed any vehicle interfering with this operation. For snow removal purposes, any accumulation of two inches or more can enact this provision. Your vehicle can be towed in order to accommodate snow removal.

Street parking is not only an issue in densely populated areas. During storms, it can be a problem on many dead ends or lesser traveled roads. Some people will park cars on the street in advance of a storm, in order to have their driveway clear for plowing. Ironically, the town is trying to keep the roads free of vehicles for the same purpose. When plow trucks are forced to plow around vehicles, it creates ice problems and other hazards. The highway workers must return at another time to complete the operation. This situation doubles efforts and wastes time, fuel, and money.

I am encouraging all residents to voluntarily comply with these restrictions and assist the town employees with providing safe roads on which to travel. The last thing anyone wants to have is their vehicle towed or be the one responsible for an accident or injury.

As a reminder, our department is collecting Christmas gift donations for local families in need. New and unwrapped toys and clothing can be brought to the Dudley Police Department at 71 West Main St. Of particular need in the past were gifts for children between the ages of 10-17 years old. Monetary donations are also accepted. Checks should be made payable to the "Dudley Police Association" with a special note for the Holiday Drive. All contributions are for Dudley families and anything left over is given to local charities, such as Webster-Dudley Food Share. Oxford police will be sporting the 'fuzz'

BOSTON — As we make our way into November, don't be surprised if your local police officers look like they haven't shaved in weeks. For the privilege of growing out their facial hair, officers from Oxford are paying up and participating in No-Shave November in support of Home Base, a Red Sox Foundation and Massachusetts General Hospital program.

Traditionally, police departments have a grooming policy where officers must remain clean-shaven. However, for the next 30 days, police officers from 44 police departments will be permitted to grow beards and goatees in exchange for donating \$100 to Home Base and their mission to help veterans and military families heal from invisible wounds — like traumatic brain injuries and post-traumatic stress disorder — regardless of their financial means or discharge status.

The movement is spearheaded by MBTA transit officer, Army veteran and Purple Heart recipient Kurt Power who sought care for his own invisible wounds at Home Base.

"The only wish I have is that we give the gift of hope, hope to all the veterans that don't

believe reintegration is possible. Hope to the approximately 20 veterans a day that may give up tomorrow," Power says. "If I can convince just one person who needs help to listen to me and put their trust in the treatment at Home Base, this will all be worth it."

This month, Kurt and his fellow first responders at Oxford PD will go beyond the badge to not only help raise money for a program that is changing the lives of veterans and their families, but to evoke conversation, raise awareness and break the stigma associated with getting care.

"The membership at OPD recognizes the hardships that our veterans have faced and will endure in the future in order to preserve our freedom and the way of life that we enjoy. We can't take their sacrifices for granted," said Chief Anthony Saad.

To date, the first responder No-Shave November campaign has raised \$75,000 for Home Base. Oxford PD has a goal of \$1,800. Nine officers are participating and we are asking community members, business owners, family members to join the cause and donate by sponsoring one of the nine with a matching pledge.

government knew "and had done nothing about it."

"This wasn't a crime against just Jews, it was a crime against what's decent, a crime against humanity," Moskin said, noting there were also Christians, Gypsies, gays, political opponents and secular people ("righteous gentiles") who tried to help others in the camps.

Like many soldiers, Moskin refused to talk about his experiences for many years, suffering horrific dreams, screaming in his sleep, and other symptoms we now know to be part of PTSD. In June 1995, the dam broke; when he agreed to talk about his experiences after a lot of thought, "it was like a catharsis — all that poison inside me came out."

Today, he has absolutely no patience with Holocaust deniers, but he's afraid they'll become a lot more vocal and influential as the last of the WW2 soldiers who actually saw such places die.

Moskin said he saw three of them use tree bark to rip open a dead horse and eat its innards, and many had eaten so little for so long that giving them any solid food immediately made them start choking.

One youth who'd survived to see his liberators died soon afterward, repeating "Why did they do this to me?" in German.

"The devil himself decided to take a vacation and came up to this hellhole," he said, later adding, "the abnormality and the bestiality of what I witnessed... is tattooed to my heart."

"We weren't prepared for that," he said, noting that they'd started hearing rumors of such camps shortly before-hand. Average soldiers had no idea they existed, although he firmly believes "the mucky-mucks" at the top and in

He urged younger people today to speak out against such denial, bigoted jokes and statements, and other efforts to promote hate "because if you don't, inaction and silence is consent."

"I speak here today for each one of my buddies [he listed several killed in the war] and I speak for all those who were slaughtered by the Nazis," Moskin said. "The message is that there was a Holocaust, and it must never be forgotten."

"I've come across many [deniers]," he notes. "It was no myth. I wasn't hallucinating what I saw. Long ago, I gave up on these people. Let them rot in hell."

Moskin said his own upbringing in ethnically-mixed Englewood, NJ, exposed him to a wide range of people and views that he took for granted as normal before joining the Army. He's Jewish, his best friend was black, and his high school was a mélange of everyone. During basic training, he acquired the nickname "College Boy," and he

had a photo of his basketball team, including him and his friend, above his bunk. When some Southern recruits saw it, they started posting racist things next to his name on the assignment board.

To this day, Moskin said he doesn't understand where such hate comes from, but knows part of it is learned from parents. At that level, it's toxic, but still less than what the Nazis did. He noted running into Hitler Youth and Waffen SS soldiers, the former often younger than him, yet already "phenomenal fighters," twisted by hatred, something he never saw in regular Wehrmacht (professional army) soldiers. Bartlett unable to keep up with bigger, stronger Nashoba Tech

INDIANS FALL SHORT IN DIVISION 8 DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIP TILT

WORCESTER — The Bartlett High varsity football team's Central Mass. Division 8 championship game against Nashoba Tech on Saturday, Nov. 11 was a lot like backing your father's brand new car out of the driveway; everything is going fine until you hit the gas pedal instead of the brake and you end up slamming into that big old oak tree across the street.

After the first quarter the Indians led by 10 points. Over the final three quarters they were outscored by 33 points and ended up losing to the top-seeded Vikings, 39-16, on the turf at Commerce Bank Field at Foley Stadium.

With the win, its first Central Mass. title, Nashoba Tech (7-3) advanced to the state semifinals where it will play Western Mass. champ Hoosac Valley, Saturday, Nov. 18 at Westfield State University. Bartlett, the No. 3 seed in the tournament, is 6-4 and will next play on Thanksgiving against Southbridge High at Harry J. McMahon Field.

"Our hallmark all year has been physicality and [Nashoba Tech] brought it today," Bartlett head coach Dame Laboissonniere said. "Hats off to them; they played great. Their line is tough and the quarterback and the running back are horses. They outplayed us today."

In the first 11 minutes of the game, however, it was the Indians who were dictating the play.

Bartlett scored on the third play of the game, a 30-yard run by Will Harding, to take a 6-0 lead, and Jesse Torres followed with a successful two-point conversion run to push the lead to 8-0. The three-play, 58-yard drive took 25 seconds to complete.

Nashoba Tech answered on the ensu-

ing drive — quarterback Vinney Eramo hitting Jose Soba with a 21-yard scoring strike to complete a 14-play, 66-yard drive to cut the Bartlett lead down to 8-6 with 5:40 left in the period. Eramo, a senior captain for the Vikings, completed 6 of 10 passes for 73 yards and two touchdowns. He also ran the ball 20 times, picking up 42 yards in the process.

The Indians pushed their lead to 10, 16-6, on their next possession, Brett

LeBeau plowing in from a couple yards out to cap a five-play, 54-yard drive. Harding added the two-point conversion run.

On the first play of the second quarter the Vikings again cut into the Bartlett lead, this time pulling to within 16-13 on a one-yard run by Adam Blouin and a PAT by Tyler Alden. Blouin, a senior captain like Eramo, finished the game rushing for 158 yards and three touchdowns on 37 carries.

Blouin's one-yard run capped a drive that started at the Bartlett five-yard line after an Indians' fumble was recovered by the Vikings.

Nashoba Tech took a 20-16 lead into the locker room at halftime, thanks to a four-yard touchdown run by Blouin and a PAT by Alden. The Vikings increased their lead to 26-16 in the third quarter, Eramo and Soba hooking up on another scoring strike, this one from 15 yards out.


Fourth quarter touchdown runs by Blouin (13 yards) and Eramo (one yard) closed out the scoring.

Harding led the Indians in rushing, gaining 107 yards on seven carries. Despite his big first half, which included runs of 10, 18, 30 and 39 yards, he only carried once in the second half.



100 percent sure she'd win at Gardner this time around, but she stuck to her game plan to get it done.

"There's a girl from Algonquin [Tess Reyes], she's a very good runner," James explained. "I was a little worried about her, so the first mile I was very conservative

because I knew all the hills were going to hit me hard."

But James persevered and Lawrence also beat Reyes by five seconds.

"This course is a Gabby type of course — she just grinds it out," explained Fossas. "This is a pretty tough course, to say the least. If you don't run it smart, it's going to eat you up."

The other Rams' runners also performed at a high level, something that Fossas noted was a major key to the team victory.

"On a day like today, the 3-4-5 runners are what make your team," she said.

So for Belmonte and Casey — both junior captains — to advance, it's a thrill for Harmon.

"We knew Brian had a really good shot, but my next three guys had a pretty good shot," he

said. "I'm extremely proud of the way the guys ran today."

Oxford High and Bartlett High were also represented at the district meet, as the Pirates' Jared Orrell nearly qualified for All-States. He finished in 24th place (18:04), just a few spots away from advancing.

WORCESTER — The Bartlett High boys' varsity soccer team scored first in its Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament semifinal against Holy Name High, but the Indians simply could not hold off the athletic, determined and hard-charging Naps. As a result, Bartlett came out on the wrong end of a heartbreaking 3-1 decision, played Nov. 8 on the turf at Commerce Bank Field at Foley Stadium.

With the win, its second in a row and eighth in the last nine games, Holy Name advanced to its first Central Mass. boys' soccer final in 30 years. Vosburg had a chance to score a second goal in the first half, but his shot on net was just wide of the far post.

Holy Name (13-5) responded to the Indians' goal with two of its own, which enabled the Naps to take a 2-1 lead into the second half.

Niko Padilla tied the game, 1-1, in the 19th minute, scoring his fifth goal of the season off a corner kick. With less than 10 minutes to play in the half, Holy Name pushed ahead of Bartlett, 2-1, on Axel Arieza's 11th goal of the season.

Arieza, who notched his 17th and 18th assists

of the season on the Naps' other two goals, managed to emerge from a scramble at the top of the 18-yard box with possession of the ball. He used what little space he had to take a quick shot, which found the back of the net.

"Axel Arieza was the star of the game; he was the most dangerous player on the field," Renaud said. "He was fun to watch."

Henry Osei, the leading goal-scorer in Central Mass., closed out the scoring with four minutes to play in the game, scoring his 47th goal of the season to extend the Holy Name lead to 3-1.

As he reflected on a season just completed, Renaud spoke with pride about his team.

"Nobody really expected much out of the Bartlett boys' soccer team this year, but they proved a lot of people wrong," Renaud said. "They are a special group of young men that truly enjoy being around each other and helping each other get better every day."


Ofori (four goals, six assists), Joe McGonagle (two goals, two assists) and Patryk Piwowarczyk.

Kunkel's kicks boost Bartlett boys' soccer to district semifinals

MARLBOROUGH — The Bartlett High and Millbury High boys' varsity soccer teams had another evenly matched battle — the two played to a 4-4 tie in regular season play — when they met in a Central Mass. Division 3 sectional tournament quarterfinal on Monday, Nov. 6 at Fore Kicks Indoor & Outdoor Sports Complex. The game was scheduled to be played

at Bartlett, but potential inclement weather shifted it to a field with turf.

The fifth seeded Woolies scored first in the first half and the fourth ranked Indians tallied in the second half to force overtime. In the sudden victory session, with just a minute and 23 seconds to go until double overtime, Sean Kunkel put the ball to his left foot from about 25 yards away. Kunkel scored from a similar spot in the

game's 56th minute and he did it again, sailing a shot that soared over the reach of Millbury keeper Alex Santiago (10 saves).

"We are so even-

ly matched," said Bartlett head coach Ryan Renaud. "Me and [Millbury head coach] Brian [Ginisi] have so much respect for each other and each other's programs. In his 11-year career it's the first time we've ever met in the districts."

And what a game it was.

"When he hit that I knew that one was in," Renaud said of Kunkel's winning goal. "He struck it with so much confidence and the first [goal] probably gave him that."

"When I received the ball in overtime — great pass from my teammate Justice Ofori — I was confident on the first shot and I've been practicing that shot for a while," added Kunkel.

The Indians, who improved to 12-2-5, have been the comeback kids for much of their season, and Renaud attributed that to his team's ability to give it all for the game's entirety.

"We've shown that we're an extremely resilient team and play the full 80 minutes," he said, citing example of forcing ties after being down two goals to Millbury, the Advanced Math and Science Academy and Blackstone-Millville Regional.

This game was just a one-goal deficit — as was Bartlett's first round playoff game with Tyngsborough High—and they found a way to win them both to advance to the district semifinals. The Indians will play top

seeded Holy Name High (12-5) for the right to compete for the champion-

ship.

But the Indians had work to do after Millbury's Zach Smith

scored in the eighth minute, with Will Savage assisting. Smith put a header on net that got past Bartlett keeper Taven Phanthavong. The ball then bounced awkwardly close to sweeper Owen Simonis, who wasn't able to clear it before it rolled into the net.

But Simonis, as well as fellow defenders Casper Sykes, Chris Place and Alex Polanco, performed at a high level to not allow the Woolies to score again.

"They played their hearts out in the back," said Renaud. "They are going to sleep well probably the minute they sit down on the bus."

Phanthavong also came up huge, especially in the game's late stages. Earlier in the overtime, Phanthavong (seven saves) punched the ball out of harm's way following a Millbury corner kick.

"I thought Taven was phenomenal down the stretch when they were throwing everything at us," said Renaud.


Kunkel then scored his second, and he and his teammates are excited to move on.

"It's been a while since a team's been to the semifinals," said Kunkel of the Indians' last visit to the Final Four, which was in 2013. "I'm glad I could be the person to do it, but then again it wasn't just me — it was a team effort."

Millbury finished with a record of 11-6-3.

crowd at Corbin Library Monday. His book also looks at several other disputes, including the fact the Battle of Bunker Hill was actually on Breed's Hill, the long-running Red Sox-Yankees feud, and the fact Concord and Lexington still vie for the title of "birthplace of the American Revolution."

Whitehead, born Gustav Weisskopf in 1874, was an engineer, but was poor and spoke little English. For years, he "was obsessed with flying," designing at least 21 flying machines of various kinds. Some of them undoubtedly flew—weather balloons for the Blue Hills Observatory—but those didn't meet all four of the qualifications that would describe an airplane: manned, controlled, powered and sustained flight.

Reinstein's research seems to show that machine #21 did. Then living in Bridgeport, Whitehead designed a contraption that surviving descriptions show looked a lot like a huge bird, its wings comprised of several slats controlled from the cockpit the way modern ailerons are, with a wooden body, wheels, and a two-stroke engine fueled by acetylene.

On Aug. 14, 1901, in the pre-dawn darkness, Whitehead used a dirt road as a taxiway (the Wrights didn't; they lacked wheels and slid downhill to get speed) and got airborne, flying out over Long Island Sound for half an hour at about 50 feet altitude before circling back over town to use the rising sun as a landing light. After landing, Whitehead "never flew again," and his craft disintegrated during the coming winter, Reinstein said.

Reinstein said he may have chosen that time specifically because there'd be few witnesses, but there were some. Years later, local lawyer Stella Randolph got interested in the story and interviewed the remaining witnesses, writing a couple of books about it. She was followed by several other people, one of them culminating in Australian researcher John Brown in the 1990s, who was hired by the Smithsonian to do a TV series on American aviation.

Brown had heard of Whitehead, and dug into his story. One of the witnesses was a bank teller who had come in early to open his bank when he heard "what sounded like a lawnmower in the sky" nearby and recalled seeing a camera on the roof of a nearby building. That camera shot what

may be the only image of Whitehead's flight just before it landed: a blurry image that's very hard to identify, but is at the right angle.

Brown found the Bridgeport Evening Post story from the next day headlined "Local man flies over Long Island Sound" and a photo in Germany of Whitehead's flying machine called the "Condor No. 21," now on Brown's website, www.gustave-whitehead.com. Brown's site claims "at least 300 newspapers reported Whitehead's 1901/1902 flights," many of them on page one. He contradicts Reinstein's statement that Whitehead never flew again, saying the man "continued to make short flights over the next five months," with "affidavits and statements by 17 people, some of them recorded on audio and video" attesting to those flights. Brown also reports that Whitehead invited people to witness even earlier flights of various creations, including something called the Condor Gus at Blue Hill and gliders in New York in 1897.

Part of the controversy has come from the Smithsonian itself, Reinstein noted. In the 1970s, Connecticut US Sen. Lowell Weicker got interested in the story and did some research

himself. He tried to get the Smithsonian's papers donated by the Wright family, but the museum refused him access. Soon afterward, Congress passed the Freedom of Information Act, so he tried again and got the papers. One of them has since been dubbed the "secret agreement;" it reportedly states the museum cannot acknowledge any other claim to be the first flight or it will forfeit the Wright air-

plane, which has become the centerpiece of its Air and Space Museum, Reinstein found.

A few years later, another man rebuilt Condor #21 from the available descriptions, using the same materials Whitehead used "down to the tiniest thread," and found a pilot to fly it. It flew for an hour on the amount of fuel Whitehead had used, Reinstein said.

Brown's site states the US State Department

issued a press release declaring Whitehead to be "the legitimate father of modern aviation" in September 1983. More recently, the 2013 edition of Jane's All the World's Aircraft recognized that claim, followed the same year by the state of Connecticut formally revoking the Wrights' "first flyers" designation and awarding it to Whitehead.

It is still the only state to do so, Reinstein said.

Tractors, equipment, livestock, home furnishings, even the house and land can be sold at a farm auction. Farm auctions have a long history in our country. The National Auctioneers Association's website states that Pilgrims held auctions when they came to America for the "sale of crops, imports, livestock, tools, slaves and entire farms."

Farm auctions have had a negative connotation in the past. This is due, in part, to when farmers struggled during the Great Depression. Banks foreclosed on many farms and the home, barn, livestock and personal property often went on the

auction block. Farmers went to their state capitol buildings to protest as farm foreclosures accelerated between 1930 to 1932 according to livinghistoryfarm.org. In 1931, farmers took matters into their own hands.

150 farmers showed up at the Vonn Bonn family farm in Madison County, Nebraska for a bank ordered farm auction. The bank hoped to recoup hundreds to thousands of dollars for an outstanding loan. When the bidding opened for 5¢ the crowd wouldn't let other bidders raise the bid. The sales for the entire

farm auction totaled only \$5.35. Other "penny auctions" took place before the banks found a way to prevent the farmers from halting the bidding.

Farm auctions today are typically a much more pleasant experience. Farm owners often initiate the sale of their farms. Hobby Farms magazine described a modern day farm auction in a 2009 column. "Farm Auctions are a great way to spend a day—offering a chance to socialize with rural neighbors, and the opportunity to buy anything from antiques and collectibles to land and livestock, or tractors and trucks," they wrote.


Farm auctions are becoming less common though. Hobby Farms

also reported in the 2009 column that a Kansas auctioneer had seen his busi-

ness decline by 50% from the previous decade. The auctioneer believes that the decline was a result of many farmers leaving farming and already auctioning their farms.

Farm auctions occur even less frequently in this area. However, we are fortunate to have been commissioned to sell the personal property of a Northborough farm. The auction will include many horse carriages. There are also sleighs, including one that was used by a market for deliveries. We will be offering several older tractors. Commander Michael C. Masley Jr.



THOMPSON, CT- Commander Michael C. Masley Jr. passed away peacefully in his home on November 7th, 2017. His parents, Michael C. Masley Sr. and Agnes Masley, predeceased him.

He will be sorely missed by his brother Joel Masley, his wife Juliana, and their 3 children Arianna, Nicholas, and Alexandra, and his brother John, his wife Elaine, and their children Kristen Dahlman and her husband Andrew and Evan. He loved his family, took great pride in their accomplishments and was always present at family gatherings.

Commander Masley led an active and fulfilled life. He graduated from Tourtellotte Memorial High School in 1971. He then graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md. with honors in 1975 with a Bachelor's Degree in Oceanography/Physics. CDR Masley attended the Surface Warfare Officers' School in California where he was awarded the Admiral Arleigh Burke Award given for leadership and academic excellence. Later he attended the Surface Officers' School in Newport, RI where he again earned the Admiral Arleigh Burke Award; making him the first and only person to have won this award at both schools.

During CDR Masley's 20 Years of service in the Navy, he was the First Lieutenant and Navigator aboard the USS Robert E. Peary from 1975-1977. He then served as the Main Propulsion Assistant on the USS Nicholson from 1979 to 1981. He was assigned to the USS Olendorf in 1983 as the Operations Officer and other duties included Combat Systems and Nuclear Weapons Officer and Tactical Action Officer. In 1985 he received orders to report to the USS Sterett as the Operations Officer. Other duties included Anti-Air Warfare Coordinator and Electronic Warfare Coordinator. The USS Mahlon S. Tisdale became his last ocean-based tour of duty from 1987-1989 where he was the Executive Officer. He traveled the world extensively while on these tours of duty.

CDR Masley reported to his first shore duty in May 1989 at the Pentagon in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations where he held several positions. In 1992 CDR Masley was assigned to the College of Continuing Education at the Naval War College in Newport, RI as a Professor, teaching National Security Decision Making courses and was National Decision Making Coordinator. He retired from active duty on August 1st, 1995.

While serving his country, CDR Masley earned a Master of Science Degree in Systems Management and a certificate in Information Systems from the University of Denver in 1991 and a Masters of Arts Degree in International Relations from Salve Regina University in 1995. CDR Masley was awarded a second place award from the American Council on Oceans Law for his research paper on U.N. Ocean Laws Impact on the New Navy Strategy in 1993. This paper was requested for use by the United States delegation to the United Nations and is still used today. CDR Masley had many papers published during his time at the War College. During his 20 years of service, CDR Masley received multiple medals and awards and prided himself on his service to his country.

Upon retirement in 1995, CDR Masley was hired as the first Senior Naval Science Instructor and began the Naval Junior Reserve Officer Training Core (NJROTC) unit at Oxford High School. Under his direction, the unit earned 25 national program awards in 20 years. In the first year, an award was created for his unit "Outstanding First Year Program Award" for NJROTC Area 4. In the second year, the unit was awarded the Chief of Naval Education and Training Unit Award, the only second year unit to receive this award. CDR Masley's unit also earned the White House National Daily Point of Light on Sept. 28, 1999 and became

the first NJROTC unit of any service branch to receive this distinction. Other NJROTC unit awards under CDR Masley's direction include 16 Distinguished Unit awards in 17 years in Area 4. As Color Guard Coach, CDR Masley led his teams to 14 National Championships. His unit received national, regional, and state awards for unit programming and excellence, academics, color guard and drill teams, shooting club, and volunteerism. CDR Masley prided himself on providing his students with the best educational opportunities as well as life opportunities such as guiding his cadets to participate in Leadership Academy, opportunities to provide color guard at a variety of events, sailing opportunities in Newport, RI, organizing the annual Military Ball, and the importance of community service to help make the world a better place. A former cadet nominated CDR Masley for and he received the coveted Thomas S. Green Public Service Award for outstanding municipal employees in 2013. As director of the Oxford NJROTC, he believed in challenging each student to reach their greatest potential and he set high standards for students and the unit. CDR Masley not only lead his unit to achieve great recognition, he was a mentor and friend to his cadets and their families, the student body and staff, and to everyone he met. He retired from his post as Director of the NJROTC Unit in October 2017.

CDR Masley also found time to be active in the community as he was a member of the US Naval Academy Alumni Association, the US Naval College War Foundation, St. Bernard's Council Nights of Columbus in North Grosvenordale CT, the Oxford American Legion Post # 58, the Military Officers Association of the United States, and many other organizations.
