## Town Meeting rejects additional land for marijuana cultivation

WEBSTER — In the only item this year's Annual Town Meeting rejected, voters turned down a proposal to add an area on Thompson Road to the marijuana overlay district by 66-74.

The concept was proposed by Paul Kujawski, who has been a consultant for Curaleaf, but did not mention the firm during his discussion of using a largely vacant property this way. The property is currently mostly being used to store school buses, and he argued

it could provide about 150 parking spaces for a nearby dispensary.

"We feel this would be an extremely attractive location," he said, noting it's only about 120 yards from the first I-395 exit and using it this way could "generate a large amount of revenue" for Webster.

Key arguments against the plan revolved around traffic and the schools.

School Committee Chair Dave Hurton, speaking as a citizen, said he supports additional revenue sources, but was concerned

that many kids pass this location, either by bus or while doing track and field. Superintendent Ruthann Goguen shared that view.

A couple of citizens, including Paul LaFramboise, cited existing bad traffic there. LaFramboise argued that any development there would likely create problems and and wouldn't benefit anyone "but for the proponent of the article." To him, adding this property would cause "no financial change" for Webster because the town has

## Oxford selectmen deal with roads and horses

OXFORD — By split votes, the selectmen approved keeping part of Conlin Road one way and giving a Huguenot Road resident a permit for chickens and horses.

The former came as part of DPW Director Sean Divoll's annual overview of his department's paving plan for this working season. Selectmen had delayed making a decision a few weeks ago pending more information in late May.

Divoll said he's seen "some conflict" between cars and trucks turning near there, but the intersection is safer, a view the police shared, Town Manager Jennifer Callahan said. Originally, the issue came to the forefront due to accidents. Among the other alternatives to address them were flashing stop signs in all four directions and closing the southernmost section entirely, Divoll said.

The vote to leave it one way was 3-1-1, with Meghan Troiano voting no and Dennis LaMarche abstaining.

Divoll told selectmen plans two major paving projects this year — Mt

Pleasant Street and Leicester Street from Route 20 to Comins Road — based on the town's pavement management program, which takes into account road conditions, traffic and cost. The latter "has been on our watch list for some time," but there hasn't been enough money to do it until now, after Town Meeting approved adding \$500,000 of local money to the regular \$625,000 Oxford gets in Chapter 90 state aid.

Beyond that, Divoll said several design projects are going forward this year. Those include part of Main Street, which is likely to be eligible for state and/or federal aid, Rawson Ave drainage and reconstruction, the Hall Road culvert, and bridges on Leicester Street and State Street.

One ongoing project, though, is behind schedule, he admitted. Sacarappa Road bridge has proven to be more complex than expected, with design he hoped would be done by now being slowed by state requirements. Among other things, he said his department had to get a

## Selectman, town clerk races heat up in Dudley

DUDLEY — Voters in Dudley have two big decisions to make in the next week, as the June 10 annual town election is on the horizon. Compared to past years, the 2019 election won't be as quiet as voters might be used to with two Board of Selectmen seats and the Town Clerk set to be hard fought battles.

These will be the only two contested elections on the ballot with three contenders for two seats on the Board of Selectmen and three contenders for the Town Clerk seat.

For selectman, we have one incumbent and two contenders seeking the open seats for

three-year terms. Incumbent Paul Joseph is seeking a new term with the board. A 30-year Dudley resident, Joseph has served 15 of those years as a selectman and is hoping to continue his service for another three.

Gerald DiDonato, who moved to Dudley to plant his roots in retirement three years ago, is making his second attempt at a Board of Selectmen seat. He current serves on the Finance Committee and an appointed member.

The third candidate is a newcomer to local politics Jason Johnson who spent much of his life in the Auburn, Dudley,





# Dudley FD on schedule for August Completion

DUDLEY – Commuters along West Main Street in Dudley have no doubt noticed the progress that has been made on the Dudley Fire Department over the past few months.

After securing funding from voters in 2016 and breaking ground in 2018, the department's initiative is bringing new life to the aged structure that went relatively untouched since its construction in the 1960s. New garage bays are now visible while work on the older portion of the structure is currently underway. Chief Dean Kochanowski says the project is on schedule to be completed in August.

"The garage portion is probably about 90 percent complete, and we have moved the trucks over because they've started renovating the older portion where the offices and living space is going to be. The bunk

area is complete, the section of the back, but they just started working on the old bay area where the trucks used to be.

That's going to bring offices and living space all to one floor while the upstairs is going to be attic space and storage. We used one room up there as a server room for all the radios," Chief Kochanowski said.

Once completed, the renovated facility will be OSHA and ADA compliant and will serve as the Emergency Operation Center for Dudley in the case of a weather event or other major incident in town. Chief Kochanowski said he is proud of the support he has received from the Dudley taxpayers and the fact that they were able to find a way to bring a newly redesigned station to the community at a relatively minor cost when compared to similar projects.

"The \$6.75 million is a lot of money to you and I, and I don't say that lightly, but you look at all these area fire station projects that are going on and they're costing double-digit millions. You're talking \$20

million, \$30 million, \$45 million and we came in at \$6.75 so I think we did our due diligence to get a very feasible building for a good price that the taxpayers could afford," said the chief. "I'm extremely grateful for the citizens of Dudley. If it wasn't for them, we wouldn't have this right now. They're the reason we're here, but by the same token I want to assure the community that we'll have the best service around when they need it."

The station renovation has provided minimal issues for the daily operations of the department. According to the chief the only real setback is the fact that quarters and offices are a bit cramped until the older portion is completely redone. Work on the department will continue throughout the summer with a ribbon cutting to be scheduled some time in September to officially reopen the building.

limited marijuana licenses to two, and firms are already looking at using the existing sites.

Kujawski countered by saying students going through that area "can see a pawn shop and a strip joint, which is a fact, and I don't know why you have an exception for that." But nobody would see a facility here from Thompson Road, although it could be seen from I-395, he said. Additionally, Kujawski argued, the "substantial amount of facilities opening" statewide means this one wouldn't be likely to see the kind of traffic troubles Leicester and Northampton saw, which he attributed to them being "novelties."

Even if the vote had been reversed, the proposal would have failed. Under state law, zoning changes need a two-thirds majority, but that would have garnered only 52.8 percent.

Equally controversial was a plan to eliminate the ban on personal watercraft launching from Memorial Beach, which voters ultimately opted to pass over for more information, 100-23. That particularly drew concerns from people living near the Lakeside boat ramp, who argued they've seen increased traffic, illegal parking, littering,

and one claimed to have seen drunken jet ski users departing there. (Another contradicted that claim.)

Police Chief Mike Shaw said his department has had some issues with staffing the boat patrol, but will have two officers doing it this year and will step up parking enforcement there.

Town Administrator Doug Willardson said the ban is one factor that might have reduced beach income by \$20,000.

"Anecdotally, we've heard it's reduced problems on North Pond, but increased problems on South Pond," he said. He'd like to have an extra year of details before making a decision, but noted it could come back in October, too.

Beyond that, all of the other articles passed by enormous majorities. Some of the bigger issues included a revamp of the animal control bylaw to increase fines for animals taken into the kennel (to \$20 plus \$10 per day up to seven days), requiring rabies vaccinations, setting a maximum of three dogs per residence without needing a permit, and other changes. Voters approved amending it to exempt "registered support and service animals ... within the meaning of the [state] laws."

Voters had some discussion before approving three related articles to create a local option 6

percent tax on motels, Air-BNB and other short-term rentals up to 30 days, plus 3 percent extra (defined as an "impact fee") each for "professionally managed" facilities and those in private two- or three-family dwellings. All three passed by votes of approximately 3-to-1.

Additionally, voters approved the \$47.9 million budget (which included pay hikes for the treasurer/collector and assessor, which are now appointed full-timers), \$3.85 million for the sewers and \$2.2 million for the water department; amendments to several administrative bylaws; a historical restriction on Town Hall; amending the vacant house bylaw to include a \$300 per day fine for failure to register and to places liens on properties if the fines go unpaid; and an easement on town property for National Grid connection to a solar array.

Furthermore, the Special Town Meeting which began the night included \$229,000 for three DPW vehicles, cruiser cameras, rescue air bags, and salt shed repairs; \$192,981 to look at which sewer lines need repair or replacement; and approval for easements to extend the Riverwalk, among other things.

## Students graduate from Assumption College

WORCESTER — A total of 635 graduates received a degree during Assumption College's 102nd Commencement exercises on Sunday, May 12, held at the DCU Center in downtown Worcester, MA.

The Commencement speaker, Robert Lewis Jr., chief executive officer of The BASE, a Boston-based nonprofit that provides athletic, education and career-building resources to enable student-athletes to pursue a college degree, shared his life story of struggle and achievement and inspired the Class of 2019 to live a life of meaning.

In her introduction of Lewis, Julia Demkowicz '19, salutatorian, shared of his tireless passion for empowering inner-city youth, specifically his efforts to break down the stereotypes of urban America.

"Robert Lewis may not have had a lot growing up as a child of teenage parents who lived in public housing, but he did have love and the mindset that he could be successful despite any limitations society tried to place on him," shared Demkowicz. "He grew up with a longing to share this message with others in similar situations. After reviewing a report on poverty that showed that Black and Latino men were disadvantaged in many ways, including lower graduation rates and higher incarceration rates, Lewis was determined

to change this narrative by launching The BASE in 2013."

Assumption was one of the first institutions of higher education to partner with The BASE, providing scholarships and other opportunities to individuals in the program. Thus far, 11 The BASE students have attended Assumption; two graduated in 2018; four others are among the Class of 2019; five more will continue their studies next year. Nationwide, The BASE serves 1,400 individuals.

"The BASE provides educational, athletic, and career-building resources to enable students to pursue college degrees," explained Demkowicz. "All of these students enter the program through word of mouth and social media, a testament to the power of the program's message. The BASE builds on the students' passion for sports, including baseball, softball, and, most recently, basketball. The program gives them a sense of belonging and also provides academic resources, such as homework support, writing workshops, SAT prep classes, and college and career visits."

Lewis shared that through The BASE, students were provided opportunities to obtain a college degree, but also to change hearts and minds.

"I started The BASE because I wanted to shift the narrative," explained Lewis. "Urban talent is American talent. When you look at me, what do you see? Your future. You see the next generation of a workforce. Don't call us at-risk. Don't call us underserved. Don't call

us disadvantaged. What you might call us are college graduates. And that's what we're doing."

Following an incident in which his house was fire-bombed when he was 16, Lewis "knew at that moment that I was going to do something good for humanity." Later in life, he would collaborate with Nelson Mandela in South Africa to build a national service model. He also advised British Prime Minister David Cameron during a period of unrest in the United Kingdom in 2011 and served as an advisor to the nation of Haiti following an earthquake there. On Mother's Day, Lewis shared with graduates the limitless potential of their future, especially when supported by a mother's love.

"Nelson Mandela, David Cameron and Haiti," Lewis pondered. "Who would have thought that a person born to a mom at 18 with a fourth-grade education that those opportunities could come? She did. And that's what you have graduates, when you look around and you see your parents. They see your future, and it's bright."

"As I look out into this crowd today, what I see is a kaleidoscope of beautiful people filled with promise and hope," shared Lewis. "You represent what is great in our country right now and for generations to come. I am inspired by you and I know your families are so proud of you."

Lewis also expressed his gratitude to Assumption College President Francesco C. Cesareo, Ph.D. for his support of The BASE program.

"President Cesareo, your belief in The BASE and our organization is changing the game for urban young people throughout the country," shared Lewis. "I want our student-athletes from The BASE

Boston, BASE Chicago, BASE Indianapolis and Pittsburgh to experience this wonderful institution and they will."

In closing, Lewis called upon the Class of 2019 to make a difference in the lives of others.

"Be impactful, every day," Lewis concluded. "Influence others to greatness and lead with your soul. The future will be shared by those willing to commit their minds and bodies to the task."

In addition to delivering the Commencement address, Lewis received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters. An honorary degree was also conferred upon Sr. Anne Credidio, B.V.M., who raised funds to rehabilitate a neglected hospital wing in Ecuador for those with leprosy and restored dignity to those suffering from the disease. The recipients were honored for their dedication to community service and living the mission of Assumption College.

During the ceremony in which 456 Bachelor of Arts degrees; 144 graduate studies degrees (Master of Arts and Master of Business Administration) and certificates; and 35 Continuing and Career Education degrees (Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Science, and associates) were awarded-Francesco C. Cesareo, Ph.D., president of Assumption College, urged graduates to be mindful of the mission of the College as they go forth to use their gifts and talents to better the world.

## Don't forget to register your alarm

Many residents may not be aware that all home and business burglar and fire alarms, currently in use here in the Town of Dudley are required to be registered. Local by-law Article Thirty-Six is the regulation which governs alarm systems. Since the renewal date for providing up to date information is nearing, I thought I

would take this opportunity to remind everyone about the process.

Police officers and firefighters respond to house alarms quite frequently. Even though many of these have been activated by accident or they have malfunctioned, responders treat them as if they are true emergencies. It is important to keep current contact information on file with public safety officials in the event of a problem. Section C (1) of Article Thirty-Six outlines the procedure for registering these alarms. It states, "Every alarm user shall submit to the Police Chief the names, addresses and telephone numbers of the user and at least two other persons who can be reached anytime, day or night, and who are authorized to respond to an emergency signal transmitted by an alarm system and who can open the premises wherein the alarm system is installed. The list of names, addresses and telephone numbers of the responders must be kept current at all times by the alarm user and shall be submitted during the first month of each fiscal year." July 1 is the beginning of the fiscal year, and this is the date when the information needs to be submitted.

Penalties for violations are covered under section E (3). It provides for a fine of \$25 for unregistered or late registered false alarms. In addition, \$25 can be charged for each month where a home owner is in non-compliance. This can be costly if not addressed. It is important to have current and accurate information for first responders. This helps to protect your property from damage, allows emergency services and family members to be contacted quickly, and limits the police and fire response in the event of a false alarm. Please take the time to stop by the station for a form, download one on-line via Facebook ("The Dudley Police Department Massachusetts"), visit our Web site www.dudleypolice.com, or simply provide the necessary information on a sheet of paper or via regular mail or email (listed below). Whichever way you choose to do this, we thank you in advance for your cooperation in this effort.

### Sleep on it

That email that just irked you... The text that made you see red and hit "reply" almost before you realized you'd done it...

The stupid, hurtful or thoughtless remark someone tossed your way in a conversation that made you instantly upset...

These things require an immediate response, don't they? Are we supposed to let someone email/text/say things like that and not react to them??

Maybe not. Maybe there is value in not replying right away. It goes against what our "instant" 21st century lifestyle professes, which is that fastest is best: fastest Internet speed; fastest-moving line at the grocery store; fastest roller coaster; quickest and best come-back remark. It's all about being instantaneous.

But perhaps we need to learn to practice the pause...the deliberate rest before reacting. An angry emailed reply can't be un-sent, and the contents can't be un-viewed. Same for a hastily-sent text, or an equally bitter comment tossed back to the person who insulted you first. It's not about not defending ourselves, or about letting things roll off our backs. It's about waiting to react.

There's a very convincing school of thought that counsels sleeping on any big decision before making it. That can apply to small things too. The email from a coworker or client that rubbed you the wrong way might look a little different by the next morning. Maybe there was no harm meant, and you interpreted it wrong. Maybe it was an unfair complaint or personal remark against you, but in waiting to reply, you strengthen your position as the more even-tempered and reasonable person. Perhaps the sender of the nasty text also had time to reconsider, and now has the chance to apologize. In pausing before reacting, you allow those possibilities to happen.

While reacting hastily and immediately can feel great at the time, it can't be undone. Waiting a while – sleeping on it – can never hurt.

Never react because you think you must. Other than breathing, just about anything can wait one day.



# Healthy BBQ Tips

It's officially BBQ Season and this time of year grilled suppers make for highly anticipated outdoor mealtimes – and the excitement applies even if you've vowed to eat healthy! All it takes is a little creativity to re-vamp traditional barbecue foods into healthier offerings.

Read on prep ideas, recipes, and culinary tips sure to make grilling not only healthy, but the best of the season! \*\*\*

The most simple and cost effective way to ramp up the flavor of healthy cuts of meats, fish and poultry is to prep grilling foods to boost optimum flavor. Below are some pre-cooking strategies that add a healthy dose of deliciousness!

**\*Brine:** Lean cuts of meat don't have to translate into less taste! Preparing meat and poultry with a brine preparation plumps up the foods while infusing tons of flavor. Brining, which is basically a salt water bath, can elevate dry, lean cuts to rich gourmet status. While many types of brine employ large doses of salt and sugar, the following recipe from Cooks Illustrated "Basics of Brining" offers a healthier alternative. This brine recipe is ideal for high heat grilling:

Use one quart cold water per pound of food. Add two tablespoons table salt or three tbsp Morton Kosher salt, and two tablespoons sugar. Meat or poultry should brine (refrigerated) in the solution for one hour per pound, but not less than a half hour or more than eight hours.

**Note:** The addition of garlic cloves, peppercorns, herbs, and/or citrus peel offer additional flavor without added fat or calories.

**\*Marinade:** Marinades are typically comprised of an acid, oil and spices. Marinating lean cuts of meat not only adds flavor, but the acids serve as a

natural meat tenderizer. In addition, it's been proven marinade helps protect meat from cancer causing compounds caused by cooking at high heat (HCAs) and by smoking fat drippings (PAH).

Sans the sugar and light on salt, this mustard based marinade rivals the best of them: Mix together two cloves garlic, crushed; one cup balsamic vinegar; 1/2 cup Dijon or other dark, quality mustard ; 1/4 cup virgin olive oil; 1/2 teaspoon pepper ; 1/4 teaspoon sea salt. Marinade for an hour or more in the refrigerator.

**Note:** Overnight marinating can reduce cooking time by up to 35%! \*\*\*

**\*Spice Rub:** With a high flavor factor and low carb and calorie count, spice rubs are healthy, delicious alternatives to rich meat sauces. Both novice and veteran grillers often experiment with herbs to develop a "signature" all purpose rub that can be used with a variety of meats and poultry. This basic all purpose rub (for beef, pork, poultry or fish) uses common pantry spices: Mix together 3/4 cup paprika; 1/4 cup freshly ground black pepper; 1/4 cup coarse salt; 1/4 cup sugar; 2 tablespoons each chili powder, garlic powder, and onion powder; two teaspoons cayenne pepper. Rub dry spice mixture generously on meat before grilling.

**Note:** This recipe makes two cups and can be adjusted for smaller portions. \*\*\*

**No Sugar Added Barbecue Sauce Recipe**

This quick and easy barbecue sauce delivers huge taste without the sugar and preservatives in most commercial brands.

**Ingredients:** one tbsp butter; one cup

2 tbsp apple cider vinegar; 1 packet (to taste) of Stevia sweetener.

**Directions:** Sauté onion in butter. Add all other ingredients. Bring to a boil and simmer for 15-20 minutes, until sauce thickens. \*\*\*

The following culinary tips cut calories, not flavor!

**\*Always trim fat off steaks and chops before grilling.** Use a brine or marinade to ensure a moist and flavorful cut (see recipes above).

**\*Substitute a slathering of fresh avocado for cheese and/or mayo on a grilled turkey burger.**

**\*Marinate large slices of summer squash, zucchini, peppers, eggplant and the like, and toss them on the grill for a tasty veggie medley.**

**\*Spice up all your grilled foods without adding calories, fat or sodium with this no salt spice recipe from Dr. Oz:** Mix together 1/3 cup each garlic powder, onion powder, and oregano; 2 tbsp thyme; 1 tsp parsley flakes; 1 tsp ground pepper

**\*Grilled fruits are a scrumptious, diet-friendly dessert as they are.** Or, top the caramelized fruit with scoop of sorbet or sugar free ice cream. Firm fruits such as pineapples, apples and pears are best fruits for grilling; bananas, peaches and mangos also work well but need extra attention to prevent them from becoming mushy. To keep fruits from

drying out, cut fruit in half (remove any seeds but leave skin on to keep its shape) and soak in cold water with a little lemon juice for 15-30 minutes before grilling. Spray a clean grate with non stick cooking oil to prevent sticking. \*\*\*

**Fun Fact:** Did you ever wonder where the word "barbecue" comes from? The origin has an intriguing explanation. Some sources claim it comes from the French phrase "barbe a queue" which translates into "from whiskers to tail." The month of May & June has numerous wildlife bringing their young into the world, as this week's picture shows a mother goose with four of her recently born Canada geese at the Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club. Many members enjoy feeding the birds daily, and provide some great entertainment when another goose tries to interfere with the young birds feeding.

Wild Turkeys are also being observed with their clutches of young birds. Some hen Turkeys have been observed with as many as 12 or more young birds. Although not all of the young birds will survive, many

will. Predators like fox, fisher cat, hawks and owls to mention a few are sure to take their toll on the newborn.

Deer are also having their young, and will do so all this month with some being born in June. The deer population in Mass. has been strong, and continues to grow annually despite their loss of habitat, due mostly to construction. The deer have adapted to living among humans, and have become a nuisance for residents trying to grow a small backyard garden. One local resident observed a couple of deer feeding in his strawberry patch. As the local

back yard gardens start to grow, the deer will sure be back to feed on the fresh young plants.

Keeping deer out of a garden is not easy, and even an eight or ten foot fence will not deter them from jumping over them to feed on the fresh vegetation.

Keeping backyard feeders full of food for numerous species of birds can become expensive if you do not have some type of control on chipmunks and squirrels. Hummingbirds are back big time with as many as a half dozen of them flocking to the feeder at one time. My wife Judy enjoyed watching them fly in and out of the feeders daily, before she lost her battle with cancer recently.

Trout fishing remains strong on local lakes and ponds & bass fishing can not get much better. One of the valleys hot spots is Lackey Pond in Sutton and Whitinsville. Sense the restoration of the Dam a number of years ago, largemouth bass populations have exploded and it is common to catch a four-pound bass daily at the site. One angler also caught a calico bass and a pickerel at the site. Because the river was heavily polluted back in the '50's -'70's, it is not recommended eating the fish from the area. Catch & release should be practiced. There is a small boat ramp at the dam, that is accessible to small boats, canoes & kayaks. Small motors are allowed. Give it a try.

Stripers are starting to show in big numbers in both Mass. & Rhode Island. Fluke fishing is also picking up along with some impressive seabass.

Many people prefer to vacation in other parts of New England. I'll offer suggestions on antiquing in other parts of New England in a future column.



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Add a bit of cool flavor to your beverages and meals this summer with homegrown mint. Try using peppermint leaves in fruit cocktails and ice cream. Add spearmint to your tea or use the leaves to season lamb and jelly. Or try chocolate mint for a unique sweet and refreshing flavor in desserts and drinks.

This vigorous plant is easy to grow and suited to container gardens. In fact, growing it in a pot will help keep this vigor-

ous herb contained. Or sink a container of mint in the garden or plant where surrounding walks and walls will keep this vigorous plant contained.

Grow mint in a full sun to partial shade location with moist well-drained soil. Mulch the soil to conserve moisture. Though hardy in zones 3 to 11, you will need to provide a bit of winter protection when growing mint in containers in colder regions. Either sink the container in a vacant spot in the garden or move the planter into an unheated garage. Water thoroughly whenever the soil is thawed and dry.

Harvest the leaves as needed. Cutting leafy stems off the plant just above a healthy leaf or bud will encourage compact tidy growth. Pick mint just before flowering for the most

intense flavor.

Include a container of mint in your patio, balcony or deck plantings. Keeping it close to the kitchen and outdoor living space will make it easy for you to harvest and use. Plus, your guests will enjoy plucking a few fresh mint leaves to add to their iced tea, mojito or favorite summer beverage or salad.

Not only does this easy to grow herb add flavor, but it also aids digestion. Add a garnish of mint to dress up dessert plates or provide it to a loved one to calm a queasy stomach. And use it to increase the manganese, vitamin C and vitamin A levels in your diet.

state determination on whether it qualifies as a dam (it doesn't), but found it also doesn't meet state definitions of a culvert or a bridge for grant purposes. He noted the project needs several state permits, and reviews for them can last months. One he hopes he doesn't need, but might, could take a year.

That prompted some discussion over trying to seek special legislation to give it a definition and state aid to erect a temporary bridge there. Selectmen John Saad objected to the delays, saying the bridge closure created a "bottleneck" during a fire there last year and could cause similar problems if other things happen up there. He noted it's "the longest cul-de-sac in town" now.

Callahan agreed, describing it as "a very unusual structure, and it calls for some potentially unusual solutions."

Divoll said Town Meeting approved borrowing \$800,000 for the project, of which \$160,000 has so far been borrowed for design. The goal is to "keep the historic nature of that structure," which used to channel water to a nearby mill site, and he hopes to start construction next year, preferably using state aid, if possible.

Regarding the animals, selectmen split 3-2, ultimately approving allowing Kristina Hayes-Blackwell to take in a large-dog-sized mini-horse alongside

two regular horses and up to 15 chickens.

The issue came up based on Assistant Animal Control Officer Ed Hart's recommendation that Blackwell's 1.5 acres of pasture wasn't enough for three horses, and urged the selectmen to require her to take time to clear more land first. Hart said town bylaws generally call for an acre per horse, but Blackwell noted she had two horses and three Shetland ponies there when younger, before the rules came into effect.

Blackwell is a licensed riding instructor, most recently at Blessings Farm in Charlton, but she had to stop teaching there because her paid job took on more hours. She said her two horses are now boarding in Spencer, but the mini-horse is not hers yet; she wants to bring him in from a rescue group. She has an agreement with one neighbor to use some of his land for pasture space, and Hart said he talked to her neighbors, none of whom had issues.

The permit calls for allowing the horses, chickens and mini-horse, "but if that ever goes, you go back to just two horses," according to Saad's motion. Troiano and LeBlanc saw a "potential space issue," with the latter noting Hart was "already making a concession for lack of acreage," and voted against it. LeBlanc, however, dubbed the rescue effort "admirable."

and Thompson areas. An Eagle Scout, Johnson has become involved in the local scout troop and touts his critical thinking experience and problem-solving prowess as an engineer and team leader in different industries as key aspects that make him a worthy candidate for the Board of Selectmen.

These three men will vie for three seats on June 10, with Joseph's seat up for grabs and Jonathan Ruda stepping down from the board earlier this year to seek the Town Administrator position for Dudley, a job he succeeded in obtaining.

While two of the three candidates for selectman will earn a seat, the Town Clerk position will also have three candidates, but only one can take the position being vacated by Ora Finn in her retirement. Finn has offered to stay on board in order to help train and prepare the new clerk after the election.

Heather Bowes has lived in Dudley for more than 20 years, and brings with her a degree and experience in business, eventually working for Atlas Distributing in Auburn, answering to the president, vice president and sales team. Over the last 15 years, she has operated her own daycare and currently works as an office manager and at a local nursing home as a health care provider.

The second candidate on the ballot is Mary Devlin, who brings more than 20 years of municipal experience in Dudley and Charlton. She was the executive secretary to the Dudley Board of Selectmen for six years, and has served as the administrator assistant to the Town Administrator and Board of Selectmen in Charlton since 2004 seeking a new career opportunity in the town she resides, Dudley.

Finally, Lori Smith rounds out the candidates. A lifelong resident of Dudley, Smith has a Master's degree in Business Administration and a Bachelor of Science and Business Administrator both from Nichols College. She has more than 13 years of municipal experience in Dudley and 15 years' experience in higher education at Nichols College.

The remaining positions on the ballot are uncontested, but voters are heavily encouraged to vote their peace either way at the polls on June 10. Seats for assessor, the regional school committee, Board of Health, Library Trustees, Water & Sewer Commission, Housing Authority and other boards and commissions will also be filled through the annual vote. Four Planning Board seats are also up for grabs however no candidates were presented on the official ballot.

Dudley's annual town election takes place throughout the day until 8 p.m. on Monday, June 10.

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
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

## Bartlett, Oxford split doubleheader, which advances Indians into District Tournament

OXFORD — Talk about saving your best for last. The Bartlett High varsity baseball team rallied to score four runs in the bottom of the seventh inning — the winning run crossing the plate on a wild pitch with two outs — in its last regular-season game to defeat Oxford High, 4-3, and qualify for the Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament.

The win, part of a doubleheader at Oxford High on Saturday, June 1, allowed the Indians to finish the season 9-9. Bartlett dropped the opening game of the doubleheader, 3-0, to the Pirates — the defending Central Mass. Division 4 champions. Oxford heads to the postseason with an 11-10 record.

"All year long we have preached to the kids that

baseball is unlike any other sport; there is no clock. When a team is up, they can't just run out the clock. Everyone has to make their 21 outs," Bartlett head coach Jon Way said. "So I told them, 'until we make that 21st out, we're still fighting.' They've had that mentality all year long and they took that mentality into that final inning."

Senior Zack Kraal reached base to open the bottom of the seventh with a walk and junior Sean Stockhaus followed with an opposite field single on an 0-2 count, Kraal moving to second. Senior Eric Vazquez followed with an RBI single, plating Kraal with Bartlett's first run, and sophomore Jordan Molina made it a 3-2 game, scoring Stockhaus with an RBI single of his own. Vazquez moved to third

on the play and Molina took second on the throw to the plate.

Sophomore Chase Czernicki then tied the game, 3-3, with a sacrifice fly that scored Vazquez, Molina moving to third on the throw home. The next Bartlett batter struck out, so with two outs the tournament-qualifying run stood at third base in the form of Molina.


"We had our No. 2 hitter, Joey Grundel, coming up and I called timeout and told Jordan, 'look, we're going to stay aggressive. I want you to read the ball down in the dirt and if gets away from Bordeaux behind the plate I want you to break for home,'" Way said. "So, we stayed aggressive. It cost us in the first game and I was hoping in that situation it would deliver us a win in the second game."

"And that's exactly what happened," Way continued. "A pitch got away from [Oxford catcher Michael] Bordeaux and Jordan scored to win the game for us."

It was fitting that it was Molina who scored the winning run.

"Jordan's a great story. He's a sophomore who played like a sophomore to start the season," Way said. "He can play everywhere for us and can pitch for us, too. He really earned his starting spot by the second half of the season."

"Jordan still makes some young mistakes; he got screamed at in the middle of the second game because he didn't slide into second and got the automatic double play called, but he's resilient," Way continued. "He took the quick tongue-lashing, went right back to the mound and got to work and then came up with a huge RBI single and had the wherewithal to score on the wild pitch to win us the game."

Oxford won the first game behind the pitching of Joel Erickson, who needed just 85 pitches for the complete-game shutout. The senior allowed just five hits — all singles — while striking out six and walking one.


"I didn't really feel 100 percent today," said Erickson, who doubled in his first at-bat in Game 1. "My body is good to go and my arm felt fine, but this was the first day this year pitching in the hot sun and I felt it. It took me some time to adjust to the heat. It was a mental adjustment that I feel took me a few innings to work through."

Oxford head coach Justin Richards said that Erickson was also adjusting to pitching on four days rest — rather than the usual six or seven — for the first time all season.

"That was by design; pitching on four days rest this week is more like it will be in Districts," Richards said. "This was an opportunity to give his body a chance to get used to throwing on four days rest. We usually don't do that during the year. With the way our games fell this week this was a chance to have him throw on four days rest and see how he does with it, and he did fine."

UPTON — The Shepherd Hill Regional varsity softball team pounded out 14 hits — six for extra bases, including a pair of home runs — and dropped Blackstone Valley Tech (BVT) from the ranks of the undefeated, beating the Beavers, 14-9, on Friday, May 31.

With the win the Central Mass. Division 1 Tournament-bound Rams improved to 14-5. The loss for BVT, in its final regular-season game, was the first of the season. The 19-1 Beavers will enter the Central Mass. Division 2 Tournament as one of the top seeds.

Shepherd Hill led, 3-2, after the first inning, 6-2 after the second, 7-2 after the third, 8-2 after the fourth and 13-2 heading into the bottom of the fifth inning.

“We’ve been hitting the ball really well lately. We got some runs early and then held on for dear life,” Rams’ head coach John Snyder said, alluding to the fact that the Beavers scored seven runs in the final three innings. “That’s a good team. They were undefeated for a reason. They can hit the ball. They put a lot of pressure on our defense and we didn’t react the way we wanted to at times, but we made the plays when we had to.”

Shepherd Hill’s offensive attack was led by junior Parker Filo-Loos, who had four hits, including a double, and three RBI. Cayley Fagan also had four hits, including a triple, and an RBI. Sophomore Sam Zannotti was 3-for-5 with a double and a home run, while junior Kelly Cournoyer was 2-for-3 with a bases loaded double (three RBI) and two walks. Junior Kiley Wong-Li also homered in the game.

“Parker is continuing to hit really well; she’s been a hitting machine the last four or five games,” Snyder said. “Kelly is having a great year at the

plate, too.”

Cournoyer’s fifth-inning bases clearing double to center field put the Rams ahead, 13-2.

“Hitting is infectious and I think our bench has a lot to do with it. Everyone was really rallying together and getting hits and that momentum carried through to me and allowed me to get my hit, too,” Cournoyer said. “Our bench is great. Once the first person gets a hit we all get rowdy and then the second person gets a hit and we get louder and it makes you want to do anything you can to help your team.

“I feel the way the bench is cheering me on definitely gives me more confidence and more focus when I’m at the plate,” Cournoyer added. “We knew they were a good team and that we needed to hit to have a chance and we were able to hit today.”

In addition to her solid day at the plate, Fagan was gritty and gutsy facing an explosive BVT lineup. The senior was up to the task, however, recording five strikeouts, two coming in the seventh inning to close out the game.

“Coming in knowing they were 19-0 was definitely intimidating, especially because they pound the ball; they have girls that can really hit,” Fagan said. “My defense made a lot of plays behind me. Playing a team like that, that’s coming in undefeated, makes us want to win more. I played with some of these girls in travel ball so I knew how well they could hit and I knew I would have to stay around the plate and try not to throw anything down the middle.”

The Beavers, who finished with 11 hits, were led by senior Alyssa Clark, who singled, homered and drove in four runs. Also having two-hit games were freshman Emma Ballard, sophomore Abby Behrikis and senior Megan Metzger, who doubled and tri-

pled. Behrikis and junior Hallie Arpin each drove in two runs.


“We didn’t play well early. We made four errors in the first two innings. You can’t win like that,” BVT head coach Peter Cardoza said. “It was an uncharacteristic start to the game for us and the hole was too big for us to dig out of. We’ll be fine going forward.”

While the loss was disappointing, to be sure, Cardoza said he believed it won’t have any effect on the Beavers’ chances to win the Division 2 title.

“This game, in the end, is meaningless,” Cardoza said. “It won’t affect our seeding. We’re the only team in Division 2 with one loss. Everyone else has two or more. This won’t affect anything; it’s a meaningless game. If we’re going to play bad, this is a good game to do so to get it out of our system. We haven’t played poorly all year. It’s tough to go through a whole season without having a bad game. And, in the end, we still battled back, we still scored a bunch of runs.”

CHARLTON — The Bay Path Regional varsity baseball team used a little bit of everything — hitting, pitching, defense, plate discipline and speed — to cobble together a 6-3 victory over Pathfinder Regional in its final regular-season game of the 2019 season.

With the win, their fourth straight and fifth in their last six games, the Minutemen head to the Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament with an 11-9 record.

Bay Path head coach Mark Sansoucy believes his team is better than its record, a record that includes one-run losses to Worcester Tech, the Advanced Math and Science Academy (AMSA), Blackstone Valley Tech and Assabet Valley, and a two-run loss to Worcester Tech as well.

“Record-wise, yeah, you want to be going into the tournament with a better record than 11-9, but we are really a better team than that; we could easily be 15-5,” Sansoucy said. “We’re a solid team. We’ve got a good group of baseball players. I think we’ll be fine in the playoffs.”

“I’m happy with the group we have,” Sansoucy continued. “I’ll play anyone with these guys. I’ll take my chances with these guys. I think we can go into the tournament and compete with anybody.”

After spotting 4-14 Pathfinder a 1-0 lead in the top of the first inning, Bay Path came back in the bottom of the frame to score a pair of runs and take a 2-1 lead heading to the second inning. The Minutemen had just one hit in the rally, but they took advantage of a pair of walks, a hit batsman, and a sacrifice fly by senior Cody Wood.

The Minutemen increased their lead to 3-1 in the bottom of the third inning. With one out junior Nate Shoemaker walked, stole second, went to third on a

single by sophomore Dylan Brien and then came home later in the inning on a two-out bases-loaded walk to senior Bryson Bullock.

Pathfinder — which lost to Bay Path, 15-0, in the first meeting of the teams this season — tied the game, 3-3, in the top of the fifth, making the most of a walk, a Minutemen error and a two-RBI single by Alex Marley.

Bay Path sewed up the win in the bottom of the sixth inning, scoring three runs to take a 6-3 lead into the seventh.

Junior Brian Lavoie started the game-winning rally by being hit by a pitch, but he was erased at second base when senior Andrew Fritze hit into a fielder’s choice to second base. Fritze went to second on an infield single by senior Dom Esposito and then scored to make it 4-3 when sophomore Erik Johnson reached on a Pathfinder error.

Esposito scored later in the inning to make it a 5-3 game, coming home on an infield single by Wood. Shoemaker closed out the scoring, pushing the Minutemen lead to 6-3 when he scored on a wild pitch.

Bay Path had just five hits in the game — all singles — but made the most of eight walks and an eye-popping nine stolen bases.

“We like to run and we’ve got some kids that can run and we let a lot of them — not all of them — loose on the bases,” Sansoucy said. “They’re smart out there on the bases. Probably because they know if they’re not, they know they won’t be running again.”

Sansoucy used four pitchers in the game. Shoemaker started and went two innings. He was relieved by Brien, who went two innings as well. Esposito replaced Brien to start the fifth inning and Fritze closed out the win with a 1-2-3 seventh, striking out two of the three batters he faced.



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
