Webster considering new recreation director post

'THERE'S JUST SO MUCH THAT THIS PERSON COULD BRING TO THE TOWN'

WEBSTER — The Town of Webster may see a new position come to the town in the near future after a proposal was made during the Aug. 8 Board of Selectmen meeting to bring a recreation director on board.

The concept was brought forward by Selectman Mark Dowgiewicz, who said he wanted the opinion of his fellow selectmen about bringing a part-time position to Webster to focus purely on the recreational activities and programs that, as of right now, are put on the shoulders of different town employees who need to juggle those responsibilities with their other duties in the

Town Hall.

"Maybe a small stipend, \$15,000 or \$20,000 for part-time for maybe 25 or 30 hours a week. The main focus would be to try to bring activities to the town like a downtown business fair, carnivals, or maybe flea markets at the beach," Dowgiewicz said of the proposed position. "Whenever we do one of these functions it always falls on the lap of one of the town employees who already work and really don't have the time to do anything that's out of the ordinary."

The concept was received warmly by selectmen, and Dowgiewicz himself

Selectmen hold off on ROFR decision

DUDLEY — Dudley officials continue to mull over the possibility of embracing its right of first refusal (ROFR) opportunity on a 55-acre Corbin Road property that has been the subject of a yearlong controversy concerning plans to build an Islamic cemetery on the land.

With the Islamic Society of Greater Worcester and other organizations currently challenging the decision by the town's Zoning Board to deny permits for the project in land court, the selectmen reopened a public hearing concerning the ROFR option but didn't close the hearing, continuing it to later meetings to allow for the land court process to play out a bit before the town makes any decisions that may contradict the court.

Selectmen, through the advice of Town Counsel Gary Brackett and a new attorney brought on board as co-counsel named John Davis, decided to wait for the case management conference to commence concerning the land court case, which will give those involved

Oxford BOS approves streets policy

PLAN COULD LEAD TO FUNDING FOR SUTTON AVE. SIDEWALKS

OXFORD — Oxford's Board of Selectmen has thrown its support behind a new policy that officials hope will serve as a gateway to financing opportunities when it comes to constructing sidewalks and other projects in the town with a long awaited sidewalk initiative at the forefront of the town's plans.

Called a Complete Streets Policy, the document is a response to requirements by the state Department of Transportation that will help show Oxford's eligibility for money to help with what Oxford Public Works Director Sean Divoll calls "multimodal" improvements as needed in the community.

"Basically, it's a policy that provides for accommodations for multimodal road and

Dudley still seeking reparation from Verizon

DUDLEY — While many of the ongoing emergency communication issues have been resolved for the time being in Dudley, Fire Chief Dean Kochanowski said that the town is still seeking reparations from Verizon Wireless after the company failed to resolve those issues promptly, leaving at least two communication hubs for emergency officials unusable for a time.

These issues have been a prominent subject of discussion at Board of Selectmen meetings for several months now, and following meetings in July, the chief brought forward records of when Verizon was called in to resolve problems concerning the town's communication sites as Southbridge Tool and Shepherd Hill for selectmen to view on Aug. 8. According to those records, Shepherd Hill had issues in 2014 and in February of this year through

June. Southbridge Tool had one date in 2014 and again saw several months of issues in 2015.

"You're talking almost six months Shepherd Hill was out," said the chief, saying the Southbridge Tool issues are a little more recent. "[Southbridge Tool had issues] from May 4 of 2016 through June 22, and I think a couple of tickets are missing because I think the problems in Southbridge Tool actually start-

New inspection fee schedule takes shape in Webster

WEBSTER — Webster's selectmen are expected to make a final decision on a new payment format for inspectional service fees later this month.

Acting Town Administrator Pam Leduc presented the Board of Selectmen with a new fee schedule layout on Aug. 8 after selectmen first discussed the possible change geared towards

embracing a more economic approach to paying inspectors in June.

The new inspection fee schedules are the result of changes during budget discussions earlier in 2016 that saw the stipends of part time inspectors removed from the town budget. According to Leduc, those fees will instead be paid directly by the individuals that are utilizing the services at \$25 per inspection.

"It's a different way of paying our inspectors," she told selectmen. "We no longer budget a stipend for them in our general fund budget. A town meeting adopted a revolving fund. It's similar to how many other communities handle this. Our inspectors will be paid on a per inspection basis, \$25 per inspection."

The plan won't increase the current rates according

to Leduc, but rather shift the responsibility from the taxpayers to the individuals who use the inspection services directly. The new plan also brings several electrical permit fee items in line with the fee schedules used by the town. Leduc said that these inspection fees will be paid per individual inspection, meaning any time a permit

Learning something new

WOMEN IN THE OUTDOORS DRAWS FROM ALL OVER REGION

AUBURN — An annual favorite, Women in the Outdoors continues to attract guests from throughout the area eager to learn everything from archery to fly fishing.

Named the best event of its kind every year since its inception, the fifth annual Women in the Outdoors program drew a record 140 participants to

Auburn Sportsman's Club on July 30. Not only did guests represent all corners of Worcester County — from the Blackstone Valley to the Brookfields — but they arrived from across New England as well.

Women took part in more than 30 classes, seminars and activities during the daylong event, each applicable for beginners with no prior experience.

"It was a fantastic event. The attendance really exploded from past years, and everyone learned a lot and had fun," said Keith Fritze, the president of the central Massachusetts chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation, which runs the event.

One of the main contributors to the event's annual success is the practicality of its offerings. When area women sign up for the program, they know that they are going to be learning various skills and then practicing them on site. Many of the participants who sign up for introduction to handguns or rifle marksmanship have never fired a weapon before — and the program gives them insights from experts.

Such offerings as basic self-defense, K-9 first aid, fire building, and wilderness survival are always well attended due to the preparations they provide for real-life situations. Other programs like falconry, blade honing, beekeeping, bird watching, photography, and pallet crafts bring an eclectic dimension to the event.

Perhaps what sets Women in the Outdoors apart from all other events in the region is the expertise of its volunteer staff. Once again, 75 volunteer instructors — all significantly credentialed — took the time to introduce guests to their passions. Portions of the event were also sponsored by the Mass. Wildlife Becoming an Outdoors Woman program.

"Our instructors are great. We always want to get top notch people with certifications in their respective fields and specialties. That is very important to us," Fritze added. "With an almost 2:1 guest to instructor ratio, this is a fun, safe environment for personalized instruction."

And the event offers much more than learning new skills. From building friendships and experiencing camaraderie, to simply enjoying a day in the outdoors, the event attracts women of all ages and interests. Several guests have formed lasting friendships and return each year to try out different activities.

Because of the extensive instructional nature of each

offering, women only have time to take part in a preselected number of activities each year. For those who didn't get an opportunity to choose an intriguing event this year, next summer will provide a brand new lineup of unique and engaging activities, as well as the many popular programs this year.

Voter registration deadline for Primary is Aug. 19

Secretary of the Commonwealth William F. Galvin reminds Massachusetts residents that the deadline to register to vote or to change party enrollment for the Sept. 8 state primary is Friday, Aug. 19.

Persons who are U.S. citizens, residents of Massachusetts, and who will be at least 18 years old on or before the State Primary are eligible to register to vote. On the last day to register for the primary, registration will close at 5 p.m. Friday throughout the state. In addition, mailed registration forms must be postmarked by Aug. 19, to be eligible to vote in the State Primary on Sept. 8.

Eligible voters can register online by visiting the office website at www.registertovotema.com.

Those who register to vote by the deadline are not only eligible to vote in the primary — which is on Thursday, Sept. 8 this year — but are registered for the Nov. 8 general election.

Voter registration forms are available online at http://www.sec.state.ma.us/ele/eleiv/howreg.htm. They can be filled out on-line then printed out and signed, or printed out first, then filled out by hand and signed. Signed forms must be brought to the local town clerk or city election department.

Voters registered in a political party (Democratic, Republican, Green-Rainbow, or United Independent) may only vote in that party's primary. Voters registered as "unenrolled" (commonly referred to as independent) may vote in any party primary and will remain unenrolled.

"If you wish to change your enrollment status," Secretary Galvin said, "you can also do it by going online at www.RegisterToVoteMA.com."

Offices to be voted on in the primary are party nominations for Representative in Congress, Governors Councilor, Senator and Representative in the General Court, Sheriff, County Commissioner in Barnstable, Bristol, Dukes, Norfolk and Plymouth Counties, and to complete terms for Register of Deeds in Dukes and Suffolk Counties, and District Attorney in Bristol County.

For information on voter registration, check the Secretary's website at www.sec.state.ma.us/ele. If you are uncertain of your registration status, Secretary Galvin urges you to check with your city or town clerks or registrars of voters before the deadline.



Selling albums: Part 4

The most common albums we encounter are Lincoln cents. About half the collections have one, and sometimes several blue Whitman albums with almost complete sets. Most were filled with coins pulled out of circulation. While many are void of any rarities, you should be aware of what to look for.

Lincoln cents and Indian Head cents were both produced in 1909, and the 1909 coins of each series can be valuable. From 1909 to 1981 the cents were primarily French bronze (mostly copper). After that they were converted to a zinc based composition. 1909 would have been Abraham Lincoln's 100th birthday, so the design was changed as a commemorative. The reverse design featured two sheaves of Durham wheat, and are known as "wheaties." In 1959, (Lincoln's 150th birthday) the reverse design was changed to the Lincoln Memorial reverse. Today, the reverse depicts the Union Shield.

Wheaties (not the cereal) remain the focus of most cent collectors. They were minted at three mints — Philadelphia (no mintmark), Denver (D), and San Francisco (S). The mintmark can be found under the date. Mint-marked coins of the 1910's and 1920's are always more valuable than Philadelphia-produced cents. Coins of the 1910's and 1920's are more valuable than the 30's, 40's and 50's. All Lincoln common date coins are sold in bags of 500, 2,500, and 5,000 at bulk prices. Many dealers say: "These bags are unsearched by us." While that could be true, I doubt these haven't been searched through at some time, so I'd take that claim with a grain of salt.

Let's take a look at some of the more valuable Lincoln cents in three grades (Good 4, Very Fine 20, ND Almost Uncirculated, AU 50). There are five varieties of Lincoln cents for 1909, the first year of production — 1909 (\$2.50, \$3.75, \$9); 1909-S (\$455, \$100, \$190); 1909 VDB, the designer's initials at 6 o'clock on the reverse (\$10, \$11.50, \$13.50); 1909-S VDB (\$560, \$650, \$900), and the 1909-S over horizontal S (\$60, \$135, \$200).

Remember that the designer, Victor David Brenner (VDB) knew that rich



folks didn't care what the reverse design would be. However, he knew that the coin would circulate widely among poorer people. That is why he put Durham wheat (the main ingredient of the newly invented poor man's food-spaghetti) on the reverse. Then he made sure word got out what the "stuff" on the reverse was. The result — instant acceptance by the lower classes.

Other valuable Lincoln cents (from most valuable to less valuable):

- 1955/55 double die is the widest spaced doubling on any U.S. minted coin in history (picture accompanies this column) is valued at \$875, \$1,050, \$1,300.
- 1922 Plain, made in Denver, but the dies, which were made in Philadelphia never had a "D" engraved on them (\$4,400, \$650, \$2,600)
- 1914 D (low mintage) is valued at \$130, \$250, \$1,900.
- 1917 with a double died obverse (\$100, \$250, \$2,000).
- 1922, weak D: These dies were actually sent from Philadelphia with D mintmarks, but the D was almost completely removed due to over polishing. With Denver being the only mint producing cents in 1922, the staff felt the pressure of getting as much use out of the dies as possible. Values are \$50, \$150, \$550.

Center Road construction

A great deal of road construction work has taken place in our town over the last few months. The Center Road area has seen a great deal of improvements. One major addition includes raised crosswalks. This is a change from the norm and I wanted to bring this to the attention of those

who may travel in this area.

Crosswalks have always been present in the section of Center Road along the Nichols College campus. During the entire school year, there is high pedestrian traffic volume. This occurs during class time as well as the evening hours, as people move between dorms and other locations on the campus. In an effort to improve pedestrian safety in this location, state officials authorized the constructions of raised crosswalks. These are designed to improve a driver's ability to see people in the roadway and reduce the speed of vehicles.

Since there are no traffic signals in place on this street, the rules under Mass General Laws Chapter 89 Section 11 apply. It states in part, "When traffic control signals are not in place or not in operation the driver of a vehicle shall yield the right of way, slowing down or stopping if need be so to yield, to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within a crosswalk marked in accordance with standards established by the department of highways..." The law calls for a \$200 fine for violations. A high amount of accidents or injuries can take place in these locations, so the laws provide significant penalties.

Remember to travel with caution in the Center Road area. Signage has been put in place and road markings have been added. These include "chevron" styled lines (staggered arrows) painted in the road leading up to these locations. The structural changes should have the desired effect of improving safety. People should be aware of these, particularly if you have not traveled through the area recently. Please travel accordingly.

EDITORIAL Olympic observations

This year's Summer Olympics in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, evoke a lot of memories. For me, it's only the ninth Summer Olympics in my lifetime, so watching them is a real treat, even if it means watching events I never would watch normally.

So, this past week, as I witnessed the Olympics, I had some scattered thoughts, which I will attempt to organize here. Call it a smorgasbord of thoughts, quick bullet points, or nuggets not necessarily

organized into a cogent stream.

Mind that Dirty Water: One of the major storylines surrounding

this year's Olympics was the state of the waterways, in particular, Rio's Guanabara Bay — the site of Olympic rowing and sailing events. Reports of raw sewage, human waste, garbage and bacteria-infested water dominated headlines before the games even got underway two weeks ago. Even as the rowing and sailing got started, the water was still reportedly filthy, with one report even stating that Olympic officials sent out memos to athletes warning them not to ingest water and to cover up all open wounds before making their way down to the bay.

So imagine my surprise when after witnessing New Zealand dominate a race, I see the rowers scooping up water with their bare hands and soaking their legs with it? Either the water isn't as dirty or dangerous as they are making it out to be, or the athletes don't care. to grow so that you can eventually afford the comfortable retirement lifestyle you've envisioned. But when you retire, should you change course and adjust your investment strategy from "offense" to "defense"?

Actually, it's not quite that simple. To begin with, even while you are working, you don't want your portfolio to be completely filled with growth-oriented investments, such as stocks. If it were, you would likely be taking on a degree of investment risk that's too high, because, as you may know, stocks will fluctuate in price — sometimes significantly. And if you only own stocks, you could take a big hit during a market downturn. That's why you need to have an array of investments — stocks, bonds, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on. By spreading your investment dollars this way, you can give yourself more opportunities for success while reducing the impact

of volatility on your portfolio (keep in mind, though, that diversification, by itself, can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses).

Now, let's fast-forward to your retirement date. Once you retire, you may need to look at your investment portfolio somewhat differently — instead of "building it up," you may now want to think of "making it last." This writer will be happy when this heat wave is over, and I know that I am not alone. Even my dogs are fed up with the heat. Early morning walks at a local rod & gun club have the dogs looking for relief in a very short time. A dip in the pond at the club provides some relief for them, but they are happy to head for home and into the air conditioning.

This week, my Lab (Twig) enjoyed a swim at the club's pond, but the beagle has not yet learned how to swim. She has, however, learned how to chase birds. In the back yard, she is constantly watching for numerous non-game species of birds and has learned how to point and slowly creep up on them, coming very close to them before they take flight. Her eyes are constantly watching the birds fly into a couple of small trees in my back yard, and has learned how to wait patiently for them to land in the tree. She may make a good bird dog this fall when the upland bird-hunting season opens up.

One thing is for sure, my Labrador retriever Twig should fill the gap finding and retrieving birds.

The Zika virus is threatening to spread to areas of the United States. This dangerous threat is real and efforts to stop the spread of the virus, which is transmitted by mosquitoes, has already infected some residents of the U.S. outside of the contaminated areas. Only common sense tells us that stopping the spread of the Zika virus by mosquitoes is not going to be successful, and that we can expect to watch it spread throughout the United States in the coming months and years. er person wherever he or she travels to. It is a very serious threat to all parts of the country. You do not need to be a rocket scientist to understand the serious threat the Zika virus is to residents of the United States.

Lyme disease continues to threaten the health of man and his pets, which is spread by deer ticks, and has also spread as far away as Canada. I have seen hundreds of deer ticks on one deer harvested by a hunter last year, that makes you think about eating such an animal, but the professionals say that if the deer meat is well cooked, it will cause no harm to humans. The lone star ticks are spreading their venom throughout the United States, and "One bite by these nasty bugs could make you a vegetarian for life," says scientists. The lone star tick can carry many diseases including monocytotropic ehrlichiosis, canine and human granulocytic ehrlichiosis and tularemia. If bitten the area exhibits a rash similar to that caused by Lyme disease. While at the veterinarian's office last week with my dog (Twig), I was told that she also needed a couple of shots to prevent this new threat to my hunting partner and family pet.

Migrating waterfowl can also spread diseases and can also spread various invasive plant life to lakes, ponds and rivers. It has happened in the past and will positively happen again. Ticks and mosquitoes are indeed a serious threat to humans and animals more than ever before. Using DEET products and Permethrin spray on clothing will certainly lower your risk of infection, but using DEET products can also be harmful if they are misused.



Cod fishing at Cox Ledge has been good, with some days better than others. The cod population a few years ago was extremely poor, but has made a come back to the area. Winter fishing for Cod has been extremely good, drawing boats like the Island Current to come from New York to take anglers out from the Snug Harbor Marina. Limits of big sea bass and huge scup had anglers busy throughout the day catching fish. Similar action on local charter boats in Rhode Island have their patrons catching limits of sea bass and large scup.

Reports of bonito arriving in the Narragansett Bay to feed on the abundant baitfish signal the start of the great fishing they will provide in the coming weeks. Every year at this time bonito

and false albacore invade the shoreline of Massachusetts and Rhode Island providing some great fishing for fly-fishing anglers and other light rod and reel fishermen. The thrill of landing one of these hard fighting fish on light tackle provides the ultimate fishing experience. Although they do not provide great table fare they are fun to catch.

Fresh water anglers continue to catch some impressive large mouth and small mouth bass from local ponds and rivers. Live shiners have been the number one bait for many anglers.

Next week, we will discuss some of the great fishing in upstate New York. Steelhead, salmon, brown trout, and Lakers will be providing some great fishing on lake Ontario at this time of year, and it will only get better in the month of September and October.

Try apple cider vinegar for what ails you

Note: Always check with your doctor before ingesting raw apple cider vinegar as use may effect tooth enamel, bone density, decrease potassium levels, interfere with medications, etc.

FYI: The key to reaping the many advantage of apple cider vinegar lies in choosing ACV in its natural, unfiltered state, which means purchasing (or making) vinegar that includes the "mother enzyme" of vinegar — a white, filmy substance that occurs as the liquid is fermenting. Thus, pass over the clear amber bottles of processed apple cider vinegar that crowd supermarket shelves.

Natural apple cider vinegar, complete with the "mother" will be labeled as such. The whitish mother enzyme, produced by fermentation contains healthy raw bacteria and enzymes that have been credited with health benefits. Raw ACV is unprocessed, unfiltered and not pasteurized. Typically, it has a brownish hue, with a visible whitish organic material is visible through the glass. The label should state it is organic. Stay away from apple cider vinegar in plastic bottles, as not all are certified BPA free.

Health Benefits of ACV: What's the secret to apple cider vinegar's healing properties? It is common sense that if apple cider vinegar aids in regulating the pH in the body and keeps it alkaline, it would keep harmful microorganisms and bacteria away, as they cannot thrive in an alkaline environment. In addition, a substance in vinegar, acetic acid, can kill bacteria and/or prevent them from multiplying and reaching harmful levels. And let's not forget to credit ACV's main ingredient. Apples have long been touted as a health boosting fruit that promises to "keep the doctor away."

How much ACV can you safely consume? According to Carol Johnston,

PhD, associate director of the School of Nutrition and Health Promotion at Arizona State University, a tablespoon of apple cider vinegar mixed with eight ounces of water and taken before a meal is a safe dose. Some people prefer to add honey or maple syrup to mask the taste of straight vinegar, while others drink it in hot tea. Of course, you can always reap the benefits of raw ACV the most traditional way — enjoyed in a fresh salad.

Apple Cider Vinegar Detox Bath: To release toxins from your body and draw excess uric acid out, try this detox bath. Praised for its ability to cleanse the body both inside and out, this simple, but effective bath also offers pain relief for those with arthritis and gout. The apple cider vinegar returns the skin to its ideal pH. As a bonus, an ACV bath aids in decreasing body odors better than deodorant.

Simply add two cups of unfiltered apple cider vinegar into a tub of hot water. Relax in the tub for at least a half hour or until the water has cooled. Towel dry without rinsing.

• Arthritis/Achy Joints: ACV is a natural pain reliever, and many studies have proven that the vinegar works especially well in decreasing arthritic and joint pain.

Applying a bandage poultice of ACV targets pain at its source. Heat up a cup of water with three tablespoons of apple cider vinegar, including the mother enzyme. Soak a cotton or flannel bandage in the mixture for at least 15 minutes. While solution is still warm, dip affected joint area in the mixture to wet the area. Apply warm bandage over the joint, wrapping it to a snug (not tight) fit.

An ACV massage bath is another method to treat arthritis and joint pain. Pour 12 ounces of raw apple cider vinegar into a warm tub of water. Soak in the tub for at least ten minutes, then massage aching muscles and sore joints. Enjoy another ten minute soak and repeat.

• Insulin Resistance and Diabetes: Medical studies reveal ACV taken with a high carb meal improved insulin sensitivity by 19-34 percent and significantly lowered blood glucose and insulin responses. In addition, research shows two tablespoons of ACV before going to bed can reduce fasting blood sugars.

In 2007 Diabetes Care published findings that concluded taking two table-

spoons of apple cider vinegar before bed lowered morning glucose levels by up to 6 percent. Other researchers reported that apple cider vinegar taken with meals slashed blood sugar levels by 30 percent.

"Vinegar appears to have effects similar to some of the most popular medications for diabetes," stated Arizona State University researcher Carol Johnson.

Note: Check with your doctor before ingesting ACV if you are taking medication for diabetes or insulin resistance.

• Weight Loss: Raw apple cider vinegar has been praised as a natural weight loss supplement, attributing its success to its ability to lower glucose levels and help you feel fuller at mealtime. In fact, a research experiment reveals those who drank ACV with a high carb meal ingested up to 275 fewer calories the rest of the day. Moreover, a three-month study of overweight participants proved that those who took apple cider vinegar daily reduced the size of their waists.

The good news is, it doesn't take a daunting dose of ACV to be effective. A double blind Japanese study found the following: In a 12 week experiment, participants who daily ingested a 16 ounce drink with one tablespoon of ACV added, had lower BMI, less visceral fat, and lost more weight than those whose drinks didn't contain vinegar. As a bonus, the vinegar also lowered the participant's triglycerides. Another study in Japan reported that mice whose high fat diets were supplemented with acetic acid (the main ingredient in vinegar) developed up to 10 percent less body fat than control mice.

Prevention Magazine reported: "Acetic acid, the main component in vinegar, may interfere with the body's ability to digest starch."

Still not convinced apple cider vinegar can be the key to successful weight loss? An abundance of ACV weight loss testimonials are available online from dozens of health site sources.

• Acid Reflux and GERD: While it might seem counterproductive to treat acid with acid, acid reflux is often caused by the lack of acid in the body. Taking two teaspoons of apple cider vinegar every day (diluted in water) has been known to relieve the symptoms of acid reflux and GERD better than many over the counter remedies.

To halt indigestion before it begins, drink a teaspoon of ACV with a teaspoon of honey in a warm glass of water about a half hour before you eat a meal that you expect won't agree with you.

• Tummy Troubles: The antibiotic properties in ACV has been proven to relieve diarrhea caused by bacteria. What's more, pectin from the apples has also been proven to stifle gastric spasms. According to "The Blaylock Wellness Report," apple cider vinegar can also help prevent dysbiosis, an imbalance between good and bad bacteria in the gut, according to author Dr. Russell Blaylock. He recommends drinking a teaspoon of organic vinegar mixed with four ounces of water with each meal to aid digestion and ease reflux conditions.

• Heart Health: Here are more reasons to eat salads: A decade long study revealed that women who ate a vinegar based salad dressing five to six days a week each week lowered their risk of ischemic heart disease. Want more? The June of 2011 issue of Journal of Agricultural and Food Chemistry reported that ingesting apple cider vinegar significantly lowered triglycerides and cholesterol. And the British Journal of Nutrition also claimed that apple cider vinegar can lower cholesterol. The lower numbers were attributed to apple cider vinegar's acetic acid content.

• Colds and Flu: Many ACV drinkers swear downing a tablespoon or two of at the first signs of a cold or the flu halts the bug in its tracks. If you've got chest congestion or a stuffy nose, a teaspoon of apple cider vinegar in a glass of water can help relieve congestion. The pain of a sore throat can be soothed by gargling with a tablespoon of ACV in a glass of warm water.

AUBURN — The 2016 Auburn Boys' Basketball Summer League wrapped up its season this past Wednesday evening, Aug. 10, with a championship showdown between the No. 10 seed from Tantasqua Regional and the No. 4 seed from Worcester Tech. Tech survived a strong effort from the underdogs and pulled away late, earning a 67-56 win to take home the title.

Those in attendance at the Auburn High School gymnasium were treated to a high-energy, fast-paced contest with loads of big plays, and most notably, a standout performer on each side. Adam Phillips of Tantasqua and Ian Mwalago of Tech each posted a game-high of 25 points to lead their respective teams in the final.

Tantasqua finished their regular season at 5-5 in the 18-team league, earning the 10th seed and rolling through three rounds of playoffs to meet Tech in the championship. Worcester finished their regular season campaign at 7-3.

The other schools represented in the hotly contested, long-running league included (in order of regular season finish) Sutton High, David Prouty Regional, Hopedale High, Uxbridge High, Quaboag Regional, Grafton High, Bartlett High, Leicester High, Northbridge High, the Bancroft School, Abby Kelley Foster, Auburn

High, Oxford High, Quabbin Regional, Millbury High and North Brookfield High.

"This league is great, and that was a great game to watch, just phenomenal," Andy Niedzwiecki, Auburn High's varsity coach and assistant to Bob Muir who runs the league said after the entertaining final. "Mooch [Muir] does a great job every year with this, I think like 36 years now. I really want to thank the town of Auburn, especially Dr. Brunelle for letting us use the gym this summer."

When the ball tipped, the action was fast and furious and through an entertaining first 20-minute half, Tantasqua held a slim lead at 36-32. That lead was due in large part to the play and hot shooting of Phillips, who poured in 19 points with three 3-pointers to help carry the load.

"I knew going into the game our team needed a floor general, so I tried to step up and fill that role," Phillips said of his efforts in the finale. "We're scrappy, hungry, and we never give, and I think we're going to have a great [high school] season."

"We talked about how this is a great start to that season and that I really think it can catapult us to a fast start," summer league coach Dan Peretti said after the defeat. "We came together pretty well here at the end of the season and through the last three or four games."

While Tantasqua still played a spirited second half, foul trouble for their big men led to issues defending the eventual championship game MVP, Mwalago, who knifed his way into the lane on a number of occasions, and when he didn't hit a great shot, he was going 4 of 5 from the line down the stretch.

Phillips and forward Ben Garrett each had six points in the second half; Garrett finished his night with 10 in all. Tantasqua got solid contributions from a handful of players including Drew Peretti, Cam Arello and Connor McCaffrey, but Tech made a push late

and some costly turnovers allowed them to open a big lead in the game's waning moments.

With 4:07 to play, the game was tied at 54-54, but Worcester went on a 13-2 run to close out the game. With the win, Worcester Tech, in their second straight championship game, got to taste victory and bring home the coveted T-shirts and trophy associated with the title game win.

"I thought we did a really great job up until the last three minutes of the game," Coach Peretti noted, "but then they really outplayed us to close it out."



Complete Streets Policy could lead to increase in funding

street use. What that means is not only cars and trucks, but also pedestrian bicyclists," Divoll said. "It covers construction reconstruction and maintenance. Basically it looks at the bigger picture when it comes to our transportation network. It's a policy I don't disagree with. I think it makes a lot of sense. If we had these policies in place fifty or more years ago we'd have roadway networks that would look a lot different than they do now."

Divoll utilized a framework given to his office from the Massachusetts DOT that was provided to all cities and towns. He said this new policy will allow the town to move forward with creating a list of projects they feel could be covered by the state through a reimbursement program as complete streets projects, with the construction of sidewalks on Sutton Avenue, a long awaited project by locals, being considered priority one on that list.

Board of Selectman Chairman Dennis

Lamarche openly supporting the document and the potential benefits it could help the town embrace.

"I see this all the time. Worcester uses it quite a bit. A lot of surrounding town are involved in this and that's how they get a lot of repairs done to these sidewalks and how they get bike lanes put it," Lamarche said. "I think it's a great proposal personally."

Through the complete streets program at the state level the town could be eligible for up to \$400,000 for any given project. While this is not guaranteed money, Public Works Director Divoll seemed to believe it was worth the attention as the town wouldn't lose anything from seeking the funds. He did specify that the policy doesn't not require sidewalks or bike lanes to be installed for every single road project in town, but rather for those options and the feasibility of those options to be explored.

"It allows for the Department of Public Works to be context sensitive when it comes to applying this policy," Divoll said. "Without the policy we can't tap into a separate stream

of funding that's been put out for the cities and town from Massachusetts DOT. Priority number one seems to be sidewalks from Orchard Hill to Oxford Crossing (on Sutton Avenue). This, in my mind, is a perfect application of complete streets."

With that in mind however Divoll wants residents to understand that he is merely hopeful the town will be able to secure reimbursement funding to perform the sidewalk work and that it's not a guaranteed benefit. While he believes the Sutton Avenue project would fit perfectly with the goals of the complete streets initiative and funding requirements, the state would need to approve it as a worthy project first.

"I don't want to give false hope that it's a given," Divoll said. "The next step is the prioritization plan and that needs to be approved. The state has to agree that our number one project is indeed a number one project. Step two is we have to submit our design to the state and they have to approve it as being in compliance with complete streets and that's not a given either. In my opinion is applies, but I don't get to make the

decisions about whether or not it gets the funding. I don't want to put it out there that it'd a given. I hope we get the money and I think we have a very strong project."

Lamarche implied that part of his support for the Complete Streets Policy was in hopes that the town could benefit from it to make projects like Sutton Avenue's long awaited sidewalks a possibility. Lamarche did make it clear to Divoll that with or without the complete streets funding the residents of Sutton Avenue have waited long enough for the sidewalk installation and that it should be a town priority no matter how they secure the money to do it.

The Complete Streets Policy was approved in a vote of 4 to 1 with Selectman Cheryl LeBlanc, who presented questions about what the priorities for the funding would be prior to the decision, casting the only dissenting vote.

Communication issues with Verizon continue in Dudley

ed in April or maybe it just took that long to get Verizon to come out. Basically that site wasn't fixed until the second week in July so you're talking that one being out for a couple of months. So I'm looking for at least six months worth of credit and I really think we should get at least a year's worth of credit. We should have it after all the issues we've had with them."

Selectmen implored the chief to continue his pursuit of the

credits, which the chief said had been approved through a call to Verizon but he has not heard from the company or received the credits since that verbal agreement was made. The chief also said he feels D&R Radio, the company the Fire Department utilizes as a radio specialist, should also receive compensation as the town needs to pay them for their involvement with the repairs.

"Verizon requested they should be there," the chief said. "They need to be paid for the time, but I don't feel that should come out of my budget.

Verizon should pay that bill."

The chief said part of the problem with communication in the town is the lack of updated technology and the limited sightlines in Dudley. Microwave communication would be difficult due to the hills and different elevations that makeup Dudley's landscape so the radio system currently works off of a phone system and copper lines. Some of the town has been upgraded to a fiber system, but to make such an upgrade for the entire community would require a serious financial commitment. Outlying receiving sites

like Shepherd Hill and the Southbridge Tool locations use copper lines that, when damaged, interrupt communication between first responders.

"You have these old copper lines and we have a more upgraded radio system sometimes there are issues if there's a break in the line or a circuit board goes bad and you need to have Verizon come out and troubleshoot it," the chief said. "That's where we've had the issues."

Selectmen indicated interest in possibly working with companies to have a tower built that could resolve the sightline

issues preventing microwave communication from working properly, but this is purely conceptual right now. For the time being communications were implied to be back up and running smoothly. The issue that needs to be resolved now is whether or not Dudley will receive anything from Verizon to make up for the lost time and failures to resolve the issues in a timely manner.

New payment format for inspectors in the works

requires multiple inspections each of those inspections will require a new fee payment.

"Some of these permits require one inspection, some require two or three," said Leduc. "If there are additional inspections required above and beyond what is considered a normal inspection schedule then each additional inspection will be charged \$25. The town doesn't get any of that. The inspector gets the entire \$25. When I say that it doesn't go directly to them. It goes through the payroll. They are taxed on it. It's accounted for and they have to provide the payroll department with their log and the type of inspection and the payroll department will have access to the fee schedule so they can then verify that they are charging for exactly what we are getting money for."

Leduc clarified that this does not eliminate permit fees and that both the permit fees and inspection fees must now be paid for any particular project.

In June Leduc told selectmen she believed this new inspection fee schedule and format would benefit the town greatly because it eliminates a guaranteed stipend that inspectors received regardless of how many inspections they are called in to perform. The new approach would mean inspectors are paid by the job rather than guaranteed a payment through the town regardless of the amount of work they perform. It was also noted in the June meeting that while this new format may appear to put plumbers, electricians and other contractors under the microscope it is actually a familiar setup that contractors should be familiar with as Webster was in a minority in using its previous setup to handle the inspection process and payments.

Selectmen did not make a motion on the new inspection fee schedule at their Aug. 8 meeting and are expected to address the document later this month.

in the case a chance to understand the schedule and outlook for how the case will be handled and when. The case management hearing was scheduled for Aug. 18, after which selectmen planned on possibly continuing the hearing and potentially make a decision with a better perspective on the future of the land court case in hand.

"We are aware that the land court has scheduled a case management conference on the pending litigation six-count suit that has been brought regarding the zoning board decision and among the declaratory judgment counts is included a count regarding Chapter

61A and a challenge regarding this board's ability to act under the statute," Brackett told selectmen on Aug. 8. "It's our recommendation that (the town) keep the public hearing open and it be continued to a future date after the case management conference."

While a decision on the right of first refusal was not handed down it didn't prevent some more input from the public from being presented at the meeting mostly geared towards Dudley's inclusion as a part of The Last Green Valley, a multi-town national heritage corridor encompassing many communities in Connecticut and a few in southern Massachusetts. Dudley resident Kathy Hurst was the first to draw attention to the

perceived impact a cemetery or other non-agricultural use for the Corbin Road land would have on Dudley's commitment to the mission of The Last Green Valley, effectively justifying the purchase of the land by the town as preservation of the land for a greater purpose.

"It is imperative to preserve the fundamental attributes of Dudley as one of the few, only one of nine towns recognized in Massachusetts, for its lush pastures and woodlands, flora and fauna, protected species, clean streams, rivers and ponds, and forests and farmlands as well as a rich historic value for our future generations," Hurst said. "I wanted to bring this to [the Board of Selectmen's] attention because I feel that since

Dudley is recognized to be part of this national heritage corridor that we should try to maintain those places, areas and resources that are so important that it has been chosen to be part of this."

Bill Dwyer, a Corbin Road resident and member of The Last Green Valley organization, said he has been in contact with the group's executive director, Lois Bruinooge, and confirmed that the town did sign a pact in 2001 to be a part of The Last Green Valley and work with them towards the preservation of a certain atmosphere and feel for the town. With that in mind he and others believe the town purchasing the large Corbin Road plot to preserve its agricultural

status would be money well spent.

"That piece of land is under The Last Green Valley. Part of that compact, some of the points are to identify and protect important natural and cultural resources from adverse development impacts, promote and facilitate open space, promote the designation and enhancement of scenic roads, views, greenways and blueways, encourage working farms and forest lands offering economic opportunity, but also Bruinooge stated that back in the early days when Dudley and the eight other Massachusetts towns were added to the national heritage corridor all towns signed on to a community compact," Dwyer said.

The concept of purchasing the land to keep in line with the town's commitment to The Last Green Valley is only the latest in a growing list of justifications for a purchase that would cost the town around \$287,000. The question remains, will these discussions be enough for selectmen to feel taking the purchase proposal to the town at large would be necessary and will the land court case impact the town's ability to do so? Only time will tell as the saga continues in one of the biggest local stories of 2016 to date.

said he feels there is a lot to be gained by having someone work around 20 hours a week with the lone purpose of helping bring activities and social functions to the town. Dowgiewicz said he feels this individual in question could truly bring out the best Webster has to offer.

"You go to Putnam every week and there's something going on there. They have downtown festivals and whatnot and this person should be scouting out towns like that and getting information so that we can put something on the same caliber as these towns," he said. "We have a beautiful cove at the

beach where we can do a bonfire and music. There's just so much that this person could bring to the town and start bringing some life back to Webster. Our downtown is probably nicer than downtown Putnam. With our area we could have car shows that would dwarf Putnam, but we have no one to really do the leg work."

Dowgiewicz added that the position could easily see a change if the person hired doesn't perform, suggesting that the town require a certain amount of productivity from any hired individual for them to maintain the position and that the job and its limited hours would be well suited for a retiree.

Selectman Andrew Jolda put his support behind the concept saying he feels it would be a good move for the town in

the long run.

"I think it would be an excellent idea to have a dedicated individual for building up the economic development in the town, especially focusing on the arts and entertainment. We find that portions of our town are underutilized and it would be great to expand what we can offer in town," he said.

Selectman Robert Miller also called it a good idea, especially since he feels Webster needs to make a better effort to bring more well rounded events to the town to give everyone something to be excited about.

"We have to get more family-involved events going on. We used to have the antiques boats and we did all of that. That was pretty cool. Different things like that we can bring back in or add

to it maybe once a month." Miller said.

According to Acting Town Administrator Pam Leduc, the addition of the position is not out of the realm of realistic possibility and wouldn't cost the town too much at all in extra funds. With positions currently being vacated in the town and considerations of restructuring on the horizon the town will have some money to spare. Before a decision on adding the position is finalized the selectmen have requested a job description be written up which should be put before them at their next meeting later this month.

Fattman reflects on first term in State Senate

BOSTON — As the 189th General Court of the Massachusetts Legislature comes to a close, Sen. Ryan Fattman (R-Webster) detailed some of the notable legislative accomplishments of the session.

In addition to working for a more fiscally responsible budget, there has also been substantial progress made in pay equity, opioid addiction prevention, MBTA budgetary oversight, expanding renewable energy use, and campaign finance transparency.

Fattman sponsored and saw SD.2647 adopted. This established a campaign finance taskforce dedicated to investigating and ensuring the integrity, accountability and fairness of the Commonwealth's campaign finance practices. Consisting of seven members of the legislature, this taskforce will investigate into the financing practices of political action committees, individuals and unaffiliated fundraising

groups and determine whether or not they possess any undue influence over elections.

"I'm committed to giving my constituents an efficient and fair government, by the people and for the people," said Fattman.

In light of the MBTA's widespread failures during the winter of 2014-2015, Fattman co-sponsored the amendment that authorized the creation of the MBTA Fiscal and Management Control Board last year. This five-person board meets at least three times per month and reports directly to Governor Baker to reduce bureaucratic drag. Its job includes creating performance standards for the MBTA, writing both short and long term budgets and issuing monthly progress reports to the Legislature. With this board in place, the MBTA can begin increasing its operational efficiency and reduce its burden on Massachusetts taxpayers.

Landmark legislation made

its way to the Senate floor this year including Senate bill S.2119, An Act to Establish Pay Equity. This passed unanimously with bipartisan support in the Senate. This bill sought to close the gender based wage gap between women and men. In order to prevent such wage discrimination, this bill makes it illegal for an employer to demand past or current salaries in an interview as a prerequisite to being hired and allows employees to discuss openly their mutual salaries.

When asked why he supported this bill, Fattman said: "We need to set a precedent in this state that men and women must be paid the same amount for comparable amounts of work and job duties."

The bill also includes that women's promotions and seniority status can also no longer be impacted by taking maternity leave.

Opioid addiction was a major issue for both Governor Charlie Baker and legislature

this session, and both branches made progress in the fight against addiction. S.2020, An Act relative to substance use prevention, limited opioid prescriptions to first time adult patients and minors have a mandatory seven day supply limit. Before signing a prescription, doctors must first check the state-wide Prescription Monitoring Program database to prevent over prescription and drug abuse. This legislation also expands drug screening and education programs in high schools to identify and head off potential drug addictions. These provisions from the Senate were eventually incorporated into the final legislation signed by Governor Baker.

"The opiate crisis has hit every town in the state, including our district," said Fattman. "It's a bipartisan issue that we are all working together to come up with solutions for."

Lastly, the Massachusetts legislature worked to be at

the forefront in clean energy nationwide. S.2372, An Act to Promote Energy Diversity, passed with overwhelming support from both chambers and aims to diversify Massachusetts' energy portfolio. The bill mandates that local utilities receive 1,600 megawatts of their electricity from offshore wind power and that power companies have contracts for said energy sources by 2027. Promoting energy diversity will create jobs in the Commonwealth and already has begun to create a new energy market. Also included in the bill was a property-assessed clean energy program by which commercial buildings can receive funding for energy efficiency upgrades. The bill also forces energy companies to repair Grade 3 gas-leaks as soon as possible once detected. These leaks while small and classified as non-hazardous, release copious amounts of gas into the atmosphere and further impact the environment.

McKenna, Kuros, Muradian support pay equity bill

BOSTON — State Rep. Joseph McKenna (R-Webster), Kevin Kuros (R-Uxbridge), and David Muradian (R-Grafton), voted on Thursday in support of legislation designed to promote gender-neutral pay equity in the workplace.

House Bill 4509, An Act to establish pay equity, was engrossed by the House of Representatives on July 14 on a vote of 158-0. The bill seeks to ensure that men and women receive equal pay, regardless of their gender, by clearly defining "comparable work that is substantially similar in skill, effort, and responsibility."

"I'm proud to support this bill which finally puts into law what I think every person would agree is common sense; that men and women will be paid the same for the same work," said McKenna.

Under the pay equity bill, an employee who feels they have been discriminated against can pursue legal action whether or not they have previously filed a claim with the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination.

All three representatives also

acknowledged the need to craft legislation that keeps all interests in mind.

"The challenge with this type of legislation is always striking a fair balance between employer and employee interests," said Rep. Kevin Kuros, "and I believe this bill does that. It defines 'equal work' so that everyone will be paid comparably for comparable work, while still recognizing that factors such as education, experience, geography and productivity are valid elements for employers to consider when determining compensation."

"Although long overdue, today's vote helps demonstrate major progress for the residents of Massachusetts," said Muradian. "This bill not only ensures that men and women receive equal compensation, but also provides protection for both workers and employers."

The 'protection for workers' discussed refers to the allowances that were made for variations in wages based on factors such as a seniority system; a merit system; a system which measures the employee's quality or quantity of production. Employers can also vary wages based on geographic location which

accounts for costs of living; the employee's education, training or experience; or travel expenses, if travel is required as a regular and necessary condition of the job.

"I was happy to see these legitimate protections for business owners built into the bill," McKenna added. "This ensures we don't unintentionally damage our job creators in the worthy pursuit of equal pay."

These protections to the bill, which is to take effect on July 1, 2018, led to the business interest groups Associated Industries of Massachusetts and the Massachusetts Business Roundtable to offer their positive endorsements of the legislation.

Additional measures in House Bill 4509 include:

Providing employers with an affirmative defense against a claim of wage discrimination if the business has completed a self-evaluation of its pay practices within the previous three years and can demonstrate that it is making reasonable progress towards eliminating gender-based wage disparities.

Prohibits employers who are found

to be in violation of the law from reducing any employee's wages to come into compliance.

Prohibiting hiring managers from inquiring about a prospective employee's salary history, or to contact a former employer for this information, until after a formal job offer has been made.


The creation of a special commission to investigate, analyze and study the factors, causes and impact of pay disparity based on race, color, religious creed, national origin, gender identity, sexual orientation, genetic information, ancestry, disability, and military status. The commission must report back to the Legislature with its findings no later than Jan. 1, 2019.

The Senate previously approved its own version of the pay equity bill in January. A six-member conference committee is expected to be appointed to try to work out the differences between the two bills before the end of formal sessions on July 31.
