DUDLEY – Town officials are responding to complaints from commuters and residents concerning flooding that occurred on Thursday, Aug. 19 in the area of Mason Road with ongoing roadwork and an unexpected amount of rain being blamed for the incident.

Like many roads in Dudley and surrounding towns, Mason Road and the adjacent West Main Street were flooded with several inches of rain fell within a couple of hours on Aug. 19 during a storm that also produced a tornado that touched down in nearby Thompson, Conn. The flooding along Mason Road in particular brought complaints to the Board of Selectmen who discussed the situation during a meeting on Aug. 23. It was then that Water & Sewer Superintendent George Patrinos explained that the flooding was due to a variety of factors including the heavy rainfall but also acknowledged that the ongoing construction on that roadway certainly didn't help.

"You don't expect four inches of rain in an hour's time. It's going to do damage to any road. The project is almost three-quarters done now and I did have them pave it up to a certain point before the so-called hurricane came through. That's still not going to help very much. We're still in the midst of putting in services. Still in the midst of tying into side streets. Certain areas can't be done yet until other areas are done," said Patrinos.

Mason Road and West Main Street weren't the only areas flooded during the Aug. 19 storm which predated Hurricane Henri's arrival that Saturday that caused much less flooding due to dropping steadier rain through a longer period of time. Center Road was also heavily flooded leading the Dudley Fire Department to assist several stranded vehicles. The Mason Road situation seemed to cause the most stress for commuters however and Patrinos said his crew responded to the situation as effectively as possible.

"I had the contractor immediately bring his guys out from Ludlow and I met them at the area with my crew and we ended up trying to clean the place up including West Main Street and everything. I think we got it done in a couple of hours. We try to respond to everything we can. Some of those ruts aren't always ours because National Grid has been working in there too along with another contractor doing some tie-ins up Mason Road, so you've got three different agencies performing work there and we just never expected to get belted by rain like this," Patrinos said.

Scott Zajkowski, Chair of Dudley's Water & Sewer Commission, also commended the contractors for their work to help relieve the flooding. The general consensus seemed to be that while the flooding certainly wasn't the best-case scenario or convenient for commuters, the weather is never under the town's control.

"During that heavy storm, after the contractor got finished cleaning up the area that needed to get cleaned up, they spent a couple of hours with their equipment helping to deal with flooding with a couple of residents in that area as well. Stuff they didn't have to do," Zajkowski told selectmen. "I was talking with one of the bosses and he didn't want me to say anything, but I felt it was

DESE orders masking in schools

OXFORD – Sometimes, events at the state level supersede what local officials choose.

In early August, the School Committee heard from a pair of parents urging against a mask mandate within the schools and in favor of keeping it as parental choice. The School Committee essentially agreed, noting they had not voted on the issue either way, but were watching it closely.

On Aug. 25, the state Board of Elementary and Secondary Education authorized Commissioner Jeff Riley to require masking, and his order calls for all public school students over age 5, staff and visitors "to wear masks indoors" but not outdoors "until at least Oct 1." The rule applies to buses, indoor sports and other things, but also allows for mask breaks and exceptions for musical instruments, and

puts the onus for discipline on the district.

"After Oct. 1, 2021, if a school demonstrates a vaccination rate of 80 percent or more of students and staff in the school, then vaccinated individuals in that school would no longer be subject to the DESE mask requirement," Riley's order states.

The state mandate prompted the Committee to cancel a planned public forum on the issue.

Back on Aug. 9, Sarah Baribeau told the committee she was considering homeschooling both of her children because she opposed mandating both masks and vaccination, although one child wants to return to school. She expressed concern about skin and lung issues from masking and "social problems when they can't understand, can't learn when they can't see lips."

She also argued the Centers for Disease

Control and Prevention website stated the "Delta variant is inconsequential." While it may have at one time, that was not the case as of Aug. 26. Then, CDC said Delta "was more infectious and was leading to increased transmissibility when compared with other variants, even in some vaccinated individuals" and had become "the predominant variant in the United States."

In early August, the committee and new Superintendent Michael Lucas were still awaiting state guidance; at the time masks were "strongly recommended" but not required, as they had been last school year, Lucas noted. He said the district was planning for all students to be in school in person, but also expected a DESE mask mandate.

According to Head Nurse Amy Grniet, who

Dudley selectmen approve CDBG applications

DUDLEY – The Dudley Board of Selectmen held a public hearing providing further insight into a pair of projects that could be funded through the Fiscal Year 2021 Community Development Block Grant.

Andrew Loew of the Central Massachusetts Regional Planning Commission joined selectmen on Aug. 23 for a brief public hearing where he presented the details of two project applications for CDBG funding for the current fiscal year. The first will see a continuation of a previous CDBG project, the Jericho-Brandon Infrastructure Project.

"This would be First Avenue between Brandon Road and George Street. That's a project that has come out of the Jericho-Brandon Infrastructure Plan – It would be the first step of implementing that plan," said Loew.

The Jericho-Brandon Infrastructure Project is a much-discussed initiative that also utilized funding from the 2019 round of CDBG funding. The project involves design and construction of infrastructure improvements in the area of Brandon Road and the Jericho neighborhood of Dudley including new water mains, sewer

Fire Chief urges residents to stay vigilant with weather

DUDLEY – It was a tale of two storms in Dudley in mid-August, as the community dealt with heavy flooding from rainfall on Aug. 19, followed by a much weaker-than-expected Tropical Storm Henri that hit only days later, on Sunday, Aug. 22.

The two storms highlight the duality of New England's weather in recent years with one being a surprise storm that came out of nowhere to cause issues for commuters and create a busy afternoon for safety officials while the other more talked about storm had much less of an impact on the region as meteorologists predicted.

Regardless of the situation, Dudley

event is its own storm and while some might be underwhelming others can be much more destructive. While the chief admitted that Hurricane Henri ended up being "the storm that wasn't," he also acknowledged that weather patterns are changing, and the region can expect to experience new weather anomalies for years to come.

"As everybody says, and it's in the news, climate change has a big effect on all of this, and I think moving forward we're going to see more storms like this," said the chief. "It's probably going to continue to get worse. It's just the way things are playing out as time goes on. I think we'll just need to have a level of preparedness going forward because I think these things are going to happen more often moving forward."

Longtime New Englanders might be used to some storms being less impactful than the weather person might predict, but Chief Kochanowski said this should not encourage people to underestimate Mother Nature. In the case of Hurricane Henri, path projections up to the day of landfall estimated at least three different potential paths the storm could take including one that would have put the hurricane right over the region causing massive damage. The chief urged citizens to take these possibilities seriously and always be prepared in any storm scenario.

"You have to have a heightened awareness and treat every storm as an individual event. You can't group every weather incident together. You have to take each one separately," the chief stated. "Meteorology isn't an exact science, as we're aware. The next time, it could say it will miss and we could take a direct hit. If they say a storm is coming, I recommend you have a level

of awareness as you would for every big storm. Don't let your guard down.'

Among the chief's safety recommendation was to shelter in place. During the Aug. 19 rainfall, commuters attempting to drive through flooded roadways had to be towed out of their situations. These individuals had much less warning than the entire region had for the hurricane where the chief said very few incidents were recorded as locals stayed at home to ride out what the storm did bring. Other recommendations were to have a generator prepared and ready for power outages, shelf-stable food and bottled water in hand and backup pumps ready to go for those homes prone to cellar flooding. Dudley citizens can also register with Smart911 on the town's Web site to receive alerts about incoming weather events.





Designing gardens for year-round color and protecting your investment

Create a colorful year-round garden filled with flowers, greenery, colorful fruit, fall color, winter interest and a few surprises. Consider seasonal interest when planning a new garden or landscape. Adding a few key plants to existing gardens can help boost your landscape's seasonal appeal.

Include a variety of plants with multiple seasons of interest as well as bird and pollinator appeal. You will look forward to the change of seasons as your landscape transforms throughout the vear.

Use trees and shrubs to provide the framework and longevity in your landscape. Serviceberries, crabapples, dogwoods, and many others have flowers, fruit, pollinator, and bird appeal and add winter interest with their bark or form. Look for those with colorful exfoliating bark like paperbark maple, heptacodium, and river birch for a beautiful statement in the winter garden.

Include a few summer blooming shrubs like St John's wort, buttonbush, panicle hydrangeas and Rose of Sharon. They add an unexpect-

ed fresh look to your summer landscape.

Perennials combine nicely with trees, He sold his camera, shrubs, and annuals, adding seasons of color and texture. Include those that also attract songbirds. bees, and butterflies by creating a beautiful

> habitat. Blue star (Amsonia), Siberian iris, sedum, Rudbeckia, coneflower, and grasses are just a few that can brighten any garden with several seasons of color, provide homes for beneficial insects and food for the birds.

> End the season with fall bloomers like goldenrod, asters, and hardy mums. These provide food for late season pollinators. Leave healthy plants stand, providing homes for many beneficial insects, winter interest in the garden, and food for the songbirds.

> Use annuals to fill any voids, add season long color and yearly changes in the landscape. Containers on steps, decks and patios help bring the garden to your front and back door.

Include spring flowering bulbs like tulips, daffodils and hyacinths planted in fall for a colorful welcome to spring. These and many of the earliest bloomers like winter aconites, grape hyacinths, and crocus provide needed nectar for early season pollinators.

Evergreens are always a welcome addition to any landscape. They provide shelter for the birds and year-round greenery. Find new and interesting ways to include them in your landscape.

Use taller evergreens for screening bad views, buffering traffic and other noises, or creating privacy. Use ever-

greens with interesting form and texture to create a focal point in a garden bed or landscape. Combine them perennials and flowering shrubs for added seasonal interest.

Then keep your landscape looking its best by protecting key plants

from hungry critters like deer, rabbits and voles. Skip the fencing and scare tactics by applying a rain resistant, organic repellent like Plantskydd (plantskydd. com) at planting. You will need fewer applications and the odor-based repellent sends animals dining elsewhere before taking a bite out of your plants. Apply repellent before animals start feeding and follow the label directions

for best results. Continue to gather ideas with visits to public gardens and partaking in garden tours. Be sure to take notes and pictures that you can reference later. Creating a year-round landscape is an ongoing process that is part of the fun and adventure of gardening.


which gave him enough money for a one-way train ticket to Hollywood, Calif., and the rest is history.

I cannot tell you how depressed I feel, how I long to see my grandchildren,

the home where I was raised, and the church which I attended.

You would not understand my fears, my longings, my anxieties.

But when you are old, then you will understand.

Someone once asked Jesus Christ "What is the greatest commandment of God?" to which He responds "To love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul and with all vour mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it. You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets."

I often repeat that the essence of our Orthodox Christian faith is divine love. First and foremost, God loves us. He loves each one of us in an unconditional way. His love doesn't depend on what we do, or who we are. He created each one of us out of His divine love. Thus, we are children of love, created to be loved and then to love one another. Jesus' teaching simply reminds us about our true nature of love. It is thus only natural that the greatest commandment that summarizes our entire faith is love - to love the One who created us and to love the others around us, who are created in God's own

It seems so natural to love because we all want to be loved. Yet, because we live in a fallen world, it sometimes seems easier to focus on ourselves rather than on others. The evil within us distorts and destroys our natural tendency to love. Instead of doing what seems so normal - to love one another - our egocentric desires mislead us. We first hold our love back against those we don't like - whether they are people who have hurt us, people who are different from us. or those we consider our enemies. It seems easy to justify not loving such people, even though our Lord concretely commands us to love even our enemies.

What excuse do we have, however, to not love our family members, our relatives and friends, our former parishioners, our neighbors and co-workers? For example, what about those

who have become old and have left our sight because they now live in nursing homes, in assisted living, or even remain homebound? Why would we hold back our love from those who have loved us when a part of our

who have loved us and been a part of our lives in the past?

Is it because we have skewed our priorities? Maybe we have fooled ourselves by equating our "busyness" with importance? Maybe we are too self-centered, that we focus only on what makes us feel good? How often I hear people say "I don't like going to the nursing homes because it makes me feel uncomfortable, it smells and I don't like seeing people that way." Maybe we are afraid to face the elderly because they remind us of our own mortality? We live in a society that tries to deny growing older, puts a superficial face on growing older and wants to reject the eventuality of death. In the end, we simply don't visit those in nursing homes.

When was the last time you visited an elderly person in a nursing home? What about those who are elderly and homebound? What about our own grandparents, parents, aunts and uncles, dear friends and others who may be dwelling in loneliness.

Ultimately, Christ's beautiful teachings about love are meaningless if we don't allow them to take root and spur us to concrete action. Can we all make a decision to go and visit someone this week? Visit a nursing home. Visit a homebound friend. Make a phone call and drop a love note. Remember those who have been a part of our lives in the past and allow them to still be a part of our lives in the present! Not only will they be appreciative but we also will feel greatly blessed. For whenever we love others, God's love only shines all the more brightly within us.

Emergency notifications

Widespread emergency notification has always been a challenge for public safety officials. Advances in technology have assisted us in this effort. Back in 2003, Dudley was the first community in the state to use the AMBER Alert system to locate missing children. Fortunately, that large-scale

media notification worked, and the children were returned safely. Several years ago, we began using technology to send area wide phone calls and messages to alert residents in times of emergency. These are commonly called "Reverse 911" messages. I wanted to advise residents of our current system and provide some further information on how it works.

The Town of Dudley currently uses a system known as "Smart 911." Through this technology, we can send hundreds of phone calls and messages to our residents within a very short period. This can be done for situations such as states of emergency, missing children, health emergencies, and other times when important information must be given fast. We have sent many of these in relation to the COVID-19 situation, and several have gone out for the water main projects taking place in town. This has been very effective. We understand, these calls cannot be used in every situation, since the danger is they may become routine. People then may start to ignore them. This could have serious implications, so we are selective of the situations in which they are used. Last week, we had a tornado warning in our area. One in fact touched down in nearby Thompson, Conn. I was asked by a resident why our local emergency alert was not sent in addition to the statewide notice. Reason being, those are sent out through the National Weather Service, and they are given priority access to all media and phones for these alerts. Any effort on our part to do the same would most likely be several minutes behind, due to the manual data entry and authorization process. Since everyone is sent multiple messages by them, their system is most effective for that purpose.

Published residential and business phone listings are available to us for our system. Cell phones are not included in our regular data base, and depending on the timing of the message, you may not receive a notification. Many people with unlisted numbers may also not receive calls. If you are not receiving messages, registration information is available on-line on the Town website www.dudleyma.gov. Click onto the Residents tab and then Disaster Recovery. There, you will have the ability to register on-line for this service. If you do not have a computer or are uncomfortable to do this, feel free to contact our police or fire departments and someone should be able to assist you in signing up. In addition, some residents may not wish to be contacted for these emergencies. The system can remove numbers from the notification list as well. Simply follow the same method as registering or once again, contact either the police or fire department. This program enables everyone to be notified quickly about emergencies in town. There is no cost and little work on your part. If you are not receiving these messages, please



Fall means trout fishing

As we enter the month of September, many freshwater anglers are thinking about the fall trout fishing season in Massachusetts. As the waters start to cool from the extremely warm temperatures of this summer, anglers need to be aware that Massachusetts Fish & Wildlife will not stock trout until the waters are suitable to sustain the freshly stocked trout. It may be until October before the waters are cool enough to see a trout stocking. It is hard to believe that the Gulf has 90 Degree surface water temperatures this past week, prior to Hurricane Ida!

Saltwater fishing continues to improve on all fronts in both Massachusetts and Rhode Island, with schools of mackerel along the South shore of the Island. Fluke & seabass fishing also remains very good at the Island. Tuna were being caught around the Gully! Albi are showing up in both Mass. & Rhode Island waters. These hard fighting fish provide some great fishing for anglers using light tackle and fly rods. They do



not provide good eating; however, some anglers do take a few home for table fare. Saltwater fishing should explode with action on all fronts in the coming weeks.

Ten local sportsmen left for Maine this past weekend to enjoy a bit of bear hunting that opened up this past Monday statewide. Bear hunters are allowed to set up bait hunting spots prior to hunting season. Hunters are allowed to use crossbows, compound bows, shotgun, etc. to harvest their bear in Maine. It should be a good year for hunting bear in Maine, if the weather cools off. Hunting bear in Massachusetts is open in all zones again this year, and a permit that costs only \$5 is required. Be sure to check all hunting regulations before the season opens on Sept. 7.

Second season opens Nov. 1, and the third season opens for shotgun Nov. 29.

Have you checked your status for an antlerless deer permit? Go to the Mass. Fish Hunt Web site to see if you have won a permit. If you did, you will need to pay a \$5 fee. If you did not win a permit, you can still apply for an antlerless deer permit starting on September. The antlerless surplus deer permits go fast. The permits will be in zones 9, 10, 11, 13 & 14. Zone 11 will go on sale Tuesday, Sept. 28 at 9 a.m. It will be a staggered system. Zone 10 will go on sale Wednesday, Sept. 29 at 9 a.m. Zone 9, including 13 & 14, Tuesday. Sept. 30 at 9 a.m. Number of surplus deer permits available in zone 9, 1,410 Zone 10 - 9,092 & Zone 11 7,770 Zone 13 2,526 and Zone 14, 2,619.

Harvest Canning Tips

It's harvest season and Farmer's Markets are selling tomatoes and cukes in bulk, workshops on preserving produce are filling up fast and canning jar manufacturers report double digit hikes in sales. There's no doubt about it, canning continues to make a comeback!

Whether canning in bulk to use up garden vegetables or filling a few jelly jars for holiday gifts, the following information is geared toward helping your preserving efforts pay off in both financial and "feel good" benefits.

Not sure if canning is worth the work? Consider the many "perks" of processing food at home, which include:

*The ability to control the salt, sugar and additive content of the foods you intend to preserve.

* Studies show foods canned at peak ripeness offer superior nutrition and flavor despite the typical loss of vitamins during the heating pro-

*Processing foods also allows seasonal fruits and vegetables to be enjoyed throughout the

*Since the canning process doesn't rely on refrigeration for preservation, canned foods are readily available and safe during power outages or appliance shut downs.

One of the joys of canning is the ability to literally put the fruits of your garden labor on the dinner table. For those who don't grow their own foods, a trip to a farmer's market or neighborhood farm stand can reap bushels of freshly picked produce. Don't be afraid to ask for "seconds" and/ or discounts on less than perfect but perfectly fine produce. Just be sure to overlook those with obvious bruises or major imperfections.

Common backyard garden vegetables such as tomatoes and cucumbers are popular candidates for canning as they offer a variety of finished products from condiments to side dishes. Best of all, a few old fashioned canning recipes can transform the versatile garden favorites into glistening jars of pantry staples. For example, tomatoes can be prepped to be canned as tomato sauce, tomato soup, tomato juice, salsa, ketchup, and more. Cucumbers transform into sweet gherkins, dill pickles, chow chow and a variety of relishes. Orchard fruits such as apples and peaches can be processed as jelly, butter, chutney, pie filling, syrups and sauces.

Before choosing a preferred method of processing be sure to study the options, all of which are available in canning "how to" books or online. For safety's sake be sure your resources are up to date, since processing recommendations have changed in the past several years. A new edition of the classic Ball Blue Book is always useful. Online, a reliable and free resource titled "U.S. Department of Agriculture's "Complete Guide to Home Canning," is available and can be accessed by visiting www.uga.edu/nchfp/ publications/publications_usda.html.

Here are some simple canning "tips from the

pros" worth noting: *Never use overripe fruit. A good rule of thumb to remember is that canning can't improve the quality of food, so always begin with top quality fruits, ripe and free of bruises.

Don't be tempted to over do the celery, peppers, onions and other low acid ingredient in pickles or other recipes. Stick to the recipe to avoid creating an unsafe

product. *Never add considerably more spices or seasonings than a recipe calls for. Some spices can be high in bacteria and too much of a good thing can put your safety at risk.

*Be sure to wash hands

and all food prep surfaces and all canning supplies thoroughly before starting the canning process,

^kAlways wash and examine all foods to be canned. Be sure to cut out any bruises and discard any overripe fruits and vegetables.

*Never reuse canning jar lids. Be sure to seal jars with a new, clean lid each and every time.

*Do not store filled iars above 95° F or near hot pipes, a range, a furnace, in a non insulated attic, or in direct sunlight. Under these conditions food will lose quality in a few weeks or months and may spoil.

*Don't store jars in damp areas such as a basement. Dampness may corrode metal lids, break seals, and encourage spoilage.

Pepper Jelly

This jelly, which uses up the last of the season's garden peppers, makes a festive holiday gift.

Ingredients: 3 green bell peppers, minced; 2 (4 ounce) cans diced jalapeno peppers

1 1/2 cups distilled white vinegar; 6 1/2 cups white sugar; 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper; 1 (6 fluid ounce) container liquid pectin; 5 drops green food coloring.

Directions: In a large, stainless steel saucepan, combine peppers, vinegar, sugar, and cayenne pepper. Cook over medium high heat. Stir frequently until mixture begins to boil.

Stir in pectin; boil 5 minutes longer, stirring constantly, and mix in food coloring. Skim off foam, and remove from heat.

Ladle into sterilized jars. Seal and process in a boiling-water canner for 5 minutes.

Apple Chutney It's apple season in New England and this chutney, made from freshly picked fruit, will be the perfect accompaniment to upcoming holiday Ingredients: 2 quarts

chopped, cored, pared tart apples (about 10 medium); 1 cup chopped onions; 1 cup chopped sweet red bell peppers (about 2 medium); 2 hot red peppers, seeded and chopped; 11/2 pounds seedless raisins; 4 cups brown sugar; 3 tablespoons mustard seed; 2 tablespoons ground ginger; 2 tablespoons ground allspice; 2 teaspoons canning salt; 1 clove garlic, crushed; 1 quart white vinegar (5%).

Directions: Combine all ingredients; simmer until thick, about 1 hour and 15 minutes. As mixture thickens stir frequently to prevent sticking. Pour boiling hot chutney into hot jars, leaving ½ inch headspace. Remove air bubbles and adjust headspace if needed. Wipe rims of jars with a dampened clean paper towel; adjust two-piece metal canning lids. Process in boiling water canner according to the altitude recommendations below. Makes about six pint jars.

Recommended process time for Apple Chutney pints in a boiling water canner (altitude chart): 1-1,000 ft, 10 minutes; 1,001-6,000 ft, 15 minutes; above 6,000 ft, 20 minutes.





What maintenance schedule does my car need?

Vehicle maintenance schedules vary depending on manufacturer recommendations. In addition, the way a car is driven and the environment it's driven in can dictate if routine maintenance like oil changes needs to occur more frequently or if belts and hoses need to be replaced sooner than manufacturers recommend.

Many people drive in ways that align with routine maintenance schedules. However, drivers who put excessive wear and tear on their vehicles may have to follow a "severe" maintenance schedule. · Urban driving: Stopand-go traffic in an urban setting can wear cars out more quickly than highdriving. Experts say lubricants found in motor oil break down rapidly under these and other conditions, including especially hot temperatures.

· Short trips: Frequent, short trips can take a toll on a vehicle. Again, this may be a problem for those who reside in cities or bustling suburbs. Short trips of no more than five miles can contribute to an accumulation of water vapor that dilutes motor oil and adversely affects its effi-

Heavy loads: Advanced Auto Parts says transporting or towing heavy loads can put more wear and tear on a vehicle. Loads can include cargo or passen-

· Dusty or salty environments: Dust can accumulate in air filters and clog internal engine components. Similarly, living close to the coast and salt water also can cause car parts to rust or degrade quickly.

• Extreme temperature conditions: People who reside in extremely cold or extremely hot climates



may find that their vehicles have to work that much harder to operate, reducing the life span of automotive fluids, parts (especially car batteries) and the overall vehicle unless action is tak

For those who freencounter quently these severe conditions, switching to a severe maintenance schedule with the guidance of an automotive service shop

of more frequent fluid changes and other maintenance can be recuperated by fewer breakdowns and the reduced need for potentially costly repairs.

Signs headlights may need to be replaced

Automobiles require a little TLC to stay on the road and operate efficiently. When vehicle maintenance is ignored, vehicles operate less efficiently and, in many instances, less safely as

Jerking and stalling is a telltale sign of engine trouble, but some vehicle problems are more subtle. One such problem is fading headlights. Fading headlights can pose a significant threat to drivers and their passengers as well as fellow motorists. According to the National Safety Council, drivers do only one-quarter of their driving at night. However, the NSC notes that 50 percent of traffic deaths occur at night. Such figures highlight the potential dangers of nighttime driving, which only becomes more dangerous if headlights are not operating at optimal capacity.

Dimming

The buildup of dirt and grime can reduce light output even when the headlights are otherwise fine. If your car is dirty, take it to the car wash and make sure the headlights are scrubbed clean of dirt and grime. Then drive at night to see if the light output of your headlights is still dim. If so, the headlight bulbs may need to be


replaced.

Flickering Flickering headlights can indicate anything from worn out headlight bulbs to a weak car battery to loose connections. Flickering is one of the more dangerous headlight issues, as it can lead to headlights suddenly going dark while drivers are on the road at night. If headlights are flickering, take the car to a mechanic as soon as possible to have the issue resolved.

One light out

When one headlight goes dark, chances are the other is not far behind. Automotive experts recommend replacing headlight bulbs in pairs, even if only one bulb has gone dark, because this ensures equal light output.

Headlight maintenance tends to be overlooked. But recognizing the signs of fading headlights can help drivers avoid accidents and vastly improve the safety of nighttime driving.

their own time after dealing with the cleanup helping to deal with flooding along with working side by side with a couple of firefighters pumping a significant amount of water from at least one person's basement. They were aware of the issues, and they were there to help,"

Selectmen asked Patrinos to ensure that information was provided on the town website and social media when appropriate to implore commuters to avoid Mason Road if possible to allow construction to progress smoothly. As of Aug. 24, the day after the Board of Selectmen meeting discussion, a notice has been posted on the Water & Sewer Department page of the Dudley Town Website asking residents to "try to avoid Mason Road due to construction" and stating that work should be completed "by mid-to-end of September." Patrinos personally requested commuters avoid that road during the Aug. 23 meeting.

'People know the road is being worked on and a lot of them still want to drive it. Maybe they think it's easy to get that way. My recommendation is if you don't have to use Mason Road don't use it," said Patrinos. "Just go around until we can get everything under control. We're trying our best to maintain the road integrity, but this weather has just not been the type of weather we're used to seeing.

appropriate to say they spent a lot of is also the district's liaison to the Board of Health, 12-15 year olds are about 30-percent vaccinated and ages 16-19 about 50 percent, while Oxford's elder population is "in the 90s." Case numbers in town were higher than last year at the same time two cases then, 20 as of early August this year.

Regarding Baribeau's mask concern, Grniet said that's 'mostly in certain [hot] weather," but there's "no hard data" that indoor use causes harm. Likewise, while there was not much data on mental health effects of masks, there has been some work on Covid's impact as a whole, she noted.

Covid also posed a budgetary issue for the district. Business Manager Justin Leduc noted his department was trying to figure out how to properly apply local special education transportation funds since "Covid is not recognized as an

exemption" from federal "maintenance of effort" rules. At the time, the district had until Aug. 22 to spend about \$480,000 in federal funding, but was "short on the maintenance of effort" by about \$300,000, he reported.

Leduc noted he'd talked to other districts who were in similar situations, and said the issue might become an audit finding. He has been applying relevant exemptions, but didn't think there'd be enough to cover the total.

"There's got to be a solution where we don't find ourselves in the same predicament again," even if Covid continues, observed committee member Palmina Griffin. She added she expects to have to pay back some of the federal money next April, and noted Oxford "didn't purposely do this."

repairs and limited paving and pedestrian improvements as well as surface drainage improvement. The project budget is \$578,000, higher than original expectations due partially to the increased cost of material due to the pandemic.

The second project would be the continuation of the housing rehab program, yet another project previously supported by other CDBG funds through a partnership with Millbury. If the current application is successful, it would be Dudley specific rather than sharing the monies with another town.

"Housing rehab is assistance to eligible low to moderate income homeowners in town so they can make code mandated repairs and other home improvements," said Loew.

The housing rehab initiatives would be implemented by the Pioneer Valley Planning Commission in partnership with the CMRPC. The application is seeking up to the maximum \$800,000 limit for this year's program. Town

Administrator Jonathan Ruda stated this project in particular has been in high demand in the community.

"We had a big outpouring of support for this. A lot of people were interested in the housing rehabilitation program and then COVID kind of slowed everything down and we just recently have got the momentum back on the first grant round. When they moved the deadline back on the second grant there were still people that hadn't been served that were interested in the program, so it was a natural (move)," said

Selectmen unanimously approved both grant project applications to be submitted for consideration. The deadline for applications is Sept. 10 and communities aren't expected to learn of any awarded funding until at least January of 2022.
