SWENSEN HONORED AT FINAL MEETING

Charlton Selectman Rick Swensen bids farewell

CHARLTON – With Charlton's municipal elections taking place this weekend, the Board of Selectmen bid farewell to a long-running member on April 24 as selectman Rick Swensen was honored during his final meeting.

A former Recreation Committee member and former chair and vice chair of the Board of Selectmen, Swensen has spent 12 years on the board and confirmed his retirement from local politics earlier this year. During the

April 24 meeting his fellow board members acknowledged his extensive involvement and leadership contributions to the town over his many years of service and presented him with a citation and his name plaque before offering their final words of thanks to their comrade.

Chairman Joe Szafarowicz was the first to acknowledge Swensen in one of many emotional farewells where the board's leader complimented Swensen on his commitment to Charlton and for being a leader to everyone who has joined the board over the last 12 years.

"He's someone I looked up to every meeting who really helped cement the way I approached this job and I think really set the tone for this board for these past years. He's selflessly served the town of Charlton throughout many roles, but for the past 12 years on the Board of Selectmen. He's someone who has tirelessly fought for all the interests of the town through many different battles including budget battles and fighting one of the biggest corporations on Earth," Szafarowicz said.

During his time on the Board of Selectmen Swensen has been instrumental in leading Charlton through two economic downturns and the battle with Exxon Mobile that resulted in financial compensations to the town despite public doubt town leaders would be

## Town and 508 International settle complaint

The town has settled its complaint with the 508 International LLC and the lawsuit filed on behalf of the town concerning the original violations of that company of the building and site plans filed for use of the property on Brookfield Road.

The property, which also shares property in Sturbridge, is intended as use for several venues; and the town alleges the property was developed in violation of the original site plan decisions made in 2015.

Provided the following terms are reached, the town has agreed to approve the already scheduled events at 508, including the Bushcraft and several upcoming events already advertised. This hinges on the terms and conditions of site plan approvals as required.

All parties have resolved the issues to satisfaction however, and the following terms

have been reached:

As soon as possible, but in any event prior to May 31, 508 will file an application with the town's Planning Board to clarify and revise the Site Plan decision to remove any reference to the list of activities in dispute, and the town agrees so this administrative clarification of the Site Plan does not require a new public hearing, but further recognize and agree that the decision of whether to treat the request as an administrative clarification shall be within the sole discretion of the Planning Board. The parties further agree that removal of any reference to the Activity List shall remove a prohibition of uses allowed by right not requiring site plan review (e.g. campground) but shall not constitute approval of the activities listed therein

## Dudley-Charlton to remain level on school choice numbers

Following a brief public hearing and discussion on April 25, the Dudley-Charlton Regional School Committee has agreed to maintain the school choice slots being vacated by outgoing seniors, but will add no new slots to their student body for the upcoming school year.

The discussion began with an initial public hearing at the beginning of the meeting where

only Superintendent Gregg Desto offered comments detailing the rocky history the district has had when it comes to managing the needs of school choice students and the budget requirements needs of the local schools.

"We began participating in the school choice program a little over 10 years ago as a way of improving budget conditions and over the years we've continued in the program for the

same main reason although it's important to know that we've enjoyed working with some truly outstanding students through this program as well," Desto said. "A few years ago, we got to the point where maybe we would have liked to back off our reliance on school choice a bit, but the budget conditions

Maya Belmonte will portray Captain von Trapp and Maria von Trapp respectively, and while they certainly feel the pressure of leading the way in this production both are excited for the audience to experience "The Sound of Music" through the eyes of the young actors of Charlton Middle School.

"This is only my second year doing drama and I'm really enjoying this year and this play, but it can get tricky," McKenzie said during a break from practice. "Forgetting your lines or the dance moves or which song is next can trip you up sometimes, but you push through it. In the end only two shows matter. It's what we prepare for the whole time. You have to be a good singer, not just a good actor so that adds to the pressure a bit."

For Belmonte, this play is more than just an opportunity to act on stage, it's a chance for her to step into a role she has treasured as a fan of "The Sound of Music" her whole life.

"There are a lot of lines so there's a lot to memorize. There's dances and a lot of songs so it can be tricky, but it gets easier after you practice a lot," Belmonte said. "I've seen the musical over and

over again, so the songs are pretty easy for me. It's just learning who sings what and getting the parts right. This is exciting for me. I was surprised I got the role. I just want to do my best and try my hardest to be the best Maria out there on the stage."

Both stars have cherished their time in the spotlight, but they acknowledge they have had to endure some tough trials along the way. McKenzie said one of the toughest things for him was getting into character and understanding the mindset of Captain von Trapp.

"You try to understand how your character lived and find key points in the character people haven't explored before," McKenzie said. "Putting yourself in the character's shoes is tough. You have to feel the story. This is based on real events. This actually happened and it's really amazing to be able to act out something that was a story in real life."

Belmonte's struggles were a little more personal as she had to endure a health scare early in the practice process, but she has recovered nicely to embrace her role to the fullest.

"I just found out this year that I have a medical condition so at the beginning when I found out I'd be Maria I was in the hospital, so it was hard for me to get the energy to do everything," Belmonte said. "That made it difficult to me but I'm better now, I'm ready and can't wait to show everyone what we put together."

"The Sound of Music" will be showing twice at Charlton Middle School Auditorium this weekend. This Saturday, May 5 the opening show will take place at 7 p.m. and a matinee will close out the weekend on Sunday, May 6 at 3 p.m. All tickets are \$6 at the door.

## Supplemental budget includes local prerequisites

BOSTON—Senator Anne M. Gobi (D-Spencer) and the Massachusetts Senate passed a \$156.4M supplemental budget to cover increased caseloads and time sensitive deficiencies in Fiscal Year 2018, including additional funding for regional transit authorities, local school districts' special education costs and programs for Massachusetts children and families.

Recognizing the financial challenges regional transit authorities across the state face in providing reliable, affordable transportation, the supplemental budget invests an additional \$4 million in these services. When asked about the increased funding Senator Gobi had this to say, "I have attended meetings and have listened to friends and neighbors whose quality of life would be changed by the reduction or loss of bus service. As the Senate Chair of the Regional Transportation Caucus, I was glad to work for increased funding and will continue to throughout the entire budget process."

Contained in the bill is an amendment sponsored by Senator Gobi that removes language previously barring towns from applying for MassWorks grants with populations under 7,000. "Our 136 small towns, including 13 in my Senate district, should not be placed at an unfair advantage," said Senator Gobi. "My amendment, which passed unanimously, removes onerous language that prevented the opportunity to apply for road and bridge grants on a yearly basis. This change can potentially bring in millions more to our small towns for needed infrastructure."

Another program Senator Gobi has been an avid champion for, the Healthy Incentives Program, gained a much needed boost to the tune of \$2.2 million to increase access to nutritious foods for low-income residents, "It is great to see successful programs that promote local agriculture and healthy foods. Outdoor Farmers Markets will be opening soon so it was necessary to add funding for the start of the season."

Senator Gobi was also proud to co-sponsor an amendment that addressed municipal police training funding. The amendment creates a dedicated funding stream by adding a \$2 fee per rental car transaction in the

Commonwealth which will create a steady flow of income and allow the Municipal Police Training Committee to maintain critical services and expand training, "I appreciate the work my police chiefs and officers do to protect our communities, said Senator Gobi. "They want to make sure they have the best training possible for their safety and ours. Creating a dedicated revenue stream to accomplish that makes sense and the unanimous vote showed my support and that of all my colleagues."

The supplemental budget also includes \$12.5 million for the Special Education Circuit Breaker, increasing reimbursements to school districts for the high cost of educating students with disabilities.

Additional investments include:  
 \$25.6M for Transitional Aid to Families with Dependent Children grants  
 \$21.1M for the operation of the Commonwealth's county sheriffs  
 \$19.3M for Emergency Assistance Family Shelters  
 \$15.5M for recently ratified collective bargaining agreements  
 \$5.3M for veterans' benefits  
 \$4.5M to support payroll costs at the Department of Correction payroll and \$2M to support payroll costs at the Department of Developmental Services  
 \$2.5M for services for hurricane evacuees residing in Massachusetts  
 \$2M for DCF Family Resource Centers to support increased demand for services from hurricane evacuees  
 \$1M to support the Prevention and Wellness Trust Fund  
 \$150K for the Municipal Naloxone Bulk Purchasing Trust Fund

The bill will now be reconciled with a version passed by the House of Representatives.

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simply dictated that we needed to continue. Now we've come to a point where I think we need to remain whole in this area, but not increase our numbers or our class sizes."

No other citizens or committee members participated in the brief public hearing, which was followed by further discussion nearly an hour later as Desto made his official recommendation that the district continue to offer school choice, but limit any new incoming students to simply succeed outgoing students in the coming school year. This would be opening only the 33 vacated slots by graduates enrolled through school choice with those in grades nine through 12 eligible for the slots.

"This would keep our school choice funds where they are and help to defray the cost from the annual loss of approximately 75 to 80 eighth graders that go to Bay Path or private schools," Desto told the school committee.

A brief discussion led to a unanimous vote by all committee members in attendance to continue participating in school choice and to allow all 33 upcoming vacancies to be made available.

While there was little debate, the discussion did reveal that contrary to popular belief not every school choice student attends the Shepherd Hill Regional High School or Bay Path. According to Desto there's another form of alternate education that has also been built into the school choice model.

"I just feel like there's a trend and it isn't people going from here to Tantasqua or anything like that it's the virtual schooling that's picked up some momentum," Desto said. "It's probably going to drop off one year a little bit and pick up but I don't think we're going to see radical departure from that. I think people are getting more and more into that business because that's kind of the wave of the present. We anticipate that the hit will be at least as bad as last year."

Desto said that virtual schooling actually costs the districts more at \$7,500 per student in comparison to the usual \$5,000 per school choice student. Desto said this new and growing form of alternate education was partially responsible for the unexpected increases in school choice costs from last year and his hope is that by keeping things level for the new school year the town's financial commitment will also stay relatively level.

# Senate passes credit protection bill in wake of Equifax breach

BOSTON — Senator Anne M. Gobi (D-Spencer) and the Massachusetts State Senate voted to pass a bill designed to protect the personal information of consumers in the case of data breaches, like the one seen at Equifax, and provide free credit freezes for all consumers.

The bill, S.2455, An Act relative to consumer protection from security breaches, helps all consumers protect their sensitive information before, during, and after a security breach in several ways: providing for free credit freezes for all consumers and creating an online “one stop shop” portal so consumers can freeze and unfreeze their credit at all three main bureaus (Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion) in one place; providing five years of free credit monitoring for consumers whose

information was part of a credit reporting agency data breach, and empowering consumers to know when and why their consumer reports are being pulled by requiring that any company attempting to pull a consumer’s report must first obtain consent.

“If you have had your identity stolen or your credit compromised because of a data breach you know how devastating that can be,” Senator Gobi said. “This bill will help to put the pieces back together and then put in place protections for your credit information.”

The legislation allows increased oversight from Attorney General Maura Healey’s office, which recently filed a lawsuit against Equifax. The Office of Consumer Affairs and Business Regulation will create a process requiring companies to certify that they

maintain a consumer information security program as required by existing Massachusetts law.

“We all have been affected by the Equifax breach and it feels like a massive betrayal. Millions of Americans don’t know who might now have access to their personal information and what they might do with it. Equifax must accept responsibility and compensate consumers for its lack of security, and all credit reporting agencies and companies must take swift action to prevent future breaches,” said bill sponsor and Senate Chair of the Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Barbara L’Italien. “Today we took the next step toward action to fix this situation. I’m so proud of our collaboration on a bill that sends out a clear message that Massachusetts is

serious when it comes to protecting consumers, especially seniors, low-income residents, and other vulnerable populations who are hit the hardest by situations like these.”

“Credit reporting agencies should be working for the American consumer. But recent data breaches and security leaks have demonstrated a repeated failure in due diligence,” said Senate President Harriette L. Chandler (D-Worcester). “This bill gives individuals more control over their personal data, and will provide essential consumer protections for Massachusetts residents. This legislation will serve as a model for other states, and I commend Senator L’Italien for her leadership on this issue.”

## DCAMM is ‘poor steward’ claims Bump in audit

BOSTON —The executive branch agency charged with management of properties owned and leased by the Commonwealth is not ensuring solid waste recycling takes place in those buildings, despite an executive order to do so, according to an audit released by state Auditor Suzanne M. Bump. The audit of the Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance shows it was not ensuring that all solid waste recycling requirements at state-owned buildings were met and was not monitoring the waste removal and recycling practices at state leased buildings. Some state agencies reported they did no recycling at all. The audit also notes that DCAMM did not track or maintain records of recycling activities, and

did not analyze waste disposed of to identify areas for improvement or potential cost savings.

In the audit, Bump calls on DCAMM to implement better oversight of waste disposal in government owned and leased buildings to ensure state agencies are complying with their responsibilities related to recycling.

Additionally, Bump encourages DCAMM to pursue potential financial credits for recycled items, which would save taxpayer dollars by offsetting the cost of solid waste disposal in state buildings.


“Massachusetts likes to think itself a leader in environmental management, but state government itself is setting a pretty poor example,” Bump said. “It

is embarrassing to learn that DCAMM is such a poor steward of the Earth and of taxpayer dollars.”

In its response to the audit findings, DCAMM conceded it was falling short and indicated it would bolster its oversight of recycling and solid waste removal in state government buildings and would explore opportunities to receive financial credits for recycling activities.

An audit of Bridgewater State University, which was released in March, found similar issues at the school.

The Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance oversees management of all properties owned or leased by the Commonwealth.

victorious. These and other accomplishments were the basis for many of the compliments shared by the selectmen throughout the meeting.

Selectman David Singer, who spend nine years alongside Swensen on the board, called it a true honor to have served with a great leader.

“Over that time Rick and I have agreed and disagreed, and it’s been a pleasure. He’s always come here and been respectful and professional and you know what, he’s always said what he thought was best for his town,” Singer said.

Selectman John McGrath also complimented Swensen’s leadership and called him and

integral part of Charlton’s thriving through many adversities during his 12 years of committed service.

“I think the biggest and hardest thing (Rick) has done is two downturns in the economy. The town never laid anybody off. We tried to provide services that we can, but nobody ever got hurt here because of a recession or depression. Rick led the town and the board through some very tight budgets, especially with the schools,” McGrath said.

Even the board’s newest selectman, Deborah Noble, reflected on the impact Rick Swensen has had on the town. An emotional Noble complimented Swensen as a man who avoided the stigma of being a politician calling him something infinitely better.

“It’s going to be difficult for me to look across the table and not see Rick’s face. This is my first year serving on this board and what I am most grateful for is the fact that even though we disagree we don’t fight, we debate like adults. We’re a team and we all work together hopefully to what we think is best for the town and its residents – Rick is not a politician. He’s a statesman and he will always be a statesman,” Noble said.

The most emotional goodbye though came from Town Administrator Robin Craver who reminisced on her years working with Charlton and acknowledge Swensen as the last remaining selectman from the board she first worked with when she was hired by Charlton years ago.

“For me working with (Rick) as chairman and vice chairman his level of integrity has been impeccable. He never sought anything for himself. He’s always tried to be diplomatic,” Craver said. “He’s tenaciously defended our employees when we needed to really get out there and make it work and he’s been fair with everything that he’s done - I really do wish him well.”

Swensen briefly addressed the audience and his fellow selectmen before the meeting proceeded saying some of the things he is prouder of his helping lead the town through the economic downturns and playing a part in bringing board together to approach Exxon Mobile for restitutions when the many believes such an effort would be all for noth-

ing. In an emotional farewell, Swensen called his 12 years of town service and honor and a privilege.

“There are high points and low points, but I think the things I’ll take away from this mostly is we got through a couple of very serious economic downturns in this town,” Swensen said. “The thing that mean a lot to me is integrity. That’s very important to me. I can honestly say I can look in the mirror every day and believe that everything I did was in the best interest of the town.”

## Local teens to compete at Mass Envirothon at Blackstone Valley state park

UXBRIDGE — For the past school year, high school students across the commonwealth have been studying watersheds, water infrastructure and the impact of recent damaging storms in their community, and formulating steps their local leaders can take to protect land and water ecosystems in the watershed.

They'll present their findings at the 31st annual Massachusetts Envirothon competition on Friday, May 18 at the Blackstone River and Canal Heritage State Park in Uxbridge. The approximately 200 students from 27 Massachusetts communities will also test their knowledge of the area's soils, forests, water, and wildlife as part of the competition.

"By engaging students on real-world environmental issues, the annual Massachusetts Envirothon improves students' problem-solving skills and creates lifelong passions for preserving and protecting our natural resources," said state Energy and Environmental Affairs

Secretary Matthew Beaton. "Massachusetts' watersheds are vital sources of drinking water and native species habitat, and this year's competition provides students with the opportunity to learn about their local watersheds and brainstorm solutions to keep them clean and safe."

At this outdoor field event, teams will rotate through four "ecostations" where they will answer written questions and engage in hands-on activities such as soil analysis, wildlife habitat assessment, tree identification, and water quality measures. Each team will have up to 10 participants and will split into specialized sub-teams during the competition, each focusing their efforts at different ecostations.

At the fifth station, the Current Issue, each team will give a 15-minute presentation on "Partnering with Nature in Watersheds" to a panel of judges. Teams have been researching the Current Issue in their own community in preparation for their presentation. Each panel of judges

includes concerned citizens and environmental professionals from government agencies, non-profit organizations, academia and private industry. Teams were asked to assess water infrastructure resources and needs, identify an important partnering opportunity, and make specific recommendations for action.

"These teams work hard getting to know their local ecosystems and how their communities depend on them. We test their scientific knowledge, but we also like to hear their stories about how they have gotten muddy, cold, and tired, and otherwise had fun and fallen in love with nature in their neighborhood. The best hope for the future comes from engaged, scientifically literate citizens who care about their communities and the environment," said Kelley Freda of the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation's Division of Water Supply Protection and representative of the Massachusetts Envirothon Steering Committee.

The Envirothon is more than just a competition about environmental knowledge. Many teams have taken what they've learned and put it to work

in an action/service project in their community. The program aims to prepare the next generation for the stewardship work that needs to be done," said Freda. "And this annual competition actually becomes a festive gathering of the environmental community of Massachusetts. At informal lunchtime roundtables, teams will share stories from their EnviroTrekks — places they visited, people they talked to, outdoor experiences, and service projects — during the past year."

The overall winning team will have the opportunity to represent Massachusetts in the North American Envirothon, which will be held July 22-28 in Pocatello, Idaho.

The 2018 Massachusetts Envirothon is made possible through the contributions of partnering agencies and organizations, including financial support from the Massachusetts Executive Office of Energy & Environmental Affairs, the U.S. Forest Service, the Massachusetts Grange, Environmental Business Council of New England, Wegman's supermarkets and local conservation districts.

Fifteen federal and state environmental agencies, conservation districts, non-profit organizations, higher educational institutions, and businesses provide expertise and help organize the event. Dozens of volunteers will also be on hand on May 18 to handle all the

event logistics from setting up tents, tables and chairs, checking-in teams, serving food, scoring tests and cleaning up.

## Legislature votes to protect licenses of pros who default on student loans

BOSTON — Senator Anne M. Gobi (D-Spencer) and the Massachusetts State Senate voted to pass legislation to protect individuals who default on their educational loans from professional licensure penalties.

The bill, S.2266, An Act to prevent bureaucratic overreach in the collection of student debt, will repeal a state law passed in 1990, which created professional licensure consequences for educational loan defaulters.

Under existing law, the Massachusetts Educational Financing Authority and the Massachusetts Higher Education Assistance Corporation — a former loan guarantor that now operates as American Student Assistance, a national nonprofit — can request that a borrower's state-issued professional or occupational certificate, registration or license be suspended, revoked or cancelled for

default on educational loans made or administered by either entity.

"Student debt is difficult to handle and default can happen easily," said Senator Gobi. "A person's ability to pay that debt is directly tied to the ability to work, making sure professional licenses are not affected by debt is a positive step."

"When we encourage high school students to go to college, many have no choice but to assume debt to finance their education," said Senate President Harriette L. Chandler (D-Worcester). "This debt is a major burden in and of itself, and it should not limit a person's ability to work and live a fulfilling life. This legislation ensures that post-graduates in Massachusetts are protected, and I thank Senator Brownsberger for his efforts on this bill."

If you had a 401(k) plan with your former employer, you have three main options: You could leave your money in the plan, if the employer allows it; you could move the money into your new employer's plan, if permitted; or you could roll the funds over to an IRA. You'll want to weigh the "pros" and "cons" of these choices carefully before making a decision.

—Choose investments from your new retirement plan. If your new employer offers a 401(k) or similar plan, you'll need to choose the investments within the plan that are most appropriate for your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon. Contribute as much as you can afford to the plan, and consider increasing your contributions every time your salary goes up.

—Make sure you've got health insurance. The health insurance offered by your new employer may not begin the minute you start your job. Given the high costs of medical care, you'll need to make sure you are protected until your coverage kicks in. So, for that interim period, you may need to consider the federal health insurance marketplace, COBRA continuation coverage or private medical insurance. You might also be eligible to be covered under your spouse's health insurance. And you may want to learn what your options are for health savings accounts (HSAs), if available.

—Review your new benefits package – and take steps to fill gaps. Your new benefits package may include life and disability insurance, but these group policies may not be enough to fully protect you and your family. A financial professional can help you quantify your protection and insurance needs and offer guidance on how much coverage you may require.

—Understand your income tax considerations. Getting a new job may involve income tax implications, such as changes in your tax bracket, severance pay, unused vacation and unemployment compensation. And if you are thinking of exercising stock options, be aware that this, too, can be a taxable event. Finally, if you have to move to take a new job, you may incur some relocation and job hunting expenses that could be deductible. You will need to discuss all these issues with your tax professional. Starting a new job can be exciting – and challenging. But you may be able to make your life easier by putting the above suggestions to work.

## Vintage cookbook recipes offer a peek into yesterday's kitchens

If your mouth's been watering for baked beans like grandma used to make, if you just can't seem to get the recipe down pat for Aunt Ellen's heirloom pickles, or even if you simply yearn to cook up an old fashioned feast, then perhaps the answer to your food fantasies are as close as a vintage cookbook. Cookbooks of the past provide a peek into yesterday's kitchen. From historical dishes to childhood desserts, the following recipes recall simpler times when food was real, comforting, and made from scratch.

The Boston Cooking School Cookbook (Farmer, Fannie Merritt. The Boston Cooking-School Cook Book. Boston: Little, Brown, 1918)

Fannie Merritt Farmer was credited with standardizing measures for

recipes. Until her Boston Cooking School Cook Book came out in 1896, most recipes called for "a pinch" or "egg sized" portions. She has been credited with singlehandedly revolutionizing recipes. One of her most popular recipes is this one for authentic Boston Baked Beans. Note that she has added helpful notations at the end of the recipe.

**Boston Baked Beans**  
 Pick over one quart pea beans, cover with cold water, and soak overnight. In morning, drain, cover with fresh water, heat slowly (keeping water below boiling, heat), and cook until they will burst—which is best determined by taking a few beans on the tip of a spoon

and blowing on them, when skins will burst if sufficiently cooked. Beans thus tested must, of course, be thrown away. Drain beans, throwing bean-water out of doors, not in sink. Scald rind of three-fourths pound fat salt pork, scrape, remove one-fourth inch slice and put in bottom of bean-pot. Cut through rind of remaining pork every one-half inch, making cuts one inch deep. Put beans in pot and bury pork in beans, leaving rind exposed. Mix one tablespoon salt, one tablespoon molasses, and three tablespoons sugar; add one cup boiling water, and pour over beans; then add enough more boil-

ing water to cover beans. Cover bean-pot, put in oven, and bake slowly six or eight hours, uncovering the last hour of cooking, that rind may become brown and crisp. Add water as needed. Many feel sure that by adding with seasonings one-half tablespoon mustard, the beans are more easily digested. If pork mixed with lean is preferred, use less salt.

The fine reputation which Boston Baked Beans have gained has been attributed to the earthen bean-pot with small top and bulging sides in which they are supposed to be cooked. Equally good beans have often been eaten where a five-pound lard pail was substituted for the broken bean pot.

Yellow-eyed beans are very good when baked.



There are around 20 fields stretching nearly a mile along Route 20. Seven of these fields open at daybreak on Tuesday. The shows draw an estimated 5,000 dealers along with countless shoppers.

If you are a serious collector, you should get there early for the best selection. If you are looking for items that are popular now, like mid-century modern furniture, there may be hundreds of other people looking for that as well. Dealers and serious collectors are there at daybreak when the fields open on Tuesday. They are also there when the other fields open later in the day Tuesday along with Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. These buyers often walk quickly or run through the fields trying to find pieces they desire before their competition does.

Others take their time hoping to spot

the items that others overlooked, or something that will look good in their homes. Many decorators scour the fields for unique pieces for their clients' homes.


Things have changed over the years at the Brimfield show. Gordon Reid had about 70 dealers at his first show in 1960. Things grew over time to the point where there are now thousands of dealers. The merchandise has also changed. I used to see some dealer tents full of things like oak furniture. I met a dealer from London who shipped a container to Brimfield and sold antiques that he had purchased from England and other European countries. Items were also being sent back to Europe from Brimfield. Dealers from Austria were buying as much cheaply priced European furniture as they could to send it across the ocean. When we used to setup at Brimfield, they approached us with an offer on a carved European chair that hadn't drawn much interest in 2 days. We agreed to their price and it was sent back to Europe, where it had originally been produced.

There are still plenty of antiques at Brimfield, but dealers bring other items that current buyers seek. Lara Spencer often films contestants buying things at Brimfield for the "Flea Market Flip" television show. Contestants buy furniture, parts and other items that they repurpose and sell at another flea mar-

ket. Some buyers look for similar things that they can use to create something of their own. Some dealers sell their already repurposed wares.

There are some things you can do to prepare for Brimfield. Try to get there early; parking spaces may fill up if quickly. Be ready for New England weather. There may be frost on the ground during the evening while the day is blistering hot. You might see snow, winds powerful enough to knock tents over or rain that turns the fields into piles of mud. Also pack the sunscreen and bug spray. If you are a serious buyer, you may find some great buys during those rainy days when others have decided to stay home.

## Brookfield Indivisible to host information session on 2018 ballot initiatives

BROOKFIELD — Area residents are invited to learn about the Massachusetts ballot initiatives proposed to address income inequality in the November 2018 election. Brookfield Indivisible will host an information session, Sunday, May 6 at 2 p.m. at the Brookfield Inn, 8 West Main St., on proposed referendum questions to adopt the so-called Fair Share Amendment, a \$15 minimum wage, paid family and medical leave, and a rollback of the state's sales tax to five percent. The event is free and open to the public.

Jeremy Thompson, senior policy analyst for the independent Massachusetts Budget and Policy Center, will present an overview of these initiatives and their impact on families, businesses and the state budget. The Fair Share Amendment seeks to create an additional tax of four percent on annual income above \$1 million and invest those funds in education and infrastructure.

The \$15 minimum wage would be implemented in increments of \$1 per year over the next four years to achieve a minimum wage of \$15 an hour

in Massachusetts by 2022.

The paid family and medical leave initiative would provide employees and self-employed individuals (who elect coverage) with 16 weeks of paid family leave or 26 weeks of paid medical leave per year up to 90 percent of an employee's average weekly wages or \$1,000 a week (whichever is less).

Finally, the sales tax rollback would decrease state sales tax from 6.25% to 5% and designate a tax-free weekend each August.

"Massachusetts voters will have to make many hard deci-

sions this November on the future of our state and our priorities when it comes to supporting families, workers, education and infrastructure," said Trudy O'Connell, chair of Brookfield Indivisible. "This program will give us good background to be able to decide and discuss these issues with our families and friends."

The Massachusetts Budget and Policy Center is an independent nonprofit organization that provides non-partisan research and analysis of state budget and tax policies, as well as economic issues, that affect

low- and moderate-income people in Massachusetts.

Brookfield Indivisible focuses on issues such as health-care and reproductive rights, elections and voting rights, protection of immigrants and refugees, the environment, and economic justice and tax reform. Founding members hail from the Brookfields, Spencer, Sturbridge and Warren. Membership is open to residents in all area towns. DUDLEY — The Shepherd Hill Regional girls' varsity lacrosse team used a balanced offensive attack and a solid performance in goal by Carrienne Fortier to roll past Fitchburg High, 13-4, at Richard Carmignani Memorial Field on Tuesday, April 24.

Skylar Pietz, Lauren Alicea and Claudia Bonaventura all scored three goals, and Hannah Kunkel found the back of the net twice for the Rams who led, 7-2, at halftime.

With the win Shepherd Hill improved to 3-2 overall and 2-0 in the Mid-Wach C Division while Fitchburg slipped to 1-4 overall and 0-3 in league play.

Pietz, a sophomore, continues to close in on the 100-career goals milestone. Including her three against Fitchburg she now has 92 career goals, with 20 of those goals (and seven assists) coming this season. In addition to being a top-notch goal-scorer, this year, with offensive weapons like Bonaventura, Alicea, Kunkel, Ceilidgh O'Brien and Hannah Cushing around her, Pietz has become more of a facilitator.

These days, when she has the ball in the pocket of her stick and she is headed toward the goal, it's not a foregone conclusion — like last year when she scored 72 times — that she's going to shoot the ball.

"Skylar is such a team player; she sets a lot of things up for us on offense. It's just wonderful to have her on the team," Shepherd Hill head coach Sarah Morin said. "She is so good at seeing the field, which is hard to teach. The ability to see everything as it's happening comes very naturally for her."

The soft-spoken Pietz attributed her field vision to growing up in a lacrosse family.

"I've grown up playing the game. My brothers have played their whole lives and my dad played, too," Pietz said. "In my head I just picture the situation and think about it, think about what I'm going to do next and then execute it. I see the things that happen out on the field before they happen. I get a picture in my head, I think about what the defender is going to do and then I just go for it."

Pietz and Bonaventura, who is a freshman, seem to have a special connection. Pietz has assisted on many of Bonaventura's goals this season.

"Claudia and I, we play really well together," Pietz said. "We're always looking for each other when we get down near the goal. We're always talking and we like to run the give-and-go a lot. That's been working real well for us. It's just awesome to have a great player like Claudia on the team with us and getting to work together with her."

The Pietz-to-Bonaventura combination paid dividends against the Red Raiders in the first minute of the game. Pietz came around the back of the net on the right side of Fitchburg goalie Diana Bajana and as she wheeled to shoot the ball, saw Bonaventura open in front at the eight-yard mark. Pietz seamlessly turned the shot into a pass to Bonaventura, who rifled the ball past Bajana to give the Rams a quick 1-0 lead.

It was the first of Pietz's two

assists on the day.

Bonaventura increased the Shepherd Hill lead to 2-0 less than two minutes later with an unassisted goal. After Fitchburg cut the lead in half on a goal by Jazmyne Rodriguez, the Rams scored five straight goals to take a 7-1 lead with 9:24 left in the first half.

In the second half Shepherd Hill picked up where it left off in the first, scoring four of the first five goals to push its lead to 11-3 with 7:04 left remaining. While Pietz and Bonaventura did most of their scoring in the first half, second half goals for the Rams were scored by Kunkel (two), Alicea (two), Aneta Czyn and Pietz.

While a herd of Rams took care of the offensive end of things against the Red Raiders, Fortier was busy limiting Fitchburg's offensive effectiveness on the other end. The senior goalie made eight saves.

"Carrienne was very solid back there for us today," Morin said. "She made good choices; she had a good game. She did well. She said she was feeling good going into it and she showed it."

OXFORD — Oxford High pitcher Candice Nelson and her Bay Path Regional counterpart, Sarah Gosselin, hooked up in what can only be described as an old-fashioned pitchers' duel on Thursday, April 26 at Ruel Field. In the end, however, Nelson and the Pirates were just a wee bit better than Gosselin and the Minutemen, prevailing 3-0 in the non-league game.

With the win Oxford improved to 4-2. The defeat was the first for Bay Path after starting the season with four straight wins.

The pitching duel between Nelson and Gosselin ended up being a draw. Nelson struck out one more batter (12-11), but she also gave up one more hit (4-3). Gosselin walked three while Nelson walked just one.

Gosselin, a freshman, struck out the side in the second and

sixth innings while Nelson, a senior, struck out the side in the third. Nelson fanned at least one batter in every inning and struck out two batters in the first, second and seventh innings. Gosselin whiffed at least one batter in five of the six frames she pitched and struck out two in the fourth and fifth.

"Their pitcher was outstanding; I was very impressed. She's the best pitcher we've faced all year," said Oxford head coach Jamie Hetherman, who was also impressed — but not surprised — by the performance of his ace. "When Candice gets going and gets in a rhythm she's tough to beat. She throws in the low-to-mid 60s and her changeup is the best it's been in the four years she's been here."

"Being a senior now and being more mature and understanding the game better, nothing seems

to bother her when she's out there," Hetherman continued. "An error here or there doesn't bother her. After something like that happens she just gets the ball and goes back to work."

After striking out a pair of Bay Path batters in the first and second innings Nelson seemed to find another gear, striking out the three Minutemen hitters she faced in the third inning on 10 pitches.

"Usually as the game goes along I get stronger and I'm able to pitch faster," explained Nelson, who was sick earlier in the day, but showed no effects of the illness during the game. "My mechanics get better as the game goes on and my focus gets sharper, too."

Oxford grabbed a 2-0 lead in the bottom of the fourth inning, making the most of two hits, a walk and two Bay Path errors.

Nelson got things started with a leadoff single and then alertly went to second when the ball got by the Bay Path left fielder. She advanced to third on a groundball off the bat of teammate Audrey Hayes and then scored to make it 1-0 when throw to first on Hayes's grounder sailed over the Bay Path first baseman's head.

Later in the inning Hayes, an eighth-grader, was on third base when junior Madison Kann walked. During sophomore Hannah Volpe's at-bat, Kann attempted to steal second. When Kann got caught in a rundown between first and second, Hayes scampered home to make it 2-0.

The Pirates scored an insurance run in the bottom of the sixth inning to extend their lead to 3-0. Hayes led off with an infield single, went to second on a passed ball, took third on a wild pitch and scored on a Bay Path error.



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# Spring fishing is making up for long, cold winter



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This is the time of year that Lake Ontario brown trout fishing explodes with action. It is the number one brown trout fishing destination that is only five hours or less away to catch trophy brown trout. For years, this writer and a few fishing buddies fished Lake Ontario for brown trout and salmon every spring. Taking along our 21 foot boat equipped to fish for these brown trout and salmon was an annual event that had us catching brown trout in excess of 20 pounds, although average fish weighed in at three to four pounds! The brown trout were caught using tandem streamer flies trolled in 10 to 20 foot of water. Using a copper line to get the fly down

a couple of feet had us catching browns every few minutes on some trips. Using a pair of homemade planner boards to get the lures away from the back of the boat was often necessary to catch the sometimes spooky fish. Large swirls were often observed as we trolled near fish that were feeding close to the surface. "Wow, did you see that huge swirl over there?" As the fishing line screamed from the reel, we realized that we had encountered a nice fish. After numerous runs, the huge brown was brought along side of the boat. The fish was quickly netted and lifted into the boat. After numerous "high fives," I picked up the scale to weigh the huge silvery brown that laid glistening on the floor of the boat. The scale showed 21 pounds even. It would be one of

three browns that all weighed in at over 20 pounds that day. We were ready to head back to camp prior to catching numerous fish during the day, but I decided to fish right up to dark. It sure paid off that day. My two fishing buddies, the late Peter Opperwall, and Jack Cunningham, wanted to leave early, but they had no choice but to stay as I was the Captain. They sure changed their tune after the first 20 pound fish was caught!! Mike Nee of Milford caught this catfish in the Charles River recently. This week's picture shows Mike with the huge cat after weighing the fish, which tipped the scales at six pounds, five ounces. It was returned back to the Charles River to fight another day. Nice fish. Local anglers are catching some nice largemouth bass at local ponds and reservoirs. Shiners are the number one choice among many anglers but local bass anglers are also catching some nice bass on rub-

ber worms and plugs. Wallum Lake and Webster Lake have been giving up some nice smallmouth bass to boat fishing anglers. This past weekend fishing pressure was light. Trout fishing remains strong as Mass Fish & Wildlife continues to stock local waters with fresh trout. Trout stocking will continue through Memorial Day. 21 inch rainbow trout are still being caught by anglers fishing Wallum Lake in Douglas! Boaters trolling lures and flies will soon see a thermocline set up on most bodies of water by this week, if not already. The thermocline is a layer of water in the ocean or lakes where the temperature gradient is greater than that of the warmer layer above and below the thermocline. Wallum Lake's thermocline is normally at a 20 foot depth during late spring and summer. This is where the fish stay to feed although many fish come to the surface to feed during early morning or evening times.

## New criminal justice legislation includes protections for officers

BOSTON - Representative Paul K. Frost (R-Auburn), Senator Michael O. Moore (D-Millbury) and Representative Kate D. Campanale (R-Leicester) announced the Legislature passed an omnibus Criminal Justice Reform Bill which includes language designed to protect police officers in the line of duty. The legislation, which marks the most comprehensive changes to the Commonwealth's criminal justice laws in several decades, sets forth extensive reforms to the criminal justice system and has been laid on the Governor's desk for approval. Among the many changes included within the omnibus bill is a provision sponsored by Representatives Frost and Campanale and Senator Moore that would make an assault and battery on a police officer a felony. Under current law, there is already precedent for some cases of assault on firefighters to be considered a felony crime, however, there is no such provision protecting police officers. Under the new reforms, an assault resulting in significant physical harm to an officer will

now be a felony charge rather than a misdemeanor. Calls from local law enforcement to make this change were spurred by the death of Auburn Police Officer Ronald Tarentino Jr., who was shot on Rochdale Street in Auburn on May 22, 2016 during a traffic stop by an individual with prior assaults on police officers. Legislation to address this issue was originally filed by Representative Frost, Representative Campanale, and Senator Michael Moore, as well as the Baker-Polito Administration in the wake of Officer Tarentino's tragic death. Frost, who took the House Floor to comment on the final version of the Criminal Justice Reform Bill, thanked the members and Governor Baker for their support of this change in the law to better protect our men and women in blue. He thanked the members on behalf of the Tarentino family, the Auburn and Leicester police departments and for all the men and women in blue across the Commonwealth. "Our men and women in blue are doing their jobs

to protect us and make our lives safer. They do not deserve to be punching bags or targeted for attack. We owe it to those who protect us this protection under the law," said Frost. "I am proud to support this legislative provision to enhance protections for the men and women who serve in law enforcement," said Senator Moore, who is a former law enforcement officer and currently serves as Senate Chair of the Joint Committee on Public Safety and Homeland Security. "Members of the law enforcement community are placed in harm's way every day to help ensure public safety. This bill seeks to deter acts of violence committed against on-duty officers." "We owe this to the officers, men and women who put their lives on the line on a daily basis," said Rep. Kate Campanale of Leicester, who serves as the State Representative of Officer Tarentino's hometown. S. 2371, the Criminal Justice Reform Bill, was enacted by both branches of the Legislature on April 4. The legislation is now to Governor Baker for his review.

What Mrs. Fisher Knows about Old Southern Cooking: Soups, Pickles, Preserves, Etc. (Women's Cooperative Printing Office, San Francisco, 1881) Abby Fisher was a former Alabama slave who couldn't read or write but was an expert cook. Her talents made her a repeat recipient of blue ribbons at county fairs. Her pickles and jams took first prize at the San Francisco Mechanics Institute Fair in 1880. The next year she transcribed her recipes from memory and the cookbook "What Mrs. Fisher Knows about Old Southern Cooking" was published. This recipe, which is one of the 160 in the book takes a lot of time, but like most great Southern foods, it is likely well worth the effort. Sweet Watermelon Rind Pickle Take the melon rind and scrape all the meat from the inside, and then carefully slice all the outside of the rind from the white part of the rind, then lay or cover the white part over with salt. It will have to remain

under salt one week before pickling; the rind will keep in salt from year to year. When you want to pickle it, take it from the salt and put into clear water, change the water three times a day - must be changed say every four hours - then take the rind from the water and dry it with a clean cloth. Have your vinegar boiling, and put the rind into it and let it lay in vinegar four days; then take it from the vinegar, drain, and sprinkle sugar thickly over it and let it remain so one day. To make syrup, take the syrup from the rind and add eight pounds more sugar to it, and put to boil; boil till a thick and clear syrup. Weigh ten pounds of rind to 12 pounds of sugar; cover the rind with four pounds of it and make the syrup with the remaining eight pounds. While the syrup is cooking add one teaspoonful of white ginger root and the peel of three lemons. When the syrup is cooked, then put the rind into the boiling syrup, and let it cook till you can pass a fork through it with ease, then it is done. When cooled, put in jar or bottles with one pint of vinegar to one quart of syrup, thus the pickles are made. See that they be well covered with vinegar and syrup as directed.

\*\*\* "Ruth Wakefield's Toll House: Tried and True Recipes" (M. Barrows & Company, New York, 1941) Ruth Wakefield ran the Toll House Inn in Massachusetts. While her claim to fame was the invention of the chocolate chip cookie in 1930, Ruth created many other memorable dishes for her diners. One of these favorites is the English Cheese Soup recipe below. Toll House Old English Cheese Soup Melt one half cup butter. Add four tablespoons flour, one teaspoon salt and one half teaspoon pepper. Blend well and add four cups milk. After thickening well add 1 1/2 pounds Old English or a yellow snappy cheese; 1 1/2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce; and 1/2 teaspoon paprika If too thick, thin to desired consistency with hot milk. Serve with crumbled crisp bacon sprinkled over the top of soup or a garnish or shredded boiled eggs. \*\*\* "First Ladies Cook Book: Favorite Recipes of All the Presidents of the United States," Parents' Magazine Press, 1965. When this cookbook came

out in 1965 housewives everywhere scrambled to make dishes fit for a President. This recipe for Johnny Cakes was said to be William McKinley's favorite. Johnny Cakes Ingredients: 1/3 cup granulated sugar; one egg; one half stick butter, melted (no substitution); 3/4 cup yellow corn meal; one teaspoon salt; one teaspoon soda; one cup sour milk (modern milk spoils, but won't "sour" so substitute buttermilk.); one cup flour; butter or lard for greasing the griddle. Directions; Mix sugar, egg and melted butter together. Blend corn meal and salt together, then stir into egg mixture. Stir soda into milk. Add white flour alternately with the milk, a bit at a time, blending to make a smooth batter. Allow mixture to stand in a cool place about 30 minutes to "lighten." Heat a greased griddle or heavy skillet until a few drops of water will "spit" and bounce off the surface. Spoon or pour the mixture onto the hot griddle, using up to 1/4 cup at a time. Brown pancakes on each side, (turning only once), about 1 minute per side. Don't overcook. Serve hot, with more melted butter, maple syrup,

that require site plan review or other approvals (e.g. recreational activities conducted for profit).

508 will file an application with the Town's Planning Board to modify the Site Plan Decision to change the approved use from a "90-space campground and motorcross park" to a "Sports, Entertainment, and Recreation Facility for Gainful Profit." The Town will support such modification, subject to the Planning Board's ability to require reasonable information and impose reasonable conditions upon such modification.

For clarity, though the ultimate decision will be within the sole discretion of the Planning Board, the Town intends to suggest the following parameters relative to the proposed modification:

That the site plan review process will involve analysis of parking, ingress,

egress, safety, noise impacts and sanitary facilities.

That clearing of additional woodland, construction of any structures or buildings (permanent or temporary), and storm water management systems must be shown on the approved site plan and that future such

alterations/improvements of the site shall require modification of the site plan approval.

That (subject to the above) the modified site plan approval allow the following types of non-motorized, low-impact activities generally on the site, without requiring the site plan to show fixed locations for such activities:

- Obstacle course foot racing
- Bicycle racing
- Biking trails
- Running trails
- Walking trails
- Paint ball

That (subject to the above) the modified site plan approval allow the following types of medium-impact activities in areas that will be generally shown on the revised site plans:

- Boxing area
- Concert area
- Baseball Softball

That (subject to the above) the modified site plan approval allow the following types of higher impact activities in the existing race track area (if such activities are proposed for other locations on the property, or if louder vehicles are proposed to be used in the track area, the Planning Board will likely require new studies and peer review regarding noise impacts):

- Motocross
- 4 wheeler
- Minibike
- All-terrain vehicles (ATV)
- Side by side
- Dirt bike Snowmobiles
- Mud bog

Stay of Lawsuit and Modification of Restraining Order: Pending the earlier of the Planning Board's action on the Site Plan Decision Modification, or approval of 508's proposed zoning amendment referenced in Paragraph 7, the parties will file a Joint Motion to Stay the Lawsuit and seek to modify the restraining order upon the execution of this Agreement allowing 508 to conduct the activities outlined in paragraph 5 below and pursuant to the terms set forth therein

Completion of Work Required Under Site Plan Decision: On or before June 15, 2018, 508 shall complete all of the unfinished improvements required under the Site Plan Decision, as shown on the attached report from the Town's consulting engineer (attached hereto as Exhibit 1), and 508 shall pay for the Town's consulting engineer to inspect and confirm the completion of such improvements prior to June 21, 2018.

Agreement to Allow Certain Events to be Held on the

Property: Notwithstanding the pendency of the Planning Board's decision on the proposed modification of the Site Plan Decision, the Town hereby agrees that 508 may hold the following events at the Property, subject to the requirements set forth herein:

New England Bushcraft Show- April 28, 2018: The Town will permit this event to take place as scheduled.

New England High School Cycling Association Race-May 19, 2018: The Town will permit this event to take place as scheduled, provided 508 has complied with the terms herein.

Tough Mudder Race- June 23-24: The Town agrees to allow this event to take place as scheduled, provided:

1. 508 has complied with the terms herein, including without limitation Paragraphs 2 and 4; and

11. 508 prepares a plan for overflow parking and traffic safety to the satisfaction of the Police Chief, Fire Chief and Board of Selectmen and complies with any reasonable conditions and requirements of said officials and Board.

Spartan Race-August 11-12, 2018: It is hoped that, if 508 timely submits and diligently pursues modification of the Site Plan Decision, the

Planning Board will be able to act on such modification prior to this event. However, if despite such diligence the modification process has not concluded by August 11, the Town will allow this event to proceed on the same terms as the Tough Mudder Race.

No other such events (including using the site as parking for other off-site events) shall be permitted until and unless the Planning Board has issued a Modified Site Plan Decision authorizing such events, subject the provisions of paragraph 7 below.

Dismissal of Lawsuit and Release of Claims: If the Planning Board issues a Modified Site Plan Decision with reasonable conditions,1 or 508's proposal for a zoning change is approved by Town Meeting, the parties hereby agree as follows:

Within ten days after the earlier of filing of the Modified Site Plan Approval with the Town Clerk, or approval by the Attorney General of a zoning change as outlined in paragraph 7 below, the parties shall file a Notice of Dismissal of the Lawsuit, without prejudice, with all rights of appeal waived, and with each party to pay its own counsel fees and costs.

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

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
