Douglas adopts new Web site, alert system

DOUGLAS — The town of Douglas has launched a new Web site, www.douglas-ma.gov. The Web site first went live in November, but is now standing on its own as the old site will no longer be updated.

Douglas also recently launched its new CodeRed Alert System with an "All Call" test on Monday, Jan. 14. If residents would like to opt-out or manage their account preferences, they are being asked to visit the new Web site and see the "Resident Flyers" on the CodeRed page under the "How Do I" tab.

CodeRed is an electronic notification system utilizing telephone, electronic mail, or electronic text messaging, to be used to distribute information related to significant incidents and events where timely communication to an effected population or geographic area in the town is essential or highly desirable, reads the Web site.

As of Jan. 1, the town's old site, www.douglasma.org, is no longer being updated.

In other news, Douglas is also seeking a part-time, interim local inspector of buildings. The individual will serve as an at-will, part-time employ-

ee of the town, supervised by the Town Administrator, for up to six months or until the town determines a permanent arrangement for filling the requirements of this position.

Applicants are asked to have a valid certification as a Building Commissioner in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts or be a local inspector in good standing that obtains the certification within 90 days of accepting the position with the town. Prior experience as a building commissioner or local inspector is preferred but not required. To be considered, individuals must have at least ten years of experience working as a licensed general contractor or in one of the licensed construction trades. According to a statement from the town, this position will remain open until filled. Candidates should forward a letter of interest and professional resume to the Town Administrator at 29 Depot St., Douglas, MA 01516 for consideration. Applications submitted by Jan. 22 will be reviewed in the first round of consideration.

Uxbridge Police Department welcomes new officer

UXBRIDGE — The Uxbridge Police Department started the new year with a new hire when Officer Graeme Carlton was sworn in recently and will enter the department's Field Training Officer (FTO) program.

"Officer Carlton is that person who sees police work as a calling rather than a job," said Uxbridge Chief of Police Marc Montminy. "He has a sense of duty and community that we

look for."

Carlton, who served in the U.S. Army Reserves, is carrying on a family tradition, added Montminy. His father was a police officer as well.

The department's FTO program pairs a new recruit with a senior veteran police officer, who then trains the recruit, said Montminy.

"At the beginning, you watch and learn and as you go through different weeks you start doing more of the work yourself," he said, adding that when recruits exit the pro-

gram, they are handling 100 percent of the work.

On average, this training takes 19 weeks to complete, but can be less or more depending on the individual.

Upon successful completion, Carlton will join the department's permanent intermittent officer ranks. The FTO program was first designed by the San Jose Police Department, said Montminy, and has evolved over the years as other departments have adopted it.

Watershed group hosts annual winter hike

UXBRIDGE/MENDON — The Blackstone River Watershed Association (BRWA) will host a winter hike on Sunday, Feb. 10 from 1 to 3 p.m. The group will start at Cormier Woods and hike into Meadow Brook Woods in Mendon, originally home to the Nipmuc Tribe. Parking is located at the Cormier Woods parking lot, 217 Chapin St., Uxbridge (abutting the Mendon border).

The leader, natural history guide, Susan Thomas will lead the group on a scenic and informative hike through the fields, woodlands, and waterways of the Cormier Woods and Meadow Brook Woods conservation properties in Mendon.

These 262 acres are managed separately by The Trustees of Reservations, the Mendon Land Use Committee, and the Mendon Conservation Commission, and they include riparian areas, vernal pools, wetlands, meadows, and forested habitats that support a diversity of plants and animals. Intermittent streams drain to Meadow and Wigwam Brooks and Inman Pond, before emptying into the Blackstone River in neighboring Uxbridge. Come winter reminds of the land's rich agricultural past dating back to the 1700s, and learn how the natural and historic resources are being conserved.

Ms. Thomas will lead the group on a scenic and informative three mile hike through the fields, woodlands, and waterways of the Cormier Woods and Meadow Brook Woods conservation properties in Mendon. The ground is a bit uneven because of roots and rocks and could be muddy or snowy depending on the weather. Wear appropriate footwear and bring water. Following the hike, warm drinks and refreshments will be served.

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Fattman sworn in for third term in state Senate

SENATOR CITES LOCAL AID, PUBLIC SAFETY, AND OPIATE CRISIS AS TOP ISSUES

SUTTON—State Senator Ryan C. Fattman (R-Sutton) was sworn in for a third two-year term in the Massachusetts State Senate representing the Worcester and Norfolk district.

Fattman, who previously served as a state representative and selectman, said he was honored to be re-elected with such a large margin in November's election and looks forward to continuing to work on behalf of the people of southern Worcester County.

"It is an honor and privilege to work on behalf of the people in Worcester County in the State Senate," said Fattman. "I am thrilled to continue advocating for the issues that matter most to our communities."

The Senator outlined his priorities for the district including: public safety improvements, stemming the tide on the opiate crisis, increasing local

aid and education funding, working on issues related to millennials such as college affordability, and continuing to make Massachusetts a better place to live.

"Last session I voted for a record amount of funding for our cities and towns in the Commonwealth, and voted to update how we fund our schools. We need to continue where we left off this past January and keep moving the ball forward on helping families in our district," said Fattman. "As a father of two, I am pleased to have the opportunity to work for a better future here in Massachusetts."

Fattman also applauded Governor Charlie Baker's efforts to reform dangerousness hearings for criminals with violent histories. Baker, who was sworn in for a second four year term, cited the need for revised procedures in how vio-

lent criminals can be released shortly after appearing in court.

"I thank Gov. Baker for mentioning this much needed update to our judicial system in his inaugural address. Having previously filed this legislation in the Senate, I look forward to refiling this legislation and advocating for these changes this year," said Fattman.

The Worcester and Norfolk district spans 14 towns along the Connecticut and Rhode Island border and includes Blackstone, Bellingham, Douglas, Dudley, Hopedale, Mendon, Milford, Millville, Northbridge (precincts 1 and 3), Oxford, Southbridge, Sutton, Uxbridge and Webster.

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Pawsitively 4 Pink holds first fundraiser to help ease financial burden for women diagnosed with breast cancer

About one in eight U.S. women will develop invasive breast cancer over the course of their lifetime. In 2018 alone, over 266,000 new cases were diagnosed in American women, Massachusetts being one of the highest occurrences of this diagnosis out of all the United States.

Often given little attention, however, is the economic impact of the diagnosis on patients. Women being treated for early breast cancer lose about a quarter of their annual income. Ten percent of women lose 66 percent or more of their yearly income.

Michelle Power, the President and Founder of Pawsitively 4 Pink, started this non-profit organization after witnessing the journeys of her

long time friend and business partner, her foster mother and most recently, two other family members who were diagnosed with breast cancer. She has seen the devastating effects physically, psychologically and emotionally that this disease has inflicted on these loved ones and their families. After talking with these women she would never have guessed the internal struggles they were experiencing. But behind their faces were hardship and heartache.

"A diagnosis of breast cancer infiltrates their bodies, and can win the daily battles, but we cannot let it win the war and steal what they have worked so hard for in their lives," said Michelle Power, President and

Founder of Pawsitively 4 Pink.

There are numerous side effects to this diagnosis not limited to the physical dimension, including psychological, emotional and fiscal all affecting a women's ability to heal and become healthy.

Pawsitively 4 Pink, a non-profit organization based in Worcester, is holding its first major fundraiser to help supplement some of the financial cost that women in Worcester County who have been diagnosed with breast cancer struggle with. Without a paycheck daily bills including phone, electric, gas, and rent or mortgage payments are unable to be paid intensifying an already stress filled situation.

Researchers followed women who had paying jobs for the

first year after their breast cancer diagnosis, and found that the majority missed work or had reduced hours. Women most affected by lost wages included those with lower education who received chemotherapy and had less of a social support network. They also tended to be self-employed or worked part-time.

Being diagnosed with breast cancer can be life-altering, and handling the news is often a challenge no matter what the prognosis. Couple that emotional pain with lost wages, when they are needed to cover numerous co-pays and transportation costs, as well as medical procedures that are not paid for by insurance, and it's easy to see how a woman could begin to feel overwhelmed.

The fundraising event will be held at 6 p.m. on March 2 at the White Eagle at 116 Green St., Worcester. There will be food, drinks, raffles, silent and live auctions and music. All proceeds go toward the Pawsitively 4 Pink organization and will benefit breast cancer victims.





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

Valley Tech announces tiered focused monitoring review

UPTON – Dr. Michael Fitzpatrick, Superintendent-Director of the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District, was informed by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) of an upcoming Tiered Focused Monitoring Review.

As part of this Tiered Focused Monitoring Review on Feb. 11, DESE's Office of Public School Monitoring will conduct a review of the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School. The Office of Public School Monitoring visits each district and charter school every three years to monitor compliance with federal and state special education and civil rights regulations. Areas of review related to special education include student assessments, determination of eligi-

bility, the Individualized Education Program (IEP) Team process, and IEP development and implementation. Areas of review related to civil rights include bullying, student discipline, physical restraint, and equal access to school programs for all students.

In addition to the onsite visit, parent outreach is an important part of the review process. The review chairperson from the Office of Public School Monitoring will send all parents of students with disabilities an online survey that focuses on key areas of their child's special education program. Survey results will contribute to the development of a report. During the onsite review, the Office of Public School Monitoring will interview the chairperson(s) of the district's Special Education Parent Advisory Council

(SEPEC). Other onsite activities may include interviews of district staff and administrators, reviews of student records, and onsite observations.

Parents and other individuals may call Michelle Hennessy-Kowalchek Public School Monitoring Chairperson, at (781) 338-3704 to request a telephone interview. If an individual requires an accommodation, such as translation, to participate in an interview, the Department will make the necessary arrangements.

Within approximately 60 business days after the onsite visit, the review chairperson will provide the district with a report with information about areas in which the district meets or exceeds regulatory requirements and areas in which the district requires assistance to correct or improve prac-

tices. The public will be able to access the report at www.doe.mass.edu/pqa/review/cpr/reports.



Preserving antique furniture and silver

"Antiques Roadshow" have seen antiques that have lost much of their value after being cleaned. If you are unsure whether to clean an antique, don't. While some antiques can be cleaned, others like coins should never be. This column will offer some guidelines on caring for antique furniture and silver, but the best advice is to consult with a professional before you clean or restore antiques.

If you have a valuable piece of Period furniture or another family heirloom the American Institute for Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works (AIC) offers some great suggestions for preserving your pieces. To preserve antique furniture keep it out of direct sunlight. Damage from visible and ultraviolet light is "cumulative and irreversible." Humidity also affects furniture. The AIC recommends that furniture not be stored in basements or attics and kept away from heating vents and fire places. High humidity can promote mold growth and insect activity in the wood. Changes in humidity can produce shrinkage and cracking.

"It was once thought that furniture needed to be 'fed' with various mixtures of oils and other materials to keep it from drying out," according to the AIC.

It has now been determined that some furniture oils will produce a gummy surface on furniture. Other furniture polishes contain non-drying oils that attract dirt and grime. Silicone polishes leave a film and may interfere with later preservation. For clear-varnished furniture a lightly applied, good paste wax is recommended. AIC notes that "it may not be appropriate to wax furniture that is gilded, painted or lacquered, or furniture that has unstable veneers or flaking finish." Stripping and refinishing used to be considered standard practice, but no longer is. The original finish is important to the piece and can't be recovered once it is removed. They recommend contacting a conservator if you are unsure about what to do.

The Victoria and Albert Museum Web site states that silver tarnishes from car emissions and other pollutants. A wide variety of other factors tarnish silver. Wood, wool, leather, textiles, rubber bands, newspaper, adhesives and even vegetables and egg all emit sulphurous and acidic gases. To help prevent tarnish James Robinson of James Robinson Inc in New York recommended enclosing silver in airtight zip lock plastic bags in his appearance on the Martha Stewart show. He advised against using rubber bands to keep flatware pieces together. Cloth silver protectors help protect from tarnish. Robinson advised that silver that is used regularly can be washed with mild soap and water.

To remove dirt from silver the Victoria and Albert Museum uses solvents on cotton swabs. To remove tarnish, they use a chemical cleaning solution with cotton wool and wash it with de-ionised water. Overcleaning silver can remove hallmarks. They note that when "used carefully these treatments can improve the appearance of silver objects, while retaining signs of wear, which are evidence of past use."

I have seen many pieces of silverplate that appear to have been polished with abrasive cleansers. The thin layer of silver has been worn off exposing the plate beneath. Sometimes, it may be best to leave your silver alone for a while and work on New Year's resolutions instead.

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

GARDNER — The Northbridge High boys' varsity ice hockey team inched closer to the .500 mark on Saturday, Jan. 11 at the Gardner Veterans Arena, thanks to a dominating performance in which they defeated winless Gardner High, 10-1.

With the win the Rams improved to 3-5-1 overall and, more importantly, remained undefeated in Russell Conference play (3-0-1). The Wildcats fell to 0-9 overall and 0-3 in conference action with the loss.

Both teams skated for the full 45 minutes, but the game was over early, Northbridge jumping out to a 2-0 lead in the first five minutes of the game and a 3-0 advantage before the contest was 10 minutes old. Nick Locurto accomplished what is known in hockey circles as a "natural" hat trick, scoring the Rams' first three goals.

The junior made it 1-0 at the 4:20 mark of the first period, being assisted on the goal by freshman Luke Lange and junior Liam Gill. Thirty-seven seconds later Locurto scored again, this time getting help from just Gill, to push the Northbridge advantage to 2-0. At the 8:22 mark of the period Locurto again gathered in a pass from

Gill and quickly rifled it past Gardner goalie Alex Lafreniere to extend the Rams' lead to 3-0.

With 2:06 remaining in the first period Gill scored the first of his three goals — off an assist from Locurto — to give Northbridge a 4-0 leading heading to the second period. Gill finished the game with seven points (three goals, four assists), while Locurto finished with four (three goals, one assist).

"Coming out and being focused and playing meaningful hockey in the first few minutes of the game is an area we've been focusing on, it's an area we've been lacking in," first-year Northbridge head coach Ryan Neville said. "We worked hard on that all week; getting pucks and bodies to the net and making good, clean passes. To be able to do that right off the bat certainly set the tone for the game."

The Rams blew the game open in the second period, scoring five more goals, three coming on the power play. Junior Owen Hogan increased the Northbridge lead to 5-0 just 72 seconds into the period, scoring off assists from sophomore Ryan Couture and junior Alex Smith.

Couture scored the Rams' next two goals, the first coming just 43 seconds after Hogan lit

the lamp, to increase the Northbridge lead to 6-0. After Gardner scored its lone goal of the game, Couture scored again, this time with 3:35 left in the period, off an assist from Gill, to push the lead to 7-1.

Gill then scored his second goal of the game at the 13:26 mark of the period to increase the Rams' lead to 8-1, and then junior Dan Zaluski closed out the second period scoring 28 seconds later, pushing the lead to 9-1 in the process. Gill completed his hat trick in the third period, scoring to make it 10-1 off an assist from Hogan with five minutes remaining in the game.

Northbridge peppered Lafreniere (45 saves) throughout the game, the Rams finishing with 55 total shots on net.

"It's about more than just shots for us, it's about shots with a purpose, shots where if the first shot doesn't go in there's multiple people around the net who can score," explained Neville, who, prior to coming to Northbridge, spent 10 years coaching at St. Peter-Marian High, the last three as the Guardians' head coach. "It was quantity tonight, but we've been focusing on quality of shots and we got a lot of quality shots off tonight."

Neville, who was a goalie for St. John's High from 1994-1998, likes how his team is playing at what is, essentially, the halfway point of the season.

"We're continuing to work hard; we're continuing to get better. We're undefeated in our league, so if we take care of the things we need to take care of from a league perspective we'll be in good shape," Neville said. "Ultimately making the [District] Tournament is our goal and I think nine games in we're improving, but you haven't seen the best Northbridge hockey yet."

SHREWSBURY — With the Northbridge High girls' varsity basketball team, a Division 3 school, taking on Shrewsbury High, a Division 1 club, on Tuesday, Jan. 8, the Rams knew they had their work cut out for them. But Northbridge came to play early and held a 27-22 halftime lead.

"We had a good first half... and we talked about coming out in the third quarter and doing well," explained head coach Matt Gauthier. "They [Shrewsbury] did an excellent job in the third quarter of really being very aggressive, especially in the post. They were just pounding us on the boards."

The Colonials won second half scoring, 34-14, to come from behind and win by 15 points, 56-41.

Shrewsbury's interior pres-

ence was the difference, as junior co-captain and center Jalycianna Horton and junior forward Maggie O'Rawe both posted double-doubles. Horton had game-best totals of 20 points and 13 rebounds, and O'Rawe added 14 points and 11 rebounds. In total, the Colonials outrebounded the Rams, 42-20, and both Horton and O'Rawe scored the majority of their points in the second half.

"She was pretty good at getting deep into the post, which we talked about we couldn't let her do," Gauthier said of Horton, "and then [O'Rawe] was doing a nice job."

Erin Cook, head coach of the Colonials, said that in order for Horton and O'Rawe to contribute at such a high level, her team's guards needed to play better after a lackluster first half.

"I think our guards got more

aggressive, which started opening things up for the post — that was the difference for our offense," said Cook. "The guards, I thought, were pretty tentative in the first half, but then we got some confidence."

Shrewsbury held a 13-8 lead after the first quarter, but the Rams put together their best period in the second frame. There, Northbridge outscored the Colonials, 19-9, to take the lead at the half. The Rams' Hannah Lomonaco, a sophomore, had herself a quarter, scoring 10 of her team-high 15 points in the frame. She hit a pair of 3-pointers and beat the halftime buzzer with a steal and coinciding layup.

It appeared that Northbridge was in line to have a strong second half as well, as senior Jackie Puda opened the third quarter with a steal and a layup to extend the advantage to 29-22. But the Rams could only muster four more points the rest of the way, and Horton and O'Rawe netted 12 of their team's 17 points.

Horton then scored six more points in the fourth quarter and was too much for Northbridge's forwards and guards (who had to defend against her when the forwards got into foul trouble) to handle.

"That's a good thing for us," Cook said of Horton getting the ball in her hands down in the post. "When she's on, she's good."

Gauthier tried to take some positives out of the game, saying, "We're playing a Division 1 team and we were hanging with them until the second half, so that does help us, but we've got to play better. We've got teams in Division 3 that are just as good as some Division 1 teams, so we've got to be ready

Start your engines! Ice augers, that is. Ice fishing has finally arrived, and anglers are wasting no time to do a little bit of ice fishing.

As always, extreme caution needs to be practiced when navigating new ice. Because of the deadline for this column, no reports of fishing from local anglers this week, but I am sure there will be a lot of news next

week.

Reports from Maine: ice fishing anglers have bob houses and other fishing gear being set up on frozen lakes. Hopefully, the ice will hang around for a while, giving anglers a few weeks of good ice fishing. Cape ponds have a coating of ice on them, but may need a few more days of cold weather to make them safe. Remember to wear ice creepers on your shoe or boots to avoid a nasty fall that could send you to the hospital and end your ice fishing expeditions for the year.

This week's two pictures show a local angler with his prize winning broodstock salmon caught a number of years ago at Wallom lake in Douglas, and the second picture shows a

farther and son team ice fishing at Linwood Pond a few years ago. Unfortunately, no broodstock salmon are available to Mass. Fish & Wildlife again this year.

It sure was a great opportunity for anglers to enjoy the experience of landing such a great fish through the ice. Pike fishing in Rhode Island and in lakes in the Western part of Mass. should start to produce some great fish.

The last segment of the Canada goose season in Massachusetts opened this past Tuesday, Feb. 15, and will end on Feb. 15. The late season allows for a liberal daily bag limit of 15 birds. Because of the extreme cold weather and frozen lakes this past week, many geese will be visiting

local rivers to feed and have water. Hunting areas around water require a good bird dog for retrieving downed birds, but can be hazardous for them also. Dogs falling through thin ice can often put the dog in a dangerous condition. I like to have my lab fitted with a good vest that is buoyant and also keeps his body warm when swimming in the frigid water. No goose is worth the life of my dog, as I have told numerous stories of my hunting experiences in past columns that could have very well cost myself and my dog our lives.

Hunting from a canoe or small water craft at this time of year is also dangerous and common sense and caution needs to be practiced on every hunt.

Wearing life preserves at all times when in water craft while hunting this time of year can save your life. I have tipped over my canoe while hunting waterfowl in my younger years and if it happened to me today it would more than likely cost me my life. I no longer have a canoe or small boat to hunt from and I prefer to keep both feet on dry ground. Goose hunting can be a lot of fun but common sense needs to be practiced every minute while out in the great outdoors at this time of year.

If you own a good rabbit dog, this is the time of year to enjoy the baying of the hounds as they trails the scent of the

For Boland, her hot shooting night was simply a matter of taking what the

The Warriors put the game away in the second, opening the period with a 13-5 spurt that was capped off by a left-side, medium-length jumper by Law, which made the score 31-9 with 2:54 remaining in the first half. Tantasqua led, 35-14, at halftime.

In addition to Boland, Law and Zak, scoring for the Warriors were senior Jordyn Trombly (seven points) and Kylee Erin Jensen (four points) and Kylee Fortuna (two points), and sophomores Emmy Cherry (seven points), Ainsley Way (seven points) and Grace Farland (two points).

"Tantasqua is a good basketball team; they should be in the state final," Uxbridge head coach Tracy Larkin said. "I just told Tom, 'I'm rooting for you guys [to win the state title]'. So, they're a good basketball team and we're an eighth-grade basketball team. We have [three] eighth-graders on our roster. That said, we were definitely asleep in the beginning of the game and they didn't rebound at all in the first quarter."

"We need to learn to be more aggressive," Larkin added. "Tantasqua is a big team and physically we're little — much smaller than they are — and we're a little afraid of contact, which we've been working on in practice. We're chipping away at it, but it's baby steps; we're building a program and trying to get the younger kids ready to go."

In addition to Streichert, scoring for the Spartans were senior Olivia Hicks (nine points), junior Ella Correa (two points), sophomore Sarah Johnston (two points) and eighth-graders Grace Orr, Meghan Smith and Katie Cullen, who all scored two points each.

January's 'super blood Moon' eclipse will be visible to millions: Where and how to watch the rare event

Millions of people across the world will witness a partially red-tinted night sky as a rare celestial event arrives this weekend: a "super wolf blood Moon" eclipse.

North America hasn't had a decent view of this special scene in at least three years and another total lunar eclipse — which occurs when the entire Moon enters Earth's shadow — isn't expected to happen again until 2021, NASA predicts.

The 2019 total lunar eclipse will last approximately 1 hour and 2 minutes, Space.com reports. It will kick off around 11:41 p.m. ET on Jan. 20 and peak around 12:16 a.m. ET on Jan. 21.

"The Moon won't be completely invisible during the period of totality when the Earth's shadow completely covers it! A little bit of sunlight is refracted by the Earth's atmosphere and reaches the Moon, bending around the edges of the Earth. This small amount of red light still illuminates the Moon enough for us to see it. Instead of being bright and white, the Moon will be very dim and red, ten thousand or so times dimmer than usual; people call this a 'blood Moon,'" North and South America and portions of western Europe and Africa will be able to see the rusty-colored Moon overnight from Jan. 20 to Jan. 21. Central and eastern Africa and Asia will only be able to see a partial eclipse of the Moon during this time, according to Time and Date.

The U.S. East Coast will definitely have the "best seats" when it comes to viewing the upcoming super blood Moon eclipse. In this part of the country, the Moon is expected to "climb to extraordinary heights," Space.com says.

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
