Author challenges common gardening views

WEBSTER – For many people, gardening is a fairly new practice. But Matt Mattus has done it for decades, and uses land that has grown food for more than a century.

The lessons he's learned doing it are the focus of his new book, which he spoke about last weekend at Booklovers' Gourmet. After reading a lot of other gardening books, he said he wanted to write one that addressed what he'd want to see and would help people who want to "live off their gardens."

That meant he "wanted to

find out what top scientists said" about what works for various crops on top of discussing what he's done over the years. He admits that might challenge some preconceptions. For example, Mattus isn't too concerned about how his practices affect earthworms since the ones here aren't native anyway; the glaciers killed all of ours, although some natives still exist down South. Nor is he too worried about hybrids or GMOs, nor about using glyphosate or various fertilizers. He points to history, saying "many scary insecticides" were used for years, some based on arsenic, but "now

we're just using two or three." But he also noted Roundup is "not a strong chemical, but anything that's used by the millions of gallons gets ugly."

Similarly, he recommends limited use of a variety of chemicals. Some are fairly safe in specific applications – for example, he opposes general use of neonicotinoid poisons, but they can be injected into trees to kill invasive pests like wooly adelgid, which he described as "chemotherapy" for the tree. But he sees no point in spraying to kill gypsy moths.

"I don't think the damage caused by gypsy moths is

worth using insecticides for," he said. "... If a tree gets it for three years, they suffer, but one or two years, they'll be OK."

Despite that, he advocates generally using organic practices, particularly creating your own compost, using manure as fertilizer, adding ashes to "sweeten" the soil (especially since New England's tends to be acidic) and rotating crops. But he combines them with some mild tilling, using synthetic row covers, and replacing the soil for some of his crops every year

Cost Savings a concern at DPW hearing

DUDLEY – The Dudley Board of Selectmen held the first public hearing to discuss the potential creation of a Public Works Department on Monday, March 25 with one of the biggest talking points

being whether or not the town would save money by making the move.

The proposal would consolidate the highway, water and sewer departments under one umbrella overseen by a Department of Public Works Director with foremen for each separate segment of the depart-

ment. The concept is not a new one for Dudley. It was previous explored in 2007, 2012, and 2015. In October of 2018, the town hired Municipal Resources Inc. to perform a best practice review of the three departments involved and it was recommended that the town heavily consider a consolidating to

a single department.

In the first public hearing to debate the concept since the results were submitted to the town, it was water and sewer officials who took up most of the podium time. Water & Sewer Commissioner Tom Fornier aired his concerns that a consolidation of department

would fix what isn't broken and question if it would really save the town any money. When requesting a breakdown of cost savings from selectmen Fornier was not given any concrete numbers which he said was worried him.

Collision leaves one dead in Dudley


DUDLEY – A dangerous crash on Southbridge Road in Dudley resulted in a fatality on Sunday, March 24, according to the Dudley Police Department.

Police received reports of a serious motor vehicle accident at 9:05 a.m. on the morning of March 24 on the bridge over the Quinebaug River on Route 131. Dudley officers Chandler Boyd and Tyler Smith responded to the scene along with fire and emergency personnel where they found two vehicles had been involved in a head-on collision. Police identified the vehicles as a 2006 Ford Fusion and a 2010 Nissan Rogue each with a single occupant at the time of the incident.

Police withheld the names

of the victims for more than 24-hours while they were both evaluated for what was considered serious injuries after the crash. The driver of the Nissan, who was traveling southbound, was later revealed to be John Waleski of Woodstock, Conn. The 68-year-old was hospitalized and considered stable 24 hours after the crash. He suffered non-life-threatening injuries.

The second victim was also identified 24-hours later as 22-year-old Quinn Paul of Southbridge. Paul was traveling northbound towards Southbridge in his Ford Fusion at the time of the incident and was transported to UMass Hospital on Worcester via Life Flight helicopter. Paul succumbed to his injuries later that day.

The accident caused the bridge to be closed for a time and traffic to be detoured so that an investigation could take place. Southbridge Police and Fire and Webster Police assisted on the scene. As of this report the crash remains under investigation by the Dudley Police Department, Central Massachusetts Law Enforcement Council and the office of District Attorney Joseph Early. No charges have been filed.

WEBSTER — Harrington held a ribbon cutting on March 26 to officially unveil its new Physical and Occupational Therapy (PT/OT) clinic in Webster.

Webster man teaches NRA gun safety course

WEBSTER — Firearm ownership continues to grow exponentially year over year within the United States, and more specifically Massachusetts. Americans enjoy the rights and freedoms that citizens of many other countries do not, the ability to keep and bear arms, which the second amendment of the constitution has empowered us since 1791.

Gun ownership originated to protect individuals from tyrannical government. They have evolved into tools in the 21st century to serve many purposes. Gun ownership varies from reasons today such as hunting, target shooting, competition and personal defense within and outside the home.

Americans enjoy this powerful right that citizens of many other countries cannot experience. With this right comes the strong responsibility of having the safe skills and attitude towards handling firearms. Matt Lanava, certified NRA instructor, teaches the home firearm safety course in Webster, and travels to other locations to instruct the high level, four-hour course which

individuals enroll in for a multitude of reasons. One of the main reasons includes but is not limited to persons looking to obtain a License to Carry (LTC) firearms within Massachusetts.

With the large amount of firearms in existence, Matt has a goal to educate and reduce the fear of firearms to ensure the safety of the population as a whole. Education and the proper attitude regarding firearm safety will cause the most impactful reduction in firearm related events. The NRA home firearm safety course instructs students that a gun by itself is neither safe nor unsafe. Any of the unfortunate events happen from one of two reasons, negligence or ignorance.

If the basic fundamental rules of safe firearm handling are followed, unfortunate events related to firearms will not occur.

The NRA home firearm safety course which teaches the fundamentals of firearm safety as a foundation course that should not be the end all be all of firearms.

Matt also helps students with firearm consultation when students are ready to make a firearm purchase and he also schedules range time for students to try out certain firearms and the ability to practice safe shooting principles.

The course also covers what many find to be confusing laws within the state of Massachusetts and help filling out the application form. Many believe that obtaining firearms is an easy process without much regulation. This is convoluted fact as in Massachusetts, individuals purchasing firearms from a dealer must submit a federal background check and report the sale to the state to be documented in the records bureau.

In addition to these laws and fundamentals, the course also covers proper storage of firearms, cleaning and maintenance of firearms, different ammunition and most importantly, the safe loading and unloading of firearms.

Gun laws and regulations can often be misguided emotion towards a passionate nerve that strikes individuals.

All media platforms as well as political agendas are also often manipulated. When focusing on the safety of firearms, the main objective remains the same across all individuals. No one wants to have unfortunate firearm events. In the case of everyone wanting the population to be safer, firearm safety and education should be a high priority for all individuals.

This is not an issue of liberal versus conservative, nor is it a democrat versus republican issue; this is the priority of safety from a multitude of angles from the handling of firearms that one may come across whether intentionally or not as well as proper storage away from unauthorized persons and making sure everyone takes the proper responsibilities.

Opioid calls up for Dudley FD

DUDLEY – While the opioid epidemic has certainly been a big news item in recent years, it's easy to forget that the issue is not limited to big cities. It's just as relevant and widespread in smaller communities as well, according to Dudley Fire Chief Dean Kochanowski, who says the number of opioid related calls in town are on the rise.

Chief Kochanowski aired his concerns before the Board of

Selectmen on March 25 where he admitted that the opioid issue is "at the forefront" of emergency services and law enforcement in society and it has certainly become an issue in the relatively small town of Dudley. According to the chief the number of opioid related calls has seen a significant jump in just the first three months of 2019 when compared to last year and that has him concerned.

"Between 2018 and the first three months of 2019 at the rate we're going we'd have a

154 percent increase of overdoses at a cost of about \$3,292 and a 237 percent increase in Narcan doses given," Chief Kochanowski said. "It is costing us more money. The trend is going upward – It's not just in the sections of town where you might think it is. We're finding it in the upper-class neighborhoods of town as well so it's kind of spreading out there."

The Board of Selectmen called this a "sad trend," and one they obviously want to see turned around. While Chief

Kochanowski couldn't provide specific breakdowns for selectmen although the chief did explain not all the recorded cases were Dudley residents. While state and local officials continue to seek answers to this disturbing trend it has become an unfortunate truth that the opioid crisis is certainly not an isolated to just larger metropolitan areas.

That wasn't the only bit of news from the Dudley Fire Department on March 25. Later this month the department will be looking to increase ambu-

lance rates, something Chief Kochanowski said is overdue and needs to be done before the state prevents the town from further increases.

"As of July 1 of this year, we will no longer have the ability to raise rates. (The state) is going to freeze it," said the chief. "We have to raise it now and I'm going to come in line with all the area towns."

If approved, the rate increase will be the first such hike for the ambulance rate since 2014.

Walk Against Domestic Violence coming to Dudley

DUDLEY – A local high school student is heading up a special walk at the beginning of May that he hopes will draw attention to an important cause in today's society.

Eric Prussman, a student at Shepherd Hill Regional High School, has received approval by the Dudley Board of Selectmen to hold a 5K event on Sunday May 5 called the Walk Against Domestic Violence. The goal of the walk is to raise awareness for domestic violence and, hopefully, put an end to an issue that has become a hot topic of conversation

on social media over the past few years due mainly to the number of athletes and celebrities who have committed the crime against their significant others.

Prussman has partnered with the Student Council to help recruit volunteers for the event and said that his membership in the school's Game Change organization, a domestic violence awareness and prevention group, helped stir the concept of a walk for the cause.

"That inspired me to pursue the cause against domestic violence. It's a run or walk 5K. The goal is just to get to the finish line," Prussman said.

The route is already set in stone and

will see walkers and runners begin at the Elementary School before making their way through town and ending where the walk and run begins.

"It's going to start at the Elementary School and then you go down Mill Street, turn onto Charlton Road and then onto Sawmill Road. You turn onto Lakeview Avenue across Dudley Beach through the woods trail and on to West Main Street. It'll pinch you down to the Dippin' Donuts intersection and then turn back to the Elementary School,"

Prussman explained.

The walk received praise from selectmen as a worthy initiative, with Selectman Steve Sullivan saying, "I'm a hundred percent in favor of it. I think this is a wonderful cause."

Police Chief Steve Wojnar said he has discussed the route with Prussman and is aware of the specification of the 5K event.

The Walk for Domestic Violence will take place on May 5, and will start at 8:30 a.m. Registration for the event will begin at 7:30 a.m.

Eric went on Amazon and purchased a 120-inch movie screen, and he then went to the local hardware







McGovern, Markey stump for Green New Deal

NORTHAMPTON — US Rep. James McGovern and Sen Edward Markey appealed to the nation's young people to come out in force to push for the Green New Deal and policies that confront climate change.

"We need you now more than ever before," McGovern said. "... Coming here gives me incredible hope about what we can get done. We believe in science; we don't think it's a radical idea to believe in science."

The two Democrats were hosting a "Town Hall" in Northampton recently to field questions from the public about what the Green New Deal (GND) is. McGovern noted he's planning a similar event in Worcester for the near future, but didn't have a date yet.

"Protecting this planet has to be at the top of our priority list," he said, noting that he's "stunned" by the reaction of some fellow Congresspeople to the GND and climate issue. He noted many ignore the climate science and have thrown "all these kinds of fear tactics" at the GND proposal, "... but that's what they do when they don't have facts on their side."

In fact, a procedural vote that gave no opportunity for debate in the US Senate recently stalled GND in that chamber, with most Republicans voting no and most Democrats voting "present." But the effort to promote it to the public is continuing, according to sponsor Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez's (D-New York) Twitter feed.

McGovern said something similar before the vote, saying supporters would be working over the next several months "to put some meat on the bones of the Green New Deal."

The resolution itself, just 2,000 words, was filed primarily to start a conversation of the various issues it contains, with a lot more work necessary - it calls for "a 10-year national mobilization" - to actually create the legislation that will make its ideas happen. Those ideas include "providing funding for community-defined projects and strategies" that mitigate and address the consequences of climate change, lots of infrastructure work, "meeting 100 percent of power demand" through renewables and "distributed" smart grids, making major changes in agriculture, "overhauling transportation systems," "restoring natural ecosystems" and forests, cleaning up hazardous waste sites and eliminating pollution sources, and "promoting the international exchange" of workable ideas and practices. Among other things, it calls for having the federal government "take into account the complete environmental and social costs" of emissions using "democratic and participatory processes that are inclusive of and led by front-line and vulnerable communities and workers" at local levels.

That last phrase sparked a fair number of the comments in Northampton, including the second speaker, Richard Fine. To him, the "social aspects of this troubled me," and asked what they meant by that phrasing.

"during the first New Deal, the Dixiecrats - they were Democrats - didn't like the idea of giving full rights to blacks," Markey replied by analogy. He continued by saying polluting companies tend to do business in "the weakest communities," often poor and/or minority, and GND's goal is to ensure those communities are included.

He also recalled his own childhood in urban Malden, where the river was "purple," but "suburban communities didn't have rivers that were purple."

McGovern agreed, pointing to the lead water contamination in Flint, Mich. There, he said, residents knew their water was contaminated, "but nobody cared and nobody listened," and many other communities nationwide are "neglected and exploited because they're poor and communities of color."

Jeff Singleton also said he's "a little concerned" about the politics of GND and noted supporters need to "consolidate the rhetoric" around the facts in ways similar to how advocates successfully built opposition to Vietnam, not "just [accuse] people of being climate-deniers who are just skeptical."

Markey rattled off several figures to support his position, noting the US has already seen the rise in renewables from 1000 MW to 65,000 MW since 2008 and creation of 350,000 solar jobs. To him, there's an "economic, environmental and moral case" for doing this.

"We intend to create another 3-4 million blue collar workers" in climate-related fields, he added. "...Once you change the policy, you unleash this incredible economic engine" that can implement it.

McGovern agreed, noting the country already provides massive subsidies to fossil fuels, and that money should be transferred to clean energy.

"110 years of subsidies to oil companies is 'capitalism,' but this is 'socialism'" Markey remarked. He later added the political right "are supporters of socialism on stilts that benefits the biggest, most powerful corporations."

Later, McGovern pointed to one key non-GND change that would make a huge difference in getting things done for the people: "get big money out of politics." That prompted several public comments, including some that were overtly critical of capitalism as a whole. One woman described the wealthy as "the parasitic class," and noted "capitalism sunk this country into the Depression" in the 1930s and "cannot solve this problem." Another woman added that "Capitalism has failed us. It's an unsustainable system that feeds off the degradation of the Earth."

Neither Markey nor McGovern took on that idea directly, but Markey acknowledged the first New Deal "saved capitalism from itself. ...Unfettered capitalism ends up being immoral. What we need is capitalism with a conscience." He said GND is "about taking back our country from those special interests. ... Failure is not an option for the Green New Deal. We have to collapse the power of an industry that lies" about climate change and pollution.

Both of them also more-or-less avoided a couple of speakers' direct accusations that the US military is the largest source of CO2 on Earth and should be cut "by 50 percent." While he agreed the defense budget is "bloated in many ways and has to be cut," Markey mostly talked about the other side of the military-CO2 issue, namely, that the military has repeatedly warned climate change will have a major impact on US ability to do things around the world, will hit many of our bases hard, and will cause conflict in many areas.

To Sherry Morgan, state and local effort is "absolutely critical," particularly when aimed at CO2 reduction. While she likes GND and other similar bills, they'll take effect "in 2021 and out," but "Massachusetts needs to step up this year and make sure we start working on this problem." She noted 81 state legislators signed onto a resolution to do that.

Markey agreed, noting a lot of climate leadership is coming from the cities.

He noted what will make it happen is "an intergenerational partnership" that builds "political momentum" for such changes going into the 2020 elections. Later, in response to a comment saying GND should include "reparations for black slavery and indigenous oppression," he said, "That's why I called [Ocasio-Cortez] ... so that when we do it, it includes everyone and leaves no one behind."

McGovern added that we need to make the GND ideas specific, looking at such issues as how much of each energy type we need. "We can lead the country if we get it right in Massachusetts," he said.

McGovern said the goal is to "speak to everyone," and include "communities that have been historically neglected," some of which host "environmentally harsh" conditions. He cited the effort to oppose gas pipeline expansion across Massachusetts as an example of how to do it, noting that building additional gas capacity would require "a multi-billion dollar infrastructure" that would hook us to using it for decades. That money should be used to change our economy and energy system instead.

A Greenfield man summarized the whole issue by saying, "The root word for economy and for ecology is the same, and it means house or home."

“Over the past four years, we have improved our clinical services, including to expanding on staff certifications and advanced training related to new program development including oncology rehab, sports rehab, lymphedema rehab, and other rehab specialties,” said Director of Rehabilitation Brenda Ebode, DPT. “We continue to grow every year, and we promise to give patients the absolute best, high quality, compassionate care.”

The Webster clinic has 12 therapists who work Monday through Saturday, offering a variety of specialized treatment, including

Sen. Ryan Fattman was in attendance, along with Rep. Joe McKenna, who spoke about his personal experience receiving post-surgical rehab at the Webster clinic.

“My experience at Harrington’s clinic after shoulder surgery was far better than the care I had received in Boston.

Every therapist who worked with me knew me personally and gave me more attention while I was receiving treatment, not to mention that the therapy itself was more thorough and effective,” McKenna said.

“Maybe the best part was that it was local!” he said, citing he previously received pre-op physical therapy in Boston.

Patient appointments in the new space began on April 1.

"Personally, I see the water and sewer commissioners doing a great job with what we have. I don't see a need to change unless they can see substantial money savings," Fornier said, later commenting on the Board of Selectmen's lack of cost savings figures. "You should have your answer up front what it's going to cost. You're not saying anything about what it's going to cost the average Joe citizen. Are they going to save money or is the rate going to go up? That's an answer that should be talked about now before this goes to town meeting."

While selectmen admitted they didn't have any hard figures to present, the did say this is a work and progress and argued that the point of the public hearing is to collect data and public concerns to prepare for more in depth conversations at later meetings and the annual town meeting.

In regard to Fornier's concerns, Selectman Kerry Cyganiewicz, a former member of the Finance Committee, said that even without hard numbers he feels it's evident a DPW Director would cost less than the current dual-superintendent format the town employs today and the fact that both superintendent positions are vacant makes it a good time to explore a change.

"If we've got \$83,000 and \$83,000 for the (two superintendents) and \$20,000 apiece for benefits that's \$103,000 apiece so we're at \$206,000. We eliminate that and we get a director. Let's go with \$125,000. We've got \$81,000 we save. I'm sure the difference if you (promote) someone up to a foreman is not going to eat up \$81,000 and that's not even touching the savings we're going to have in economies of scale," Cyganiewicz explained.

Selectman John Marsi said he believes some of the concerns stem from the potential of rate increases and unknowns that are expected to be resolved before the annual town meeting discussion on the subject.

"I think there's a little fear, uncertainty and doubt (about the water rates). I don't think that's fair right

now. Notionally there's savings right off the top. Once we go through with all of these numbers then we can actually say that. We're known for having fair and reasonable water and sewer rates so why would we jack those up to fund these things? Nobody has ever said that," Marsi said.

Selectman Paul Joseph said he believes the Department of Public Works discussion is on the right track and while there may be some doubt from those within the departments involved he feels the discussion is accomplishing what it needs to by getting available information and concerns out in the open for discussion.

"When we decided to embark on this we said we would go for and support a Department of Public Works if it does the following: improves services to the people no matter how minutely, that it was done financially in an efficient manner, and three that we would support a DPW provided that no current employees lose their job. As of right now we're still on track for all of those to happen," said Joseph.

Finally, Selectman Steve Sullivan said he wanted to make it clear that the exploration of a Department of Public Works is not a reflection on the job the water, sewer and highway employees and officials have done as he believes

their level of work has been productive and commendable.

"It was no reflection of dissatisfaction at the board member level. The big one too we said was it's not a money grab to get enterprise money," Sullivan said. "I would challenge anybody to find me a business of the scope of our budget that does not have one board of directors and one person in charge. Whether it's separate divisions they all float to the top. There's somebody in charge."

The Dudley selectmen are expected to continue the public hearing concerning the Department of Public Works during their upcoming meeting in early April.

Tagging is not a crime taken lightly

Someone recently read about the offense of "tagging." On its face, this appears to sound minor in nature; however, it is a very serious offense. I was asked to explain this crime and the potential penalties.

The crime of "tagging" is a form of property destruction. It is described in Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 266 Section 126B as anyone who "sprays or applies paint or places a sticker upon a building, wall, fence, sign, tablet, grave-stone, monument or other object or thing on a public way or adjoined to it, or in public view, or on private property." It also involves the marking of "words or phrases associated to such persons, conduct or activity, either as an individual or in a group." An example of this may be a person spray painting his or her initials on a building or other place. People may more commonly refer to this type of activity as "graffiti."

Serious fines and penalties are associated with this offense. It carries a jail sentence of up to two years. It also has a minimum fine of \$1,500 or three times the value of the property so destroyed "whichever is greater." A person can be subject to both jail and a fine. Another major consideration is the person convicted of this offense will also have their license to operate suspended for one year. If the offender is under age 16, their license eligibility time will be extended by one year. In other words, a young person would not be able to obtain a license until at least age 17 and one half.

This may appear to be harmless fun to some, but it comes with a great cost and aggravation on behalf of the property owners. A great deal of money, time, and effort goes into the clean-up of these crimes. People who are considering committing this offense, should certainly take time to weigh the consequences.

Moving slowly in the fast lane

The world is moving at a faster pace than anyone living 20 or 30 years ago could have imagined.

In 1989, computers were the things teachers warned we'd never be able to "carry around in our pockets," so we still needed to learn advanced math functions. To see the weekly forecast, we had to either watch the 6 o'clock news or trust the printed version in the daily newspaper. To access facts and information, we visited the library. That was all fine with us. That was life.

In 1999, there were more and better computers, and the Internet (known then as the World Wide Web) was expanding steadily. Our access to this vast body of knowledge was through dial-up modems, waiting patiently for the ringing-static-beeping signal for a connection, and then waiting further for the page to "load." We'd scroll through the content and click on a hyperlink – repeating the process, as our desktop computer slowly accessed the new information. We were pretty happy with that. People with modems were cool. And it was so much faster than a trip to the library. Now we had instant info at our fingertips.

In 2019, our perception of "fast" and "instant" has taken on new meaning.

We are inseparable from our phones, our Kindles, our watches and our Fitbits. Need to know tomorrow's forecast? Glance at your Android. Did the Celtics win? Google it. When is the next band concert for the middle school? Check your calendar...on your phone. Need a new book to read? Download it. Could our 1999 selves ever have conceived of these things? Could we ever go back to our old perceptions of what constitutes "a long time?"

There are still things in life that cannot be rushed: long-simmered soups and stews; a hike through the forest; a conversation with a beloved friend; a long drive on a Sunday afternoon. In those moments, life slows down again. Where once speed was a luxury and a reason to be excited, now we crave the leisurely, unhurried pace of a day without our gadgets. We unplug and chill out. We remember to look up and around and take in our surroundings. Life slows down... for a while. Or at least until the alarm on our phone reminds us that it's time to get going again.

What can you do with your tax refund?

Invest the money. In 2018, the average tax refund was about \$2,700. For this year, it might be somewhat lower, due to changes in the tax laws and the failure of taxpayers to adjust their withholdings in response. However, if you were to receive in the neighborhood of \$2,700, you'd be almost halfway to the annual IRA contribution limit, which, in 2019, is \$6,000. (If you're 50 or older, you can put in up to \$7,000). If you have already "maxed out" on your IRA, you could use your refund to fill in gaps you may have in other parts of your investment portfolio.

Pay insurance premiums. Let's face it – nobody really likes paying insurance premiums. Yet, if you have anyone depending on you, you will certainly need life insurance, and possibly disability insurance as well. And if you want to help protect your financial resources later in life from threats such as an extended – and hugely expensive – stay in a nursing home, you also may want to consider long-term care insurance. Your tax refund could help pay for some of these premiums, boosting your cash flow during the months you would normally be making these payments.

Contribute to a college fund. It's never

too soon to begin saving for college, which has grown increasingly expensive over the last several years. So, if you have young children, you may want to think about investing some or all of your refund into a college-savings account, such as a tax-advantaged 529 plan.

Pay off debts. You might be able to use your refund to pay down some debts – or perhaps even pay off some of your smaller ones. The lower your monthly debt load, the more money you will have available to invest for the future. Keep in mind, though, that you might not want to look at all debts in the same way. For example, putting extra money toward your mortgage might help you pay it off faster, but you'll also be funding an asset – namely, your house – that might not provide you with the same liquidity as you can get from investments such as stocks and bonds.

Help build an emergency fund. Another Round of Lenten Meals: Take a Tip from the Past

Generations of women (and men!) have taken up the challenge each year to prepare delicious and creative meatless dishes during the Lenten season. While this column shared some ideas earlier this month, I thought we'd take a nostalgic look at meatless meals this week. In fact, some of my fondest childhood memories include helping my mom skewer fish kebabs on metal rods and chopping chunks of Velveeta for her famous macaroni and cheese – both meals made popular courtesy of Catholic meat restrictions!

It was while I was (literally) tossing a frozen fish fillet in the oven last Friday night that I vowed to take time out to rediscover the "comfort meals" of past generations. Since I collect old cookbooks, an accumulation of time-tested meals were right at my fingertips. A quick look through a few of the books revealed meatless dishes that were both interesting and easier to prepare than I anticipated!

So – in the interest of uninspired cooks everywhere, this week's column will feature a menu of meat alternatives that promise to bring rave reviews from even the most fussy family meal critic!

"California Chicken" Pie (first served in the 1930s by Ruth Wakefield at The Toll House Restaurant, Whitman)

This mock "chicken" pie is the epitome of comfort food! I cheated and used a premade refrigerator pie crust; if you are really pressed for time, you can also substitute canned potatoes and carrots. I also used salmon in place of tuna fish.

Ingredients: one medium sized onion, chopped; one cup peas; two diced carrots; two diced potatoes; one large can tuna fish; two tablespoons flour; one tablespoon butter; one cup milk; one teaspoon salt; one eighth teaspoon pep-

per; one quarter teaspoon paprika.

Preparation: Boil the carrots and potatoes. Add peas to chopped onion. Make a white sauce by melting butter, add flour and stir until smooth. Add milk, salt, pepper, and paprika. Cook until thick and smooth. Add one cup tuna, broken into small pieces. Fill a baking dish with mixture in layers. Cover with an upper crust or buttered crumbs and bake until brown in a 450 degree oven. Serves 6.

Onion Soup - Toll House Style
 Why not start a Lenten meal with an elegant appetizer? This original Toll House Onion Soup recipe can be adapted to better serve today's busy cook with the use of canned vegetable stock.

Ingredients: One pound onions, sliced and cooked in butter; 1 ½ rich vegetable stock; one tablespoon flour

Preparation: Cook onions until brown, sprinkle with flour and stir. Add to chicken stock slowly, stirring until smooth. Let stand for several hours or the night before for best flavor. Serve soup with a slice of French bread sprinkled with Parmesan or Romano cheese and toast in the oven the last moment. Serve grated cheese on the soup.

Babyboomer Mac and Cheese
 Those "over fifty" will recall this familiar favorite, which was often topped with fresh slices of tomato. Substituting crushed potato chips for the crackers is another delicious option. Use casserole sized elbows to really bring back the memories.



TAKE THE HINT

Ingredients: one quarter cup (½ stick) butter; one quarter cup flour; one cup milk; 8 ounces Velveeta cheese, cut up; two cups elbow macaroni, cooked, drained.; one half cup shredded Cheddar cheese; one quarter cup crushed Ritz crackers.

Preparation: Preheat oven to 350 F. Melt 3 tablespoons of the butter in medium saucepan on low heat. Add flour; mix well. Cook 2 min., stirring constantly. Gradually add milk, stirring until well blended. Cook on medium heat until mixture boils and thickens, stirring constantly. Add Velveeta; cook until melted, stirring frequently. Add macaroni; mix lightly. Spoon into lightly greased 2-qt. casserole dish; sprinkle with shredded cheese. Melt remaining 1 tablespoons butter; toss with cracker crumbs. Sprinkle over casserole. Bake for 20 minutes or until heated through.

Shrimp Creole in the Crock Pot
 A crock pot makes this meal hassle free. Let it cook all day, then add shrimp the last hour. What could be easier on a busy Friday night?

Ingredients: One pound shrimp, shelled; 1 ½ cups diced celery; 1 ¼ cups chopped onion; one cup chopped bell pepper; 1(8 oz.) can tomato sauce; 1 (28 oz.) can whole tomatoes, broken up; 1 clove garlic, minced; 1teaspoon salt; one quarter teaspoon pepper; six drops Tabasco, or to taste; prepared rice.

Preparation: Combine all ingredients except shrimp in the crock pot. Cook 3 to 4 hours on high or 6 to 8 hours on low. Add shrimp last hour of cooking. Serve over hot rice or thin spaghetti.

Baked Bean Roast
 This is from "The American Women's Cookbook," Culinary Arts Institute, 1947. Readers who try this vegetarian loaf are encouraged to send in feedback!

Ingredients: Four cups mashed baked beans; two eggs, slightly beaten; two cups bread crumbs; one cup tomatoes; two tablespoons minced peppers; two tablespoons minced onion; four tablespoons olive oil; one half teaspoon paprika; salt and pepper.

Preparation: Cook pepper and onions in fat. Add other ingredients in the order given. Bake (350 degrees) in greased baking dish for 30 minutes. Serve with brown sauce or tomato sauce.

Freshwater fishing season begins

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Massachusetts Fish & Wildlife has been stocking fish all last week, and will continue to do so this week. Many anglers are catching limits of recently stocked trout using power bait and lures. Many trout are following the lures & are hitting them close to the shoreline. Reports of a lot of dead trout along the shoreline of Webster Lake last week right after they were stocked have anglers upset. Some speculate the pump that provides oxygen to the fish while in transport had failed, leaving the trout in poor shape at stocking time. No information on the fish kill by MFW was available at the time of this deadline.

Anglers are patiently waiting for the trout fishing to open at Wallum Lake in Douglas next Saturday, April 13. Because the lake falls under the jurisdiction of Rhode Island, there fishing regulations apply. The interstate body of water is stocked annually by both Mass. & Rhode Island, and a liberal daily bag limit of trout is five. For many years, Wallum Lake had hundreds of anglers fishing on opening day, but now there are 100 or less attending the opening day. Be sure to wear your life preserver in boats, kayaks, or canoes. It is the law, and can save your life.

The Quabbin Reservoir generally opens on the third Saturday in April. The Wachusett Res. normally

opens on the first Saturday in April, to shore fishing only. To find out more about the April openings on both bodies of water, call 413-323-7221. Ice conditions could change the opening dates.

This week's picture shows Dan Southwick with a monster Musky (Muskellunge) that he recently caught in another state while ice fishing. It took Southwick well over an hour to bring the huge fish through the 12 inch hole. Dan is a fisherman that is very good at catching monster fish like Musky, Northern Pike, and huge Bass! Keeping his fishing spots secret is not an easy task. Nice fish, Dan! Mass. has attempted to raise tiger musky, but did not have much success, although there pike program is quite popular, and does well when the state purchases small pike from another state, and stocks them in some of the major lakes and ponds outside of the valley area.

The freshwater sport-fishing awards program in Mass. is open to 22 different species of fish. It is a popular program, and has hundreds of entries annually. The problem is that fish must be weighed on certified scales by the state. MFW needs to find another way for anglers to certify their catch. By the time the fish are weighed in at a certified scale, most fish are in poor shape and often die. With all of the high technology available today, someone should find a way, by using there cell phone. One popular magazine already has taken action to allow an angler to register there fish and release it after taking a picture and measuring it, for entry into numerous derbies. Just imagine how many



fish will live to fight again, giving another angler the thrill of catching a trophy fish.

Numerous forms of wildlife have survived the winter months very well this year and are being observed by local sportsmen on a daily basis in the valley. Wild turkeys are already strutting their stuff trying to lure a hen to mate, although it is a bit early. Turkey hunting opens on April 29 this year in Mass. There sure is no shortage of birds this year! Deer are also being observed in local fields and also crossing roads. This writer had four deer cross in front of my car this past Sunday. They looked to be in great shape, but were extremely small for year old deer. There are no changes in the daily bag limit for tur-

keys this year, but it could take affect next year.

It was brought to my attention by a fellow sportsmen that Mass. Fish & Wildlife has not renewed their contract with the Corp of Engineers at West Hill Dam. The release is due to run out in October of this year. The popular hunting & fishing spot is used daily by anglers and hunters. It would be a shame if it was lost. Send an e-mail to Mass. Fish & Wildlife voicing your concerns. The state is also contemplating dropping the stocking of pheasant in areas on the Cape. The valley area has lost to many local covers, that received pheasant stocking over the past twenty years. Sportsmen had better wake up and become involved, by writing letters

to MF&W stating your concern over the pheasant hunting in your area. Contacting your State Senator and State Representative about your concerns could help.

Part of his opposition is from his background in packaging (he worked for Hasbro until two years ago), which made him "nervous about cardboard... a lot of chemicals go into it."

Such ideas wove through a largely freeform discussion Mattus was having with about a dozen people, although he said he also has a slideshow talk on the topic. Surrounding the technical

comments were references to a salad of garden vegetables, some of them not well known.

One was celtuce, also known as stem lettuce or wu sun in Asian restaurants. Mattus noted it's really just an Asian variant of common romaine lettuce that farmers selected for its stem rather than its leaves over the few thousand years since romaine started being grown in Italy and spread from there. Once, when flying over the Himalayas, he saw fields of a red version of it from the air, and said it grows fast, germinates in cold weather (mid-30s) and transplants easily.

By contrast, Mattus discovered over the years that plants of the brassica family shouldn't be planted the way

people often do. A common practice is to seed it around now, but that means it matures in July and is often subject to pests. In their original climate zone, he noted, the brassicas seed in summer and mature in the cool weather of autumn. (This family includes broccoli, cabbage, kohlrabi and other plants that are actually the same species.)

Also in the myth-busting vein, Mattus said seed-saving for tomatoes or cucurbits (the squash family) isn't usually useful; they won't breed true unless planted in isolation, since it's "a very promiscuous genus." Likewise, there's no such thing as "baby carrots." They're just shaped and cut parts of standard carrots (usually Nantes variety) that have grown too big to go through regu-

lar commercial processing systems.

"If you pull up a real baby carrot, you know it's just a piece of dental floss," he said.

Mattus, a Worcester resident, said he "grew up in that culture where we were sort of 'child labor'" in helping his parents garden. He was a late baby, born when his parents were in their 50s. They had gone through the Depression, exposed to common Victory gardens and other self-sufficiency practices, he said. For several years, he's been writing a popular gardening blog called "Growing with Plants" at www.growingwithplants.com.

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
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

Offensive surge helps Rams win season opener versus Tantasqua

DUDLEY — Carmignani Memorial Field was the site for the season-opening girls' varsity lacrosse game between Shepherd Hill and Tantasqua Regional on Friday, March 29, and the host Rams started and finished hot en route to a 15-8 victory.

Shepherd Hill scored the game's first six goals and, after the Warriors had trimmed the deficit down to 6-4, they scored six consecutive again to surge ahead, 12-4.

"We started hot and then we kind of settled down and thought it was going to be an easy game," explained Meg Dunn, the Rams' first-year head coach. "They scored three and we called a timeout and got everything back together. Hopefully we don't have to go through that again, [but] we responded well after that."

Dunn was pleased with how her team jumped out to the six-goal advantage before Tantasqua could score its first with 8:10 remaining in the first 25-minute half.

"We came out ready to go, but it's all about possession: winning groundballs, winning draws, and that's what we did in the beginning," she noted.

Shepherd Hill's Claudia Bonaventura scored the game's first goal and was followed by Tori Paine scoring. Bonaventura then grabbed her second and third goals before Skylar Pietz scored twice to make it 6-0.

Tantasqua head coach Heather Egan did explain a potential reason for the Rams' fast start.

"We had an equipment issue with our goalie, so we had to put in a girl who had never played goal before," she said. "I

give McKenna Lowell all kinds of props."

Normal goalie Jordan Guilette wasn't able to go, so Lowell stepped in. After surrendering the first six goals, Egan switched to Paige Alexander, who had only played in goal a few times in youth lacrosse.

"They're great kids that would do anything for me, so when I asked them they said yes," Egan said of Lowell and Alexander sacrificing for the betterment of the team.

Egan also acknowledged the play of some of her other players as the Warriors got as close as 6-4 down before halftime.

"I think our field players did a great job," she said. "Lila LaPorte fought like a dog out there. Cami Freeland got it going on the attack, I think she had four goals."

Freeland had three of the goals in the four-goal stretch, while Liz Beaumont had the other.

Shepherd Hill's Pietz scored just before halftime to make it 7-4, though, and the Rams added the first five of the second half (scorers were Paine for the first three, Lauren Alicea and Pietz) to pull away, 12-4.

After the Warriors netted the next three (off the sticks of Freeland, Addie Ellithorp and Beaumont) to make it 12-7, the Rams' Bonaventura, Hannah Cushing and Pietz scored in succession.

Tantasqua's Maddi Varney registered the game's final goal.

Pietz scored five times for Shepherd Hill, while Paine and Bonaventura both added four tallies.

"For the first game, they did well. They came out with good energy," said Dunn, who served as the

junior varsity coach during the program's first two years. Prior varsity coach Sarah Morin stepped down for family reasons so Dunn — who had no prior lacrosse experience before learning a lot from Morin — was the next person in line to lead the team.

"We have high expectations.

We saw how good we could be last year; I think we can be even better," she said of last spring's District-bound team and what could be in store in 2019.

On the flip side, Tantasqua had made Districts nine years in a row — their first nine years in the program's history

— before coming up short in 2018.

"The girls all want to do it," Egan said of getting back to the playoffs. "The first handful of years we won the league and then Grafton started winning it. We want to have the opportunity to win the league again and make Districts again."
