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## Controversial clock concerns Sitkowski Apartment residents

SELECTMEN RESPOND TO COMPLAINTS ABOUT CLOCK TOWER BELL

WEBSTER — Complaints concerning a historic bell in the clock tower of the Webster Town Hall have received little support from the Board of Selectmen after Selectman Robert Miller brought recent complaints to the attention of town leaders on June 27. Miller said he received a letter, which he believed came from the

residents on the fourth floor of the new Sitkowski Apartments adjacent to the town hall, complaining about the clock tower bell chiming every hour, even overnight. Miller said this apparently has caused a disturbance for many, but he immediately made his feelings known that the bell needs to be left alone.

"It's not up to me so I wanted to present it to the board. [Selectmen]

have a copy of that original letter that I received," Miller said. "My whole problem with this is, you know, that clock is part of the town history. It was moved from the original Bartlett High School and back over here. That's where it's been since 1928. I think it's a part of Webster history and God knows we're out to preserve some of the history that we do have left."

Miller called the bell a

landmark and was very forward in saying that while the bell does make its share of noise, it has also been a staple of the community for years and that stopping its chime would be a shame.

Last year tenants finally moved into the Sitkowski Apartments, a Neighborhood of Affordable Housing initiative that houses 66 apartments in the old school structure behind

WEBSTER — Following the passing of Webster's town budget during a rather contentious budget season, one adjustment made for cost saving and other purposes will be initiated in the next month or so as the yearly stipend for part-time inspectors will be done away with in the new budget year.

Acting Town Administrator Pam Leduc spoke on the impending change telling selectmen more specific details will be discussed in July, but she took the time to provide an overview of what exactly this change will mean for Webster going forward.

## Webster crash displaces family, driver in serious condition

WEBSTER — Webster police responded to a very dangerous situation on June 26 after a vehicle rammed into a home on Westfield Drive, causing significant damage to the buildings and displacing a family in the process.

Police released details on the incident, which occurred at 12:02 a.m. At that point the Southern Worcester County Communication Center received multiple 911 calls reporting that a

vehicle had struck a residence at 17 Westfield Drive.

Officers were dispatched to the area with off duty Webster officer Timothy Whiting being the first on scene. Officer Whiting reportedly issued first aid to the operator of the vehicle, who was identified as Matthew E. Dupras, a 22-year-old resident of Upton Street in Millbury. Officer Patrick R. Perry and Sgt. Toby M. Wheeler were next on the scene and secured it as medi-

cal units also responded and Webster Officer Joseph Reed responded to assist.

The vehicle involved in the incident was reported to be a Chevy Lumina with police reports saying the vehicle collided with the ranch style residence on Westfield Drive. The car damaged the foundation of the wooden structure and caused structural damage that created concerns for the condition of the home.

## Caissie announces bid for re-election to Governor's Council

Governor's Councilor Jen Caissie (7th District) is seeking re-election on Nov. 8.

Caissie is an attorney in private practice and special prosecutor for the Middle District. Caissie was first elected in 2010

on a platform of public safety, victims' rights and 2nd Amendment rights. "Those were my core issues then and continue to be with nominees that I vet for judgeships. The public demands it and the taxpayers deserve it," Caissie said.

Caissie is the only Republican on the eight member Governor's Council, but says her issues transcend politics.

"People want safe neighborhoods and schools for their kids and families. Confirming the right judicial nominees have a direct impact on public safety. Likewise, victims of crimes should be treated with respect and have their voices heard. I have voted for judicial nominees who make public safety and victims' rights their priority," she said.

Caissie believes her nearly 20 years of experience as an attorney in criminal and civil law in addition to her work as a Special Prosecutor has been invaluable to her in her public service as a governor's councilor.

"No question about it, this training has enabled me to be an effective Councilor. I believe my reputation is that I do my homework on every nominee, come to hearings prepared, ask the tough questions and vote for qualified nominees," Caissie said.

Asked about her questions to nominees about the 2nd Amendment, she says: "I respect lawful gun owners' rights. They should not be punished because criminals and thugs are buying guns out of the trunks of cars."

Caissie is a member of Singletary Rod and Gun Club in Oxford and received a 100 percent rating from GOAL.

Caissie noted the importance of this election where Governor Baker will have five Massachusetts Supreme Court nominations in the next six to nine months.

"The impact five new supreme justices will have on the Massachusetts justice system is really incredible. I want to continue to work hard to ensure we get the best-qualified people

on our Supreme Court and all Courts in Massachusetts," she said.

Caissie served as a selectman in her hometown of Oxford for 13 years, served as a Trustee at Worcester State College, served as a member of the Harrington Memorial Hospital and currently served as a Trustee at Nichols College and a Corporator at Webster Five Cents Savings Bank.

The 7th District consists of primarily Worcester County and includes Brimfield, Holland, Monson, Palmer, Wales, Ware, Asby, Townsend and Bellingham.

## Dudley Middle School false bomb threat leads to two charges filed

On Friday, June 3 at approximately 10:40 a.m., members of the Dudley Police and Fire Departments responded to a bomb threat at the Dudley Middle School located at 70 Dudley Oxford Road. An automated call had been received in the school's main office warning of a possible suspicious device. The building was evacuated and all students were relocated temporarily to Shepherd High Regional High School, primarily due to inclement weather occurring at that time. The building was searched by emergency responders, school officials, and a member of the Massachusetts State Police Bomb Squad. No suspicious devices were found and school resumed early that afternoon. A coordinated investigation took place to determine if this was an isolated incident or connected in any way with a string of similar calls, which had occurred in our region over the previous months.

During the week of June 6, information was obtained regarding two potential suspects. It is believed two Dudley Middle School students, ages 10 and 11, were connected with this incident. They utilized an online based computer program to place the automated call to the school. Charges were filed this week at Dudley District Court - Juvenile Division against these two individuals alleging Disturbing a School Assembly and Reporting a False Bomb Threat. The two are scheduled to appear at court later in July.

Threats of this nature are given serious attention in today's world. These are not considered harmless "pranks." Anyone participating in these activities can face serious charges. A False Bomb Threat, which causes disruption of a school, is a felony and carries a maximum penalty of 20 years in prison. The Dudley Police Department discourages anyone from participating in these types of activities. Dudley Police

School Resource Officer Philip Megas and Sergeant Dean Poplawski led the investigation on behalf of the department. The Dudley Police wish to thank the School Officials and members of the public who assisted with this case.

## \$620K in scholarship aid

WORCESTER — Greater Worcester Community Foundation announces the awarding of \$624,650 in college scholarships to local residents for the 2016-17 academic year.



# Huguenot Memorial Society announces essay contest winners

OXFORD — The Huguenot Memorial Society of Oxford, Inc. sponsored its annual Huguenot Essay Contest at the Oxford Middle School. A total of \$225 in cash prizes was awarded to three Seventh Grade students at the Memorial Day Program. Ryan Steiner was awarded first prize and read his essay at the Program. Ashley McGowan was awarded second prize and William Tyrrell was awarded third prize.

The Society has sponsored this contest annually for about 40 years as a way to promote an appreciation of the Huguenot settlers who established the

Settlement of New Oxford in 1686 on the west facing hillside from the Huguenot Monument on Fort Hill Road which is Oxford's most historic site to Main Street/Route 12. The Society offers a different theme each year for the Essay Contest. The person who writes the winning essay is also invited to read it at the annual Picnic and Concert at the Huguenot Fort. This year's Picnic and Concert is scheduled for Sunday, Sept. 11 beginning at Noon with a rain date of Sept. 18. At that time Ryan, Ashley and William will be awarded certificates acknowledging their winning essays.

The Society appreciates the work of the teachers and administrators involved with this project. The Middle School selects a number of essays and then submits essays to the Essay Contest Committee of the Society who in turn selects the three winners.

While the Huguenot Memorial Society of Oxford was formed in 1881 by Huguenots, it was immediately designated a "memorial" Society as those who organized it realized that there were very few Huguenot descendants still living in the area. Today, several Huguenot descendants are members of this Society but the majority of members are not necessarily of Huguenot descent. And, yet, all members are interested in the early history of this town and wish to keep the spirit of the Huguenots alive. Membership of \$10.00 per year is open to not only Oxford residents but interested people living across the country.

# Harrington HealthCare System awarded \$10,000 grant

WEBSTER — Harrington HealthCare System has been awarded a grant of \$10,000 from the Janet Malser Humanities Trust as a contribution toward the new dual diagnosis unit being constructed in Webster.

"The grant from the Janet Malser Humanities Trust brings us one step closer to completing the our dual diagnosis unit," said Ed Moore, President and CEO. "Without the generosity of organizations like this, we wouldn't be able to provide our community with the highest level of care, especially for behavioral health disorders. We truly appreciate the continued support of the Janet Malser Humanities Trust for recognizing the importance of keeping advanced healthcare services in our region."

When complete, the 8,500 square foot unit will be one of only a few licensed locations in the state to provide comprehensive care for dual diagnosis — individuals with both a mental health and a substance abuse disorder.

It is estimated nearly 50 percent of people with a mental health disorder such as bipolar or schizophrenia also have comorbidity, typically in the form of substance abuse. According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), of the adults living with co-occurring disorders, 34 percent receive mental health treatment, 2 percent enroll in drug rehab, and [only] 12 percent get the

help they need for both disorders.

In offering dual diagnosis treatment, Harrington is able to expand on the care offered to each individual beyond just medication management to include outpatient therapy, intensive day programs, and other supportive resources within the Harrington structure.

Patients admitted to the unit will have access to group therapy, occupational therapy, and a sensory program, where they learn rehabilitative coping skills for triggers and stress management. Construction will also include a new Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP), a structured day program for individuals with substance abuse and/or psychiatric issues.

Janet Malser was a lifelong resident of Dudley and Webster. She established this trust so that the causes she was involved with would continue to be supported when she was no longer here. She loved art, history, nature and music.

The Janet Malser Humanities Trust was established in 2009 as a 501(c)(3) charitable foundation. Its purpose is to fund educational, cultural, historic and charitable causes in the towns of Dudley, Oxford and Webster. 

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# Construction underway for new Dual Diagnosis Unit in Webster

WEBSTER — Of the many needs the new Behavioral Health Inpatient Unit currently under construction at Harrington's Webster campus will fulfill, two are most noteworthy.

First, it's a vital treatment facility in an area where access to treatment is seemingly at an all-time low. Second, it will open as one of only a few licensed locations in the entire state to provide comprehensive care for dual diagnosis — individuals with both a mental health and a substance abuse disorder.

It is estimated nearly 50 percent of people with a mental health disorder

such as bipolar or schizophrenia also have comorbidity, typically in the form of substance abuse.

According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), of the adults living with co-occurring disorders, 34 percent receive mental health treatment, 2 percent enroll in drug rehab, and [only] 12 percent get the help they need for both disorders.

In offering dual diagnosis treatment, Harrington is able to expand on the care

offered to each individual beyond just medication management to include outpatient therapy, intensive day programs, and other supportive resources within the Harrington

structure.

Harrington Executive Director for Behavioral Health Greg Mirhej has stressed how critical this type of program is since the healthcare system began to explore building the unit nearly five years ago.

"Treatment is more likely to be successful if the individual does not have to bounce around to several organizations for different programs," he said. "Similarly, treating just one of the issues (psychiatric or substance abuse) can result in relapse more easily, since one condition undermines the other and the individual has a hard time maintaining stability."

Patients admitted to the unit (typically through emergency room observations or by referral from other hospitals or mental health facilities) will have access to group therapy, occupational therapy, and a sensory program, where

they learn rehabilitative coping skills for triggers and stress management.


When construction is complete, the 8,500 square-foot-unit will also include a Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP), a structured day program for individuals with substance abuse and/or psychiatric issues. The outpatient program includes therapy and medication management. It is considered a 'step down' from the inpatient program, or an option for individuals who are not candidates for the unit.

The adult facility will feature 16 beds and therapy rooms staffed by approximately three dozen employees, including a physician medical director, nurse practitioner, mental health associates, and social workers. The unit is a complete renovation of the former inpatient floor at the Webster facility, which closed in 2009, though the facility has continued to flourish with the new Remillard Emergency Department, a sleep lab, diagnostic imaging center, laboratory, and primary care offices.

The dual diagnosis unit also requires growth within Harrington's already-established and fairly expansive behavioral health program across the region. Mirhej expects the recruitment of additional psychiatrists and mental health clinicians, citing a possible expansion of outpatient services at Harrington's office in Dudley at 171 W. Main Street.

Harrington Director for Psychiatric Inpatient Services Jere Dittrich anticipates operating at full capacity almost immediately because there is such a high need. While the typical inpatient stay for a psychiatric unit is five to seven days, Dittrich anticipates the dual diagnosis unit will have an average inpatient stay closer to 10 days due to the nature of identifying all underlying conditions before treatment is established.

"We stand by our mission of a total, cohesive care plan," he said. "We're not just building a medical treatment facility, but a comprehensive approach to dual diagnosis, including what happens to the patient after discharge."

## Legislators announce legislation to protect police officers

BOSTON — Rep. Paul K. Frost (R-Auburn) along with his colleagues, Sen. Michael Moore (D-Millbury), Rep. Kate Campanale (R-Leicester) and Rep. Timothy Whelan (R-Brewster) have announced they filed legislation Wednesday, June 15, which will seek to make an assault and battery on a police officer a felony.

Currently, assault and battery on a police officer is a misdemeanor.

The motivation to file this legislation and push its passage became paramount when a known criminal who had two prior arrests for assaulting police officers took the life of Auburn Police Officer Ronald Tarentino, Jr. on the early morning hours of Sunday, May 22. Had the killer's prior assaults on police officers been treated as felonies rather than misdemeanors, Officer Tarentino's killer would likely not have been on the streets of Auburn or elsewhere that tragically fateful overnight.

Under Massachusetts General Laws there is already precedent for some cases of assault on firefighters to be considered a felony crime. There is no such provision protecting police officers currently.

Frost commented: "It is time we protect our men and women in blue. We should pass this legislation to make it a felony to assault and attempt to harm a police officer in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Our police are more and more becoming targets across our country and we need to stand up for them as they do for us. Auburn Police Chief Andrew Sluckis, Jr. in his remarks at the funeral services for Officer Tarentino said his death should not be in vain. Those comments moved me. Tarentino's death should not be in vain and this legislation could stand to help save his fellow brothers and sisters in blue in the future."

Frost went on to say, "The tragic and senseless death of Officer Tarentino in my own small hometown and on the very street I live on has truly shaken me and the entire community to the core. We owe it to Tarentino's memory and to all those who serve and protect us day and night in our

neighborhoods and on our local streets to do more to protect them and back them up against those with evil intent in their hearts."

In his eulogy for Officer Tarentino, Chief Andrew Sluckis, Jr. stated, "We need come together to fix what is broken." The lawmakers filing this legislation aim to do just that.

"I am proud to support this legislative provision to enhance protections for the men and women who serve in law enforcement," said Sen. Michael O. Moore (D-Millbury), who serves as Senate Vice Chairman of the Joint Committee on Public Safety and Homeland Security. "Members of the law enforcement community are placed in harm's way every day to help ensure public safety. This bill seeks to deter acts of violence committed against on-duty officers."

"We owe it to our selfless officers, the men and women who put their lives on the line on a daily basis," said Rep. Kate Campanale of Leicester, who serves as the State Representative of Officer Tarentino's hometown. "I am proud to be a part of this commonsense, proactive bill. This legislation justly matches the punishment to the crime, while benefitting the safety of our officers."

"As a retired State Trooper with 26 years of public safety experience, I know that our security relies on police officers to serve as that thin blue line between order and chaos. We have a responsibility to provide laws that protect those women and men behind the badge from being battered in the course of their duties, serving the public. I am proud to offer my full support to this legislation which makes a statement that those who would attack police officers deserve to be held accountable for their actions," said Rep. Timothy Whelan (R-Brewster), a Worcester native who formally served in the Worcester County region as a State Trooper and was also a former resident of Charlton.

The legislation filed today will still accept other members of the State Legislature as co-sponsors of this bill. The Legislature could take up the bill before the session ends on Tuesday, Jan. 3, 2017.





## Alarm systems



CHIEF'S CORNER

All home and business burglar and fire alarms currently in use here in the Town of Dudley are required to be registered.

Local bylaw Article 36 is the regulation that governs alarm systems. Since the renewal date for providing up to date information is upon us, I thought I would take

this opportunity to remind everyone about the process.

Police officers and firefighters respond to house alarms quite frequently. Many of these have been activated by accident or they have malfunctioned. It is important to keep current contact information on file with public safety officials in the event of a problem. Section C (1) of Article 36 outlines the procedure for registering these alarms. It states, "Every alarm user shall submit to the Police Chief the names, addresses and telephone numbers of the user and at least two other persons who can be reached anytime, day or night, and who are authorized to respond to an emergency signal transmitted by an alarm system and who can open the premises wherein the alarm system is installed. The list of names, addresses and telephone numbers of the responders must be kept current at all times during the alarm user and shall be submitted during the first month of each fiscal year." July 1 is the beginning of the fiscal year and this is the date when the information needs to be submitted.

Penalties for violations are covered under section E (3). It provides for a fine of \$25 for unregistered or late registered false alarms. In addition, \$25 can be charged for each month where a home owner is in non-compliance. This can be costly if not addressed. It is important to have current and accurate information for first responders. This helps to protect your property from damage, allows emergency services and family members to be contacted quickly, and limits the police and fire response in the event of a false alarm. Please take the time to stop by the station for a form, download one online via Facebook ("The Dudley Police Department Massachusetts"), or simply provide the necessary information on a sheet of paper or via e-mail (listed below). Whichever way you choose to do this, we thank you in advance for your cooperation in this effort.

## How much should I spend on a home?

When we sit down at the bank to get preapproved for a loan they don't look at every bill that we have. We need to look at things like our spending habits. What if the furnace goes in the first month of ownership, can you go ahead and pay for a new one or do you have to put it on a credit card at 18-percent interest? However, make sure you are in a position to weather some potential big repairs before taking the leap into the American Dream of home ownership so it doesn't become a nightmare.

Sugar Free, Low Carb BBQ Sauce — Low carb diets often translate into bland cookout foods.

Not anymore! You can boost up your BBQ flavor with this homemade sauce that is low carb and delicious. Make up a batch and store it in the refrigerator.

Ingredients: 2 strips of thick bacon, chopped fine; 1 small onion, minced; 1 clove garlic, minced or 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder; 1 small can (6 oz) tomato paste; 1 can (12 oz) diet (sugar-free) cola - Splenda-sweetened preferred; 1/4 cup no sugar added ketchup; 3 T mustard; 1 Tablespoon Worcestershire sauce; 1 pinch ground cloves; Hot sauce to taste

Directions: Fry and drain bacon; Add the onion and cook over medium until soft, 3-5 minutes. Add garlic at this point if you're using fresh and stir it for half a minute or so. Add the rest of the ingredients, plus about half a cup of water. Stir well. Allow to simmer or a half hour to marry flavors (sauce will cook down). Season to taste.

The recipe makes approximately 10 servings of 1/4 cup each. Each serving has about 3.5 grams of carbohydrate plus 1 gram of fiber.

## Marriage and family

Pope Francis recently issued an Apostolate Exhortation Amoris Laetitia dedicated to the family. Marriage and family are intertwined realities and continue to play a crucial part in the life of our society. Despite decades of an alarmingly high divorce rate and family breakdowns, people still consider the family as the heart of their life. There is a yearning in our society for a happy marriage, a stable family life, and to experience the joy of living. All of this revolves around family.

As a young couple preparing for marriage, they are filled with dreams and expectations. They hope to own a home, raise their children and become part of a long, lasting and loving relationship. However, quite often the road map they designed for themselves becomes full of obstacles, such as loss of employment, terminal illness, or other unexpected challenges and difficulties. When such a crisis arises, the early dream of marital bliss starts to look more like an illusion where every day reality dampens their early enthusiasm. It is precisely at a moment like this when many marriages begin to crumble and disrupts the family's life.

The priest asked the wife of a couple who celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary if she ever considered divorce and the wife jokingly responded, never — murder, yes — divorce, no. Through persever-

ance, the parents continue to model, for their children, the love that exists between a husband and wife and the joy it brings the whole family.

Contemporary family life is complex and different from previous generations. The physical and psychological environment in which we live affects our health and our general wellbeing. Families are managing various allergies, illnesses and learning challenges of the children that effects marriage and family life. In addition, parenting these days is also changed. We are living with a new reality. Everyone worries that their children could be hurt or even kidnapped when they play in their neighborhoods. Children are entertained inside their homes by electronics and lack opportunities for socialization with their peers.

To complicate matters further, the cultural context of contemporary society with its general confusion is hostile to marriage and a stable family life. In many cases, parents have forfeited their parental authority to install lifelong values in favor of befriending

their children. Some young families lost the connection with the supernatural power of God, do not participate in Divine Worship, and do not pray together, and do not pass their faith to the next generation. It is very helpful for young couples to hold hands and to pray together for their common intention. Many couples derive a special joy when they take the little hand of their child and make the first sign of the cross. A father feels proud that his little son calls him father, and he also calls God "Father."

Historically speaking, in every age families experience difficulties, yet have managed to overcome them and remain the central unity of society. The Church teachings, based on scripture, are a great help for a healthy and happy family. The Year of Divine Mercy is a great opportunity for parents, children, and society to turn to God and his Church for guidance and strength. As a stream of light pierces through the thickest cloud, so the act of trust in Jesus, even in the midst of darkness permeates the human life, illuminates the road, and brings new hope and encouragement to all of us.

OXFORD — Nineteen Little League athletes representing 17 leagues and 16 towns competed in the seventh annual District 5 Little League Major Division Home Run Derby, hosted by Oxford Little League at Stanley Johnson Field on Saturday, June 25.

TJ Power of Shrewsbury was crowned the sole winner of the competition, leading the way with 30 homers. Power had only two home runs in his regular season this year.

Following in second place was Colby Jacobs of Charlton with seven homers, and Ben Wing of Oxford and Seth Larson of Leicester split third place after slugging four home runs apiece.

Wing hit the furthest home run of the contest at 305 feet, as Power was just behind with a 292-foot shot over the center field fence.

Each year, all District 5 programs are eligible to compete, with players ranging in age from 10-12. The entry fee is just two official Little League-approved baseballs. After the registration process, names were picked out of a bucket to decide the batting order. Players were given 15 pitches in the batting cage prior to stepping up to the plate. A home run at Stanley Johnson Field is measured at 200 feet.

The competition lasted two rounds total with each batter given 10 outs (any swing that doesn't result in a homer) in the first round. The top four hitters advanced to the second round with their home runs carrying over from their first frame, as they are given seven additional outs.

The movie "The Sandlot" was shown following the hitting competition, as all were invited to stick around and watch.



## Young Sturbridge Legion squad falls to Wachusett

HOLDEN — Kenan Kolanda and Matt Pingitore each went 3 for 3 at the plate and totaled five RBIs for the Wachusett Post 42 American Legion baseball team, as Sturbridge Post 109 fell, 12-0, suffering a mercy-rule loss after five innings on Wednesday, June 29 at Wachusett Regional. Dropping to a 4-13 overall mark, the young Sturbridge squad dressed only nine players, facing adversity through injuries in addition to inexperience at the Legion level.

"We had nine players — a 14, 15 and a couple 16-year-olds out there," said Sturbridge manager Jim Rosseel. "We knew coming into the season it was going to be rough. We only have three returning players with Legion experience. With the atmosphere at this level compared to high school, everything from pitching to hitting is different. If I can keep these kids together, two years from now, we will be all right."

Wachusett (6-9) outthit Sturbridge, 10-4, as the Wombats and Post 109 each

left three runners stranded on base. Left fielder Connor McCaffrey (2 for 2), catcher Brannon McMullen and center fielder Keegan Moynahan had the hits for Sturbridge's only three hits. On the mound, Post 109's right-hander Tyler Stoever threw a complete game. Only five of the 12 runs allowed were earned.

Earning the win for Wachusett was right hander CJ Callender, who pitched four innings, allowing four hits and striking out six. Right-hander Erik Benson closed in the top of the fifth inning for Post 42.

Sturbridge was off to a strong start in the top of the first inning, sending back-to-back singles to the outfield with no outs. Leading off, McCaffrey lined to left field for a base hit before McMullen followed with a shot to right field.

However, Wachusett turned a double play on an infield grounder before Callender logged a strikeout, leaving McCaffrey deserted on third base to end the inning damage-free.

Wachusett then took an early 2-0 lead in the bottom of the first on one hit, one error and a sacrifice fly.

With one down in the top of the second inning, Moynahan reached on a bunt down the first base line but, once again, a Sturbridge runner was left stranded, as Callender recorded a pair of strikeouts to escape the inning with another clean sheet.

Wachusett then used two straight three-run spurts in both the bottom of the second and third innings, and plated another four runs in the fourth inning to exercise the mercy rule and secure the victory.

Despite the runs allowed, Sturbridge exemplified sparks of greatness on the defensive end during this span.

After Wachusett notched a third run on two singles and a double in the bottom of the second inning, Sturbridge shortstop Jared Langevin temporarily halted the scoring frenzy. Fielding a grounder, Langevin looked back Wachusett runners on second and third base to prevent any from advancing before firing a throw to first base for the first out of the inning. However, an RBI

single to left field was to follow, which brought in the next two runs, extending Wachusett's lead to 5-0 entering the third inning.


McMullen earned the next notable play for Sturbridge. With a runner on base and one out in the bottom of the third, McMullen backed-up an overthrown ball to first base on an infield grounder. As the Wachusett runner attempted to advance to second base on the error, McMullen laced a throw to the bag for the second out of the inning.

However, before the end of the third inning, Wachusett added another three runs on two hits and a sacrifice grounder. After a quick frame for Sturbridge, Wachusett rallied for the final four runs of the game on a four-hit surge and one error in the bottom of the fourth, as Post


42 moved out to a 12-0 advantage.

Sturbridge had one last at-bat in the top of the fifth inning for a chance to dodge the mercy. Sturbridge cranked two promising fly balls to center field, but couldn't find the gaps, as Wachusett registered three quick outs to claim the win.

"We had seven kids out there with no Legion experience," said Rosseel. "Some teams we play have up to six college athletes on their squads. I took a different route this year and went young. I knew we would struggle at times, but I also didn't think we'd have four wins at this time. I hope they have fun, get some more wins and get the experience they need during the remainder of this season."

# Sitkowski Apartment residents bring concerns about Town Hall bell

the town hall, and while there was clear concern made to Miller, none of the complainants were in attendance to make themselves heard during the selectmen's meeting.

Greg Vassale, who cares for and works on Webster's clock tower as well as many other in the region, said the Seth Thomas-style clock and bell goes off every 15 minutes until 10 p.m. every night and is only heard on the hour, chiming the number of chimes coinciding with the hour number, every night as well until resuming its quarter hour schedule in the morning.

Vassale said this is how the bell and clock are set and shutting the clock's chime down completely overnight would be quite a pricy project for such

a small issue.

"There was never a provision made to shut that clock down from counting the hours, At 1 o'clock in the morning it rings once. At 2 o'clock it rings twice and so on and so forth. That's what it was designed to do," Vassale said. "You could [shut it off overnight] but it's going to cost money. It would need a motor to do it because the simplest thing is to lift the striking level off the great wheel on the strike train. It has to have a timer and a crack arm built. It adds up."

Vassale estimated over \$1,000 as the potential cost of making such adjustments to the clock tower. He said shutting the chime down overnight is certainly possible, but it would depend on how far the town is willing to go.

Selectman Miller continued to be the loudest voice heard from the Board of

Selectmen with the remaining members mostly asking questions of curiosity about the clock and potential measures that could be taken to help muffle the noise at the very least. Miller said he feels that, with all due respect, the residents of the new apartment complex need to deal with the bell like someone living along a busy road would deal with traffic or someone living near a train track would deal with the sound of a train.

"It's done that for God knows how long, longer than I've been around for sure," Miller stated. "It's my own personal opinion, not the boards, don't even toy around with the idea of trying to muffle it, which you can't anyway because you're not going to quiet the clock. If I'm going by at two in the morning I want to hear it ringing."

Responding to questions about

whether or not the clock's chime had increased in volume after the time was changed during daylight savings time, Vassale said this is an unsubstantiated assumption and that nothing was altered about the clock except, of course, the time. When asked about the possibility of adding Plexiglass to muffle the sound, Vassale revealed that there already is a Plexiglass covering over the clock tower, meaning that if the town were to ever take measures to decrease the sound of the bell they would have very few options available to muffle the noise that have not already been explored and shutting the chime down in the overnight hours may be too costly for selectmen to justify any change in the near future.

prise. During the budget time I made it very clear when going through the budget that one of the changes in the budget was that we remove the stipends of the part-time inspectors from the inspectional services budget," Leduc said. "Under the continue or create revolving funds we created an inspectional services revolving fund which will pay our inspectors per inspection which will be a fee that will be added on to

what we receive as a permit fee."

Leduc said this change will pay part-time inspectors based on the inspections they actually make rather than a guaranteed stipend regardless of how many inspections they are called in to perform. She noted that the fee will be a charge unto itself and will not impact other fees the town will require from any residents.

"We are not looking to raise our permit fees, however there will be built into that inspection fees and that is how our inspectors will be paid," she

said. "There is more accountability there. There's more transparency there."

Leduc said inspectors will need to provide a log of all their inspections and it will need to be reported with addresses and what is done. She said it also provides homeowners with a way to control their contractors if there is an issue.

"Built into an electrical permit let's say there'll be two inspections, a middle inspection and an end inspection. That will be built in and collected at the time that the permit is pulled. If your electrical

contractor may not be doing the job in a way that electrical inspector feels it should be done and additional inspections are needed they're going to require additional inspection fees which will of course then be passed on to the homeowner and they'll want to know 'why did I need an additional inspection,'" Leduc said.

While on the surface this change may seem to put electricians, plumbers and other contractors under the microscope, Leduc said local contractors should be familiar with this setup as it is a format other

communities have used for some time in the region. A lot of questions still remain about the specifics of this change and all are expected to be answered as building officials and others are expected to join Leduc and the Board of Selectmen to continue discussions on the shift on July 11. Among those discussions will be exactly how much the new fees will cost.

Dupras was the sole occupant of the vehicle at the time of the incident and was transported to UMass Medical Center in Worcester by Webster EMS. As of this report he was considered stable and the details behind how and why the accident occurred have not been released by police.

The incident caused the response of officers from the Central Massachusetts Law Enforcement Council Collision Reconstruction Team, who conducted further investigation into the situation. A family of four was displaced as the

Webster Fire Department and Webster Building Inspector work to determine the structural integrity of the building and any major repairs that would be required to make the home safe. The Building Inspector did determine that structural damage made the home uninhabitable. The cause of the crash is still under investigation, and criminal charges are possible, but there have been no indications made by police as to any precise criminal activity that took place regarding the crash.

## Protect Your Family From Mosquitoes Six Ways

(NAPS)—According to the World Health Organization, as many as 3 to 4 million people may be exposed to the Zika virus in the next 12 months—but you and your family don't have to be among them. To combat the Zika virus-carrying Aedes mosquito, the use of personal insect repellents is already surging in many places where the virus has been reported.

- Use insect repellent and remember to reapply. When picking an insect repellent, consider the length of time you'll be outside and the type of activity you're planning. Find a repellent appropriately labeled for that use (length of protection varies by the percentage of active ingredient). DEET-based products, in particular, are recommended by the National Institutes


of Health for effective, long-lasting protection and can be used by pregnant and breast-feeding women throughout pregnancy after checking with their physicians. The American Academy of Pediatrics also recommends DEET repellents for kids and advises that 30 percent DEET concentrations or lower can be used on children ages 2 months and up. Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus is the only natural active ingredient recommended by the Centers for Disease Control, but should not be used on children under the age of 3 years. Always follow product label instructions.

- Mosquito proof your home. Most people don't think about mosquitoes entering their home, but it only takes one getting through a window or doorway to cause a threat to your family. Be sure that windows and doors are sealed off from the outdoors and screens are in good working order without holes.

- Use yard applications to eliminate mosquitoes. Kids and pets spend a lot of time in the yard during mosquito season. Using a product like the Cutter® Backyard™ Bug Control Outdoor Fogger can help eliminate mosquitoes in the area.

- Wear the proper attire when outdoors. Mosquitoes are attracted to exposed skin and dark colors so you can prevent some contact with them by simply wearing long pants, sleeves and light-colored clothing.

## Water Safety Sense

(NAPS)—Although drowning is a major cause of injury and death for children ages 5 to 14, it can be prevented. One way is through the YMCA's Safety Around Water program, which teaches kids the value of being safe around water and parents the importance of water safety skills. According to data from the USA Swimming Foundation, 70 percent of African-American, 60 percent of Hispanic and 40 percent of Caucasian children cannot swim. To reduce such statistics, the Y—one of the nation's leading nonprofits strengthening communities through youth development, healthy living and social responsibility—will award more than 18,000 scholarships for free swim lessons to children in high-risk communities.

### WHY THE Y

The Y was the first organization to introduce the concept of group swim lessons in 1909. Now, in thousands of pools across the country, the organization teaches more than a million children from all backgrounds invaluable water safety and swim skills. They learn how to reach the water's sur-

face if they submerge, safely reach a pool's edge, exit any body of water and respond to unexpected water situations.

Water Safety Suggestions  
If you know how to stay safe in and around water, swimming can be a lifelong source of fun and exercise.

Here are six steps toward water safety:

1. Never swim alone. Swim only where there's a lifeguard on duty.

2. Supervise children whenever they're in water. Whether they're in the bath or the ocean, stay within arm's reach at all times.

3. Don't hold your breath. Children shouldn't hold their breath for a long time while swimming. This can cause drowning and other severe physical side effects.

4. Wear a life jacket. Inexperienced or nonswimmers should wear a Coast

Guard-approved life jacket.

5. Don't jump in the water to save someone struggling in deep water. Even if you're a great swimmer, a panicked person can overpower you and pull you underwater. The Y's Safety Around Water program teaches the "reach, throw, don't go" concept of using a long object to reach for the swimmer and pull him or her to safety.

6. Enroll in water safety lessons. Just like teaching children to look both ways before crossing the street, having them participate in formal water safety lessons gives them an important life skill. The Y's Safety Around Water program teaches children fundamental water safety skills and what to do if they find themselves in water unexpectedly.

"Every year, the Y teaches more than 1 million children from all backgrounds invaluable water safety and swim skills. This year, we're committed to addressing the disturbing statistics around fatal youth drownings by making free swim lessons available to more than 18,000 children in underserved communities," said Kevin Washington,

President and CEO of Y-USA. "It's our mission to help mitigate the sociocultural factors that inhibit today's youth—especially those of color in urban communities—from receiving the potentially life-saving skills to keep them safe in and around water."

One problem the program aims to solve is the number of things that inhibit African-American kids from learning how to swim and swimming recreationally or competitively. Things that put them at high risk for drowning include:

- Lack of Swimming Access—convenient facilities may be few and far between, expensive and hard to get to.
- Cultural Constraints—there may be a legacy of fear.
- Parental Perceptions—adults who don't swim themselves may not realize what needs to be done so their children can learn the skill.

## Become a Superhero of Summer Safety

(NAPS)—You can protect the kids you care about from the playground falls, lawn mower accidents and campfire and fire pit burns that are common and potentially life-altering childhood injuries.

Darren Rottmann knows first-hand how easily accidents can happen. He lost his leg in a lawn mower accident when he was 3 1/2 years old and was treated at Shriners

Hospitals for Children®—St. Louis, where he was fitted for different prosthetic legs as he grew. Despite his injury, Rottmann was able to walk then run and eventually, play baseball, basketball and football.

Now 37, Rottmann is a certified prosthetist at that same hospital where he was treated. He was inspired to help children the same way he was helped as a boy. "I think it puts the kids' minds and

their parents' minds at ease to see that somebody else has been through it," he explains.

Today, Rottmann is helping Shriners Hospitals for Children encourage kids to become Superheroes of Summer Safety by learning and following a few simple rules of safe summer play.

### MOWING MATTERS

- Teach children to

never play on or around a lawn mower, even when it is not in use. They should never be permitted to walk beside, in front of or behind a moving mower.

- Children under 6 years of age should be kept inside while you are mowing.

- Children should be at least 12 years of age before operating a push lawn mower and at least 16 years of age before operating a riding lawn mower.

### PLAYGROUND 101

- Choose playgrounds appropriate for the child's age and that offer shock-absorbing surfaces.

- Teach children that pushing and shoving can result in accidents and injuries.

- Remind kids to use the slide one at a time and to wait until it is completely clear before taking their turn. Teach them to always face forward with their legs straight in front and to never slide down headfirst.

- Remind children to swing sitting down. Encourage them to wait until the swing stops before getting off and to be careful when walking in front of moving swings.

### MAKE A SAFE SPLASH

- Teach children to never swim alone or go near water without an adult present.

- Give children your undivided attention when they are swimming or near any body of water.

- Always jump in feet first to check the depth before diving into any body of water.

- Never dive in the shallow end of the pool or into above-ground pools.

### FUN ON THE WATER

- Always have children wear Coast Guard-approved, properly fitted life jackets while on a boat, around an open body of water or when participating in water sports.

- Educate yourself. According to the U.S. Coast Guard, 86 percent of boating accident deaths involve boaters who have not completed a safety course.

- Always check water conditions and forecasts before going out on the water.

### FIRE SAFETY SIMPLIFIED

- Teach kids to never

play with matches, gasoline, lighter fluid or lighters. Store these items up and away from young children.

- Do not leave children unattended near grills, campfires, fire pits or bonfires. Always have a bucket of water or fire extinguisher nearby.

- Take your child to a doctor or hospital immediately if he or she is injured in a fire or by fireworks.


