SPENCER - The community rallied around a local family last month during the memorial dedication of a pavilion at Powder Mill Park.

On Aug. 24, residents looked on as the Cole William Victor Memorial Pavilion was dedicated during a ceremony at the park. The program honored the life and legacy of Cole Victor, who passed away in a vehicle accident in December 2018. He

was 25 years old. The dedication ceremony took place during the Saturday in the Park event hosted by the Spencer Exchange Club. The memo-

rial pavilion includes a gazebo that was reconstructed over the summer, an effort led by Victor's father, George Victor, who owns Victor Contracting. With assistance from several local businesses, Victor and his family completed a project that improves

Legislators secure financial boost for East Brookfield's Centennial

EAST BROOKFIELD - With significant help from local officials, the town will be able to bolster its centennial celebration next year.

On Aug. 27, town officials were joined by Sen. Anne Gobi and State Rep. Donald Berthiaume for a check presentation. The legislators teamed up to submit requests for state funding to support East Brookfield's 100th anniversary celebration

Earlier this summer, Gov. Charlie Baker approved \$60,000 in this year's budget to support the East Brookfield celebration. Both Berthiaume and Gobi presented the check to members of the town's 100th Anniversary Committee.

"We are so excited to be the recipients of this support," said 100th Anniversary Committee member Heather Gablaski. "The year-long series of events we have planned for 2020 are designed to appeal to a variety of audiences.

The two major events planned for next year are a Roaring Twenties-themed dinner dance in April and a two-hour parade and subsequent family fun day at Connie Mack Field. Thanks to the recent funding, the costs associated with the celebration will be significantly defrayed.

'We are grateful to both Sen. Gobi and Rep. Berthiaume for their continued support and advocacy of local events,"

Gablaski added.

The many events slated for 2020 are designed to bring residents and families of all ages into the celebration, from newcomers to lifetime residents. As the newest town in the Commonwealth - incorporated in March of 1920 - East Brookfield has seen many changes, but several facets of the community remain the same.

Looking ahead, residents and officials can't wait to celebrate 100 years in style. Berthiaume and Gobi are looking forward to joining residents as they celebrate their community's mile-

Leicester officials move ahead with Warren Ave. drainage study

LEICESTER – Selectmen voted last month to request that an engineer study the drainage problems affecting several residents' properties in one neighborhood.

At their Aug. 22 meeting, three of the five board members were present for the Thursday night discussion with affected residents in the Warren Avenue neighborhood. The drainage problems began during the construction of the new fire station on Paxton Street. Residents said the problems have worsened since the completion of the project in May 2018.

 $Selectmen\ confirmed\ that\ they\ currently\ have\ limited\ options$ for addressing the drainage problems, as litigation is ongoing between the town and the contractor for the fire station project. The completion date for the project was delayed several months due to a series of setbacks, and officials aren't sure what is causing the retention basins to continually fail. Selectmen don't want to make changes regarding the drainage structures until the litigation is completed.

At the Aug. 22 meeting, selectmen voted 3-0 to proceed with a third party engineer to analyze the problems and work with Town Administrator David Genereux and other officials to seek a solution. Selectmen Sandra Wilson and Dianna Provencher did not attend the meeting.

For affected residents of the Warren Avenue neighborhood, the drainage problems present an array of risks, including

New Principal takes the reins at NBES

NORTH BROOKFIELD -Having taught at all levels within the school district, Sarah Priestley was the perfect choice to become North Brookfield Elementary School's next Principal.

A member of North Brookfield Public Schools since 2008, Priestley initially served as an English teacher at the high school. Subsequent stops at the middle school and elementary school helped broaden her experience and prepare her for an administrative role.

With a Master's degree and a certificate of advanced graduate studies, Priestley always hoped to eventually rise to the administrative level. And she got her chance far sooner than

expected. "I had no idea an opportunity like this would come

up so quickly, and I am very

excited about it," Priestley

told the New Leader. "I fell

in love with the elementary school during my time there. So much is taught in elementary school that lays the foun-

dation for future success.' During her advanced graduate studies, Priestley focused on several areas of school leadership, including staff management and preparing budgets. She knows it will be a big transition from teaching to administration, but she still plans to log plenty of time in the classroom.

It's important to have an environment where kids are excited to come to school every day," said Priestley, who lives in Hardwick. "I want to always be working with the teachers to improve instructional practices. In a small district, you get to know everyone really quickly and all students get the attention they deserve."

Spencer residents to participate in Boston Marathon® Jimmy Fund Walk

There is a distance option for everyone. Participants can choose from any of the below four distances along the historic Boston Marathon course:

Walkers are treated to 12 refueling stations along the course, as well as poster-sized photographs of inspiring Walk Heroes at each mile and half mile

As Walkers cross the finish line, they will be cheered on by volunteers and fellow Walkers. There will be inspiring speakers, games, music, food, and other fun activities.



mold growth and mosquito breeding. Residents regularly deal with standing water in their yards due to a failure in either the design or the construction of drainage basins on the fire department property. A few residents have taken videos of torrents surging onto their properties during storms.

"When we get rain, it overflows into the properties along Warren Avenue. It has made our back yards uninhabitable for an entire year,' said Joel Hart, who has resided on Warren Avenue since 1996. "We started noticing the problem right after the project began, and it has been terrible ever since. It floods our back yards and

makes it unusable."

The Warren Avenue neighborhood has always had minor flooding problems due to a naturally high water table in the area, residents said, but the drainage problems have become severe since the fire station construction.

Properties on Paxton Street have also been affected. With the elevated EEE risks throughout much of the state, residents are concerned about standing water on their properties. Residents have also complained about the incomplete fencing around the perimeter of the drainage basins.

Officials said they share the frustrations of residents but are unable to move forward with immediate action to improve the retention ponds.

"We have to wait until the litigation is finished before we can do anything physically. We are going to work to bring their properties back to the way they were," said Selectman Rick Antanavica. "Once there is a settlement, we can move forward at a faster pace. This is very frustrating for the people and for

The site has received MassDEP approval enabling the basins to continue operations for drainage, officials said. The DEP also greenlighted officials to regularly drain the basins with sump pumps, which could provide temporary relief for residents in the fall months.

The third party engineer will analyze all design specifications of the retention ponds, Town Administrator Genereux said. This will

determine where flaws exist and how best to improve them.

Responding to residents' concerns over the incomplete fencing around the ponds, officials said the Planning Board approved the current enclosure. Hart and other residents feel that more needs to be done to secure the property.

"It's a big safety threat, especially for children," Hart said.

Residents are hoping to have an article placed on the Fall Special Town Meeting warrant seeking assistance with the problems. This could help provide more timely relief if the town's legal proceedings get tied up, residents said.



understands the district at all levels. Additionally, Priestley has served on the district's instructional leadership team, which worked with teachers, administrators, and community members to create an improvement plan for both schools. Goals emerging from the improvement plan focus on cur-

riculum, wellness, and community involvement.

'We want to make sure the schools share the same goals and are moving in the same direction," Priestley said. "I am very excited about working with the leadership team.'

At the elementary school, reading and math will be heavy points of emphasis this year. The school will continue to employ the Eureka math program, as well as Units of Study for reading. Moreover, the school will build on popular traditions like Camp Read-a-Lot, which engages students in fun activities before vacations.

New this year, the school will feature a wellness area that focuses on sensory activities, movement, and mood. A math hallway will also provide kids with creative new opportunities for instruction. The goal, Priestley said, is to give students a chance to learn outside the conventional classroom environment.

Like the overall district, the elementary school continues to make strides in technology. Priestley hopes to add a makerspace section in the library this year to augment student learning. In addition, the district's newly hired STEM teacher. Stephanie Martin, spent much of the summer preparing to hit the ground running.

'We have a lot of very creative, dedicated staff members here. Many of the teachers buy their own materials for classrooms," Priestley said.

When she isn't in school, Priestley enjoys spending time with her three children.



Victor was also a skilled contractor who worked for his father's company for many years along with his brother, Zachary.





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



AAA reminds motorists to drive carefully with school back in session

REGION — As the new school year begins, AAA Northeast reminds both motorists and families that extra caution is needed as children make their way to school by walking and riding in areas where they weren't seen over the summer.

The greatest risk to children isn't when they're riding the school bus; it's approaching or leaving them. Between 2008 and 2017, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) reports 264 school-age children were killed in school transportation-related crashes, primarily when they waited at hus stops or crossed streets before boarding or getting off school buses.

"Children can get caught up in the excitement of back to school time and might forget to look for cars even though motorists are required to yield and stop for school buses with activated lights," said Mark Schieldrop, AAA Northeast Massachusetts spokesperson. "Drivers need to be aware especially in school zones, near playgrounds and at bus stops that kids might dart into

Through its annual School's Open C Drive Carefully campaign, AAA offers tips to drivers to keep children safe:

Slow down. Speed limits in school zones are reduced for a reason. A pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling at 25 mph is nearly two-thirds less likely to be killed compared to a pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling just 10 mph faster.



Look for clues, such as AAA School Safety Patrollers, crossing guards, and school zone signs that indicate children are in the area.

Keep your eyes moving. Scan between parked cars; look for shadows on the ground. Since children can be quick crossing roadways unexpectedly or emerging suddenly between parked cars, understand that taking your eyes off the road for just two seconds doubles your chances of colliding with another car or pedestrian.

On the other hand, parents and guardians should teach school-aged children to:

Cross at corners, not in mid-block. Use cross-

walks if they're available. Use your 'eagle' eyes: look left, right, then left

again before crossing streets. Right on reds can be dangerous; watch for turning vehicles when crossing at corners.

Eliminate electronics such as headphones and cellphones when crossing streets.

AAA Northeast reminds drivers that flashing yellow lights on a school bus means slow down because the bus is preparing to stop. Red flashing lights means stop, including cars in the opposite lane on undivided roads. In Massachusetts, the law requires drivers to stop at least 100 feet behind a school bus and stay stopped until the bus light stops flashing, the extended stop-arm is retracted and the bus begins to move.

'Safe driving habits are important year-round, but extra diligence is required when children are

heading to and from school," Schieldrop added. A close call on the Salmon River



THE GREAT **OUTDOORS** RALPH TRUE

With the Labor Day weekend over, fishing pressure on fresh water lakes ponds and the saltwater will be less crowded. It is also the time that fishing picks up, as the waters cool down, making the fish a lot more active during their feeding cycles. Despite negative reports by some anglers fishing on the canal last week, some anglers were reporting great action, catching some impressive fish. These guys follow the action very close and make the trip to the canal almost on a daily basis. Sebile fishing lures are one of the best producing surface plugs, when the fish are feeding on or close to the surface.

One angler shared his technique for catching big fish using an Al Gags rubber jig, with this writer last week. Many anglers fishing the canal for stripers often keep there bait or jig on or close to the bottom, but sometimes this angler insist that moving his bait or jig a few feet off the bottom, works for him. This writer often uses the same Technique on seas bass and other bottom feeding fish.

Fat Nancy's Bait & Tackle in Pulaski revealed the following information. Although there are some salmon in the river, he predicted that some of the best fishing will be in the middle of September and early October. Unfortunately, hundreds of anglers will be on the river at the same Taking a walk up or down the river away from the large crowds can be rewarding, giving an angler some piece and quiet, and the chance of



landing a large King salmon. Finding small creeks can also hold some large fish and will also provide some great fishing. This week's picture shows an angler with a nice salmon from the Salmon River. Photo courtesy of Fat Nancy's Tackle Shop.

An angler that is fishing in New York's Salmon River needs to be very careful when navigating up or down stream along the river banks or in the water. New York law can have vou in trouble with private property owners if you trespass on their property. The private property owners own the property on the river bank and also under the water! Setting foot on the property can get you in trouble with the law. My brother Ken and I navigated a canoe upstream a number of years ago, and stepped out onto a gravel bank to do some fishing.

We were only fishing a few

minutes when I saw a gold badge flashing on a person upriver a hundred yards or so away. He slowly worked his way down to us and identified himself as a deputized warden hired by the landowner. After introducing himself, he went on to tell us that we were trespassing on private property.

"Do you realize you are fishing on private property?

"No, sir," I replied. He went on to tell us about the laws regarding privately owned property. When he was done, I apologized, and we started to retrieve our canoe to go back down river. He pulled out a citation book and questioned us some more about our actions.

I figured it was time to tell him that I was an outdoor writer and always tried to obey all of the fishing regulations. Phew. It worked. He quickly changed his method of questioning, and put his citation book away. "Just do me a favor and write about the laws in New York pertaining to trespassing on private property."

I apologized to him for our ignorance of the law. we started to climb into the canoe, he gave me one of his cards and asked us if we would like to get a free pass to the property upriver, which was owned by a Senator. "Yes, sir."

After thanking him, we quickly boarded our canoe and headed back down river to the area we had launched the canoe, and where our fishing party was.

My oldest son, Ralph, Jr., was standing in the water fishing, but was not on private property.

"How come you came back so soon?" he asked.

Planning to have a little fun with him and his buddies, we dreamed up a story about being arrested, and that we needed to

meet the officer at a designated

"That's what you get for not staying with the fishing party!"

Everyone was ribbing us, but we would have the last laugh. After loading the canoe on our truck, we headed off to the Senators property up stream that has a couple of wardens occupying a small booth for anglers wishing to pay for the right to fish the river. I showed the wardens the card that I had received from one of their other officers.

"Yep," he called us. "You are all set; park your car over there and follow these two other anglers to the fishing site. Have fun."

As my brother Ken and I followed the two anglers, I started laughing out loud about our other fishing buddies we left at the river with my son. We spent the next few hours catching some nice salmon, and laughing about the whole ordeal. It was starting to get dark, so we left the area and headed back to the camp site, thanking the officers for a great day of fishing. My kid was most likely thinking the worst — was my dad locked up? As we entered the camp site, everyone was laughing and having a few beers. After a lecture from my kid, we finally broke the news about where we were, and the great salmon fishing we had.

It was a good thing that I had taken my car because everyone else was not talking to us, and more than likely would have left us there. The good old days. Memories!

Some Democrat front-runners and their supporters go far beyond specific acts of injustice. They basically condemn an entire class of people simply for possessing wealth. And,

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
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they encourage those who are poor

Then it hit me. I'm inexperienced and potentially in a dangerous situation. I felt the downward momentum increasing. My heart raced. A picture in my mind replaced the beauty before me. As though it was real. I could see the ski patrol in their bright orange clothing, placing me in their stretcher and pulling me down to the base of the mountain to the waiting helicopter and the short flight to the local trauma center.

I visualized the danger so vividly, I began scanning the snow ahead, searching for a place of my choosing to execute a controlled fall and I did.

I laid on the ground as other skiers whisked by, enjoying their day. I took inventory of my limbs and found everything was in working order. I was not paralyzed. Nothing was broken except my confidence and pride. I removed my ski's and spent the next few hours walking down the access road from an 11,000-foot peak.

I never put skis on my feet

Fear is a natural emotion that is ingrained into our DNA, and can be useful in some situations but can also be an irrational response to events that are unreal and only imagined. Fear may someday save your life, but more often, this strong emotion will limit your experiences, success and fun.

The late great Zig Ziglar taught us that F.E.A.R. is nothing more than False Evidence Appearing Real. A perceived danger amplified in our minds that pushes us to have an irrational response.

I'd taken ski lessons everv vear. while visiting slopes in Wisconsin and Michigan. Tall hills to be sure, but nothing like the ski resorts of the Rocky Mountains. I mastered the midwestern slopes with ease and felt assured that I was ready for Vail. Physically and technically I was prepared. Mentally ... not so much.

I allowed doubt in my experience and ability to seize control over my thoughts and destroy my ski trip. I suddenly found myself expecting to fall

What if I would have expected to make it the bottom of the mountain, safe and sound and feeling the exhilaration of accomplishment and success?

Forest management project underway in North Brookfield

To the Editor:

Mass Audubon owns approximately 1,100 acres of land in Brookfield and North Brookfield known as Elm Hill Wildlife Sanctuary. During the next few weeks, Mass Audubon will begin a forest management project at Elm Hill designed to promote broader biodiversity and improve overall forest health on the property.

Beyond Elm Hill, Mass Audubon owns and manages over 30,000 mostly forested acres across the state, and we generally manage these forests passively, allowing them to mature to provide wildlife habitat and to sequester carbon. Mass Audubon recently committed to retaining forest carbon on 10,000 of our acres for the next 100

Elm Hill is covered by an Agricultural Preservation Restriction (APR) which requires an agricultural use of the property. To align with the requirements of the APR and to enhance specific habitat values, our scientists are partnering with a licensed forester to complete a carefully planned multi-year forest management project. Work during the 2019/2020 management cycle we will focus on approximately 225 acres in the northern section of the property with primary access via a gate off Brookfield Road/Route 148.

In the coming months, we will control invasive species, cut and remove trees on a limited section of the property to meet specific habitat management goals, recover overgrown field edges, and remove windrows to increase the effective size of several

Specifically, the work will include: Removing most trees from several sections totaling approximately 40 acres—less than four percent of the 1,100-acre property. This clearcut area will then be allowed to regrow to provide young forest habitat for a number of declining bird species and other wildlife.

Eliminating an eight-acre red pine

plantation that currently provides very little habitat value.

Cutting a smaller fraction of trees from a 70-acre portion of the forest to support future management goals.

Enhancing forest structure on 30 acres, to mimic old-growth forest con-

Controlling invasive plants on more than 90 acres of forest and field edges. Active forest management by Mass Audubon may come as a surprise to many. However, our State of the Birds series has documented precipitous declines in the populations of birds that nest in young forests due to lack of habitat. The Elm Hill project will create more biodiversity by addressing the urgent need for more young forest habitat in New England.

The project will also serve as a demonstration site for our Foresters for the Birds program, which teaches private landowners and professional foresters how to improve wildlife habitat when planning forest management activities. The project is being planned by a Massachusettslicensed consulting forester, and is funded in part through grants provided by the federal Natural Resource Conservation Service and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

Planning has benefitted from guidance provided by MassWildlife staff and other experts, and draws on Mass Audubon's own experience with young forest habitat creation in the Connecticut River Valley and the Berkshires.

Leaving your job? What happens to your 401(k)?

If you're in the early stages of your working life - or even in the not-soearly ones - the chances are pretty good that you will change jobs at some point. When that happens, you'll probably leave a few things behind -

Of course, you wouldn't really forabout your 401(k).

(It does happen, however – over the period from 2004 through 2013, more than 25 million people left at least one 401(k) or similar plan behind when they left their job, according to the U.S. Government Accountability Office.) But you will have to do something with your account.

Essentially, you have four choices:

You can cash out your 401(k). It's your money, but if you take it out before you reach 59 ½, you will owe federal income taxes, plus any applicable state and local taxes.

Also, you will likely be charged a 10 percent penalty for early withdrawal. Perhaps even more important, if you liquidate your 401(k) when you change jobs, you'll be reducing the amount you'll have left for retire-

You can leave your 401(k) with your old employer. If your former employer permits it, you can leave your 401(k) intact, even after you move to a different job. This might be appealing to you if you like the investment choices in your account, but you won't be able to make any new contributions. Plus, you won't face any immediate tax consequenc-

You can move the money to your new employer's 401(k). You can consolidate your old 401(k) with one offered by your new employer, if allowed. You won't take a tax hit, and you might like your new plan's investment options. And you may find it easier to manage your funds if they're all held in one place.

You can roll your 401(k) into an IRA. You don't need the permission from any employer – old or new – to move your old 401(k) to an IRA. Your money will continue to grow on a tax-deferred basis, and an IRA offers you a virtually unlimited array of investment options - stocks, bonds, mutual funds and so on. You can make either a direct or indirect rollover. With a direct rollover, the administrator of your old 401(k) sends your money directly to the financial provider that holds your rollover IRA. No tax is withheld because you never actually take possession of the money. With an indirect rollover, you're technically withdrawing the money and moving it to the IRA provider yourself. (You've got 60 days to make this transfer.) You will face a withholding of 20% of your account's assets, but you may be able to recover most of this amount when you file your tax return. Still, for the sake of ease of movement and avoidance of all tax issues, a direct rollover may be more advantageous.

Which of these options is right for you? There's no one "right" answer for everyone. You'll have to consider several factors, and you'll certainly want to consult your tax professional before making any decision. But in any case, do whatever you can to preserve - and hopefully grow your 401(k) assets. You'll need these resources to help fund the retirement lifestyle you want and deserve.
