## Spencer's Mary Madden celebrated for a lifetime of service

SPENCER — Mary Madden has countless fond memories over the years at her local library, but very few of them compare to a program held last week.

On May 29, residents and town officials gathered at Richard Sugden Public Library to dedicate a painting to Madden in honor of her service to Spencer. Madden, who turned 104 this year, was thrilled to receive the watercolor painting of downtown Spencer created by the late Emile Gaucher. The

painting will be displayed in the library, where Madden has spent many decades attending programs and accessing materials.

"This was a great surprise and honor for me," Madden said. "I have always enjoyed the treasures here at the library. It has taught us all about generosity and good fellowship."

A longtime teacher and principal in Spencer, Madden's last position before retiring was at the former Lake Street School.

## Leicester residents weigh in on school building project

LEICESTER — During the first of three public forums, residents last month weighed in on the school building project.

The May 21 meeting was attended by school leaders, Finance Board members, and several other town officials who were on hand to answer questions. Many residents asked about the configuration of the district's grades once the school building project is complete.

Officials have been informed that the most cost-effective configuration is to have students in grades pre-K through grade eight attend school in the same building. Rather than build a new middle school and then address the aging Leicester Primary School with a separate project, officials have mulled combining the two schools into one building.

"We have learned this is the most fiscally responsible choice, since the Primary School's useful lifespan will need to be addressed just about the time the middle school is completed," said School Building Committee member Paul McCarthy.

School officials were encouraged by residents' interest and

participation in the first public forum. Looking ahead, residents are once again invited to attend the remaining forums and offer input.

"I think the forum went very well. Parents and attendees had some very insightful questions and gave the committee some suggestions for the next public forum," said Leicester Public Schools Superintendent Marilyn Tencza. "The climate was positive, and we shared what the process has been up to this point and how we reached the design ideas that were presented at the meeting."

The next public forums will likely take place after the summer, officials said. This will give residents more time to conduct research on various grade configurations and ask questions based on their findings. Officials understand there are pros and cons for every scenario, and they want to find the one that fits best with Leicester's overall educational picture.

"We are hoping people would not only do more research, but continue to reach out with their questions," McCarthy added. "We have already received our first one through the contact page accessi-

## North Brookfield man honored with gravestone decades after passing

NORTH BROOKFIELD — On April 13, 1986, resident of North Brookfield Myron Harold Brown was killed instantly in a motorcycle accident while on a ride with his son, Michael. Myron left behind his five children, Leslie, Michael, Angie, Jennie and Linda. The children attended his funeral services as anyone would when a loved one has passed. What the children learned shortly after the services was the start of a 33-year-

long hope, wish and wait.

Myron's widow, Doris Brown, made a decision not to put a gravestone or any type of marker on Myron's grave. The children approached her on several occasions only to be told "no." A few short months after Myron's death, Doris remarried, and the hope of seeing the gravestone grew dimmer and dimmer. Earlier this year, Doris passed away, and the deed to the cemetery site was released to his

family.

Myron was a Korean War Veteran, honorably discharged, who has never seen a flag nor marker of his country's remembrance of his service. On May 22, after applying for a gravestone through the VA, Myron's gravestone was installed at his final resting place in St. Joseph's Cemetery. The stone includes a military emblem, an eagle and the words "Never forgotten" (chosen by his five children).

The Town of North Brookfield has arranged for the years going forward to have a flag on his gravesite, and to read his name each year during the town's annual Memorial Day Service Parade.

The children wish to thank all involved to help close their hopes and wishes of finally honoring their father. May each person reading this find peace as the years march forward.

## Knox Trail students keep tradition alive at Declamation Contest

Allan Poe, John F. Kennedy, Robert Frost, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Gwendolyn Brooks, and Maya Angelou, among others.

Several of the speeches in the final round lasted over a minute, and students' preparation work paid off.

"The process that students go through for declamation touches on so many important lessons," Johnson told the New Leader. "Choosing a poem or speech that speaks to them helps them learn about themselves. Memorizing it is a good workout for their brains, and performing it helps many of them gain confidence by overcoming a fear of presenting in front of others."

The tradition also helps spark students' interest in literature and oration, officials said. The school has hosted the declamation for so long now that some parents who took part when

they were kids are able to offer advice to their own children.

"I'm always proud and amazed to see how much effort and feeling students put into declamation, and I think they even surprise themselves sometimes when they go outside their comfort zone and find that they're capable of reaching new heights," Johnson said. "I also love the fact that our declamation judges are always members of the community, so students can see that their Knox Trail family extends beyond the staff who works in the building."

Officials thank all judges who take part in the tradition each year. During the first round of the contest open to all students, judges visit English classes throughout the school to discover the best speeches. School lead-

ers are also excited about the camaraderie the tradition builds among students as they prepare.

"The support and encouragement they give to each other is phenomenal, and all of this culminates in the final round," Johnson added. "A lot of people put a lot of planning and effort into our annual declamation contest, and it's always rewarding to see everything come together."

ble through the Web site."

Added Tencza, "We want to communicate to the townspeople that we want and need their input in all phases of the project."

SchoolBuildingCommittee officials also continue to stress the need to make the right decision the first time to prevent the added costs of future projects. In order to move forward, residents would ultimately need to approve the project in a debt exclusion ballot vote.

"After our years of learning and meetings, we are anxious to educate the voters that this is the time," McCarthy said. "Passing on this opportunity will potentially have a negative effect lasting more than a decade. Moving to one campus will harvest many rewards."


In February, the School

Committee unanimously voted to close the Leicester Memorial School at the end of the school year and reconfigure the district's grades next year.

Beginning in September, students in grades three and four will attend the primary school. Fifth graders will move to the middle school, and preschool students will shift to the high school. LHS will be modified over the summer to accommodate an additional grade, officials said.

Proponents of the pre-K through eighth grade building configuration cite significant financial savings as a benefit, as well as the ability to have all elementary and middle school students on one campus.

Over the summer, school officials will continue to make the needed submissions to satisfy Massachusetts School Building Authority requirements for the project.



### Partisan undermining

To the Editor:  
The Constitution clearly demands that a census be conducted to count all persons. Not citizens, not white people, not Republicans — persons. “All persons” includes citizens, non-citizen legal residents, non-citizen long term visitors, and undocumented immigrants based on where a person “lives and sleeps most of the time.”

The Trump administration has insisted on asking the citizenship of all members of a household for the first time in history despite that data not being relevant and since 1790 not desired by any administration. The clear reason is that Trump desires an “undercount.” He wants to scare households into not returning their census so that blue areas are undercounted and gerrymandering more effective. We are on track for the US population to “decline” because of unreturned census questionnaires.

There was little doubt that the Trump administration acted in bad faith when it moved to add a citizenship question to the 2020 Census. For those still unconvinced — including Supreme Court justices resistant to examining the administration’s nakedly partisan motivations — the revelation of new evidence last week made such willful blindness even less tenable. We cannot let the Trump administration get away with manipulating the census in a barely disguised partisan power play.

Opponents of the citizenship question provided in federal court documents elaborating on the partisan inspirations for the change. The daughter of Thomas B. Hofeller, a recently deceased Republican gerrymandering expert, discovered files on her late father’s hard drives suggesting that GOP operatives hoped to do more than simply depress the census count. They also wanted to give themselves an edge in legislative line-drawing.

Mr. Hofeller had concluded in 2015 that switching the way states distribute political representation — basing it on where eligible voters are, rather than on total population, whether voting-eligible or not — would benefit Republicans. Many Hispanics and

their children would be excluded from consideration as legislative lines were drawn. Democratic districts would have to expand in order to encompass the same number of people. The result would be districts that skewed Republican. But Mr. Hofeller concluded that Republicans would need better data on the voting-age population — from, say, the census — in order to make the switch.

The documents reveal that Republicans could gain doubly from the Trump administration’s insistence on a citizenship question to next year’s census. First, the question would undoubtedly depress the count among immigrants fearful that the government would hassle them if they revealed their noncitizen status. That in itself would deprive Democratic-leaning areas of representation in the next redistricting cycle.

The data could also enable states to move away from considering non-voters at all in their line-drawing in the way Mr. Hofeller envisioned. It is little wonder, then, that Mr. Hofeller’s daughter revealed documents suggesting that he helped cook up the administration’s flimsy excuse for adding the citizenship question — to better enforce the Voting Rights Act, as though that were a priority for the Trump Justice Department.

It is unclear whether the Supreme Court would consider evidence submitted in federal district court at this late stage in its pending ruling on the move to add the citizenship question. Ideally, it should not matter much; the justices were already offered a crystal-clear picture of an administration searching for excuses to meddle with the census for partisan ends, over the concerted objections of government experts about what the shift would do to the accuracy of the count.

But, at this point, anyone paying attention would have to be purposely obtuse to conclude that the Trump administration acted for legitimate purposes. The court must not let this pass. The voters must punish the elephant party in 2020.





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

# Sleep on it

That email that just irked you...  
The text that made you see red and hit "reply" almost before you realized you'd done it...

The stupid, hurtful or thoughtless remark someone tossed your way in a conversation that made you instantly upset...

These things require an immediate response, don't they? Are we supposed to let someone email/text/say things like that and not react to them??

Maybe not. Maybe there is value in not replying right away. It goes against what our "instant" 21st century lifestyle professes, which is that fastest is best: fastest Internet speed; fastest-moving line at the grocery store; fastest roller coaster; quickest and best come-back remark. It's all about being instantaneous.

But perhaps we need to learn to practice the pause...the deliberate rest before reacting. An angry emailed reply can't be un-sent, and the contents can't be un-viewed. Same for a hastily-sent text, or an equally bitter comment tossed back to the person who insulted you first. It's not about not defending ourselves, or about letting things roll off our backs. It's about waiting to react.

There's a very convincing school of thought that counsels sleeping on any big decision before making it. That can apply to small things too. The email from a coworker or client that rubbed you the wrong way might look a little different by the next morning. Maybe there was no harm meant, and you interpreted it wrong. Maybe it was an unfair complaint or personal remark against you, but in waiting to reply, you strengthen your position as the more even-tempered and reasonable person. Perhaps the sender of the nasty text also had time to reconsider, and now has the chance to apologize. In pausing before reacting, you allow those possibilities to happen.

While reacting hastily and immediately can feel great at the time, it can't be undone. Waiting a while – sleeping on it – can never hurt.

Never react because you think you must. Other than breathing, just about anything can wait one day.

## Do you have a business succession strategy?

### The Promise Act: A big opportunity to give our kids a better chance for success

To the Editor:

State Sen. Adam Hinds represents the rural district western Massachusetts. He recently wrote an article, "The Income Equality Problem Massachusetts Ignores." A sturdy local guy with extensive national and international experience, he indicates in cities we can easily see inequalities and poverty. However, in rural areas (such as those served by the New Leader), he believes they aren't so visible. Yet they widely exist. For example, about 20 towns in Worcester County, mainly to the north, south, and west of the city have large numbers of economically disadvantaged townspeople.

Hinds points out that as the productive sectors of their economies declined, small cities and rural towns have faced severe problems including limited broadband, almost non-existent public transportation, older and stagnant or declining populations and similar income levels.

Perhaps most importantly, importantly rural school districts struggle,

to provide quality education for our kids.

Hinds says that as the towns' tax bases decline in real terms, budgets are cut in areas like infrastructure and public schools. These cuts, in turn, make it difficult to hold onto existing residents and businesses, much less attract younger residents or new entrepreneurs.

Consider one example of inequality between towns. Overall, expenditure on education in towns is directly related to the size of its property tax base. Rural Spencer and, Boston suburb Weston have about the same population. However Weston's property tax base is about six times larger than Spencer's (and even greater for the "Brookfields").

Does it mean that because Weston's has a six times larger property asset base, that their kids deserve a much better education than ours. Of course not, but right now they - and the kids of other well off towns) both get a better education and with it, and resulting a

much better chance for success.

This June offers an unusual chance to narrow the inequality of educational opportunity. Our state legislators, Ann Gobi, Donald Berthiaume, Peter Durant and David Leboeuf will consider and hopefully vote on ways to increase public school funding.

Gobi and Leboeuf stand along with Hinds as co-sponsors of Promise Act.

Award winning journalist Bianca Vasquez Toness manages education reporting for public radio station WGBH. Recently she wrote an article, "How Much Should Massachusetts Pay To Close Gaps Between Rich and Poor Students." In it, she indicates the Promise Act would provide much more funding to districts with large numbers of economically disadvantaged students. Based on estimates she quotes and on other sources, the Promise Act would provide three times more funds than Governor Baker's education proposal. In Worcester, for example, the annual funding difference per disadvantaged would differ

from Baker's \$800 to Promise's \$4,251 per student.

These difference levels have at least a partial cause in Baker's, under pressure reluctance to increase taxation and the Promise Act sponsor's likely interest, for long term investment in our kids of raising taxes on (only) the very, very well off. Such investments in educational opportunities typically show very positive returns for everybody.

Increased funding of our school districts is not everything. But the Promise Act level of funding (hopefully with Baker like positive incentives and oversight) should give our kids a more equal opportunity to succeed.

## The Founders' intent

They created a representative democracy in the form of a republic - people elect leaders who make decisions on their behalf with a system that protects minority rights.

For 243 years, there have been no kings, queens, juntas, conquerors, or dictatorships. The United States is the oldest continuous democracy in the world. The United States has the oldest Constitution in use today. As our leaders pull the levers of power, we should ask ourselves, "What did the founders intend?"

The Constitution is silent on political parties, and the founders did not originally intend for our politics to be partisan. Federalist Papers No. 9 & 10 warn of the dangers of domestic political parties. George Washington was non-partisan throughout his career and presidency. Washington warned against political parties in his farewell address.

It is clear that the founders did not intend for either political parties or partisan politics.

The President is elected by the people quadrennially. Should a vacancy open up on the Supreme Court, the President is to appoint a successor with the Senate's advice and consent. In our history, only during the Civil War era did we see political calculations regarding running out the clock on judicial appointments although in those times the Senate had dubious but ostensible merit-based objections.

In 2012, the people chose Barack Obama to fill all SCOTUS vacancies and we had one. In 2016, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Kentucky, refused to hold a hearing on President Barack Obama's Supreme Court nominee, saying that it was an election

year and that the American people "deserved a voice in the selection of their next Supreme Court Justice." No reason to reject the nominee was given, only a vow not to consider any nominees from the then duly elected president so that "the next" president could fill the seat. This was not the founders' intent.

This week, McConnell was asked He was asked at a Chamber of Commerce luncheon: "Should a Supreme Court justice die next year, what will your position be on filling that spot?"


McConnell responded with a grin, "Oh, we'd fill it." What a hypocrite! Our Republic is fundamentally broken when the constitution is interpreted differently by the same man who holds the keys to the Supreme Court 4 years apart based only on partisan political opportunism.

In the other constitutional crisis of the week, Mueller clarified his comments, on TV, presumably to reach Americans who choose not to read. He said, "If we had confidence that the president clearly did not commit a crime we would have said so". He went on to say that it would have been unconstitutional for him to charge a sitting president and that the constitution requires a process other than the criminal justice system to formally accuse a sitting president of wrongdoing. 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

## Minutemen finish regular season strong, including victory over Pathfinder

CHARLTON — The Bay Path Regional varsity baseball team used a little bit of everything — hitting, pitching, defense, plate discipline and speed — to cobble together a 6-3 victory over Pathfinder Regional in its final regular-season game of the 2019 season.

With the win, their fourth straight and fifth in their last six games, the Minutemen head to the Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament with an 11-9 record.

Bay Path head coach Mark Sansoucy believes his team is better than its record, a record that includes one-run losses to Worcester Tech, the Advanced Math and Science Academy (AMSA), Blackstone Valley

Tech and Assabet Valley, and a two-run loss to Worcester Tech as well.

“Record-wise, yeah, you want to be going into the tournament with a better record than 11-9, but we are really a better team than that; we could easily be 15-5,” Sansoucy said. “We’re a solid team. We’ve got a good group of baseball players. I think we’ll be fine in the playoffs.”

“I’m happy with the group we have,” Sansoucy continued. “I’ll play anyone with these guys. I’ll take my chances with these guys. I think we can go into the tournament and compete with anybody.”

After spotting 4-14 Pathfinder a 1-0 lead in the top of the first inning, Bay Path came back in the bottom of the frame to

score a pair of runs and take a 2-1 lead heading to the second inning. The Minutemen had just one hit in the rally, but they took advantage of a pair of walks, a hit batsman, and a sacrifice fly by senior Cody Wood.

The Minutemen increased their lead to 3-1 in the bottom of the third inning. With one out junior Nate Shoemaker walked, stole second, went to third on a single by sophomore Dylan Brien and then came home later in the inning on a two-out bases-loaded walk to senior Bryson Bullock.

Pathfinder — which lost to Bay Path, 15-0, in the first meeting of the teams this season — tied the game, 3-3, in the top of the fifth, making the most of a walk, a Minutemen error and a two-RBI single by Alex Marley.

Bay Path sewed up the win in the bottom of the sixth inning, scoring three runs to take a 6-3 lead into the seventh.

Junior Brian Lavoie started the game-winning rally by being hit by a pitch, but he was erased at second base when senior Andrew Fritze hit into a fielder’s choice to second base. Fritze went to second on an infield single by senior Dom Esposito and then scored to make it 4-3 when sophomore Erik Johnson reached on a Pathfinder error.

Esposito scored later in the inning to make it a 5-3 game, coming home on an infield single by Wood. Shoemaker closed out the scoring, pushing the Minutemen lead to 6-3 when he scored on a wild pitch.

Bay Path had just five hits in the game — all singles — but made the most of eight walks and an eye-popping nine stolen bases.

“We like to run and we’ve got some kids that can run and we let a lot of them — not all of them — loose on the bases,”

Sansoucy said. “They’re smart out there on the bases. Probably because they know if they’re not, they know they won’t be running again.”



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

# Gilman, Hart pitch Quaboag to doubleheader sweep over Douglas

TEN-WIN SEASON PROPELS COUGARS INTO CENTRAL MASS. D4 TOURNAMENT

WARREN — The Quaboag Regional varsity baseball team is headed back to the Central Mass. Division 4 Tournament, thanks to a 7-1 victory over Douglas High in the first game of a doubleheader between the teams on Wednesday, May 29.

The win was the ninth of the season for the Cougars, who play an 18-game regular-season schedule. Quaboag also defeated the Tigers in the nightcap (9-0)

and, following a loss to Uxbridge High on Saturday, June 1, enter the postseason with a 10-8 mark.

"I've been here for more than 12 years and this is only the second time we've put up double-digit wins in a season," Cougars' head coach Brian Guimond said. "The only other time we did that was in 2013 when we had a kid who is now pitching Triple-A ball for the Brewers."

Guimond was referring to Thomas Jankins, who is currently a starting

pitcher for the San Antonio Missions, Milwaukee's AAA affiliate in the Pacific Coast League.

Senior Aiden Gilman was instrumental in the Cougars' Game 1 win over Douglas back on May 29, allowing just an unearned run and four hits while striking out 14.

"Aiden just took over in that game. He's our ace; he's been our workhorse. He's pitched a lot of innings," said Guimond. "He'll be pitching at Westfield State next year."


Offensively Quaboag banged out nine hits in the game, several coming in a five-run first inning.

"Kolby Moynahan [a senior] had a couple of hits and a couple of runs in the game and Zach Hogan [a senior] had a nice long double that scored a couple of runs. That was the big blow in the game," Guimond said. "Brandon Hart [a senior] had two hits in the game and Jack Dorman [a senior] had a big hit, too. We were able to string some hits together in that game."

The second game was also a combination of good pitching and ample hitting, too, for the Cougars. Hart got the win, throwing a six-hit shutout while striking out eight and Wyatt Gilman [Aiden's younger brother] collected three of the hits — and drove in a pair of runs — to pace Quaboag's 11-hit attack.

"Brandon's been phenomenal this year. He's pitched 36 innings for us and walked like two guys. His ERA is sub 2.00. He threw the ball real well," Guimond said. "Aiden's little brother, Wyatt Gilman, who is only a freshman — we called him up for the last week of the season — was the hitting star of the game."

"Jack Dorman had two hits in the game, too," Guimond continued. "Jack's been hitting right around .400 all year for us. He's been steady all year long."

The game was tied, 0-0, after four innings, but Quaboag scored seven runs in the fifth and single runs in the sixth and seventh to sew up its 10th win of the season.

So now it's onto the Division 4 Tournament for the Cougars, where the bracket will be released after press time.

"I feel good about this team going into the tournament," Guimond said. "It's funny because if you watched us this year you see us beat Northbridge and you think we can play with anybody. But then there are other times when we make four errors in the first inning that you're like, 'what is going on here?'"

"For the most part we play very good infield defense and our pitching has been good," Guimond continued. "You get in these tournaments and sometimes the higher seed plays in an easier league. Because we have two solid pitchers we have a chance to win any game we're in. We don't score a ton of runs, so hopefully we can scratch for a few runs and our pitching can keep us in it. But, you just never know what's going to happen so we'll see how it goes."

Guimond said he is well aware that qualifying for the postseason — with a 10-8 record — is quite an accomplishment for the program whereas last season they qualified with a sub-.500 record (7-11) via the Sullivan Rule, where they had to finish .500 or better against common D4 opponents because they play 70 percent or more of their league games against teams in higher divisions.

"For us to get in like this is a big deal," Guimond said. "When Thomas was a senior we won some big games, but this is the first year that we played with some good teams and we competed with everyone. This year I feel like we created our District berth while last year I think we kind of fell into it. I'm excited for my players because these guys love baseball and they play hard. I'm happy for them."

GRAFTON — It took 16 and a half games for the Tantasqua Regional boys' varsity lacrosse team to play a zone defense — they normally form man-to-man pressure — but when called upon the Warriors really rose to the occasion.

"My heart was in my throat, but I still had confidence in my guys," added Anderson.

"Sean Farland, our face-off guy, is great. Their guy, I think, is the best one we've seen all year. Sean is a battler, he definitely held his own," said Anderson.

Darger scored to open the second quarter. After Nipmuc tied the score, Cam Dungey potted goals within 20 seconds to make it 5-3. Darger then

Keeping deer out of a garden is not easy, and even an eight or ten foot fence will not deter them from jumping over them to feed on the fresh vegetation.

Keeping backyard feeders full of food for numerous species of birds can become expensive if you do not have some type of control on chipmunks and squirrels. Hummingbirds are back big time with as many as a half dozen of them flocking to the feeder at one time. My wife Judy enjoyed watching them fly in and out of the feeders daily, before she lost her battle with cancer recently.

Trout fishing remains strong on local lakes and ponds & bass fishing can not get much better. One of the valleys hot spots is Lackey Pond in Sutton and Whitinsville. Sense the restoration of the Dam a number of years ago, large-mouth bass populations have exploded and it is common to catch a four-pound bass daily at the site. One angler also caught a calico bass and a pickerel at the site. Because the river was heavily polluted back in the ‘50’s -‘70’s, it is not recommended eating the fish from the area. Catch & release should be practiced. There is a small boat ramp at the dam, that is accessible to small boats, canoes & kayaks. Small motors are allowed. Give it a try.

Stripers are starting to show in big numbers in both Mass. & Rhode Island. Fluke fishing is also picking up along with some impressive seabass.

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

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

# Healthy BBQ Tips

It's officially BBQ Season and this time of year grilled suppers make for highly anticipated outdoor mealtimes – and the excitement applies even if you've vowed to eat healthy! All it takes is a little creativity to re-vamp traditional barbecue foods into healthier offerings.

onion, diced; one tbsp soy sauce; three garlic cloves minced; one tsp cumin; one tsp dry mustard; one tbsp chili powder; one tsp Italian seasoning; one 6 oz can tomato paste (use sugar free if available); 1.5 cups beef or chicken stock; 2 tbsp apple cider vinegar; 1 packet (to taste) of Stevia sweetener.

Directions: Sauté onion in butter. Add all other ingredients. Bring to a boil and simmer for 15-20 minutes, until sauce thickens.

The following culinary tips cut calories, not flavor!

\*Always trim fat off steaks and chops before grilling. Use a brine or marinade to ensure a moist and flavorful cut (see recipes above).

\*Substitute a slathering of fresh avocado for cheese and/or mayo on a grilled turkey burger.

\*Marinate large slices of summer squash, zucchini, peppers, eggplant and the like, and toss them on the grill for a tasty veggie medley.

\*Spice up all your grilled foods without adding calories, fat or sodium with this no salt spice recipe from Dr. Oz: Mix together 1/3 cup each garlic powder, onion powder, and oregano; 2 tbsp thyme; 1 tbsp parsley flakes; 1 tsp ground pepper

\*Grilled fruits are a scrumptious, diet-friendly dessert as they are. Or, top the caramelized fruit with scoop of sorbet or sugar free ice cream. Firm fruits such as pineapples, apples and pears are best fruits for grilling; bananas, peaches and mangos also work well but need extra attention to prevent them from becoming mushy. To keep fruits from drying out, cut fruit in half (remove any seeds but leave skin on to keep its shape) and soak in cold water with a little lemon juice for 15-30 minutes before grilling. Spray a clean grate with non stick cooking oil to prevent sticking.

**Fun Fact:** Did you ever wonder where the word "barbecue" comes from? The origin has an intriguing explanation. Some sources claim it comes from the French phrase "barbe a queue" which translates into "from whiskers to tail." The reference recalls the longtime tradition of cooking an animal on an open fire, thus roasting the entire carcass from whiskers to tail!

Read on prep ideas, recipes, and culinary tips sure to make grilling not only healthy, but the best of the season! \*\*\*

The most simple and cost effective way to ramp up the flavor of healthy cuts of meats, fish and poultry is to prep grilling foods to boost optimum flavor. Below are some pre-cooking strategies that add a healthy dose of deliciousness!

\*Brine: Lean cuts of meat don't have to translate into less taste! Preparing meat and poultry with a brine preparation plumps up the foods while infusing tons of flavor. Brining, which is basically a salt water bath, can elevate dry, lean cuts to rich gourmet status. While many types of brine employ large doses of salt and sugar, the following recipe from Cooks Illustrated "Basics of Brining" offers a healthier alternative. This brine recipe is ideal for high heat grilling:

Use one quart cold water per pound of food. Add two tablespoons table salt or three tbsp Morton Kosher salt, and two tablespoons sugar. Meat or poultry should brine (refrigerated) in the solution for one hour per pound, but not less than a half hour or more than eight hours.

Note: The addition of garlic cloves, peppercorns, herbs, and/or citrus peel offer additional flavor without added fat or calories.

\*Marinate: Marinades are typically comprised of an acid, oil and spices. Marinating lean cuts of meat not only adds flavor, but the acids serve as a natural meat tenderizer. In addition, it's been proven marinade helps protect meat from cancer causing compounds caused by cooking at high heat (HCAs) and by smoking fat drippings (PAH).

Sans the sugar and light on salt, this mustard based marinade rivals the best of them: Mix together two cloves garlic, crushed; one cup balsamic vinegar; 1/2 cup Dijon or other dark, quality mustard ; 1/4 cup virgin olive oil; 1/2 teaspoon pepper ; 1/4 teaspoon sea salt. Marinade for an hour or more in the refrigerator.

Note: Overnight marinating can reduce cooking time by up to 35%!

\*Spice Rub: With a high flavor factor and low carb and calorie count, spice rubs are healthy, delicious alternatives to rich meat sauces. Both novice and veteran grillers often experiment with herbs to develop a "signature" all purpose rub that can be used with a variety of meats and poultry. This basic all purpose rub (for beef, pork, poultry or fish) uses common pantry spices: Mix together 3/4 cup paprika; 1/4 cup freshly ground black pepper; 1/4 cup coarse salt; 1/4 cup sugar; 2 tablespoons each chili powder, garlic powder, and onion powder; two teaspoons cayenne pepper. Rub dry spice mixture generously on meat before grilling.

Note: This recipe makes two cups and can be adjusted for smaller portions. \*\*\*

# A burst of new (wild)life



The month of May & June has numerous wildlife bringing their young into the world, as this week's picture shows a mother goose with four of her recently born Canada geese at the Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club. Many members enjoy feeding the birds daily, and provide some great entertainment when another goose tries to interfere with the young birds feeding.

Wild Turkeys are also being observed with their clutches of young birds. Some hen Turkeys have been observed with as many as 12 or more young birds. Although not all of the young birds will survive, many will. Predators like fox, fisher cat, hawks and owls to mention a few are sure to take their toll on the newborn.

Deer are also having their young, and will do so all this month with some being born in June. The deer population in Mass. has been strong, and continues to grow annually despite their loss of habitat, due mostly to construction. The deer have adapted to living among humans, and have become a nuisance for residents trying to grow a small backyard garden. One local res-

ident observed a couple of deer feeding in his strawberry patch. As the local back yard gardens start to grow, the deer will sure be back to feed on the fresh young plants.

Keeping deer out of a garden is not easy, and even an eight or ten foot fence will not deter them from jumping over them to feed on the fresh vegetation.

Keeping backyard feeders full of food for numerous species of birds can become expensive if you do not have some type of control on chipmunks and squirrels. Hummingbirds are back big time with as many as a half dozen of them flocking to the feeder at one time. My wife Judy enjoyed watching them fly in and out of the feeders daily, before she lost her battle with cancer recently.

Trout fishing remains strong on local lakes and ponds & bass fishing can not get much better. One of the valleys hot spots is Lackey Pond in Sutton and Whitinsville. Sense the restoration of the Dam a number of years ago, largemouth bass populations have exploded and it is common to catch a four-pound bass daily at the site. One angler also caught a calico bass and a pickerel at the site. Because the river was heavily polluted back in the '50's -'70's, it is not recommended eating the fish from the area. Catch & release should be practiced. There is a small boat ramp at the dam, that is accessible to small boats, canoes & kayaks. Small motors are allowed. Give it a try.

Stripers are starting to show in big numbers in both Mass. & Rhode Island. Fluke fishing is also picking up along with some impressive seabass.


