### Finance figures cause frenzy at **Town Meeting**

ITEMS ULTIMATELY PASSED AS DEBATE DOMINATES GATHERING

WEBSTER — If members of the Webster community thought they would get a quick and easy Fall Town Meeting on Monday, Oct. 17, they were sorely mistaken especially when it came to what some believed would be very simple financial articles on the table for consid-

Articles 2-10 on the meeting warrant concerned several

financial items, mostly relating to salaries of employees throughout the town. While all of these articles passed in separate votes, albeit by majority rather than unanimous, it took over an hour and a half to have the votes tallied after members of the Finance Committee, Board of Selectmen, town hall staff, and the general public engaged in heavy conversation about whether or not to even vote on the items at all.

Webster resident Ken Mandile was the one who stood and made the motion to see Articles 2 through 10 postponed to a Dec. 5 meeting in order to give the Finance Committee, the incoming new town administrator and others the chance to further examine the finances and understand the origin of the raises included in the articles and the history of raises for those respective positions.

"I don't feel that the gener-

al public has been given the information to make a proper decision on these articles,' Mandile said. "We don't have the history of the salary items. I believe some of these have recently gotten salary increases. We would need a lot more detail in order to make a good judgment on these. In addition, we should be hiring on a new town administrator within the

### Voters to decide fate of fire department project

DUDLEY — On Election Day. voters in Dudley will have more than just a president to decide on. There will be an item on the ballot that hits a little closer to home, as voters in the town will decide whether or not to move forward with funding a remodel to the

town's fire station. Before that, however, voters need to approve the item for a vote during the Annual Fall Town Meeting in just under a week's time. The fire station renovation and construction project will be one of several items on the town meeting warrant on Oct. 24, and with a two-thirds vote, the item would be approved to appear on the 2016 election ballot in November as a debt exclusion ballot question. This is not to be confused with a Prop. 2 1/2 override, which allows a budget to go over the maximum 2.5-percent increase set by the state. The debt exclusion would exempt only the fire department project from the limits of Prop. 2 1/2 as the town will be borrowing \$6.5 million for the design, renovation, construction, demolition and refurnishing of the West Main Street facility.

In preparation for both the town meeting and the upcoming

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

# Vietnam vet chosen as parade grand marshal

WEBSTER/DUDLEY — When he came home he was spit on, subjected to vile commentary, and he was insulted by the brutal "in your face" tactics of the "make love not war" advocates who verbally bushwhacked every member of the military arriving home from Vietnam at our nation's airports. The

uninformed critics of the war misplaced their anger, it should have been directed at the politician, not the soldier.

Because of Grzyb's Airborne training he was highly capable of putting a serious hurt onto the war protesters he encountered. But, during his enlistment he had learned restraint as well as discipline and knew full well that assaulting a civilian while wearing the uniform could mean court martial. Biblically speaking, he turned the other cheek. But, T-5 Grzyb never, ever forgot that "welcome."

Behavior such as David endured on his arrival back home never happened in Jericho, where he grew up on Pine Street, surrounded by friends and relatives. He has fond memories of the area landmarks, the DLK Hall, White Eagle Bottling, the Lumber Yard, Koko's café as well as Sunnyside. The Jericho boys all had nicknames, to some David was known as "Mushroom."

He was born in Dudley in 1944 and educated in the town school system prior to attending Boys Trade in Worcester where he studied Painting and Decorating. He entered the military in 1963 at the age of 19. Recruit Grzyb received basic training at Ft. Dix, N.J. He subsequently attended Airborne School in Fort Benning, Ga. Upon completion he was ordered to Ft. Lee, Va., for Parachute Rigging School. He was then assigned to the 549th Airborne QM Company in Japan, as a parachute rigger. David worked primarily on the chutes used to drop heavy equipment such as tanks, trucks, etc. Officially, he was designated as an Aerial Delivery Specialist, an Airborne Rigger.

While in Japan, David was sent to Okinawa to complete a course at HALO

School (High Altitude Low Opening) jump training. He also received Temporary Additional Duty as an advisor on classified missions in Southeast Asia. He has been awarded a Letter of Commendation (for devotion to duty, etc.), Basic Qualification Badge, Parachute Badge, National Defense Service Medal and Good Conduct Medal.

Grzyb was separated from service after two years and nine months, including one year of foreign service on June 15, 1966. It has been 50 years but David still appears to be physically fit and enjoying life. He is a gregarious individual, an extrovert who continues to live on the edge by jumping out of airplanes. He has completed over three hundred jumps since his separation from military service.

David is retired now and lives in Dudley. Most of his working life was with the Telephone Company, from Ma Bell to Verizon and all the companies in between. He is a member of Webster-Dudley Post 184 American Legion.

He will be leading the parade through our two towns on Veterans Day. Parade goers will have a unique opportunity to right a terrible wrong.

When you see David marching down Main Street, looking sharp in his Airborne Uniform, wearing his polished trooper boots, just give him a raucous and heartfelt "Welcome Home Dave." He will appreciate it.

The Webster-Dudley Veterans Council is honored that David J. Grzyb has agreed to assume the responsibilities of Grand Marshal for this year's Veterans Day Parade. He will always be a proud veteran and a patriotic citizen of Dudley who served his country honorably.

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
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### OHS revels in level 1 designation in accountability report

OXFORD — In recent years, Oxford High School has faced criticism when it comes to funding and lack of effective programs and results, all of which culminated in the school being designated a Level 3 school by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) for the last six years or so — a designation that put the school right in the middle of a five-level scale determined by test scores, graduation rates and drop out rates.

After six years, a change of leadership and some hard work, the school has entered a new era. Recently OHS was upgraded, receiving a Level 1 designation from the DESE accountability rating for the first time since the rating system debuted in 2010, an honor that Principal Ross Thibault said is the culmination of many different people coming together from the school and community to grow Oxford High School into something special.

'Oxford High School had

been a Level 3 high school for a number of years. This accountability system has been in place since, I believe, 2010, and Oxford High School has been Level 3 pretty much since this system was developed and rolled out," Thibault said. When I got here one of my charges was to help improve the school and to raise it ultimately to a Level 1 school. This most recent school year, [DESE] announced that Oxford High School has improved to a Level 1 high school. Our staff does a phenomenal job here and we became a Level 1 school because we are doing what we need to do to improve.

Over the past few years the high school has implemented several different new programs, including a dramatic increase in AP courses, a robotics program, a successful video production program and computer science courses that have sense also grown to include AP level classes as well. The school's MCAS scores, dropout rate and graduation rate have all improved to the point where now Oxford is at level with many of the state's most respected educational institutions as a Level 1 school.

[The designation] "provides the community with some validations of confidence that you have a high performing school in Oxford. It gives the school something to be proud of because it puts us right up there with the top schools in the state. One of the biggest challenges Oxford High School has faced since I got here is the issue of perception versus reality. The perception was, stressing past tense, that we weren't getting the job done. That was a problem because with school choice, no one has to send their kids to Oxford," Thibault said. "We found ourselves in a Level 3 rating and the town had concerns about the work the high school was doing ... and now as a Level 1 school, we can show the community we are doing good work here and that they can be confident in what we do. It helps us to battle a perception that wasn't reality.'


Superintendent Dr. Mark Garceau also called the Level 1 designation an honor and a culmination of effort and determination. He said it's no surprise to him that Oxford High School has become what it is today, noting that he always believe the school was destined for great things despite the struggles it was facing when he came on board only a few years ago.

"It's terrific recognition of the hard work that's going on over at Oxford High School. I've known the potential of the school, the district and the town is unlimited and through hard work and focus and perseverance we knew great improvement could be on the way and sure enough it's here," Garceau said. "I'm really committed to seeing Oxford High School become the comprehensive high school in the region. There are other schools with specialties and there are vocational schools in the region that do a fine job with what they do, but in terms of preparing kids for a college or career, whatever they choose because that is their choice, I think Oxford High School can do that at the highest level.

We have outstanding programs at the school that continue to strengthen. When you have that cloud of Level 3 status above you and you can remove it and hone in on the academics while expanding those other opportunities for kids then nothing but good can come from that."

For perspective, compared to other high schools in the region, Auburn High School and Shepherd Hill Regional High School in Dudley sit as Level 2 schools on the accountability scale, while Bartlett High School in Webster currently has a Level 3 designation. As for Oxford's other town schools, they're not doing too bad either. Oxford Middle School and the Clara Barton Elementary School both currently have Level 2 designations on the same accountability scale as of 2016 with the district as a whole achieving Level 2 status as well.

### As holiday season approaches, hunger looms

FOOD BANKS CALL FOR SUPPORT DURING STRESSFUL TIME

the holiday season approaches, residents are getting an early start on Christmas shopping and planning out their food lineups for Thanksgiving dinner. But for countless families throughout the area, they are wondering where their next meal will come from.

Food insecurity remains a chronic yet often overlooked problem, and local legislators and volunteers are asking for your support. Congressman James McGovern recently spoke on the House Floor about the important role that food banks play in helping families and communities struggling with

This past summer, McGovern volunteered at Philabundance, a Philadelphia-area food bank. While there, he saw in action the importance of legislators supporting local food pantries and strengthening federal anti-hunger programs.

"Food banks across our country, like the Worcester County Food Bank and Food Bank of Western Massachusetts, do incredible work to reduce hunger in surrounding communities," McGovern said. "They employ innovative strategies to fight hunger and increase access to nutritious food for our most vulnerable neighbors.

McGovern commended local food pantries for everything they do to support families, but he knows they can't do it alone.

They need constant assistance from donors and volunteers, as well as support from legislators.

"Food banks and food pantries are incredible partners in our efforts to end hunger. They are often the first line of defense emergency situations," McGovern said. "Ending hunger will take a strong partnership between these organizations and federal, state and local governments.

Volunteers at area food pantries often see families with young children dealing with food insecurity, as well as seniors who forego meals in order to cover other costs. In the cold months, seniors are sometimes forced between staying warm and going hungry.

"A lot of seniors have to decide whether to pay a bill or buy food. We want to do everything we can to help them," said Cheryl Cooney, who has spent the last 15 years as director of the Leicester Food Pantry, in addition to serving as a member of Hearts for

Working in home healthcare, Cooney regularly sees seniors choosing between heat, prescription medications and food. Countless others are one lost job or sickness away from requiring food pantry assistance.

"There is nothing worse as a home care health provider than to go into a cold house to visit a sick senior who has limited funds for food and medications," Cooney said.

For many residents, they don't understand the vital role of food pantries until they require the services themselves.

"I had cancer three years ago, ended up losing my job," said a lifelong Northbridge resident who preferred not to provide his name for this article. "You never think it will happen to you, but there I was – trying to recover, bills stacking up, no job. You can't buy food and pay all your bills without a job, and it seemed like there was nowhere to turn. But the food bank was there for me. That was huge."

In his time spent at food banks across the state and beyond, McGovern has seen countless similar stories of hardship leading to food insecurity. To ensure that food banks continue to have adequate funding and resources, he is promoting the need for support at all levels.

"Many [food pantries] are small and only open on limited schedules. Most are run with the support of dedicated volunteers. some of whom have other fulltime jobs," McGovern explained. "Often, these charities operate out of small spaces like basements or closets at houses of worship. And importantly, they rely on donations from members of the community as a primary source of food to distribute.'

### Fire department project in the hands of Dudley voters

election, The Webster Times paid a visit to the Dudley Fire Department during their open house on Saturday, Oct. 15, where Chief Dean Kochanowski and Selectman Jonathan Ruda, a member of the committee that planned the project, hosted a walkthrough of the facility and revealed some of the underlying issues with the current building and the plans for the new facility should the item pass.

The new building would take the current, two-story facility and eliminate its second floor. The entire building would become a single-level structure, expanding into the neighboring wooded area that would require permits from the town to complete. Also included in the layout are two full-size bays with 14-by-14-foot openings, raising the existing bays by 12 feet, creating living quarters and a large office area as well as a small workout room that would be housing equipment already owned by the department and a mechanical room. It would also bring the building within ADA compliance.

This project is the second plan presented to the town after five years of work, with the first proposal in 2015 failing to receive support due to issues with a change of location to the town municipal lot with the town hall and police station and a high cost. The new station plan reduced the footprint of the project to 14,000 square feet from 19,000 square feet, eliminated \$2.7 million from its cost and required no land acquisition, as the department will remain where it is today, just in a new form. The cost of the project would mean an extra \$42.20 per year for the average single-family value, which equated to about 19 cents on the overall tax rate throughout the 40-year life of

Speaking with Kochanowski, the leading fire official for Dudley said that this project is as simple and fleshed out as they can make it after failing to bring a much larger project to the table last year. Both Kochanowski and Ruda said this may not be the department they want, but it's the one they really do need.

"It's the safety of the people working in this building, but it's also the safety of the community. We run many community programs and people from the community want to visit our station, but I don't feel it's even safe for that," the chief said during the walk through of the station. "It doesn't meet ADA compliance with only one bathroom you have to sneak past a hose to get to. We've got a part of the building pulling away, and another thing people don't realize is that we could bring it up to code but then you break that threshold and you have to bring the whole building up to code, which is a huge waste of money to put that much investment in a building that will have the same problems in five or 10 years. So instead lets spend the money to get a building for the next 50 or 60 years that will more than pay for itself.'

During the walkthrough The Webster Times took note of some of the issues plaguing the building, including several ceiling fixtures that have

had to be removed do to the larger trucks that have moved into the station. Black mold issues were noted, as well as ceiling problems, such as tiles degrading and falling apart, and a significant lack of space with little room to maneuver between bays. Upstairs, a single bunkroom containing four bunks allows for no privacy for female firefighters, with an office converted into a single sleeping space. The upstairs meeting room appears very presentable, but is the center of the mold issue in the building and an office space is shared with ventilations and heating equipment. As the chief stated, a portion of the building is indeed coming apart from the main structure having been an addition to the facility many

years ago. Kochanowski explained that the idea to make the building a single level structure had many added benefits. In addition to make the building a more conveniently designed structure, it also eliminated the requirement of an elevator to meet ADA compliance. The facility also acts as the towns **Emergency Operations Center** and its current setup is not conducive to serving that purpose.

"Right now this is the center and it doesn't meet any state code or mandate to meet that designation, but it's what we have. If the town hall or schools get wiped out in a natural disaster the superintendent and administrator and town accountant are supposed to be able to all move in and set up their computers and do what they have to do temporarily. They can't so that here. We couldn't even come close to handling that right now," the chief said, adding more input on the single-level design. "You'll be able to see the entire building and I think it will be better for the aesthetics of the town. The selectmen have made it clear they want to promote Dudley

and maybe bring businesses into town, but no business will come to a town that doesn't invest in itself. The town has had three police stations, three town halls, schools being built and only one original fire station since 1960. It's never been replaced. So, there really is a


Over the years, the department has evolved from a volunteer entity to one with fulltime employees and an entity the town depends on for much more than fire response. Ruda said he agrees it's time to invest in the fire department and that he feels this is an important project for the people of Dudley to get behind.

'Any town building always belongs to the taxpayers, so we have to listen loud and clear to what the taxpayers want. We designed a building that would suit Dudley's needs for 75 years, and the taxpayers didn't like the location or the cost, and they defeated it. We heard that message and we've come back and designed a building that serves the purpose and is more in line with what the taxpayers said they wanted in the first place," Ruda said. "The chief has made every effort to find new sources of revenue to improve the services we offer the town. He's nearing a million dollars in grant money during his time here and we've gotten a new ladder truck for less than the average cost and paid it off early. Whenever we can find a source of funding that doesn't impact the taxpayer we do that, but at some point it becomes necessary for the taxpayer to purchase an upgrade. The cost of this new station is less than it cost us 15 years ago to renovate the town hall. It's time. We've evolved to the point where the department is a 24/7 operation.'

Even still, there are those in the town who are not in favor of the project. Some have questioned why the department

doesn't make small changes and fixes here or there. However, the chief has been adamant in saying that doing so would create small solutions to bigger problems and require much more of an investment over time than this current project would involve to create a long-lasting facility. With the possibility always there that the project could fail at the town meeting or the polls, The Webster Times asked the chief what would happen if the results were not in their favor.

"We'd be forced into a corner because you can only fix so much. Once you break the threshold you have to bring the whole building up to code and we'll just be doing patchwork while the building continues to degrade. It's an unhealthy building. You look at the potential for people who work here every day for years and years developing health issues. That's ultimately going to cost the town in the long run on medical. It's pretty straightforward. You spend money now and you don't have to spend more in the future," Kochanowski said. "Plus we've pretty much upgraded most of our fleet but I still have two trucks that we will need to look at replacing in the future, and the truck heights are just too

high nowadays so we can't get the trucks we need because they can't fit in the building. That's reality, and something we can't change right now without this project."

Kochanowski said that the new facility would last around 60 years, probably longer with proper upkeep. The project has received support from almost every major board in Dudley with some not needing to vote on the project. The Finance Committee and Board of Selectmen gave the initiative universal approval.

"If you consider a family starting off in 1960, recently married, and what they would have required for housing versus a family in 2016 that's a good analysis as to this situation," said Ruda, "It was built in 1960 and has seen no substantial changes since then. It's time to make that upgrade to accommodate the needs of the town and the community."

The item will be Article 11 on the Fall Town Meeting warrant on Oct. 24, which will be held at Shepherd Hill Regional High

next four weeks. That's why the Dec. 5 date was chosen. It would give the new town administrator some time to look at these and decide whether these are good decisions that we're making.'

What started as a simple request erupted into a significant debate between Finance Committee members and other town officials, specifically committee members Michael Finamore and Joe Beresik, who seemed to continue their criticism of town budgeting and the presentation of numbers at Town Meeting that ensued in

Committee hasn't had the opportunity to question the acting town administrator/town accountant," Finamore said, referring to Acting Administrator Town Pam Leduc. "We haven't gotten all the proper answers as to why these raises are here.'

Finamore and Beresik both presented concerns about why union employees have received raises while non-union workers seem to have gone untouched in recent years, however Leduc responded to the criticisms noting that the Finance Committee did approve these articles for the Town Meeting, albeit without Finamore present in early October for

"I'm,

once again, extremely concerned about the comments that a member of the Finance Committee is making as a member of the committee when the Finance Committee on Oct. 6, when we had excessive discussions regarding this, voted to recommend approval of these articles. That body, ladies and gentlemen, voted to recommend approval of the articles. What you have — once again — are certain individuals who are stating their personal opinions with disregard for the democratic process, and that is a vote of the body.'

Finance Committee Chairman Earl Gabor responded to Leduc's

own statements about the committee and acknowledged that they did in fact recommend approval, but that doesn't mean they agreed with the process leading up to the Town Meeting.

"To get the articles handed to us pretty much as they're published here at one meeting at the end of September with no further information in hand, and I'm talking most of these articles like Article 9 and 10, which are big, usually a business spends a lot of time dwelling on it," Gabor said. "They impact not only the current fiscal year, but future fiscal years. The Finance Committee didn't get the three con-

tracts that were completed until the very end of August. That's not ample time to analyze and give recommendaproper tions. I requested in the future that the Finance Committee be brought in earlier in the process.'

Before the vote was taken to decide on whether or not to delay the articles or move forward with voting on them, Marc Becker, Webster's Chief Assessor, warned against holding off on a decision on the articles, saying that it would cost Webster in the long run in time and efficiency.

"It's funny how a person's opinions and ideas can absolutely cause chaos and confusion," Becker said, speaking of the discussion that dominated the Town Meeting. "To delay this

into December or event late November is lunacy. It puts myself, [Leduc], and the Town of Webster in a very bad spot. We can't [in good] conscience go forward and have this pushed off."

Despite nearly an hour and a half of debate and waiting, all the articles passed by majority votes, albeit with some recommended changes that received little debate and others that were denied by the public, including more attempts to postpone individual articles as they came to the table.

# Junior operators

I recently came across some interesting information regarding junior operators. These are classified as individuals under age 18. They have a high rate of traffic accidents. AAA Northeast has come out with some recent study information that should be helpful for these young operators

and their parents.

According to AAA, over the last five years, teen drivers were involved in nearly 14,000 fatal crashes. A survey of 142 driving instructors was conducted and it identified the top three mistakes teens make while learning to drive. They are speed (over limit or too fast for conditions), distraction (cell use, talking with passengers, looking at other objects in the vehicle), and poor visual scanning (not watching for risks or driving with "tunnel vision"). These issues are contributing factors in many crashes involving drivers of all ages. In fact according to the AAA stats, some 77 percent of drivers 35-55 admit to using cell phones (68 percent of teens admit to this) while 45-46 percent of all drivers up to age 55 admit to driving 15 mph over the speed limit on highways.

It was stated that we as parents must do a better job preparing our younger drivers. AAA recommends the following ideas to help improve teen driving safety: Have early and regular conversations with your children about the dangers associated with speeding and distracted driving. Take some time to practice with them on driving in varying conditions. These include not only weather but also city driving, highways, busy parking lots, etc. Teen drivers will face many difficult driving situations and it is better for them to first face some of these while accompanied by an experienced driver. There is no substitute for experience. The more you have the greater the likelihood you will react appropriately in a given situation. Another recommendation is to adopt and enforce a family vehicle use policy. This should outline the rules and expectations for teen drivers to follow. Finally, as difficult as it is can be, we must try to lead by example as adult drivers. Children have tendencies to mimic the behaviors of parents. We must all be aware of this and try our best to demonstrate good driving habits.

Fortunately, Massachusetts has several laws that directly address many of these areas of concern. Junior operators have stricter penalties for speeding (with possible license suspensions for violators), cell phone use (not allowed under 18), and traveling with passengers (limits during the first six months of driving). Fortunately, seatbelt use has been strongly promoted among young people. This hopefully encourages them to continue the regular use of belts while traveling. Violations for many offenses involving junior operators include fines, license suspensions, and driver re-education

Speeding, distractions, and tunnel vision are consistent contributing factors in crashes involving all drivers. The goal is to limit and minimize these as much as possible for everyone, in particular newer drivers. If we as parents and instructors promote and teach good behaviors from the beginning, we have the best chance of having safer drivers on the road. Better behaviors will limit a driver's chances of being involved in an accident and/ or suffering serious injuries.

### Guard against identity theft, and protect your finances

Department of Justice. What can you do to guard your identity and protect yourself from potential financial losses? Here are some ideas to consider:

Review your statements. Closely review the monthly statements from your checking and other financial accounts. If you find any unfamiliar charges, contact your bank or other financial services provider immediate-

Order your credit reports. The three credit reporting agencies - TransUnion, Equifax and Experian - are each required by law to provide you one free credit report a year. Make sure your name, address and other information are correct on your credit report, and if you find old or inaccurate information, have it removed.

Place a fraud alert. If you suspect you have become a victim of Identity theft, place a "fraud alert" on your credit reports by contacting any of the three credit reporting agencies. You can choose a short-term or long-term alert. And if you're an active member of the military, you can request a special, oneyear alert.

Feed your shredder. Shred all old bank and investment statements, applications for new credit cards and any other documents that contain personal information.

Destroy digital data. If you have a variety of financial accounts, you're not just creating a paper trail – you're also establishing a digital "footprint." So, when you sell or otherwise dispose of a computer system or hard drive, you may want to take steps to destroy personal data. You might think that simply deleting it would be sufficient, but tech-savvy identity thieves can "undelete" files or recover information from a formatted drive. However, products are available that allow you to completely wipe out data on hard drives.

Change passwords. It's a good idea to change your Internet passwords every so often - especially those passwords that provide access to financial

Leave your Social Security card home. Snagging someone's Social Security number is a real "catch" for identity thieves, so do everything you can to thwart them. And you can start by leaving your Social Security card safely at home - after all, there's probably never a good reason to bring it out, anyway. In fact, be wary of anyone, or any business, that asks for your Social Security number, either in person or online. Except for a few obvious exceptions, such as your tax preparer, most reputable businesses don't need to know anything about your Social Security information.

Watch for "phishers." If you've ever gotten an e-mail, supposedly from your bank, advising you that your account will be "frozen" unless you provide personal details about your account, it's a good bet that someone is "phishing" for this information – and they're using the "freezing" threat as bait. What's particularly alarming is that these "phishers" have gotten quite good at duplicating logos and using official-sounding language. However, a legitimate bank would never threaten you this way with an e-mail, so, if you get such a message, contact the bank's fraud department.

You can go a long way toward protecting yourself against identity theft by following these suggestions — so put them to work soon.

### Is the real estate market seasonal?

In the fall, I always think this is a good topic to discuss. I think most consumers believe the market is seasonal and there is some truth to that. I think it most important to look at the numbers though. We also want to concentrate on

our local market rather than nationally because real estate is a local business even though it can be affected by what is going on nationally and internationally, such as interest rate changes and any news that can positively affect consumer confidence and buyers ability to purchase a home.

If we look at the last 12 months then we see 8,080 homes sold in Worcester County according to the Multiple Listing Service Property Information Network, and during the months of December through February 1,545 homes sold, which encompasses just over 19 percent of the homes that sold in the last 12 months. In the previous year, the number was 20 percent. This data tells me that there is a dip in the winter, but the market just doesn't completely stop. So if you are thinking about selling your home and you are thinking about waiting until the spring because homes don't sell in the winter. I would suggest evaluating your goals to see if it makes more sense just to sell in the winter rather than wait.

The interesting thing is that the market that we have been in for the past few years has been one of shrinking inventory. If I actually go back to 12/01/2014, we had 2,861 homes for sale, on 5/01/2015 REALTOR'S REPORT

we had 2,677 homes for sale, 12/01/2015 we had 2,614 homes for sale and on 5/01/2016 we had 2,179 homes for sale. This shows a shrinking inventory and today we are up to 2,341 homes for sale in Worcester County as of today, and on

10/16/2015 we had 3,154 homes for sale. All this data shows that the inventory builds up and sells off in the fall and winter months and shrinks as we go through the winter with homes selling or being taken off the market. This is a great opportunity for a seller who wants to get their home sold now rather than wait until the spring market.

I would suggest if you are thinking about selling your home now or in the spring to start interviewing realtors and find out what they are saying about your local market in your town, neighborhood and price range. If we break down this data to that level, some towns and price ranges are hot and selling quickly while others are not.

This data covers all of Worcester County, and again, real estate is extremely local and you want to hire an agent who understands your local market and can interpret the market to make sure you are making the right decision for your goals.

Archery deer season opened this past Monday in Massachusetts and it has numerous archers spending a lot of time in their tree stand or ground blind, waiting for a big buck to present a good shot.

Archers are a special breed of hunter that take their hunting very serious-

ly. Many have also spent a lot of time scouting prior to deer season and get a bit upset with another archer if they set up their stand close to their spot. To avoid this problem, a hunter should look around to make sure that another tree stand or ground blind is not close by. There are a lot of woods out there, and there is no need to encroach on another hunter.

Archers also need to check with landowners prior to hunting their property. It can avoid a lot of problems during the deer-hunting season. Again this year, deer hunters will not be able to do any Sunday hunting in Massachusetts. It is way overdue but the politicians move very slowly in getting any changes made to our hunting regulations. As previously mentioned in last week's column. the crossbow bill is still the same, allowing only disabled hunters the opportunity to use them, although they have relaxed the regulations a bit. Not every archer is a Davie Crockett, and often

make poor shots that result in the loss of the animal. The use of a crossbow could have had different results if the hunter was allowed to use a crossbow. They are extremely accurate if they are used properlv

Goose hunting provided some great shooting last week. Setting up in a cornfield last week, I bumped into an old friend that I have known for years. Bob Bromley has been a sportsman all his life and also mentored his son, taking him hunting and fishing, showing him the proper way to enjoy the sport, and he is now working for an outfitter guiding fly fishing and waterfowl sportsmen. Locally, trout fishing anglers are catching many of the recently stocked trout from Wallum Lake in Douglas and Webster Lake. The newly stocked rainbow trout average 12 to 14 inches. Bottom fishing anglers are catching most of the fish on power baits. Hopefully some will be left for ice fishing anglers this winter.

Saltwater fishing for tautog has anglers in Rhode Island waters catching limits of legal size fish. It really picked up last week, according to the Snug Harbor fishing report. Crabs are the number one bait at this time of year. Using a pair of scissors to cut the crabs in half, exposing the meat of the crab, I carefully place the half crab on a 3-0 circle hook and lower it to the bottom. It is not long before a bite is realized. Carefully raising the tip of the rod, a sudden surge in the line has the rod tip bending into the water. When using circle hooks you never set the hook. The hook slowly turns and the fish hook themselves. No more jerking the rod with few hook ups. Anglers using circle hooks catch far more fish than the conventional hooks. Love them or hate them, I prefer circle hooks for much of my bottom fishing. Give them a try.

Sea bass continue to provide fast action on the Rhode Island coast and at the Block. Striper fishing was slow at the Block during the first part of last week but improved substantially during the second half of the week.

Local duck hunters harvested numerous ducks during the opening season last week with a good number of mallards and wood ducks providing some fast shooting. The male wood duck is a magnificent bird that provides great eating and numerous feathers for the fly tying angler.

Take a kid fishing and keep them rods bending!

### Tips to carve out a Halloween display

No traditional New England harvest display would be complete without a parade of fat pumpkins and a sprinkling of assorted gourds.

The simple pumpkin, rich in both nutrition and heritage, has long served as an object of intrigue. In the 17th century fairy tale, Cinderella's coach magically appeared from a large, stout pumpkin; and even today, generations of Native Americans hail the pumpkin's healing seeds as a medicinal sedative. Add in the mystique of the annual Halloween Jack-O-Lantern, and its no wonder both pumpkins and gourds remain an autumn wonder, touted for both their culinary and decorative virtues. Here are some tips to "carve out" a fun fall display!

kins with a sturdy stem, as this is the sign of a healthy pumpkin. Never lift a pumpkin by its stem, not only do you risk it breaking off, a stemless pump-

For carving, choose pumpkin ages faster.

If you are tracing a design to carve from a pumpkin or gourd, use a chopstick or nut spear to press into the gourd for a foolproof guideline.

To cut out a top lid that won't fall inside the pumpkin, carve a hexagon shape to keep it sitting pretty throughout the night.

Better yet, cut off the bottom of the pumpkin instead of the top. Place the carved pumpkin over a candle safely set on a plate, or for optimum safety, simply use a flashlight.

If you plan to place a pillar candle inside your Jack-Lantern, first cut a hole in the bottom of the pumpkin the same size as your candle to stabilize it.

For a festive twist on traditional Jack-O-Lantern lights or candles, stuff a string of small white Christmas lights inside the carved pumpkin. Make a hole out the back to feed plug through.

Need a creativity boost? Log onto these websites for pumpkin and gourd designs you can download for free: www. pumpkinmasters.com or www. spookmaster.com.

Carving a gourd? Here's a hint to halt the hassle. Simply place a towel inside a large bowl to hold the gourd steady. Place the gourd in the padded bowl to keep it from moving while you trace or cut.

Did you know? The Japanese considered the gourd a lucky token and believed a set of six gourds had the power to improve health and spiritual power. Plus they believed the set of gourds could produce six fortunes!

Want your Jack-O-Lantern or gourd sculpture to last longer? A spray of Lysol or other disinfectant will prolong life of pumpkins and gourds.

For long term storage, put a thin amount of petroleum jelly on the exposed, sawed edges. This prevents water from getting out. If water gets out, your pumpkin will shrivel.

Stretch the longevity of a Jack-O-Lantern by giving it a bath. Let the pumpkin float for a few hours, or even overnight, allowing the insides fill with water. Put a little bleach in the water if you wish to prevent mold. The pumpkin absorbs the water and become very firm. Anytime your pumpkin

shrivels, soak it in a bath of cold water for one to eight hours to rejuvenate it. \*\*

Another way to extend a lighted Jack-O-Lantern's life is to poke a vent hole or two in the top of the pumpkin to vent the heat and slow the rotting process.

FYI: Jack-O-Lantern Lore Legend has it the Jack-O-Lantern evolved from an Irish tale involving a drunkard named Jack. According to the longtime yarn, Jack was a trickster who playfully deceived family members. His fate was sealed the day he attempted to trick the devil into climbing an apple tree. Once Jack convinced the devil to climb the tree, he placed crosses around the tree truck, trapping the devil. With the devil cornered, Jack refused let him down until he promised not to take Jack's soul when he died. The story goes that many years later when Jack died, he couldn't get into heaven, vet he was turned out of hell too, because of the devil's long ago promise. Jack found himself with nowhere to go. He asked the devil how to leave the gates of hell as there was no light to guide him. According to the tale, the devil threw him an ember from the flames of hell to help him light his way. Jack put the burning ember inside a

hollowed out pumpkin. From that day on, it is said that Jack wandered the earth without a resting place, lighting his way with his lantern, thus the leg-end of the "Jack-O-Lantern," was born.

### Seeing God's beauty all around us

At the Metro Station in Washington, D.C., on a cold January morning in 2007, a man with a violin played six Bach pieces for about 45 minutes.

During that time, almost 1,100 people went through the station, most on their way to work. After about 3 minutes, a middle-aged man noticed that there was a musician playing. He slowed his pace and stopped for a few seconds, and then hurried on to meet his schedule.

At 4 minutes, the violinist received his first dollar. A woman threw money in the hat and, without stopping, continued to walk. A minute later, a young man leaned against the wall to listen to him, then looked at his watch and started to walk away. He was late for work.

The one who paid the most attention was a 3-year old boy, but his mother tugged him along hurriedly. The kid stopped to look at the violinist again, but the mother pushed hard and the child continued to walk, turning his head the whole time. This action was repeated by several other children, but every parent — without exception forced their children to move on quick-

During the 45 minutes, only six people stopped and listened for a short while. A mere 27 out of 1,097 passing travelers gave a total of \$37.17. When he finished playing and silence took over, no one noticed and no one applauded. There was no recognition at all.

No one realized that the violinist was Joshua Bell, one of the greatest musicians in the world, playing one of the most intricate pieces ever written by Bach, with a violin worth \$3.5 million dollars. Two days earlier, Joshua Bell played before a sold-out theater in Boston where people paid an average of \$100 to listen to him play the same

This true story was organized by a Washington Post writer Gene Weingarten, who won a Pulitzer Prize for his article describing this social

experience on perception, taste and people's priorities. At an inappropriate time and in a commonplace environment, would people recognize beauty? And if so, would they stop to appreciate

Weingarten noted, "Each passerby had a quick choice to make, one familiar to commuters in any urban area where the occasional street performer is part of the cityscape - Do we stop and listen, or do we hurry past with a blend of guilt and irritation, aware of our cupidity but annoyed by the unbidden demand on our time and wallet? Do we throw in a buck, just to be polite? Does our decision change if the musician is really bad or really good? Do we have time for beauty? And shouldn't we make the time?

Think about this experiment for a moment – a world class musician playing a magnificent piece of music, yet so few people notice, and even fewer take the time to enjoy. If less than 3

percent of the commuters had time to simply pause at such beauty, how many other things are they, and we missing as we rush through life?

Each and every day, God speaks to us through beauty — whether through nature or music or writing or some other experience — as well as through His most beautiful creation, our fellow human beings.

God is present everywhere, in everyone, trying to communicate with us. The question should never be, "Where is God?" Instead, we need to ask ourselves, "Where are we? Do we have the eyes to see Him? Do we have the ears to hear His soft, quiet voice? Can we perceive His Spirit active and present all

around us and in our lives? When I was a young seminarian, I remember a saintly Bishop Gerasimos who was retired and didn't teach any classes. I learned more from this holy man than from most of my professors, however, because of his saintly, peaceful, and joy-filled presence. One thing that remains etched in my mind is the way he would walk around campus and enjoy the beauty all around. He would tenderly stop and smell the roses in front of his apartment. He would admire any squirrel or animal crossing his path, and seemingly speak to the birds. He was in communion with nature, as well as at peace with all

people, because He understood God's presence everywhere and in everyone.

When Jesus preached Good News to the crowds, He often concluded by saying, "Those who have ears to hear, let them hear." Thousands of people listened to Christ, but only a few perceived what He truly said, and even fewer responded positively to Him. When we don't feel God's presence in our lives, it's not that He is absent. He is present, but we may be too busy to even notice. We may be too occupied with our own superficial or inconsequential affairs, or even with what we perceive as significant and important. We may think "I don't have time to stop for this subway musician?" or "What do I have to learn from this homeless person?" We forget that God is present, possibly speaking through this person, or talking to us through the beauty of this unexpected

When we rush throughout the day, with distractions crying out for our attention, going 24/7, it is hard to hear God's voice. Yet if we set aside time, consciously open our eyes and hearts, and seek after God, or even wait for God, the wonder is that we will not only hear Him, but we will actually meet Him. The more we allow God's Spirit to dwell within us, the more we begin to see Him everywhere and in everything.

Remember Joshua Bell and his Metro music concert. God's beauty is all around us, and He is trying to speak to our hearts. Are we listening?

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
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### New wildlife feeding regulations approved

these animals become dependent on human-provided food.

"I have a photograph of my home that dates back to 2013 with this problem with seagulls. I got fed up with it. They come in, they mess up my boat, my boat covers and my docks and I have to be out there almost daily clearing their waste off of the docks," Yacino said. "If anyone thinks this is a frivolous bylaw, I challenge them to come to my house sometime. It's something that has to be done."

In fact, some did see the law as a bit vague, or even too restrictive, with a few citizens speaking against it, not because they didn't want such a law, but because they felt there was little wiggle room for citizens to go about their own business without penalties. While the bylaw was designed with waterfowl in mind, it does

limit intentional feeding of animals such as raccoons or foxes and other such animals that may be common to a residential area. Some of the citizen concerns were addressed simply by noting the exceptions provided for the bylaw. The regulations note that the bylaw does not impact those engaging in lawful agricultural pursuits, those using bird feeders unless the feeder itself creates and unforeseen nuisance, those exercising baiting and luring of wildlife within state regulations, trap-and-neuter programs for animals such as cats, or situations in which wild animals are found to have been feeding on pet food specifically designated or an outdoor pet. Those permitted to own an animal that otherwise could be considered a form of local wildlife are also exempt.

Dan Clark, director of Natural Resources for the Massachusetts Department of Conservation, was on hand to speak in favor of the new regulation, and noted that Webster is not the only town with such a problem. In fact, Clark noted that his organization has done quite a bit of research on the matter, and with his personnel working hard to preserve the quality of natural drinking water the issue of waterfowl specifically is right up his

"One of the biggest threats to water quality is basically the presence of wildlife, in particular the presence of gulls, geese and ducks. We thought about this problem a lot and have done a lot of research on this issue. What we've been able to identify through that research is, looking at the ecology of these gulls, is that during the winter time when natural food sources are almost non-existent these gulls rely almost exclusively on human derived food and in many cases this food takes the form of handout," Clark said. "We've spent a lot of time identifying some of these areas, doing some education and outreach, and we've discovered that there are a surprising number of people who have sort of dedicated themselves to feeding these gulls."

Clark said feeding, especially daily intentional feeding, creates a situation where gulls and other animals become dependent on the food and a vicious cycle begins.

"Gulls will utilize a variety of areas in central Massachusetts. There general biology is they spend the day out on the landscape looking for food and at the end of the day or night they will congregate on water to spend the night," said Clark. "Wachusett Reservoir is one of their primary routes. Another primary route is Webster Lake. From a water quality perspective this has caused potential concern. They sit on the reservoir all night they defecate and there's a higher potential for contamination in the water supply from a drinking and a recreation standpoint."

While officials noted that

it would be near impossible to stop this action altogether and many may still get away with feeding wildlife, this law gives the town a way to enforce punishment on those contributing to the problem. Becker compared it to speed limits, noting that people break them every day, but for those who are caught the law allows to punishment to be handed down and enforced.

"The point here is to create a penalty so that when people are caught not just with a feeding issue but creating a public nuisance issue then they can be dealt with," Becker said.

According to the bylaw the Webster Animal Control Officer will be charged with enforcement and handing out any punishment as a result of breaking the new bylaw.

### Police: 'Clowning' around will have consequences

said. A few parents reported that their children remained deeply frightened and upset long after the incident.

It was later revealed that the suspect is the parent of one of the students aboard the bus. Even though such incidents may seem to some like harmless pranks, police are hoping residents will think twice before acting in ways that scare people.

"We are hopeful that others will learn from this incident and not repeat these types of behaviors," read a statement issued by the Auburn Police Department. "We sincerely appreciate the assistance of those who contacted us with information that led to this individual being identified."

Reports of threatening clowns have surfaced throughout the country, with the majority of the incidents concentrated in the Carolinas. From clowns accosting pedestrians and drivers, to people in clown outfits posting threatening messages on social media pages, police have received thousands of reports nationwide. Many people are blaming it on a social media firestorm, while others ascribe more sinister reasons to the excessive clown appearanc-

Regardless of the cause, police have had enough. As Halloween approaches, law enforcement officials are warning residents that incidents which frighten the public will not be viewed as pranks

'Whenever you're putting people in for potential issues. We are taking any

fear – even if you think it's just a prank the police are going to respond," said Uxbridge Police Chief Jeffrey Lourie.

The Uxbridge PD's school resource officer recently spoke to students about the clown epidemic. Many of the national incidents have involved teenagers dressing as clowns, and reaching out to students has been an effective tool for police. Lourie said the program was well-received by students and their par-

Meanwhile, police departments across the country are cracking down on social media threats in the wake of multiple schools being threatened nationwide as part of the clown craze. Several of the schools were forced to shut down as investigations ensued.

'We continue to monitor social media

and all complaints very seriously, and we are asking people to use common sense this Halloween season," said Leicester Police Chief James Hurley.

Police throughout the area will be stepping up patrols this Halloween. They ask residents to enjoy themselves responsibly and recommend keeping the clown garb in the closet - at least for this year.

'Clown costumes may not be the best choice given everything that has happened. We're encouraging people to stay away from that based on what's going on," Hurley added.

resents the town on the Central Massachusetts Regional Planning Commission, explained work to Charlton Street has been a long time coming and was a priority project for that commission.

Charlton Street has had a tremendous amount of problems with drainage and things like that. So we put in a proposal to the state to have Charlton Street completely renovated," Lamarche told a crowded Town Meeting at Oxford High School. "We're going to put in new sewer drainage so that it's much more efficient and drains properly. This is being done through the state, but in order to get the state to come in, we have to approve them to allow us to work on this road."

The plan received near unanimous approval by those in attendance, with only a handful naysayers voting against the question. While the plans received mostly positive responses from residents, one of the main questions that was brought to the table was by Conlin Road resident John Eul, who felt that improvements to benefit the safety of local school children should be included in the plan.

"I'd like to see new sidewalks put in, and I see that's being proposed, but what I don't see is a bus turnoff or a shed for a drop off and pickup point," Eul said. "That's what I'd like to see, where someone could mind that station and the bus, then enter Charlton Street after picking up the children, instead of seeing the bus stop at every driveway with traffic backing up every morning and every night."

This concern sparked a response from Oxford School Committee Chairman Samir Bitar, who said that while student safety is surely a priority, there are no plans as of right now to adjust how students are picked up or dropped off on that roadway, but the possibility is there if the improvements allow for positive change on that road.

"The School Committee has policies in place to ensure the safety of our children and as such we have certain roads that are deemed unsafe for children to walk on. Charlton Street and Sutton Avenue are two examples of such roads. I don't see, in the current road structure, the committee changing that policy," Bitar said. "I know it's perhaps annoying for some people to be stuck behind those busses and have to stop several times but that's done with the children's safety in mind. I have not seen the Charlton Street improvement plan, but if there are sidewalks in place so that children don't have to cross those streets that might be something we take into consideration.'

The project has a \$5.5 million price tag, the entirety of which will be paid for through state and federal funds. Officials said so far only the design has been completed, an initiative paid for through Chapter 90 funding previously awarded to the town.

# What Millennials Need To Know About Healthful Eating



The millennial generation is health conscious but many are not getting all the nutrients they need.

The number of millennials in America—over 83 million—surpassed that of baby boomers for the first time last year. If you or someone you care about is a millennial—born in the 1980s or '90s—here's some food for thought.



### Tips For Getting Your Outdoor Power Equipment Ready For Winter

Fall is here, and as cold weather creeps in, it's time to put away your spring and summer outdoor power equipment, such as lawn mowers, leaf blowers, chain saws and trimmers, and get out what you will need for winter, such as snow throwers, generators and other small-engine equipment.

"Doing good maintenance in the fall means that your equipment will be in good shape when spring arrives and you want to tackle landscaping projects again," said Kris Kiser, president and CEO of OPEI. "Now is also the time to do snow thrower and generator maintenance and review safe handling procedures so you are ready when the snow flies."


First, review your owner's manual for your equipment. Re-familiarize yourself with how to handle your equipment safely and any maintenance needs. If you lost your manual, you can usually find it

Service all your equipment. Before storing equipment, clean and service it yourself or take it to a small-engine repair shop. For instance, drain and change engine oil and dispose of old oil safely. Service the air filter and perform other maintenance activities as directed by your service manual. Check all winter equipment and see what maintenance and repairs

are required, as well. tery. If your equipment has a battery, remove and fully charge it before storing or to ready your winter equipment for a sudden, unexpected weather event.

Handle fuel properly. Unused gas left in gas tanks over the winter can go stale. It can even damage your equipment. For equipment you'll store over the winter, add fuel stabilizer to the gas tank, then run the equipment to distribute it. Turn the engine off, allow the machine to cool, then restart and run until the gas tank is empty. For winter equipment, be sure you know the appropriate fuel for your equipment. Most outdoor power equipment, for instance, was designed, built and warranted to run on 10 percent or less ethanol fuel.

ter weather. Store your spring and summer equipment in a clean and dry place such as a garage, barn or shed. Winter should also be away from the weather elements but available for use when needed. Always keep your outdoor power  $reac\bar{h} \ of \ children.$

during the winter. Make space in your garage or basement before the weather changes so you have room to store larger yard items, such as patio furniture, umbrellas and

If you are getting out winter equipment, such as a generator or snow thrower, review safe handling procedures. Familiarize yourself with your equipment, making sure you know how to turn the machine on and off and how to use the equipment safely.

Find and prepare to fill your gas can. Buy the type of fuel recommended by your equipment manufacturer no more than 30 days before you will use it. Remember, use fuel with no more than 10 percent ethanol in outdoor power equipment. Also, fuel goes stale and will need to be replaced if you

have not used it within a month. And remember to use a fuel stabilizer if recommended by your manufacturer.

Installing ductwork is expensive and requires cutting holes in walls, floors and ceilings, or decreasing closet space. Ductless systems require only a twoor three-inch hole just outside the wall and are also whisper quiet.

In addition, everyone can adjust each room to the temperature he or she wants-year-roundvirtually eliminating the "thermostat wars," with family members fighting for their personal climate preferences.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, some 70,000 children under age 5 are injured every year by common household products and toys—but yours don't have to be among them.

Here are seven ways to keep infants and toddlers safer:

- 1. Cook safely. Never leave food unattended on the stove. Turn pot handles so curious toddlers can't reach them.
- 2. Set your water heater to  $120^\circ$  F or lower. Infants and small children may not be able to get away from water that's too hot.
- 3. Use home safety devices, such as guards on windows above ground level, stair gates and guardrails.
- 4. Keep medicines, cleaning products and other toxic substances where children can't see or reach them.
- 5. Make sure children are properly buckled up. With a 90 percent misuse rate for installing car seats and boosters, parents should visit a car seat inspection station in their area to learn how to properly install and use them.
- 6. Always check the age label on toys. Small parts—whether from toys, pieces of food such as hot dogs or grapes, or anything else—can become a choking risk for children who have small throats and tend to put things in their mouths.
- 7. Check window coverings for exposed or dangling cords, which can pose a strangulation hazard to infants and young children.

Parents with young children should replace their corded window coverings with the many cordless products.

For their products to be eligible for certification as safe for homes with

coverings or those with inaccessible cords. Replace window blinds, corded shades and draperies with those that are cordless or have inaccessible cords. Look for the Best for Kids label.

• Move all cribs, beds, furniture and toys away from windows and window cords of any kind, preferably to another wall.

When window cords are pres-

ent, keep them out of sight and reach by shortening or tying them up and away.






