Dudley EDC reacts to visit from State Auditor

DUDLEY – Following a meeting with Massachusetts State Auditor Suzanne Bump the Dudley Economic Development Committee is hoping that brighter days are ahead when it comes to issues like education spending.

Officials from throughout Dudley and Charlton came together on April 5 to discuss economics and financing issues with state auditor Suzanne Bump on April 5 and one thing the Dudley EDC learned is that the auditor's office wants to push for changes, especially

when it comes to education financing, but convincing state leaders on Beacon Hill may be the most difficult part of the process.

EDC Chairman John Briare gave his reaction to Auditor Bump's visit during the committee's April 17 meeting and said there were many issues brought up, particularly in regards to the education cost sharing in the commonwealth, and that towns like Dudley and Charlton are not getting what they have been promised in terms of financial commitments on the state level.

"It's estimated that the state

spends in total if you look at all the cities and towns seven billion dollars a year on education for the high school level for the commonwealth. The big issue is the transportation portion that the state has been falling short in reimbursing school districts," Briare said. "It would come out to close to a million dollars I believe it was that the Dudley-Charlton School District would get back if the state just met their obligations."

Briare said the state auditor presented some interesting revelations and plans to the town leaders from Charlton

and Dudley including the fact that the dual-town school district has remained relatively stable compared to other school district's in the state and that contrary to beliefs the two towns are near equal in their financial commitment to the district. "The State Auditors Department said it's actually probably the most well balanced out of any school district in the commonwealth. That was kind of a surprise," Briare said, also noting both communities are losing money because the state has failed to return promised monies to the district.

"The reimbursement loss that Dudley is short, because the state doesn't fulfill its part of the deal, is actually \$657,386. There's \$3,600 for homeless student transportation reimbursement loss and then charter schools there's a loss there too that the state should be obligated to pay. Legislatively they're supposed to be paying, but they don't."

Briare said the State Auditor's office is going to be pushing for the Senate to push through full funding of regional transportation reimbursements and to permit region-

DUDLEY — Valentine's Day 2018 began like every other day Paul Brower has spent on the recruiting trail in the last several years, as the Nichols College men's and women's tennis coach and its dean of admissions. By early afternoon, however, it was a day unlike any other in his life, and one he prays never repeats itself.

After visiting four Florida high schools: Fort Lauderdale High School, Coral Springs Charter School, Coral Springs High School and North Broward Preparatory School, Brower and St. Clair Ryan, the Nichols running backs coach, arrived at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland to discuss the possibility of attending Nichols with four senior members of the Eagles' football team.

Stoneman Douglas was familiar territory for Brower; he had made recruiting visits there many times and considered head coach Willis May and assistant coach Aaron Feis friends.

"We had been talking to the kids for about 10 minutes when we heard a fire alarm go off, but it only went off for about 10 seconds, which is very unusual," said the 40-year-old Brower. "Usually when you hear a fire alarm it usually goes off for about 10 minutes. It was one of those moments where you look around at each other and go, 'OK'."

Moments later Brower, Ryan, May and the four student-athletes who were meeting

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Arming educators not a good scenario here

Ever since the deadly shooting in Newtown, CT where an assailant targeted the students of Sandy Hook Elementary School, discussions about how to increase security in schools nationwide have become commonplace in American society.

The recent deadly attack on students of Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, FL have sparked these debates once again, with the call for arming teachers now becoming a major part of the conversation. Here, school and police officials are no strangers to the opinion that teachers should be armed to fend off any attackers that might threaten the student body, but they don't necessarily see eye to eye with those who support the concept.

In late March the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education unanimously opposed arming classroom teacher in the commonwealth, and while the vote has no regulatory power it serves as a statement all the same. On the local level the Dudley-Charlton

Superintendent of Schools and the Dudley Police Chief seems to agree with the DESE's vote.

Dudley Police Chief Steve Wojnar was actually a speaker at the meeting on March 27, where the DESE cast their vote of opposition. As the president of the Massachusetts Chiefs of Police Association, he represented police chiefs throughout the commonwealth at the lecture, and said in an interview that he feels arming teachers as a policy is not the right course of action.

"You've got a wide array of diverse opinions on this and even among the police chiefs there are differing opinions. The main thing when you look at these issues is that you need anyone who is going to be carrying a firearm in these types of settings should be well trained and prepared individuals. Throwing these things out blankly and just allowing school teachers to bring weapons into class doesn't sound like an overall wise plan," Chief Wojnar said.

"Why are we members of the land trust?" President Lisa Mosczyński asked an audience of over 50 people. "Why do we work with individuals, municipalities and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to preserve and protect our fields, forests and open spaces? Because we love where we live! And we want to keep component of our quality of life strong and vibrant for all."

"In keeping with that," she explained, "we started an annual tradition called the Community Spirit award to recognize one or two special people who go the extra mile to help us – directly or indirectly – achieve our goal."

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With low inventory should I build a new home?

Ever since the most recent housing crash the building of new homes has been minimal. It has grown over the past few years however. According to the National Association of Home Builders it was 925,000 in 2013 and up to over 1.2 Million in 2017 for the entire U.S. This is an almost 30 percent increase over those 5 years but yet has not kept up with demand. The median homes prices also rose from \$288, 500 in 2014 to \$321,100 in 2017 and is continuing to rise in 2018 with the continued rise in building costs. Inventory for new and existing homes is still extremely low which is causing a growth in new construction.

The best thing about building a home is that you get to choose the finishes, the style of home, where it sits on the lot. You truly get to make this home your own by adding all the features you want. The downside to buying a new home is that you will need to wait for it to be completed. Most new builds you will see taking 6-9 months in this area to complete so you have a narrow window to start construction so you can be in the home before school starts or you start a new job. You also

do not have much control over the timing so this can be a challenge if you have a home to sell as well. It is usually best to either build the new home and then sell your home if you can cover both mortgages or sell your home and then move into temporary housing until your home is complete. The other thing to consider is that the cost of building is significantly higher than the cost to purchase an existing home so you probably want to increase your

budget when looking at new homes. Lastly, if you have very specific taste or want lots of upgrades you may need to come out of pocket during the build to pay for the many upgrades and the cost of the home may also go much higher and possibly the bank will not appraise it and you may need to change the plans or the features of the home so you can afford it. I suggest when you are thinking about moving to sit down with a local Realtor so they can consult with you on what direction makes the most sense based on your needs in a home to either buy new or to purchase an existing home.

Parents continue to voice concerns about MCAS


Local parents of middle school students in Charlton are hoping to see a change in policy after they say their children were improperly punished for deciding not to take the MCAS tests. Charlton Middle School Parents Lisa Tinsley and Julie Richard attended a meeting of the Dudley-Charlton Regional School Committee on April 10 where they made a statement, calling out Charlton Middle School Principal Dean Packard asking him to turn around and face the wall while they had their discussion with the school committee during citizens forum. It was a move that received backlash from the school committee member as aggressive and out of line and the discussion that followed criticizing the principal's treatment of several students was quickly ended due to the school committee's practice of not discussing

personnel matters in open forum without proper process. Often such issues are discussed in executive session or as a proper line item on the agenda for discussion as part of proper protocol. Before the discussion ended Lisa Tinsley, who has been a public spokesperson against the MCAS tests, said that she has had several issues with Principal Packard over the last few years but this latest incident saw students punished in a similar manner to which she addressed Packard on April 10. "This is what happened to our children who opted out of MCAS last week. Our children were made to face walls and sit for an hour to do nothing at Mr. Packard's direction to his teachers. It was an abuse of his powers and it was abusive and humiliating to our children," Tinsley said. In an interview Tinsley said she and other parents were informed of what happened directly from their children.

The students were allegedly prevented from reading for an hour and asked to have their chairs turned facing the wall after deciding not to take the MCAS tests. The state allows for silent reading after fifteen minutes and according to Tinsley several letters were sent to school officials asking for fairer treatment of students who refuse

to take the MCAS tests. They were informed no consequences would be faced by students if they refused the test, but the alleged actions by Packard and his staff would prove otherwise. "We thought this was punishment and we wanted to come to the school committee and talk about a proposal, some kind of bylaw, that would be in place so that other people who chose to opt out of MCAS in the future would know what's to be expected," Tinsley said. She added that she has been in touch with Superintendent Gregg Desto outside of the school committee meeting and that Desto has been "nice" during those exchanges. She did say she had written a formal complaint but had yet to hear back from the Superintendent. Desto confirmed in an interview he had received correspondence from Tinsley and was looking into the situation however due to limitations in discussing personnel matters he could offer little information. What he did offer were a few comments about the perception of Principal Packard's actions in light of the accusations of excessive punishment. He said he understands there are parents who disagree with MCAS testing, but he also doesn't believe that there was any harm meant by the actions of those in the Charlton Middle School. The goal for the future is to make sure both parties are respected. "This whole situation by its very nature is unusual. Basically, the school has just tried to balance the wishes of a family with the responsibility to follow very specific state testing protocols. That has not been an easy thing to do,

and we have relied on input from the state as much as possible. At no time has the school attempted to single out or embarrass any child. We disagree with parents a lot. They disagree with us a lot. But we always try to separate that and to treat all the students respectfully no matter what. I have known Mr. Packard and many on his staff for nearly 20 years, and I have seen too many times to count how much they care about their students," Desto said in a statement. "I believe that everyone involved has the best intentions here deep down and that the challenges we've experienced this year will lead to a smoother process in the future. I can tell you this, though: we will not engage in any kind of disrespectful dialogue or anything of that nature. Our focus will be on how to ensure a strong finish to this school year for every kid in the school and on setting a good example while we do it." Tinsley said she hopes one of the positive changes on the horizon is the new policy and the she and other parents would like to see a concrete plan in place that would prevent students from being singled out for refusing the take the test. "I would at least like to see that there's something in place that states when children come in and they're not testing that they will not be forced to open the Chromebooks and they do need to sit for the fifteen minutes. Then after the fifteen minutes they can read silently," said Tinsley. ing behaviors and breeding hormones in songbirds. She is an ornithological expert on the area of Blackstone River Valley and works with students and volunteers to band migratory birds moving through our area.

In addition, Dr. Van Roo shares her expertise at both the local and state levels by volunteering her time as a member of the Douglas Conservation Commission and in 2005 she was appointed by the Governor to the Fisheries & Wildlife Board which oversees the Massachusetts Division of Fish and Wildlife where she continues to serve today.

Scammers never take a break

Tax season has come to a close, however, a variety of "scams" continue. Unsuspecting people may become a victim of a larceny or identity theft in an IRS scam. People in our area have been contacted. With

this in mind, the IRS tries to provide warnings to citizens. I wanted to remind the readers of this column of some precautions to take.

According to the Internal Revenue Service, victims have been called, or notified electronically, and told they owe money to the IRS. Generally, victims are informed they must pay promptly, for example through a pre-loaded debit card or wire transfer. If the victim refuses to cooperate, they are then threatened with arrest, deportation or suspension of a business or driver's license. In many cases, the caller becomes hostile and insulting. These scams have occurred in nearly every state in the country. The IRS warns of the following:

Scammers may use fake names and IRS badge numbers. They generally use common names and surnames to identify themselves. Scammers may be able to recite the last four digits of a victim's Social Security number. They can spoof the IRS toll-free number on caller ID to make it appear that it's the IRS calling. Scammers sometimes send bogus IRS emails to some victims to support their calls. Victims hear background noise of other calls being conducted to mimic a call site. After threatening victims with jail time or driver's license revocation, scammers hang up and others soon call back pretending to be from the local police or DMV, and the caller ID supports their claim.

The IRS provides the following recommendations: If you know you owe taxes or you think you might owe taxes, call the IRS at 1.800.829.1040. The IRS employees at that line can help you with a payment issue – if one really exists. If you know you don't owe taxes or have no reason to think that you owe any taxes (for example, you've never received a bill or the caller made some bogus threats as described above), then call and report the incident to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration at 1.800.366.4484. If you've been targeted by this scam, you should also contact the Federal Trade Commission and use their "FTC Complaint Assistant" at FTC.gov. Please add "IRS Telephone Scam" to the comments of your complaint. More information on this subject can also be found at IRS.Gov.

The IRS reminds everyone they do not initiate contact with taxpayers by email, text messages or social media channels to request personal or financial information. Additionally, the IRS does not threaten taxpayers with lawsuits, imprisonment or other enforcement actions. Being able to recognize these tell-tale signs of a tax scam could save you from becoming a victim. You can always contact your bank, tax professional, the police, or other organizations before you conduct any transactions. If everything is legitimate, there should be time to research any request or demand. Some simple steps can allow you to make informed decisions and avoid becoming a victim.

Our one true thing

Democracy is crazy system of government. It depends entirely on the honesty of its people to direct themselves. It expects those people to trust. To put their trust into other people to invest their time into the complexities of day to day government on their behalf.

It expects the lowly 'us' to put certain expectations on those we entrust with this duty. We want them to be honest, that's a given.

 We want them to NOT be biased or racist or sexist or any of a zillion other isms or ists that exist to render them incapable of clear thought.

We want them to work always on our behalf, without thought of their own possible gain.

We want them to listen to our tales of woe, even if they can't fix the problems; but we certainly would like to have the problems fixed too.

Hardest of all, no matter where we fall on the left-right spectrum, every single one of us wants our person to be on our "side." To represent our views, whatever they may be. And if someone is elected that does not suit our own view of the world, we find ourselves working harder than ever to oust that person and get one of our own stripe in.

Whether the person seated is actually doing a good job...or not.

How we decide what that 'good job' should look is so subjective. If we like welfare and do-gooder programs than we sure do want those front and center.

But if we think there is way too much given away already and not enough accountability for the way that money is spent, then that's a different expectation.

Should there be a single way to pay for health care? Should we abolish private insurance? Is that even feasible with the size of the health insurance giant that exists in our country? That alone could give elected officials headaches forever.

Biggest problem with that dismantling is several fold, and really had not much to do with quality of health care issues at all. It has to do with unemployment (where will all those private insurance companies, now defunct, find work for their myriad staff? A government run program can certainly absorb some, but not all.) We would be creating our own depressed economy with that many people out of work all at once.

Then, there would just be the logistics nightmare of reinventing the wheels of industry on this one. You think wading through paperwork for private insurance is a nightmare? Imagine what it will be if the government runs it. They did, after all, create the IRS. How was doing your taxes this year?

And finally, there's the biggest hurdle of all, the money, money, money. When you pay insurance premiums to a private insurance company; and beyond their costs of doing business and paying the doctors etc., there is actually of course a profit margin. Guess where it is? The stock exchange. Of course it is. So if we dismantle the private industry, what happens to their invested money? Think about it. Think depression. Think millions subtracted from stock and bond availability. The dirty little secret that keeps the insurance companies in business isn't even related to doctors and hospitals, it's related to Wall Street.

So when we take about our power to elect and who we want to put into place, we have a lot to think about in the next few years. We have those who appreciate hardly the status quo and the profit sharing and the ways things have always been.

Business people doing government and government doing business are two different things.

When they meet, it becomes muddy. And it can only get worse as we struggle with insurance, banking and now international trade and tariffs that can only impact how we run our world, from Wall Street to Main Street, in ways we cannot even fathom.

Even on the local level, think about your vote with caution, and strap in tight. It truly is going to be that proverbial bumpy ride.

Take steps to control your investment taxes

Tax Season is finally over. Of course, how much you pay in taxes depends on a variety of factors, many of which you can't control. But you might give some thought to how you can manage your investment-related taxes.

Here are some suggestions to consider:

Contribute to your employer's retirement plan. If your employer offers a 401(k) or similar plan, such as a 403(b) or 457(b), contribute as much as you can afford. The more pre-tax dollars you put in to your retirement plan, the lower your taxable income. Your employer also may offer a Roth 401(k) option, under which you invest after-tax dollars, so your annual income won't be lowered and your withdrawals will be tax-free.

Contribute to an IRA. Even if you have a 401(k) or similar plan, you may still be eligible to contribute to an IRA. With a traditional IRA, your contributions may be fully or partially deductible, depending on your income level; with a Roth IRA, contributions are not deductible, but your earnings can grow tax-free, provided you've had your account at least five years and you don't start taking withdrawals until you're 59½.

Follow a "buy-and-hold" strategy. You can't control the price movements of your investments, but if you do achieve gains, you can decide when to take them – and this timing can make a substantial difference in your tax situation. If you sell investments that you've owned for one year or less and their value has increased, you may need to pay capital gains taxes at your personal income tax rate, which, in 2018, could be as high as 37 percent. But if you hold investments for more than one year before selling them, you'd be assessed

the long-term capital gains rate, which is 0, 15 or 20 percent, or a combination of those rates.

Consider municipal bonds. If you're in one of the higher tax brackets, you may benefit from investing in municipal bonds. The interest on these bonds is typically free of federal taxes, and possibly even state and local taxes. Interest from some types of municipal bonds may be subject to the alternative minimum tax (AMT). However, because of the new tax laws, the AMT exemption amounts were increased significantly.

You might be wondering what these new laws mean to investors. In terms of your regular investment activities, the effect might not be that significant. The tax brackets for qualified dividends and capital gains – such as those realized when you sell stocks – will remain about the same. This means that most investors will continue to pay 15% to 20% on long-term capital gains and dividends. Consequently, the new tax laws shouldn't really affect you much in terms of your decisions on buying and selling stocks or investing in companies that may pay dividends. Of course, it's still a good idea to consult with your tax advisor on how the totality of the new laws will affect you.

Ultimately, your investment decisions shouldn't be driven only by tax implications – nonetheless, it doesn't hurt to take steps to become a tax-smart investor.

BBQ basics: skill with the grill

Grilling is one of the simple pleasures of the season. Whether outdoor suppers consist of an impromptu barbecue or elaborate grilling feast, it's all about technique. From proper preparation to skill with the grill, this week's column reviews some BBQ basics.

The Waiting Game: As a rule of thumb, when you grill with charcoal, it takes about 30 minutes for coals to reach a medium temperature and become ash covered. For gas grills, allow about 15 minutes for the grill rack to preheat properly.

Turn the Heat Up: To increase the heat on a charcoal grill, try these tips. Simply push the coals together; add more coals as needed; lower the grilling surface, or fan the fire and tap the ashes from the coals.

Call for Coal: Did you know as a general rule, it takes about 30 coals to grill one pound of meat? But keep in mind the number of coals required can vary depending upon weather conditions. Cold temperatures and high humidity call for the addition of more coals.

Cool It: To quickly decrease the temperature on a charcoal grill, just raise the cooking grid or carefully sprinkle the coals with a little water to cool it down fast.

Tasty Turns: When marinating meat or other foods for grilling, you should move or turn the meat in its container every half hour or so to ensure an even distribution of the sauce.

Dry Off: Did you know meat that has been marinated should be blotted dry before searing in order to form a second skin?

Don't Flip Out: Did you know if you flip your steak more than once, you're probably cooking it wrong? Grilling experts say you can properly sear meat by using higher heat, and turning it just once. A nice crust will form and seal in the flavor, and keep foods from sticking.

Cut Curls: If you slash the edge of the fat around a steak or chop it will prevent it from curling as it cooks. Just make cuts in the edge every couple of inches.

Water Rub: When grilling hamburger patties, you'll get a juicier burger if you rub each side of the meat with cold water before grilling.

Sugar Stall: Barbecue sauce containing sugar should be applied for only the last 20 to 30 minutes of cooking because putting it on sooner may cause the meat to burn. For grilled chicken, baste with sauce the last ten minutes.

Basting Basics: Basting on the grill can be a tricky challenge. Try this timing trick: For hot dogs and sausages, baste with BBQ sauce for the last five to six minutes of cooking time; barbecued meats cooked by indirect method should be basted with sauce the last hour of cooking.

Spray to Stay: Want your spices to stay put on meat while grilling? Try spritzing a little nonstick spray on the meat after seasoning to keep it in place better.

Cut Cleanup: Here's a tip to cut grill cleaning time. After cooking, place a piece of tinfoil over the grate and turn the gas up to high for about a minute, and then turn it off. The foil attracts the heat, burning the bits to an ash. When cool, crumple up the aluminum foil and use it to scrape off the residue.

said that he too disagrees with the concept, although his position comes more from his understanding of the stresses teachers and educators already face each day. Desto said making them responsible for law enforcement would add to that stress and teachers shouldn't have to bear that burden.

"I don't know if people are aware how hard teaching is. Being a public school teacher is an incredibly difficult job and it's incredibly demanding and important. To think that now, all of a sudden. We're just going to have them be trained as law enforcement officials is almost disrespectful to this profession," Desto said. "I'll tell you what does work. If they want to put the money where it should go there are two things to focus on. Number one is mental health. So many times when I was principal we would try to get mental health services in place for a young person, particularly one who is economically disadvantaged, and there's just barriers all the way. I think it was Frederick Douglas who said it's easier to build strong chil-

dren than mend broken adults. That's the biggest thing for me. As soon as kids start to manifest these kinds of challenges let's not have any barriers to be able to get them some help. The honest truth is there isn't one magic solution to an incredibly complex problem."

Another focus Desto said the state should embrace is a program Chief Wojnar also supports, because he has seen it work. Desto said a focus on providing school resource officers should be part of the state's plan, and having a certified and trained law enforcement officer on hand has been a proven security measure that works.

"Being a law enforcement official is really hard and really important. Not just anyone can do that. We have a resource officer at Shepherd Hill and he's an amazing asset to the district. If we had one at every school in the country that model would work. That's where they should be putting the money," Desto said.

Wojnar swears by the school resource officer model and said he's certainly in support of armed enforcement personnel carrying firearms on school campuses. Shepherd Hill Regional

High School currently has a full-time school resource officer that interacts with other schools in the town and Wojnar said that officer is more than just a security measure. The officer has ingrained himself within the school community to become a support system where student may need one.

"We've found the fact that the school resource programs serve a great purpose and just the community involvement and the other activities that our officers participate in at schools have a huge role," Wojnar said. "That whole program has been hugely successful from that perspective with everything that we've been trying to accomplish here in terms of safety and security. The school is a microcosm of society in its own right. You're going to have everybody coming together to socialize. You'll have similar problems in schools that you'll have out in the community. These officers become part of the school community and become ingrained with the staff and the students. They're not there to be disciplinarians or to arrest people unless they have to. They can defuse situations, interact and intervene before situations become major

issues."

As the president of the Massachusetts Chiefs of Police Association, Wojnar said he feels most of his fellow law enforcement leaders feel the same way. While he said that different chiefs have different positions on the debate, most seems to believe that having a certified law enforcement individual on hand on school grounds is the best idea to help prevent any future incidents from happening anywhere in the nation.

"I think the general vibe is people don't want just anybody running around on campuses with guns. Just introducing guns there for the sake of doing it doesn't really serve a purpose," Wojnar said. "It falls on training and we want qualified people to be out there that are going to be in these positions if they're going to do something. You have diverse opinions, but I think folks are trying to think outside the box and examine different possibilities and proposals. You can't just dismiss something as a crazy idea until you've had a chance to listen to it and take a look at it. So that's why I think you have a variety of opinions coming forward now."

"I want them to design programs and create this space their own."



al transportation. There is currently a Senate Bill being proposed to even incentivize regionalization and explore alternative structure and financing options. These alternative options include the recently discussed separate tax rate plans that Dudley and Charlton have begun to explore to help ease the burden of cost sharing on either community. The plan would set aside a separate budget account for education rather than making it an allotted budget line item in the overall town spending plan.

But the biggest issue, for Briare at least, still remains. Chapter 70 funding is still intact and for Briare this is the biggest issue and one he says will be the hardest hurdle to jump over in terms of education funding reform in the commonwealth.

"There was no disagreement from the auditors' department that the funding formula is flawed, but it was like we have a better

shot at pushing water uphill than to get that changed," Briare said. "I reached out to a couple of state senators and state representatives, none of our local ones, and they're immediate reaction was don't touch my Chapter 70 funding formula, it works. You have this mentality at the state house that nothing broken with Chapter 70. They're basic feeling is that everyone is always going to complain that they're not going to get enough money and the formula works. How do you convince people who think something works that it doesn't work?"

Briare said the positive news is these issues are starting to get attention and discussions like the April 5 meeting with the State Auditor are part of that process. While change may take a long time to promote and push through the State House and Senate, Briare and the Dudley EDC are hopeful that positive changes for the commonwealth that will benefit Dudley in the long run are on the horizon.

Pirates' bats, Meech's pitching help upend Tyngsborough for Clem Tournament championship

OXFORD — Senior left-hander David Meech allowed just one hit over four innings, struck out seven and offensively contributed two hits and three RBI to help lead the Oxford High varsity baseball team to a 15-1 win over Tyngsborough High in the championship game of the fifth annual Dan Clem Memorial Tournament on Wednesday, April 18.

Meech struck out two and walked one in the top of the first inning and the Pirates scored three runs in the bottom of the frame to jump out to a quick lead that was never seriously threatened by the Tigers. The game was stopped after 4-1/2 innings due to the 12-run mercy rule.

"With Dave pitching [and] getting a three-run lead early like we did makes us pretty tough to beat," said Oxford head coach Justin Richards,

whose team improved to 4-1 with the victory. "He's our No. 1 pitcher and he showed why today."

After Meech set Tyngsborough (2-3) down nearly in order in the top of the first, the Pirates wasted no time getting their ace the lead in the bottom of the inning.

Junior Michael Bordeaux led off with a walk and scored the first run of the game when the next batter, senior Jason Panient, tripled to the gap in left-center field. Panient trotted home to make it 2-0 when Meech followed with an RBI single to right field. Meech made it 3-0 later in the inning when he scored on a groundout to second base by senior Noah Buckley.

"That shot Jason hit in the first inning, it just went," Richards said. "He is having really good at-bats. Both he and Dave are, but really, it's the whole team; everybody is getting on base. It's just

been good so far."

Oxford broke the game open in the bottom of the third inning by scoring seven runs on two hits, three walks, a hit batsman and two Tyngsborough errors. The Pirates added five runs in the bottom of the fourth inning to extend their lead to 15-0. Oxford's five fourth-inning runs came on five hits, two hit batsmen and one Tyngsborough error.

Panient finished the game 3 for 3 with a triple, two singles, three RBI and a stolen base. Meech singled and tripled, while fellow seniors Colin Ryan and Ryan Nolan, junior Ryan Parr and freshman Sawyer MacPherson all recorded singles during the game. Bordeaux, Buckley, Ryan and MacPherson all drove in a run as well.

"As a team we're seeing the ball really good offensively right now and we're putting the ball in play pretty good," Richards said. "That was our hope going into this year; to be pretty tough 1 through 9. We're starting to come together."

Richards said he is pleased by the Pirates' solid start to 2018.

"It's early in the year and the weather is atrocious, so the things we're looking for — we're less concerned with the end result, although it's nice to be 4-1 — are, how good are the at-bats we're having? Are we seeing the ball OK? Are we putting the ball in play? Are our pitchers throwing strikes? Are we making plays in the field? And, are we getting better at all those things?"

"And we have been, even though we have not really been practicing a lot on the field," Richards continued. "What we've done in the last couple of weeks, we're pretty pleased with where we are at this point. Usually pitchers have a little bit of advantage early in the year, especially with teams not being outside much, but offensively we're in a really good spot right now, much further ahead than we were last year."

Richards said he attributes Oxford's hot start to the overall maturation of the team.

"The whole team is back and they're older; we only lost one kid from last year," Richards said. "The team is more mature; they take things a little more seriously. They know what I want and I know what to expect from them. They've grown up a lot. They had a big growth year last year and we can see it in the way they handle themselves day to day and how they're playing."

Shepherd Hill escapes Ahearn Memorial Tourney with consolation round win




hits to go with nine strikeouts and four walks.


Mick Sullivan of Shepherd Hill swings away at a Marlborough offering and connects for a triple.

"That was big for him," Bay Path head coach Mark Sansoucy said of Shoemaker's first inning. "He pitched a couple of innings last week, but that was his first start."


Sansoucy then said that Shoemaker's teammates helping him with such a big run output was important.

In all, Desimone was 4 for 4, scoring each time he reached base. Jose was 3 for 3 with a walk, Stitis 3 for 3, O'Loughlin 2 for 2 with a walk and Shoemaker 2 for 5.

Sansoucy saw his team's offense come alive in their prior game, which took place in the consolation round of the annual Cape Cod Tournament over April Vacation. The Minutemen defeated Cape Cod Tech in the game, 17-1.

The Broncos grabbed a couple of runs in the top of the second inning to cut the deficit down to 12-2, but the Minutemen tacked on two runs in the home half of the frame to regain a 12-run lead, 14-2. Mansfield magical for Spartans, who push past Bartlett

WEBSTER — Harrison Mansfield had a game to remember against Bartlett High on Saturday, April 21, helping to lead the Uxbridge High varsity baseball team past the Indians, 8-1, with both his pitching and hitting.

On the mound the junior left-hander tossed a complete game three-hitter and struck out 14, allowing just an unearned run while walking two. At the plate Mansfield had two hits and drove in two runs.

"Harrison pitched great today; he was in total control," said Spartans' head coach Peter Rice, whose team improved to 2-5 with the win. "He was hitting his spots with his fastball and he mixed in a few curveballs and changeups very effectively. He really pitched well today."

Mansfield struck out the side in the first, second and sixth innings and also fanned two Bartlett batters in both the fourth and seventh innings.

"I felt good coming into the game. I was stretching and throwing before the game and my arm felt good," Mansfield said. "This is my second start, so I felt fresh. From the first inning on I was throwing pretty well."

Mansfield said he felt like his strong start — striking out six of the first seven batters he faced — plus his performance at the plate bolstered his confidence when he was out on the bump.

"If I'm pitching well I usually hit well, too, and I got two hits. After I got the two hits my pitching definitely got better," said Mansfield, who was really popping the fastball into

catcher Alex Currie's mitt. "My fastball, I was just blowing it by everybody. And the curveball was looking good, too."

Bartlett head coach Jon Way was also impressed by Mansfield's performance.

"Hats off to him, he threw really well. He got stronger as the game went on," Way said of Mansfield. "He found a way to change his speeds and his location; he kept us off balance. Late in the game he just reached back and let it fly. It almost seemed like he was throwing harder in the seventh than he was in the first. Those are the signs of a good competitor and a good pitcher. I'd have liked to see us put a few more balls in play, but he threw real well and didn't let that happen."

Bartlett (1-5) took a 1-0 lead in the bottom of the third inning. With one out the Indians' junior catcher, Joey Grundel, walked. With two outs Grundel raced to third base on a single to right-center field by sophomore Casper Sykes. Grundel then scored on a passed ball.

After squandering chances to score in the first, second and fifth innings — leaving a total of four runners in scoring position in those three innings — the Spartans' bats came alive in the sixth. The first eight Uxbridge batters in the inning not only reached base, but scored runs as well.

The Spartans scored their eight runs on five singles, a walk and a Bartlett error. Recording singles in the inning for Uxbridge were juniors Currie, Holden Thiebault, Jack Hughes, Josh Labrie and Mansfield.

Currie finished with three hits in the game while Mansfield, Thiebault and Hughes had two each.

Mansfield drove in two runs in the inning while sophomore Jacob Rancourt, junior Cam Pomeroy and freshmen Sam Criscola and Jackson Hacker all recorded RBIs as well.

"In that inning we put the ball in play and forced them to make some plays on us and they made a couple of mistakes," Rice said. "We were then able to come up with a couple of big hits in the inning and, with the way Harrison was pitching, put the game out of reach. The timely hits were big; it was a good inning, but it was really more that we hit the ball hard and forced them to beat us defensively."

After the game Way met with his team in right field for a 10-minute meeting, during which Way became animated at times.

"I wanted to let them know that making the playoffs this season is still within reach," Way said. "We need eight wins and its going to be a grind every day, we're going to have to win the games that we're supposed to win and surprise some people in some games when they don't expect us to. It's just going to be a mental grind the rest of the way."

in the coach's office inside the boys' locker room found out the school was not holding a fire drill or testing the system.

"The fire alarm was shut off so quickly we thought nothing of it, but about 45 seconds later the words 'Code Red' came over the loudspeaker — twice," Brower recalled.

"Coach May went to the outer locker room doors and locked those and told everybody to get into his office."

"Shortly thereafter, we heard a popping noise and somebody said over the radio, 'hey, is that a firecracker?' And a voice came back and said, 'that ain't no firecracker,'" Brower said.

"A minute or two later we heard 'pop, pop, pop.' One of the guys then opened one of the side doors to the outer office and when he did that you could hear the shots clear as day. They were a lot less muffled. At that point, we knew someone was shooting inside the school."

Brower, who grew up in the Brookfields and now lives in Auburn, and Ryan, a first-year coach at Nichols, had found themselves inside one of the deadliest school shootings in the nation's history; 17 students, teachers and administrators were killed that day.

Feis, who worked security at the school and served as the football team's offensive line coach, was one of the casualties.

Brower sized up the situation quickly and when he realized that he, Ryan, May and the four athletes were in the safest place they could be in the school, his attention turned

to the student-athletes in the room.

"To see these four football players learning about one of their coaches being a victim of this was very hard for me," Brower said. "And, naturally, close for Coach May, who was very close with Coach Feis — Coach Feis had played for Coach May — it was really hard for him, too. All of those guys, Coach May and the four kids did an amazing job keeping their head on straight through all of it. It was definitely something you could see wasn't easy for them to find out about."

At that point, Brower — who with wife Amy is the parent of a 5-year-old daughter named Kaylee — and Ryan, went into a parental mode.

"We were really just trying to keep everyone's mind occupied by talking about football, by talking about college; anything not to focus on what was going on what's outside the room," Brower said.

"It was an incredibly stressful situation. That's not our community. We don't live there; we don't know the people in that community. I had only met these four young men that day, but they're hearing about friends and classmates; people they grew up with and they have known since they were little kids. I can't even fathom what was going through their heads."

One of those four young men was Tyler Goodman, the starting quarterback on the football team. The actions of Brower and Ryan have left a lasting impression on Goodman.

"Coach Brower and Coach Ryan kept us, the recruits, completely calm. They were trying to discuss any other

topic they could than what was going on outside the locker room. That's what impressed me the most," Goodman said in a phone interview.

"When it came down to making my decision that was a big part of my deciding to go to Nichols. They treated me like a son. Every parent wants their children to go to a school where they know their kid would be treated like a son; treated the same way they were treated at home. You know, reminding us to stay on top of our school work, things like that — parental things."

Goodman made an overnight visit to Nichols Feb. 24-25. At the end of the first night of his visit he verbally committed to attend Nichols and play on the football team. Goodman said Coach Ryan was particularly comforting when Goodman

found out Feis — whom he was very close to — had been killed in the shooting.

"When I found out Coach Feis passed, I lost it. A friend of mine actually called me and told me, 'Coach is gone.' I was in the coach's office and I broke down," Goodman said.

"Coach Ryan told me, 'it's going to be all right. You've just got to toughen up right now. You can call me whenever you need to and we can talk about this, but right now you have to be tough and strong for your team.' When I found out Coach Feis passed away, that took a chunk out of my heart."

Goodman said when he got onto the Nichols campus he received a sign from Coach Feis and the others who perished in the school that this was the place he was destined to continue his education.

"I visited Western New England College the day before and it was 75 degrees and hot and I was like, 'this is Florida weather,'" Goodman said. "When I woke up the next day it was kind of chilly out and we drove to Nichols and it started snowing as soon as I got there. And it wasn't that icy snow, it was soft and fluffy snow."

"I looked up [toward heaven] and said, 'if someone is sending me a sign, I see it. I see the sign. OK guys, I get it. I got you. I'm listening.'" Goodman explained. "When I got to the administration office I saw Coach Brower and I went to shake his hand and he said, 'no, I want a hug.' I loved the campus. I'm not a big school type of kid. I'm not a small school guy. When I found out the whole school was on one street I said to myself, 'you know what, this school is the perfect size for me.' Everything is all together. I committed right then."
