MILLBURY — With \$3,000 in recent grant funding, the Millbury Public Library will host a series of programs throughout September, October, and November.

The library was one of 517 public libraries nationally that received \$3,000 from the American Library Association—Libraries Transforming Communities: Focus on Small and Rural Library grant. The eligibility for this grant was limited to communities with populations less than 25,000, according to the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

This funding will enable the library to "lead community engagement programs for patrons and library staff," according to a library statement.

"Through community engagement, my goal is to gather feedback from the community on how to continue to offer innovative library programs despite the challenges of limited funding, staff development to stay abreast with new library trends, and be able to have staff stay stress-free through fun engaging staff development workshops," said Ann Dallair, Millbury Library Director.

This week, the library hosted an in-person program called "Conversations about Library Programming and Staff Development." The program served as an opportunity to gather feedback from the community and to hear ideas and suggestions on future innovative programs, programs that have worked/not worked, ways for promotion, and staff development that can be offered, according to the library.

Later this month and continuing through November, a series of virtual online adult/senior computer classes will be offered as part of this grant, the library released. The seven-week computer programs will begin on Tuesday, Sept. 28, at 6 p.m. and the following topics will be discussed:

Sept. 28 and October 5 at 6 p.m.: Learn Windows 10: Close the Digital Divide

Oct. 12 and Oct. 26 at 6 p.m.: Using Browsers, Exploring Websites and Getting the Most Out of Searching the Web

Nov. 9 and Nov. 16 at 6 p.m.: All About Pictures— Finding, Organizing, and Editing

Nov. 23 at 6 p.m.: Save Time and Money with an Easy Computer Tune-up! (The library has released that this last workshop is not for Apple/Mac users).

Recycling company penalized for violating waste site cleanup regulations at Northbridge property

NORTHBRIDGE — The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) has announced that D & G Recycling, Inc. has been penalized \$31,000 to settle violations of the Massachusetts waste site cleanup regulations at their Northbridge property.

In March 2019, MassDEP issued a Notice of Noncompliance for failure to submit required documents for a reported release of oil and hazardous material at the company's property, located at 2040 Providence Rd. The property has been an auto repair and auto salvage yard since 1936 with three

underground storage tanks containing gasoline and waste oil abandoned in place since 2005. Soil, sediment and groundwater at the property and adjacent wetlands are contaminated with volatile organic compounds, petroleum compounds

In 2014, the company started cleanup actions, but failed to document completion of the work and failed to classify the site in accordance with state regulations. Under the terms of a consent order, D & G Recycling must pay \$7,750 or tne penalty, with the remaining amount suspended for a year as long as the company abides by the order and completes the

cleanup work at the site, including the removal of the aban-

doned underground storage tanks. Companies must communicate with MassDEP and make all efforts to timely complete required cleanup actions to address environmental contamination," said Mary Jude Pigsley, Director of MassDEP's Central Regional Office in Worcester. "Working with MassDEP is the most efficient way of accomplishing this goal and is particularly so in the

case of small businesses with limited resources." MassDEP is responsible for ensuring clean air and water, safe management and recycling of solid and hazardous wastes, timely cleanup of hazardous waste sites and spills and the preservation of wetlands and coastal resources.

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

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

Road race and health walk to benefit Manchaug Pond



Police, DA warn of elder exploitation scams

REGION — Police are warning residents once again of scams targeting elders.

"There's no shortage of those who look to take advantage of folks," the Sutton Police Department shared in a statement. "If you have elderly family members or friends, make sure you let them know there are dishonest people out there who are possibly looking to scam them out of money."

Sutton Police shared information about an elder exploitation scam commonly referred to as the "Grandparent Bail Scam." Since June 2020, the Department of Homeland Security, with other national agencies, have been actively investigating the scam, which occurs when a caller contacts an elderly victim and portrays themselves as the grandchild of the victim, advising the victim that they have been involved in a serious motor vehicle accident, have been arrested, and require money for bail, according to reports.

The caller or a purported attorney or paralegal will then advise the victim how much money is required to post bail for the grandchild and will coordinate a transfer of the money through the following three methods, police shared: money collected in person from victims by a courier, money sent by the victim mainly through UPS or FedEx, or money sent by the victim through wire transfer.

"Take a few minutes to educate [family members or friends] so they do not become a victim of this scam. If they do happen to fall for it, make sure you let us know ASAP, so we may investigate it in a timely manner," the department continued.

Worcester County District Attorney Joseph D. Early also commented on another recent scam in which an 86-year-old Massachusetts woman lost more than \$40,000 to a series of phone scams.

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"You answer the phone and hear that you have won a \$2.7 million sweepstakes," Early released in a statement on social media. "All you have to do is pay a fee. Does it sound too good to be true? That is because it is.'

Early added that in this particular case, scammers had spoofed the caller ID to display the "Publishers Clearing House" name.

"It is important to remember that scammers are capable of making any phone call appear legitimate," he contin-

According to Hingham Police, the 86-year-old resident fell victim to a series of phone scams over a two-week period and lost at least \$42,000.

"The woman, who suffers from the early onset of dementia, began receiving phone calls...the caller ID on all the calls displayed 'Publishers Clearing House," police said. "The

caller told the woman she

won \$2.7 million dollars in their sweepstakes.'

The caller said before the woman could collect her prize, she would need to pay the taxes up front on her winnings, police added. The caller then connected her with someone from the "Tax Department," and that person explained that she "would need to open an account at Bank of America so they could transfer the money."

"Remember, as always awareness and education are the keys to stopping these scams and protecting our seniors," the department reported.



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

There is more to the labor shortage than laziness

All around the country, we've seen businesses reducing hours, restaurants reducing menu items and help wanted signs everywhere. "People just don't want to work!" is the excuse we here uttered by anyone who hasn't done their homework.

While it's true there are some who don't want to work, this certainly has not caused the labor shortage. Please note that since the dawn of history, there have always been those who don't want to work. At the end of the day, if someone is able bodied enough to work and isn't independently wealthy for some reason, and chooses not to work, well they end up unfortunately facing their own issues.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, job openings are at 9.3 million. Extended unemployment benefits have run out, so that argument is no more. In fact, only 3 percent of unemployed people earned enough with the extended benefits country wide to warrant not returning to work. Only 14 percent were earning more than they did prior to the extended benefits. The cessation of those benefits will send some people back to work, but not enough to make a dent. Experts say worker's rights could have more to do with it.

Low pay is one reason for the shortage. In 1968, the federal minimum wage was \$1.60 per hour. Factoring in the rate of inflation since, that would be the however, the federal minimum wage is just \$7.25 per hour in 2021. Walmart is now starting employees at \$17/hour, and McDonald's restaurants in many New England states start their employees at \$15/hour. Lowes has just advertised to start paying \$18/hour. This is not good news for smaller local businesses who don't have the backing of being a corporation.

Employees are also seeking better Those in the working conditions. restaurant business who rely on tips are sexually harassed at a much higher rate, and because of mask mandates, those workers are often asked to police rude and belligerent people who refuse to comply for either personal or political reasons.

The COVID lockdown has allowed many to re-evaluate what is really important and meaningful, and working a job where you're harassed and underpaid just isn't worth it. Flexibility that provides work life balance is what many are looking for. Remote work has allowed this to become more of a reality. Remote work has also allowed many companies to function with less employees. Workers without digital skills are out of luck as far as remote work goes until more training is available. There are some companies who do offer such training such as Google and Amazon.

Many Americans are also in a position where they need to stay home to care for vulnerable individuals including young children. While many schools and daycares are open, many have closed due to COVID outbreaks, leaving parents without childcare. The opening and closing is unpredictable, and will remain that way until the pandemic is under con-

Tips to Plant Fall Bulbs

Following a long New England winter, few signs of spring are more welcome than the first sprouts of green popping up in a barren garden. The promise of a season of beautiful blooms, the tiny shoots are the gardeners reward of a past autumn spent preparing and planting. Experts agree fall offers ideal conditions to plant perennials. In fact, this season is the preferred time to plant spring blooming bulbs. The following are tips to preparing, planning and planting bulbs now for a flourish of flowers come spring.

Planting time varies depending on location, but here in the northeast it ranges from September until as long as the soil can be worked, usually around the end of October.

Prepare vour bed by making sure the soil is properly fertilized. Be sure to dig out the soil to the proper depth. Loosen the soil and if you choose, add a bulb booster to the soil. Bulbs should be planted with pointed side up. Place them firmly, yet gently, into the ground. Cover the bulbs loosely with soil, water lightly and add a layer of mulch. . Typically, bulbs should be planted three times as deep as the bulb is wide. In sandy soils, you can plant a little deeper, and in heavy soils you can dig a slightly shallower hole. Bulbs should be spaced approximately a width twice the diameter of the bulb. Note: Tulips should be planted one inch or so deeper as deep rooting can prolong the effective life of the tulip bulb.

If you are selecting bulbs in bulk, such as loose bulbs offered at discount garden centers, it's important to follow a few rules of thumb. Typically, big bulbs produce the largest blooms and may yield more flowers, therefore, it may be worth the cost to pay a bit more for good sized, healthy bulbs. However, if you are on a budget and have the time to wait, smaller bulbs will TAKE THE HINT

eventually increase in size and bloom each year.

When choosing a bulb, look for those that are firm and plump. Hold them in your palm and select bulbs that feel heavy for their size. Avoid bulbs with bruises, spots or signs of mold. And steer clear of soft, mushy and lightweight bulbs. Sprouting bulbs may indicate a bulb that has been in storage for a long time.

A little thought and preparation go a long way in reaping the benefits of a successful spring and summer flower garden. The planning you take time for in the fall will be apparent when the flower garden plantings burst with color and texture next year. Know your flowers before you plan to plant. While most bulbs require an area where there is full other varieties sun, such as the iris and crocus enjoy some shade after blooming. For best results select a location in full sun or sun with morning shade only. Well drained soil is a requisite for flower bulbs. If you have poor soil, raised flower beds may be an effective alternative.

For best results, design your garden with pen and paper first, mapping out the size of the beds and the flowers to scale. Keep in mind color, texture and fragrance are all important factors when deciding on a particular flower garden plan.

Plotting a garden plan is an exciting chore, and there are some basic rules that ensure a pleasant mix of color for a showy display. Notice how a clump of daffodils and tulips are much more charming than a tidy row of the springtime flowers? The eye is drawn toward

the burst of color when these flowers are situated in generous groups of plantings.

Be sure to take an accurate bulb count of such large splashes of plant-Your layout plan ings. should also include using flower bulbs as accents in perennial beds, or to fill in rock gardens or as an interesting border to greenery. Be sure to plan for extra bulbs to fill in areas or to add as landscape accents.

For an interesting mix, merge short plants with tall specimens to give variety and depth as well as differing textures. And don't underestimate the power of fragrance! Nothing is more delightful than a pathway of floral scents welcoming visitors to your door.

Scaling plants to the bed is another important factor when plotting your A simple rule to follow is to keep in mind the tallest plant in an island flower bed should have a mature height that is equal to about half the width of the bed. Place these plants in the center, so they can be viewed from all sides. remember to take into account plants that grow and expand quickly.

Color is another major consideration planting your bulbs. If you want your garden to be a showcase all season, select a variety of bulbs that flower during early, middle and late spring and summer for a continuous burst of color.

Just as in the home, in the garden bed cool colors seem to recede and warm colors appear to come forward. To make a small garden area appear larger and more spacious, plant flowers in cool, light colors. As a general rule white goes a long way in a garden bed, but if you use a lot of white flowers in an area, consider adding a dramatic splash of bright red or bright pink or purple for visual contrast.


Dreading the long, cold winter ahead? Forcing bulbs indoors allows the impatient gardener to enjoy springtime blooms during the winter season! Certain bulbs, such as the narcissus and hyacinth lend themselves to forced budding. To do: Drop a bulb into a glass jar and fill with water and small pebbles until the water level reaches the base of the bulb. Position the jar in a sunny window. Water must remain at the same level, so add moisture as needed. To prevent mold, change the water periodically.

Help for weather-stressed lawns



Fall is a good time to improve the health and appearance of a stressed lawn.

The extreme heat and drought of 2021 across much of the country has turned many lawns brown. Damaged lawns may be thin, contain dead patches or are overrun with weeds.

Fall is a good time to improve the health and appearance of a weather-worn lawn. Start the process by evaluating the damage. Then plan a course of action and be prepared to follow through as needed with proper care.

Fall fertilization can help improve thin lawns and those with numerous small dead patches the size of a baseball or smaller. Apply fertilizer in early September to help lawns recover from summer stress while encouraging denser growth and deeper, more drought tolerant roots. Those in warmer climates growing grasses like centipede, Bermuda and zoysia should make sure the last fall application is at least one month prior to the average first killing frost. Use a low nitrogen, slow-release fertilizer that won't harm stressed lawns and young seedlings if repairing

or overseeding the lawn

Continue to mow high as long as the grass continues to grow. Taller grass produces deeper, more drought tolerant roots. Mow often, removing only a third of the total height. This is less stressful on the lawn and results in shorter clippings that can be left on the lawn. The clippings return moisture, nutrients, and organic matter to the soil.

Use a sharp blade for a cleaner cut that closes more quickly, reducing

water consumption and risk of insects and disease while leaving the lawn looking its best. You'll also save time as sharp blades cut more efficiently and reduce fuel consumption by as much as 22 percent.

Improving a lawn's growing conditions will help it recover more quickly and equip it to better manage environmental stress. Core aerate lawns that have more than one half an inch of thatch, those growing in compacted soils, or before overseeding. By removing plugs of soil, you will break through the thatch and create channels for water and fertilizer to reach the grass roots. For best results, core aerate the lawn when its actively growing; fall for cool season grasses and spring or early summer for warm season grasses.

Hand removal of weeds is the most environmentally friendly option. Organic broadleaf weedkillers with the active ingredient Fehedta or Hedta is another option. Spot treat problem areas to minimize the use of chemicals and reduce the stress on already stressed lawns. As always, read and follow label directions carefully whether using traditional, natural or organic chemicals.

Repair dead and bare patches in cool season lawns that are the size of a soccer ball or larger as needed. Those

growing warm season GARDEN grasses will have the best results when seeding in spring through early summer. Rake away dead grass and MELINDA debris roughening and **MYERS** exposing the soil below. Spread grass seed over the area and lightly rake to ensure seed-to-

soil contact. Or mix a handful of grass seed in a bucket of compost or potting mix. The organic matter helps conserve moisture and promotes seed sprouting. Spread the mix over the soil surface. Water these areas often enough to keep the soil surface moist until the grass seed sprouts. As grass begins to grow, water more deeply and less often to encourage a robust drought tolerant

Proper maintenance and a bit of cooperation from nature will help transform your lawn from a disappointment to an asset in your landscape.

Grafton's new library includes outdoor gathering and learning areas

The finished project brings 25,200 sf of new and renovated space to the residents of Grafton for their academic and community needs.

Construction Managers (https://ctaconstruction.com/), general contracting firm responsible for the construction, worked closely with DRA Architects and the Town's project management firm, DA Sullivan, to maintain the existing character of the 1928 original structure and provide environmental enhancements. During construction, contaminated soils were discovered on the site. Over 7,000 tons of petroleum impacted material stemming from multiple unforeseen subsurface fuel storage tanks were removed and replaced with clean fill. Most of the site and subsurface conditions were reclaimed to provide environmental improvements.

"Located within the Historic District, on a tight site with extensive wetlands, it required careful planning and execution to make the site and building work well together," said Ken Best, AIA principal in charge for DRA Architects. "The addition was designed to complement the original historic library yet provide for services required of a 21st century community. This marriage of old and

new has been the key to the success of

the project," he continued. "The team was able to refinish the existing antique interior woodwork and enhance it for modern technology needs," said Steve Taylor, CTA Construction's project executive. "The exterior hardscape and landscape design DRA Architects created pro-

vides outdoor teaching and learning environments," he said. "CTA delivered a project that has been an immediate hit with both the staff and

public, and the process of building it has been a pleasure. Their team was open, professional, organized and committed to giving the town a high-quality building," said Andy Deschenes, Grafton's Clerk of the Works, and owner's project manager.

The library staff is currently moving materials and equipment into the new facility. A ribbon cutting and grand reopening ceremony for the community has been scheduled for the first weekend in October.

This will be CTA Construction's first municipal project for the town of Grafton and seventh library in Massachusetts. CTA Construction previously built the Merrimac Public Library, Harvard Public Library, New Tufts Library (Weymouth), and completed the Dudley Branch Public Library (Boston), Hopkinton Public Library, and Somerville West Branch renovations and additions.





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














Douglas Cultural Council seeks funding proposals

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DOUGLAS — The Douglas Cultural Council has set an October 15 deadline for organizations, schools, and individuals to apply for grants that support cultural activities in the commu-


These grants can support a variety of artistic projects and activities in Douglas -- including exhibits, festivals, field trips, or performances in schools, workshops, and lectures.
