## New vehicle great help to senior center

WEST BROOKFIELD — The Senior Center staff is riding in style this summer thanks to a combination of monies received from a local organization and the state.

State Representative Donald Berthiaume helped secure \$25,000 in state funding for the Senior Center, with approximately \$12,000 used to purchase a car. Capable of seating five passengers, the vehicle is being used to transport staff members to meetings, appoint-

ments with seniors, and outreach programs.

Sue Raymond, an outreach worker with the Senior Center, utilizes the car for home visits and other programs offered through the center. The vehicle was acquired from Lamoureux Ford in East Brookfield.

"It is very comfortable and rides well. They [Lamoureux Ford] were great to work with, and we thank Donnie for all of his help," said Senior Center Director Linda MacCoy. "The seniors were so excited about this."

## Bus drivers up in arms over unsettled incidents

SPENCER — Two longtime bus drivers are asking for their routes back after being released following multiple incidents with the same Wire Village School student.

Michael Mielowski, who has bused students throughout the region for 25 years, was released from his Spencer route in March after reporting several incidents involving the student to Wire Village officials.

Mielowski took over the route late last year and continued it for the 2017-18 school year, but it didn't take long for the fifth grade student to become disruptive, he said.

Incidents with the student increased in severity throughout the year, Mielowski told the New Leader, until finally the driver began issuing bus discipline reports. One of those reports describes a March 15 incident in which the student threatened to kill another student on the bus, then threatened Mielowski's safety.

"This child presented behavioral problems from the first day this year," said Mielowski, who works for AA

Transportation and bused 60 Wire Village students as part of his Spencer route. "I brought these problems to the school's attention, but nothing was ever done. I wrote four different tickets for the same kid, and the school still didn't do anything."

Mielowski also reported the incidents to the student's mother, whom he described as repeatedly insulting him and making obscene gestures at the bus stop. In a March 19 incident report, Mielowski described the mother shouting that he was a child molester and making several other insulting comments.

On March 22, AA Transportation officials received a letter from the Spencer-East Brookfield Regional School District seeking Mielowski's removal from his route.

"It has recently come to the District's attention that one of your school bus drivers, Mr. Michael Mielowski, acted in a manner we consider unprofessional and unbecoming of a representative of this District, based on his interactions with

## Solar: advisory committee, growth caps part of discussion

SPENCER — Residents and town officials discussed an array of solar topics during a public hearing last week.

Held at the June 19 Board of Selectmen meeting, the hearing provided residents with a chance to offer input and concerns related to the future of solar development in town. Officials presented an overview of recent solar projects launched in town, including a 2016 effort that converted lands at St. Joseph's Abbey into solar installations.

Most recently, selectmen voted 4-1 in May to waive the town's right of first refusal for a pair of parcels off McCormick Road. This decision

provided the green light for a solar proposal to move forward for the parcels at 20 and 32 McCormick Road.

Before additional companies propose solar projects in Spencer, officials wanted to have a discussion with residents about their concerns. Moving forward, residents' input from the public hearing will be integrated into a comprehensive set of regulations that create a roadmap for the future.

While selectmen are eager to see the town continue to reap the financial rewards of solar development, they also understand the importance of preserving open space and farmlands.

## Local teens soar through the skies

WORCESTER — Several cadets from the Goddard Cadet Squadron, a local unit of Civil Air Patrol, recently participated in glider orientation flights. Two of those members, Cadets Dawson Durgin and Dalton Durgin of Spencer, flew in gliders, as part of Civil Air Patrol's goal of furthering aerospace education in teenagers.

Through the free flight orientation program, CAP teenage members receive training on how to safely handle a glider on the ground, how to communicate through hand signals from the glider occupants to the ground team to the tow pilot, and then how to operate the glider while it is in the air. Taking off from Hartness State Airport in North Springfield,

VT, the glider is towed to an altitude of around 3500 feet before the cadet releases the tow line and begins flying the glider with commands from a certified flight instructor sitting directly behind the cadet. Once the glider goes below 1000 feet, the instructor takes the controls and lands the glider.

When asked about his soaring experience, Cadet Dalton Durgin replied, "It was a great time to be up there in the glider and be there with friends from CAP. I hope to go again sometime and I hope others from CAP will go and have as much fun as I did."

Cadets Dalton Durgin, Dawson Durgin, Sam Houle, Grayson Logan, and Tyler Sawicki each flew at least one

and as many as four glider flights over a two day period. Each cadet can also take five powered orientation flights in CAP's fleet of Cessna planes, the largest fleet of Cessnas in the world.

In addition to glider flying, this summer Cadet Dawson Durgin will be attending a Powered Flight Academy in Shawnee, OK later this month, where he will do flight training and work towards his private pilot's license as part of CAP's Cadet Program that focuses on leadership, aerospace, and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) training.

Berthiaume, whose district includes almost a dozen senior centers throughout the county, is constantly on the lookout for state funds that can support local projects. Sometimes the funding has to be secured in stages, but he has accessed significant monies to help defray the costs of several major projects.

"It means a lot to be able to assist local senior centers. Linda and her staff are always working hard to help seniors," Berthiaume said.

The remaining \$13,000 in state funds earmarked for the Senior Center went toward improvements to the building that paved the way for an eventual generator purchase. The building is

now fully wired and equipped with new infrastructure, and the town will be able to use it as a warming station where meals can be served.

Additional funding for these improvements and the new car was provided by the J. Irving England and Jane L. England Charitable Trust. Once the generator is purchased for the center, the town may also be able to utilize the building as a shelter.

For MacCoy and her staff, it's exciting for the center to receive funding from external sources like grants and state allocations. The J. Irving England and Jane L. England Charitable Trust is an annual donor to the Senior Center, providing assistance that has gotten several projects off the ground.

"They are always so supportive of us every year. It is a pleasure to work with them," MacCoy said.

# Buddy Bench a mission of kindness

WALES – Fifth graders at Wales Elementary School embarked on a mission to spread kindness and raise funds last year. After falling just short of their goal, the kids were supported by the kindness of the community to make their project a success.

Beginning last year, the fifth graders made signs out of donated wood, then painted them with the message: “Be Kind.” The signs were given to community members in exchange for donations to be used for the purchase of a buddy bench. Requests for signs quickly poured in and the students wound up raising about \$400, though it wasn’t enough to purchase the bench.

But even though they didn’t meet

their fundraising goal last year, students didn’t let it get them down for long. Despite not being able to purchase the bench, the kids took pride in knowing they had spread positivity throughout the community with their signs.

“We asked for a donation, but we stated that anyone who wanted a sign but could not donate would get one,” said WES fifth grade teacher Marion Reilly, who helped lead the project. “Our fundraising efforts were not the end-all. To get signs out in the community was more important to us than the buddy bench.”

The summer of 2017 ensued and the students moved on from their disappointment, never realizing how far their kindness had spread. Now in the sixth grade this year, the students learned that their project hadn’t been forgot-

ten. School staff members and even a few Parks and Recreation Department members offered additional donations, which inspired the kids to resurrect their project and continue fundraising.

After the students secured an additional \$100 in donations from residents, the school was finally able to purchase the buddy bench. Recently unveiled to the entire student body, the bench serves as an example of dedication and persistence to all students and staff.

“I hope the bench remains a reminder to reach out to others, include them in their play, and be kind,” added Reilly, who has taught at WES for 13 years.

As part of the bench unveiling ceremony, the sixth graders were able to lead a ribbon cutting presentation in front of the whole school.

Buddy benches are commonly placed on or near a school playground. A child who doesn’t have anyone to play with or is feeling lonely can sit on the bench, and other students are encouraged to engage that child and offer to play with him or her. With the addition of the buddy bench at WES, school officials are hoping the message of kindness continues to permeate throughout the campus.

“It is a way to include everyone, be empathetic, and lend a helping hand,” Reilly said. “There were so many great aspects of this project. The sense of purpose the kids had in making the signs was astounding. The teamwork and camaraderie the students exhibited was awesome. This is the first project in my 13 years of teaching in which the students have left behind a lasting tribute to the school through their fundraising efforts.”

a student and parent on March 20, 2018,” read the letter issued from Gary Suter, the district’s business administrator. “We are requesting that Mr. Mielowski be immediately dismissed from all bus routes in our District.”

Mielowski was released from his route a day later, and he hasn’t been able to secure regular work with the company for months. With most drivers maintaining their routes through the end of the school year, there are few opportunities for fill-in work.

Meanwhile, Brian Winslow took over Mielowski’s bus route on March 23, and he immediately ran into problems with the same student. Winslow, a driver with AA Transportation since 2014, wrote two disciplinary reports after additional incidents with the student.

“I gave him a bus ticket because he walked down the aisle and hit another kid in the head,” Winslow said. “Several other drivers have written tickets for kids or requested assistance, but nothing is done by the school. They don’t enforce anything.”

Winslow was informed two days after reporting the student’s behavior that he would be removed from the route.

“We got no help from the principal, the superintendent, or anyone in the district,” Winslow added.

Mielowski and Winslow reached out to district officials in an attempt to discuss the incidents involving the student, but most calls and emails were not returned, they said. When one district official finally talked with Mielowski, the individual allegedly indicated that the student’s mother had complained about Mielowski’s sexual orientation and asked that he be removed.

Mielowski said he may end up seek-

ing legal action against the school district, but for now he remains focused on getting his job back.

“I did nothing wrong. The kids on my bus are great kids, and I just wanted to keep them safe,” said Mielowski, who has maintained a spotless bus driving record over his quarter-century career. “The school has done nothing to keep kids safe on the bus. When problems happen, they ignore the reports.”

Interim SEBRSD Superintendent Jodi Bourassa said school officials cannot comment on student discipline information because it is confidential under state and federal student records laws.

“The District does have a process for addressing complaints and incidents that occur on school buses. That process was utilized in connection with all complaints or issues brought by bus drivers,” Bourassa said. “However, since student discipline information is confidential, the bus drivers in question would not be privy to the disciplinary actions taken by the District to address the situation.”

A copy of the school district’s bus regulations obtained by the New Leader outlines a detailed system of warnings in place for first and multiple student offenses on the bus. These include suspensions from the bus, as well as parental notification by the principal. For the fourth violation, the principal is supposed to notify the superintendent to discuss a lengthier suspension or expulsion from the bus.

School officials declined to comment on their reasons for requesting to have the drivers removed from their routes, citing potential litigation.

“One of the drivers has threatened legal action against the District, so the School District has been advised by its legal counsel not to comment on the reasons, which are unrelated to student discipline matters,” Bourassa added.

## Closing cost credit For Massachusetts veterans using program

BOSTON — MassHousing announced a \$2,500 closing cost credit for Massachusetts military veterans who purchase a home through the agency. The new \$2,500 closing cost credit is available to Massachusetts veterans, National Guard and Reserve members, active service members, and Gold Star families who purchase a home with MassHousing's Operation Welcome Home mortgage program, a home loan program designed specifically for veterans.

"Closing costs can run into the thousands of dollars, and by helping our veterans reduce those costs, we will make homeownership more affordable for them," said MassHousing Executive Director Chrystal Kornegay. "When combined with MassHousing's existing financing options, which offer military members and Gold Star families down payment assistance and up to 100-per-

cent financing, this new closing cost credit will give the men and women who serve our country substantially more buying power."

MassHousing is offering veterans the new \$2,500 closing cost credit in addition to the agency's Operation Welcome Home mortgage product, which finances up to 97 percent of the purchase price of a single-family home or condominium. Operation Welcome Home borrowers can also use a second down payment assistance loan for three percent of the purchase price — or up to \$12,000 — to receive 100 percent financing.

Veterans who purchase a two-, three-, or four-family home can receive up to 95 percent financing, and also use the 3-percent down payment assistance second loan, along with the \$2,500 closing cost credit.


MassHousing will reimburse the lender for the \$2,500 closing cost credit.

Operation Welcome Home loans for which the borrower makes less than a 20-percent down payment will include MassHousing's MIPlus™ mortgage insurance. MIPlus™ includes unemployment protection at no additional cost to the borrower. The benefit will cover the borrower's principal and interest payments up to \$2,000 for up to six months in the event of a job loss. For a member of the Reserves or National Guard, activation or deployment overseas will make them eligible for the unemployment benefit as well.

MassHousing is not a direct originator of mortgages and instead makes home loans through 170 partner banks, mortgage lenders and credit unions across the Commonwealth. MassHousing then purchases the loans and services them from its Boston office.

MassHousing (The Massachusetts Housing Finance Agency) is an inde-

pendent, quasi-public agency created in 1966 and charged with providing financing for affordable housing in Massachusetts. The agency raises capital by selling bonds and lends the proceeds to low- and moderate-income homebuyers and homeowners, and to developers who build or preserve affordable and/or mixed-income rental housing. 

## Collaboration promotes communication as school works with agency

CHARLTON — If the US were Bay Path and Iran were the Mercy Center, or vice versa, the world would probably be better off.

That's because the two entities — a voke school and a social service agency — have been exchanging people for nearly 15 years with the goal of trying to better understand each other. Recently, they celebrated the end

of a semester by having Mercy Center folks come to Bay Path for lunch and activities in the cosmetology, carpentry and graphic design shops.

"I was nervous because I'd never been in that type of environment," said Brooke Bowes of Dudley. "I learned to love it there by talking to them and really getting to know people — not just by what you see, but who they are as a real person."

Like the other Bay Path

students involved, Bowes is a health technology sophomore. According to one of the department's four teachers, Christine Piehl, the students spend part of the year in several places that help them learn "communication skills across the growth and development cycle," from infancy to seniority. In this case, it gives them experience with various kinds of disabilities and for the last two years has specifically given them an opportunity to practice sign language, although none of the deaf clients were able to come to Bay Path this time.

"They enjoy watching our students," Piehl said. "They seemed a little apprehensive at first, but came into themselves."

Indeed, some were quite vocal about it. One, Rafael, proudly wore the basketball pin and Hawaiian shirt he'd just received from the graphics art department.

"I like making new friends and love the art stuff," he said, noting his favorite part of the visit was "my friend right here."

He was referring to Carla Rodriguez of Southbridge, who likes the program because it "makes it easier for us to talk to different kinds of people."

"I miss them a lot. We used to go to Mercy Center, but we haven't been there in a while," she said. "It's nice to be able to have this one last goodbye."

Piehl said the students visited Mercy Center on alternating weeks earlier this year, before shifting to an adult day care setting. As she sees it, the typical student is "inexperienced and uncertain at the start, but their confidence levels improve and they embrace the setting."

At least one Bay Path graduate now works at

Mercy, she added.

According to Jodi Contonio, Mercy Center has several related programs, including a day hab and a community-based day program (a sheltered workshop), for its roughly 140 clients. Some of its clients go to regular jobs, so the Bay Path students tend to interact with those who stay behind. She also noted a couple clients have relatives working at Bay Path.

"These guys just love them. They build a great relationship," she said. "These guys work a lot one-on-one with our clients. I wish they could join our clients on job sites, but they can't."

For Charlton's Samantha LePage, who said she's worked with disabled children, Mercy Center's adult population was a logical next step, but she admitted she "wasn't sure I'd like it." But she particularly likes

hearing their stories and pasts.

She and Bowes were having lunch with Freddy of Fitchburg, who spends most of his days in Mercy's workshop sealing envelopes, folding papers and doing similar things. He said he's been there "a long time" and particularly likes "meeting new people."

At Bay Path, he spent much of his visit in the carpentry shop, where he worked with two students to make a birdhouse, wielding the hammer himself.

Contonio said she tries to ensure everyone gets a chance to come here, and would love to have more time to see more Bay Path programs.

"I really wish we could do it more than once a year," she added.

It was also one of the primary recovery vessels for NASA during the Mercury and Gemini missions, and retrieved astronauts Scott Carpenter, Gus Grissom and John Young after their respective orbits and splashdowns in the Pacific.

The Intrepid Sea, Air & Space Museum is a non-profit, educational institution featuring the legendary aircraft carrier Intrepid, the space shuttle Enterprise, the world's fastest jets and a guided missile submarine. Through

exhibitions, educational programming and the foremost collection of technologically groundbreaking aircraft and vessels, visitors of all ages and abilities are taken on an interactive journey through history to learn about American innovation and bravery.



EDITORIAL

*Are we boring you?  
Scaring you?  
Or haven't we done our jobs?*

*"According to the L.A. Times, by next year, millennials born between 1981 and 1996 are projected to outnumber baby boomers born between 1946 and 1964. But millennials are going to the polls in very small numbers. In the 2014 mid-term elections, turnout among 18-20 year-olds was 15%, which was the lowest in a national election since the voting age was changed from 21 in 1971."*

As often as we tout the need to register to vote, to go to the polls, to become involved especially at the local level; that statement from the LA Times is frightening.

We can shrug and say it is indicative of the age of that demographic; that people that age don't usually become involved in politics for another 10 years or so when it hits them how important it is to them personally.

No, that is not so. At least, it hasn't been so in the past. There was no one more passionate about politics and being involved than the young people of the 1960s and '70s. The ones who marched for civil rights and women's rights and against a war. They were definitely that demographic.

And we can definitely see a move in a slightly younger generation for involvement; think of the high school age students who have made a movement on their own for civil rights and gun control in the wake of tragedies they have personally witnessed. While they are immediately advocating gun control, we imagine with more thought they will also begin paying attention to other pieces of the puzzle, and understand there is more to it. There will be really good young people entering political science classes, and social work classes, and law, and history in the next two or three years we suspect. Advocating for better mental health and intervention; advocating for education on peer mediation and anti-bullying and recognizing the symptoms of antisocial behaviors among their peers, hoping to interrupt a tragedy before it happens.

But that is the younger generation. We need to address this sorrowful state of those two to five years of young adults who are in college right now; who are NOT in political advocacy groups, not joining Young Republican Clubs or even being compromised by (gasp) the far left by tempting them with a social event.

They aren't working for candidates they believe in. They aren't registering voters. They aren't working for civil liberties.

And they aren't voting themselves. After watching a view interviews with that age groups, there was a sense some are indeed overwhelmed by the whole thing; they fear they can't make a difference so why try.

They don't know where to start. Some have no clue how it works. No one taught them how. And they fear they will make a mistake.

Some throw up their hands in disgust, not "wanting to be sucked in" to it at all.

But we need them to be "sucked in." We desperately need them to want to be part of it.

Because they are the next steps. The next ones to BE there. To be part of the system, or the new world order if it changes. And they must, they really must be part of that process.

We can't as a nation afford to have them step aside.

We may have done them all a disservice by not emphasizing the old civics curriculum many of us learned in high school. But we can't change that now. We need to find a way now to engage them where we are, and where they are.

Because if we don't, and you think our current political scene is in turmoil, wait 10 years.

## 4th of July: work toward your own financial Independence Day

We're getting close to the Fourth of July, our national Independence Day. This celebration may get you thinking of the many freedoms you enjoy. But have you thought of what you might need to do to attain financial freedom?

Like a diver at great depth, I peered into the night with a pressure on my chest. And when the half-light came and the room began to take its more familiar shape, I would toss about the bed reveling in the slip of the sheets. Wary from the fierceness of this vigilance, heart thumps receding with the shadows, I would slip into a fitful sleep and awake to the brilliant sunlight on my face.

I found solace in the fall ritual. Rubbing sleep from my eyes, I would tread barefoot to the stove, strike the wooden match to its box, and listen with satisfaction to the whump of the gas as it burst into blue flame. With the oven door open and heat erasing the damp chill, I would pad to the bathroom sink and stare into the sameness of my image. I examined each mirrored pore in detail as I shaved, wiping the froth from my cheeks with deliberate swipes of a finger. I finished at the kettle's insistent whistling.

I would sit near the small table, feet cocked on the oven door, and study the muddied swirl in my mug. The aroma was an old friend. Sometimes the steady tick of the clock on the wall began a symphony of thoughts. It was like a metronome for memories, a steady march of unbidden scenes: friends, lovers, dim success and clear failures, all part of my momentary existence.

Dammit, what was that thing in the night? The shadow would not go away. I knew that little of what counts makes it to the surface in a mind. Something unknown had entered my life and caused me to feel afraid. I didn't like that.

It was Vinnie at the gas station who gave the clue. Vinnie knew many of

his customers by their nickname. When Vinnie assigned you a nickname, you were a regular. You gained access to his homespun philosophy and his quick wit, and if you didn't burden him too much with your personal problems, he had sharp incisive comments about current events.

"Hi Teach, how they treaten ya?"  
"No complaints Vinnie. I love what I do."

"They settled down after the attack?"

"Yeah...they seem to be through the stage of wanting to kick ass on anyone who seems different. Now comes the hard part of asking why it happened."

"You know why it happened?"

"Not fully. Most students seem to be repeating what they hear their parents say. Very few want to dig deeper. But there's no excuse for killing innocent people."

"You study the problem? The history?"

"Yeah. And I'm a little worried about the administration reaction. Some seem ready to exploit the fear. We'll punish someone, even if it's not the right one. People do stupid things when they're afraid. I'll feel successful if I can get students to ask one question: 'What is your evidence for that statement?'"

"Keep at it Teach. Don't give up. You're right: fear and ignorance are close neighbors."

I knew enough American history to see the connection. The attack on 9/11 would change my country...and not necessarily for the better. Our reaction to the attack had the potential to pull us together or tear us apart. The key would be getting the world community to form a coalition and hunt down the perpetrators. The terrorist attack was an attack on civilization, not just on the people in New York City, or the United States. It was an attack on what we valued as human beings.

And the thing in the dark? It was no longer a puzzle. It was fear, plain and simple. Personal fear, fears about the future, fears that I might not meet the challenge of teaching, that the government might not meet the challenge of leadership... and just plain fear of the unknown.

Now all these many years later, important values are still under attack.

The enemy is still fear and ignorance.

And I want to write about it.

# Fishing success is sketchy throughout region

Surface water temperatures have reached 70 degrees on many saltwater bays in both Massachusetts and Rhode Island. Even with the water temperatures that high, some fishing has been slow for some, while other anglers enjoy a fishing bonanza. Last week Kurt Salvias and his two sons were treated to a fishing bonanza aboard Steve Mercure's 17 foot boat while fishing outside of the Westport River. The group caught their limit of doormat fluke and sea bass in just a few hours, with many legal size fish being released. Steve was using some of the Road Runner jigs that I had given to him last year, and were responsible for many of the fish they had caught that day.

Using a large white bucktail jig on the bottom, and a 1/8 oz. Road Runner jig a foot above had proved to be a deadly combination for this writer also over the years. The jigs are tipped with a small piece of squid. Road Runner jigs are the product of the Blakemore company. Check out all of their products at Roadrunnerlures.com. This week's picture shows a fluke and seabass caught by one of Ralph's sons. It took a few hours to clean and process all of the fish for the freezer. They were in the right place at the right time.

The second picture shows Jake Leone of Oxford with a nice 44 inch striper he caught at the canal recently. Action

at the canal was very good for some, and slow for others last week. The east end of the canal reportedly saw the best action on surface plugs, although other parts of the canal did pretty good also. Everyone was hoping that the full moon would send in some monster fish with the high tides.

Haddock fishing on the cape has boats going farther out to find the fish, but when they do, action is fast. Many anglers are catching some nice cod on each trip, but they need to be released because of the closure of cod on all of the Gulf of Maine for the last few years. Cod fishing in Rhode Island has taken a big hit this year, with nothing but poor reports from charter boats.

Summer has arrived, and with it comes all types of infec-

Gypsy moth caterpillars are making their presence known around the valley. Some areas are being hit hard again this year, while others are barely being touched.






## Early-inning 'jitters' leaves Leicester one game shy of winning State Title

GREATER NEW BEDFORD VOKE TECH TOPS WOLVERINES, 5-1

WORCESTER — The clock struck midnight on the Leicester High varsity softball team, the Cinderella story of the 2018 Division 2 State Tournament, as the Wolverines lost in their bid to become the school's first-ever state title team, 5-1, to Greater New Bedford Voke Tech (GNBVT), on Saturday, June 23 at Worcester State University's Rockwood Field.

Leicester, which entered the State Final having won 10 straight games, finished its very memorable season 19-7. The Wolverines' chances for a win over the Bears (22-4) were greatly affected by their defensive struggles; Leicester finished the game having committed four physical errors and about as many mental ones as well.

"We've said through this whole run in the postseason that there is only one team that's going to beat us, and that's us, and we certainly did that today," Wolverines' head coach Dave Stanick said. "In the third inning we gave them six outs. You can't do that to a good team. They're going to take advantage of it and they did.

"So, when we finally got our run across in the fourth inning we felt like the game should have been 1-1 at that point, 2-1 at worst. That's a game. That's when we started really playing, but we had put ourselves in too big of a hole. You can't start playing in the fourth inning in a game like this against a team like that."

Greater New Bedford went ahead, 1-0, in the bottom of the second inning. With two outs Leicester pitcher Kya Birtz hit the Bears' Piper Crooks. Crooks promptly stole second base and came home when GNBVT's next batter, Janice Rullan, singled to left field.

In the third inning the Bears put the game away, extending their lead to 4-0 on three hits and two costly Leicester errors.

The Wolverines scored their lone run in the top of the fourth inning, with junior co-captain Caitlin Kemp (two hits) making the score 4-1 when she smacked a leadoff single to left field and came home when junior co-captain Katelyn McKay lashed a one-out triple to the fence in left field.

Greater New Bedford added a run in the bottom of the sixth inning to account for the game's

final run.

Birtz, a freshman who exhibited pinpoint control throughout Leicester's late season and postseason run, struggled with her command against the Bears.

"Kya didn't have her best stuff today, certainly. She was off a little bit, I'm not sure why," Stanick said. "She wasn't her normal sharp self, but she is a freshman and this is a big stage."

Stanick was disappointed by the loss, to be sure, but he was able to quickly put it in perspective.

"I just asked the girls if, on March 19 when we first started in the gym, they thought they would be standing here today," Stanick said. "And they all said no. And I told them, 'neither did I.' We originally said if we could get to Worcester State for the District Semifinals that would be a good season for us. So this has gone well beyond any expectations we had for the season.

"We had a great season," Stanick continued. "I'm very proud of the girls; they've done a great job all year. We've come so far as players and as

individuals. Hopefully we learn a lot from this and we can get back here next year. That'd be great."

The fact that Leicester had no seniors on this year's team certainly seems to set the Wolverines up for a prolonged run of success. Against GNBVT that positive may have been a negative.

"It might have been a little bit of a liability today," Stanick acknowledged. "When you're leaning on your junior captains [Kemp, McKay, Hannah Wickson and Lydia Petit], who have done a great job all year, and they're looking for someone to help them and there is no one there to help them, that's tough.

"We might have missed a little senior leadership there, but the rest of the games in the postseason were very similar and we got through those games, so I was hoping we'd do it again," Stanick added. "We had done a great job in the postseason getting past the first- and second-inning jitters. Today we didn't. We really struggled with that."

# Wolverines win extra inning affair over Greenfield, advance to State Final

AMHERST — Leicester High third baseman Hannah Wickson corralled a slow dribbler down the third base and bulleted a throw to first base. This play finalized a gritty, 4-2, eight-inning win over Greenfield High in the Division 2 State Semifinals played Tuesday, June 19 at UMass-Amherst.

"I am just proud of the girls and how far they have come as players and young ladies," head coach Dave Stanick expressed about his team's performance throughout the playoffs, a 5-0 span through the Central Mass. Tournament and now the State bracket. "They have grown so much, it has been fun to be a part of."

Leicester, now 19-6, leaned heavily on freshman pitcher Kya Birtz for a great performance — and she delivered. The Wolverines' defense did make the plays, including a diving catch in center field by Maddie Hippert for the first out of the eighth inning. In addition, many infielders gobbled up hard-hit grounders and followed with accurate throws to first to get Birtz out of jams.

And although offense was at a premium — the Wolverines tallied just four hits — they were able to put pressure on the Greenfield (19-3) defense and forced them into mistakes early.

Birtz started it in the top of the second inning when she laid down a perfect bunt that resulted in a wild throw to first, scoring Hannah Gallant. Birtz,

now standing at third base, scored a few pitches later on a hard-hit grounder by Alexa Dufries. This gave Leicester a 2-0 lead until the Hickey homer in the fourth.



## Northbridge tops Cherry Valley in American Legion pitchers' duel




Cherry Valley's Chris Kustigian rips a base hit off his bat.

"We are young and we need to take advantage of the opportunities that we get," explained Meech. "As a group we need to learn how to move runners over as well as learning what to do with the

bat in certain situations. They're slowly moving it as they go."

Cherry Valley didn't go down easy, however, despite the lack of base hits throughout. Ryan Sanderson opened the bottom of the fifth inning with a triple to right center that one-hopped to the fence in the deepest part of the park at Rochdale Field.

Post 443 was able to get on the board a batter later when Chris Kustigian was able to turn over on a fastball and hit a line drive to shallow left field to score Sanderson.

This was it for Cherry Valley's offense, though. "The kids just didn't hit tonight, we had been hitting the ball all week and we won four in a row, but what are you going to do," expressed Post 443 Manager Jim Stephens. "Their kid pitched good and kept us off balanced."

Gilman did give Cherry Valley a bright spot with his performance on the mound. The Quaboag Regional


junior only gave up two hits in seven innings pitched. He also struck out nine Northbridge batters and allowed three unearned runs. Another highlight from Gilman was his diving catch in the fourth inning to snag an attempted bunt out of the air.

All of this was done after it appeared as if Gilman's outing would be done prematurely.


"Aidan pitched great. He developed a blister in the third inning and I thought we were going to have to take him out, but he fought through it. It was just a tough game," explained Stephens.

### LEICESTER JUNIOR LEAGUERS WIN DISTRICT 5 PLAYOFF CHAMPIONSHIP


The Leicester Junior League baseball team recently won the Little League District 5 Playoff Championship, its first District Title in at least a decade.

The team is now set to play in the Little League All-Star Tournament. Since Leicester had just one regular season team, their championship-worthy squad is sticking together as the All-Star team.



WORCESTER — Sturbridge American Legion Post 109's baseball game with Main South Post 341 started out as a pitcher's duel and turned into a slugfest.

Sturbridge rallied from a four-run deficit after six innings to lead by three heading into the bottom of the seventh, only to lose a heartbreaker, 9-8, at Vernon Hill Park on Thursday, June 21.

In the last three innings — which took 85 minutes to complete — the teams combined to send 39 batters to the plate.

Sturbridge grabbed a 1-0 lead in the top of the fourth inning. Tyler Stoever reached base on a fielder's choice, took second on a walk to the next batter, Curtis Koebke, went to third on a wild pitch and scored on a two-out error by Main South second baseman Alex Scavone, who dropped a pop-up in the infield.

The game was tied, 1-1, when play moved into the bottom of the sixth inning. Main South loaded the bases on an infield single and a pair of walks before Ryan Prosser staked Post 341 to a 5-1 lead with a grand slam over the fence in left field on a 2-2 count.

Post 109 didn't collectively hang its head after the home run, however, scoring seven times in the top of the seventh inning to take an 8-5 lead.


Patrick Wilbur (2 for 4) got the comeback started with a leadoff double. Deven Kingman was then hit by a pitch and Colin Eliason then walked to load the bases. Post 109 then tied the game, 5-5, Laprade scoring when Stoever launched a sacrifice fly to right field. It was the first out of the inning.

Sturbridge went ahead, 7-5, thanks to a two-run double to center field by Koebke, which plated Sullivan and Brown. Post 109 extended its lead to 8-5, Koebke scoring on an RBI single to left field by Wilbur. The rally ended on a strikeout and a groundout.

Main South, however, staged a comeback of its own, scoring four runs in the bottom of the seventh on two hits, three walks, a fielder's choice and a Sturbridge error.

"We finally get the timely hits we've been searching for, hits with runners in scoring position. We finally get them

and then we couldn't hold onto the lead," Rosseel said. "Our bats really came alive halfway through the game."


"We needed that shot in the arm," Rosseel said about his team's seventh-inning rally. "We got the leadoff double and we kept it rolling."

Despite the devastating loss, Rosseel thinks Post 109 is a team built for the long haul.



## David Prouty's Labaire earns spot in Massachusetts High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame

SPENCER — Coaching high school football is not all about the wins and losses. Winning is important to be sure, but preparing boys to become men, teaching them the important life lessons is a key component of the job description, too.

Former David Prouty Regional football coach Neal Labaire excelled at both.

In the 27 years Labaire was the head coach of the Panthers' varsity squad — after spending eight years as an assistant at David Prouty — his teams won 134 games, enjoyed an undefeated season and went to a Central Mass. Super Bowl.

During that span Labaire, who taught sixth grade at the Maple Street School in Spencer for 30 years, also prepared hundreds of boys for the real world that awaited them.

For his tireless efforts for all those years Labaire, in April, was inducted into the Massachusetts High School Football Coaches Association (MHSFCA) Hall of Fame.

"I was shocked when Sandy [Ruggles, MHSFCA Hall of Fame Chairman] called in January and told me I was going to be inducted into the Hall of Fame," Labaire said. "That was something I never expected. I'm definitely humbled by it, especially when you see the coaches that are in the Hall of Fame. It was really a great moment for me and my family. It was a great night."

Ruggles said Labaire had been in consideration for the Hall of Fame since retiring in 2008. He said several factors went into Labaire's induction.

"Aside from being an excellent football coach, the impact he has had on the community where he coached for so many years and the stability he provided were big factors," Ruggles said. "Another thing that told us he was a worthy candidate was the fact that once word got out that Neal was going into the Hall, the first five calls we got requesting tickets for the event were former players."

Labaire said among his former players in attendance at his Hall of Fame induction were Ray Martinez, who came up from Virginia, and Colby Compton and Mark Pepler, who came down from Maine.

In addition to serving as an assistant and head coach at David Prouty once his playing days were over at Worcester's St. Peter's High and Worcester State College, Labaire was the treasurer for many years of the Joseph Mewhiney Chapter of the College Football Foundation and he served as a coach in the annual Shrine Game. He was also instrumental in the creation of All-Star Games between Central Mass. and Western Mass. players.

For his work with Mewhiney Chapter of the College Football Foundation, Labaire was presented one year with its Distinguished Service to Central Mass. Football Award.

The father of one of Labaire's former players, who requested anonymity said, "I sent Neal a boy and four years later he sent back a man."

Labaire taught his players as many life lessons as he did football plays.

"That was important to us. We always had the philosophy that the field was another classroom; that we were just

teaching a different subject," Labaire said. "You were teaching football as well as all the other things that go along with it. We tried to teach our players how to conduct themselves in and out of the classroom."

Phil Desroches and Marc Grady both coached with Labaire for several years. Both believe Labaire was a mentor to them and both feel he is very deserving of his induction into the MHSFCA Hall of Fame.

Desroches said Labaire's work with the Mewhiney Foundation and his tireless promotion of Central Mass. football across the state were certainly factors in his induction, but it was his relationship with his players that made Labaire Hall of Fame worthy in Desroches' eyes.

"Neal cared about his kids. He did a lot for them. He was always writing letters of recommendation to get kids into schools they wanted to go to and then he would follow up with a call or visit to the coach of that school," Desroches said. "He really made it important to be a Prouty Panther. I think that meant a lot to the kids. I feel that Neal really cared about the kid as a whole, as opposed to just being a football player. You were a better kid playing for Neal."

Grady called Labaire's induction a worthy one.

"The class and dignity that he conducted himself with and the extra effort he put into his players' lives are a couple of the reasons I thought his induction into the Hall of Fame was a fitting honor," said Grady, who teaches science at David Prouty. "The way he conducted himself, the way he ran his program, the way he insisted on a level of performance and commitment

from the kids. He always stressed to give your best and try your hardest. He took care of them in ways that went far beyond the game of football."

All proceeds from the "Run Like the Dickens" 5K will be applied to food, vet and farrier care for the 10 horses currently recovering and living at the BSER's new facility on New Braintree Road in Oakham. The facility was

recently purchased with a bequest from a generous donor, and is still being improved. Sue Sheridan, a founder of BSER says, "We depend on the public to keep us going. It's a lot of work trying to keep up with the bills. The race is our biggest fundraiser of the year and is very important to keep our work with the horses going."

BSER was founded in 2002, the outgrowth of a 4H group's effort to save a horse named Rocky, who had been severely overworked and neglected. The BSER saw Rocky through surgery and rehabilitation, and eventually found him a loving home. The group has since done the same for many horses endangered by abuse or facing

slaughter. Horses who cannot be placed find a permanent home at the Rescue. Part of the organization's mission is to prevent neglect and abuse through education: promoting understanding of all that a horse needs to have a full and healthy life. BSER also maintains a placement list to help people who can no longer care for their horses find fitting homes for them. It is all part of the Rescue's mission to provide horses with human advocates and help "abolish mistreatment and disrespect of horses" in Massachusetts and across the country.

# June is National Fresh Fruit and Vegetables Month

Fresh fruit and vegetables from the backyard garden are a summertime treat like none other. So what's the next best thing to a homegrown crop? Try "pick your own" at area farms and look for weekly Farmers Market events to ensure the freshest picks. How to choose fabulous fruit and vegetables at an outside market or grocery store? The following tips can help you pick perfect produce!

**Beans, snap:**  
Look for small seeds inside straight, fleshy pods. If you can see large seeds through the skin than the beans are probably too old. Avoid beans with dry-looking, rusty, wilted or damaged pods.

**Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, cauliflower:**

Look for tightly compacted flower clusters on broccoli and cauliflower, and compact, uniform sprouts. Avoid wilted, yellow, or dirty heads, and avoid loose, open sprouts or those that are yellow or pale green.

**Cabbage and head lettuce:**  
Look for firm compact heads that are heavy for their size. On leaf lettuce, choose unwilted, compact, crisp-looking compact plants.

**Carrots:**  
Look for deep orange colored and smooth skinned roots. Avoid carrots with purple or green shoulders or pale in color, or ones with forked or crooked roots. Oversized roots usually mean they are woody. If tops are still attached on carrots, they should be fresh.

**Celery:**  
Choose large, firm stalks with uniform stalk and a white bottom. Avoid spindly, wilted stalks.

**Chard:**  
Look for fresh, dark green leaves with bright, tender stalks. Avoid wilted, poorly colored leaves.

**Collards and kale:**  
Check for tender, green, full-sized leaves with tender tips; avoid wilted, tough or overly large leaves.

**Corn on the cob:**  
Choose well-filled cobs with plump, straight rows of kernels. Avoid large, wrinkled kernels.

**Cucumbers:**  
Pick long, slender cukes that are medium to dark green.

**Peppers:**  
Look for firm, darkly colored fruit with uniform size, color, and number of lobes. Avoid wrinkled or shriveled ones or fruits that are sunburned (contrasting color spots).

**Radishes:**  
Choose medium-sized, firm, crisp roots. Avoid wilted or soft roots or those with growth cracks or insect damage. Oversized roots will be pithy. Sunburned crowns are also not desirable.

**Summer squash:**

**Blueberries:**  
Pick plump, firm, deep blue berries with their natural waxy silver coating.

**Cantaloupe:**  
Look for a smooth shallow base; thick, coarse, corky netting that stands out from skin. Should yield slightly when pressed on non-stem end and have the slight scent of cantaloupe.

**Cherries:**  
Should be dark in color, glossy, plump, with fresh looking stems.

**Mangos:**  
Pick fruit that has plump, smooth, dark green skin with patches of red, yellow, or orange color; should be slightly soft.

**Nectarines:**  
Fruit should be plump, slightly soft along "seam"; either orange-yellow or greenish between red-blushed areas depending on variety.

**Oranges:**  
Choose firm oranges, heavy for its size; smooth-textured, with bright-looking skin.

**Peaches:**  
Should be somewhat firm, becoming slightly soft; red with creamy, orangy

**Tomatoes:**  
Look for smooth skinned, firm fruit with uniform color. Avoid fruit with growth splits, sun scald, or overripe (soft) fruit.

**Apples:**  
Choose firm, well-colored fruit that feels crisp.

**Bartletts:** pale to rich yellow; **Bosc:** green to brown yellow.

In recent months, several residents have expressed concerns that an infusion of solar installations will detract from the town's farming identity. Others are concerned about the effects solar arrays might have on soils, which was mentioned during the public hearing.

"Residents brought a lot of their concerns and asked what our vision is for the future. We always want to have balanced growth in town and not rely on any one type of growth," said Board of Selectmen Chairman Tony Pepe.

Selectmen also discussed with residents their plan to establish a solar study committee to vet all issues and propose bylaw additions to be voted on at town meeting. These could include a potential cap on the number of commercial solar installations allowed in town, a route that has already been chosen in surrounding communities like North Brookfield.

Selectmen expected to vote on the solar study committee at their meeting this week. If formed, the committee would also weigh the financial benefits

of future solar development in town against the drawbacks. The ultimate goal is to form bylaws that represent the town's collective vision for the future.

The estimated annual revenue generated from a PILOT tax agreement with the developer of the McCormick Road proposal is \$100,000 per year over the course of 20-25 years. The estimated new growth revenue is between \$150,000 and \$160,000, with the real estate tax revenue projected to be \$130,000.

The McCormick Road proposal is currently proceeding through the town's permitting stages, and there will likely be additional solar proposals for selectmen to consider elsewhere in town in the coming years.

Meanwhile, at the May 3 annual town meeting, voters overwhelmingly supported a solar project at the landfill. The vote authorized selectmen to execute a lease for 19 acres of land on the capped landfill at 17 South Spencer Road. The goal for town officials is to secure a lease with a commercial developer to install a solar facility at the site.

The lease is eligible to extend to a term of 20 years, if approved by selectmen.





of gold



## 62 Years of Quirks

On Rt. 16 in Mendon 1954, John Quirk Sr. began a business that would become a 62-year legacy, and that legacy is still going strong.

Only two short years after opening its doors on April 17, 1956, the restaurant was one of two businesses to first obtain a liquor license in what was then considered an otherwise "dry town."

Over the years, the restaurant has undergone many additions and improvements, but the one thing that hasn't changed is the original, eclectic décor. Including a 1961 champagne cork from the restaurant's first banquet, a 1901 bicycle that Quirk's

grandfather used to ride in Mendon parades, and family photos and antiques.

Several celebrities, including singer Tina Turner, the band Aerosmith, actor John Ratzenberger, actor Chuck Connors, children's show host Major Mudd, and a performing monkey named Zip have visited the restaurant. Zip wore a tuxedo and bow-tie to order a shrimp cocktail for dinner.

Quirk prides himself in the quality of the food he serves, specifically the steak and prime rib that is cut to order. The Andelman brothers, local food critics from the television show Phantom Gourmet, are regular customers and friends, he said. They have named the restaurant as one of the top five places to go for steak or prime rib.

The restaurant's regulars have been coming "since the first day," Quirk said, and others used to "come here as little kids and now bring their own children here."

After 6 decades in business, a rarity in the restaurant industry, the secret to success is hard work and a strong relationship with the community. New England Steak and Seafood stays connected by donating to Milford Regional Hospital, which it has done every year since it first opened.

"We can't give to everyone," said Quirk, "but we feel like if we give to Milford Regional, we're giving to everyone in the community."

When asked about his long-term goals, Quirk said, "We're just going to keep doing what we're doing," he said, and "hope that we make it another 10 years."

Owning a restaurant "was the biggest gamble a person could make, but sometimes it pays off."
