# Momentum going strong at Water Department

EAST BROOKFIELD – Following a major structural change, the town's Water Department continues to make progress on several projects.

Earlier this year, the East Brookfield Highway and Water Department became two separate entities following a series of retirements, departures, and additions. Among the new hires is Joseph Kenney, the Water Department's new superintendent. He has been pleased with the momentum of his department since the restructuring.

"The separate departments have been beneficial to have a department focused on just the water system," Kenney said. "The EBWD's focus is to continue to comply with the Safe Drinking Water Act and the Department of Environmental Protection's water regulations to distribute safe and clean drinking water."

With stricter state regulations on the books involving microbial contamination, lead and copper, and other contaminates, the Water Department is working hard to maintain compliance with all regulations. Town officials are also making several other changes involv-

 $ing \ the \ water \ system.$ 

Early in 2020, the Water Department will replace all water meters in town. This will allow for more efficient and accurate recording of data, officials said, as well as improved billing.

"The meters will utilize current cellular technology to accurately record and bill water consumption, which will allow the EBWD to develop a fair and equitable rate structure and still allow revenue for large capital projects," Kenney

The meter project is estimated to take about 8-10 months to complete.

Additionally, the town is seeking an engineering firm to assist officials with numerous capital improvement projects that will ensure compliance with DEP regulations.

"One project of particular importance is a greensand filtration plant to filter out iron and manganese from the source well," Kenney told the New Leader. "Iron and manganese is a large problem facing many New England water utilities."

# Education Commissioner tours local schools

NORTH BROOKFIELD – During a recent tour of the school district, a state educational leader and his staff were impressed by several new initiatives.

On Nov. 13, Massachusetts Commissioner of Elementary and Secondary Education Jeffrey Riley visited both schools in the district. Several North Brookfield and local officials were on hand, including Senator Anne Gobi, North Brookfield Public Schools Superintendent Richard Lind, School Committee members, and building principals.

At the first stop of the tour, North Brookfield Junior-Senior High School, Riley was introduced to the school's Edgenuity initiative. Launched this year, the online program allows students to take dual enrollment courses and earn college credits. Nearly 50 students are enrolled in Edgenuity courses, including introduction to business, sociology, psychology, medical terminology, conflict resolution, art history, and digital arts, among others.

Available to juniors and seniors, the online courses are instructed by college professors and other distinguished educators. Students are given 45-minute sessions during the school day to work on their online tasks and seek help from teachers.

"Edgenuity provides our students with great opportunities to seek out challenging, interest-based courses," Lind said.

Riley and Gobi spoke with both school officials and students about their thoughts on the Edgenuity program. Students have enjoyed the many benefits of taking courses that wouldn't otherwise be available in North Brookfield.

Ainsley first learned about RYLA from her sister who participated in the program four years ago. In turn, she now is recommending the program to current Sophomores at her school.



Iron and manganese are naturally occurring minerals found in rocks, soil, surface water, and well water. Higher levels of manganese can have adverse health effects, and Water Department officials are working with the DEP on a plan to lower the manganese concentrations in drinking water.

Officials are also committed to edu-

cating residents on the effects of elevated manganese. To that end, the Water Department has mailed a health advisory notice to residents and posted the document on the town Web site: www. EastBrookfieldMA.us.

The town will also hold continued hearings on the mandated upgrades to the water system. Most recently, officials hosted a public informational forum at a Select Board meeting, as well as an open house at the West Street well site.

During their discussions with Riley and Gobi, students also explained how their feedback is helping to improve the facilitation of Edgenuity at NBJSHS. The program is also being used to expand students' access to advanced placement courses not offered at the school.

# Thanksgiving Leftovers

If the remains of Tom Turkey are still taking up half of your refrigerator space, it's time to use up all the leftover meat pronto or freeze it for future meals. According to the Center of Science in the Public Interest (CSPI), the Thanksgiving turkey can be eaten for four days after cooking. This week's column will spotlight some delicious meals perfect for last minute suppers - or beyond, if you have frozen the left-

If you think hot turkey sandwiches and turkey noodle soup are your only options, read on. With a few extra additions, your post Thanksgiving meals can be as interesting as the memorable main event.

Leftover Turkey and Potato Casserole This scrumptious recipe uses up tur-

key and mashed potatoes, and even that extra can of evaporated milk you have

Ingredients: three tablespoons butter: two tablespoons all-purpose flour: one (5 ounce) can evaporated milk; one cup cold water; one quarter teaspoon salt; one quarter teaspoon pepper; one quarter teaspoon onion powder; one cup cooked, diced turkey meat; one cup shredded cheddar cheese; two cups leftover mashed potatoes two tablespoons butter; one cup finely crushed herb-seasoned dry bread stuffing mix.

Instructions: Preheat oven to 350 degrees. For sauce: Melt three tablespoons butter in a saucepan over low heat. Add flour and stir until mixed. Slowly stir in evaporated milk and

water, then season with salt, pepper and onion powder. Stir over low heat for five minutes; remove from heat. Place turkey in a lightly greased 9 by 13 inch baking dish. Pour sauce over turkey, then sprinkle with cheddar cheese. Spread mashed potatoes

over cheese. Melt two tablespoons butter and add to stuffing mix; sprinkle stuffing over top of casserole. Bake, uncovered, in the preheated oven for 45 minutes.

Cream of Turkey Soup Forget boring clear leftover soups, this one is rich and delicious!

Ingredients: one quart turkey broth; one cup diced, cooked turkey; one half cup diced, cooked carrots (optional); one cup light cream; four tablespoons butter; four tablespoons flour; one quarter teaspoon salt: one eighth teaspoon white pepper; one eighth teaspoon nutmeg or mace; one tablespoon minced parsley or chives

Directions: Melt four tablespoons butter in a large heavy saucepan over moderate heat and blend in four tablespoons flour. Add broth and cream and heat, stirring constantly, until thickened and smooth. Mix in all seasonings, turkey meat and carrots; cover, let mellow over low heat for about ten minutes, Serve hot. Makes about four servings.

Slow Cooker White Turkey Chili

This Mexican crock pot dish that uses up lots of leftover turkey, is an award winning recipe from Mary Torell with the Nebraska Dept of Agriculture.

Ingredients: chopped onion; one cup chopped celery; four cups cooked turkey chopped; two 15.5 ounce cans Northern beans, drained; two 11 ounce cans shoe peg corn, undrained;; one four ounce can chopped green chilies: one quart turkey broth; one half cup mozzarella cheese,

Directions: Place cooked turkey and all other ingredients in a slow cooker. Mix well and cook on low for 6 to 8 hours.

For a thicker sauce, remove the cover for the last hour. Sprinkle with Mozzarella cheese.

Turkey Timer Trivia: Pop up timers have saved many a Thanksgiving turkey from ruin. Have you ever wondered how they work? In case you missed this in a previous column, here's everything you've always wanted to know about the handy plastic pop ups!

A pop up turkey timer is typically comprised of the outside case, a red stick that pops up, a metal spring and a dab of soft metal similar to solder. The soft metal is solid at room temperature and turns to a liquid at about 185 degrees (when a turkey is fully cooked). When the metal melts, it frees the end of the red stick that had been trapped in the metal. The spring pops the red stick up and you know the turkey is done! One little known fact is that these timers are reusable. If you dip the tip in hot water it will remelt the metal and you can push the pop up piece back into the metal. Then let it cool, and the pop-up piece will be back in its original position, ready to use again!





should be kept out of drafts of hot and cold air. Consider moving your plant to an even cooler room at night to extend the bloom time.

Use your finger to monitor soil moisture. Water thoroughly when the potting mix that's just below the soil surface is starting to dry. Pour off any excess water that collects in the saucer, decorative basket or foil wrap. Allowing plants to sit in water leads to soggy soil and the decline of the plant's health and beauty.

Or set the plant on a saucer of pebbles. The excess water will collect in the saucer while the pebbles elevate the pot above the water. You'll reduce the risk of root rot and save time by eliminating the need to pour off this excess water.

Remove any yellow leaves to keep your plant looking its best. Adjust watering frequency and growing conditions if this is a frequent problem. Overwatering or allowing the soil to dry to the point of wilting can cause the leaves to yellow. Low light and drafts of hot and cold air can do the same.

Remove flowers as they fade. Gently twist and pull off or cut spent flower stems back at their base in the foliage. Regular deadheading will increase the number of flowers and length of bloom. With proper care, you will be enjoying flowers for four weeks or more.

Don't be alarmed when the leaves yellow and dry soon after the plant stops flowering. It is entering a natural dormant period. If you like a challenge, try forcing it into bloom a second time.

Simply cut back on watering when you notice the leaves begin to yellow. Then stop watering once all the leaves have dried. Move the plant to a cool dark location for several months. After the rest period, bring your plant out of dormancy and encourage it to bloom. Begin watering, fertilize once new growth appears and place it in a sunny window. Then wait for a beautiful floral display.

# Late-game beroics send Leicester to Gillette Stadium after defeating South Hadley, 28-21

SHREWSBURY — The Leicester High varsity football team had its back against the wall with less than 10 minutes remaining in the fourth quarter. It was fourth-and-16 from South Hadley High's 24-yard line. It was a must score situation due to the Tigers battling back with 14 unanswered points to claim their first lead of the game, 21-14.

The Wolverines called a timeout. What came next was what everyone spectating would call the play of the game — and not just a game, but a Division 7 State Semifinal. Leicester trotted back onto the field, as calm as a team could be in such a crucial situation. The offense set up in a spread formation with quarterback Dan Mero waiting to receive the shogun snap.

A few seconds went by and Mero received the snap cleanly, rocketed a bullet pass to an open Jack O'Neill on a designed inside screen. O'Neill gathered the pass and, instead of running up field like he did so often early on, lateralled the ball backward to a sprinting Bryce Gosselin, who bolted 24 yards into the end zone untouched.

Leicester's completed hook-and-ladder play in the most critical point of the game had it all square at 21-21 following an extra point kick by Nolan Power.

There is nothing in the playbook for when it is fourth and that long, but they executed it," expressed head coach Tim

Griffiths. "We ran a couple slip screens early in the game, so the timing was right and they executed flawlessly — it was pretty cool."

Gosselin, the team's senior running back, added, "We recently started to work on it in practice this week. We have run it in years past, so we know how it goes and what it is about. The timing had to be there and even though we only ran it a few times this week, we nailed it."

The Wolverines carried their momentum onto the defensive side of the ball on South Hadley's next drive. It looked as if the Tigers were going to march down the field and counter with yet another touchdown after obtaining a couple quick first downs, but their drive came to a stall on their 44-yard line. On fourth-and-3, Leicester's defense held to force a turnover on downs with 5:35 left in regulation.

Two minutes later, Mero snuck in from a yard out to give Leicester a one touchdown lead after another Power extra-point. This ended up being the score (28-21) that sent the Wolverines (11-0) to the Division 7 State Super Bowl hosted at Gillette Stadium versus Eastern Mass. champion Abington High (9-2), the South Sectional winners who defeated North region champ Greater Lawrence Tech (7-4) by a 33-22 count in the other state semifinal.

An interception by Jeffrey Puchalski and a few first down runs by Gosselin to

run out the clock clinched the win over South Hadley (8-3) on Saturday, Nov. 23 at Shrewsbury High's David J. Adams Memorial Field at Central One Federal Credit Union Stadium.

"We went deep in the playbook today," Griffiths explained. "I am proud of the kids, so much pressure coming from a small town, same with South Hadley, neither team deserved to lose. Honestly, I feel heartbroken for those kids, because it was just a great high school football game."

Griffiths also added a few words about his senior class: "The expectations were high and to actually achieve them, it is a pretty special group," he said. "Kudos to them and I just go on for the ride, it is

the players and my coaching staff. I am happy for the kids.'


Gosselin ended the game with 107 yards and a touchdown on nine carries and also caught a few passes, including the hook-and-ladder touchdown that sparked his team in the fourth quarter. O'Neill also had himself a game, pacing the offense early on. The senior wideout caught six passes for 150, yards including a 69-yard double-pass touchdown late in the first half.

"This is what we worked for, this whole core group we played AYF together," Gosselin said. "This is where we lost our final game in eighth grade, so we were looking for some revenge and we got it today.'

# Panthers end Tantasqua's journey in Division 4 State Semifinals

WESTWOOD — A total of 19 student-athletes on Tantasqua Regional's varsity football team are seniors, and that particular group has seen plenty of turnover over the course of their four years playing at the Reservation.

During their freshman year, Jon Hargis wasn't a member of the Warriors' coaching staff. Hargis then took over in 2017, but Tantasqua endured a losing season. Last fall, the Warriors made a run to the Central Mass. Division 4 Tournament final, where they lost to Nashoba Regional, 28-0.

And then this season — a special one, to say the least — the 19 seniors had a record of 6-2 in regular season play. Tantasqua then defeated Groton-Dunstable Regional and Fitchburg High in the Central Mass. playoffs for the Sectional title, before embarking on Xaverian Brothers High on Saturday, Nov. 23 in a Division 4 State Semifinal.

There, the Warriors played South Sectional representative Plymouth-South High for a right to play North Sectional champion Melrose High (10-0) at Gillette Stadium for the Division 4 State Championship.

Tantasqua's playoff run ended in Westwood, though, as the Panthers edged the Warriors, 26-14.

We had our opportunities. Couldn't punch it in. A couple of turnovers that hurt us, a couple of penalties as we were driving — but I couldn't be prouder of our kids," said Hargis. "The seniors, being my third year in the program, they've bought in since Day One. When they were sophomores most of them started and we were 3-8. Last vear 7-4, and this year making the State Semifinals."

The Warriors had to punt as they opened the game with the football, but their defense came to play early on. On Plymouth-South's sixth offensive snap, quarterback Hunter Dean dropped back to throw. But Tantasqua's Tyler Hall shot through the gap in the line to pressure the QB. Dean's throw found the hands of the Warriors' Seann Lauritsen, who ran back the interception 30 yards for the touchdown. Jarod Spratt's point after touchdown kick made it 7-0 with 5:50 remaining in the opening quarter.

"Ty did a great job of putting pressure on the quarterback," said Hargis. 'Seann Lauritsen made a nice pick and then returned it to the house. It kind of helped us there because we had to punt on the first drive. That flipped the momentum, so it helped us out a lot."

The Panthers regained the momentum on the final snap of the first quarter when Dean (9 of 16, 114 yards) connected with Hunter Budrow on a 10-yard scoring pass. Tyler Doyle kicked the extra point to even the score at 7-7.

Plymouth-South then grabbed a 13-7 lead on its next possession, finishing it off with 2:24 to go until halftime when Dean barreled into the end zone from a

yard out. Doyle's kick then hit the left

Tantasqua looked to even the score before the half with a touchdown, but a late holding penalty forced the Warriors into attempting a 38-yard field goal. Spratt's boot may have been good from 37 yards, but the ball fell just shy of the crossbar.

"We got a holding call that put us behind the chains. Just probably a foot short on the field goal," said Hargis. "In a game like this, three points goes a long way, especially going into halftime."

The Panthers then padded their lead to 19-7 with 5:42 to play in the third quarter, which came after both teams were forced to punt. Nick Siegelman (26 carries, 104 yards) ran one in from 14 yards out, but Dean's two-point conversion throw fell incomplete.

Tantasqua then embarked on an all-important drive that took 11 plays to traverse 76 yards. Ryan Sears (24 carries, 117 yards) found the end zone from 11 yards out, twisting and spinning through Plymouth-South defenders.

"Sears has been a warrior for us all year," Hargis said of one of the 19 seniors, and one of the four co-captains, along with Liam Gore, Kyle Boone and Noah Galonek. "He's been running the ball, averaged 100 yards every single game, 150 most of the time. He runs the ball hard, physical. He wants to score every single play; you can't ask for any more than that."

Spratt's kick with six seconds to play in the third quarter cut the deficit down to 19-14.

But the Panthers scored next — Cillian Davis scampering in from 3 yards out, and Doyle made the PAT to grab a 26-14 lead with 6:03 to go.

Tantasqua had two more drives, but they couldn't produce any additional points to close the gap.

The Warriors dropped to 8-3 as they wished the Panthers (10-1) well going

'Plymouth-South is a great team. I wish them the best in the States and hopefully they can take it home against Melrose," said Hargis.


