**Town mulls purchase of land at center of cemetery debate**

DUDLEY — As the Town of Dudley awaits a decision by the Zoning Board of Appeals on the fate of the proposed Islamic cemetery on Corbin Road, it appears the town itself may be taking steps to exercise the option of purchasing the property itself if that is a course of action that

voters would like to take. The cemetery, proposed by the Islamic Society of Greater Worcester, has been the focus of much debate over the past few months with many in Dudley, specifically residents of Corbin Road, expressing great concern over how such a project would impact their own properties and the town itself battling accusa-

tions of racially and religiously charged motives for the public going against the project. Despite how the general public may perceive the Town of Dudley, for better or worse, an item added to the town's May 23 Town Meeting warrant may be the first big step in the people taking matters into their own hands to stop a project that has

clearly been unwelcome by the masses. Article 20 on the warrant asks the voters whether or not to authorize the Board of Selectmen to exercise the town's right of first refusal under the provisions of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 61A, Section 14, which would allow the town to be the priority buyer



DUDLEY — The search is on for new families to get involved with a year-long exchange student program with the students preparing to make their trip to the United States for a few months at the end of June.

Hosted through the Education First (EF) Homestay Program, a Boston-based nonprofit, the program brings foreign students from several different countries to the United States to learn English, take cultural classes and embrace the culture of America first hand while also joining a family based in the region for the duration of their stay.

# Higgins embraces the bond of siblings

OXFORD — The Webster Times has featured many different students from Oxford High School in 2016 through the OHS “That’s A Picture!” campaign interview series. The final student of the 15 featured in the campaign was recognized not only for her commitment to her fellow students, but her commitment to her own siblings, as senior Brianna Higgins was named the “good sibling” in the campaign, which focuses on traits and interests that make up the many different college students in the United States.

As a “good sibling,” Brianna Higgins uses her lessons and skills learned as an older sister to help those around her get through their own problems and roadblocks as a leader and mother-like figure. With an older brother, now in college, who taught her the ropes, a younger sister attending Oxford High School as a sophomore and a younger brother in eighth grade preparing to become a freshman, Higgins has a deep bond with her siblings and spoke about their relationship and being part of the “That’s A Picture!” campaign with The Webster Times Staff Writer Jason Bleau.

**Brianna, thanks for sitting down with me today. The first question I have for you is, you have an older sibling and two younger siblings who probably look up to you as a big sister. Can you explain what it’s like having that responsibility to be that role model and even kind of living up to the legacy of your older brother?**

“It is kind of hard because they know I’m not the oldest, but I have to kind of be the boss sometimes. Sometimes they tell me I’m too much of a mom, and it is hard having that responsibility because I don’t want to be too hard on my siblings, I also want to be friends with them and have that relationship.”

**Your younger sister is actually here in high school with you. Talk about what that relationship is like, because when you’re in school it’s probably fun for you to be a senior and to be able to tell her what she can expect as she progresses through each grade.**

“I know sophomore year was really hard for me. I try to motivate her to keep her grades up and I help her with her homework. We do see each other in the hallway from time to time and make weird faces at each other. We actually kind of compare our years. She will tell me what it’s like for her and I’ll tell her what it was like for me. I’ll brief her as to how senior year will be.”

**How do those talks work with your brother who is getting ready to come into the high school as you’re getting ready to leave?**

“He’s always sad that he’s never in school the same time that I am. He

doesn’t really know much about high school and it’s hard to tell if he’s even interested because, well, he’s an eighth grade boy. I try to tell him stuff and we try to have fun with it. I hope he listens to my advice, but I think he is excited.”

**You are a younger sibling, so what was it like coming up in high school while your brother was here, and has that played into how you approach being a similar role model to your younger siblings?**

“I didn’t know any upperclassmen when I came in as a freshman so he was kind of my inside look into things and what it was like in the higher grades. His senior year got me so excited for my senior year and I always kind of looked up to him. Certain things he did I still remember today and I always wanted to be like him or even have my class be like his. After seeing what he was doing I’m trying to get my sister and brother excited for their years too because I want them to look up to me like I looked up to my older brother.”

**Let’s expand the concept that comes with being a “good sibling” for a minute. Obviously you want to be a good leader to your own siblings, but how does that translate into how you treat and work with people outside of your family?**

“I work at a day care, actually, as a counselor, so I think it’s helped shape me to work in that capacity. It’s like I’m also a big sister to them because they ask me for advice, girls ask me about boys, I’ve helped with homework and play games with them and I tell them the dos and don’ts about how you

should behave and what’s rude and what’s not.”

**Is it bittersweet to be graduating while your sister is still in school and your brother getting ready to move up? Are you a little worried about them and how they’ll adapt when you’re gone?**

“I think it really is bittersweet, especially as it gets closer. We’re all really close and we did have a moment, my sister and I, where she was really upset that I’m leaving her. So I’m excited to be graduating, but at the same time it’s a little sad.”

**I think people today can underestimate the significance of a relationship with their siblings and how they’re more than just another person in the household. I know my brother and I personally have had our differences, but we still maintain a good relationship. For you as the “good sibling,” can you speak to how important those relationships are and how people should cherish them?**

“They’re your siblings. You’re bonded to them for life. It’s really important to have that relationship because in the long run you want to know you’re there for each other. I think it really is important. It has shaped me as a person. Having that kind of relationship with my own siblings has helped me be the person I am.”

**Before I let you go — what’s it like to be named the “good sibling” in this campaign?**

“I like it because it lets me know that people see me as that good person that they can have a bond with. I don’t get into fights with people or mess with others. I try to befriend everyone and I just like that people notice that I can be there for them and that I’m there for my siblings too.”

**Well, thank you very much and while it may be bitter sweet, graduation promises to be an exciting day for you and your family. We will see you then.**

## St. Joseph School visits State House

BOSTON — On Thursday, May 12, the fifth through eighth grade students from St. Joseph School in Webster had the opportunity to visit the Massachusetts State House.

Their tour included a visit to the West Wing Plaza where they got to view the bronze statue of John F. Kennedy, the 35th President of the United States; a stop at the State House Women's Leadership Project which depicts several women who had a profound impact on public life before they could testify at legislative hearings, cast a vote, or hold elected office; and, a stop in the Hall of Flags where they reflected on all the Massachusetts soldiers who are honored and remembered there.

The students were fortunate to be joined by Rep. Joseph McKenna and Sen. Ryan Fattman. McKenna spent time with the group in the House of Representatives explaining his role in government as well as the voting process. He also pointed out the Albert Herter murals, "Milestones on the Road to Freedom," the names on the ceiling cornice that commemorate men who made important contributions to the commonwealth, and the famous Sacred Cod, which symbolizes the importance of the fishing industry in the early Massachusetts economy.

Fattman was equally generous with his time. He escorted the students onto the balcony located at the front

of the State House where they had the opportunity to view the Public Gardens and the Boston skyline. In addition, he shared the history of the Senate Reception Room, which included pointing out the paintings of former Senate presidents, and the famous "Teagle." While inside the Senate Chambers, Sen. Fattman noted that they were directly under the gold dome of the State House. He also shared personal stories regarding the history of his seat and how the saying, "Tied up in red tape" came about. Senator Fattman and Rep. McKenna also treated the students to lunch.

One highlight of the day was the opportunity for the students to sit

in the Senate Public Gallery and listen to hearings on The Transgender Bathroom Bill in Massachusetts. During that time, the students were recognized by Senator Fattman and received a round of applause from all the Massachusetts Senators who were present. However, the most exciting part of the day was meeting Governor Charlie Baker. The governor greeted the students, asked several questions about their school and asked that they say the name of Webster Lake, Lake Chaggogaggogmanchaggaggogchounagungamaugg. He then posed for a very memorable picture with the students.

The field trip ended with a Boston Harbor Cruise. While cruising the Harbor, the Saint Joseph Students saw the USS Constitution, Bunker Hill Monument, the site of the Boston Tea Party, and the Old North Church. It was definitely a memorable day!

The projects lead to learning personal leadership of their peers. It’s a multi-layered approach to raising children.”

The importance of an Eagle Scout project is for the boys to learn what it takes to put together a project, see the behind the scenes activities and bring a project to fruition.

“This project is important to Nate for his own personal reasons and it’s a way for him to bring that knowledge and passion to others,” concluded Simoneau. “They’re all good kids. They’re all looking for their way in life and we try to provide them with as many opportunities as we can. He has some ideas as to where he’s heading and he’s learned a lot of skills related to working with his peers. He’s become an effective leader within the troop.”

The Wildflower Pollination Project was an idea Elliott came up with when he learned that many “bee-friendly” home gardens were filled with a class of pesticides that can kill bees and other pollinators. With a growing international concern for the honey bee population, Elliott felt it was a great project to help the community.

Olivia Richman sat down with the Eagle Scout hopeful to discuss his time as a Boy Scout and the importance of helping out the community.

#### What is your Eagle Scout Project?

“We are making a pollination garden for the bees. It’s made out of non-GMO plants, no nicotine and stuff that would

kill the bees. Forty percent of all plants now have these chemicals in them, which is harming bee populations.”

#### How did you decide on this project?

“We talked to the ranger here, Jamie, and she gave us a couple of options, like building stairs down by the beach area. I just thought this option would be the best. I like planting stuff so I thought it was better for me than building stairs.”

#### How did you like working at Buffumville?

“It’s pretty cool. It’s a nice place to walk and play Frisbee.”

#### What is the importance of this garden to you?

“Since 40 percent of plants have these chemicals, it doesn’t just stop one at one generation. It happens over each generation of plants. The world needs bees to pollinate or else no plants will grow.”

#### When did you start the project?

“Probably since last November, including all the planning. We came a couple days before and tilled it. We can’t use machinery and stuff. So we did that before everyone arrived today.”

#### How many hours have you put into the project?

“It’s hard to say. Maybe with planning, 12 to 15 hours.”

What is the importance of completing an Eagle Scout project in your community?

“It leaves an everlasting impact on the community for generations to come. You can come back at it later in life and see how it affected the area and the community.”

#### What made you want to become an Eagle Scout?

“It looks really good on your résumé. I just enjoyed being a Boy Scout. I liked camping. Camping is really fun. I like being outside.”

#### What appealed to you about being a Boy Scout?

“I’ve been in Boy Scouts since 2011. I was a Cub Scout since first grade. I didn’t really like Cub Scouts because there was no camping and a lot more supervision.”

#### What have you enjoyed about the experience?

“You make a lot of new friends and learn a lot of new skills, like cooking and other real world skills.”

#### How do you feel now that the project is complete?

“I feel pretty good. We’ll come back to maintain it to see how it turned out and keep watering it, but it will be done today.”

#### What’s next for you?

## Monthly real estate market update

The market is continuing on a positive note this year, which has been a very nice change from years past. There are still concerns that with this being an election year and with interest rates expected to rise, that we will see a negative impact to our real estate market.

Locally, we have not seen any negative effects yet. If we compare the first four months of this year to the same period last year for Worcester County, all the numbers are positive.

The average days to receive an offer has lowered over 15 percent from 90 days to 76 days. This has largely been impacted by the low inventory of homes for sale and the low interest with fear of rising interest rates causing people to jump on the homes quicker. The average sales price has risen about 2 percent from \$264,886 to \$270,164, which is in line with what the National Association of Realtors predicted of a 5 percent increase in prices Nationally this year. Sales are up 30 percent from the same period last year from 1534 sales to 1993 sales. We have seen that the inventory of homes coming on market is not able to keep up with the demand for homes. Many sellers are waiting to sell because there are no homes on the market, which is causing inventory to stay low.

Not every home is selling within a couple days with multiple offers. If all the repairs have been done to the home, it

has been staged properly, priced at a fair market price and has a great online presence those homes are selling quickly and at a premium. However, if a home needs work, doesn’t show well or is overpriced buyers are still overlooking

it and sitting back waiting for another home to come on the market. I think this is due to our busy society and most people don’t have time to make repairs or the extra money to make the repairs. If they do buy the home with needed repairs they are asking for a huge discount on the home.

My advice for buyers in this market is to be willing to look at those homes that need repairs and get contractor estimates to know what you are getting into. Candidates in our community are gearing up for Election Day. Just as they are hoping for a good voter turnout, Stonebridge Press wants to hear from you. Who do you support in your town's upcoming election? Why? What issue is most important to you?

Our Election Letters Policy is as follows:

Absolutely no anonymous Sound Offs may be submitted in endorsement of any candidate for political office. Any mention of a political candidate and/or issues he or she has addressed, and any election-related matter, must be done in a signed Letter to the Editor.

While space dictates how many letters are published in each issue, prompt submission will increase the likelihood of inclusion. In other words, writers are advised not to wait until two weeks before an election to submit a letter.

For Dudley election letters, the last edition including political letters will be the Friday, June 3 Webster Times. Dudley letters must be received by the editor no later than 12 p.m. Thursday, May 26, at 5 p.m. No Dudley election letters will be published in the Friday, June 10 edition.

All letters must be signed, with a place of residence and phone number supplied for verification if needed. Failure to include any of that informa-

tion could result in your letter not being published.

All letters must be free of personal attacks and libelous remarks. Letter writers are encouraged to remain focused on endorsing a candidate, and to refrain from commenting negatively about opponents. Failure to follow that guideline could result in rejection of a letter to the editor.

Letters should not be written as though to a particular individual (for example: "Your decision was wrong. You should not act in that way."). Refer to individuals by name, and then by "he" or "she" or "they" in subsequent references.

For election-related letters only, there is a 500-word limit, and all submissions will be published as space is available.

Any candidates for office will be allowed one letter to introduce themselves and their candidacy. Candidates will not be allowed to submit any other election-related letters.

The editor reserves the right to edit any and all submissions at his discretion. When possible, attempts will be made to allow the letter writer to rewrite, but the final decision rests with the editor.

No "Your Turn" columns will be accepted as candidate endorsements.

The editor reserves the right to refuse a submission if it does not meet any of the aforementioned guidelines for publication. The editor may otherwise edit or reject a letter at his discretion.

There are a lot of important issues facing every town this year and you deserve a say in them. You'll get one chance at the polls on Election Day. You have another chance on our Op/Ed pages.

## Updated headlights law

The expanded use of headlights law took effect in April of 2015 and it impacted all drivers on Massachusetts roadways. Chapter 481 of the acts of 2014 made changes requiring the use of lights on vehicles at specific times. Since the effective date, many drivers have complied

while others have been slower to come around. I was asked to provide a reminder of the provisions of this law.

The rules governing headlight use are contained in several sections of the law. Headlights (as well as taillights) are to be used on a motor vehicle "during the period from one half after sunset to one half hour before sunrise, and during any other period when visibility is reduced by atmospheric conditions so as to render dangerous further operation without lights being displayed." The change to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 85 Section 15 requires both headlights and taillights to be used when, "visibility is reduced such that persons or vehicles on the roadway are not clearly discernible at a distance of 500 feet or when the vehicle's windshield wipers are needed." A violation can result in a civil fine of \$5. Although the fine appears small, it is a surchargeable violation for insurance purposes.

Many newer vehicles are equipped with running headlights that are activated at all times during operation. Although this is good, it is necessary to activate the vehicle taillights as well in order to be in compliance with the law. This is a good law, which enables drivers to see other vehicles easier when weather conditions are a factor. Police officers realize it does take some driver's time to adjust to these regulations. Since it has been in effect for over a year now, we hope all drivers will do their best to be in compliance. Similar laws exist in other states, so this is not a unique situation. By using lights, there is a greater likelihood of your vehicle being noticed sooner. Your cooperation can result in safer driving habits and a reduction in accidents and injuries.

However, over the last 10 years, he lost interest. I'm not sure why. I assume it was just that his attention was drawn elsewhere as life got busier and busier. We'll see if anything comes of them. We even got a couple pepper seedlings and a potato seed given to us from a friend. I think I'll plant those just out of curiosity off to the side and see what happens. We planted seeds in a starter greenhouse a few weeks ago and have witnessed them grow into small plants. As I type this, I can reach out and feel the soft leaves of my future zucchini plants. The kids have gotten a kick out of watching them grow little by little, from when they first sprouted out of the soil to becoming the baby plants they are now. We even had a few extra spaces left in the greenhouse, so we planted a couple "magic beans" — shiny rocks that my son found in the front yard.

I suppose that will be half the fun of creating this garden, making it a fun, educational experience for my kids. I mean, yes, hopefully, we will get some nice, fresh vegetables later this summer, and hopefully some to share with others, but getting the kids involved will be a learning experience not only for them, but for me, as well. I have never tended a garden before, so I am learning everything all over again myself. As the weeks and months go on, and I figure out what works and what doesn't, I will get a feel for how to create the best garden possible for that spot, and return it to its former glory.

## How to keep your portfolio healthy

If you have a medical appointment this week, you might want to wish your nurse a happy National Nurses Week. This annual event is designed to celebrate the important role nurses play in health care. Diversify. Rebalancing is import-

ant. But a balanced portfolio should also be a diversified portfolio. If you only owned one type of financial asset, such as U.S. growth stocks, you could take a big hit during a market downturn. But different types of financial assets don't always

move in the same direction at the same time, so by owning a wide variety of investments — U.S. stocks, international stocks, government securities, corporate bonds, real estate, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on — you may help reduce the effects of market volatility on your portfolio. Keep in mind, though, that diversification by itself can't guarantee profits or protect against loss.

Maintain realistic expectations. If you expect the financial markets to always move upward, you will be disappointed many times. Market downturns are a normal part of the investment process, and they will always be with us. Once you accept this reality, you will be less likely to make questionable decisions, such as abandoning a long-term strategy. If you've designed an appropriate strategy, possibly with the help of a financial professional, you can stick with it through all market environments.

By following the suggestions mentioned above — staying invested, rebalancing your portfolio as needed, diversifying your holdings and maintaining realistic expectations, you can go a long way toward maintaining the fitness of your financial situation.

It took a lot of patience to call a bird into the decoys during the final days of the season, with the best hunting from 9:00 am. till noon. Some turkey hunters will still have the opportunity to harvest one bird of either sex bird during the fall season.

Although some hunters did not bag a single bird, many had a great time in the outdoors watching numerous forms of wildlife. One local hunter reported watching two big snapper turtles fighting or engaging in the turtle ritual prior to laying their eggs. Large snapper turtles will be on the move in the next few weeks trying to locate a good spot to lay their eggs. Parents should be on the alert for a turtle encounter if they live near a river or



The invasion of the gypsy moth caterpillar has started in the Valley and they have already defoliated numerous trees in the area. One local resident of Uxbridge had the nasty little caterpillars crawling on his arm as he sat outdoors under an oak tree last weekend. Although they are very small now they will soon be crawling all over local back yards and on trees. Together with tent caterpillars, mosquitoes and black flies, hornets, horseflies, ticks, etc., they should do their best to make life miserable for local residents this summer.

Local trout anglers are enjoying some great spring fishing locally. As the state starts to wind down their 2016 trout stocking season at the end of the month, anglers should enjoy some great trout fish-

ing through out the summer months. Finding the deep holes that support trout throughout the summer months can have an angler catching some impressive trout. Boaters have a great advantage over shore fishermen as the can easily locate trout with their fish finders. Cape ponds are also a great place to catch hold-over lunker trout during the summer months. The Quabbin Reservoir and Wachusett Reservoir are also providing some great fishing.

Many anglers have complained about the poor taste of stocked trout by the state and private vendors. I too have noticed the difference in taste and no longer eat them. Catching holdover trout that have been feeding on insects and small fish can have you enjoying the taste of trout again. It must be something in the pellets of food that they feed the fish today to make them grow rapidly, but the sweet taste of trout has been sacrificed. Tautog fishing has been improving in Rhode Island waters and fluke fishing is about to break wide open in the next couple of weeks. Again, it has been a crazy spring. Most anglers thought that fishing was going

to be early this year due to the unusually warm winter, but the up and down temperatures of March, April and May have slowed the fishing season on all fronts. Farmers are also having a hard time with their crops with numerous farmers complaining about the loss of peaches and strawberries this year due to the warm and then cold temperatures.

Take a kid fishing and keep them rods bending!

## Get your green thumbs ready

There is nothing better than fresh veggies.

Whether you go to your local farmers market or grow your own, you can taste the quality and hard work that went into making these delicious foods so fresh. One of the most important types of food you can put into your body are vegetables. They are super high in vitamins and minerals and fiber and so many other amazing nutrients that our bodies need to function. Dark leafy greens like spinach, kale, broccoli, Swiss chard, etc., are very high in iron, vitamin K, and calcium. Protein is necessary for healthy muscles, bones, skin, and blood. Some vegetables that are highest in protein are beans, peas, mushrooms, artichokes, spinach, sprouts, etc. The list goes on, both fruits and veggies are as important to our body's function as water!

So with the weather finally getting warmer and now that the rain has finally subsided I challenge you to get into the garden and start planting. Typically I would suggest starting your garden in containers inside at the end of winter, but if you're a procrastinator like me, we get motivated once the weather gets warmer. There is still time and there is still hope. Once you know for sure there will not be another freeze (which in New England is hard to predict) you can get outside and till your soil and get ready to plant. The best way to have a successful garden is to make sure it is planted correctly. Make sure you have a good soil base and use good fertiliz-

er or compost. Make sure your garden gets plenty of sunlight and have steady access to water. Pick seeds that will thrive in your area and can grow quickly. Some great choices for the beginner are, salad greens, green beans, tomatoes, eggplant, squash, and cucumber. Mint is also fail proof.

I can't tell you how many mint plants I have killed and they mysteriously come back to life. I will warn you though, that if you plant mint make sure it's in a contained area because it will spread like wild fire, you will only have to plant it once and you will have it forever. I do have to say though that as it comes up in the spring and any time you mow your lawn, everything will smell amazing!

As you plant, make sure that you plant your seeds only a couple of inches down and make sure you spread them out far enough away from each other that they can thrive individually. Fertilize, water, adequate light, and patience. Before you know it you will have a garden.

If you start them in the house, one of the most inexpensive ways to do it is starting your seeds in an egg carton. This is such a fun project for kids as well, they will be able to cultivate their own garden and this will not only be a lesson that will stay with them, but they will also be more inclined to eat the veggies because they grew them

themselves, and they are proud of it. Take a cardboard egg carton and cut the top off. Poke a small drainage hole in the bottom of each egg cradle and use the top as a tray for draining. Let me stress that this will leak so either use Styrofoam or make sure you have

a plastic case underneath. Have your kids scoop soil into each cradle only about halfway, place a few seeds in the center of each then cover with more soil to the top. Water until moist and place in a sunlit window. Within a week you should see a sprout. Once the sprouts reach about 2 inches transplant to your garden. If you used cardboard you can transfer them, egg crate and all, because the cardboard is biodegradable.

"Farmers Table"

Ingredients:

1 lb. ground sausage browned and drained

1 1/2 c beef broth

However much of the following diced veggies you would like

Summer squash

Green pepper

Green onion

Zucchini

Tomatoes (really good with either cherry tomatoes or sun dried)

Grain of your choice cooked- Whole-wheat pasta, quinoa, brown rice...

Directions: Return cooked sausage to

a pan, add in beef broth, and bring to a simmer

Once simmering add green onion and peppers

Once peppers soften add remaining veggies

Bring back to simmer and once the veggies are cooked to your desired firmness

Spoon over grain

## God the gardener

Spring has many alluring aspects. Trees unfold their leaves and perennial plants and shrubs begin to flower. Lush grass emerges to replace the barrenness of late winter and the earth becomes verdant like an unfurled carpet. Seeds ordered during winter's fury now anxiously await planting in the soil of local gardens. The earth is alive with beauty and the dormancy of winter a distant memory.

Some rather disagreeable distinctives are part of spring also, most notably the revival of allergies. Pollen permeates the air and meteorologists now rate its daily impact on people plagued with hypersensitivity to this springtime nemesis. The season everyone longs for is occasionally the season many people dislike.

The origin of the seasons, with their blessings and curses, can be traced back to the period of creation as described in Genesis 1-2. God the Creator fashioned and formed the earth, providing a clear picture to readers of the biblical account of His role as the Architect of the earth and all that is in His masterful design. Such handiwork is often described in agricultural terms. One such description in Genesis 2:8 is reminiscent of spring. There, we read that God planted a garden in Eden.

In the most simplistic manner possible, the Bible reveals God as a gardener. How many times have you heard God described as a gardener? I have preached thousands of sermons and

have presented God to people in a variety of ways — as father, judge, potter, redeemer and friend. But never have I preached nor heard a sermon where God is described as a gardener. Nor have I thought of Him that way until recently.

How opportune to encounter early in the biblical story a picture that helps people figure out who this God truly is. To a society that devalues and distorts God, the writer of the book Genesis provides a very clear picture of God. This is especially helpful for people who easily and quite often misunderstand God or deem God irrelevant. To all mankind, God reveals himself as a gardener.

Have you ever considered what such an identity of God might mean to you or to the world around you? God is not first described as a warrior or a judge, a tyrant or a monarch. God is first declared to be a gardener, a designer and planter, a nurturer of all life, a protector and a pruner, concerned with every aspect of creation, especially the welfare of mankind. As someone said, God is concerned with "life's flourishing."

This, of course, is in contrast to humankind. People seldom delight in dirty hands, or face the task of pruning or weeding with much joy. Even the work of sowing can be toilsome. Yet

God invests Himself into the life he plants, giving special attention to the abundance of every living person. His desire is for people to be fruitful as we journey through life. 

WEBSTER — The Millbury High varsity baseball team out-hit Bartlett High, 8-2, which led the Woolies past the Indians, 6-2, in a game played last Friday, May 13.

The loss dropped the Indians' record down to 2-8, as they still have an outside chance of qualifying for the Central Mass. Division 4 district tournament should they go on a lengthy winning streak to close out the regular season.

"We're happy to jump out to an early lead, but we want to keep the pressure on the defense and continue to extend that lead," said Bartlett head coach Jon Way. "We shot ourselves in the foot on our own rally a couple times, getting picked off with base running mistakes. Against good teams, that's going to bite you. We can play with anybody — if we get the bats going and play solid defense, we can play with anybody."

Ryan Ward led the Woolies at the plate, batting 3 for 4 with a pair of triples and a double. Just behind Ward was Evan Daly, who went 2 for 3 with a single, double and two RBIs.

Junior center fielder Will Cronan and junior first baseman Jacob Rankovic each posted a single for Bartlett. Cronan and sophomore designated hit-

ter Justin Daab each recorded an RBI for the Indians.

Starting on the mound for the Woolies, lefty Matt Huban claimed the win, pitching five innings and allowing two runs on two hits. Huban had two strikeouts. Coming in to close for Millbury in the sixth inning was right-hander Gil Picard, who notched three strikeouts.

Freshman Jonathan Truscott threw for Bartlett and had two strikeouts.

"Ward was a phenomenal hitter," said Truscott, his biggest pest at the dish. "We need to minimize our errors in the field. So far this season, that has been costing us a couple runs. That's a key turning point of the game. We can hold with any of these teams in the league. All it takes is a couple errors and it's all over."

After a quick two innings for both teams, the Indians jumped out to an early 2-0 lead in the bottom of the third. With the bases loaded, Cronan chopped a grounder to the gap between shortstop and third base for an RBI single. Daab followed with a sacrifice line drive to left field to score the second run.

Millbury was quick to respond, though, trimming the deficit down to one run in the top of the fourth before taking the lead in the fifth.

First, in the fourth, Ward hit a triple to deep center field. Bob

Picard hit him home with a single to right field. The Indians then turned a double play at second base to end the inning.


But, in the fifth frame, the Woolies scored another two runs to take a 3-2 lead. With runners on first and third, junior shortstop Anthony Grzembki made a big play on an infield grounder for Bartlett, looking back both the runners to prevent any advancing and getting the second out of the inning at first base. Millbury refused to look back from there, adding three more runs to expand out to the 6-2 final.



OXFORD — If Oxford High varsity softball coach Jamie Hetherman could sum up sophomore Candice Nelson's nine strikeout performance against David Prouty Regional last Tuesday, May 10, he would say that she was in

"total control."

"Candice's performance today on the mound was the best I've seen her pitch since last year," added Hetherman. "She had a good fastball and outstanding changeup. She took her time."

Nelson's stellar effort in the circle was backed by a powerful 11-hit explosion by the Lady Pirates' offense in a 12-5 Southern Worcester County League victory against the Panthers (2-8).

Junior Olivia Fahey started off the Panthers' offense with a bunt single to the catcher and advanced to second on a passed ball. After Nelson retired Rachel Tebo for her first strikeout of the day, sophomore Michelle Lamothe singled into center field to bring in Fahey to give David Prouty the 1-0 lead.

However, the Lady Pirates did not let the Panthers enjoy their lead for long. In the home half of the first frame, Oxford took advantage of early defensive woes committed by Prouty. After senior Stephanie Nelson safely reached first on a drop-third strike, junior Karlie Parmenter rocketed an RBI double into the right field gap that allowed Nelson to plate the tying run.

After Candice Nelson retired the Panthers in order to begin the second, David Prouty's defense committed two costly errors that allowed the Pirates to push their lead to 3-1. The second baseman misplayed a ground ball that allowed freshman Hannah Buxton to safely reach first, who then put herself into scoring position at third after junior Amanda Fradsham's sacrifice bunt. Candice Nelson helped herself out with a sacrifice fly ball to left field that brought in the go-ahead run and gave Oxford the 2-1 edge. With the lead now in Oxford's corner, senior Nicole Grady plated the third Pirates' run as she beat the tag of junior catcher Jillian Roy on sophomore Nicole Bergeron's infield single to second.

Over the course of the third and fourth frames, Candice Nelson allowed David Prouty just one hit and struck out three to hold the Pirates' lead at 3-1. With the defense backing Candice Nelson, it was evident that communication amongst the team was a strength for the Pirates.

"They're getting more and more deep into the game — knowing where to go, where to back up bases," explained Hetherman. "It's just about getting more knowledge of the game."

However, the fifth inning proved to be troublesome for Oxford as the Panthers got to Candice Nelson for three runs in the fifth to regain the 4-3 lead.

The Panthers' bats came alive as the inning began with back-to-back singles from Olivia Fahey and Lily Fahey. Oxford had yet to record an out as Candice Nelson surrendered a run on a wild pitch that put the score within one. She then fanned the next two batters and nearly got out of the inning, but Oxford's lone error on Lamothe's ground ball to third cost the Pirates two more runs. Lamothe put the Panthers in position to take a two-run lead after she stole third, but a fly ball concluded the inning with David Prouty now ahead, 4-3.

But the Panthers' comeback came to screeching halt as Oxford's bats exploded for a combined nine runs over the fifth and sixth innings. Oxford put the game away in the fifth inning as they pieced together a five-run attack on David Prouty.

The comeback started with consecutive singles from Stephanie Nelson and senior Sarah Keohane to put runners on first and second with one out. Senior Kayla Soto then brought in Stephanie Nelson on an RBI double into the left field gap to square the game at 4-4. Fradsham then snuck a one-out single through the left side that allowed the

Even though David Prouty was down four runs as they entered the sixth, the Panthers continued to battle. In an effort to put runners at second and third, Soto spoiled Alivia Lamoureux's attempt to steal as she successfully fired the ball down to second for the first out of the inning. With Brooke Pepin on third after she advanced on two passed balls, she plated the fifth Panthers run on a ground ball from Victoria Bain to put the score at 8-5.

Oxford then put the game out of reach in the sixth with an additional four runs. The ninth and 10th Oxford runs were plated on RBI singles from Keohane and Fradsham with the final two runs coming at the expense of a dropped fly ball. David Prouty had one final opportunity to put some more runs on the board, but two ground balls and a pop up sealed the 12-5 win for the Lady Pirates.

If there were certain aspects of the game that first-year Panther head coach Cricket Bolduc would pinpoint as certain aspects to work on, she said it was the team's countless errors and getting hits when they were needed.

"I would say that we are trying to minimize our errors. We're also continuously trying to hit, hit, hit and improve that," she said. "Which we are and we are slowly improving."

As for the Pirates, the team proved that they could notch hit after hit when they were most needed, which pleased Hetherman.

"It's been a real slow start for us offensively," said Hetherman, as his team improved to 3-6. "It was good to see the girls swing the bat and come up with some big hits. It just looked like they had a lot of fun out there today. We're on our way."

SHREWSBURY — A strong wind consistently blew out toward Shrewsbury High's right field fence on Monday, May 16, and the Shepherd Hill Regional varsity softball team certainly took advantage of it. The Rams slugged six home runs — three off the bat of freshman pitcher Cayley Fagan — as they won a 15-10 decision.

Shepherd Hill improved to 9-5 and needs one more win to qualify for the Central Mass. Division 1 district tournament, while the Colonials dropped to 11-5.

"We're the team no one's going to want to play," Ram assistant coach Bob Lane said, citing the team's offensive prowess. "We can hit."

Fagan finished 4 for 4 with 5 RBIs and

fellow freshman Keely Scotia batted 3 for 4 — including a homer — with a pair of RBI. The two hit in the eight and nine spots for the Rams, indicating that the team is loaded with powerful bats.

"They can smash the ball," Lane said of the underclassmen.

Fagan credited her homers to the wind and the pitching speed of Shrewsbury starter Emma Lacasse — "the wind definitely helped but when she's fast you can put more power into it so it goes further," she said — but her shots cleared the fence by a wide margin.

Scotia hit her homer in the top of the sixth after Fagan had gone yard twice and seniors Molly Hennessey and Logan Filo-Loos had also hit homers, so she was "hoping so" that she could join the home run club.

"They're hitting home runs, I need to

get mine in," added Scotia of her first career blast at any level of softball.

Shepherd Hill began the home run parade in the top of the first inning when Hennessey (3 for 5, 5 RBI) blasted a shot to center field that would have cleared the fence with no aiding wind. Hennessey's first career homer gave the Rams a 3-0 lead before Fagan launched her first — a solo shot — in the second to make it 4-0. It was Fagan's first homer at the varsity level.

Shrewsbury scored three runs in the bottom of the third but The Hill responded by getting those three back in the fourth. Fagan started the rally with another solo homer to right field and Filo-Loos (3 for 4, walk, 2 RBI) followed with a two-run shot that right fielder Gianna Simone nearly tracked down before running out of real estate and colliding with the fence.

Simone took her frustration out on the softball the next inning, though, getting a pair of runs back for her team with a two-run homer to cut the deficit down to 7-5. It was the Colonials' lone home run, while Shepherd Hill wasn't done yet.

Scotia made it a 9-5 game in the top of the sixth with her two-run homer and Hennessey drove in two more by hitting another ball over the right field fence — this one a ground rule double — before she scored on a wild pitch.

With the score a comfortable 12-5 lead for the Rams, Fagan put the game away with a three-run homer to center.

"It releases the pressure a little bit," said Fagan of she and her teammates hitting so many home runs.

Fagan also tried to not let the wind bother her pitching performance, stating, "You just can't worry about it, you have to push through."

Fagan added that the wind can also help with pitching effective changeups, and those off-speed pitches led to her striking out five Shrewsbury batters.

The Colonials scored five runs in the bottom of the seventh to turn a 15-5 game into a 15-10 score, but it wasn't enough as The Hill now hopes to clinch a district berth.

"I said, 'This is a district team and if we don't beat ourselves we'll be in districts,'" Lane said to the team before the season began.

When asked how the Rams have turned a 4-16 season last spring into a potential playoff-bound club this year, Lane, filling in for second-year head coach Donny Loos because of business commitments, said that contributions have come from all over the roster.

"The juniors that became seniors and the freshman have obviously played better than we expected," he said. "We were hoping that they'd contribute, and they have. We have a nice mixture of youth and seniors."

"Our team has come a long way and we have more to come," added Scotia.

Although they didn't knock any over the fence, Shepherd Hill's Sophia Sciarappa (3 for 5) and Amanda Lane (2 for 5) had multi-hit games as the team combined for 19 base knocks.

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# Appraising your antiques

I often get called by people asking to have their items appraised. Often people don't really need an appraisal because their ultimate goal is to sell their items. There are many cases where an appraisal is needed though.

Most of the work we do is for attorneys or estate representatives (formerly called executors) who require a written appraisal for probate and/or tax purposes. Items are inventoried, photographed and assigned a value. A report is then created that can be used by the attorney, Internal Revenue Service and other parties that require it.

There are other times when a more informal and less expensive option is adequate. For example, there may be siblings who want to know the value of some of the items in an estate. They want to make sure that one heir isn't getting a piece worth \$50,000 while another is getting items worth \$2,000. A verbal appraisal is typically fine for an appraisal for equitable distribution of personal property.

If you have valuable home furnishings or an important collection an insurance appraisal is advisable. Many

people with a large amount of personal property may not be able to remember everything they had in the event of a fire or other disaster. Even if you do have an inventory, that may also be destroyed. Having your items appraised by an independent appraiser and sending that appraisal to your insurance company can help ensure that you are able to get adequate compensation in the event of a catastrophe.

When looking for an appraiser, you want to find one who has knowledge in the area you require. For example, I wouldn't appraise the contents of a power plant. I don't have the knowledge of heavy machinery that would be needed to evaluate that type of equipment. On the other hand, the heavy equipment appraiser typically won't have the knowledge of antiques necessary to do estate appraisals.

An appraiser's report should meet USPAP (Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice) standards. The Appraisal Foundation sets standards for appraisals. Make sure that when you hire an appraiser their report will be USPAP compliant.

I had a client recently hire me to view items that he was considering selling when he was moving from his home. They had been in his family

for many years but he no longer wanted them and planned to part with them. He just wanted to be certain that he didn't sell something for \$200 that was worth \$5,000. The verbal appraisal didn't turn up anything of particularly high value but the client said that he has the piece of mind knowing that he didn't sell a family heirloom for a fraction of its worth.

There are many times when I advise clients not to pay for an appraisal. If we are taking their items to auction we do research, when necessary, while cataloguing their personal property. Also, the competitive bidding at an auction ensures that their items will sell for fair market value. When running an estate sale, items are also evaluated before being priced and an appraisal isn't required.

## Dudley considering land purchase amid cemetery talks

of the property, made up of three separate parcels, if the opportunity arises.

The Islamic Society of Greater Worcester currently has a purchase agreement on the property, which is zoned residential and would require a special permit for the cemetery project to go through. The public hearing concerning the permit lasted several months and in April the hearing closed with the Zoning Board of Appeals yet to make a decision on the application. Complaints of groundwater contamina-

tion, traffic and the impacts it would have on nearby properties have dominated the public's outcry against the project while those who have defended it have pleaded with the people of Dudley to allow them the opportunity to become a part of the community.

Currently the property is enrolled in state Chapter 61A, a reduced property tax classification for agricultural properties as the land used to act as a farm. The Board of Selectmen must approve a request from the land's owner to waive the town's right of first refusal, but the approval of the article at town meeting would have the town act on it's right of first

refusal instead, giving Dudley the opportunity to match any offer on the property.

"This is not guaranteed that we can do this, but if we can we want to have the authority from the townspeople to do it. We want to be able to do it if the opportunity presents itself," said Dudley Selectman Paul Joseph during a May 3 joint meeting between the Board of Selectmen and Finance Committee. "We can't put a specific dollar because that handcuffs our ability to negotiate. We don't want to get locked in to a figure until we know what's available. We don't know that right now."

Joseph said he feels this is

a good first step for the town to exercise its options if the need arises. With the public clearly not being in favor of the cemetery selectmen believe this to be one of the few ways the taxpayers can prevent the project from happening if it is truly what the town wants to do. Selectman Steven Sullivan said he agrees with allowing the public the chance to have a say on this option.

"I wholeheartedly support this article. I think it's the right thing to do. If we get it offered to us I think it's something I hope the town's people support. It's a hot button issue. If it gets defeated I'd rather have 5,000 people show up and lose than

five people show up and win," said Sullivan, who also put to rest rumors that the town has already saving up money for the purchase noting that this is in fact not the case.

The Zoning Board of Appeals was set to discuss the cemetery application on May 5, however the meeting was canceled due to the board failing to properly advertise the meeting and the agenda. Dudley's Annual Town Meeting will be held at Shepherd Hill Regional High School on May 23, at 7 p.m.

## Exchange program seeking families to host students

from France, Spain, China and Hong Kong will need temporary homes for their stay, with anyone from within the region willing to serve as transportation and to assimilate the student into their home life able to apply. The requirements of being a host family simply state that the family pass a background check, provide references, which are contacted and treat the child as if they war truly a member of the family.

"If we have enough families in a certain area then we can provide a bus to bring them to the school," Sullivan said.

"They can share a room with a host family child as long as boys are with boys and girls are with girls and they have their own bed."

Sullivan said the students are kept busy with trips, activities and learning opportunities for the duration of their stay. Many of the students will remain in the region from the end of June until the middle or end of August with Sullivan hoping to have families set and in place for the students' arrivals at the end of next month within the next few weeks.

As for why the students are coming to the Untied States, Sullivan called it a learning opportunity and also a cultural opportunity as many of these

students come from countries where English as a second language is essential for them to succeed in their everyday lives and there's no better way to perfect the language than to learn from those who speak it every day.

"They're here to improve their English speaking skills and to experience the American family way of life. Most European countries start speaking or learning English as soon as they start school and for them to get really good jobs in their countries they need to speak the language fluently. This is very beneficial to them in that aspect. I've had a very good success rate of matching students with families," Sullivan said.

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

### LEGAL NOTICE

**To our patients, their families, and the communities we serve:**

As part of St. Elizabeth's Medical Center (SEMC)'s commitment to patient privacy and the security of patient information, we wanted to make you aware of a recent incident at the American College of Cardiology Foundation (ACCF) that impacted the personal information of 133 patients who received cardiovascular care at SEMC before 2011 (when SEMC was part of Caritas Christi Health Care).

#### WHAT HAPPENED?

Like hundreds of other hospitals around the country, SEMC participates in nationwide clinical data registries operated by the ACCF as part of the ACCF's National Cardiovascular Data Registry (NCDR) program. The ACCF is a premier national medical society representing 49,000 physicians and other cardiovascular health care providers and dedicated to improving heart health and the quality of cardiovascular care worldwide. The ACCF's NCDR is a group of ten registries of clinical data submitted by health care providers around the country about their patients that is used to measure, benchmark, and improve the quality of cardiovascular care for all. We use the information and analysis we get from NCDR to ensure that all of our cardiovascular patients receive high quality care. In many cases, state health care regulations or rules set by Medicare or other health insurance payers actually require us to submit data to NCDR. On December 10, 2015, representatives of the ACCF discovered that a data table containing the names, Social Security Numbers, and dates of birth of 133 SEMC patients—along with thousands of other patients of other hospitals and health care providers around the country—had mistakenly been copied into software testing and development databases within the ACCF's software environment. Those databases were supposed to contain only fictional patient data (e.g. "Jane Doe," etc.)—not any data about real patients. During the time between when the table was mistakenly copied (2009 or 2010) and when the mistake was first discovered (December 10, 2015), the ACCF has determined that five software and data analytics vendors hired by the ACCF to help it improve its registries had access to the testing and development databases. According to the ACCF's investigation and discussions with those five vendors, only two of the vendors actually accessed the table containing real patient information. One of those two vendors temporarily copied that table from ACCF's server onto the vendor's own computers on December 3, 2015, in order to complete a project for ACCF. The vendors have confirmed to ACCF that none of their employees used or further shared the information contained in the table, and the one vendor whose employees copied the table has confirmed that all copies have since been deleted. The ACCF reports that all five of the vendors have signed contracts with the ACCF requiring the vendors to keep all ACCF information confidential and prohibiting the vendors and their employees from sharing such information with others. **Importantly, there is no indication that any patient's information has been viewed by any unauthorized person beyond a small number of employees at one or more of those five vendors. There is no indication that any of those individuals has misused any patient's information in any way that might cause harm.**

**STEPS THAT HAVE BEEN TAKEN, AND ARE BEING TAKEN, FOLLOWING THIS INCIDENT**

The ACCF has taken several steps to investigate and to reduce the risk that any similar incident ever occurs in the future. Among other things, the ACCF has made sure that all data about real patients—including the table discussed above—has been deleted from its software testing and development databases. The ACCF also has obtained signed statements from its software and data analytics vendors confirming that the only known copy of the table outside of ACCF's own servers has been deleted. Those signed statements also confirm that no one at any of the vendors misused or further spread the information from the table. The ACCF and SEMC are both further revising our vendor contracts to ensure even more safeguards are applied to confidential patient data going forward.

**STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO ENSURE THAT YOUR DATA IS NOT MISUSED**

As previously indicated SEMC has no reason to believe that any person has misused, or will misuse, this patient data in a way that might be harmful. That said, there are steps any

impacted patients can take if they are concerned that their data might be misused—including requesting a security freeze or fraud alert on any bank and/or payment card accounts that they may maintain, and monitoring their credit. More information about these steps is available at:

We will help you determine whether your, or your family member's, data was involved and, if so, help you get credit monitoring activated if you choose to use it.

SEMC and Steward Health Care System have the utmost concern for our patients' privacy and takes measures to ensure that those with whom we share confidential information maintain appropriate, responsible safeguards to prevent unauthorized access to that information. Once again, we sincerely apologize for any inconvenience that this incident at ACCF may have caused any of our patients or their families. We and the ACCF take the confidentiality of your information very seriously and will continue to work to ensure that a similar incident does not occur in the future. 



## Job Security, Higher Income Two Benefits Of A College Degree, Experts Say

## Transitioning Resources Important To Returning Service Members

Each year, between 240,000 and 360,000 service members transition out of the U.S. military, and as we draw down from the war in Afghanistan, the military is expected to separate a million service members over the next several years, according to the White House. This leaves our nation's heroes returning home only to face a new battle—finding a job in the civilian workforce. Service members and veterans gain valuable skills and knowledge during the time they serve. However, understanding how the skills gained in the military translate to civilian jobs isn't always easy.

An online survey conducted by Harris Poll on behalf of University of Phoenix® in fall 2015 of more than 500 hiring managers found that they overwhelmingly (86 percent) have considered hiring a person with military background. And of those same hiring managers, 80 percent cited hiring employees with a military background.
