Emergency services reassure seniors concerning medical issues

WEBSTER – Nobody likes to call 911, seniors probably most of all.

"You come from a different generation. You used to be able to take care of yourselves," said Shawn McKenna of the Sheriff's Department. While some younger people overreact to minor medical issues, seniors often feel "embarrassed" to call for help of any kind, he noted.

But since many medical issues can be hard to clearly identify, McKenna urged seniors to call 911 if they experience pain, dizziness, changes in motor skills and balance, or a variety of other signs that might indicate a serious medical issue.

"Raise your hand if you have X-ray vision," he asked. Obviously, no one did, to which he added, "I was hoping someone would. Because we'd get together and make a lot of money."

Until that happens, emergency medical services via 911 remain the best way to get checked out, and he reminded those present a few times that "you are not a burden," because such care is for what ambulance crews are trained.

McKenna, a Leominster firefighter and EMT spoke as part of the Sheriff's Senior Summer Celebration event at Webster Senior Center recently. Alongside him, several dozen seniors learned about heart health during aging and the importance of humor in healing, played a couple rounds of "safety bingo," spent time browsing tables of information on senior-related services, and dined on breakfast pastries and an Italian lunch. From his experience, McKenna said the most

From his experience, McKenna said the most common injuries EMTs see among seniors typically come from falls – head trauma, wrist and ankle sprains, and fractures. But he urged people to pay attention to a wide range of health signs, particularly those affecting the "holy triumvirate" of heart, brain and lungs, and "be very, very cautious about dizziness, especially if it's coupled with pain."

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Town meeting OKs pot and other changes

WEBSTER – In a vote that was among the shortest of the evening and with no debate, town meeting voters approved 90-30 amending the town's marijuana moratorium before it expires this December.

Town Administrator Doug Willardson told the roughly 125 meeting attendees doing so would allow the town's existing medical pot grower, Curaleaf, to also grow for the recreational market, since it already has town approval. Any other firm seeking to do so, however, would still have to go through the formal process, including getting a letter of support or non-opposition from the selectmen and Planning Board hearings. The town's recreational zoning bylaw should be complete by the year's end, he said. That vote was by far the closest one of the hour-long meeting. Curiously, because of a technicality (Moderator Thomas Ralph didn't get the Planning Board's report beforehand), voters actually got a second bite at the apple. After Ralph read it into the record (the board voted unanimously approve the change), he called for a re-vote, and it passed 92-25.

Buildings come in pieces and parts

CHARLTON – How do you move a building? If it's made of Legos or Lincoln Logs, it's no big deal. But if it's made of three 70-ton sections of concrete, the answer is very, very carefully.

crete, the answer is very, very carefully. That's what contractors at Buffumville spent their day doing recently, as the park closed for the week to install new bathrooms. In previous generations, they'd have built them on site, but in this case the new building was made in a factory and shipped here on three big trucks.

Trucking them here was the (relatively) easy part. "A lot of thought goes into the calculations," mostly on computers, necessary to transfer those sections to their final location, Army Corps of Engineers Safety Officer Kane Turmelle said. While watching makes it look easy, even stately, that apparent ease requires a lot of basic physics based on multiple load charts that show how much mass the crane can handle at various distances, how fast it can turn safely, how much weight it needs for balance, and other issues.

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Shepherd Hill auditorium to be renamed

After much deliberation, the Dudley-Charlton Regional School District has made good on a request from a parent to change the name of the auditorium in Shepherd Hill Regional High School to honor a now retired teacher long associated with the school's success.

In June Superintendent Greg Desto officially announced the renaming of the school's auditorium, a location of numerous musical productions and even town meetings, to the Constance V. Galli Auditorium. Known to students and staff as Connie Galli, the former music teacher was present for a meeting of the School Committee where Desto revealed an official letter announcing the upcoming change was sent out on June 5. Committee members made the decision on the change during a meeting on May 23 in a unanimous decision.

"The Constance V. Galley Auditorium will be officially unveiled at a ceremony at a later date," Desto read from a letter sent to Galli informing her of the honor. "This decision to forever link (Galli) to the Shepherd Hill Auditorium where she served so well and with distinction was spurred by a heartfelt letter written to the committee by a music parent and colleague. The committee did not make its decision lightly as befitting and honor of this magnitude." Desto said it is the first time in his tenure with the district that he received such a request. Normally individuals are honored posthumously for their contributions, but Galli is a rare individual who will be alive to see her name adorn a room in a building where she has spent many of her professional years teaching.

"It's not frequent because I think people generally understand that this isn't something that you do lightly," Desto said. "There is, on occasion, a person who comes along who has had such an unusual impact on a particular part of the school district that this is

Dudley-Charlton requires waiver to hire Nash

Following questions from a previous meeting at which the Dudley Charlton Regional School Committee approved the hiring of Kristine Nash as interim superintendent of schools, it has been confirmed the district will be at the mercy of the state and the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education to keep Nash on board for the foreseeable future.

In June committee members did discuss the possibility of needing a critical shortage waiver from the DESE to employ Nash and now that requirement has been confirmed with the district sending an application for the waiver on Wednesday, June 20. Committee Chair Pauline Aucoin said the committee is fully aware of the situation as is Nash.

"The committee has been updated along the way with emails. I did speak to Dr. Nash and she is expecting to start on July 9 with or without the waiver confirmation because she still can make a little bit of salary. She understands that if we do not get the waiver that she will not be working here," Aucoin said. Superintendent Gregg Desto, who is exiting the district official on July 6 to lead Auburn High School as principal, gave credit to the members of the School Committee for their diligence in finding a temporary successor for his post and showed confidence that the DESE has what they need to make a decision hopefully in favor of the district's waiver application. "I honestly feel that (the committee) has done the best they can do and now it's a waiting game," Desto said. "If there's anything that the committee needs from me in July I'll help anyway that I can."

The School Committee decided to make good on that offer by agreeing to keep Desto on call for the first week of July

Dudley picks KP Law as new town counsel

DUDLEY – The Board of Selectmen has chosen new town counsel after cutting ties with the previous attorney in the early part of 2018.

In February selectmen decided to dismiss longtime town attorney Gary Brackett after over 20 years when a discrepancy came to light concerning Brackett's handling of an application to bring the Islamic cemetery issue of 2016 to court.

Brackett's termination was effective June 30, and now a new agency has been brought on board to fill the gap.

Selectmen interviewed two firms for the position in recent weeks, Mirick O'Connell and KP Law. Both organizations have a history with the town. Mirick O'Connell Attorneys at Law has served as the labor lawyer for the town through attorney Marc Terry and in May, a representative of KP Law served as attorney for the town during the spring annual town meeting. Town Administrator Greg Balukonis told selectmen on June 18 that they could "couldn't make a wrong decision" regardless of who they picked, however it was KP Law that was recommended for the job.

"I looked at it that KP Law is municipal law experts. That's their business. That's all they do. Their other strong point was the attorney that they said would represent Dudley, Michele Randazzo. I have a lot of confidence in her ability. Mirick O'Connell is a known commodi-They've provided ty. legal counsel services to us. They are central Massachusetts located and they're a large diverse firm but have expertise in municipal law," Balukonis said

while advising selectmen on the candidates

Selectmen seemed to show confidence in KP Law, and specifically Attorney Randazzo, to do the job and do it well. Selectmen John Marsi said he feels Randazzo has worked well with the town in the past and would continue to be a good partner for them as needed.

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

'Sometimes the body outsmarts itself, and can cause you to decline faster," he noted.

accept or refuse certain kinds of treatment, health care proxies and the like. McKenna noted emergency responders cannot just take people's word that such things exist; the law requires them to actually see the documents.

Two points he discussed, many people take for granted, except in a crisis. He noted it's important the house be easy to find, and the Sheriff's Department can provide homeowners with signs bearing reflective numbers for the end of their driveways. Once inside, first responders sometimes find another hazard: hoarding. While the homeowner may be used to weaving their way around piles of stuff, it's a serious fire risk and makes finding you in an emergency much more difficult. "When we see something like this, it's on a really bad call," McKenna said, referring to a photo of a living room full of toys and junk. Once in the ambulance, he noted EMTs maintain radio contact with the hospital in case they need further medical advice, will keep talking to you to assess whether treatment is working, and typically allow direct family members to sit up front, although a parent of

a sick child can ride in back. Although many people don't want neighbors and friends to see an ambulance taking them away, he said they routinely use stretchers, lights and sirens for safety, although patients who are coherent can sign waivers refusing care even if the EMTs recommend taking them to the hospital. Furthermore, EMTs are prohibited under the HIPPA laws from discussing patients' personal issues with others.

The overall goal is "to get you back to your baseline, whatever your normal health is," he said. "You're never



For a while, he talked about the common questions people raise about what happens when 911 is called, from why EMTs, police and doctors ask so many (often redundant) questions - because they want to make sure you're coherent and understand what's happening - to what kinds of information you should have easily available. For the latter, McKenna urged people to make sure they have an up-to-date medication list and any key documents, including Do Not Resuscitate orders, MOLST (Medical Orders for Life-Sustaining Treatment) forms, by which you dictate in writing whether you wish to

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something that you take under consideration."

Galli's history with Shepherd Hill Regional High School dates back to the '80s with over 30 years of experience with the school. As an educator, she helped the school's music programs gain state and nationwide recognition, an accomplishment that Desto said played a part in the School Committee's decision.

"Brick by brick she built the Shepherd Hill music program into something of a juggernaut," Desto said. "Something that is well know truly throughout the country.'

Clearly overwhelmed by the honor, Galli told members of the committee she was grateful for the honor and that she feels this recognition caps off decades

of commitment to a program she loved so much.

"I'm humbled and just so very grateful for this honor. It's been my privilege to be able to teach in the district my whole career. I've truly always felt that the work that I've done has been valued and supported. I can't be more grateful for that," Galli told committee mem-bers and those present for the official announcement.

"It would be remiss of me not the acknowledge that any success I might have had did not happen in a vacuum. We have the support for the arts in our district - It's been my privilege. It's been a good run and this incredible honor is the proverbial icing on what was a really good cake.

The School Committee has not announced an official date for any ceremony to commemorate the renaming of the auditorium.



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New program to highlight business friendly Dudley

DUDLEY – The Economic Development Commission has been hard at work over the last few years looking for ways to promote Dudley as a great place to live, work and set up shop. A new initiative might be the next big step in that mission as members of the EDC are planning on creating a new network program that would put the focus on properties available in Dudley and the benefits of moving businesses to the town.

On June 18 selectmen heard a proposal from Jo-Ann Szymczak, a member of the EDC, who proposed a quarterly public access program the highlight business, commercial, residential and farming opportunities in the community. It's a project Szymczak believes will help give Dudley an advantage as the town seeks ways to grow.

'We can use that to our

advantage to educate our townspeople and maybe people who have an interest in moving to Dudley," Szymczak said. "First we talked about doing something monthly and that's not realistic. I thought if we did a quarterly program we could highlight properties that are actually available for commercial, residential and farming opportunities and that might bring attention to those individual parcels that are available and secondly it would give us an opportunity to invite people who are in financing. Several of the local banks offer financing terms and people don't realize they're very heavily involved in the communities to finance projects."

Szymczak added the program could act as an educational opportunity to allow people an understanding of what it would take to move to Dudley and bring a business to town. The program could involve town officials close to such projects like the building inspector or zoning officials.

"The program selectmen are doing is very good where they invite people from around town who are in business. This would be to attract business from that," Szymczak said. "You have so many people on the Economic Development Committee who are technology savvy. You could take a program like this and get it up on YouTube and send the information out a number of different ways. Even a 20 or 30-minute program does bring Dudley to the forefront. I think it might bring more people to us."

Selectmen asked for information on a format as well as information what it would cost to produce the program. The conversations led Nichols College President Dr. Susan Engelkemeyer, who was at the meeting for a separate discussion, to speak in favor of the project and even offer Nichols College's services to see the project through.

"If it would be helpful we could organize a student group that might help. It could be a class project. We could do some stock videos that we could interweave into it, plus we also have a green screen room in one of our new buildings where we could actually do some of the filming," Engelkemeyer said. "We would offer either of those if it would be helpful."


Selectmen gave a warm reception to the whole idea. Selectman John Marsi was one of several to voice support for the initiative.

"I like this, and I definitely like the idea of any way other media to promote Dudley, but it can't just be on Dudley access on YouTube. It's got to be something that we tweet, that we post and is archived somewhere else. You want reach," Marsi said.

When discussing the show format Szymczak said the program would include interviews with different guests and would possibly feature rotating hosts. Most of all the focus would not be to advertise businesses or banks, but the town as a whole using the resources available to provide a video presentation on the benefits of moving to Dudley for business or residence.

"It's about trying to create interest, and everything today links one thing to another with technology," Szymczak said. "I see this as one more opportunity for a visual and maybe to pick up to do a little bit more with it to try to attract people to Dudley and show what the opportunities are here. If I asked 'do you know any farms available' you wouldn't know unless you're a person in real estate. This will give a chance for them to highlight it.

Selectman Jonathan Ruda motioned to have Town Administrator Greg Balukonis work with the EDC and Nichols College to iron out more details on the project and return to the board with an overview of the proposal.



EDITORIAL Self centered sons and daughters

We had in the past two weeks the largest sporting events on the planet. Millions of people around the globe were tuned into televisions and radios; glued to the internet and cellphone podcasts, double checking Twitter feeds during dinner to keep up with scores.

Everywhere except in America.

Because we are separated from the rest of the world by miles...or kilometers...of interest.

We as a nation don't seem to understand the intense sport of 'real' football.

Most people don't even know the terms. A pitch, midfielder, offsides, striker...foreign words even though they are English. The game is straight forward enough. You can't use your hands, you can use your head or your feet only, or your torso. Only certain people can run past the midline on the field. Only the goalkeeper can touch the ball with their hands. And you score by getting the ball into the net past defenders and the goalkeeper.

You can't purposely trip anyone, or push them anyone out of your way with your hands, though you may block them with your entire body as long as you don't touch them with your hands. It's FOOT-ball, people.

It is a game that can be played by poor people in the streets and in fields, on grass or on asphalt or sand. It takes something round to kick and bunch of people to run and that's it.

Which is part of its appeal. It is a game of the masses. Anyone can play. No fancy equipment, no particular intense skill set. Being able to run, and learn the rules. A ball or ball-like object and a goal...that's it.

But Americans just never bought into it. We just never seemed to understand the finesse, the skills it takes to dribble between the feet, to pass with accuracy to better positioned teammate, to control the entire field while still moving at that speed. And the endurance to run for more than 90 minutes with small breaks. We've heard soccer called a 'sissy game Really? American football is played once a week, with huge stops, between the actual plays which last a few seconds each. The players are padded, the runs are seconds long. Yes, there is pretty heavy duty body contact, but very little time endurance. And lots and lots of breaks (for TV commercials if nothing else). Basketball does have more running, and is pretty physical. But also has more 'rest' time between plays and more timeouts. And is split up into four quarters with rest in between.

What are responsibilities when hitting an animal?



our Recently, department sought public assistance, social through media, to locate a vehicle that struck a dog. We thank the public for their assistance in identifying the party involved. As a result, I was asked to explain the legal responsibilities of a driver when they

are involved in hitting a dog or cat. Massachusetts General Law

Chapter 272 Section 80H pertains to these situations. It states in part, "The operator of a motor vehicle that strikes and injures or kills a dog or cat shall forthwith report such an accident to the owner or custodian of said dog or cat or to a police officer in the town wherein such accident has occurred."

This means a driver has the obligation to try and locate the owner of the animal or notify the police soon after the incident. If this does not occur, the driver is subject to a fine of not more than \$50.

These are not wild animals. The owners are owed the respect of being notified about the death of their pet. In some cases, it may not be safe to immediately stop and try to find a pet's owner. This is why there is the provision for notifying police. When the police are contacted, the operator is identified and attempts can be made to find the owner.

There are always sad cases. Owners have lost a pet and drivers feel bad even if the situation is unavoidable. Operators must drive safely and may have no choice but to strike an animal. This is especially true if it would be necessary to enter the path of an approaching vehicle. To avoid these instances, please be sure to contain your pet as best you can. Even the most obedient dog can be difficult to control if chasing a rabbit, person, or something else which happens onto their territory. Please remember to remain attentive to your pets and leash or confine them. It can limit these unfortunate instances.

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

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

WORCESTER — The Sturbridge Post 109 American Legion baseball team, behind a 13-hit attack that featured a pair of triples, rallied from a three-run deficit to defeat East Side Legion Post 201, 11-8, on Wednesday, June 27 at Worcester Academy's Gaskill Field.

With the win Post 109 improved to 5-10; Post 201 dropped to 4-8 with the loss.

Jared Langevin led off the inning with a single to center field and Curtis Koebke followed with a walk. Langevin scored later in the inning on an East Side error to make it a 4-2 game, and then Koebke came home on a wild pitch to make it 4-3.


"They pitched around Curtis tonight," Rosseel said of his No. 3 hitter, who walked in three of his five plate appearances but did single to right field in the seventh inning. "They wanted nothing to do with Curtis."

Sturbridge went ahead for good in the top of the fourth inning.


With one out Mick Sullivan singled to center field and then went to second on a wild pitch. Sullivan tied the game, 4-4, coming home when Langevin (three hits, triple, RBI) lashed a single to left field. After Koebke grounded out to short for the second out of the inning, Pat Wilbur hit a booming triple to center field, scoring Langevin to give Post 109 a 5-4 lead.

The triple was Wilbur's only hit of the game and it came after two frustrating at-bats earlier on.

"I fixed what I was doing wrong in my first two at-bats and I made a good swing on the ball," said Wilbur, who will be a senior at Shepherd Hill Regional when school starts up again in late August. "I wasn't getting my feet wide enough the and Wilbur worked into some trouble, walking two of the first three batters he faced. 
Wilbur scored to give Sturbridge a 6-4 lead when Post 109's next batter, Avery Wetherbee (four hits, two RBI's), singled to right field.



Cherry Valley Post 443 squeaks past Framingham, improves to even 6-6



in 10 days," and used two examples: overgrown weeds can, but a collapsed roof usually can't. In the latter case, owners won't be fined if they report to Code Enforcement that they've started the process within the 10 day period.

Several other articles sought to repurpose the remaining balances of completed water and sewer projects to fund new ones. By doing that, the town doesn't have to borrow as much, Willardson said. All were approved, including upgrading the SCADA computer system, repairing various water lines, and covering a \$119,000 deficit for the completed Rawson Road water project.

A similar process was used to fund replacing fire Engine #5 and Ladder #2 with a new truck that can combine both functions. Willardson said the engine is 23 years old, while the ladder truck is 35 vears old, and National Fire Protection Administration guidelines recommend retiring such vehicles after 25 years. To do that, the town's capital plan calls for replacing a fire vehicle every 3.5 years. Willardson said the town looked

at refurbishing

the truck's life by about seven years. He got bids from three manufacturers, with E-1 being the lowest at about \$600,000. A third of that cost is in the fiscal 2019 capital budget, about \$193,000 is coming from Free Cash, and town meeting approved the rest by transferring from completed capital projects.

Lastly, voters approved rezoning an unused part of St. Joseph's Cemetery to business use. The Planning Board rejected the proposal this spring because it originally called for a change to Business-5 (a non-sewered zone), which Willardson said is open to "any business activity not classified as industrial." 

In the "best case scenario," the crane they used can carry 300 tons (600,000 pounds), but at the length and radius they need to do this project, it can handle less than half that, he said. That's still 115 tons, about 40 percent more than they need.

"The Corps has strict regulations on cranes and this contractor seems pretty good," he said as he watched workers from Central Mass Crane Service of Leicester do their work. That went without any noticeable hitches, although it took a lot longer to finesse the last inch or two into proper alignment than it did to hook it up and swing 70 tons from truck to location.

According to Corps

Project Manager Tim Russell, the bathroom replacement has been in the Corps capital budget "for probably 10 years," and actually in the planning stages for about two. It became necessary particularly after flooding in 2005 and 2011 inundated the already old and too-small bathrooms, which were at a location somewhat closer to lake level than the new ones will be.

"About every five years, [the water] gets to the height it'll flood those [old] bathrooms," he said.

Russell said the old ones were the park's originals, dating to 1960, when Buffumville opened as a flood control facility after the devastation of the The crane slowly swings around essentially big outhouses; only in the 1990s were they

renovated to become flushing facilities.

Since then, the park's popularity has dramatically outgrown those facilities. Russell estimated 60,000-70,000 people use it annually.

"That's a busy weekend here, so to get these up and running before then is huge," Turmelle added.

When discussing a contract Selectman Paul Joseph recommended selectmen break from the norm and approve a two-year contract rather than the traditional practice of reapproving a contract every year. However, Joseph also recommended selectmen include a reviewable option after one year.

The Board of Selectmen approved all these recommendations effectively signing KP Law to represent the town through June 30, 2020 with an option to review Attorney Randazzo after the first year. The vote was unanimous with Selectman Joseph abstaining due to his absence from recent meetings on the subject for health reasons.

Kabala had mentioned during a meeting on June 20 that a critical shortage waiver would be required from the DESE as Nash is seeking to collect her full retirement pension while returning to work as the leader of the district. If the waiver is denied, the school committee has implied an internal search would likely take place. A special meeting was scheduled for July 2 to discuss the possible backup plans if the waiver is denied. That meeting occurred after press time.
