PRHS makes playoffs at Quiz Bowl national championship tournament



ROSEMONT, ILL. — On the weekend of Saturday, April 27, Plymouth Regional High School joined 142 of the top quiz bowl teams from small public high schools at the Hyatt Regency O'Hare Chicago for the 2024 Small School National Championship Tournament to determine who was the best.

Quiz bowl is a competitive, academic, interscholastic activity for teams of four students. Quiz bowl teams use buzzers to answer questions about science, math, history, literature, mythology, geography, social science, current events, sports, and popular culture. The matches feature a blend of individual competition and team collaboration, since no individual player is likely to be an expert in all subject areas. Participation in quiz bowl both reinforces lessons from the classroom and encourages players to develop new intellectual interests.

The team, in the Traditional Public Schools Division, was captained by Reagan Sutherland, who was joined by

Khalil Dakhli, Paul Mason, Norman Sackett, and Ethan Savage. The team was coached by Jay Fogarty, who was assisted by Troy Harris.

Plymouth was the only New Hampshire team at the national championship.

Plymouth finished the preliminary rounds with a 8-2 record, which qualified them for the playoffs.

Plymouth's shot at the title ended when they lost to Salem from Ohio in round 17.

Plymouth Regional High School finished in 21st place in the Traditional Public Schools Division.

The Traditional Public Schools Division champion was Hastings High School Hastings-on-Hudson, N.Y. The Open Division champion was the A team from St. Mark's School of Texas Dallas, Texas.

The 2024 Small School National Championship Tournament (Traditional Public Schools Division)'s field featured 88 teams from 24 states.

Brush fire caps busy day for Bristol FD

BRISTOL — In the midst of a very busy weekend for fires, and not long after returning from a mutual aid response in Plymouth, Bristol Fire Department received notice of a brush fire at 10:52 a.m. on Sat., April 27, upgraded moments later to include exposure to a building, on Old Stage Road in their community.

The first personnel arrived at the rural location just 12 minutes later where they found a large brush fire quickly heading uphill toward the tree line.

Concerned with how fast the fire was spreading, a first alarm forestry response was requested to bring more equipment and manpower to the site. Joining them to battle the flames were mutual aid

crews from Alexandria, Ashland, Bridgewater, Franklin, Meredith and New Hampton fire departments. With Engine 2, Engine 4, Utility 1 and Ambulance 2 from BFD already on scene, Hebron Fire Department and Stewarts Ambulance Service provided coverage for the Bristol station.

Bristol's Deputy Fire Chief Chris Dolloff noted that a total of ten of

their fulltime and call firefighters responded to the call and with the help of the mutual aid crews, a total of 10,000 gallons were used to extinguish the fire and complete an overhaul of the area. When all was said and done, approximately two acres had burned but no structures were caught up in the flames.

Plymouth Fire-Rescue tackles back to black blazes

PLYMOUTH — It was a busy weekend for Plymouth Fire-Rescue when two fires broke out, beginning at 4:10 a.m. on Saturday morning and continuing with yet another call at 7:14 a.m.

The overnight crew could see heavy flames above the tree line as they opened their doors to head to the scene at 28 Pleasant Street where they immediately called for a first alarm, to bring additional apparatus and manpower to the scene.

Plymouth Deputy Fire Chief Kevin Pierce reported that the single-family home was already evacuated upon their arrival and with the use of handlines they were able to extinguish the fire, which originated from the home's garage. Thankfully the fire did not extend into the home and the department reported that the structure received no damage from the flames.

Plymouth Fire-Rescue was assisted for this fire by Ashland, Bristol, Campton-Thornton, Holderness, and Rumney. Medical coverage that morning

came from Stewarts Ambulance and Warren-Wentworth Ambulance, while New Hampton Fire Department also covered Plymouth during the incident. Additional support was received by both Plymouth and Plymouth State University police, along with Plymouth Village Water District and the NH Electric Co-op company.

Just a few short hours later, as PFRD was still repacking their equipment from the early morning fire, they were once again toned out to a build-

Local fire crews tackle stubborn blaze in Rumney

RUMNEY — Just before 5:30 p.m. on Saturday, April 27, the Rumney Fire Department, along with the Wentworth and Plymouth fire departments on automatic response, were called to a chimney fire with extension to the building at 110 Old Route 25.

Rumney's Fire Chief, Evan Hacker, arrived on scene 6 minutes after the tone to find smoke showing from the eaves on all sides of a two-and-a-half story wood framed single-family home and requested a First Alarm assignment.

Hacker made contact with the homeowner and confirmed all occupants were out of the building; shortly after, Rumney Engine 2, Deputy Chief Kevin Pierce from Plymouth Fire-Rescue Department, a Wentworth fire fighter and Plymouth Tower 1 arrived at the scene.

Plymouth's Tower was positioned for an aerial attack on the fire and sent a crew to the roof where they began cutting vent holes to release smoke and heat from the structure. At the same time Wentworth and Rumney crews, led by Plymouth's

Deputy Chief Pierce began an aggressive interior attack. Crews were met with high heat and zero visibility as they made their way to the second floor. Once there they encountered heavy heat and fire conditions.

As additional resources arrived, crews rotated in fire attack and overhaul.

Hacker reported this fire was tough to locate and extinguish. The house was a large building with additions and many void spaces with plaster and lathe walls and ceilings. At the height of the fire there were four hose lines in operation and three outside vent crews working.

The incident ultimately went to three alarms to bring in more manpower to help with the labor-intensive con-

ditions and operations. The result was approximately 60 firefighters on hand, both at the scene and providing water supplies from a dry hydrant on Route 118.

One firefighter was injured and transported to Speare Memorial

Hospital in Plymouth for evaluation. The name and town that person was from was not disclosed but the injuries appeared to be minor, Rumney's report read.

While the home was heavily damaged, in the midst of the blaze, crews

were able to recover a collection of rare antique phonographs and records valued at over \$200,000.

Crews remained on scene until approximately 10 p.m.

"Great job by all," Hacker said the next day on the department's social media page. "This was a stubborn and dangerous fire. Most of the crews on the scene have been working at several multiple alarm fires in the area over the past week."

The exact cause of the fire remains undetermined at this time as an investigation continues.

The chief wished to thank all the departments that assisted his department that evening and provided emergency cover services for the

It also raises money for the Plymouth State Climb Above Scholarship, which supports PSU students facing any kind of serious adversity.

The red tulips are blooming!

Last October, CADY's Youth's Youth Advisory and Advocacy Council (YAAC), participated in the 2023 National Red Ribbon Week "Plant the Promise" Campaign. Partnering with Plymouth State University and Joyce Weston of the Town of Plymouth's Beautification Committee, the young leaders planted red tulip bulbs in front of the ECO House above the Plymouth Rotary. The red tulips are in honor of National Red Ribbon Week and serve as a powerful reminder that substance misuse prevention is an ongoing, year-round community endeavor.

The "Plant the Promise" campaign is a national program that encourages families and community members to plant red tulip bulbs in the fall and watch them bloom in the spring!

The YAAC's goal for Plant the Promise is to reach as many young people and families as possible and demonstrate their commitment to a drug-free New Hampshire. The red tulips are a great opportunity for parents to start conversations and talk to their kids, and other parents, about the dangers of substance misuse. Kids who learn about the risks of drug use from their parents are significantly less likely to use drugs.

Here are some suggestions for how parents and their kids can create a healthy relationship that includes open conversations about the risks of using drugs:

Advice from a YAAC youth leader for Parents:

Safe environment - Ideally, kids should not engage in situations with alcohol and drugs at all. It is important to create a safe environment that is conducive to open conversations, so if your child makes a mistake, they will feel comfortable seeking your counsel.

Trust is important - It is important to know the influencers in your child's life: who they are hanging out with and where they are spending their time. But it is also important to create a level of trust between parent and child that they will not want to break.

Talk early and talk often. Talk about the harms of substance misuse and teach healthy coping strategies when children are young. Help them practice saying "No," because it is often harder to do in reality than it sounds.

Advice from a YAAC for Kids:

Tell the truth - It is better to start with the truth. It takes less time to be honest than to lie about things, and parents will be more willing to listen and help when you tell the truth.

Follow your gut - We have a built-in gut response when we feel something is wrong. Stick with it and follow your instincts.

Know who you are hanging out with - Some people around you may be making unhealthy choices. This does not mean they are bad or mean, but hanging out with people who are using alcohol or drugs will put you in risk of doing something that goes against your better judgment.

Peer pressure is real - Saying "No" to using drugs or alcohol can be hard in some situations, especially if you are not used to it! Role play some situations where you might need to say "No," even if it makes you uncomfortable. The more prepared you are, the better!

Find people who will support you and your choices - the best option is to find people to be friends with who make healthy choices and want you to make healthy choices as well. True friends want the best for you and encourage each other to be healthy and happy.

The YAACs are a group of Plymouth Regional High School students who are passionate about preventing substance misuse. They work with CADY to educate, engage, and empower their peers, younger students, and strive to affect powerful community and statewide change, for everyone, especially children and youth to lead healthy, drug-free lifestyles.

Insurance and Medicare cards, along with pre-certification and other documentation required by insurers

A list of all the medications—prescription and over-the-counter—you or your loved is currently taking, along with the dosage. (However, in most cases, hospitals ask that you bring only those medications that the physician requests.)

A copy of advance health care directives, such as durable power of attorney for health care and living will

A personal health record that includes information such as allergies, health conditions, immunization record and reports of recent tests or physical exams

Reports your physician gave you to bring to the hospital

A list of telephone numbers of family and friends to be contacted as needed

To avoid misplacing any of the important paperwork and information—which is critical for facilitating a patient's treatment—keep it all together in one folder.

For your comfort

Hospitals often encourage patients and their families to bring other items to help make a hospital stay more pleasant or comfortable. Hospitals

provide gowns and toiletries, but they generally invite patients to bring their own pajamas, bathrobe, cardigan sweater, non-slip socks or slippers, comb, brush, lotions, toothbrush and toothpaste, and lip balm. However, avoid perfumes and any highly-scented products. Keep in mind that short sleeves are best to accommodate intravenous lines.

Check ahead of time to find out what the hospital will allow. This information often can be found on the hospital's Web site.

Other things to bring include:

Protective containers for holding eyeglasses or dentures when not in use

Books, magazines, crossword puzzles to help pass the time

Paper and pen for jotting down notes and questions—to help you remember to ask doctors or nurses when they are in the room

A small amount of money for newspapers and magazines and other items from the gift shop or vending machines.

Photos or small personal items. However, keep in mind that space is limited.

Clothing to wear home at discharge

Items to leave at home

Hospitals cannot be responsible for patients' personal belongings. Generally, they recommend against bringing valuables. Specific things to leave off the packing list:

Cell phones. In most cases, these are not permitted in patient care areas, as they can interfere with heart monitors and other patient monitoring equipment

Tobacco products, because smoking is prohibited in health care facilities

Credit cards, checkbooks, large amounts of cash, jewelry, high-end portable music players and other valuables, as they can easily be stolen amidst the activity of a hospital patient care unit

Before bringing any type of electronic items, check the hospital's policy. Items that need to be plugged in generally are forbidden as their wiring does not meet hospital-grade standards. If you or a loved one does bring a portable electronic device, make sure it is in the care of a friend or loved one while the patient is sleeping or out of the room.

ing fire, they were once again toned out to a building fire at 219 Old North Main St.

Responding in just minutes, Plymouth FD's Car 2 observed from Main Street that a heavy column of smoke was rising in the area and requested an immediate First Alarm. Upon arrival moments later, that request was upped to a second alarm when heavy flames were seen coming from the rear of the three-story, multi-family building.

The first task of responders was to perform a search of the structure. Once they found all residents were evacuated they then began to attack the blaze.

Two male occupants and a juvenile, however, were treated for smoke inhalation.

At the end of the tough battle the building was declared a total loss and Deputy Pierce requested that Red Cross be notified to provide assistance to four adults and a juvenile who were displaced as a result of the fire.

Among the many municipalities assisting Plymouth with this second fire of the day were Ashland, Bristol, Camp-

ton-Thornton, Center Harbor, Holderness, Meredith, and New Hampton fire departments. Plymouth Police Department was also at the scene to assist the responders, as well as Warren-Wentworth EMS, Stewarts Ambulance, NH Electric Co-op and Plymouth Village Water District.

In his press release, Deputy Pierce said his department wished to thank not only their mutual aid partners for their valuable assistance, but their community partners and the entire community of Plymouth as well.

"In the past seven days, Plymouth has experienced three building fires and many other unusual emergencies. This is abnormal for this area, but all emergencies are mitigated with professionalism and safe fire ground operations," Pierce said. "The company businesses and residents stepped up to assist our firefighters in many ways. This is what makes the greater Plymouth area so special to live in."

The origin and cause of the fire remains under investigation by Plymouth Fire-Rescue and the New Hampshire State Fire Marshals office.

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

The week started with an exciting win over Pelham on Monday, April 22, as the Bobcats scored once in the seventh inning to tie the game at one and won in extra innings.


