## Ryder leads Raiders to sixth place at Division IV State Meet

NEWPORT — In blustery conditions at Newport Golf Club last Thursday, the Belmont golf team battled to a sixth place finish at the Division IV State Meet.

The Raiders were led by a sixth place overall finish from junior Max Ryder, who finished with a score of 82 over the 18 holes. That finish qualified him to com-

CANTERBURY — A Massachusetts driver is deceased following a pursuit and crash on Interstate 93.

At 12:51 a.m. on Sunday, Oct. 19, a Trooper from the Troop D barracks tried to perform a traffic stop

of a vehicle for speeding on I-93 northbound near Exit 12. The driver failed to stop, and a pursuit ensued.

The vehicle, identified as a blue 2020 Honda Civic, was seen traveling erratically and speeding up to 120 miles

per hour. As the Honda approached Exit 18, the driver attempted to take the off-ramp but lost control. The vehicle went off the road, crossed the northbound on-



## Don't let your guard down behind the wheel as the leaves fall

Autumn in the Lakes Region has that distracting beauty that makes people slow down on Route 3 and forget they're still operating two tons of steel. The hills between Sanbornton and Tilton flare gold and crimson, the Winnisquam waterfront settles into quiet reflection, and the first hard frost wakes us to the season ahead. But as we head into late October, this is also the time when our region's public safety crews start holding their breath.

Every year, local fire departments and other public safety personnel deal with the same mix of seasonal hazards: slick leaves on the road, wood-stove fires, early snow squalls, and distracted drivers. A single night of black ice on Laconia Road can undo weeks of careful

This year, the warning comes with extra urgency. Local first responders report an uptick in weather-related calls during the transition months—carbon-monoxide alarms, backyard burn piles gone wrong, and a few too many rearend collisions when the temperature dips below freezing. Each of these is preventable.

As a community, we owe it to the people who answer those 911 calls to use a bit more sense. That means slowing down on the curves near the Winnisquam Bridge, checking chimney flues before lighting that first fire, and giving road crews room when they're spreading sand at dawn. It means parents reminding teen drivers that no amount of pumpkin-spice urgency justifies speeding.

There's another kind of preparedness we often overlook: neighborliness. In a region where plenty of seniors live alone on back roads, a quick check-in after the first cold snap can make a real difference. Clear a walkway, share a meal, or make sure a furnace is working. These small gestures carry more warmth than any woodstove.

So as the maples turn and the tourists thin, let's remember that autumn isn't only scenic—it's a signal. The beauty of the season asks us to slow down, look around, and take care of one another before the snow flies.

## Do your parents have an estate plan?

Estate planning for your parents Initiating conversations about your parents' future, especially concerning their finances, medical care, and memorial wishes, can be challenging, but it is undeniably one of the most important discussions you can have with them. Addressing these topics sooner rather than later benefits everyone involved and ensures greater peace of mind and preparedness for the future. This crucial dialogue should encompass plans for when one or both parents pass away as well as scenarios where they become incapacitated and unable to manage their own affairs. To help ensure that their estate plan is comprehensive and aligns with their wishes, consider discussing the following key areas with your parents:

A team effort. Encourage your parents to compile a list of their advisors, starting with legal and financial professionals, including their contact information. This list should also include the contact information for your

parents' doctors so that whoever they nominate as their health care agent can reach them if necessary. Even if they prefer not to share the list immediately, they can create it and let you know where to find the information if the need arises.

Last will and testament or a trust. If you discover that your parents do not currently have a last will and testament or revocable living trust it is probable that they do not have other essential estate planning tools, as these important tools are often created as part of a comprehensive estate plan. If they do have a will in place, confirm when it was created, who the executor is, and where the original wills are stored. Similarly, if you discover that they have a trust, you will want to confirm who the trustees are and whether they have properly "funded" their trust. You should also find out where the original trust documents are stored. Stress to them that you do not need to read their will or trust, but knowing where to find the original documents is crucial to ensuring that their wishes are carried out when the time comes.

Medical directives. While discuss-

ing your parents' estate plan, confirm whether they have created a living will (also known as an advance directive) and a medical power of attorney. These important tools allow someone to make medical decisions on their behalf if they are unable to make or communicate their own medical decisions. If you discover that they have these tools in place, encourage them to have a conversation with their chosen agent under their medical power of attorney to ensure that the decision-maker understands your parents' feelings and wishes about both their medical care preferences as well as their end-of-life care, such as how their medical affairs should be handled should they become incapacitated and whether or not they want to be on life support.

Why estate planning matters

Failing to put together an estate plan often leads to chaos, excessive costs and taxes, unnecessary court involvement, inadequate incapacity planning, potential hurt feelings, delays in distributing inheritances, and even unexpected outcomes after

## Simulation Theory

During an interview years ago, Elon Musk famously claimed there's a "one in billions" chance that this is base reality. In other words, he believes it's far more likely that we're living in some simulation than in the original, foundational universe.

But what kind of simulation? A digital computer program? A spiritual matrix? That idea may sound bizarre—after all, everything feels real, doesn't it?

Yet this isn't just late-night dorm room talk. Some of the world's most respected thinkers are taking the idea seriously. It's not about rejecting science—it's about following it to its farthest, strangest conclusions.

Let's start with String Theory. It's a theoretical framework in physics proposing that the fundamental building blocks of the universe aren't particles, but tiny vibrating strings. These strings, depending on how they vibrate, give rise to all particles and forces—even gravity.

The math checks out, even if we haven't proven it experimentally yet. It's one of the best candidates for a "Theory of Everything" that could unify quantum mechanics with general relativity.

At the 2011 Isaac Asimov Memorial Debate titled "The Theory of Everything," theoretical physicist Sylvester James Gates, Jr. dropped a bombshell. He revealed that he found something astonishing embedded in the equations of string theory: patterns of "error-correcting codes"—the same kind used in computer programming to detect and correct mistakes.

Sitting next to him, astrophysicist Neil deGrasse Tyson reacted with blowing my mind right now!"

Why would error-correcting codes appear in the fabric of the cosmos? Gates himself admitted he doesn't know the implications yet. But the mere presence of such codes leads to a wild yet serious question: Could

the universe itself be structured like a vast, intelligent computation?

That's where the idea of the simulation arises.

On late-night television, when asked if he thought we were living in a simulation, Neil deGrasse Tyson replied, "I wish I had a good argument against it, but I don't...'

And while the science doesn't prove this, it pushes our imagination into territory that philosophers, mystics, and spiritual traditions have been exploring for millennia: that reality is deeper than it appears.

It doesn't mean we live in a video game controlled by aliens.

It might mean that the universe is information-rich, consciousness-infused, and governed by principles far beyond our current understanding.

My friend, physicist and laser pioneer Dr. Mani Bhaumik, wrote about this in his book "Code Name God." He argues that modern physics, far from disproving a creator, points toward a transcendent source of intelligence.

That's a powerful idea: that our minds are just beginning to awaken

to truths already embedded in nature. Dr. David Selbie, interpreting the implications of quantum physics, has emphasized: Our choices and behavior as conscious observers—not the accumulation of material goods—are

what matter. Those things are transient illusions. True immortality lies in evolving consciousness beyond the physical hologram.

Similarly, Dr. Amit Goswami, a quantum physicist known for his explorations of consciousness, has stated: "Contrary to what they tell you, you are not a limited material being.'

This idea echoes something timeless. Whether through the lens of physics or philosophy, the message is the same: You are more than you think you are.

Quantum physics shows us that particles don't even exist in fixed states until observed. They remain in a state of possibility. In a strange and very real way, attention shapes outcome. This isn't just a metaphor—it's physics, though interpretations vary. So what does this mean for us?

It means we live in a participatory universe. That our focus, our awareness, our very act of observation-matters. That we are not passive passengers in reality, but active participants.

No, quantum physics doesn't promise we can manifest Lamborghinis with our thoughts. But it does suggest something far greater: that we are wired into the very structure of existence, and our consciousness has weight in the world.

And that, perhaps, is the most hopeful message of all.

We are not powerless. We are not

accidents. We are not limited. We are participants in something

vast, intelligent, and alive. The universe is not outside us. We are part of it. And the deeper we look,

the more we realize: We are more than we think we are.



The Raiders put in their





## What to do with leftover Halloween candy

• Stained glass cookies: Turn hard candies (like Jolly Ranchers®) into works of art. Fill sugar cookie cutouts with hard candies in the middle. When the cookies bake, the candies will melt and then turn soft after cooling.

 Candy-topped brownies: Brownies are delicious on their own, but they're even better with some embellishments. Mix chopped caramels into the batter, or add other candies for flavor and fun.

• Candy bark: Melt down any chocolate you may have and spread it on a baking sheet. Sprinkle chopped up leftover candy on top and allow to cool. Break into pieces for a homemade chocolate bark.

• Gingerbread house: Save the candy in a ziptop bag for freshness and

reserve for decorating gingerbread houses around the holidays.

• Birthday piñata: If there is a birthday on the horizon, use the Halloween candy to stuff the piñata.

• Parade route: Veteran's Day parades are held each November. Start a new tradition in town where donated candy will be tossed out to the crowd by those marching in the parade.

• Donate: Various organizations will gather and ship leftover candy to troops stationed overseas or donate the goods to first responders, veterans and others.

## Make your Oktoberfest celebration unforgettable

Millions of visitors travel to Munich, Germany, each year to take part in a celebration of Bavarian culture known as Oktoberfest. Although the name implies that the world's largest Volksfest (people's festival) occurs in October, the majority of Oktoberfest actually happens in September, and runs from between 16 and 18 days. For 2025, Oktoberfest begins Saturday, September 20 and runs through Sunday, October 5.

Though it may seem like Oktoberfest is just a beer festival, it's actually a celebration of community, food and music. The origins can be traced back to October 12, 1810, when Crown Prince Ludwig of Bavaria married Princess Therese of Saxony-Hildburghausen and the citizens of Munich were invited to celebrate the royal event outside of the city gates.

Whether one can trace his or her lineage to Germany or not, people of all



backgrounds take part in Oktoberfest revelry, even hosting their own fests at home. The following ideas are some ways to create your own unforgettable Oktoberfest celebration.

Erect a beer tent

Visitors to Oktoberfest in Munich will find massive beer tents, each operated by Munich's traditional breweries. These are the only official beer providers of Oktoberfestbier. People replicating Oktoberfest celebrations nearer to home can include beers by Augustiner, Hacker-Pschorr, like potato salad, sauerkraut Hofbräu, Paulaner, and Spaten-Franziskaner, and be sure to serve at least one

Märzen-style lager at the celebration. Set up a beer tent with all of the beverages widely available for guests to enjoy.

Offer popular culinary

Beyond the bevy of beer available, guests to an Oktoberfest celebration will anticipate traditional and hearty Bavarian specialities. Options include hendl (roast chicken), schweinebraten (roast pork), würstl (sausages), brezen (pretzels), and many other culinary delights. Side dishes and red cabbage also are

Wear the right folk attire Traditional Oktoberfest attire includes lederhosen for men and dirndls for women. Lederhosen consists of leather shorts, often with suspenders, worn with a checkered shirt. A dirndl is a dress consisting of a bodice, blouse, skirt, and apron. The outfits are not just costumes, but a celebration of Bavarian heritage. Men and women may accessorize with Alpine hats, Haferl

shoes and Loferl socks.

Many people wonder why the official colors of Oktoberfest are blue and white, despite this not matching the colors of the German flag. In fact, Oktoberfest builds its color scheme around the Bavarian flag. Bavaria is a state within Germany. It is one of the 16 states that make up the Federal Republic of Germany, and it has its own traditions, dialect, cuisine,




