DES announces drawdowns on local ponds

ALTON / NEW DURHAM — The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES), Dam Bureau, is planning to adjust the water levels in Wentworth Pond and Mill Pond behind the Alton Power Dam beginning Sept. 2.

In accordance with RSA 482:13, NHDES is notifying the local governing bodies and the NHDES Dam Safety and Inspection Section that this drawdown will be a full drawdown to the base of the dam, lasting approximately 1–2 weeks. Following this period, the impoundment will be refilled to a level 2.5 feet below the current water surface elevation by leaving the stoplogs out of the dam.

Beginning Sept. 2, the stoplogs in Jones Pond Dam will also be removed, resulting in a water surface decrease of approximately four to five feet from its current elevation. This reduction will support ongoing engineering evaluations and wetland studies within Jones Pond. The waterbody will remain in a lowered state until the dam is removed.

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Football set to make its debut at Prospect Mountain Timber Wolves kick off first-ever football season on Sept. 11

ALTON — A new era has dawned at Prospect Mountain High School.

For the first time in school history, Timber Wolves will be suiting up to play football, as the school begins a new program.

The Prospect football squad will start this year in Division IV and because they are petitioning down for the first two seasons, they are not eligible to make the playoffs this year, but will be eligible next year.

"We have had a great turnout with 28 kids on the roster in our inaugural season," said coach James Christie. "We have one baseline expectation, and that is to compete."

The Timber Wolves will be looking to a solid group of seniors to lead the way as they start a new tradition in Alton. While they don't have any varsity experience in the sport, some of them played as kids in neighboring leagues and others bring experience from other varsity sports to the table. The group of seniors include Blake Pappaceno, Gavin DeWitt, Charlie Chandler, Hunter Sawyer, Cody Manley, Owen Libby-Sprague and Luchiano Pecorino.

"The guys have been working hard all summer to get ready for this season and we are looking forward to competing on the football field this year," Christie said. "We are excited to see the team on the field and for our community to experience football for the first time in the 20-plus-year history of the school."

Christie acknowledged that there is work to do but expects his squad to hit the ground running in the inaugural season.

"As you could imagine, there is a lot that goes into getting a program off the ground," Christie said. "We feel like we are in a great spot and expect a strong start for the Timber Wolves football program."

The Timber Wolves will play a schedule that includes home games against Newport, Mascoma, Farmington-Nute and Newfound and road games at Fall Mountain, Raymond and Hillsboro-Deering.

The season officially kicks off on Friday, Sept. 11, with a 7 p.m. home game against Newfound.

Wright museum hosting lecture and book signing by author James M. Scott

WOLFEBORO — On Tuesday, Sept. 8, the Wright Museum will welcome James Scott. This is the sixteenth program of the Wright Museum's 2026 Education Series.

Over three days in August 1945, a nation once morally opposed to the bombing of civilians killed 120,000 men, women, and children; doomed tens of thousands more to agonizing death in the weeks and months ahead; and annihilated two cities: Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Empire of Ashes explores the final brutal months of the war in the Pacific, featuring the voices of never-before-heard

victims of the atomic bombs. Through interviews with survivors and accounts gleaned from Japanese sources, New York Times best-selling author James M. Scott combines the attacks' heart-wrenching details with their causes and consequences, from debates within the Manhattan Project at Los Alamos, Oakridge, and Hanford to the fallout that would alter decades of life in Japan.

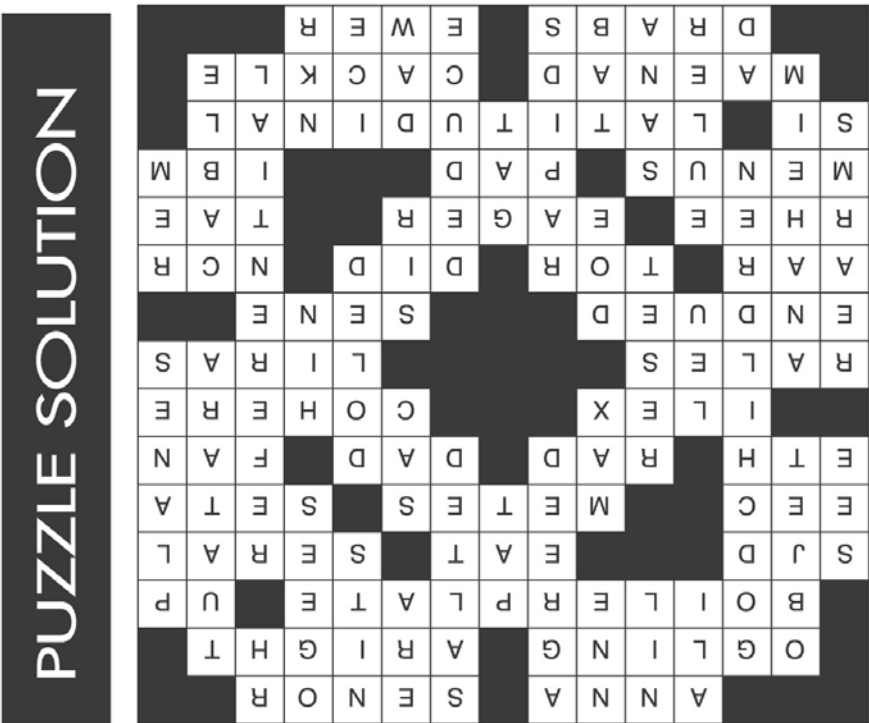

More than a first season

There will be something different under the lights at Prospect Mountain High School this fall.

For the first time in the school's more than two decades, the Timber Wolves will take the field as a football team. When Prospect Mountain hosts Newfound on Sept. 11, the scoreboard will matter, but it will hardly tell the whole story.

This inaugural season is about building something. Starting a high school athletic program from scratch is no small undertaking. There are uniforms and equipment to purchase, schedules to arrange, coaches to hire, facilities to prepare and countless logistical details that most spectators will never see. More important, there must be students willing to take the considerable leap of becoming the first players to wear the uniform.

Prospect Mountain has found them. A roster of 28 players for an inaugural season is an encouraging beginning, particularly for a program without generations of older players establishing expectations for those who follow.

These Timber Wolves cannot look back at championship teams, famous games or school football records because none of those things exist yet. They get to create them. That gives this particular group of students an opportunity few high school athletes ever receive. Years from now, when future Timber Wolves take the football field, someone will be able to point to 2026 and say this was where it started.

The seniors deserve particular recognition for embracing that challenge. Blake Pappaceno, Gavin DeWitt, Charlie Chandler, Hunter Sawyer, Cody Manley, Owen Libby-Sprague and Luchiano Pecorino will have only one season to play football for Prospect Mountain.

They will not benefit from several years of experience within an established varsity program. Instead, their responsibility is to help establish the culture that younger players will inherit.

Coach James Christie has set a fitting baseline expectation: compete. That is a sensible standard for a first-year program. Prospect Mountain is petitioning down to Division IV for its first two seasons and will not be eligible for the playoffs this fall. That makes conventional measures of success somewhat less important.

Success should instead be measured in progress. Are players learning the game? Are they improving from September to November? Are younger athletes seeing something they want to become part of? Is the program developing the discipline, sportsmanship and commitment that will sustain it long after the excitement of the inaugural season has passed? Those questions matter more than whether the Timber Wolves finish their first season with a winning record.

There is also a role for the community. New programs need spectators in the stands, parents willing to help, younger children imagining themselves in those uniforms someday and residents willing to support students who are attempting something new. The Sept. 11 opener against Newfound offers an opportunity to begin creating that atmosphere.

High school sports are at their best when they become community occasions. They give students another place to belong, another reason to challenge themselves and another opportunity to learn how preparation, teamwork and perseverance translate into results.

Football will now become part of that experience at Prospect Mountain. There will inevitably be mistakes and difficult games. That is part of building any program. There will also be firsts that can never be repeated: the first kickoff, first touchdown, first victory and first group of seniors to walk off the field knowing they helped establish something that did not exist before. Those are accomplishments worth remembering.

The Timber Wolves are beginning with a blank page. Twenty-eight young athletes now have the opportunity to write the first chapter.

LETTERS FROM EDWIN

Scary

There were things that I wanted to get done today. Even some on my mental list that I might have been able to get to if things had gone well. Well, I didn't get to any of them. Technology took over my day. Everything I did was totally dragged down like it had a ball and chain attached to it.

I went to the company's Web site and entered my password.

Incorrect.

I tried another password.

Incorrect.

Then I tried the password I was absolutely certain was correct.

Incorrect.

The Web site suggested that I reset my password. Fine.

I clicked the button. An email arrived containing a six-digit code. I copied the code, returned to the website and entered it. Then came the instructions for creating my new password.

It had to contain at least eight characters, one uppercase letter, one lowercase letter, one number, one symbol and, judging by the difficulty involved, possibly the maiden name of my third-grade teacher. I created one.

"Password does not

meet requirements."

Apparently, I had disappointed the Internet. So I created another. This one was accepted.

Then the Web site informed me that my new password could not be the same as any of my previous passwords. At this point, I began to miss stamps.

Passwords have become one of the great inconveniences of modern life. I understand why we need them. There are people out there who would happily steal our identities, empty our bank accounts and probably use our streaming subscriptions if given the opportunity. Security matters. But I am beginning to wonder how many secret combinations one ordinary human being is expected to remember.

The bank has a password. The credit card has a password. The utility company has a password. The doctor's office has a password. The insurance company has a password.

Every online store you've visited since 2009 appar-

ently has a password.

Then there are the rules. One Web site wants 10 characters. Another wants 12. One requires a symbol. Another does not allow certain symbols. Some want you to change your password every few months. And every computer expert tells us the same thing: Never use the same password twice. That's excellent advice if you're capable of memorizing 74 unrelated strings of letters, numbers and punctuation marks. I sometimes have trouble remembering why I walked into the kitchen.

There are password managers, of course. Those are programs designed to remember all your passwords so you don't have to. Naturally, the password manager itself requires a password. Lose that one and I assume you are sent back to 1987.

Then came two-factor authentication, which means knowing your password is no longer enough. Now you must prove that you are really you. A code gets sent to your phone.

This works beautifully unless your phone is in another room. Inevitably, mine is upstairs. So what began as an attempt to check an account balance becomes exercise. Up the stairs. Get the phone. Down the stairs. Enter the code. "Code expired." Back upstairs.

Technology was supposed to save us time. I suspect it has simply changed how we waste it. Still, I know better than to romanticize the old days too much. Writing checks wasn't particularly exciting, and standing in line at the bank on a Friday afternoon wasn't exactly a treasured American tradition.

There are enormous conveniences in being able to pay bills, transfer money and handle countless errands from the kitchen table. I simply wish my kitchen table didn't occasionally feel like the command center at NORAD.

Eventually, I got my bill paid. The Web site congratulated me. Then a little box appeared.

"Would you like us to remember this device?" Absolutely.

At this point, somebody ought to remember something.

NH Boat Museum casts off toward a broader, bolder future

MOULTONBOROUGH — Recently, Jaime Laurent boarded the Miss Lauren at The Lake Estate on Winnisquam and let the boat carry her out past the little cottages, the scattered islands, and all the way to the loon sanctuary.

As a trustee of the New Hampshire Boat Museum (NHBM), she could have called it a working trip. Instead, she went as a guest, because understanding what a visitor feels on the water is, in many ways, “the whole point.” “That’s our mission — to give people accessibility to the water,” she said. “It’s a through line to everything we do at

the museum.”

When Laurent first became involved, NHBM was largely the domain of technical boating enthusiasts — the people drawn to history and heritage, the evolution of propulsion, the art of restorations, the passion of it all. That core still matters, although something has changed.

“Now it’s a community,” she noted. “The museum has vitality, it has an interest, it has a draw...It’s attracting all ages and audiences.”

The evidence is everywhere she looks. Her neighbor, a fourth-grade teacher, wants to bring her class to NHBM because New Hampshire history is part of the curriculum. Families

linger longer now that children engage in a little marina play-table, lake life story hour, or hunt for a hidden otter tucked among the exhibits.

“I’ve had parents comment that they are enjoying the museum too,” said Laurent, “because their children explored for about an hour, and it allowed them to walk around and take in the exhibits.”

Her own path into the museum began, fittingly, with children. Years ago, while teaching at Brewster Academy, she was asked to run a summer camp for kids from kindergarten through sixth grade.

“It was a blast,” she recalled. “We played port and starboard games, the Marine Patrol came and invited them on their boat to teach safety skills, and the New Hampshire Department of Environment Services came to demonstrate with hands-on activities to include water tables that educated youth about management of shoreline and aquatic invasive species.

But now, Laurent is looking to the future. Within days, NHBM will complete a major renovation, opening a bright new community room she described as “a very clean, beautiful white envelope. This adds 6,500 square feet to the museum to share

the legends, stories and heritage of our beautiful region.”

A virtual boating trainer will soon anchor the space, giving visitors a chance to practice highly realistic on-water skills. She is thinking bigger, too. A small grant application, if awarded, could seed a career-exploration program connecting young people to the many trades that keep the Lakes Region’s boats afloat.

Now, as the board prepares to begin its next strategic plan this winter, Laurent is focused on keeping the momentum alive.

“You have to keep thinking forward,” she said. “We will evaluate what we have accomplished, focus on the audiences we serve, and set our priorities and goals for the next phase.”

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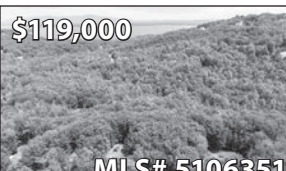

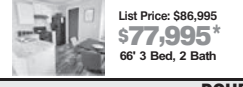
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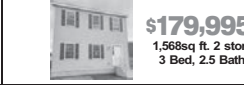

The concerts will begin at 7 p.m. and run for two hours, with a short intermission, at which time a pass the bucket offering will be held to support the free concert series.



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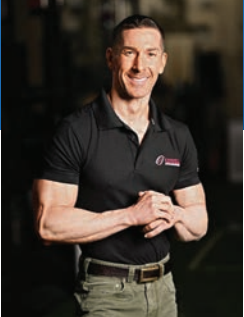


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
