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Franklin to honor NH's only Vietnam Medal of Honor recipient

FRANKLIN — This Memorial Day, Franklin will pay tribute to Lance Cpl. Jedh Colby Barker, USMC, killed in action on Sept. 21, 1967 while on patrol in Con Thien, Vietnam. The son of G. Colby Barker and Ruth Barker, Jedh was born in Franklin on June 20, 1945. He is the only recipient from the state of New Hampshire to receive this nation's highest military honor, the Medal of Honor, during the Vietnam War.

The unusual spelling of Jedh's first name resulted from his father's service in the Marine Corps during World War

II. His father combined the first letters of the first names of his closest Marine buddies to spell Jedh's name: John, Ezekiel, Donald and Herbert -JEDH.

The Barker family left New Hampshire when Jedh was six years old, relocating to Park Ridge, N.J. From an early age, Jedh was connected to sports, playing baseball and football as a youth, then later coaching his younger brother John's baseball and football teams. During his years at Park Ridge High School, Jedh distinguished himself in team sports. He served

as co-captain of both the baseball and football teams in his senior year and was voted "Most Athletic" by his classmates. He participated in the school chorus at PRHS, and surprising many, made quite a comedic turn in the Senior class play. In retrospect, his ability to lead and at the same time participate, attests to his cognizance of the team dynamic. Jedh later demonstrated these very same qualities, essential

After graduating from high school in 1964, Jedh attended Fairleigh Dickinson University in East Rutherford, New Jersey. In the fall of 1965, he transferred to Northeast

College in Kirksville, Mo. At Northeast (later renamed Truman State University), Jedh was recruited as a member of Coach "Red" Wade's Bulldogs football team.

Jedh left college in May 1966. With the spirit of Semper Fi firmly embedded in the Barker Family, he decided to follow in the footsteps of his father and older brother Warren and enlist in the United States Marine Corps. On his 21st birthday, June 20, 1966, Jedh enlisted in the United States Marine Corps Reserve, 1st Marine Corps District, New York, N.Y. until discharged to enlist in the regular Marine Corps on 05 October 1966. Upon completion of recruit training at Parris Island, S.C., he underwent individual combat training and weapons special training at Camp Lejeune, N.C. He was promoted to private first

Shortly after, Jedh returned home on leave to spend his last Christmas with his family. From there, he went on to Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton in California for additional infantry training. He then joined Marine Air Base Security MABS-12 in San Francisco, California, serving as group guard. Jedh was then assigned to Marine Air Base Security MABS-12 in Chu Lai, Vietnam, protecting planes around the outer perimeter of the air base.

However, Jedh and his two buddies from boot camp, both from New Hampshire, were getting restless with this assignment. They heard that the 3rd Marines needed replacements near the DMZ and volunteered to go. His buddies, Corrigan and Blair, went into 9th Marines. Jedh was re-assigned as a machine

Honoring the fallen

When Memorial Day was first celebrated, it was known as Decoration Day following the Civil War. Youngsters would place flowers in cemeteries while they sang songs and honored those lost due to war. The Civil War that ended in 1865 took the lives of more people than any other war in the history of the United States, the estimate is roughly 620,000. The Union losing 365,000 and the Confederacy 260,000. History says that more than half of these losses came as the result of disease. As a result, the first national cemeteries were created.

In 1868, General John A. Logan, the leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationwide day to honor fallen soldiers. General James Garfield gave a speech at Arlington National Cemetery on the first Decoration Day and the over 5,000 people in attendance decorated over 2,000 graves, both Union and Confederate.

The holiday as we all know is celebrated on the last Monday in May and became an official holiday in the year 1971. Parades across the country take place, and people visit cemeteries where family members who have served in the military have been laid to rest.

At 3 p.m. every year, a moment of silence takes place across the country. In December of 2008, President Bill Clinton signed the "National Moment of Remembrance Act" which designated the time be at 3:00 p.m. In 1966, the government marked Waterloo, New York as the official birthplace of Memorial Day. In Waterloo, every business in town would shut their doors and owners would venture out to decorate graves with flags as well as flowers.

Originally, Decoration Day was intended to honor those lost in just the Civil War. After WWI America felt the need, and rightfully so, to honor all those lost serving their country. In WWI 116,516 Americans died at war and 405,399 were lost during WWII. The Korean War took 36,574 lives and the Vietnam War cost 58,220 lives. 4,411 were lost in Operation Iraqi Freedom, 73 in Operation New Dawn, 2,346 as the result of Operation Enduring Freedom, 48 in Operation Freedom's Sentinel and 61 in Operation Inherent Resolve.

An estimated 38 million people in America will travel over the holiday weekend, and 2.5 million travelers will board flights. Memorial Day is the fourth busiest travel day of the year.

In New York, Washington, D.C and Chicago you can find the largest parades in the country

Because of the three day weekend, many Americans will throw parties and barbecues or head out of town for a mini getaway.



North Country Notebook

Of the Flying Circus kind, this wasp certainly ain't

The drone occurred at about 3 in the morning — not a drone that I was flying or anything like that, but the lumbering of something flying itself

It was a wasp, and no doubt about it, and not just any old wasp, and no doubt about that one, either. It was what's known as a mud wasp, the largest and most ungainly of the wasps that I know of, and one most familiar to me from my days of working around piles of freshly cut white pine—a resin-loving wasp named, well, something.

The problem is that there are all sorts of hinged-at-the-waist, dangling-legged, Flying Fortress kinds of winged creatures, some of them quite large, capable of carrying off babies. And this one was headed for me, no baby.

This sudden realization hit me like the proverbial wet washrag as I sat bolt upright and instinctively flung the bed-covers out and away. No, wait a minute---it was learned behavior, not instinct, because it was from a painful childhood incident.

When I have to fill out a medical form---a rare chore these days of more caution and fewer mishaps---I can still skip down through the allergies and check off "none." But I may well mark one category "not sure" because it involves (you guessed it) mud wasps.

First of all, mud wasps (or any species of wasp) don't bite, they sting. Where this confusion of morphology comes from I just don't know. They don't even have the right mouthparts to bite. But stingers, yes. Even the species known (unpopularly) as "white-faces" turn themselves at the last millisecond of their attack to use their abdomens to sting, or just grab hold with their legs, but sting they do.

In fact, the last time I was stung, it was the two white-faces typically posted as guards at the entrance to their nest—a small abode that had gone noticed in a roof-corner at a camp—that did it.

On that occasion, at one of my favorite destinations on the western shore of First Connecticut Lake, we all sat down to wait for the allergic reaction that never came. And I have no glimmer as to why not, except for this: maybe it was one of those pre-puberty things.

Whatever the case, I might not be allergic to wasp-stings any longer, because the painful childhood episode happened when I was a prepubescent kid of 8 or so growing up on Park Street (swamps in the back yard, and all that) in downtown Colebrook. It all could have gone out the window when I became that strange species known as "a teenager"

I know this because

I've been stung (not bitten) several times since, with no undue reaction. Still, you never know, and the instinct (wait—learned behavior) remains.



CONTINUED FROM PAGE A1 gunner to Fox Company, 2nd Battalion, 4th Marines, 3rd Marine Division. He was promoted to the rank of Lance Corporal on Sept. 1, 1967.

The 2nd battalion, 4th Marines were famously named "The Magnificent Bastards" for their legendary combat skills in Vietnam. Jedh became part of "Operation Kingfisher," a USMC operation that took place in the western part of Leatherneck Square, lasting from July 16 to Oct. 31, 1967. This operation was launched to destroy NVA forces just south of the DMZ.

On Sept. 21, the 2nd battalion, 4th Marines began a "search and destroy" mission and quickly encountered the entrenched 90th NVA regiment. It was on this day that LCpl Jedh Colby Barker gave his last full measure of devotion as a United States Marine. sacrificing his own life to save his fellow Marines.

On Oct. 31, 1969, more than two years after his death, Vice President Spiro T. Agnew posthumously presented the Medal of Honor to Jedh Barker's family during a White House ceremony. Lance Cpl. Jedh Colby Barker is buried in

George Washington Memorial Park in Paramus, New Jersey. Jedh will be forever remembered by those who knew him as a beloved son and brother, a team player, a loyal friend; and to all who know of his sacrifice, a hero in the truest sense of the word.

Jedh is survived by his elder sister Dolly Barker Lewis, younger sisters Susan Barker Rilliet and Anne Barker Kist, and younger brother John W. Barker, former member of the United States Army. Elder brother Warren, now deceased, retired as a Lieutenant Colonel in the United States Marine Corps, with service in both Korea and

Vietnam. Upon retirement, Jedh's parents, G. Colby Barker and Ruth Barker returned to their beloved Franklin, New Hampshire to live out their golden years. Their ashes are buried with Jedh at his gravesite in Paramus, New Jersey.

The family of Lacne Cpl. Barker welcome all who wish to attend the Memorial Day services to come together to honor our Fallen Veterans and Gold Star families on this day. The Lance Cpl. Jedh C. Barker Memorial Monument will be unveiled at the Franklin War Memorial across from Franklin High School on Memorial Day, May 30, at approximately noon.

In addition, at 2 p.m., there will be a special dedication service to Lance Cpl. Barker at the Franklin VFW Post 1698. Captain Alvin Mc-Bride USMC will be a keynote speaker. Jedh's sister, Susan, will participate as well. This year's recipient of the **USMC Barker Memorial** Leadership Award, LCpl Gardner USMC, will also be attending. Both Mc-Bride and Gardner, are proud members of the "Magnificent Bastards" of the 2nd Battalion,

4th Marines from Camp Pendleton, Calif.
