

Hello, and welcome back. At the last selectmen's meeting, it was announced that Scott Ruggles was resigning his position as Selectmen. He will be moving on, literally, to a new opportunity out of state. Scott has been a Tilton resident and with Tilton School for over 20 years, and will be missed greatly as a caring and active member of our community. Thank you, Scott, for all you have done for our town, and best of luck to you and your family with your new endeavors.

The selectmen received a letter from the DOT Commissioner, William Cass P.E., in response to their letter on what they consider to be dangerous road conditions on Route 3 along the Winnipesaukee River. Over the years, there has been substantial erosion of the river bank across from the island and heading north along the road that abuts the river. Commissioner Cass has assured the town that the current condition of the road is safe, and they will continue to monitor the road and guard rails. They have placed us in their ten year plan with a target date of 2029 for repairs. Needless to say, the selectmen were not happy with this response. I have no doubt we'll be hearing a lot more on this.

The selectmen also discussed our downtown and specifically the number of chairs, couches, tables, etc., finding their way from inside the buildings to residing outside on the sidewalk at all hours of the day and night. Making it potentially difficult for wheelchair access and or folks walking into shops, as well as potential safety concerns. The town does have an ordinance on the books and will be enforcing it. The Selectmen are also considering updating the ordinance and likely will have a public hearing to get feedback. I'll keep you posted.

The Town Hall will be getting much needed air conditioning in the form of mini-splits with work underway as of this week.

You may have noticed the new gate and fencing at the Island Bridge as well as repairs to a few of the boards. The DPW is trying to ensure that the bridge is safe enough to get light equipment over to clean up the island. Hopefully they'll get the go ahead and neaten things up, but you can't be too careful.

I am pleased to report that the Hartwell Concert Series will once again be at the Tilton School Amphitheater, starting on Sunday, July 14 with "Club Soda," Pop Hits from the '70's to the '90's. Should you like to volunteer or need more information, please call the Selectmen's Office at 603-286-4521, ext. 100.

The Planning Board had one agenda item for Tuesday, July 9. It was a public hearing on the Winnisquam Boats LLC redevelopment of boat storage at 1003 Laconia Rd. This is also on the agenda for the ZBA meeting scheduled for Tuesday, July 16. As they seek a variance for the demolition of the old buildings and replacing them with two new boat storage

My apologies to you all, as I missed the date on the first "2024 Lakes Region Household Hazardous Waste Collections." Good news, there's four more. The next will happen on July 27 at the Gilford DPW Garage, 55 Cherry Valley Rd., and at Meredith DPW Garage, 17 Jenness Hill Rd. Drop off starts at 8:30 a.m., and goes until noon. They'll take up to ten gallons or fifty pounds of waste. You can go to their Web site for more information on what they'll accept, at lakesrpc.





Jeffersons's Waumbek Golf Course reopens after major renovations



Waumbek Golf Course is open to the public again after two

years of being closed.

JEFFERSON — After being abandoned and closed for two years, Jefferson's historic Waumbek golf course has reopened to the public. The course has undergone significant upgrades including irrigation and drainage improvements, fertilization and aeration, new cart paths and bridges, and a few new hole layouts. In addition, new electric carts, a course beverage cart, on course restrooms, and a new practice putting green have been added. Memberships are available, and tee times can be booked online (www.waumbek.com) or through a mobile app.

The 18-hole Waumbek course, the oldest and one of the most scenic golf courses in the state of New Hampshire, was originally built in 1895. It has impressive views of the Presidential Range from almost every hole. The course has a 71 par

In order of difficulty, they are identifiable by blue, white, yellow and green tees. Advanced golfers will want to play the blues, while beginners will want to start on the green tees, which are closer to the holes.

Thanks to Waumbek Partners Forrest and Stacey Hicks of Jefferson and David and Sarah Hill of Lancaster, along with many local people who helped improve, build and regenerate the property, a spacious new clubhouse will open soon with a full restaurant, bar, and numerous open air decks. The restaurant is named Fenn's Way in honor of Arthur Fenn, the first American born golf professional, who helped design the original course and make the Waumbek a popular golf destination in the early 1900s. With the course

Who's ready for Paris?



There was a lot of paperwork, a lot of testing and a lot of empty stadiums. But, I was at the Olympics and there was no complaining about that.

The 2024 Summer Olympics in Paris kick off on Friday, July 26, and after working many hours making donuts, bread, cookies and the like at the Yum Yum Shop in Wolfeboro four or five mornings a week, the Paris trip is paid for and I will be boarding a plane on Monday night, July 22, with a final destination of Charles de-Gaulle Airport in Paris.

I know Dover diver Jessica Parrotto will be in her third Olympics, while former UNH star Elle (Purrier) St. Pierre is competing in two events in her second Olympics. But are there local connections? 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



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
