Belmont tax rate set at \$17.39

BELMONT — The Town of Belmont Tax Rate was set on Friday, Nov. 7.

The tax rate was set at \$17.39 per \$1,000 of assessed value. This is a \$1.65 increase (10.48 percent) from the 2024 rate of \$15.74. This rate is similar to 2023.

The Local and State Education tax combined is 63.71 percent, the Municipal portion is 30.99 percent and the County portion is 5.29 percent.

It was anticipated that tax bills would be sent by mail no later than Nov. 14, with a due date projected to be around Dec. 16.

Once tax bills are ready, and will be immediately available on the town Web site at belmontnh.gov > Departments > Town Clerk/Tax Collector.

Finding common ground in a season of small generosities

Late November in the Winnisquam region always carries a different sort of energy. The lake settles into its cold stillness, the last leaves cling to the edges of country roads, and communities begin their seasonal shift toward reflection and preparation. As Thanksgiving approaches, the calendar tends to fill quickly with food drives, community meals, winter coat collections and quiet acts of neighborliness that rarely make headlines but define life in towns like Tilton, Northfield, Belmont, Sanbornton and Laconia.

This is a time of year when people often talk about gratitude in grand terms. Yet the most meaningful expressions of generosity tend to happen in the margins: a bag of groceries dropped off at a pantry, a volunteer night at the school, a neighbor who plows someone else's driveway without being asked. These gestures don't require committees, budgets or speeches. They simply require someone deciding that the community is stronger when people look out for one another.

Local organizations are already at work on that front. Food pantries in Laconia and Tilton have urged families to donate shelf-stable items as holiday demand increases. Churches across the region are finalizing plans for their Thanksgiving meals. School groups are organizing winter gear drives, and service clubs are lining up volunteers for December events. None of these tasks is glamorous. All are essential.

The value of these efforts goes beyond meeting immediate needs. They remind us that community is not a passive condition. It is something built every day through small choices that accumulate into a shared sense of responsibility. When people show up for one another, even in modest ways, it strengthens the foundation that holds our towns together in more difficult times.

This year, the calls for assistance are especially notable. Rising costs continue to strain many households, including those who have not historically needed help. Local service providers have reported an uptick in first-time visitors. That reality underscores the importance of supporting the organizations that serve as safety nets and gathering points. A donation of time, funds, or goods is never wasted. It is an investment directly into the region's stability and wellbeing.

There is another piece worth considering. Acts of community service offer something in return for the giver: connection. It is easy in busy seasons to retreat into routines, to hurry between obligations and let the days slip past. But shared work — stacking boxes at a food drive, sorting winter clothing, preparing a meal for others — invites conversation, understanding and perspective. It reminds people that even in small towns, we often know far less about one another than we assume.

As winter settles in, these small efforts matter even more. Cold weather brings its own challenges, from heating expenses to transportation difficulties to simple isolation. A kind gesture offered now can ripple far beyond the moment.

The Lakes Region has long been defined by the quiet steadiness of its residents. People here tend not to draw attention to their generosity; they simply do what needs to be done. That unassuming spirit is a strength worth celebrating and maintaining.

In the week ahead, as families prepare meals, gather with friends or simply take a breath before December begins, there is value in pausing to appreciate the work happening behind the scenes. There is also value in asking a simple question: What small action can I take that would make life easier for someone else?

Not every contribution needs to be large. In fact, the durability of a community is often built on the accumulation of small things — the sort that don't make the news yet shape the character of a place. If each of us contributes even one such act in the weeks ahead, the impact will be felt not only during Thanksgiving, but throughout the winter to come.

From hosiery to heritage: The long life of the Belmont Mill

BELMONT — The redbrick Belmont Mill, rising above the Tioga River in the center of town, has stood for more than 180 vears as one of the most recognizable industrial landmarks in the Lakes Region. Its survival is not accidental. The building has been reinvented multiple times since the 1830s, reflecting the economic and civic transformations of the community that grew around it.

A mill village takes shape

The original structure dates to 1833, when local investors formed the Gilmanton Village Manufacturing Company to produce cotton textiles along the river. At the time, Belmont was still part of Gilmanton, and the village that would become Belmont developed around the mill complex, which once included a dam, machine shops, boarding houses and outbuildings.

By the 1850s, the site changed hands several times, weathering economic cycles common to textile towns. The 19th century brought both expansion and disaster; fires in 1865 and 1875 destroyed portions of the complex, prompting significant reconstruction and the addition of the four-story brick

structure that still stands

Hosiery makes the mill a regional employer

The use that cemented the mill's identity came in 1884, when the Belmont Hosiery Company moved into the building and began large-scale production of wool and cotton stockings. For decades, hosiery dominated the local economy, employing hundreds of men and women from Belmont, Laconia, Northfield and surrounding rural

villages. Historic reports note that the company produced both knit and seamless stockings and shipped its goods throughout New England. By the turn of the century, the mill village was thriving enough that Belmont voted to separate from Gilmanton and incorporate as its own town in 1869, a decision strongly influenced by the presence of the growing mill industry.

Decline and uncertainty Like many New England mill towns, Belmont faced a long economic shift in the 20th century as textile production moved south and, later, overseas. By the mid-1900s, hosiery operations tapered off, and the mill passed through various small manufactur-

By the 1960s and 1970s, the future of the building was unclear. Portions of the structure deteriorated, and there was increasing concern about fire safety, code compliance and structural viability. Several proposals surfaced — from demolition to commercial redevelopment — but none materialized.

A pivotal decision in the 1990s

The turning point came in 1996, when Belmont residents voted to rehabilitate the mill for municipal and community use rather than allow the structure to fall into disrepair. The project was ambitious: stabilize the building, preserve its historic features, and convert the interior into offices, meeting rooms and public spaces.

The \$3.2 million restoration, completed in 1998, remains one of the region's most significant adaptive-reuse efforts. It included new mechanical systems, fire suppression, interior renovations and the reconstruction of historically sensitive exterior elements. The project received multiple preservation honors, including recognition from the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance. Source: New Hampshire Preservation Alliance.

A center of community

Today, the Belmont Mill houses town offices, meeting rooms, community programming and public events. Historical photographs displayed in its hallways show workers lined up outside the old hosiery plant, evidence of the

building's industrial past. The mill also anchors the broader Belmont Village Revitalization Project, a multi-decade effort to preserve historic buildings, improve walkability and strengthen the civic heart of the community.

An enduring landmark

Few structures in the Winnisquam region illustrate the arc of New England history as clearly as the Belmont Mill. It has survived fire, economic upheaval, industrial decline and the uncertainty that follows when a town grows beyond its early in-

Its restoration ensured that, rather than stand as a relic, the mill remains a working part of the village - a reminder of how communities can honor their past while building toward their future.

protects vulnerable nest sites, rescues loons in distress, conducts research to determine threats to loon survival and nesting success, and educates the public about loons and their needs.

While it has not yet recovered to historic levels, New Hampshire's loon population has more than

quadrupled from the lows documented in the 1970's, growing to 370 pairs in 2025.

"The ongoing recovery of New Hampshire's loon population shows what can happen when science and community come together," said Harry Vogel, LPC Senior Biologist and Executive Director. "The progress we've made is not the work of our staff alonefor fifty years, we've worked hand-in-hand with the people of New Hampshire to protect loons and their habitats. Every person who volunteers, donates, or takes the time to learn about loons and help them has played a role in this success story. As we reach this fifty-year milestone, we are both celebrating the successes we've seen so far and looking forward to the next fifty years of loon conservation in New Hampshire."

The Holiday Open House, says Vogel, is one way for LPC to thank the public for five decades of support. It will take place on Saturday, Nov. 29 from 10 a.m.–2 p.m. at The Loon Center (183 Lees Mill Rd. in Moultonborough). Admission is free, and all ages are invited and will be warmly welcomed.
