From BVT to Tufts

MILFORD ARTIST ADONIS DEKING TO JOIN SMFA'S ELITE MASTER OF CREATIVE PRACTICE PROGRAM

MILFORD — For artist Adonis Deking of Milford, the arrival of a letter from Tufts University on Feb. 4 was more than just an admission notice; it was the start of a new chapter in a journey defined by cultural heritage, technical mastery, and community service.

Deking has been officially accepted into the Master of Arts in Creative Practice at the School of the Museum of Fine Arts (SMFA) at Tufts. The innovative program, designed «by artists for artists.» offers a flexible, individualized studio practice—a perfect fit for an artist who has spent his career bridging the gap between digital animation and traditional community healing.

A return to collaborative learning

After earning his Bachelor of Fine Arts (B.F.A.) in Animation from the Savannah College of Art and Design (SCAD), Deking spent time navigating the professional art world as a self-guided creator.

“My reaction to getting the letter was relief and excitement that I could get back into learning in a professional setting,” Deking shared. “After getting my BFA, I felt lost for a lot of that time. Now, I have the opportunity to collaborate with other artists at a similar level, sharing stories and ideas about how to amplify our voices.”

Deking’s current focus is an author-illustrated picture book exploring the Filipino-American experience. At Tufts, he intends to expand this project, seeking out fellow

artists to collaborate on works centered on inner strength and cultural celebration.

A foundation in heritage and service Deking’s path to the New Ivy was paved with local excellence and a deep commitment to his roots. A graduate of Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School (BVT), he was a standout student in the Multimedia Communications program. His academic rigor was matched by his cultural education at Boston’s Iskwelahang Pilipino (IP), the nation’s longest-running Filipino cultural school.

His portfolio—highlighted by recent exhibitions like “New England History” (2026) and “Lakes” (2025)—reflects a mastery of visual storytelling. However, it is his history of service that truly distinguishes him:

Cultural stewardship: As an active volunteer and alumnus of IP, Deking helps preserve Filipino heritage through performances with the IP Carolers and mentoring youth.

Civic engagement: For years, he represented IP’s outreach efforts at the Lowell Folk Festival, fostering cross-cultural exchange at one of the country’s largest folk gatherings.

Art as therapy: Deking hosted «Paint-Therapy» sessions at the Bay Path Practical Nursing Academy in Charlton, providing an emotional outlet for nursing students facing the rigors of healthcare education.

Deking’s acceptance to Tufts has also earned him a high recommendation for the PAMANA Inc. Scholarship. Supporters describe him as the “quintessential representative of Pamana (Heritage).» noting his ability to honor his roots while building a legacy for the future.

Dr. Ayanna Thomas, Dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences at Tufts, expressed the university’s excitement in welcoming Deking to their “diverse and academically stimulating” community.

For the Milford community and the wider Filipino-American diaspora in New England, Deking’s move to Tufts represents the rise of a leader who will undoubtedly amplify their narrative in the fine arts. As he prepares to begin his graduate career in the Fall of 2026, Deking’s “heart remains firmly planted in his community.”

UHS Athletic Director earns statewide recognition

Now in her fourth year at Uxbridge High School, Wandyes came to her role after a lengthy and decorated career at Bryant University, where she supported the Division I programs in a variety of capacities, including lead compliance officer, a sport supervisor and liaison with financial, academic support, and student affairs. Living longer, healthier & happier: Blue Zones programs at Plummer Place

NORTHBRIDGE — Over the past year, Plummer Place, Home of the Northbridge Senior Center, has expanded its offerings for local seniors by incorporating Blue Zones-inspired classes designed to help participants learn lifestyle habits associated with longevity and well-being. These programs, led by the Center’s Program and Volunteer Coordinator Amy Cowen and supported through community interest, has brought a fresh focus on healthy living in a fun and social environment.

In April 2025, Plummer Place launched a four-week “Introduction to the Blue Zones” class aimed at teaching seniors the basics of longevity principles — inspired by the communities around the world recognized as Blue Zones for their high numbers of healthy older adults. Participants met on Thursday mornings to explore habits linked to longer lives, including purpose, movement, diet,

and social connection. The session included a book to guide the class, guest speakers, community challenges, and interactive discussions to help transform healthy Blue Zones’ tips into daily routines.

Encouraged by the strong participation and energy in the spring class, Cowen then introduced “The Blue Zones Kitchen: 100 Recipes to Live to 100” in September-October 2025. This course dove deeper into the culinary and nutritional side of longevity, blending practical cooking guidance with Blue Zones philosophy. Highlights included: exploring the foods and kitchen practices tied to longer lifespans, insights into how plant-centric meals can support overall health, a cooking demonstration and discussions of the joy and community around eating healthfully. As with the spring session, this class included educational content, opportunities to con-

nect with peers, and challenges to bring Blue Zones habits into seniors’ daily lives.

Both the spring and fall programs were designed to be inclusive and interactive, creating space for seniors to not just learn but practice new habits together. By focusing on the Blue Zones framework — which emphasizes lifestyle factors like purpose, movement, plant-based eating, social engagement, and stress reduction — participants gained tools for improving both physical and emotional health. While these classes were structured with guidance and materials, the heart of their value came from fostering supportive group experiences that reinforce healthy choices through shared weekly participation.

“The Blue Zones classes are part of the Senior Center wanting to help seniors age with vitality,



Volunteer as a regular site monitor assigned to a particular site or serve as a "floater" to cover sites on an "as needed" basis. Fieldwork not your thing? Come volunteer in the water-testing lab, which operates out of the Tri-River Family Health Center in Uxbridge.

The BRC trains community scientists to participate in the Coalition's watershed-wide water quality monitoring program. The goal of this long-running program is to gather infor-

mation about the current status of, and long-term changes in, the health of the Blackstone River watershed. This information helps local policy makers, state officials, and concerned community members make the Blackstone River cleaner for people and wildlife.

More than 90 volunteers work with the BRC to sample 75 sites throughout the watershed from Worcester to Pawtucket. Sites are sampled on the second Saturday of each month from April through November. Field monitors and floaters are trained in a 1 hr. session to test for dissolved oxygen at the site, record physical and aesthetic

parameters, and collect a water sample that they drop off at the lab between 9 a.m. and noon on

the Saturday of testing. Lab volunteers, who help test these samples for nutrients, conductivity, and turbidity, do not need to commit to helping each month and can be trained the first time they assist.

There are two additional sampling teams in the program. The Headwaters Team samples waterways from Worcester to Grafton and runs its lab out of Mass Audubon's Broad

Meadow Brook Wildlife Sanctuary in

Worcester. The Rhode Island Team samples waterways from Woonsocket to Pawtucket and runs its lab

out of Sycamore Landing in Lincoln, R.I. The Rhode Island Team and the Headwaters Team are also looking for volunteers.

The quiet importance of public works

Most of us do not think about public works departments until something goes wrong.

When a road floods after a storm. When a water main breaks. When snow piles high and school is delayed. When a tree falls across a travel lane.

But in Douglas, Uxbridge, Northbridge and Whitinsville, public works crews are on the job long before most of us notice.

They patch roads in summer heat. They inspect culverts before heavy rain. They maintain sidewalks near schools. They monitor drinking water systems. They plow before dawn so commuters can reach Route 146 or head toward Worcester.

It is steady, largely invisible work.

Across our region, infrastructure is aging. Many of our roads were laid out generations ago. Water and sewer systems in some areas date back decades. Bridges, culverts and drainage systems must withstand increasingly unpredictable weather patterns.

These are not flashy projects. They do not generate ribbon cuttings or headlines unless something fails. But they require careful planning, long-term budgeting and public understanding.

Residents often see the line item on a town meeting warrant or in a budget hearing and wonder why the cost is high. Replacing a culvert can run into six figures. Repaving even a short stretch of road can carry a steep price tag. Equipment like plow trucks and loaders must be replaced on a cycle to remain reliable.

But postponing maintenance rarely saves money. It often increases costs.

A small crack becomes a pothole. A neglected drainage system becomes a flooded intersection. Deferred equipment replacement becomes an emergency repair during a winter storm.

Public works departments must balance immediate needs with long-term planning. They stretch budgets. They apply for state Chapter 90 funding. They coordinate with utilities. They respond to resident concerns while trying to prioritize projects based on safety and condition.

And they do so in all weather.

There is also a workforce challenge. Many towns face retirements among experienced staff. Recruiting skilled workers who can operate heavy equipment, understand water systems and respond to emergencies is not easy. Competitive wages, training opportunities and safe working conditions matter if communities want to retain talent.

When we talk about investing in our towns, infrastructure deserves a place in that conversation. Smooth roads, reliable water service and safe sidewalks are not luxuries. They are foundations of daily life.

They affect property values. They affect public health. They affect whether businesses choose to locate here.

As fall approaches and winter planning begins in earnest, our public works crews are already preparing for snow and ice, even while finishing summer projects.

It may not be the most visible work in town government, but it may be among the most essential.

The next time you drive a freshly paved stretch of road, turn on the tap, or pass a plow clearing the way before sunrise, it is worth remembering: community strength is built not only in council chambers and classrooms, but also in garages, workshops and along the roadside.

Public works may operate quietly, but their impact is everywhere.

And that quiet reliability is something worth recognizing.

A new tax on each and every retail delivery in Northern Virginia: deliveries by Amazon, Uber Eats, FedEx, UPS, etc. This is similar to the tax imposed on Minnesota by soon-to-be Ex-Governor Tim Walz.

An expansion of the retail sales tax on things that formerly were exempt: admission to recreation, fitness, sports facilities, non-medical personal services or counseling. This includes a new tax on dry cleaning, laundry services, residential home repair, maintenance, landscaping or cleaning services. The tax also includes computer-related services, and travel, event and aesthetic planning services [wedding planning services].

A new law would allow towns to implement a local sales tax. Think of it! A sales tax on every cookie, doughnut or pizza!

A tax on the developer of any solar energy project or energy

storage system to pay a one-time fee of two cents per watt of generation or storage capacity. This per watt fee will cost hundreds of thousands and likely millions of dollars before the project actually generates any electricity. The cost will be born by consumers.

Let’s remember, our own dear Governor has not been able to build one EV charger on our state highways, despite receiving \$64 million federal dollars in 2022 from Biden for that exclusive purpose. Not one in four years.

And our dear Governor, who is from Maryland and grew up in New Hampshire, only to come here and carpetbag her way into our government, told the Governor of New Hampshire not to build an ICE holding facility there.

Aren’t these new codes great?

To the Editor:

Are these new building and plumbing code changes great or what?

And so, in this week’s guide to the building codes for the dummies who wrote those left-leaning code additions, a brief introduction to flood plain management as per the new codes starts off the fun.



Sheriff Lewis Evangelidis noted that shortly after taking office in 2011, he decided to privatize the WCSO Medical Department, believing that it was one of the best decisions of his tenure.

"Subcontracting medical services through Wellpath significantly reduces liability for the Commonwealth while allowing us to provide a higher level of care to those in our custody," Evangelidis said.

The recognition reflects a year of sustained progress under the leadership of Anjuli Richard, Health Services Administrator, and Kayla Carlo, Assistant Health Services Administrator. Together, Richard and Carlo built upon the facility's strong foundation by strengthening workplace culture, refining clinical and operational processes, and expanding access to care through enhanced interdisciplinary coordination.

Anjuli Richard commented, "This award highlights the hard work, resilience, and teamwork demonstrated every day by our staff, as well as the strong collaboration with the Sheriff's Office in supporting a safe, respectful, and effective environment for care."

Wellpath is an international provider of contracted healthcare services for correctional facilities and other high-risk environments. The company employs more than 8,000 professionals and serves nearly 300 facilities across the United States and Australia, providing care to approximately 200,000 patients each day.

The WCSO medical team includes physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, nurses, and other healthcare professionals who provide 24/7 medical coverage. The medical unit is housed within the Sheriff's Office Intake and Medical Unit, a modern, purpose-built facil-

ity that opened in 2021 and was designed to centralize intake, medical screening, and long-term care.

Key accomplishments contributing to the Facility of the Year designation include securing a \$25,000 UMass Medical School grant to expand ophthalmologic services and vision care, as well as partnering with MCPHS University to enhance dental health education through student involvement. The facility also prioritized workforce development by establishing a nurse-led onboarding committee, implementing shift huddles and a staff Idea Board, achieving zero first-year staff turnover, and maintaining 100 percent compliance with annual training requirements.

Additional partnerships with Anna Maria College allowed 27 Bachelor of Science in Nursing students to complete clinical observation hours. Collaboration with UMass hospital case managers further improved continuity of care for patients returning from hospital stays. Operational enhancements included the creation of an Infirmary Committee to support compliance with updated NCCCHC standards and the launch of regular interdisciplinary meetings with non-Wellpath mental health partners.

"This award affirms the meaningful progress we have made over the past decade to strengthen the operations of the Worcester County Sheriff's Office," said Lew Evangelidis. "I'm especially proud of the strong partnership we have built with our healthcare team and the professionalism our corrections staff demonstrates in working alongside them to support those in our care."

achieve a common goal without expecting anything in return.)

A legacy of service continues: Partnership of Purpose, 2012-2026

Having spent over a decade guiding future nurses at Bay Path Practical Nursing Academy, Dr. Bolandrina is no stranger to humanitarian efforts. While her retirement in late 2025 marked the end of an era for nursing education, it signaled the beginning of a new "tour of duty" alongside her husband.

The 2026 project began when the Bolandrinis visited Bruce and Mary Willoughby, the retiring owners of O'Neil's Bicycle Shop in Gardner. Faced with hundreds of used bicycles that needed a new home, Joseph reached out to Bikes for the World (BfW), a non-profit they have supported for years and have helped to send shipments to the Philippines (coordinated with Bikes for the Philippines).

This mission is the continuation of a shared passion; both Joseph and Gretheline have been volunteers with Bikes for the Philippines since 2012. For 14 years, the couple has worked in tandem—collecting, organizing, and delivering donated bicycles from their local Massachusetts community to the BfW headquarters. Their long-standing partnership has

been instrumental in ensuring that hundreds of bicycles have reached the Philippines through Bikes for the Philippines, transforming the lives of students and workers across the archipelago. Hundreds more for the rest of the world through Bikes for the World.

Powered by the Bay Path community

The mission was a true team effort. The Bay Path community—comprising former students, faculty, and local friends—helped the Bolandrinis reach their fundraising goals. A key celebration and fundraiser held on Gretheline's 59th birthday at Kuru Kuru Ramen shop in the Worcester Public Market provided the necessary funds to rent the 20-foot U-Haul truck required for the long haul to Maryland.

"I have seen how second-hand bikes enrich lives," Joseph explained. "From helping a student graduate to giving a small-scale entrepreneur a way to reach the market, these bikes are tools for independence."

Navigating the "Plan B" route

The trek to the Bikes for the World headquarters in Rockville, Md., tested the couple's resolve. The duo spent hours navigating around New York's low-clearance parkways.

"Every time we saw a 'NO

TRUCKS' sign on a parkway on-ramp, we had to scramble for a Plan B," Joseph shared. Despite adding hours to their transit time, the couple arrived safely to deliver 55 bicycles to BfW leaders Yvette Powell Hess and Taylor Jones.

A commemorative honor

In recognition of their years of advocacy, Yvette presented Joseph with an Official Bikes for the World 2005-2025 Commemorative Coin. The Bolandrinis plan to keep the coin as a family heirloom,

eventually passing it to their grandson, Tidus, to inspire the next generation of service.

For the retired Academy Director, the journey was a reminder that while she may have stepped down from the helm of the practical nursing Academy, her mission to heal and help the world is far from over.

"Life is best shared," the couple reflected. "We are tired, but we have a grateful grin that isn't going away."
