

Volunteers pitch in at Lucy Stone Park

WARREN - A team of local volunteers hasn't let the many adversities of the pandemic get in the way of projects at Lucy Stone Park.

Throughout the fall, masked volunteers have descended on the park to complete an array of projects that prepare the grounds for winter. Under the direction of Tim O'Brien, a longtime resident of West Warren, volunteers have been hard at work on the six acres comprising the park.

The volunteer efforts not only improve the park, but they also honor its namesake – a prominent U.S. orator, abolitionist, and suffragist whose dying words, "Make the world better," have inspired the community for nearly 130 years.

Of course, this year's volunteers haven't been alone, adding to the work of past community service contributors.

"So many others have gotten their hands dirty and backs tired - while volunteering to transform the bramble-ridden park to a place of beauty, contemplation, family, fishing, peace, and fun," read a statement released by park volunteers. "Many hands make light work, and many hands have worked together to make this corner of the world a better place."

Among the most recent volunteer efforts, a local Boy Scout from West Brookfield built the park's volunteer tool shed as part of his Eagle Scout proj-

Gobi touts commitment to fight against COVID-19

majority of struggles related to COVID-19 have been well-documented, countless residents are grappling with largely unseen challenges. Seeking her fourth term, Sen. Anne Gobi is focused on assisting people in all phases of the recovery effort.

Having served the Worcester, Hampden, Hampshire, and Middlesex District since 2015, Gobi currently chairs the Senate Higher Education Committee and the Environment, Natural Resources, and Agriculture Committee. Additionally, she co-chairs a number of caucuses, enabling her to strongly advocate for badly needed aid.

"This term, as Co-Chair of the Rural Caucus, I have successfully fought for increases in unrestricted local aid, Chapter 90 money, and funding for numer-

ous programs, which allows our Executive Office of Housing and Economic Development to administer grants to help struggling communities," Gobi said. "This includes over \$100 million to wrap up the last mile of broadband infrastructure to un-served and under-served communities."

Moreover, Gobi worked with the towns of New Braintree and Petersham, as well as Mass Broadband, to provide a cost-effective solution for their broadband needs.

"Our most rural towns are finally getting connected and more attractive to young families looking to settle in the region," Gobi said.

As Co-Chair of the Regional School Caucus, Gobi has helped secure increases in Chapter 70 money, regional school transportation, and funding that assists students with special needs. She plans to continue fighting to secure state money

SPENCER – Selectmen voted last week to hold trick-or-treating for one hour on Halloween, with strict safety measures in place.

"A lot of the towns around us are either yellow or red [on the state's COVID-19 community risk map], and I am afraid of people coming in from other towns where trick-or-treating has been canceled," said Selectman Gary Woodbury, who voted against holding trick-or-treating this year. "How can you keep everybody safe? We can't expect the police to be out there checking whether every person is wearing a mask and social distancing. There are just too many risks."

Spencer officials are urging families to follow all guidelines and not exceed the hour-long session. Also, trick-or-treaters are reminded to keep off properties that are darkened and avoid gathering in groups. Parents and guardians are asked to accompany their children at all times

this year to ensure social distancing, rather than allow them to go trick-or-treating in unmonitored groups of friends.

limited to 25 people indoors and 50 people outdoors," read a statement released by selectmen and the Town Administrator's

"If people take personal responsibility and follow the health protocols, we can minimize the risks," said Selectman Anthony Pepe.

All residents who choose to hand out treats must also wear a mask. Additionally, rather than open the door for trick-or-treaters, please consider leaving individually wrapped goodie bags for families to grab and go. These can be left at the end of your porch, walkway, or driveway to help minimize face-to-face contact.

Moreover, please wash your hands before preparing treat bags. If you don't wish to participate in the trick-or-treating process this year, simply leave your home dark.

In addition to trick-or-treating, Halloween parties are yet another concern for officials.

"Gatherings at private residences are

limited to 25 people indoors and 50 people outdoors," read a statement released by selectmen and the Town Administrator's office. "For indoor/outdoor gatherings of more than 10 people where participants are from different households, all persons over the age of five years must wear a face covering unless they have a medical condition."

No restrictions are in place preventing trick-or-treaters from surrounding towns from taking part in the Spencer event. Some officials are concerned that this could cause problems with social distancing and traffic management, but it was determined that enforcement of restrictions would be too challenging for the one-hour period.

Spencer's annual Halloween party at Town Hall was previously canceled.

for rural schools with declining

enrollments. Also, as the Chair of the Food System Caucus, Gobi has advocated for increased funding for school meals programs and the Healthy Incentives Program, which allows access to nutritious foods for people who receive SNAP benefits.

chaired the Gobi also Crumbling **Foundations** Commission, helping to secure critical assistance for affected homeowners.

Despite the significant gains Gobi was able to make for her district this year, the suffering caused by COVID-19 has overshadowed the accomplishments of all legislators in 2020. Gobi and her colleagues have seen the widespread hardships every day, with desperate residents and business owners calling their offices in search of help.

Looking ahead, Gobi knows the urgency that is needed to help save lives and careers.

COVID-19 has affected lives and livelihoods. We will be feeling the effects of this pandemic for years to come," Gobi said. "Our state revenue continues to decline, as we are facing some of the highest unemployment numbers we have seen in decades."

Added Gobi, "The coronavirus has brought with it a great deal of mental distress caused by isolation, food insecurity, housing insecurity, and the anxiety that comes with them. I am proud to have advocated for additional funding for behavioral and mental health services. We have seen an uptick in depression, suicide, and substance use during this crisis, and our law enforcement officers have had to deal with much of that. They need our support now as much as ever. I continue to stand with them and appreciate the endorsement of the Massachusetts Chiefs of Police Association.'

Another major concern during the pandemic is unreported child abuse, Gobi said. She and other legislators are worried about kids and families who are suffering in silence. The statewide shutdown this past spring caused many vital services and personnel to be suspended or reduced, which has led to major problems.

"Reports of child abuse and neglect have decreased over 50 percent during COVID-19, not because abuse has stopped but because of this pandemic. There are thousands of children who have not been in front of a mandated reporter in seven months," Gobi said. "Now, more than ever, we need to support our teachers and the staffs of our schools, and be sure they have access to much needed behavioral health services and the capacity to assist their most vulnerable students.'

Gobi has also seen the devastation of the virus in the western part of the state. At the Holyoke Soldiers' Home, 76 veterans lost their lives during the early part of the pandemic. Several probes and reports have indicated that the COVID-19 outbreak at the facility was caused by major failures in policies and decisions at the leadership level.

Looking ahead, Gobi is committed to getting answers for veterans and their families on what went wrong in Holyoke - and how to better serve our aging veterans' healthcare needs.

"This pandemic has shown the gaps in our healthcare system and ability to react quickly to crisis," Gobi said. "As a member of the Special Oversight Committee to investigate the Soldiers' Home, I will work in the coming days and months to make sure those deaths were not in vain and that every veteran receives the highest level of care possible."

Gobi has also honed a comprehensive strategy to help the region recover from the pandemic and ensure long-term sustainability. Students, educators, manufacturers, small businesses, and local farmers will form the linchpin of Gobi's plan.

"In order to move forward, we must make sure our local economy can thrive," Gobi said. "Our manufacturers need a welltrained workforce, and making sure our vocational schools and community colleges have the resources they need in order to train and retrain workers is a necessity. Our public schools also play an important role to make sure the next generation of students have the skills needed to be viable in a changing economy, and our farmers need continued assistance such as the dairy tax credit that I have been proud to support."

Looking ahead, the Senior Center will launch additional projects to help protect seniors and staff.

"We just received approval from our Town Administrator to install counter guards in our large room," Cloutier "This will provide said. anti-virus shields for our seniors. It is our hope that with the installation of these, along with making certain that masks and all proper steps are taken - including no-contact forehead digital thermometers – we may

be able to serve meals and play bingo with a limited attendance."

Senior Center leaders thank town officials for their continued assistance.

"We are very fortunate here in Leicester to have the support of our administration in our efforts to assist our seniors," Cloutier said.

Although the Senior Center won't be able to have normal programming for a while, an array of specialized services are still being offered. Seniors are able to stop in and obtain food that is delivered by Bill Moore, of Project New Hope, who visits every Wednesday and Friday. Seniors may enter the building and select foods after they have their temperatures taken.

The Senior Center is also continuing its outdoor exercise programs with Heidi Gambaccini, as well as the Meals on Wheels program with new Nutrition Site Manager Karen Chiaravallotti.

With the installation of the acrylic guards, which will allow for up to six people to sit at one table, we are hoping to eventually be back to normal," Cloutier said.

The Senior Center staff is also looking forward to eventually resuming the Leicester Senior Citizens Group, which takes part in such activities as golf, bowling, and trips. The group hasn't met since March, but Senior Center officials have worked hard to keep them connected.

"I decided to send them our monthly newsletter at no cost," Cloutier said. "It is my sincere prayer that this devastating virus will soon be done, and the hundreds of seniors who come here can return to

a foster parent bill of rights that will have a major impact moving forward.

"Over the past few years, many of my colleagues and I have met with numerous dedicated foster parents to hear their concerns regarding their treatment from the state. We were able to pass a bipartisan bill recognizing that foster parents are the backbone of the Department of Children and Families, and promises better communication from all stakeholders involved," Berthiaume said.

The Spencer legislator also cast votes on several major pieces of legislation

that were signed into law this session, including Nicky's Law, which established a statewide "do not hire" registry to track caregivers who abuse clients with intellectual and developmental dis-

Berthiaume was also appointed to two special committees this session that mean a lot to him personally. He will serve on the special oversight committee tasked with studying the COVID-19 outbreak and deaths of 76 veterans at the Holyoke Soldiers' Home. The com-





Kavanaugh had encouraged Starr to ask sexually explicit questions. Later, Kavanaugh joined the legal team of George W. Bush to stop the counting of ballots in Florida in 2000. After Bush took office, Kavanuagh worked in the White House for Bush's AG. Later in Bush's presidency he was nominated to the federal judiciary. Democrats were getting back at him for his Ken Starr days but in reality, he was a terrible choice for the court due to his partisan

same music, lived in small houses, rode in the same types of cars, had fathers who all worked at the same types of jobs, and most of our mothers stayed home and raised us. They had "Friday School" where they learned their Church's doctrines, and we went to Sunday School where our teachers attempted to do the same thing. They gave up things for Lent, and we didn't. They went to Church on Ash Wednesday to get ashes put on their foreheads (which I always sort of secretly admired--it looked kind of cool), but we, again, didn't share that ritual. But, unlike many of our parents, the differences to us, if any, were not worth talking about.

When they came up to bat in a baseball game, they would scratch a cross in the dirt front of the plate with their bat, and I, ever the cynic, would wonder, "Is he asking for a fat pitch?" They also pinned a little medallion to the back of their ball caps which I also thought looked kind of neat, but never understood its significance. On team busses, whenever we passed a Catholic Church, they would make the sign of the cross. Before they dove into the YMCA swimming pool, they would also make that same gesture. The priests wouldn't let us Prods play for the parish basketball team as we weren't parishioners, but the other churches in town had the same policy, so it all evened out. Things have changed just a bit since then, don't you think?

As high school boys with hormones raging almost out of control, we all lived for the Friday night C.Y.O. (Catholic Youth Organization) dances at the French Church (St. Colman's), where they let anyone come in and where we could dance with our impossibly cute French, Irish, Italian. Polish and Lithuanian female classmates. As the night wore on, the priest with a benignant, avuncular smile on his face, would walk amongst the tooclose-dancers with a cautionary "Leave some room for the Holy Ghost, please."

That was a long time ago, and except for the drill instructors--who weren't known for delicacy in matters of speechin boot camp on Sunday mornings growling, "All right, you mackerel snappers, fall in for mass!" before he marched them off to weekly services, I haven't heard or thought of those awkward times since

coming of age and leaving it all behind, and I thought it was all behind us. Now,



Stand up for decency and democrary

As our spirit pants through what we hope is the last lap of the presidential election race, headlines have begun popping up around the country about voter intimidation. There are fears but also realities, from a mail ballot drop box set afire in Boston to supporters of a president prone to badmouthing shouting at people outside an early polling place in California.

This is a type of election security breach that is being documented. Attempts to establish voter fraud as a significant security problem have been rejected by pretty much all credible investigators. And by the time you read this the mail-in ballot deadline will be passed, leaving us only Election Day to look forward to and look beyond.

Should you feel intimidated this Tuesday? Voting is a hard-won right. You certainly have less to fear than the Founding Fathers when they put their lives on the line to sign the Declaration of Independence, or the people of Syria who stepped into the streets to demand democracy more recently and were cut down by their own government. We are more fortunate, but good, decent people can feel intimidated by shouting and

Let's stand together and not be turned around. People have fought and died for the rights we have, voting included.

Your vote on Nov. 3 is secured by a historically reliable electoral system in the Commonwealth. In our communities, clerks are confident they will see that election and harassment laws will be enforced if necessary. They have worked hard to put extraordinary

systems in place to certify each ballot received by any means, and to assure sanitation and social distancing for all who vote and work at the polls during a pandemic. And towns like Brimfield are welcoming the public to observe the "great care our staff will apply to the processing of ballots."

We can do our part to ensure the integrity of the process by following the advice commonly given to the public about any threat of terrorism: "If you see something, say something." 9-1-1 makes that easy enough. And make no mistake: Voter intimidation is terror-

Election officials can call on officers to enforce bans on politicking and voter intimidation within 150 feet of polling places. Police officers are at the polls but may need public help seeing something occurring outside that distance. If called, police departments can enforce other laws dealing with unruly behavior and harassment on the public streets. Don't hesitate to be their eyes and ears.

"I think that we have everything pretty secure," Barre's Town Clerk Ellen Glidden told me. She acknowledged the media and public discussions have heightened election security awareness in 2020 beyond the norm. If anyone sees anything suspicious or disruptive, she said "they should definitely contact the police or election officials.

Clerks I interviewed reported no issues have surfaced in their Western Worcester County towns during early voting. "We have police officers at the polls to keep order. We think there's going to be plenty of police on duty that day (November 3)," Southbridge Town







Clerk Madaline I. Bonadies said. Spencer Town Clerk Lisa J. Johnson offered a similar assessment, adding, "I don't anticipate anything" in the way of intimidation in her town.

The clerks said that state advisories weren't giving voter intimidation as much emphasis as working out the mechanics of 2020's unprecedented heavy mail-in and early voting season and COVID safety.

As for police chiefs, Chief David Darrin of Spencer said. "I think generally there's more

concern with disorder after the process, what's going to happen if there's not a winner and how people are going to behave." He alluded to the prospect of court battles prolonging the process around the country, but he was confident there will be order in these parts. "I don't think that sort of thing would happen in Spencer," he said, "or in the state of Massachusetts."

And as common as the phrase "we'll deal with it" seems to be coming from local officials, it would be hard to deny the tone of this election year can be uglier than we're used to. Here's how we can "deal with it":

Don't be intimidated. Vote

for decency and democracy by showing up on Nov. 3 if you haven't voted already. Be civic and civil, and don't let those who won't be get away with a single step. If democracy is to be tested, we're ultimately the ones who determine whether it passes or


