Douglas promotes new Fire and Ambulance Chief

Uxbridge Public Schools announces new leadership appointments

DOUGLAS — The Town of Douglas has promoted Kelly Manning to Chief of the Douglas Fire and Ambulance Department. She will be the third person to serve as Chief since the Department began delivering full-time service in 2017, and the first woman to earn the top spot.

The Department provides 24/7 fire coverage and Advanced Life Support (ALS) ambulance services with a full-time trained staff of 10 supported by over 30 active call members.

Manning started as a call firefighter in Wellfleet, Massachusetts in 2004. She earned her EMT-Paramedic status as a university student in 2006, the year she joined the call department in Douglas under then Chief Don Gonynor. She worked for the Amherst Fire Department for three years, more than nine years as a career firefighter in Southbridge, and two more in Westborough while she climbed the ranks of the Douglas call department. Chief Kent Vinson hired her as Assistant Chief in Douglas in November 2020, after town meeting created the position. Manning was promoted to Deputy Chief in

Local nonprofit leader publishes children’s book to help families discuss homelessness with compassion

WHITINSVILLE — After nearly a decade of helping individuals and families experiencing homelessness throughout the Blackstone Valley, Leslie Reichert, Founder and CEO of the Blackstone Valley Emergency Shelter (BVES), has transformed those experiences into a children’s picture book designed to teach empathy, kindness, and hope.

“Hope the Bear Finds Kindness” tells the story of Hope, a gentle bear whose life unexpectedly changes when she loses her home. Through simple acts of kindness from strangers, Hope discovers that even during life’s most difficult moments, compassion can restore dignity, friendship, and hope.

The book was inspired by the countless stories Reichert has witnessed since founding BVES in 2017. During that time, the organization has grown into a

regional leader in addressing homelessness through emergency shelter, homelessness navigation, police partnerships, volunteer engagement, and innovative housing initiatives serving communities across the Blackstone Valley.

“Many children notice people experiencing homelessness but don’t understand what they’re seeing,” said Reichert. “I wanted to create a story that helps parents and teachers answer those difficult questions with honesty, while reminding children that every person deserves kindness and compassion.”

Unlike many books that focus primarily on homelessness, “Hope the Bear Finds Kindness” centers on the power of ordinary people to make a difference. The story encourages children to look beyond circumstances and recognize the humanity in every person they meet.

inspires even one child to treat someone with greater compassion, then it has accomplished exactly what I hoped.”

Proceeds from “Hope the Bear Finds Kindness” support the mission of Blackstone Valley Emergency Shelter, helping provide emergency shelter, crisis intervention, homelessness navigation, and housing stabilization services to individuals and families throughout the region.

Since opening its doors, BVES has mobilized hundreds of volunteers and built partnerships with local police departments, faith communities, healthcare providers, businesses, and civic organizations to ensure that no one faces homelessness alone.

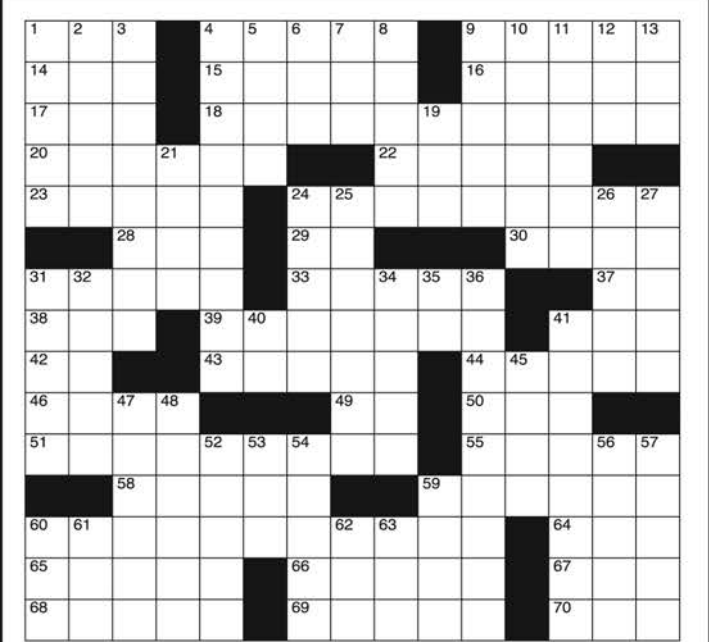

EDITORIAL

Leadership earned through service

Communities place extraordinary trust in their fire departments. Whether responding to a house fire, a medical emergency, or a natural disaster, firefighters and paramedics arrive on what is often the worst day of someone’s life. The person leading that department must possess not only technical expertise, but also the judgment, compassion and character to inspire confidence from both the public and the firefighters they serve.

Douglas appears to have found such a leader in its new Fire Chief, Kelly Manning.

Promotions to the highest ranks of public safety should never be viewed as symbolic. They should reflect years of preparation, experience and demonstrated leadership. Manning’s career tells that story. Beginning as a call firefighter in Wellfleet more than two decades ago, she steadily built her credentials while serving in multiple communities, advancing through the ranks in Douglas and gaining experience as a paramedic, registered nurse, instructor and emergency management professional. Her educational background, including a master’s degree in public administration, complements an already impressive list of certifications and field experience.

Equally important is the endorsement she has received from those who know the department best. Retiring Chief John Furno spent more than 40 years in public service and worked alongside Manning for the past several years. His confidence in her ability to lead carries significant weight. Likewise, Town Administrator Matt Wojcik highlighted not only her qualifications but also the mentorship she received during the department’s recent evolution into a full-time organization.

Douglas’ Fire and Ambulance Department is still relatively young in its current form. Since transitioning to full-time service in 2017, it has continued to grow while maintaining around-the-clock fire protection and Advanced Life Support ambulance coverage with a combination of career personnel and dedicated call firefighters. Sustaining that momentum requires thoughtful leadership focused on recruitment, training, operational readiness and fiscal responsibility.

Chief Manning’s own priorities suggest she understands those challenges. Her emphasis on strengthening community partnerships, embracing innovation and protecting the health and well-being of department personnel reflects a modern approach to emergency services. Firefighters today face increasing demands that extend well beyond fighting fires. They respond to medical emergencies, hazardous materials incidents, rescues and countless other situations requiring advanced training and teamwork. Supporting those professionals is essential to maintaining the high level of service residents expect.

Her appointment also represents a meaningful milestone as the department’s first female chief. While history should recognize that achievement, it should not overshadow the qualifications that earned her the position. The most significant aspect of this promotion is not that barriers have been broken, but that Douglas selected the individual it believes is best prepared to lead.

The best public servants rarely seek recognition for themselves. Instead, they focus on building strong teams, preparing for the unexpected and ensuring others have the tools they need to succeed. By all accounts, those are the qualities Kelly Manning has demonstrated throughout her career.

As Douglas looks ahead, residents can take confidence in knowing their Fire and Ambulance Department remains in experienced hands. Leadership transitions are always significant, but they also present opportunities for fresh ideas built upon a solid foundation. Chief Manning now has the opportunity to write the next chapter of a department that continues to evolve in service to its community.

That is good news not only for Douglas’ firefighters and paramedics, but for every resident who may someday depend on them.

Fauci’s infamy

The empty parking space

I pulled into a crowded parking lot last week and did what most of us do. I started looking for the closest available space. There wasn’t one. So I circled once. Still nothing.

By the second lap, I noticed something interesting. Every driver seemed to be doing exactly what I was doing. We were all hunting for the perfect spot while dozens of perfectly good spaces sat empty just a little farther away. I finally gave up, parked near the edge of the lot, and walked. It took all of about 45 seconds.

By the time I reached the front door, several of the cars that had passed me were still circling. It made me wonder why we’re so determined to save a few extra steps.

When we were kids, walking wasn’t something we tried to avoid. We’d think nothing of hiking across a field to visit a friend or riding a bicycle halfway across town because someone said there might be a pickup baseball game.

Now many of us will spend five minutes searching for a parking place that saves us 30 seconds of walking. I’m as guilty as anyone.

There’s something strangely satisfying about finding that front-row space. It feels like winning a prize, even though the prize is usually a walk that’s shorter than the average television commercial. The funny part is what happens when you park farther away. You notice things.

You see flowers planted along the sidewalk that you would have driven right past. You hear conversations instead of engines. You notice the small independent businesses tucked between larger stores. Sometimes you even run into someone you haven’t seen in years because you’re both walking instead of rushing from one door to another.

Those extra few steps become part of the outing instead of something to be avoided. I suppose that’s true of a lot of life.

We’re always looking for shortcuts. Faster internet. Faster check-out lines. Faster shipping. Faster routes around traffic. We measure success by how quickly we can get from one thing to the next.

But not everything improves by speeding it up. Some conversations are worth lingering over. Some roads are worth taking because they’re scenic instead of efficient. Some Saturday mornings deserve to unfold without constantly checking the clock.

Living in New England reminds us of that every season. Nobody hurries through the first blaze of autumn color. People stop to watch a fresh snowfall. We pull over for covered bridges and scenic overlooks even when we’re already running a little late.

Those moments aren’t productive by any measurable standard. They’re simply enjoyable. Maybe that’s why I didn’t mind the longer walk after all.

The parking lot gave me a few extra minutes outside on a pleasant afternoon. I watched a family loading pumpkins into the back of a pickup. An older couple strolled toward the garden center without seeming to be in any hurry. A little boy proudly carried a loaf of bread that was almost as long as his arm.

None of those moments would have registered if I’d found that perfect parking space. I still like parking close to the door. Old habits don’t disappear overnight. But every now and then, the best spot in the lot isn’t the closest one. It’s the one that reminds us slowing down is sometimes the shortest path to enjoying the day.

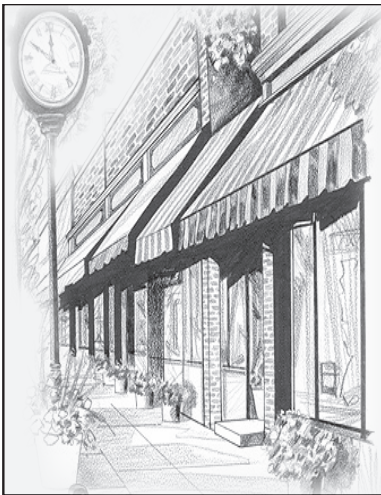

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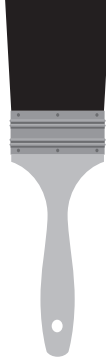
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41st Valley Friendship Tour raises nearly \$110,000 for Open Sky Community Services

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QCC professor gives voice to formerly incarcerated in new documentary

WORCESTER — What is it like to get out of prison and start over? QCC Professor of Criminal Justice Kristy Glover spent her sabbatical researching this question and creating “Voices of Justice,” a documentary film that she produced, filmed and edited herself.

“Voice of Justice” features accounts from three men who have firsthand experience with the justice system. The documentary highlights how multiple support systems are critical

for re-entry, the period of time when individuals are transitioning out of incarceration. Support from family members, community organizations and probation officers, along with raising awareness to reduce stigma, were all mentioned as ways to reduce recidivism and influence personal and professional growth.

“There are so many things that we expect of individuals when they’re just getting released. They have to get a job, pay their monthly supervision fees and find a place to live,” Glover said.

Glover witnessed the re-entry process during her time as a parole officer for the state of Georgia, but the connection is also personal. Her grandfather encountered challenges when he was released from prison, which left a lasting impression on the family, including Glover’s mother, who also joined law enforcement, eventually becoming a police captain.

In the documentary,

Glover interviews Mario Rivera, who spoke about his own re-entry experience. Rivera praised Worcester-area nonprofits such as Legendary Legacies and Open Sky Community Services for providing services such as counseling and assistance with obtaining a laptop and hygiene products. He also acknowledged his family as a large source of support.

“Without initial help in the first 60 days of me coming home, my progress wouldn’t have taken off the way it did,” Rivera said.

Rivera didn’t wait until he was released to start preparing. He completed QCC’s culinary re-entry program, a partnership with the Worcester County Jail and House of Correction that teaches skills needed to work in food service and includes multiple certifications upon successful completion. In “Voices of Justice,” Rivera shared that during

the program, he realized education was a vital part of his path to a new future. After his release, he enrolled at QCC and in the Liberal Arts for Returning Citizens (LARC) program at Clark University.

“The culinary program has had a significant impact on hundreds of incarcerated individuals,” said Worcester County Sheriff Lew Evangelidis. “We are proud to have helped Mario build a successful path forward after incarceration.”

Anthony Bryant, who also appeared in “Voices of Justice,” has seen multiple sides of the criminal justice system. Before he was incarcerated, he held roles as a corrections officer, a deputy sheriff and a highway patrolman.

“Law enforcement is not just a job; it’s your identity. And losing that role can produce deep internal shame,” Bryant shared.

Bryant, however, drew on his law enforcement training to stay calm and

focused during his incarceration, using that discipline as a foundation for working to improve his life. As his release date approached, he didn’t receive any re-entry preparation from the prison, so he got ready by reading self-help books and journaling.

After his sentence, Bryant relied on employment assistance programs, but he was often steered into manual labor positions that didn’t reflect his skills, making it difficult to rebuild his professional career.

In addition to family and community programs, both Bryant and Rivera said that a strong relationship with a probation or parole officer can make a positive difference. They noted that the stigma of having a criminal record can be detrimental to progress, but even one person who sees past their mistakes can be instrumental. They hope others can offer the same grace to those who are going

through re-entry.

“People change when their dignity is restored, responsibility is entrusted gradually and their story is allowed to mean something more than their worst decision,” Bryant remarked. “It’s a mindset shift that many people and legislators don’t understand.”

Rivera and Bryant have also taken it upon themselves to help others with similar experiences. Bryant has become an ethics trainer for law enforcement and other public service organizations. Rivera has stayed connected with Legendary Legacies to educate others and advocate for those in the re-entry process.

“I’m taking accountability in my own life for the things that I’ve done,” Rivera said. “Some people might not be receptive to my situation, but I take it as motivation to do better.”
