Spencer Pavement Management Plan report now available

SPENCER — The Town of Spencer retained BETA Group, Inc. (BETA) in 2024 to update its Pavement Management Program (PMP) and provide services to better maintain the town's roadway network. This project included a pavement condition assessment along all town-maintained roadways. This comprehensive study was undertaken with the goal of establishing an extensive database to reflect current pavement conditions to facilitate planning efforts.

The PMP is a planning tool intended to provide the foundation to manage the town's roadway resources in conjunction with local institutional knowledge. Ultimately, these efforts will assist in the development of a dynamic Capital Improvement Plan for the town's roadway net-

The town is committed to maintaining the PMP and improving its roadway network. This will be achieved by preserving and maintaining the existing infrastructure to the greatest extent possible.

The roadway survey in Spencer, consisting of paved, town maintained roadways, was completed in the Fall of 2024. A total of 97 and a half centerline miles were inspected, serving as the basis for this report. The required field inspections were performed autonomously utilizing a lidar sensor mounted on a vehicle. As the vehicle traveled each roadway, a 3D digital point cloud was developed

and all roadway assets within a 50-foot radius of the lidar sensor were scanned and populated. As part of the data collection, images were captured, georeferenced and timestamped every 20-foot section of roadway.

Upon completion of the field data collection, proprietary algorithms and AI machine learning technology were run to identify pavement surface distresses such as cracks, potholes, seals,

DOT to hold virtual public hearing on Route 9 project

SPENCER — A Virtual Design Public Hearing will be hosted on the MassDOT Web site Tuesday, Nov. 18 at 5:30 p.m. to present the design for the proposed project in Spencer - East Brookfield.

The purpose of this hearing is to provide the public with the opportunity to become fully acquainted with the proposed project. All views and comments submitted in response to the hearing will be reviewed and considered to the maximum extent possible.

The proposed project consists of improvements along Route 9 and at the intersection of Route 9 and Route 49 in the Towns of East Brookfield and Spencer. The work involves construction of a cement concrete roundabout, improved bike and pedestrian accommodations, lighting, and upgrades to pavement, drainage, pavement markings, and signage. The proposed pedestrian accommodations consist of five-foot-wide sidewalks along Route 9 and a shared use path at the roundabout. The proposed bicycle accommodations consist of five-foot buffered bicycle lanes along Route 9 and a shared use path at the roundabout. Pedestrian and bicycle accommodations have been provided in accordance with applicable design guides.

A secure right-of-way is necessary for this project. Acquisitions in fee and permanent or temporary easements may be required. The Commonwealth of Massachusetts is responsible for acquiring all needed rights in private or public lands. MassDOT's policy concerning land acquisitions will be presented in the hearing.

Successful completion of the course will certify any minor, from 12 to 16 years of age, to operate a powerboat, including a Personal Water Craft / Jet Ski (for 16 & 17-year-old operators), on all Massachusetts waters; in conjunction with the Mass. Environmental Police. Approved by National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA) it will also cover the requirements to operate a vessel in most other states & many countries where boating safety education is mandatory including Rhode Island and Connecticut.

The Hanson-Milone Boater Safety Act, signed into Mass. Law January 8, will now require ALL Mass. motorboat operators to complete an approved Safe Boating Certificate course before April 1, 2026 for anyone born after Jan. 1, 1998, and by April 1, 2028 for boaters born before Jan. 1, 1998. Enforcement of the new law will begin on Sept. 1, 2026. This course meets the future Mass. requirement. Most boating insurance companies offer a discount on premiums for successful completion of this course.

State officials confirm spotted lanternfly infestation in Spencer

Department of Agricultural Resources (MDAR) recently confirmed an infestation of the invasive insect known as spotted lanternfly (Lycorma delicatula or "SLF") in Spencer. A survey team was following up on a report that came in to us at the end of September, and confirmed that the insects were present. MDAR does

not yet know the full extent of the infestation - only a preliminary survey has been done so far.

Spotted lanternfly is a pest that attacks tree-ofheaven, grapevines, maple trees, hop vines, and many other types of plants. This pest is known to impact grape/wine producers and other agricultural commodities, and can also interfere

infestations reach high levels, due to the swarming behavior of adult SLF in late summer and fall. That said, the insects themselves do not bite or sting - they are a nuisance because they gather in large numbers in areas where people are, and cover anything they are on with a sticky, sugary waste product known as honey-

Residents may see survevors (MDAR and/or USDA staff) periodically through the fall and winter, checking trees in the area to determine the extent of the infestation. If



Case Number: 2025-001-431 You are hereby notified that the appeal of Timothy Dinges of Map 43 Lot 1 for

a variance from Brookfield Ordinance. Article II – 2 (c) & (g) regarding a shed/ tiny cabin placed on the noted property has been GRANTED, subject to the conditions listed below, by the affirmative vote of five members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

Findings of Fact:

•Granting this variance is not against the public interest because it is difficult to reach the private property and the shed/tiny cabin is not visible or generally accessible by the public. Additionally, the lot has over 900 feet of frontage on Class VI roads and the cabin is not intended for long term human occupancy, but instead is meant as a hunting/camping cabin where people sleep no more than occasionally. The variance therefore does not harm the public health, safety or welfare, nor does it alter the essential character of the neighborhood, which is low density and rural.

 Allowing the tiny cabin/shed to stay on the property does not go against the spirit of Brookfield Ordinance, Article II - 2 (c) & (g) because the structure is not permanent and will be used recreationally-only, despite it having no frontage on a Class V road or better. The Class VI road the property and structure are on allow for access to the property by its owners and emergency

services, when necessary. Granting the requested variance allows for substantial justice to the property owners, allowing them to use and enjoy their property, and without the variance, the lot cannot be used for any purpose without expending significant funds to upgrade the road to Class V standards. Granting this variance would do no injustice to the Town, because Brookfield is a largely

rural and low-density town. There is no risk to abutters or nearby property owners that granting of the variance diminishes nearby property values, given that the property in question is remote, largely inaccessible by the public, and the shed/tiny cabin is not visible from the property line, will not increase traffic or noise in the area, and complies with all other zoning requirements.

·Lastly, the Board finds that unnecessary hardship would result from the denial of the variance. The lot is uniquely situated in its environment with a significant amount of frontage on Class VI roads but no frontage on Class V roads, the use of the property for hunting and camping is reasonable, and there is no fair and substantial

relationship between the ordinance's frontage requirement and the use of the property for a hunting and camping cabin. Additionally, failure to grant this variance would result in undue hardship for the property owner because it would prohibit the intended recreational use of the property. **Conditions:**

The applicant has represented that the outhouse on the sketch included with the application has been removed. It is a condition of this approval that that outhouse shall not be brought back onto the property without obtaining the proper permits.

Applicant shall execute and record a Notice of the Limits of Municipal Liability.

No heating source shall be installed without the proper permits. 4. No changes shall be made to the shed/cabin, nor shall additional structures be brought onto the property without further approval from this Board.



patches, and pavement oxidation to generate Road Surface Ratings (RSR)s at the segment level. BETA then conducted a thorough review to ensure the quality of the data for analysis and reporting.

Based on the inspections completed in the Fall of 2024, the overall RSR for Spencer's Town-maintained roadway network was 70.11. This represents a significant improvement from the 57 RSR previously calculated during the 2020 assessment. The roughly 13-point increase can be attributed to the bond secured by the Town. The overall RSR indicates a benchmark for performance measuring of the Town's PMP moving forward. If the overall RSR were to drop in the years to come, this would



Harvest season and the art of slowing down

There's a rhythm to late October that you can feel even with your eyes closed — a soft percussion of leaves underfoot, the low thrum of tractors wrapping up their season, the scent of wood smoke curling through the evening air. In Spencer, Leicester, and the Brookfields, it's the season when daylight shortens but our gratitude grows long. Harvest time has arrived again, quietly reminding us that growth — whether in fields or in people — takes time, patience, and a bit of faith in the weather.

Every road seems to pass a small miracle this time of year. The local farm stand stacks pumpkins like little suns, the orchards of East Brookfield still offer cider so fresh it tastes like October itself, and hay wagons lumber toward barns that have seen a hundred seasons come and go. The work is steady and often unseen, yet it sustains more than tables. It feeds the character of these towns — the notion that honest labor and shared reward are still the best harvests of all

But harvest isn't just for farmers. Every household has its own version of gathering in the year's yield. It might be a student who pushed through a hard semester, a volunteer who kept the local food pantry stocked, or a small business owner who survived another unpredictable summer. These too are harvests — the quiet victories that deserve their own celebration before winter draws the curtain.

Our communities have long understood that the best way to honor a season of abundance is to share it. You see it in the church suppers that fill fellowship halls with the smell of stew and laughter. You see it at the library craft tables where children glue paper leaves and learn that creativity, like crops, grows best when tended. You see it at the senior center, where apple pie is as much about conversation as dessert. These moments knit the region together tighter than any budget line ever could.

Harvest time also teaches humility. The farmer who watches the skies knows control is an illusion — too much rain, not enough sun, and the whole balance shifts. Maybe that's a lesson for the rest of us. In a world that prizes speed and certainty, it's worth remembering that good things often ripen slowly, and not everything is meant to be hurried. Some seasons are meant to be savored.

So, take a walk this week before the frost steals the last color from the hills. Wave to the neighbor stacking wood, thank the farmhands closing their stands, stop at a local diner for a bowl of chowder and the gossip of the day. The harvest season is a kind of townwide exhale, a pause before the deep breath of winter.

We spend most of the year racing ahead — to meet deadlines, to check boxes, to get somewhere faster. The fields around us are whispering a gentler instruction: slow down. Notice. Gather what's good. In the end, the harvest isn't measured by bushels or dollars, but by how much gratitude we manage to bring home.

Mark the location of late emerging perennials



Butterfly weed (Asclepias tuberosa) has red, orange, or yellow flowers and can be late to emerge in spring.

As you prepare your gardens for winter, consider marking the location of late emerging perennials to avoid accidentally weeding them out next spring. Use bulbs, commercial or DIY plant labels,

stones or simply leave their stems intact to help guide your cleanup efforts next

These late emerging perennials may have you worried they died overwinter. Lingering winter weather and cooler than normal

spring temperatures can further delay their appearance. Be patient and know this adaptation allows them to avoid damage from late spring frosts as they wait for the soil to warm and begin growing.

flow-Hardy hibiscus, balloon (Platycodon), leadwort (Ceratostostigma), Crocosmia, Redhot poker (Kniphofia), whirling butterflies (Gaura lindheimeri), Butterfly bush (Buddleia), Russian (Perovskia atriplicifolia), and blue spirea (Caryopteris x clandonensis) are a few you may have growing in your garden. Many native plants like butterfly weed (Asclepias tuberosa), swamp milkweed (Asclepias incarnata), black-eyed Susan

(Rudbeckia), Culver's root (Veronicastrum), Indian pink (Spigelia marilandica), Joepye weed (Eutrochium spp. formerly Eupatorium), asters, liatris, and goldenrods can also be late to emerge. It's easy to accidentally weed these out during spring clean-

These plants are worth the wait since they add extra color to our mid and late season gardens. They extend the beauty, pollinator appeal and food source for many insects, and songbirds visiting your

Try leaving the stems or a portion of the stems of these plants intact until the new growth emerges. Unfortunately, many of us have accidentally removed these, too.

Plant tags will identify the plant and mark their location but can be unsightly. Try placing a colorful dowel rod, golf tee or short bamboo stake at the base of these plants. Number each and mark them on your garden plans to help track the plant's identity.

Stones or shells, where they are abundant, can be placed next to or surrounding these plants to mark the location. These tend to stay put and may be less obtrusive

than plant tags. Just be sure to alert anyone helping in the garden of their purpose and that they need to stay put.

Or mark their spot with bulbs. Plant spring flowering bulbs like daffodils, hyacinths and alliums next to these plants to extend your garden's bloom time and help prevent damage to the perennial plants.

Avoid tulips, crocus and other bulbs that animals love. Squirrels, chipmunks, rabbits and deer may move or eat your

Consider using a mix of early, mid and late spring flowering bulbs to further extend the color in your garden. Or skirt these late emerging plants with early spring blooming perennials like woodland and creeping phlox, candytuft or rockcress. You'll enjoy the added color as you wait for the other plants to make their appearance later in the spring.

When spring arrives, exercise patience as you wait for the return of beautiful, late emerging perennials.

Simulation Theory

During an interview years ago, Elon Musk famously claimed there's a "one in billions" chance that this is base reality. In other words, he believes it's far more likely that we're living in some simulation than in the original, foundational universe.

But what kind of simulation? A digital computer program? A spiritual matrix? That idea may sound bizarre—after all, everything feels real, doesn't it?

Yet this isn't just late-night dorm room talk. Some of the world's most respected thinkers are taking the idea seriously. It's not about rejecting science—it's about following it to its farthest, strangest conclusions.

Let's start with String Theory. It's a theoretical framework in physics proposing that the fundamental building blocks of the universe aren't particles, but tiny vibrating strings. These strings, depending on how they vibrate, give rise to all particles and forces—even gravity.

The math checks out, even if we haven't proven it experimentally yet. It's one of the best candidates for a "Theory of Everything" that could unify quantum mechanics with general relativity.

At the 2011 Isaac Asimov Memorial Debate titled "The Theory of Everything," theoretical physicist Sylvester James Gates, Jr. dropped a bombshell. He revealed that he found something astonishing embedded in the equations of string theory: patterns of "error-correcting codes"—the same kind used in computer programming to detect and correct mistakes.

Sitting next to him, astrophysicist Neil deGrasse Tyson reacted with stunned amazement: "You're blowing my mind right now!"

Why would error-correcting codes appear in the fabric of the cosmos? Gates himself admitted he doesn't know the implications vet. But the mere presence of such codes leads to a wild yet serious question: Could the universe itself be structured like a vast, intelligent computation?

That's where the idea of the simulation arises.

On late-night television, when asked if he thought we were living in a simulation, Neil deGrasse Tyson replied, "I wish I had a good argument against it, but I don't..."

And while the science doesn't prove this, it pushes our imagination into territory that philosophers, mystics, and spiritual traditions have been exploring for millennia: that reality is deeper than it appears.

It doesn't mean we live in a video game controlled by aliens.

It might mean that the universe is information-rich, consciousness-infused, and governed by principles far beyond our current understanding.

My friend, physicist and laser pioneer Dr. Mani Bhaumik, wrote about this in his book "Code Name God." He argues that modern physics, far from disproving a creator, points toward a transcendent source of intelligence.

material being."

Quantum physics shows us that particles don't even exist in fixed states until observed. They remain in a state of possibility. In a strange and very real way, attention shapes outcome. This isn't just a metaphor-it's physics, though interpretations vary.

So what does this mean for us?

It means we live in a participatory universe. That our focus, our awareness, our very act of observation—matters. That we are not passive passengers in reality, but active participants.

No, quantum physics doesn't promise we can manifest Lamborghinis with our thoughts. But it does suggest something far greater: that we are wired into the very structure of existence, and our consciousness has weight in the world.

And that, perhaps, is the most hopeful message of all.

We are not powerless. We are not accidents. We are not limited.

We are participants in something vast, intelligent, and alive.

The universe is not outside us. We are part of it. And the deeper we look, the more
