DOT to hold informational meeting on Route 20 updates

CHARLTON — As the Route 20 reconstruction project prepares to commence in 2023 officials from the Massachusetts Department of Transportation are preparing to host an informational session in May to answer questions and provide an update on the project which will impact both Charlton and Oxford.

The reconstruction project will redesign Route 20 with the goal of improving safety, accessibility, and traffic flow as the corridor continues to be a prime location for business development. It has also been the sight of numerous vehicle accidents, including several in April alone, leading officials from both local communities and the state to push for reconstructing the roadway to be safer and easier to travel. The goals of the project include widening the roadway, introducing both sidewalks and shared use paths, enhanced traffic operations at intersections, replacement of bridges in both Oxford and Charlton, and enhancing storm water treatment. The redesign will also include new signage, guardrail, retaining walls, and better accommodation for alternative forms of transportation like bicycles. The full design for the project is slated to be completed this spring. The project is planned to be funded through the 2023 Transportation Improvement Program for the Central Massachusetts Metropolitan Planning Organization.

With design nearly completed, MassDOT will be hosting a live virtual information meeting to provide updates on the status of the project in its current phase. The meeting will also explore early construction activity and provide a chance for attendees to comment and pose questions about the project. Residents, abutters, local business owners, and general commuters are all invited to attend the meeting and attendees can be added to an email list to receive future updates on the project. DA honors team of professionals who help victims of child abuse

WORCESTER

Worcester County District Attorney Joseph D. Early, Jr. recently recognized a team of professionals who are specifically trained to support, aid and care for victims of child abuse and their families in the 60 cities and towns within Worcester County.

The Multidisciplinary Team which includes of members the County Worcester District Attorney's Child Abuse Unit and nationally-accredited Children's Advocacy Center, the Child Protection Program at UMass Memorial Medical Center, the Massachusetts Department of Children and Families, police from across Worcester County and Seven Hills Behavioral Health were presented with the District Attorney's Team Excellence and Merit -TEAM Award – for their unwavering work in serving the children of

their families.

The group is receiving this award in April, which is National Child Abuse Prevention Month.

"These dedicated and passionate experts collectively work to be an advocate, a voice for our most precious and vulnerable population," Early said. "Victims of child abuse and trauma, along with their families, reach out to be heard in the most difficult times. This group of professionals are here to help, offering a listening ear and a range of services to seek justice and start the healing journey."

The Multidisciplinary Team works in tandem to make sure victims and their families are given the help and services they need while assessing the course of any investigation, ranging from mental and health evaluation and treatment to social service needs.

Worcester County and a member of the team is exceptional in their own discipline," said Courtney Sans, Chief of the Child Abuse and Sexual Assault Unit for the Worcester County Attorney's District Office. "The members all came to the team through different paths, but we all share the same unified goal of helping kids."

The creation Children Advocacy Centers helped agencies step out of their silos to work cohesively to help victims and survivors of child abuse.

"When a child falls into a horrible part of life, the team is here to catch them," said Tracy DeFusco, Director of the Worcester County Child Advocacy Center. "We're supposed to be here to catch them and help children and their families through it."

"We do the work because we genuinely care. You wouldn't be "Every person who is in this field or do this

work if you didn't have compassion for others,' said Jennifer Altomare. a Forensic Interviewer and Case Coordinator for the Worcester County District Attorney's Office. "Our job here is to help children and families through a traumatic process, a traumatic time and make it as easy as possible."



Some marlinespike seamanship (knots etc.) will also be included, along with the new RI regulations. 

Growing herbs in containers

Keep your favorite herbs within easy reach for cooking and seasoning by growing them in containers. A few pots set by your door and grill or on the patio, deck, or balcony make it easy to include some homegrown flavor.

Start by growing those herbs you like to use for seasoning food and beverages, making pesto, or preserving. Include some with fragrance for a bit of aromatherapy or for your craft projects.

Make sure the plants you select will thrive in the amount of sunlight in the growing space. Most herbs prefer full sun but some like mint, thyme, chives, parsley, and lemon balm will tolerate some shade. A bit of afternoon shade is welcome to many sun-loving plants growing in hotter regions. Check the plant tag or seed packet for detailed planting information.

You can grow individual plants in their own container. Place these among other pots to create an attractive display. Or mix several different herbs in one larger container to create a herb garden in a single pot. Make sure all the

herbs will thrive in the same soil moisture and sunlight.

In general, place three or four plants in a 10-12inch pot, four to six in a 14-16-inch container, and six to eight in a 16 to 20-inch planter. Adjust this number based on the size of the transplants

purchased and the mature size and growth habit of the herb selected.

Use a container with drainage holes to provide proper drainage and reduce the risk of root rot. Terra cotta pots dry quickly and are a good choice for those gardening in wetter regions or who tend to overwater. Plastic, fiberglass, and glazed pots don't dry out as quickly. Self-watering pots have water reservoirs to extend the time between watering.

Use a quality potting mix that provides adequate drainage, as most herbs require well-drained soil. Whether planting seeds or plants, you will want to leave space between the top of the potting mix and the container. This allows you to water thoroughly without washing the soil out of the pot. Leave a space about half an inch in small planters and an inch or more between the top of the pot and potting mix in larger containers.

Water new plantings and seedlings often enough to keep the soil slightly moist. Gradually reduce frequency and water thoroughly when the top inch

of soil is crumbly and dry. Check containers once a day and more often in extremely hot weather. Water thoroughly as needed.

Reduce watering and increase success by incorporating Wild Valley Farms' wool pellets (wildvalleyfarms. com) into the planting mix. This sus-

tainable soil amendment reduces watering by up to 25 percent and adds air space for

Moments better plant growth. Harvest a few leaves and stems as needed

throughout the growing season. Regular harvesting encourages more growth for future harvests. Herbs have the most intense flavor when harvested just

before flowering. You can remove even more when large amounts of herbs are needed for preserving and craft projects. Cut annual herbs back by 50 to 75 percent and perennial herbs by onethird at one time. The plants will recover for future harvests. Make room for some herb-filled con-

tainers to enjoy this summer. They make great additions to outdoor gatherings for you and your guests to enjoy their beauty, fragrance, and flavor.



The evolution of student debt

It's that time of year, when high school seniors are committing to colleges and planning for what will happen after graduation day. College tuition has become so incredibly unaffordable that many students are opting out or seeking a career in various trades, of which they stand to make more money than a classmate with a four-year degree, depending of course on which route they take. Harvard University cost ten schillings per year in the early 1700's, which was equal to about a pair of shoes and two pairs of stockings. Interesting to note is that back then, most jobs did not require a degree, license or certification and laborers learned via apprenticeship. If the price of Harvard over time had risen at the same rate as prices generally equaled to the rate of inflation, tuition today would cost \$1,703 per year. However, that is not the case and the current tuition at Harvard is upwards of \$67,580. As a society, we stress the need for a solid, good education. Any job that pays a livable wage requires you to have a degree, however many students are not making much more than their counterparts who chose to enter the work force right out of high school. Really this depends on where you live and what you do. The significant increase in college tuition has angered many parents and students. One has to wonder how a financial aid office at any given school comes up with the numbers for a student's financial aid package. In one recent example, a college in Massachusetts, cost \$73,000 per year. Yes, you read that right. A student with a single mother who makes in the ballpark of 30 grand a year, was offered \$13,000 in financial aid for the year. Does this school discriminate based on socioeconomics? One has to wonder. Are wealthy students somehow more special than their less fortunate counterparts? Students who do make it through the four years will graduate with an exorbitant amount of debt, a bill they could potentially be paying well into old age. Way back when, state universities were free; however, they did charge a small fee. In the 1960's, social and legislative changes turned higher education into a business; hence, the student loan debt crisis we see today. Through some research, we discovered an interesting timeline that laid out the path higher education has taken since its inception during medieval times in Europe. Back then, lew of these schools charged tuition and were supported by the government or a church, and areas

of study were limited. In 1796, Thomas Jefferson proposed an education system that was supported through taxes. He did this because he believed that for a government to truly work, that its people needed to be educated. As a result, in 1818, the government began subsidizing elementary schools and Jefferson used a \$15,000 grant to start The University of Virginia. In the early 1800's, many colleges did not charge tuition, however only the wealthy could afford the living expenses incurred during study. In 1810, students lived as simply as possible, keeping room and board rates extremely low, compared to today's living conditions. In 1870, Harvard's tuition was \$150 per year, while Brown University was just \$75. This equals to about \$3,000 in today's terms. Again, only the wealthy could afford to attend. A spike hit in 1920, when admissions doubled between then and The cost was about \$250 per year, with 20 percent of college aged Americans attending university. The G.I. Bill was passed in 1944 has since been modified. In 1965, the Higher Education Act passed. This act helped provide financial assistance for those who needed it. In 1973, in today's dollars, an average year at an average school cost just over \$9,000, and just over \$2,000 for an in state public school.

In 1972, only 49 percent of high school graduates went on to college. Back then grants covered 80% of the costs. Today more and more students are heading off to school, leaving less grant money to go around. In 1975, the rates started to increase faster than inflation. Before the 70's tuition rates increased roughly 2-3 percent each year. In 2003, the cost went up 14% in just one year. In 1987 the rate for a public school saw a 44 percent change. In the late 1990's, the debt was so bad that people put off weddings, having children and making other big lifetime decisions. The year 2008 saw an increase of 439 percent since 1982, while income has only increased 147 percent. If things continue as they are in 2028, the cost will be \$340,800 for a private school education per year and \$95,000 for a public school. Americans over the age of 60 currently owe more than \$86 billion in unpaid loans. Many of whom are concerned that the government will take their Social Security, leaving them with noth-

There is also a Bill H.603 that has been initiated in the Massachusetts legislature which will make universal school meals permanent. It is currently signed by 115 legislators including 11 Republican House

Wallum Lake opens for fishing







Town of Sturbridge conducts preventative maintenance audit with grant from Mass. Interlocal Insurance Association

STURBRIDGE — Sturbridge was awarded \$9,000 from the Massachusetts Interlocal Insurance Association (MIIA), the town's property and casualty insurance provider, to fund safety and risk management activities and equipment.

"The award from MIIA has allowed Sturbridge to conduct a comprehensive Facilities Condition Assessment and Asset Inventory of town buildings, so that we have detailed maintenance data on our buildings streamlined in one location," said Robyn Chrabascz, Sturbridge Facilities Manager. "This program helps us plan for both preventative maintenance and capital planning for replacement of building elements, when needed.

So far, we have been able to identify several preventative measures that have helped us to redu

The town conducted the audit using preventative maintenance software purchased with the MIIA grant and plans to expand the tracking program to other Town departments including Public Works and Information Technology.

"This would allow us to provide asset tracking and preventative maintenance work orders across departments, improving communication and further reducing our risk exposure," Chrabascz said

For the 2022 fiscal year, MIIA awarded \$1 million to fund over 180 grant requests from members for public safety activities and

equipment. Municipalities were able to conduct cyber risk audits, conduct safety trainings, purchase infrared cameras and security equipment for schools and thermography cameras for public works departments, among many other initiatives.

As a member-based organization, MIIA's focus is to provide excellent service and quality risk management solutions to nearly 400 cities, towns, and other public entities in Massachusetts. 

Real estate forum highlights Charlton's economic potential

CHARLTON — The town of Charlton hosted its first Real Estate Community Forum on March 24 at the Overlook showcasing the development vision of Charlton. The forum provided an opportunity for both residential and commercial realtors to learn about what Charlton has to offer as the town prepares to welcome a new Amazon facility as well as improve the Route 20 corridor. Town Administrator Andrew Golas

provided a recap of the meeting for the Board of Selectmen on March 28 where he called it a productive forum that brought many potential players to the table to learn about Charlton's economic growth and potential.

"We had about 30 attendees including a representative from the Board of Selectmen, Massachusetts Office of Business Development and Sen. Ryan Fattman's office. We had a good discussion around pinch points of local development, identified some areas that are held as higher priorities when considering development, and provided some context into the local government process altogether," said Golas.

The forum also allowed Charlton to learn how they can be good hosts for potential businesses in the future. Selectmen complimented the forum as a great opportunity for the town to learn how it can draw in more businesses while showcasing what Charlton has to offer. 


