In past years we have seen these representations through flowers of a favorite book or poem can range from literal to abstract and serious to silly. Whether you will be a featured artist or not, don’t miss this evening of food, music and fun on Sept. 23, benefiting the library’s free programming for all. Tickets will go on sale beginning Aug. 22.

EDITORIAL

The stories we grow together

Libraries have always been places where imagination takes root. Long before digital screens became part of daily life, they invited people to discover unfamiliar worlds, explore new ideas and connect with neighbors through a shared love of reading. One of the most enjoyable reminders of that mission is an event that asks participants to take those stories off the page and bring them to life in an entirely different way.

The Gladys Kelly Library’s annual Bites, Books and Blooms celebration does something remarkable. It combines literature, art, music and community into an evening that appeals to readers and non-readers alike. It reminds everyone that creativity does not belong to professionals alone. It belongs to anyone willing to try something new.

That is perhaps the greatest strength of the Books in Bloom tradition.

Participants are challenged to create floral interpretations inspired by books or poems. There are no rigid rules. Some arrangements faithfully recreate memorable scenes or recognizable objects. Others capture the mood, symbolism or emotion of a favorite story in ways that encourage viewers to stop, think and perhaps even revisit a classic they have not read in years.

The beauty of the exhibit lies in its diversity. One display may make visitors smile with a clever visual joke. Another may quietly inspire reflection. Together, they become a gallery that celebrates not only literature but also the unique perspectives of the people who call Webster and the surrounding communities home. That community spirit deserves recognition.

Events like this succeed because local businesses, volunteers, artists and residents choose to participate. A florist contributes professional expertise. A bookstore owner offers literary inspiration. Amateur designers discover talents they never knew they possessed. Visitors purchase tickets, admire the displays and, in doing so, help support free library programming that serves children, families and seniors throughout the year.

It is easy to think of creativity as something reserved for painters, sculptors or musicians. Books in Bloom challenges that assumption. It encourages people who may never have entered an art competition to experiment with flowers, color, texture and symbolism. The result is an exhibit that is welcoming rather than intimidating. Perhaps even more importantly, it creates conversations.

Someone who has never read “The Red Wheelbarrow” may find themselves looking up William Carlos Williams after seeing a floral interpretation. A child may ask why a particular arrangement represents a favorite novel. Friends may compare their own reading lists while walking from display to display. Those moments are exactly what libraries hope to inspire: curiosity leading to discovery.

The planning workshop being offered before the event is another reminder that participation matters more than perfection. Not everyone begins with experience arranging flowers, but everyone begins with imagination. Providing guidance lowers the barrier to entry and opens the door for more community members to share their ideas.

In an age when so much entertainment is consumed alone, there is something refreshing about gathering around books in a way that is interactive, colorful and distinctly local. These are the kinds of traditions that give a town its character. They create memories, strengthen friendships and remind residents that culture does not only happen in large cities or famous museums. It thrives wherever people are willing to create together.

As September approaches, there is still time for someone to decide that this is the year they will take part. Whether inspired by a childhood favorite, a classic novel or a beloved poem, each new display adds another voice to the conversation.

The finished arrangements may last only a short time, but the inspiration they spark can endure much longer. That is the quiet magic of libraries. They do not simply preserve stories. They encourage every generation to tell new ones, in whatever form their imagination allows.

The last pay phone

Every once in a while, something disappears so quietly that you don’t realize it has gone until you go looking for it. That happened to me a few weeks ago.

I wasn’t actually planning to make a phone call. I simply drove past an old convenience store where I distinctly remembered a pay phone standing outside for decades. It had been tucked beneath a little metal hood, facing the parking lot. It wasn’t attractive. It wasn’t historic. It wasn’t something anyone photographed.

It was simply...there. Except it wasn’t.

The concrete pad remained, along with four rusty bolts sticking out of the ground like tiny gravestones. If you didn’t know what had once occupied that spot, you’d never give it a second glance.

For anyone under about 30 years old, the idea of needing a pay phone probably sounds ridiculous. We all carry computers in our pockets now. If we’re lost, we have GPS. If we need help, we can text. If we’re running late, we can call before anyone has time to wonder where we are.

But there was a time when finding a pay phone could feel like finding water in the desert.

You always needed a quarter. If you didn’t have one, you started checking cup holders, coat pockets or the bottom of your glove compartment. Sometimes you’d ask a stranger, “Do you have change for a dollar?” Nobody thought that was odd.

There was an unspoken etiquette, too. You kept your conversation short if someone else was waiting. If the weather was bad, you’d hunch beneath the little metal cover while rain dripped off the edges. In winter, the handset always seemed about twenty degrees colder than the air around it.

The pay phone was also a witness to life. Teenagers nervously calling home after missing curfew. Parents letting family know they had arrived safely. Drivers reporting breakdowns before roadside assistance came with smartphone apps. Young couples talking longer than they could afford because hanging up first somehow felt

impossible.

Looking back, it’s amazing how much trust we placed in those phones. They sat outside through blizzards, thunderstorms and heat waves. Thousands of hands touched them. Somehow they almost always worked.

Today’s technology is unquestionably better. I wouldn’t trade my cell phone for a pocket full of quarters. But convenience has changed something else. Because every call is private now.

You never overhear someone happily announcing they got the job. You don’t hear somebody telling their spouse they’ll be home in twenty minutes. You don’t watch a nervous teenager practicing what they’re about to say before dropping a coin into the slot.

Life still happens, of course. We just experience it behind screens instead of out in the open.

Small-town Massachusetts has always been full of ordinary landmarks that quietly stitched communities together. A hardware store with creaky floors. The diner where everyone knew the waitress’s name. The corner barber shop. The bulletin board covered with handwritten notices.

The pay phone belonged on that list. It wasn’t important because of what it was. It mattered because everyone, sooner or later, needed it.

Maybe that’s why seeing those four empty bolts caught my attention. They reminded me that progress rarely arrives with a parade. More often it comes one unnoticed change at a time, until the world you’ve always known has become somebody else’s history.

Someday, a child will ask what those rusty bolts are for. Someone my age will smile.

“They used to hold a pay phone,” we’ll say.

The child will probably look puzzled. And for a brief moment, we’ll realize we’re telling a story that has quietly become history.

The hidden danger of investing too cautiously

One of the most significant risks investors face isn’t losing money in a market dip; it’s failing to reach their long-term financial goals.

Many people focus heavily on short-term losses in the stock market and try to protect their savings by investing conservatively or avoiding stocks altogether. But that runs the risk that their savings won’t grow enough to keep up with inflation or support future needs.

Understanding what investment risk really means helps you make smarter financial decisions, considering these three key aspects.

Risk tolerance describes your emotional comfort with risk. If you’d want to pull your money out of the market during a downturn, that reveals something about your tolerance. Many financial advisors use questionnaires to help clients understand how they might react in different market conditions.

Risk capacity refers to how much risk you can afford to take. Your timeline matters. A 35-year-old saving for retirement has decades to ride out market swings. A retiree drawing income from their portfolio doesn’t have that same cushion.

Required risk describes how much risk you may need to take to reach your financial goals. Higher returns generally come with higher risk, though higher risk does not guarantee higher returns. If you need strong growth to retire comfortably, you may need to accept more short-term volatility.

Sometimes these elements don’t line up. You might be uncomfortable with risk but need strong growth to meet your goals.

Balance and diversification matter: Finding the right balance matters more than you might think. A small difference in your annual rate of return, from 5% to 7% for instance, doesn’t just add up a little. It multiplies. That’s the power of compounding — returns earning their own returns, year after year, building on an ever-growing base. Over 30 or 35 years, that can become significant.

You needn’t choose between playing it so safe your money barely keeps up with inflation and taking on more risk than you’re comfortable with. Instead, a balanced mix can fit your comfort level and still help grow your money over time.

The age factor: You’ll want to adjust your approach to risk as you get older. If retirement is years away, your portfolio may lean toward growth investments like stocks and stock mutual funds; you have time to absorb short-term losses and benefit from long-term gains. Lower risk investments like bonds still play a role because they can help smooth out changes in your portfolio’s value.

As you near retirement, your portfolio may shift toward a more even mix of stocks and bonds to limit exposure to large market swings. The goal is to protect what you’ve built while still generating enough growth to fund a retirement that could last decades.

QCC professor gives voice to formerly incarcerated in new documentary

WORCESTER — What is it like to get out of prison and start over? QCC Professor of Criminal Justice Kristy Glover spent her sabbatical researching this question and creating “Voices of Justice,” a documentary film that she produced, filmed and edited herself.

“Voice of Justice” features accounts from three men who have firsthand experience with the justice system. The documentary highlights how multiple support systems are critical for re-entry, the period of time when individuals are transitioning out of incarceration. Support from family members, community organizations and probation officers, along with raising awareness to reduce stig-

ma, were all mentioned as ways to reduce recidivism and influence personal and professional growth.

“There are so many things that we expect of individuals when they’re just getting released. They have to get a job, pay their monthly supervision fees and find a place to live,” Glover said.

Glover witnessed the re-entry process during her time as a parole officer for the state of Georgia, but the connection is also personal. Her grandfather encountered challenges when he was released from prison, which left a lasting impression on the family, including Glover’s mother, who also joined law enforcement, eventually becoming a police captain.

In the documentary, Glover interviews Mario Rivera, who spoke about his own re-entry experience. Rivera praised Worcester-area nonprofits such as Legendary Legacies and Open Sky Community Services for providing services such as counseling and assistance with obtaining a laptop and hygiene products. He also acknowledged his family as a large source of support.

“Without initial help

in the first 60 days of me coming home, my progress wouldn’t have taken off the way it did,” Rivera said.

Rivera didn’t wait until he was released to start preparing. He completed QCC’s culinary re-entry program, a partnership with the Worcester County Jail and House of Correction that teaches skills needed to work in food service and includes multiple certifications upon successful completion. In “Voices of Justice,” Rivera shared that during the program, he realized education was a vital part of his path to a new future. After his release, he enrolled at QCC and in the Liberal Arts for Returning Citizens (LARC) program at Clark University.

“The culinary program has had a significant impact on hundreds of incarcerated individuals,” said

Worcester County Sheriff Lew Evangelidis. “We are proud to have helped Mario build a successful path forward after incarceration.”

Anthony Bryant, who also appeared in “Voices of Justice,” has seen multiple sides of the criminal justice system. Before he was incarcerated, he held roles as a corrections officer, a deputy sheriff and a high-way patrolman.

“Law enforcement is not just a job; it’s your identity. And losing that role can produce deep internal shame,” Bryant shared.

Bryant, however, drew on his law enforcement training to stay calm and focused during his incarceration, using that discipline as a foundation for working to improve his life. As his release date approached, he didn’t receive any re-entry preparation from the prison,

so he got ready by reading self-help books and journaling.

After his sentence, Bryant relied on employment assistance programs, but he was often steered into manual labor positions that didn’t reflect his skills, making it difficult to rebuild his professional career.

In addition to family and community programs, both Bryant and Rivera said that a strong relationship with a probation or parole officer can make a positive difference. They noted that the stigma of having a criminal record can be detrimental to progress, but even one person who sees past their mistakes can be instrumental. They hope others can offer the same grace to those who are going through re-entry.

“People change when their dignity is restored, responsibility is entrusted

gradually and their story is allowed to mean something more than their worst decision,” Bryant remarked. “It’s a mindset shift that many people and legislators don’t understand.”

Rivera and Bryant have also taken it upon themselves to help others with similar experiences. Bryant has become an ethics trainer for law enforcement and other public service organizations. Rivera has stayed connected with Legendary Legacies to educate others and advocate for those in the re-entry process.

“I’m taking accountability in my own life for the things that I’ve done,” Rivera said. “Some people might not be receptive to my situation, but I take it as motivation to do better.”

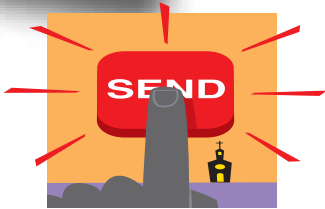

Skurka recognized the efforts of the construction team and project partners in reaching the milestone safely and efficiently.

"Today's event celebrates a significant construction milestone and the many people and partnerships helping us bring this project to life," Skurka said. "At Gilbane, we are committed to creating healthy, safe and sustainable spaces that have a lasting effect on the community. We are honored to partner with QCC on this transformative project."

The QCC Center is expected to open in Fall 2027 and will serve as a centerpiece of the college's campus, creating new opportunities for hands-on learning, workforce training and community engagement.

"When we look at this structure, we aren't just looking at steel beams and concrete; we're looking at the literal framework of Worcester's economic future," said Petty. "True progress means lifting everyone up. By expanding physical accessibility and producing state-of-the-art, energy-efficient systems, QCC is ensuring our green energy and equity goals move forward."

WORCESTER — Quinsigamond Community College celebrated a major construction milestone with a Topping Off Ceremony for its new QCC Center, marking the completion of the building's structural frame.
