HONORING A SEASON OF GROWTH, GRIT, AND HISTORIC FIRSTS

WEBSTER — The 2025 Wildcats capped off their historic season by recognizing several standout players for their leadership, effort, and impact both on and off the field during their end of the year banquet. Thank you to the Cruz and Ludwig family for providing the banquet and your generous support.

Our Wildcat awards winners are as follows: Hunter Claypool earned Most Valuable Player honors after a record-breaking year that included 28 total touchdowns. Tyler Bernier, Andreas Langlois, and Connor Opatka each received the Coaches Award for their dedication, consistency, and teamfirst mindset. Joshua Cruz Jr. was named the Unsung Hero, recognized for his quiet leadership and hard work that often went beyond the stat sheet. The coveted 2025 Wildcat Hammer Award also went to Hunter Claypool, highlighting his toughness, discipline, and relentless drive throughout the

The 2025 Webster Middle School Wildcats football team closed out their season with an impressive 5-1 record, marking the most successful campaign in program history. Averaging 34.5 points per game while allowing just 21, the Wildcats proved that academics, attendance, commitment, teamwork, and consis-

tent effort ultimately pay off.

A season defined by growth, the Wildcats came out strong, opening with a pair of dominant wins over Auburn (36-0) and Knox Trail (48-16) "Under The Lights" at the Memorial Athletic Field in Webster. A tough Week 4 loss to Millbury (20-46) served as a mid-season wake-up callone that ultimately fueled a renewed focus and stronger team identity.

team caught fire. Over their final three games, the Wildcats averaged 35 points per game, capped by a 49-19 statement win over Gardner to close the season. The defense ended on a high note, allowing only 65 total points over that same stretch-an average of under 18 per game-against three very good football teams.

Beyond the scoreboard, this season was about building a foundation of discipline, accountability, and unity. The team's mantra of "student-athlete first, welcome the coaching, compete hard, stay disciplined, and improve together" became more than words; it became the Wildcats' identity.

Attendance at school, practice, and games went hand in hand with performance. Every week, the Wildcats topped 85 percent attendance, they won. În fact, a 15 percent increase in attendance correlated with nearly 10 more points scored per game, highlighting how directly impacted execution and success on the field.

Led by Hunter Claypool, the WMS All-Time Leading

Scorer, who recorded 28 touchdowns (25 rushing, 1 passing, and 2 defensive pick-sixes), the explosive "ground and pound" offense defined the Wildcats' identity. The team recorded the highest-scoring offense in program history, surpassing 30 points in five of six games.

Defensively, the Wildcats took pride in their resilience returning three interceptions for touchdowns, recovering eight fumbles, delivering a Week 1 shutout, and racking up 22 tackles for loss. They stood tall in clutch moments, including a nail-biting 36-32 win over Leicester and a stripsix touchdown to seal the against a well-coached and respected Uxbridge squad.

The 2025 Wildcats delivered several unforgettable performances throughout their historic season. Their best offensive game came in Week 7, with a commanding 49-19 victory over Gardner, where the team showcased explosive scoring and balance on both sides of the ball.

Defensively, the Wildcats opened the season in dominant fashion with a 36-0 shutout win against Auburn, setting the tone for toughness and discipline. The grittiest win came in Week 5's 36–32 thriller versus Leicester, a game that tested the team's resilience and program's first ever victory heart. The Wildcats also posted

their highest offensive yardage of the year, an incredible 507 total yards, in the Gardner matchup, powered by a relentless ground attack. To cap off the season's highlights, AJ Pereira connected on a 65-yard touchdown pass reception, the longest pass play of the year, again against Gardner, sealing the Wildcats' reputation as one of the most dynamic teams in program history.

The 2025 Wildcats etched their names in Webster Middle School history with a season full of firsts and milestones. This squad became the first winning football program in WMS history, setting a new standard of excellence for Turn To WILDCATS page A14

Webster Public Schools wins PLTW Student Work Cup!

Dudley exploring options for future PFAS mitigation funding

DUDLEY While Dudley's recent special town meeting in October finally saw taxpayers approve borrowing that will allow for a waterline extension in the Eagle Drive neighborhood, the town now needs to once again work around covering the cost of continued mitigation.

The Oct. 20 meeting approved borrowing \$14.2 million to fund a waterline

extension into the Eagle Drive/ Fairview Avenue area as the final solution for local PFAS contamination, \$10.25 million of which is eligible for a 0 percent interest State Revolving Fund loan. However, the meeting did not approve borrowing another \$222,615.32 for costs associated with the ongoing mitigation of PFAS in the neighborhood and testing and monitoring the capped landfill. Until the waterline is officially installed, Dudley still has an obligation to fund mitigation

Earlier this year, the town found itself facing potential fines and legal ramifications after struggling to earn support for a similar town meeting article that was eventually approved to fund mitigation through 2025.

Going into 2026, Dudley will now need to explore other ways to meet its obligations. Town Administrator Jonathan Ruda said the vote

BAY PATH GRAD JOINS SISTERS AS LPN IN LOCAL HEALTHCARE



SOUTHBRIDGE — On Oct. 23, members of the new Masonic Lodge, the Major General Salem Towne Lodge (MGST) of Southbridge attended the monthly 24th Masonic District Lodge of Instruction (L.O.I.) class at the Webster apartments (the Webster Lodge building). These classes are where new candidates receive information about Freemasonry and a quest speaker who talks about fraternity as well as other topics.

The Traveling Chainmail Armor Attendance Apron is a tradition that began in 2010. The lodge with the most brethren in attendance gets to bring this beautiful Chainmail Armor Attendance Apron back to their lodge home and the bragging rights until the next L.O.I monthly class.

Let me give you a little history about this Traveling Chainmail Armor Apron. This beautiful heavy chain link apron was made by brother Michael Sgariglia of the Quinebaug Masonic Lodge with the permission of Brother Robert Schremser, who was our District Deputy Grand Master (DDGM) in 2010. Brother Mike Sgariglia made chainmail armor as a hobby before he became a Master Mason. Because of this he was inspired to make the apron. He got the idea when he was at another Lodge of Instruction class and saw that lodges gave out a prize for the most attended and thought of something personal for the 24th District. Brother Sgariglia made it with a pair of pliers in each hand. It took about 30 hours and 3500 rings to make the Chainmail Armor Apron. It consists of silver and weighs approximately five pounmds

and can be worn. The brethren from the Major General Salem Towne Lodge (MGST) are proud to exhibit this apron until the next L.O.I. class. This is why the members of the (MGST) Lodge try to attend the L.O.I. classes in large numbers. The highest attendance from each lodge keeps this Chainmail Armor Apron. At this meeting of the L.O.I. the (MGST) Lodge had the most brethren in attendance.

EDITORIAL

When town meetings still matter

In towns like ours, democracy doesn't live in marble halls or political soundbites. It lives under the hum of fluorescent lights in the cafeteria of Bartlett High, in the folding chairs of Oxford Middle School, and in the echo of voices that rise and fall in Dudley's Town Hall. It lives wherever neighbors gather, warrant booklets in hand, to decide—sometimes line by line—how their shared community should spend, save, build, and plan.

It's not glamorous. There's no applause, no cameras, no slogans. Sometimes, the coffee is the most exciting part of the evening. But that's precisely the beauty of it. The town meeting, and the citizen boards that spin out of it, represent the oldest and most direct form of self-government in the country. They remind us that a community isn't governed by "them." It's governed by us.

And yet, more and more often, the seats are half-empty. Attendance at public meetings has been shrinking across Central Massachusetts. It's not because people don't care—it's because life is busy. Parents juggle work and after-school schedules. Commuters fight late traffic home from Worcester or Providence. Others feel they don't know enough about local issues, or worry they'll stand out in a crowd of "regulars." Some figure their single vote won't make a difference.

But here's the quiet truth: in small towns, it always does. When only a few dozen residents show up, one voice can change a line item, a bylaw, or a project that shapes the town for decades. A single question can clarify a costly oversight; a single suggestion can improve how public funds are used. No other level of government offers that kind of access, or that kind

Town meeting is where the abstract becomes personal. A number on a spreadsheet becomes the new roof for a senior center. A zoning change becomes a future housing development or a protected field. A vote to fund or delay a road project might decide whether your street stays safe through the winter. And beyond the budgets and bylaws, these gatherings remind us what's best about New England life—the ability to argue passionately with your neighbor one minute and shake their hand the next.

When people stop showing up, the system doesn't collapse. It quietly shifts into the hands of the few who do. That's when government feels distant, when decisions start to surprise us, when cynicism creeps in. But when citizens take the time to show up, ask questions, and listen, local government regains its balance. It becomes what it was meant to be: a partnership between those elected to lead and those who care enough to watch

So as the leaves give way to the gray weeks before winter, take another look at your town calendar. Read the warrant. Attend a meeting—even if only to listen. You don't need to know the bylaws by heart or the budget codes by number. You only need to bring your curiosity, your common sense, and your willingness to care.

The strength of Webster, Dudley, and Oxford has never come from their size or wealth. It comes from participation—from the idea that the people who live here should shape what "here" means. Town meeting may not trend online or draw a crowd, but it remains one of the last honest places where democracy still fits around a folding table.

The lights are still on at Town Hall. The microphones still work. The seats are waiting. All that's missing, sometimes, are the people they were meant for.

First Lieutenant Ragnar Godfrey Lind, a.k.a. Jeffrey Lynn

One of Auburn's most famous people was the actor known as Jeffery Lynn. He was the son of John Algot and Hedvig Cecilia [Persdotter] Edoff and was born Feb. 16, 1909, in Auburn. The family lived at 785 Oxford St. He had four brothers and three sisters. His father worked as a machinist in a tool shop.

Jeffrey attended Bates College in Lewiston Maine and graduated in 1930 with a B.A. In education. After college, he worked as a high school teacher in English and speech & drama. He also worked for the New England Telephone Co. for a while. His first film was in 1938, but when the war started, he enlisted in February 1942, where he trained with B-18, B-23, and PT-17 aircraft. He was part of Company A, Army Air Force B-25 Mitchell Bomb Squadron. This group flew more than 450 combat missions while in the Mediterranean Theater. The unit was cited for outstanding performance of duty in action and was awarded a Presidential citation. His unit was awarded the distinguished-unit badge for the invasion of Italy's mainland. Promoted to Captain in 1945, then he earned the bronze star in Italy and Austria as a combat intelligence officer in the Dept of Air Force overseas. This group was instrumental in cutting communications behind the German lines in Italy. Jeffrey was discharged in 1946 as Special Intelligence Officer.

After he left the military, Jeffery returned to Hollywood to do movies like "A letter to Three Wives," "Home Town Story" with Marilyn Monroe, "BUtterfield 8" with Elizabeth Taylor & Laurence Harvey, and "Tony Rome" with Frank Sinatra. Later in the 1960s, Jeffery did Broadway in plays such as "Any Wednesday" in 1966, and in 1967 "Dinner at Eight," just to name a few. He dabbled in television starring in shows like "Robert Montgomery Presents," "Your Shows of Shows," "My Son Jeep" and "Lux Video Theatre." His last appearance was on "Murder She Wrote."

Jeffery was married to Robin Chandler 1946 – 1958, Patricia Davis Ciarlo in 1965-1973, and at the time of his death was married to Helen Lynn. Jeffery died Nov. 24, 1995, in Burbank California at the age of 89. He is buried in Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles.

Pay with cash or debit. Credit cards make it easy to overspend, especially if you don't plan to pay the balance in full. Using cash or a debit card and paying for it now rather than deferring payment can help you stick to your budget and avoid buying things you can't afford.

If it already feels overwhelming, consider trimming your list to only close friends and immediate family. Plan ahead for next year. If overspending is a recurring issue, start preparing now for 2026. Decide how much you want to spend and set up a holiday fund. Contributing monthly to an interest-bearing account can ease the burden next year – and even earn you a little extra.

The holidays should be joyful, not financially stressful. By planning ahead, spending intentionally and keeping your long-term goals in mind, you can enjoy the season without the burden of debt. A little discipline now can lead to a more peaceful start to the new year – and a healthier financial future.

It's been nearly a month and a half since my last auction news update, and there's a lot to report. I'll start by sharing news about a rare piece of Titanic memorabilia being auctioned in the United Kingdom.

Frederick Sutton, a 61-year-old first-class passenger from New Jersey, was lost at sea when the Titanic sank on April 14, 1912. Some of his personal effects were recovered and given

to his family. The family held them for over 100 years before deciding to now auction the memorabilia. Mr. Sutton's family received his belongings in a white canvas bag marked "46." It included a first-class passenger list that had been damaged by the cold Atlantic waters after the tragic incident. The collection includes a note from Titanic's White Start Lines. Families of missing passengers were advised that they would have to pay for a first-class ticket to return deceased family members' bodies that were recovered. "This is callous in the extreme but goes to illustrate how different the world was in 1912," the auctioneer said in the BBC article. The passenger list is estimated to bring £100,000 (\$131,350 U.S.).

A massive collection of memorabilia from the estate of colorful and eccentric Indianapolis Colts owner, Jim Irsay, will be sold in several auctions. Irsay had shared some of his collection with the public in 2023 when he offered free concerts to the public with the opportunity to view some historical and pop culture memorabilia. One of the stops on the tour was at Boston's TD Garden, where I was fortunate enough to see some of the rare artifacts. Items being auctioned include "an Apple II manual signed by Steve Jobs, Hunter S. Thompson's Red Shark convertible and Jack Kerouac's orig-

inal typewritten manuscript of "On the Road,"" according to the Indy Star.

Made of gold, the working sculpture was designed by Italian artist Maurizio Cattelan and is titled "America." It was created with 101.2 kilograms (223 pounds) of gold," according to MSN. An identical one was stolen from England's Blenheim Palace in a brazen 2019 heist. Cattelan is the artist who sold "Comedian," a banana duct taped to a wall, for \$6.2 million last year. No estimate for the toilet was provided, but the gold used is worth approximately \$10 million at current

Life balance

We all want to move forward — to reach the goal, finish the book, launch the business, get in shape, fall in love, or become the person we know we could be. We all have dreams, and most of us don't lack the desire. What we lack is the willingness to act when the timing isn't perfect.

I'm all about maintaining a work-life balance, and boundaries are essential, but I sometimes think that it's not the world slowing us down — it's our own rules. The quiet, self-made commandments we invent in the name of balance, boundaries, and self-care. Rules like "I don't check emails after 5," or "I don't work weekends," or "I don't follow up twice with the same client." They sound healthy — responsible even — but sometimes they're invisible fences around our potential.

We build them to stay sane, but if left unchecked, they can also prevent us from going where we truly want to be in life.

A lot of these rules come from a good place. We've been burned before. We've felt the crash after burnout, the sting of rejection, the exhaustion of trying too hard. So we promise ourselves limits: never again, not after hours, not on Sundays. But what starts as protection can quietly become a kind of confinement. Sometimes growth begins exactly where dis-

comfort starts.

Every ambitious person eventually faces a crossroads between their rules and their results. The people who go far — the ones we admire — aren't necessarily smarter or luckier. They're just the ones who decided certain rules didn't apply to them.

apply to them.

Stephen King ignored the publishing world's "one book a year" rule. He wrote so fast that his publisher couldn't keep up, so he created a pseudonym—Richard Bachman—to release more. When readers discovered the truth, both names became bestsellers, and the rule was never taken seriously again.

Or take Jeff Bezos, who in Amazon's early days answered customer emails and support calls at 2 a.m., believing connection mattered more than sleep. That obsessive rule-breaking focus on

customers became the DNA of one

of the world's biggest companies.

Or Ed Sheeran, who played dozens of free or low-pay gigs in a single year, sleeping on couches and busking on street corners. Friends said he was devaluing his art — but those nights built the loyal fan base that later filled stadiums.

Or Elon Musk, who broke Silicon Valley's "focus on one thing" rule. While most founders were told to master one company at a time, he was building rockets, cars, and solar panels all at once.

Each one of them broke a rule that sounded smart but wasn't serving the dream.

I'm not suggesting that people should work 24/7, but I am saying that sometimes you need to work 24/7. Knowing when to be flexible with your work-life balance can change your entire future. It's knowing the difference between a guardrail and a cage.

Discipline isn't always about sticking to the same schedule forever; sometimes the boundaries need to bend. The rules that once protected your peace can, at a different season of life, start protecting your comfort instead. And comfort is a silent thief of

momentum.

Every ambitious person reaches a point where "balance" becomes an excuse. Where the rule that once made sense starts standing in the way, the truth is, you can't build an extraordinary life while staying entirely within ordinary limits.

Your next breakthrough may not require a new plan, a new mentor, or a new skill. It may require pushing past self-imposed boundaries.

Examine the rules you've established for yourself. Keep the ones that keep you healthy — the ones that let you rest, recover, and reconnect with life. But question the ones that keep you safe at the expense of your potential.

We all need balance, and progress isn't found in balance alone. It's found in the moments you lean just a little further than what feels comfortable — when you stay an extra hour, take the extra call, send the extra pitch.

You don't need to give up balance — just bend it in the direction of what matters most.

Small-scale succulents provide a multitude of opportunities for incorporating them into your holiday celebrations. Just select containers that complement, but don't overpower their charm.

Create a succulent garden to use as a centerpiece for the table. A shallow container filled with a variety of succulents with different shapes and colors is sure to capture everyone's attention. Set the container on a saucer to protect the table and add a complementary table runner for even greater impact.

Consider using succulents as party favors for guests to

take home and enjoy for years to come. But first, use them to decorate the table by making them into place cards for your guests. Simply add a name to the decorative pot.

Or display them all together in a tray, terra cotta saucer or other shallow container to use as a centerpiece throughout the evening. When the party is over, each guest can pick their own plant to take home.

Add a unique flair to the table by placing cocktail glasses filled with succulents next to each guest's place setting. This makes a unique table decoration and party favor for guests to take home as a reminder of your fun gathering. Use a few planted cocktail glasses to decorate the beverage table or bar.

Grow these plants in a cacti and succulent potting mix. These fast-draining mixes help reduce the risk of overwatering. Further reduce this risk by using containers with drainage holes that

are only slightly larger than the succulents' root system. Growing them in too large of a container for the plant size will retain moisture longer that can lead to root rot, decline, and even the death of your plants.

After the party continue to provide proper care so your centerpiece will be ready for your next event. Move the succulent planter to a cool, draft-free location near an unobstructed south-, west- or east-facing window. If light is limited, consider adding artificial lights.

Water thoroughly but only when the top few inches of soil are dry and just often enough to keep the plants from shriveling. These winter-growing conditions often encourage a spring display of colorful and unique flowers.

Share these directions with your guest and if possible, the name of the succulent. This helps your guest keep the plants alive to enjoy for years

With a trip to your favorite garden center and your imagination you can create fun holiday décor and party favors. You and your guests will enjoy their beauty throughout the holidays and beyond.



Marsi champions change to M.G.L. language referring to disabilities

BOSTON — The State House of Representatives on Beacon Hill has approved an amendment that will replace language referring to those with intellectual, physical and developmental disabilities in Massachusetts General Laws removing what many consider offensive and outdated termi-

nology. The amendment, H. 4704, was championed by the House Committee on Ways and Means which includes 6th Worcester District Rep. John Marsi, a former Dudley selectman whose district includes Dudley and Charlton. Marsi presented his inaugural speech

ing lead the charge towards a 152-0 vote of the House to approve the amendment.

The rule will now replace the language of "disabled persons" to "persons with disabilities" and "disabled American Veterans" to "American Veterans with disabilities" which Marsi called a "necessary" change to preserve the dignity of these individuals. It also removes all references to the word "retarded," which Marsi simply referred to as "the R-word," which has long been considered a derogatory term for those with disabilities.

"It's about time we addressed this. If there's anything we need to know about this bill, it's that words matter and as elected leaders of the

Commonwealth it's up to us to set the tone for how individuals with disabilities are referred to and how they are treated," said Marsi in his speech on the House floor, which he also shared on social media.

The issue is personal for Marsi who is a father and advocate for a special needs child. His daughter Jessica has disabilities, diagnosed with Angelman syndrome and is non-verbal, but Marsi said she lights up every room she enters and is a "perfect soul." His son Anthony has also become a strong advocate for Jessica, and Marsi considers him a model for how to interact with individuals with disabilities.

This personal connection helped fuel Marsi's push to enter politics and see a 15-year

battle to change the language in Mass General Laws come to fruition.

"I'm her voice on so many issues and it inspired me to run for local office in Dudley many years ago to give back for all the help that the school district and the community gave to us," said Marsi. "Since then, when I decided to run for the House, I wanted to advocate for those who need help the most and be a champion for those without a voice or who feel like they don't have a voice."

Marsi received a standing ovation for his speech. He said the House's eventually vote to support the amendment was a decisive statement by state lawmakers that "words mat-

Dudley begins search process for new employee health care plan

DUDLEY — The Dudley Board of Selectmen has charged a new committee with seeking out and recommending new group health insurance plans and benefits for town employees.

The Insurance Advisory Committee includes representation from the different town unions. Selectmen approved the appointments on Nov. 2 and included Paul Konieczny of Worcester County Retirement, Amanda Holmes of USW with Brayden Cutler as alternate, Officer John Glowacki with Sgt. Keith Remillard as an alternate each representing the Dudley Police union, Lt. Kevin Holstrom and Firefighter Todd Betts as alternate for Local 4271 representing town firefighters, and Kyle MacDonald of SEIU 888 with Brian Dorval as alternate.

Town Administrator Jonathan Ruda explained the importance of the IAC's role.

"The IAC will be brought in and work directly with our independent healthcare consultant to make a recommendation to the board to evaluate

what the best healthcare setup will be from the town. That's why we have representatives from each union," said Ruda.

While the IAC members were appointed to terms that expire in 2028, Ruda anticipates the committee moving quickly as deadlines approach going into the new calendar year.

There are some changes coming down with healthcare the way it is, not just for the town but throughout the country," said Ruda. "It's going to be some rapid based decision making and once those decisions are made, because they're all associated with deadlines coming up over the winter and early spring, things will slow down for the IAC.

A final report and recommendation deadline will be determined by the different healthcare plans that are being evaluated by the IAC. Any recommendations will need to go before the Board of Selectmen for consideration.

Bids for a consultant were opened on Nov. 3 with five bidders submitting to the town. Ruda's office had yet to announce a winning bid as of this writing.







in May approved funding for the rest of the 2025 calendar year but going into January they'll have to find a way to continue to fund the mit-

igation which could involve using stabilization funding which itself requires a two thirds vote at town meeting. Another option could be utilizing Emerging Contaminants in Small or Disadvantaged Communities (EC-SDC) grant funds which the town has applied for through the Department of Environmental Protection Bureau of Water

Resources Clean Drinking Water Program. While the town has yet to secure the funds, officials are hopeful that the potential grant, which could total as much as a million dollars, can help cover the mitigation costs.

"The Town Administrator's Office has presented the project and is finalizing the application with DEP. We're working with the DEP to determine whether one-time remediation costs are eligible and whether the grant can be split between construction and mitigation," Ruda said. "We are confident that the project meets eligibility criteria for qualifying costs. If the grant cannot be applied to mitigation, the Town will need to consider alternative options-either a withdrawal from stabilization (requiring a two thirds vote of Town Meeting) or a new borrowing

Any town meeting to consider alternative funding methods will depend on when Dudley hears back about the grant. Regardless, Ruda made it clear that due to an agreement with local company Gentex, who is splitting the cost of mitigation with the town, and mandates by the state, Dudley will need to find a way to fund its obligations.

"Both the town and Gentex remain under a DEP order to maintain PFAS mitigation via Point of Entry Treatment (POET) systems until the new waterline is operational. Those compliance requirements remain in place, so risks still exist if mitigation lapses," Ruda said. "The town continues to work closely with DEP and consultant, Weston & Sampson, to ensure uninterrupted compliance and to

If Dudley receives the EC-SDC Grant, the remainder not utilized for mitigation would go towards a portion of the waterline project deemed

avoid enforcement issues."

ineligible for the no-interest State Revolving Fund loan and thus subject to a projected 4.5 to 5 percent interest rate in the borrowing.

Speaking of the waterline, Ruda clarified that there has yet to be any confirmed agreement with Gentex on any cost sharing for that project, but the town is making headway now that the borrowing has been approved.

'The DEP has deemed both the town and Gentex Optics Inc. as potential responsible parties for PFAS in private wells and we have worked cooperatively throughout mitigation," Ruda said, adding,

"We anticipate that same spirit of cooperation to continue as we negotiate a cost-sharing agreement to define each party's responsibilities for the waterline installation. Both are expected to contribute 50 percent of the total cost, which is approximately \$8.22 million

The timeline for the project should see as much as 90 percent of the design completed by February and the project going to bid in November of 2026. Construction is expected to start in 2027 and complete by summer 2028, with site restoration expected to conclude the following year.


