Dudley first responders receive regional STORK Award for helping deliver baby girl

DUDLEY — The Town of Dudley is proud to recognize five first responders who were honored with the Central Massachusetts STORK Award for their extraordinary teamwork and compassionate care in helping safely deliver a baby girl during an emergency medical call earlier this year.

The award recipients are: Officer Luis Pacheco, Dudley Police Department; Firefighter/Paramedic Daniel Sheehan;

Firefighter/Paramedic Alex Buck;

Firefighter/Paramedic Cole McKinstry;

Firefighter/Paramedic Nathaniel Bushain.

On Sunday, May 3 at approximately 5:54 p.m., Officer Pacheco and Dudley EMS personnel

responded to a residence on Truman Drive for a report of a woman in active labor. Upon arriving, the team quickly assessed the situation and assisted the expectant mother with the delivery of a healthy baby girl before she could be transported to the hospital.

“Most emergency calls do not end with everyone smiling—or with Dudley welcoming a brand-new resident,” Town Administrator Jonathan Ruda said. “This was an extraordinary moment, and Officer Pacheco and Firefighter/



Paramedics Sheehan, Buck, McKinstry, and Bushain handled it exactly as we would expect: calmly, pro-

fessionally, and with genuine compassion for the family.”

The Central Massachusetts STORK Award recognizes emergency responders who demonstrate

exceptional professionalism, calmness, and compassionate care while assisting with out-of-hospital births.

The award notes that it is “a rare privilege for EMS professionals to be present for life’s most joyful moments” and commends recipients for their meaningful role in welcoming a new baby into the world.

During a recent Board of Selectmen meeting, Police Chief Marek Karłowicz highlighted the significance

of the recognition.

“Last Friday, Central Mass EMS presented five STORK Awards to four firefighters and Officer Luis Pacheco,” he said. “It’s probably one of the scariest and happiest moments in a parent’s life, and our officer and the four paramedics were there to help the parents through it.”

Chief Karłowicz also issued a formal Letter of Commendation to Officer Pacheco, praising his prompt response, professionalism, and teamwork with Dudley EMS.

“Your prompt response, care, and combined teamwork with the Dudley EMS personnel successfully delivered a baby girl. In our line of work, we see a lot of tragic calls, but you were able to experience a life entering this world, one of the happiest moments in a mother’s life,” the Chief wrote.

He further noted that Officer Pacheco’s actions, alongside those of Dudley Fire Department personnel, “reflect great credit upon yourself, this department, and the Town of Dudley.”

Ruda agreed.

“Our police officers and firefighter/paramedics train every day to help people through some of the most difficult moments of their lives, so it is especially wonderful to celebrate a call that ended with the arrival of a healthy baby girl. I could not be prouder of this team, and I suspect this may be the youngest person ever to receive the full Dudley public safety welcome,” he said.

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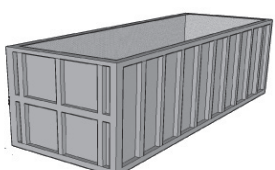


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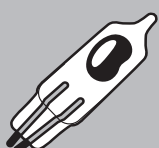

EDITORIAL

A life welcomed, a community reassured

Most people associate police officers, firefighters, and paramedics with moments of crisis. They arrive when tragedy strikes, when accidents happen, or when someone’s worst day suddenly unfolds. Their work often takes place under circumstances most of us hope we never experience.

Every so often, however, those same professionals are called to witness life’s happiest moments.

The recent recognition of five Dudley first responders with the Central Massachusetts STORK Award is one of those rare and uplifting stories that reminds us why public service matters. Officer Luis Pacheco and Firefighter/Paramedics Daniel Sheehan, Alex Buck, Cole McKinstry, and Nathaniel Bushain were not simply responding to an emergency on Truman Drive this past May. They were helping welcome a new life into the world.

Few situations demand greater composure than an unexpected childbirth outside of a hospital. There is little room for hesitation, and no opportunity to ask for a second chance. Every decision matters. Every action must be calm, deliberate, and compassionate.

That is exactly what happened.

The awards recognize more than medical skill. They honor teamwork, professionalism, and the ability to provide reassurance during one of the most emotional moments a family can experience. Those qualities often go unnoticed because they are quietly displayed every day by emergency responders across our communities.

Town Administrator Jonathan Ruda made an important observation when he noted that most emergency calls do not end with smiles. Police officers and paramedics routinely encounter heartbreaking situations that leave lasting impressions on everyone involved. They carry those experiences with them while continuing to answer the next call, regardless of what awaits.

That reality makes moments like this especially meaningful.

Chief Marek Karłowicz also captured the significance of the event when he described it as both one of the scariest and happiest moments in a parent’s life. For the new family, what began as an emergency became a story they will undoubtedly tell for generations. Their daughter’s first welcome into the world came not in a delivery room, but through the capable hands of neighbors who had dedicated themselves to serving others.

Communities often measure public safety by response times, equipment, or budgets. Those things certainly matter. But the true strength of a public safety department lies in the people who wear the uniforms. Their character, preparation, and compassion cannot be purchased or easily measured.

Awards like the STORK Award serve another important purpose. They remind residents that behind every badge and every ambulance is a person committed to helping others, regardless of the circumstances. Whether responding to a house fire, a medical emergency, or an unexpected birth, these professionals bring the same level of dedication to every call.

The baby born that evening will likely never remember the extraordinary circumstances surrounding her arrival. One day, however, she will hear the story of how five local first responders helped bring her safely into the world, and how an entire town celebrated that remarkable beginning.

Communities need stories like this. They remind us that while emergency services exist to respond to danger, they also stand ready to protect life’s greatest joys. In a profession often defined by loss and hardship, it is fitting to pause and celebrate a call that ended with a healthy newborn, grateful parents, and five deserving recipients of an honor that reflects the very best of public service.

Dudley should be proud of these first responders. Their actions represent the professionalism, compassion, and quiet excellence that communities depend upon every day, whether the call ends in tragedy or, as it thankfully did this time, with the first cries of a brand-new resident.

The empty parking space

I pulled into a crowded parking lot last week and did what most of us do. I started looking for the closest available space. There wasn’t one. So I circled once. Still nothing.

By the second lap, I noticed something interesting. Every driver seemed to be doing exactly what I was doing. We were all hunting for the perfect spot while dozens of perfectly good spaces sat empty just a little farther away. I finally gave up, parked near the edge of the lot, and walked. It took all of about 45 seconds.

By the time I reached the front door, several of the cars that had passed me were still circling. It made me wonder why we’re so determined to save a few extra steps.

When we were kids, walking wasn’t something we tried to avoid. We’d think nothing of hiking across a field to visit a friend or riding a bicycle halfway across town because someone said there might be a pickup baseball game.

Now many of us will spend five minutes searching for a parking place that saves us 30 seconds of walking. I’m as guilty as anyone.

There’s something strangely satisfying about finding that front-row space. It feels like winning a prize, even though the prize is usually a walk that’s shorter than the average television commercial. The funny part is what happens when you park farther away. You notice things.

You see flowers planted along the sidewalk that you would have driven right past. You hear conversations instead of engines. You notice the small independent businesses tucked between larger stores. Sometimes you even run into someone you haven’t seen in years because you’re both walking instead of rushing from one door to another.

Those extra few steps become part of the outing instead of something to be avoided. I suppose that’s true of a lot of life.

We’re always looking for shortcuts. Faster internet. Faster checkout lines. Faster shipping. Faster routes around traffic. We measure success by how quickly we can get from one thing to the next.

But not everything improves by speeding it up. Some conversations are worth lingering over. Some roads are worth taking because they’re scenic instead of efficient. Some Saturday mornings deserve to unfold without constantly checking the clock.

Living in New England reminds us of that every season. Nobody hurries through the first blaze of autumn color. People stop to watch a fresh snowfall. We pull over for covered bridges and scenic overlooks even when we’re already running a little late.

Those moments aren’t productive by any measurable standard. They’re simply enjoyable. Maybe that’s why I didn’t mind the longer walk after all.

The parking lot gave me a few extra minutes outside on a pleasant afternoon. I watched a family loading pumpkins into the back of a pickup. An older couple strolled toward the garden center without seeming to be in any hurry. A little boy proudly carried a loaf of bread that was almost as long as his arm.

None of those moments would have registered if I’d found that perfect parking space. I still like parking close to the door. Old habits don’t disappear overnight. But every now and then, the best spot in the lot isn’t the closest one. It’s the one that reminds us slowing down is sometimes the shortest path to enjoying the day.

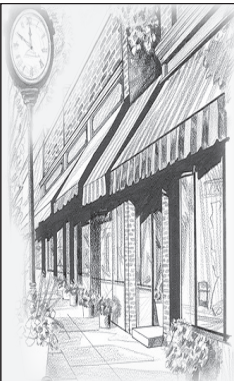

Drought conditions prompt water restrictions

SOUTHBRIDGE/CHARLTON — The Massachusetts Drought Task for issues a Level -2 Significant Drought status for Worcester County. The Town of Southbridge now has to require that all Southbridge and Charlton water customers refrain from all outside water use except for handheld watering between the hours of 5 and 9 p.m. Please turn off all outside sprinkler systems.

This declaration from the State also applies to homes with private wells.

Certain water uses are not subject to restrictions such as production of food and fiber, health and safety reasons, maintenance of livestock, and core functions of a business (for example irrigation for a nursery).

For the general public’s information, Currently the Southbridge Water Departments reservoir system is at 100.1 percent of total capacity. This is within our historical average for this time of year.

The declaration is a county wide declaration, and not due to any current water storage shortfalls within the Southbridge Water Department. This declaration is part of new laws and regulations put forth by the State legislature, and enforcement went into effect in April of 2025.

To be clear, the Southbridge Water department is not experiencing any water storage shortages currently.

The declaration of Level- 2 significant drought will remain in effect until the State Drought Task Force deems that the conditions within Worcester Country have returned to acceptable levels.
