Ten adults, 200 hours, one new career path

Bay Path’s Career Technical initiative graduates third Building Maintenance cohort

CHARLTON — Bay Path’s Career Technical Initiative (CTI) celebrated its third graduating class of adult learners on Aug. 12, honoring 10 students who completed the 200-hour Building Maintenance certificate program. The graduation luncheon, held on Bay Path’s campus, brings the program’s total number of graduates to 30 since its launch in September 2024.

This cohort traveled to Charlton from Worcester, Spencer, South Grafton, Southbridge, Oxford, Shrewsbury and ranged from 22 to 50 years old. Each will leave the program with supports that can lead to job placement, OSHA 10, Bloodborne Pathogens, Asbestos Awareness, Ladder Safety, Scaffolding Safety and Fall Protection certifications; a year of access to Interplay’s virtual reality trades training simulations and a fully stocked toolbox of the trade, presented at the ceremony in front of family and friends.

“The goal of this program is really to help people get

into good-paying, in-demand careers by removing the barriers that often keep adults from going back to school or getting the training they need,” said Jibrael Younis, Operations Manager for Mass Hire, the state agency working with Bay Path to facilitate the CTI program. “We partner with vocational schools like Bay Path to provide industry-focused training that leads directly to employment in fields where employers are actively hiring for jobs that provide sustainable, livable wages.”

Demand for the program continues to grow. Bay Path has scheduled cohorts through 2028, and applications for the next Building Maintenance cohort are open now, closing once the program receives 24 applications or by Aug. 26, whichever comes first. The program is open to all Massachusetts residents 18 and older who qualify.

Among this cohort’s graduates are adult students charting distinct paths into the trades. One graduate is using the certificate as a springboard toward a career

in building inspection.

“I was previously working in the IT field and that field is shrinking because of AI technology. I needed to develop a different skill set,” said Jeff from Worcester. “I feel good, I feel like I accomplished something, taking a first step down a path for a new skill set. Job hunting is my next step; I’m not sure if I’ll go back to the IT field or if I’m going to commit to switching over to facilities maintenance. Regardless, having the skillset will be valuable and even if I don’t do it for a job, I’ll save me thousands in the future with home repair and maintenance.”

“I wanted to further my education and knowledge,” said Anne from Worcester. “I liked being in the program; it helped me learn more things. I do renovations. I’m proud. It doesn’t hurt to do it; you get the knowledge, the experience, and you can go out and further your job opportunities and your resume. My plans after this are to find a job, find a house, and try to find something in

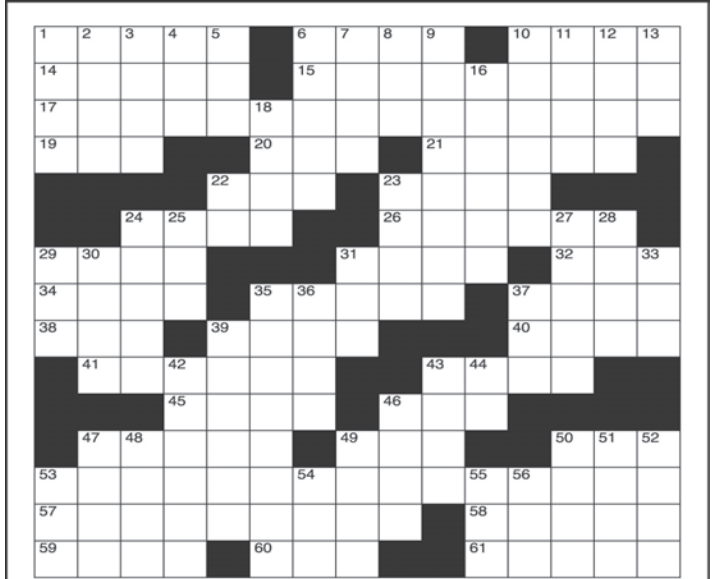

September Gardening Tips from the Charlton Garden Club

1. Now is the time to de-thatch and aerate lawns to promote root growth if necessary.
2. Remove and compost spent, disease-free annuals and fallen leaves.
3. If frost threatens, bring houseplants indoors.
4. Pot up or propagate herbs to bring indoors for winter use.
5. Fall is a great time to plant trees and shrubs. The new plants will have several months to grow new roots and will be ready to grow early next spring. Consider adding some plants with great fall color.
6. Continue to aerate and moisten compost pile to speed decomposition.

7. Plant peonies now, but make sure the crowns are buried only one and a half to two inches below ground level. Planting them deeper than two inches may keep them from blooming.
8. If pesky seedlings of woody plants, such as maple, elm or hackberry are found growing in your yard, remove them as soon as possible so they won't take over gardens and other landscape plantings.
9. Start thinking about purchasing spring blooming bulbs. Plant them for early color in the landscape.
10. September is a great time to seed or overseed lawns. Limestone can be applied if the pH needs to be raised.

Training adults for the jobs communities need

For many adults, changing careers sounds simple in theory and daunting in practice.

Going back to school can mean tuition costs, transportation problems, childcare responsibilities and the uncomfortable prospect of entering a classroom after years away from formal education. Even when someone knows a better-paying career may be within reach, the obstacles between the old job and the new one can be enough to keep that opportunity out of reach.

That is why the continued growth of Bay Path Regional Vocational Technical High School’s Career Technical Initiative deserves attention.

On Aug. 12, Bay Path celebrated the third graduating class of its adult Building Maintenance certificate program. Ten graduates completed 200 hours of training, bringing the program to 30 graduates since its launch in September 2024.

Thirty people may not sound like an enormous number when discussing statewide workforce needs. At the community level, however, those numbers matter.

These are adults from Worcester, Spencer, South Grafton, Southbridge, Oxford, Shrewsbury and elsewhere who arrived in Charlton looking for another opportunity. They ranged in age from 22 to 50, an important reminder that education and career training should not have an expiration date. Their reasons for enrolling are equally important.

One graduate came from the information technology field and saw the training as a way to develop a different set of skills amid changes in his industry. Another already had renovation experience but wanted additional knowledge and credentials that could lead to better employment opportunities.

Those are examples of what workforce development should accomplish. It should meet people where they are and give them practical tools to move forward.

Bay Path’s program goes beyond a certificate. Graduates leave with safety credentials, access to additional virtual trades training and a toolbox stocked for the trade. Through the partnership with MassHire, participants can also receive career coaching, connections with employers and assistance addressing barriers such as transportation and childcare.

That last piece should not be overlooked. An adult with a family and financial obligations cannot necessarily put life on hold for several months to retrain. Successful workforce programs recognize that reality. Helping someone get into the classroom is important. Helping that person remain there long enough to finish the program is equally important.

There is also a broader benefit for Southern Worcester County. Employers continue to need workers who can maintain buildings, repair vehicles, install electrical systems, work in HVAC, weld, manufacture products and perform the many other skilled jobs that keep businesses, schools, municipal buildings and homes functioning.

Bay Path already has the classrooms, shops, equipment and technical expertise necessary to teach those skills. Opening those resources to adults outside the traditional school day makes good use of a public educational institution that has served the region for more than five decades.

The demand speaks for itself. Bay Path has cohorts scheduled through 2028 and offers CTI training not only in building maintenance but also diesel technology, HVAC, electrical, welding, automotive collision repair, automotive technology, culinary arts and manufacturing.

Vocational education has traditionally been viewed as one path available to teenagers deciding what comes after high school. Programs such as this demonstrate that it can be something more. A 22-year-old can need a new direction. So can a 35-year-old or a 50-year-old.

A strong regional workforce depends partly on making sure people have realistic opportunities to learn new skills throughout their working lives. Bay Path and its partners are building that opportunity in Charlton, one graduating class at a time.

What does financial fulfillment actually feel like?

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Feeling financially fulfilled means so much more than just the number in your bank account. It’s about being able to take your family out to dinner without calculating whether you can afford it. It means sleeping soundly on a Sunday night, knowing that if the water heater gives out tomorrow, you can handle it. And it’s saying yes to a vacation because you planned ahead, and the money is there.

In short, financial fulfillment is the feeling that your money is supporting the life you want.

Yet true fulfillment is surprisingly rare. Only 16 percent of Americans are financially fulfilled, according to a 2026 study by Edward Jones and Gallup, “Money and Meaning: Understanding Financial Fulfillment.” Those at the other end of the spectrum, the financially stressed (32 percent), often say that money regularly controls their daily decisions. Most Americans (51 percent), however, fall in the middle — the financially conflicted. They manage to get by but often carry a persistent undercurrent of worry.

Notably, where you land on this spectrum has less to do with your income than you might expect. More than half of households earning \$175,000 or more are still financially conflicted.

Building the foundation

So, the question becomes, “What do financially fulfilled people do differently?” Simply put, they tend to have foundational planning structures in place. Five behaviors show up consistently among the financially fulfilled, and they’re simple steps you can take, too.

- Build an emergency fund (98 percent of fulfilled have this). Aim for saving three to six months of living expenses in a liquid, easily accessible account. When you know you can handle the

unexpected, you stop bracing for it, and lower stress gives you a higher quality of life.

- Create a financial plan for retirement (91 percent of financially fulfilled have one). It’s hard to feel in control if you don’t know where you’re going. A retirement plan puts a real number on what you’ll need and lays out a clear path to get there, with built-in protection against life’s unexpected curveballs.

- Save intentionally for major milestones (87 percent of financially fulfilled do). A home renovation, a new vehicle or a child’s education don’t have to feel disruptive. Setting money aside deliberately for the milestones you anticipate means you can say yes without scrambling.

- Put an estate plan in place (66 percent of financially fulfilled have). Estate plans are not just for the wealthy. A will and basic estate plan help ensure that you’ve worked for still reflects your wishes after you’re gone.

- Work with a financial advisor (60 percent of financially fulfilled who sought any guidance have used an advisor in the past year). The internet is great, but real guidance comes from a credentialed person who knows you and your family and what you want your money to do for you.

Knowing that your money is working toward the life you want doesn’t happen by accident. Feeling financially fulfilled is worth the effort and may be more achievable than you realize.

The annual mystery of the missing household scissors

There are certain objects in a house that apparently do not belong to anyone. Scissors are one of them.

My wife and I have purchased enough pairs of scissors during our marriage that, mathematically speaking, we should be able to open a small barber shop. Yet when I actually need a pair, there are none to be found.

This happened again recently when I needed to cut the tag off something. Simple job. Thirty seconds, maximum.

I opened the kitchen drawer where the scissors are supposed to live. No scissors.

I checked the other kitchen drawer, even though scissors have never lived there. No scissors.

Then came the junk drawer, which is less a drawer than an archaeological site. I found three expired coupons, several batteries of uncertain strength, a key that nobody can identify, two rolls of tape and a tiny screwdriver apparently designed to repair eyeglasses. But no scissors.

At this point, I asked my wife the question every married person eventually asks. “Have you seen the scissors?” This is different from asking, “Where are the scissors?”

The second question suggests that the other person has some responsibility for their disappearance. After three decades of marriage, you learn these distinctions.

She had not seen them. Or, more accurately, she had not seen “the good scissors.”

That was when I remembered that our house has categories of scissors. There are the good scissors. There are the old scissors. There are the little scissors.

There are scissors that came with some kind of sewing kit and are apparently forbidden for ordinary use.

And somewhere, allegedly, there is a pair of scissors in the garage. I went to investigate.

Anyone who has ever entered a garage looking for one specific item knows how this goes.

You begin with scissors. Ten minutes later, you are holding an extension cord, wondering why you own four nearly empty cans of spray paint and trying to remember when you bought a snow shovel with a cracked handle.

I did find a pair of pruning shears, but even I understood that using those to remove a clothing tag would represent an

unnecessary escalation.

So I returned to the house. By now, the original task had become irrelevant. This was no longer about cutting a tag. This was about solving a mystery.

I checked the desk. I checked a basket in the living room. I looked in the drawer where we keep pens, even though the pens themselves rarely seem to be there. Then I spotted them.

The scissors were sitting on a table approximately six feet from where I had begun my search.

I picked them up triumphantly.

My wife looked over.

“Those aren’t the good scissors,” she said.

Apparently, victory has many definitions. I cut the tag anyway.

Later that day, I started thinking about all the other household objects that seem to operate under the same rules. Tape measures vanish immediately after being used. Pens migrate from room to room. And socks? I am not even going to discuss socks. Some mysteries are beyond the reach of science.

What fascinates me is that these things never seem to disappear permanently. They merely go somewhere else for a while.

A missing tape measure eventually appears on a workbench. The flashlight turns up in the car. A pen emerges from underneath a pile of mail.

And the scissors will inevitably return to the kitchen drawer.

That is, until the next time I need them.

I suppose every home has its own small ecosystem, with objects circulating mysteriously among rooms and family members. Maybe that is why, after all these years, I have stopped asking who moved something.

There is rarely a satisfactory answer. Besides, I have learned the safest approach.

When you finally find the scissors, use them quickly. Then put them back exactly where they belong.

That way, when they disappear again, you can be absolutely certain it was somebody else.

this career field. Ultimately, I want to join the military but the things I've learned here I can take with me."

wrappers, and various other waste items. But of major concern is the enormous amount of nip bottles that are collected. This past April the Earth Day Planning Group, in collaboration with the Keep Charlton Beautiful committee, decided to tackle the problem in earnest. Spearheaded by local resident Susan Chanel, the committees asked volunteers to separate nip bottles and alcohol containers from other roadside trash. Volunteers received clear plastic bags, courtesy of the Keep Charlton Beautiful Committee, as a way to highlight the depth of the problem. The Earth Day Planning Group distributed

pickers, gloves, and sturdy trash bags for other roadside trash. A grant from The Last Green Valley helped to cover the cost of some supplies.

While everyone who registered to clean a road was not aware of this new campaign, the results were astounding — an estimated 5,000 nip containers and approximately ten bags of liquor bottles were collected. Photos were sent to local legislators, urging them to support an expansion of the Bottle Bill, specifically to include a deposit and return on nip bottles.

When Terek Mroczkowski, owner of Ted's Package Store, learned of our initiative, he offered his support by installing bins at the four

liquor retailers in Charlton where empty nip bottles may be discarded. Every time a bin is filled at Ted's, they will make a monetary donation to the Keep Charlton Beautiful Committee. These funds will help continue efforts to reduce, reuse and recycle to support Earth Day.

We are grateful for the generosity of the Mroczkowski family and the time commitment of our volunteer citizens. But litter still remains a costly problem. We appreciate those businesses that provide trash receptacles for items purchased at their storefronts, and encourage people to use them. By working together, we can help to Keep Charlton Beautiful and take care of Mother Earth.
