Charlton officials settle dispute over house renumbering request

CHARLTON — Nearly a year after Charlton paved the way for changes to its house numbering bylaws, the first major debate over a requested renumbering dominated the Select Board's meeting on Oct. 14.

Charlton voters approved a bylaw amendment during the fall town meeting last October granting the Select Board power to approve policies for number assignments on buildings and properties. It took a year before any major debate or disagreement emerged regarding requests to owners to change their existing house num-

Changes in the bylaws now reserve letters like "A" or "B" for duplexes that share a single driveway, and seeks to work with homeowners along certain routes to change their numbers to be in more numerical order. This has been deemed significant for public safety and emergency response to better locate and identify and locate homes. But for some the requests may seem too cumbersome.

That was the case for Brian Lafleche, owner of 77 E. Baylies Road which was recommended to change the number to 81. Lafleche met with the Select Board in a public hearing to denounce the requested change calling it an "unnecessary hardship" on his family.

The ensuing debate included input from several local officials, including Zoning Enforcement Officer Curtis Meskus and Fire Chief Rob Barton who acknowledged the safety and emergency response significance of the change while also recognizing the citizen's concern. The Select Board was also initially divided on the matter, but Selectman David Singer made it clear he wouldn't vote to force the change on Lafleche reminding everyone the change would also require the family to update legal documents like licenses and passports to reflect the new

"I think there are times where we hope that if it's not too much on a resident that they would want to work with the town, but there are times where things do require a bit more work or effort on someone's part and if a resident isn't going to want to do that I loath to do things if there are, in my own mind, other options. With all due respect to the work that's been done I just think there are other options," said Singer.

Town officials and the Select Board eventually came to a compromise with the homeowner to take no action as Lafelche had indicated a possible negotiation with a neighbor to potentially renumber a different property and other neighboring lots are currently empty. With the potential for those properties to host new homes in the future, town officials decided to leave the situation as it is until there is a serious need to return to the table to further negotiate a resolution on the matter.

Master Masons celebrate 250-year anniversary of "Knox Noble Train of Artillery"

On Sunday, Oct. 12, the Sturbridge common was packed with spectators to watch the Master Masons celebrate one of the most pivotal episodes in American military history, leading to the founding of this great nation 250 years ago. In the winter of 1775-1776 Colonel Henry Knox's Noble Train of Artillery passed through

this area in Massachusetts on the way to Boston. Here is a little bit of his-

On Nov. 16, 1775, General George Washington sent Colonel Henry Knox to Fort Ticonderoga in upstate New York to retrieve cannons and munitions from the Green Mountain Boys led by Ethan Allen and Benedict Arnaold. Colonel Henry Knox was only 25 years old and traveled 300 miles in the dead of winter of 1775-1776 from Fort Ticonderoga to Boston. Knox selected 58 cannons that was transported by oxen-drawn carts in

what became the "Knox Noble Train of Artillery.' After 56 days of traveling, Knox and his troops erected fortifications over Dorchester Heights overlooking Boston. The British were driven out of Boston to a flotilla of ships heading for Nova Scotia. General George Washington claimed his first victory of the American Revolution, in a large part due to Colonel Henry Knox's Noble Train of Artillery.

To commemorate Brother Knox's achievement and contribution to American independence, a

If every adult in Southbridge, Sturbridge, Brimfield, Holland, Wales, and Charlton gave a single evening a month to public service, every board seat would be filled, every community event would thrive, and every child would see munity. the living proof that local life still matters.

Autumn always reminds us that seasons change, and people move on. But a strong community endures when new hands are ready to carry the torch. If you've been thinking about getting involved, this is the season to do it. Your town is waiting.

Topics of career, church, and life in general involved the implication that if you achieve certain levels in life, obtain a specific job, increase attendance, or manage to accumulate certain benchmarks of success - car, house, vacations – or rack up a bunch of accomplishments, you've made it, whatever it is, as Vonnegut might inquire.

Not that these in and of themselves aren't worthy objectives. They are. But earthly achievement does not fully define us in terms of success, and we need to avoid grading ourselves solely by these barometers, as if an instructor has less value than a professor, or a manager is a better person than a new hire, or a smaller church is less impactful than a larger one.

My late aunt and uncle co-founded a tiny church in New Jersey with a couple other families. Over the years people in the community came to call it "the giving church." Even though it remained small, it became a significant resource for the com-

I've known people who have had lives of great fulfillment in purpose, who walked with the Lord, and reflected Him well, who have very little material wealth, and yet they have lived immensely successful lives in what lasts long after antiques break, cars get old, houses run

down, and fashions are no longer chic.

But what is success? That question has garnered answers as varied as the human condition and is treated as a complex notion. But is it?

My parents thought success was helping to build others, to help them become their best selves.

Moreover, mom and dad – two of my most important role models -defined success as living a life that would make God proud. Which is to say leave the place better than you found it, use the blessings provided

to help others, and to remember identity is in how God defines us, not others, regardless of success or string of disappointments.

Several uber entrepreneurs I know have defined it as the ability to do some good in the world; with more resources more can be done to elevate others.

Ben and Jerry's formed a partnership Greyston Bakery to purchase brownies for their ice-cream. Founded by Bernie Glassman, he set out to create a bakery to hire people who might have significant barriers to employment, such as homelessness. B and J could have made more money (which some define as success) purchasing lower

quality brownies. They chose to help others.

Simulation Theory

During an interview years ago, Elon Musk famously claimed there's a "one in billions" chance that this is base reality. In other words, he believes it's far more likely that we're living in some simulation than in the original, foundational universe.

But what kind of simulation? A digital computer program? A spiritual matrix? That idea may sound bizarre after all, everything feels real, doesn't

Yet this isn't just late-night dorm room talk. Some of the world's most respected thinkers are taking the idea seriously. It's not about rejecting science-it's about following it to its farthest, strangest conclusions.

Let's start with String Theory. It's a theoretical framework in physics proposing that the fundamental building blocks of the universe aren't particles, but tiny vibrating strings. These strings, depending on how they vibrate, give rise to all particles and forces-

The math checks out, even if we haven't proven it experimentally yet. It's one of the best candidates for a "Theory of Everything" that could unify quantum mechanics with general relativity.

At the 2011 Isaac Asimov Memorial Debate titled "The Theory of Everything," theoretical physicist Sylvester James Gates, Jr. dropped a bombshell. He revealed that he found something astonishing embedded in the equations of string theory: patterns of "error-correcting codes"-the same kind used in computer programming to detect and correct mistakes.

Sitting next to him, astrophysicist Neil deGrasse Tyson react-

ed with stunned amazement: "You're blowing my mind right now!"

Why would error-correcting codes appear in the fabric of the cosmos? Gates himself admitted he doesn't know the implications yet. But the mere presence of such codes leads to a wild yet serious question: Could the universe itself be structured like a vast, intelligent computation?

That's where the idea of the simula-

On late-night television, when asked if he thought we were living in a simulation, Neil deGrasse Tyson replied, "I wish I had a good argument against it, but I don't...

And while the science doesn't prove this, it pushes our imagination into territory that philosophers, mystics, and spiritual traditions have been exploring for millennia: that reality is deeper than it appears.

It doesn't mean we live in a video game controlled by aliens.

It might mean that the universe is information-rich, consciousness-infused, and governed by principles far beyond our current understanding.

My friend, physicist and laser pioneer Dr. Mani Bhaumik, wrote about this in his book

"Code Name God." He argues that modern physics, far from disproving a creator, points toward a transcendent source of intelligence.

That's a powerful idea: that our minds are just beginning to awaken to truths already embedded in nature.

Dr. David Selbie, interpreting the implications of quantum physics, has emphasized: Our choices and behavior as conscious observers-not the accumulation of material goods—are what matter. Those things are transient illusions. True immortality lies in evolving consciousness beyond the physical hologram.

Similarly, Dr. Amit Goswami, a quantum physicist known for his explorations of consciousness, has stated: "Contrary to what they tell you,

you are not a limited material being."

This idea echoes something timeless. Whether through the lens of physics or philosophy, the message is the same: You are more than you think you are.

Quantum physics shows us that particles don't even exist in fixed states until observed. They remain in a state of possibility. In a strange and very real way, attention shapes outcome. This isn't just a metaphor—it's physics, though interpretations vary.

So what does this mean for us?

It means we live in a participatory universe. That our focus, our awareness, our very act of observation-matters. That we are not passive passengers in reality, but active participants.

No, quantum physics doesn't promise we can manifest Lamborghinis with our thoughts. But it does suggest something far greater: that we are wired into the very structure of existence, and our consciousness has weight in the world. And that, perhaps, is the most hope-

ful message of all. We are not powerless. We are not

accidents. We are not limited. We are participants in something

vast, intelligent, and alive.

The universe is not outside us. We are part of it. And the deeper we look, the more we realize:

We are more than we think we are.

Mark the location of late emerging perennials



GARDEN Moments **MELINDA MYERS**

As you prepare your gardens for winter, consider marking the location of late emerging perennials to avoid accidentally weeding them out next spring. Use bulbs, commercial or DIY plant labels, stones or simply leave their stems intact to help guide your cleanup efforts next spring.

These late emerging perennials may have you worried they died overwinter. Lingering winter weather and cooler than normal spring temperatures can further delay their appearance. Be patient and know this adaptation allows them to avoid damage from late spring frosts as they wait for the soil to warm and begin growing.

Hardy hibiscus, balloon flower (Platycodon), leadwort (Ceratostostigma), Crocosmia, Red-hot poker (Kniphofia), whirling butterflies (Gaura lindheimeri), Butterfly bush (Buddleia), Russian sage (Perovskia atriplicifolia), and blue spirea (Carvopteris x clandonensis) are a few you may have growing in your garden. Many native plants like butterfly weed (Asclepias tuberosa), swamp milkweed (Asclepias incarnata), black-eyed Susan (Rudbeckia), Culver's root (Veronicastrum), Indian pink (Spigelia marilandica), Joe-pye weed (Eutrochium spp. formerly Eupatorium), asters, liatris, and goldenrods can also be late to emerge. It's easy to accidentally weed these out during spring clean-up.

These plants are worth the wait since they add extra color to our mid and late season gardens. They extend the beauty, pollinator appeal and food source for

many insects, and songbirds visiting your gardens.

Try leaving the stems or a portion of the stems of these plants intact until the new growth emerges. Unfortunately, many of us have accidentally removed these, too.

Plant tags will identify the plant and mark their location but can be unsightly. Try placing a colorful dowel rod, golf tee or short bamboo stake at the base of these plants. Number each and mark them on your garden plans to help track the plant's identity.

Stones or shells, where they are abundant, can be placed next to or surrounding these plants to mark the location. These tend to stay put and may be less obtrusive than plant tags. Just be sure to alert anyone helping in the garden of their purpose and that they need to stay put.

Or mark their spot with bulbs. Plant spring flowering bulbs like daffodils, hyacinths and alliums next to these plants to extend your garden's bloom time and help prevent damage to the perennial plants.

Avoid tulips, crocus and other bulbs that animals love. Squirrels, chipmunks, rabbits and deer may move or eat your marker.

Consider using a mix of early, mid and late spring flowering bulbs to further extend the color in your garden. Or skirt these late emerging plants with early spring blooming perennials like woodland and creeping phlox, candytuft or rockcress. You'll enjoy the added color as you wait for the other plants to make their appearance later in the spring.

When spring arrives, exercise patience as you wait for the return of beautiful, late emerging perennials.
