First program held at newly renovated Swan Tavern carriage house

LEICESTER — The Tavern-Leicester Historical Museum held its first public program in its newly restored & renovated carriage/summer house on Thursday, Oct. 9.

The detached building was originally a carriage house, but in the 1930's was renovated and turned into a half-glass structure to be used in the warmer months.

The structure had long been neglected when the tavern was used by Becker College as its administration building and it was at a point where it needed immediate attention. Coordinated by the town of Leicester Historical Commission, the project has been ongoing for the last two years. The major work was done by

Antanvica Construction of Leicester, funded by grants. The remaining exterior and interior work was done by the group of dedicated museum volunteers.

Steve and Bronya Joanis, historical reenactors who present public programs all over southern New England, held a public demonstration on how apple cider was made around the turn of the 19th century.

The tavern usually holds three programs in the spring, and three programs in the fall/winter after the Harvest Fair on the town common; this was a great opportunity to bring the public in to see how far the little building has come in the past couple of years to kick-off the fall/winter

People driving by were able to look right through the first floor with no walls, so this was a great way to invite the public to see the newly renovated summer house. The event was well attended, and the crowd really enjoyed the program, with one attendee even interested in learning how to start making cider himself. It was really one of the most well received presentations in the past five

SPENCER — A Virtual Design Public Hearing will be hosted on the MassDOT Web site Tuesday, Nov. 18 at 5:30 p.m. to present the design for the proposed project in Spencer - East Brookfield.

The purpose of this hearing is to provide the public with the opportunity to become fully acquainted with the proposed project. All views and comments submitted in response to the hearing will be reviewed and considered to the maximum extent possible.

The proposed project consists of improvements along Route 9 and at the intersection of Route 9 and Route 49 in the Towns of East Brookfield and Spencer. The work involves construction of a cement concrete roundabout, improved bike and pedestrian accommodations, lighting, and upgrades to pavement, drainage, pavement markings, and signage. The proposed pedestrian accommodations consist of fivefoot-wide sidewalks along Route 9 and a shared use path at the roundabout. The proposed bicycle accommodations consist of fivefoot buffered bicycle lanes along Route 9 and a shared use path at the roundabout. Pedestrian and bicycle accommodations have been provided in accordance with applicable design guides.

A secure right-of-way is neces-

sary for this project. Acquisitions in fee and permanent or temporary easements may be required. The Commonwealth of Massachusetts is responsible for acquiring all needed rights in private or public lands. MassDOT's policy concerning land acquisitions will be presented in the hearing.

EDITORIAL

A season of small gratitudes

In towns like ours, November doesn't roar in with fireworks or fanfare. It arrives quietly, with the scrape of rakes on damp leaves and the scent of woodsmoke drifting down Main Street. It's a month of smaller moments — and perhaps that's what makes it the right time to talk about gratitude.

We're good at saying thank you on Thanksgiving Day. We carve the turkey, name our blessings, and think we've done our part. But the kind of gratitude that really matters doesn't fit neatly onto a holiday table. It shows up in the rhythm of ordinary weeks — in the volunteer firefighter answering another midnight call, in the coach spending a cold Saturday morning shouting encouragement from the sideline, in the library clerk who greets every patron by name.

These are the unnoticed threads that hold a town together. You won't find them mentioned in state reports or grant summaries, but without them, nothing quite works. When the snow hits, it's a neighbor who plows your driveway before you're awake. When illness comes, it's the church supper that fills your freezer with enough casseroles to last a month. Gratitude, in small towns, isn't an emotion. It's a way of doing business with one another.

We could use more of that these days. The news — local and beyond — can make it feel like kindness is losing ground. Budgets are strained. Tempers flare in public meetings. Some residents feel unseen, others unheard. But step back a little, and you'll notice the quiet counterweight: the people who persist in doing good work without applause.

This week, a retired teacher is tutoring kids at the library. A local shop owner is donating coats to the community cupboard. Scouts are stacking canned goods taller than themselves for the holiday food drive. These gestures don't make front-page headlines, but they are how decency renews itself.

November's short daylight has a way of testing everyone's patience. The chores don't end; the light fades early; and every errand seems to require one more layer of wool. Yet maybe this is when gratitude counts most. It doesn't demand a sunny mood — only attention. It's noticing the small kindnesses and refusing to treat them as small.

In Spencer and Leicester, in the Brookfields and Warren, our best days are built from that kind of attention. The shared table might be in a church basement, a senior center, or a neighbor's kitchen. What matters is the effort to keep showing up, to keep the lights on, to keep one another seen.

So before the full rush of the holidays sweeps in, it's worth taking stock. Not of what's missing or what's next, but of what's quietly working: the food pantry stocked for winter, the rescue volunteers still on call, the child's mitten clipped safely to her coat at the bus stop.

In a world eager for headlines, these are the quieter successes — and the kind that endure. Gratitude doesn't have to be grand. In towns like ours, it's the everyday way we say: we're still here, and we're still looking out for each other.

Giving to charity feels good but understanding the tax benefits can benefit both the charity and you. Whether you donate regularly or are planning your first gift, knowing how charitable tax deductions work can help you make informed decisions while supporting causes you care about. The basics: Itemizing vs. standard deduction. To benefit from charitable tax deductions, you need to itemize your deductions on your tax return. Everyone automatically receives a standard deduction, which in 2025 is \$31,500 for married couples filing jointly or \$15,750 for single filers. Yould only benefit from itemizing if your total deductions, including charitable gifts, exceed these amounts.

For many people, charitable donations alone won't push them over the standard deduction threshold. However, when combined with other deductible expenses like mortgage interest or state and local taxes, itemizing can make financial sense.

If you give regularly but don't usually exceed the standard deduction, consider "stacking" your donations. Instead of donating \$5,000 annually, you might donate \$15,750 in one year to exceed the itemization threshold, then take the standard deduction in subsequent years.

Ensure your donation qualifies. To claim a deduction, you must give to a qualified charitable organization recognized by the IRS. You can verify an organization's status on the IRS website or ask the charity for their determination letter. Donations to individuals, even those in need, don't qualify for tax deductions.

Additionally, you can't receive personal benefits in exchange for your donation. If you give \$500 to a charity but receive concert tickets worth \$200, your deductible amount is only \$300.

How much can you deduct? The IRS limits charitable deductions based on your adjusted gross income (AGI). For cash donations to public charities, you can typically deduct up to 60 percent of your AGI. If you donate stocks or other appreciated assets you've held for more than a year, the limit is generally 30 percent of your AGI.

If your donation exceeds these limits in a single year, you can carry forward the unused portion for up to five years.

What to donate. Think strategically about what you donate. While cash is easiest, donating appreciated stocks can provide additional tax benefits since you avoid paying capital gains taxes on the investment's growth.

Keep good records. Documentation matters. For donations under \$250, a canceled check or receipt works fine. Cash donations of \$250 or more need written acknowledgment from the charity. For larger non-cash donations of property exceeding \$5,000 in value, the IRS requires a qualified written appraisal. Keep these records with your tax documents in case the IRS requests proof. See IRS Publication No. 526 and No. 561 for information on charitable contributions and valuing donated property.

The bottom line: Charitable giving may start with your heart, but understanding the tax implications helps you give more effectively. Work with a tax professional and a financial advisor to develop a giving strategy that aligns with both your charitable goals and financial situation. With thoughtful planning, you can maximize both your impact on causes you care about and the tax benefits you receive.

It's been nearly a month and a half since my last auction news update, and there's a lot to report. I'll start by sharing news about a rare piece of Titanic memorabilia being auctioned in the United Kingdom.

Frederick Sutton, a 61-year-old first-class passenger from New Jersey, was lost at sea when the Titanic sank on April 14, 1912.

Some of his personal effects were recovered and given to his family. The family held them for over 100 years before deciding to now auction the memorabilia. Mr. Sutton's family received his belongings in a white canvas bag marked "46." It included a firstclass passenger list that had been damaged by the cold Atlantic waters after the tragic incident. The collection includes a note from Titanic's White Start Lines. Families of missing passengers were advised that they would have to pay for a first-class ticket to return deceased family members' bodies that were recovered. "This is callous in the extreme

but goes to illustrate how different the world was in 1912," the auctioneer said in the BBC article. The passenger list is estimated to bring £100,000 (\$131,350 U.S.).

A massive collection of memorabilia from the estate of colorful and eccentric Indianapolis Colts owner, Jim Irsay, will be sold in several auctions. Irsay had shared some of his collection with the public in 2023 when he offered free concerts to the public with the opportunity to view some historical and pop culture memorabilia. One of the stops on the tour was at Boston's TD Garden, where I was fortunate enough to see some of the rare artifacts. Items being auctioned include "an Apple II manual signed by Steve Jobs, Hunter S. Thompson's Red Shark convertible and



Jack Kerouac's original typewritten manuscript of "On the Road," according to the Indy Star.

A toilet might make an impact on the art world when it goes on the auction block later this month. Made of gold, the working sculpture was designed by Italian artist Maurizio Cattelan and is titled "America." It "was created with 101.2 kilograms (223 pounds) of gold," according to MSN. An identical one was stolen from England's Blenheim Palace in a brazen 2019 heist. Cattelan is the artist who sold "Comedian," a banana duct taped to a wall, for \$6.2 million last year.

No estimate for the toilet was provided, but the gold used is worth approximately \$10 million at current rates. The artist is hoping it bowls over bidders and brings much more though.

Life balance

We all want to move forward - to reach the goal, finish the book, launch the business, get in shape, fall in love, or become the person we know we could be. We all have dreams, and most of us don't lack the desire. What we lack is the willingness to act when the timing isn't perfect.

I'm all about maintaining a work-life balance, and boundaries are essential, but I sometimes think that it's not the world slowing us down — it's our own rules. The quiet, selfmade commandments we invent in the name of balance, boundaries, and selfcare. Rules like "I don't check emails after 5," or "I don't work weekends," or "I don't follow up twice with the same client." They sound healthy - responsible even — but sometimes they're invisible fences around our potential.

We build them to stay sane, but if left unchecked, they can also prevent us from going where we truly want to be in life.

A lot of these rules come from a good place. We've been burned before. We've felt the crash after burnout, the sting of rejection, the exhaustion of trying too hard. So we promise ourselves limits: never again, not after hours, not on Sundays. But what starts as protection can quietly become a kind of confinement. Sometimes growth begins exactly where discomfort starts.

Every ambitious person eventually faces a crossroads between their rules and their results. The people who go far — the ones we admire — aren't necessarily smarter or

luckier. They're

lishing world's "one book a year" rule. He wrote so fast that his publisher couldn't keep up, so he created a pseudonym-Richard Bachman-to release more. When readers discovered the truth, both names became bestsellers, and the rule was never

taken seriously again. Or take Jeff Bezos, who in Amazon's early days answered customer emails and support calls at 2 a.m., believing connection mattered more than sleep. That obsessive rule-breaking focus on customers became the DNA of one of the world's biggest companies.

Or Ed Sheeran, who played dozens of free or low-pay gigs in a single year, sleeping on couches and busking on street corners. Friends said he was devaluing his art - but those nights built the loyal fan base that later filled stadiums.

Or Elon Musk, who broke Silicon Valley's "focus on one thing" rule. While most founders were told to master one company at a time, he was building rockets, cars, and solar panels all at once.

Each one of them broke a rule that sounded smart but wasn't serving the dream.

I'm not suggesting that people should work 24/7, but I am saying that sometimes you need to work 24/7. Knowing when to be flexible with your work-life balance can change your

entire future. It's knowing the difference between a guardrail and a cage.

Discipline isn't always about sticking to the same schedule forever; sometimes the boundaries need to bend. The rules that once protected your peace can, at a different season of life, start protecting your comfort instead. And comfort is a silent thief of momentum.

Every ambitious person reaches a point where "balance" becomes an excuse. Where the rule that once made sense starts standing in the way, the truth is, you can't build an extraordinary life while staying entirely within ordinary limits.

Your next breakthrough may not require a new plan, a new mentor, or a new skill. It may require pushing past self-imposed boundaries.

Examine the rules you've established for yourself. Keep the ones that keep you healthy — the ones that let you rest, recover, and reconnect with life. But question the ones that keep you safe at the expense of your potential.

We all need balance, and progress isn't found in balance alone. It's found in the moments you lean just a little further than what feels comfortable - when you stay an extra hour, take the extra call, send the extra

You don't need to give up balance — just bend it in the direction of what matters most.



Create a succulent garden to use as a centerpiece for the table. A shallow container filled with a variety of succulents with different shapes and colors is sure to capture everyone's attention. Set the container on a saucer to protect the table and add a complementary table runner for even greater impact.

Consider using succulents as party favors for guests to take home and enjoy for years to come. But first, use them to decorate the table by making them into place cards for your guests. Simply add a name to the decorative pot.

Add a unique flair to the table by placing cocktail glasses filled with succulents next to each guest's place setting. Grow these plants in a cacti and succulent potting mix. These fast-draining mixes help reduce the risk of overwatering. Further reduce this risk by using containers with drainage holes that are only slightly larger than the succulents' root system. Growing them in too large of a container for the plant size will retain moisture longer that can lead to root rot, decline, and even the death of your plants.

After the party continue to provide proper care so your centerpiece will be ready for your next event. Move the succulent planter to a cool, draft-free location near an unobstructed

south-, west- or east-facing window. If light is limited, consider adding artificial lights.

Water thoroughly but only when the top few inches of soil are dry and just often enough to keep the plants from shriveling. These winter-growing conditions often encourage a spring display of colorful and unique flowers.

Share these directions with your guest and if possible, the name of the succulent. This helps your guest keep the plants alive to enjoy for years to come.

With a trip to your favorite garden center and your imagination you can create fun holiday décor and party favors. You and your guests will enjoy their beauty throughout the holidays and beyond.


