





## Caring for the caregivers close to home

In towns like Southbridge, Sturbridge and Charlton, we take pride in being self-reliant. We mow our own lawns, shovel our own driveways and show up when a neighbor needs a hand. It is part of the culture here.

But there is a quieter group among us who give far more than a hand. They give their time, their energy and often their peace of mind. They are the caregivers.

They are the daughter who drives from Charlton to Southbridge after work to check on an aging parent. The husband in Sturbridge learning to manage medications and appointments after a spouse's diagnosis. The grandparent stepping in to raise grandchildren when circumstances change. The adult child juggling full-time work and weekend visits to a rehabilitation facility.

Caregiving rarely comes with a title or a paycheck. It comes with responsibility, emotion and exhaustion.

As our region ages, more families are finding themselves in this role. According to state data, Massachusetts continues to see growth in its senior population, particularly those over 75. That reality touches every community, including our own.

Local resources exist. Senior centers in all three towns offer programs and support. Regional agencies on aging provide guidance on benefits and services. Faith communities and nonprofit groups step in with meals, transportation and companionship.

Yet caregiving often remains isolating.

Many caregivers hesitate to ask for help. They feel it is their duty. They worry about burdening others. Some are unaware of available services. Others assume that if they are "managing," they do not qualify for assistance.

We can do better by acknowledging that caregiving is not a private struggle to be endured silently. It is a community issue.

Town leaders can continue to ensure that information about elder services, respite programs and support groups is easy to find. Employers can recognize that flexible scheduling is not merely a perk but a practical necessity for many working caregivers. Neighbors can check in with more than a polite wave, offering a concrete gesture such as a prepared meal or a ride to an appointment.

And perhaps most important, we can shift the way we talk about caregiving. It is not a sign of weakness to need support. It is a sign of commitment to accept it.

Small towns have an advantage here. We are not anonymous. We see one another at the grocery store, at school events and on the sidelines of youth sports. That visibility can be an asset if we allow it to foster genuine connection rather than quiet observation.

We often celebrate milestones: ribbon cuttings, graduations, parades. Caregiving rarely earns applause. It happens behind closed doors.

But it deserves recognition.

Strong communities are measured not only by their tax base or new development but by how they care for their most vulnerable members and those who support them. If we truly value neighborliness, then we must extend it to the caregivers among us.

They are carrying more than we may realize.

And they should not have to carry it alone.

## What should you do with your tax refund?

It's almost time for people to begin receiving their tax refunds. If you get one, what will you do with it?

The answer will depend somewhat on the size of your refund. Last year, the average was \$3,167, according to the Internal Revenue Service's Filing Season Statistics report.

Whatever the size of your refund, you'll want to maximize its benefit. Here are some suggestions:

- Contribute to your IRA. If you receive \$3,167, it could go a long way toward funding your IRA for the year, but any amount would help. You have until April 15 to contribute for the 2025 tax year, but if you've already "maxed out" contributions, you could use your refund for 2026, when the annual contribution limit for an IRA is \$7,500, or \$8,600 if you're 50 or older. Beginning early toward fully funding your IRA can help reduce the pressure of coming up with large amounts later.

- Build an emergency fund. Your tax refund could help you start or expand an emergency fund. It's a good idea to keep three to six months' worth of living expenses in such a fund, with the money kept in a liquid, low-risk account, separate from the funds you use for your daily expenses. You might need to draw on this fund for unexpected expenses, such as a major home or car repair or a large medical bill. Without an emergency fund in place, you might be tempted to dip into your IRA or other retirement accounts to pay for these types of costs, and that could be expensive, resulting in taxes, penalties and lost opportunities for growth.

- Contribute to a 529 plan. If you have children or grandchildren and want to support their education, you might consider investing in a 529 education savings plan. Earnings and withdrawals are federally tax free, provided the money is used for qualified education expenses. Your 529 plan may provide state tax benefits, too. (It's possible, though, that 529 withdrawals could affect financial aid packages, depending on who owns the account.) A 529 plan can be used to help pay for college, accredited trade school programs, some K-12 expenses and even some student loans.

- Pay down debts. You may wish you could reduce your debt load. Your tax refund could offer you that chance. But which debts should you tackle first? You could follow the "snowball" method by paying off the smallest of your loans or debts as quickly as possible. Or you could choose the "avalanche" route by making minimum payments on all debts and using extra funds — such as your tax refund — to pay off those with the highest interest rates. Either method could help you save money in the long term.

- Prepare for other tax obligations. Your refund can also be set aside in a separate savings account to pay estimated quarterly taxes or personal property or real estate taxes.

It's not often that you receive a financial windfall such as a tax refund — so think carefully about how you can maximize its benefits.

## The quiet confidence of knowing your way

There is a certain kind of confidence that does not announce itself.

It does not come with raised voices or bold claims. It does not rush to prove anything. You notice it most often in people who know exactly where they are, even if they could not explain how they got there.

I think about this whenever I see someone navigate a place they have known for years without hesitation. They take the right turn without thinking. They park instinctively in the same spot they always have. They greet someone by name, even if they have not seen them in a while.

None of it is flashy. All of it is earned.

In small towns, this kind of confidence used to be common. You learned it slowly. You figured out which roads flooded after a hard rain, which shortcuts were worth taking, and which were not. You knew where the sun hit the sidewalk in winter and which side of the street stayed cooler in summer.

That knowledge lived quietly in the body. It did not require a screen or an update. It came from repetition, observation, and time.

Now, many of us rely on directions for even familiar trips. We check schedules we already know. We second-guess routes we have taken for years. There is nothing wrong with that, but something subtle changes when we stop trusting our own sense of place.

I do not miss getting lost. I do miss the confidence that comes from not needing constant confirmation.

There was a time when knowing your way meant more than geography. It meant knowing when to speak and when

to wait. Knowing which questions mattered and which ones could sit unanswered. Knowing that not every problem required immediate action.

You still see this kind of assurance in certain people. Often, they are older, but not always. They move through a room without urgency. They listen more than they talk. When they do speak, it is usually measured, and often helpful.

They are not slow. They are steady.

That steadiness is something our towns quietly depend on. It shows up in long-serving clerks, familiar faces at local counters,

and neighbors who seem to understand how things work without needing to explain themselves.

They remind us that experience does not need to be valuable.

I catch myself trying to relearn some of that confidence. Leaving the phone in my pocket. Trusting memory instead of prompts. Letting familiarity do its work without checking to see if it is still correct.

Sometimes it is. Sometimes it is not. But the act of trusting it again feels important.

In a world that constantly asks us to verify, update, and refresh, there is something grounding about knowing your way well enough to move forward without asking permission.

That quiet confidence does not draw attention. It does not need to.

Like so many good things along Main Street, it is simply there, doing its work, steady as ever.






