Residents object to gas plant plan

CHARLTON – Dozens of residents spoke out against a proposed giant liquid natural gas storage facility being proposed for land on Route 169, just south of Millenium Power, at last Wednesday's public hearing restarting the state's review process.

Among the biggest concerns were safety, traffic, the fact some boards (including the Board of Health) had not received official notification of the project, although others had. Also riling several people was the fact NEC, the corporation proposing it, had filed requests to be exempted from all local zoning.

New Selectman Bill Borowski, speaking as a citizen, said the latter was "difficult to justify to many people ... that an enormous

facility can petition the state for something that is wildly outside of our zoning." Others noted that's why zoning exists – to keep things out town residents don't want.

"Zoning bylaws tend not to fit real squarely with a lot of energy facilities" or federal and state rules for them, said James Avery, NEC's lawyer. He claimed "if we had to comply with the zoning bylaw, they would not be as safe," and expressed willingness to confer with town boards "informal-ly"."

Zoning Board Chair Frank Lombardi said NEC did reach out to his board, which is "not necessarily opposed to the project."

Specifically, the plans – which NEC did not even show in public, although they had done so during the previous public hearing in November – call for taking natural gas off the interstate pipeline that runs through town, chilling it to about -260 degrees and concentrating it about 600 times into one 2-million-gallon "internal thermos tank" to store it for times of high demand, NEC partner Matt Taylor said. It would be shipped by truck to various places, mostly via Route 20 and the Pike to the Boston area, with some going north and west.

When first proposed last fall, the plan was to build ten 100,000-gallon tanks, with NEC's preferred site being off Route 20 near the Sturbridge line. But that property had significant wetlands issues, although some residents last week said they felt it would be safer than the current site.

Local parents to raise funds for baseball field

CHARLTON – A group of parents from the Dudley-Charlton Regional School District are stepping up to bring a much needed update to the baseball facilities at Shepherd Hill Regional High School.

With the blessing of the School Committee, principal and booster club, a group of parents whose children play softball and baseball for the high school will be seeking support through fundraising efforts to pay for an estimated \$100,000 in upgrades needed to the facilities in an attempt to take the pressure off the district which is already dealing with a tight budget situation. Parent Kristin Kustigian sought the blessing of the School Committee in late May saying that she and other parents have been made aware of the unfortunate condition of the aging baseball fields and want to help whatever way they can.

"I learned from the athletic director that the fields are 45 years old and there's minimal drainage under there," Kustigian said. "Baseball and softball primetime is April and May. They need to have a playable field if you want to have a good program."

The policy of the School Committee is that all fundraising programs go through them as the finances can't be expended through the fundraising entity. The group will raise the money and donate the funds to the booster club who will handle the money from there through the School Committee's authority.

Shepherd Hill Principal William Chaplin said the effort will be of great help to the Shepherd Hill community and there are big plans for that money if and when the goal is reached.

"It needs draining and it needs grating. All that land up there is fill and it all acts like a sponge," Chaplin said. "You're going to need a fence and if there's money left over a scoreboard."

With the School Committee's full endorsement, the parents group will now plan exactly how they will go about raising awareness and support for the effort to bring new life to an aging sports field for future generations to learn the art of America's favorite pastime.

Audit planned of selectmen and planning board

CHARLTON – Following up a recent proposal in April, the Charlton Board of Selectmen is officially moving forward with an audit with the intent of clearing the air of any potential wrongdoing or abuse of power within the town hall or



Local students graduate from Assumption College

635 graduates received a degree during Assumption College's 102nd Commencement exercises on Sunday, May 12, held at the DCU Center in downtown Worcester.

Christine Dylewicz, of Charlton Jessica FitzGerald, of Uxbridge Erin Wilbur, of Charlton

The Commencement speaker, Robert Lewis Jr., chief executive officer of The BASE, a Boston-based nonprofit that provides athletic, education and career-building resources to enable student-athletes to pursue a college degree, shared his life story of struggle and



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achievement and inspired the Class of 2019 to live a life of meaning.

In her introduction of Lewis, Julia Demkowicz '19, salutatorian, shared of his tireless passion for empowering inner-city youth, specifically his efforts to break down the stereotypes of urban

"Robert Lewis may not have had a lot growing up as a child of teenage parents who lived in public housing, but he did have love and the mindset that he could be successful despite any limitations society tried to place on him," shared Demkowicz. "He grew up with a longing to share this message with others in similar situations. After reviewing a report on poverty that showed that Black and Latino men were disadvantaged in many ways, including lower graduation rates and higher incarceration rates, Lewis was determined to change this narrative by launching The BASE in 2013."

Assumption was one of the first institutions of higher education to partner with The BASE, providing scholarships and other opportunities to individuals in the program. Thus far, 11 The BASE students have attended Assumption; two graduated in 2018; four others are among the Class of 2019; five more will continue their studies next year. Nationwide, The BASE serves 1,400 individuals.

"The BASE provides educational, athletic, and career-building resources to enable students to pursue college degrees," explained Demkowicz. "All of these students enter the program through word of mouth and social media, a testament to the power of the program's message. The BASE builds on the students' passion for sports, including baseball, softball, and, most recently, basketball. The program gives them a sense of belonging and also provides academic resources, such as homework support, writing workshops, SAT prep classes, and college and career visits.'

Lewis shared that through The BASE,

to obtain a college degree, but also to change hearts and minds.

"I started The BASE because I wanted to shift the narrative," explained Lewis. "Urban talent is American talent. When you look at me, what do you see? Your future. You see the next generation of a workforce. Don't call us at-risk. Don't call us underserved. Don't call us disadvantaged. What you might call us are college graduates. And that's what we're doing.

Following an incident in which his house was firebombed when he was 16, Lewis "knew at that moment that I was going to do something good for humanity." Later in life, he would collaborate with Nelson Mandela in South Africa to build a national service model. He also advised British Prime Minister David Cameron during a period of unrest in the United Kingdom in 2011 and served as an advisor to the nation of Haiti following an earthquake there. On Mother's Day, Lewis shared with graduates the limitless potential of their future, especially when supported by a mother's love.

"Nelson Mandela, David Cameron and Haiti," Lewis pondered. "Who would have thought that a person born to a mom at 18 with a fourth-grade education that those opportunities could come? She did. And that's what you have graduates, when you look around and you see your parents. They see your future, and it's bright."

"As I look out into this crowd today, what I see is a kaleidoscope of beautiful people filled with promise and hope,' shared Lewis. "You represent what is great in our country right now and for generations to come. I am inspired by you and I know your families are so proud of you."

Lewis also expressed his gratitude to Assumption College President Francesco C. Cesareo, Ph.D. for his support of The BASE program.

"President Cesareo, your belief in The BASE and our organizationis changing the game for urban young people throughout the country," shared Lewis. "I want our student-athletes from The BASE Boston, BASE Chicago, BASE Indianapolis and Pittsburgh to experience this wonderful institution and they will."

In closing, Lewis called upon the Class of 2019 to make a difference in the lives of others.

"Be impactful, every day," Lewis concluded. "Influence others to greatness and lead with your soul. The future will be shared by those willing to commit their minds and bodies to the task.'

In addition to delivering the Commencement address, Lewis received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters. An honorary degree was also conferred upon Sr. Anne Credidio, B.V.M., who raised funds to rehabilitate

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

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

The food pantries are in need of all kinds of food but

there are some foods and personal items that they don't normally receive from the food bank. These include crackers, canned spaghetti and ravioli, macaroni & cheese, jelly,

Hamburger and Tuna Helper, soups, beef stew, coffee, tea, fruit juices, instant potatoes, condiments like ketchup, relish, mustard and mayonnaise, toothpaste, toilet tissue, bath

soap and shampoo.

The high cost of food, together with the rising cost of utilities, rent and other living expenses, has made it harder for struggling families;

even the recent government shutdown caused hardships for people that one would not think would use a food pantry.

It means many people have tough decisions to make: buying food or paying the rent, the utilities, the car repairs and other costs. Seniors, most of them living on fixed incomes, often have to choose between buying food and buying medication.

One of the fastest growing programs at the St. John Paul II pantry is the senior supplement program, which currently runs senior programs three times a month. In 2009, the average number of seniors coming to the food pantry each month was 12. A year later, when the Senior Supplement Program was launched, the average was about 50 each month. Today, that number has climbed to about 150 each

With the help of about 70 volunteers, the food pantry serves about 350 families of about 1,000 people each month. The pantry is open every Tuesday between 3 and 5 p.m. and every Thursday from 9:30-11 a.m. The Senior Supplement program is open beginning at 9:30 a.m. on the second, third and fourth Wednesday of each month.

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





much of the truck traffic to/ from the site, which partner Boris Brevnov said would amount to 12-14 trucks per day. The facility operates 24 hours a day most of the time, and trucks would mostly arrive/ depart by daylight, he said. He tried to assuage people's concerns about tank size by noting Millennium Power has one for oil that's 1.4 million gallons and has been there for decades.

To potential neighbor Mary Beth Czaja, whose family runs North American Tool & Machine Corp., the truck number seemed dubious, since she recalled Brevnov had said the smaller facility from last fall would get 12-24 trucks per day. She was also concerned that building there would require blasting (something Brevnov denied, saying "geotechnical and seismic testing are not required" at this stage), since that hillside is mostly ledge. Were that to happen, she said it would disrupt her business,

and she was also concerned about potential water problems after the landfill-related con-

tamination issues. To clarify, NEC actually has two potential sites on Route 169, nearly next to each other. The preferred site is on the hillside behind a few small businesses with access directly from 169; the other is off Sherwood Lane, closer to Millennium. Both would require building additional pipelines to tap the Tennessee Gas line, either across 169 and Cady Brook eastward or along it northward.

Several people noted both roads face heavy traffic, especially when the Pike has problems, and Route 20 has seen numerous accidents over the years. Some were more afraid of disaster, noting natural gas is explosive.

"Would you guys love to see that in your front window?" Scott Lamica said. "If it blows up, what do I say to my kids? 'Goodbye?' What kind of warning do we have?"

Joe Lawendowski agreed, saying that much natural gas

would be roughly equal to three Hiroshima bombs were it to explode. He said at least 18 nearby homes and four businesses are "in such great danger," cited various news reports of gas explosions, and dubbed the proposal "absolutely absurd."

Were his comparison to hold true, the Nukemap website (https://nuclearsecrecy. com/nukemap/) shows a huge damage area. Light damage broken windows and many injuries – would reach to downtown Southbridge, Route 49 and Route 31; medium damage "most residential buildings" collapse, injuries are universal, fatalities widespread" - to Prindle Pond, the airport, and Vinton Street; and heavy damage - "concrete buildings are severely damaged or demolished" with nearly 100 percent death toll - from Brookside Road to Millennium itself (which is also a natural gas

thing that cannot be replaced by money," said Southbridge resident John Pulawski, who urged the Siting Board to remember that smaller towns don't have the resources to adequately deal with the issues and provide proper oversight to such facilities.

'I feel like I'm in the Twilight Zone," Julie Dowen agreed. "... This idea is insane.'

Among other things, she said it needs a traffic study that accounts for school buses. She noted the town is already dealing with issues from the landfill and Exxon's MTBE leaks, and observed (as did others) that the 2011 tornado passed near that site, as did Hurricane Diane, which sparked the massive 1955 flood.

"Yes, heat's important, but it's not more important than our properties, our homes, our life," she said.

For some, the project was contrary to what society should be doing to deal with climate change and would be using fracked gas, with its long list of environmental and health issues.

"This is like putting a saddle factory in in 1930. We're not going to be using natural gas." said Sturbridge's Kirstie Pecci. "... Shame on you for expanding a system that is literally setting the world on fire."

Brevnov argued it wasn't adding to the system but "displacing oil," which has higher emissions.

"There's no magic bullet, no silver lining," he said. "None of energy is safe if it's not handled safely.'

The Siting Board's process will include a few months of discovery, then evidentiary hearings in the fall, with both being conducted in Boston. The deadline to submit petitions to be considered an intervenor or limited participant is June 12, with such requests to be emailed to both hearing officer Kathryn Sedor - kathryn.sedor@state.ma.us - and NEC's attorney James Avery javery@pierceatwood.com.

initiative while the Planning Board voted against it. Part of the frustration from citizens stemmed from an alleged lack of communication with abutters as selectmen debated a host agreement in executive session before going to the public. Citizens protested the project and eventually the Planning Board voted not to allows permits leading to infighting within the town hall and between the boards. This has also led to a very public battle between Planning Board Chair Patricia Rydlak and Town Administrator Robin Craver as well as battles in court between Valley Green Grow and the town. All of this has created division in the Charlton community a well with many voicing outrage towards selectmen and other applauding the town's highest board for sup-

Earlier in the Board of Selectmen meeting on May 21 selectmen also discussed an investigation into emails to determine in Rydlak had been accused of recording a private Land Court hearing by a town official which led to accusations and threat of lawsuits by Valley Green Grow. Singer's proposal however was geared towards a larger scale examination of the practices between the two boards and within town offices to bring any wrongdoing from either board to the table.

"I think that it's important that we show everyone who lives in this town that the Board of Selectmen are honest, hardworking people who care for nothing more than the best for this town and the people who live here and that the best way to ensure that they know that we are going to treat everyone with the absolute utmost fairness and impartiality, no witch hunts and no favoritism, everyone is treated the same, is to shine the brightest lights on the darkest corners of this building," Singer said adding that the auditors should have access to emails, recorded video and anything else pertinent to the investigation. "They should be looking for town issues that were being dealt with on private email servers off of the town email servers, ethics violations, anything at all that the auditor finds or discovers during the audit between our two boards should also be brought forth and reported on."

Selectmen voted unanimously to allow for the audit with the board's newest members, Bill Borowski, wholeheartedly backing the proposal implying that if there's nothing to hide then there's nothing to be concerned about.

"Best case scenario, which is what

I'm hoping for, nothing is found. Then it puts to rest everything. However, let's be honest, there have been issues over the past year and there may be recommendations to say that this is a better way for multiple boards to work together or communicate or have issue resolution. Either way, the more we can put sunlight on this I'm all in,' Borowski said.

Town Administrator Robin Craver suggested that the Board of Selectmen reach out to Town Counsel for a recommendation into how an auditor should be chosen in order to keep her office out of the selection process as the investigation will also considering actions and communications from the town administrator. She also guaranteed that the auditors will have full access to any resources they need to complete the job.

Sleep

That email that just irked

The text that made you see red and hit "reply" almost before you realized you'd done it...

The stupid, hurtful or thoughtless remark someone tossed your way in a conversation that made you instantly upset...

These things require an immediate response, don't they? Are we supposed to let someone email/text/say things like that and not react to them??

Maybe not. Maybe there is value in not replying right away. It goes against what our "instant" 21st century lifestyle professes, which is that fastest is best: fastest Internet speed; fastest-moving line at the grocery store; fastest roller coaster; quickest and best come-back remark. It's all about being instantaneous.

But perhaps we need to learn to practice the pause...the deliberate rest before reacting. An angry emailed reply can't be un-sent, and the contents can't be un-viewed. Same for a hastily-sent text, or an equally bitter comment tossed back to the person who insulted you first. It's not about not defending ourselves, or about letting things roll off our backs. It's about waiting to react.

There's a very convincing school of thought that counsels sleeping on any big decision before making it. That can apply to small things too. The email from a coworker or client that rubbed you the wrong way might look a little different by the next morning. Maybe there was no harm meant, and you interpreted it wrong. Maybe it was an unfair complaint or personal remark against you, but in waiting to reply, you strengthen your position as the more even-tempered and reasonable person. Perhaps the sender of the nasty text also had time to reconsider, and now has the chance to apologize. In pausing before reacting, you allow those possibilities to happen.

While reacting hastily and immediately can feel great at the time, it can't be undone. Waiting a while - sleeping on it - can never hurt.

Never react because you think you must. Other than breathing, just about anything can wait one

Healthy BBQ Tips

It's officially BBQ Season and this time of year grilled suppers make for highly anticipated outdoor mealtimes - and the excitement applies even if you've vowed to eat healthy! All it takes is a little creativity to re-vamp traditional barbecue foods into healthier offerings.

Read on prep ideas, recipes, and culinary tips sure to make grilling not only healthy, but the best of the season!

The most simple and cost effective way to ramp up the flavor of healthy cuts of meats, fish and poultry is to prep grilling foods to boost optimum flavor. Below are some pre-cooking strategies that add a healthy dose of deliciousness!

*Brine: Lean cuts of meat don't have to translate into less taste! Preparing meat and poultry with a brine preparation plumps up the foods while infusing tons of flavor. Brining, which is basically a salt water bath, can elevate dry, lean cuts to rich gourmet status. While many types of brine employ large doses of salt and sugar, the following recipe from Cook's Illustrated "Basics of Brining" offers a healthier alternative. This brine recipe is ideal for high heat grilling:

Use one quart cold water per pound of food. Add two tablespoons table salt or three tbsp Morton Kosher salt, and two tablespoons sugar. Meat or poultry should brine (refrigerated) in the solution for one hour per pound, but not less than a half hour or more than eight hours.

Note: The addition of garlic cloves, peppercorns, herbs, and/or citrus peel offer additional flavor without added fat or cal-

*Marinade: Marinades are typically comprised of an acid, oil and spices. Marinating lean cuts of meat not only adds flavor, but the acids serve as a natural meat tenderizer. In addition, it's been proven marinade helps protect meat from cancer causing compounds caused by cooking at high heat (HCAs) and by smoking fat drippings (PAH).

Sans the sugar and light on salt, this mustard based marinade rivals the best of them: Mix together two cloves garlic, crushed; one cup balsamic vinegar; 1/2 cup Dijon or other dark, quality mustard; 1/4 cup virgin olive oil;1/2 teaspoon pepper ; 1/4 teaspoon sea salt. Marinade for an hour or more in the refrigerator.

Note: Overnight marinating can reduce cooking time by up to 35%!

*Spice Rub: With a high flavor factor and low carb and calorie count, spice rubs are healthy, delicious alternatives to rich meat sauces. Both novice and veteran grillers often experiment with herbs to develop a "signature" all purpose rub that can be used with a variety of meats and poultry. This basic all purpose rub (for beef, pork, poultry or fish) uses common pantry spices: Mix together 3/4 cup paprika; 1/4 cup freshly ground black pepper; 1/4 cup coarse salt; 1/4 cup sugar; 2 tablespoons each chili powder, garlic powder, and onion powder; two teaspoons cayenne pepper. Rub dry spice mixture generously on meat before grilling.

Note: This recipe makes two cups and can be adjusted for smaller portions.

cups beef or chicken stock; 2 tbsp apple cider vinegar; 1 packet (to taste) of Stevia sweetener.

Directions: Sauté onion in butter. Add all

other ingredients. Bring to a boil and simmer for 15-20 minutes, until sauce thickens.

*Always trim fat off steaks and chops before grilling. Use a brine or marinade to ensure a moist and flavorful cut (see recipes above).

*Substitute a slathering of fresh avocado for cheese and/or mayo on a grilled turkey

*Marinate large slices of summer squash, zucchini, peppers, eggplant and the like, and toss them on the grill for a tasty veggie

*Spice up all your grilled foods without adding calories, fat or sodium with this no salt spice recipe from Dr. Oz: Mix together 1/3 cup each garlic powder, onion powder, and oregano; 2 tbsp thyme'1 tbsp parsley flakes; 1 tsp ground pepper

*Grilled fruits are a scrumptious, diet-friendly dessert as they are. Or, top the caramelized fruit with scoop of sorbet or sugar free ice cream. Firm fruits such as pineapples, apples and pears are best fruits for grilling; bananas, peaches and mangos also work well but need extra attention to prevent them from becoming mushy. To keep fruits from drying out, cut fruit in half (remove any seeds but leave skin on to keep its shape) and soak in cold water with a little lemon juice for 15-30 minutes before grilling. Spray a clean grate with non stick cooking oil to prevent sticking.

Fun Fact: Did you ever wonder where the word "barbecue" comes from? The origin has an intriguing explanation. Some sources claim it comes from the French phrase "barbe a queue" which translates into "from whiskers to tail." The reference recalls the longtime tradition of cooking an animal on an open fire, thus roasting the entire carcass from whiskers to tail!

think about: sales, marketing, employees, competition, industry trends, consumer preferences – the list goes on and on. It's easy to get so caught up in your work that you might not take time to think about retirement. 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Cool, refreshing and straight from the garden – Mint



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Add a bit of cool flavor to your beverages and meals this summer with homegrown mint. Try using peppermint leaves in fruit cocktails and ice cream. Add spearmint to your tea or use the leaves to season lamb and jelly. Or try chocolate mint for a unique sweet and refreshing flavor in desserts and drinks.

This vigorous plant is easy to grow and suited to container gardens. In fact, growing it in a pot will help keep this vigorous herb contained. Or sink a container of mint in the garden or plant where surrounding walks and walls will keep this vigorous plant contained.

Grow mint in a full sun to partial shade location with moist well-drained soil. Mulch the soil to conserve moisture. Though hardy in zones 3 to 11, you will need to provide a bit of winter protection when growing mint in containers in colder regions. Either sink the container in a vacant spot in the garden or move the planter into an unheated garage.

Water thoroughly whenever the soil is thawed and dry.

Harvest the leaves as needed. Cutting leafy stems off the plant just above a healthy leaf or bud will encourage compact tidy growth. Pick mint just before flowering for the most intense flavor.

Include a container of mint in your patio, balcony or deck plantings. Keeping it close to the kitchen and outdoor living space will make it easy for you to harvest and use. Plus, your guests will enjoy plucking a few fresh mint leaves to add to their iced tea, mojito or favorite summer beverage or salad.

Not only does this easy to grow herb add flavor, but it also aids digestion. Add a garnish of mint to dress up dessert plates or provide it to a loved

The month of May & June has numerous wildlife bringing their young into the world, as this week's picture shows a mother goose with four of her recently born Canada geese at the Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club. Many members enjoy feeding

the birds daily, and provide some great entertainment when another goose tries to interfere with the young birds feeding

Wild Turkeys are also being observed with their clutches of young birds. Some hen Turkeys have been observed with as many as 12 or more young birds. Although not all of the young birds will survive, many will. Predators like fox, fisher cat, hawks and owls to mention a few are sure to take their toll on the newborn.

Deer are also having their young, and will do so all this month with some being born in June. The deer population in Mass. has been strong, and continues to grow annually despite their loss of habitat, due mostly to construction. The deer have adapted to living among humans, and have become a nuisance for residents trying to grow a small backyard garden. One local resident observed a couple of deer feeding in his strawberry patch. As the local back yard gardens start to grow, the deer will sure be back to feed on the fresh young plants.

Keeping deer out of a garden is not easy, and even an eight or ten foot fence will not deter them from jumping over them to feed on the fresh vegetation.

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Keeping backyard feeders full of food for numerous species of birds can become expensive if you do not have some type of control on chipmunks and squirrels. Hummingbirds are back big time with as many as a half dozen of them flocking to the feeders

er at one time. My wife Judy enjoyed watching them fly in and out of the feeders daily, before she lost her battle with cancer recently.

Trout fishing remains strong on local lakes and ponds & bass fishing can not get much better. One of the valleys hot spots is Lackey Pond in Sutton and Whitinsville. Sense the restoration of the Dam a number of years ago, largemouth bass populations have exploded and it is common to catch a four-pound bass daily at the site. One angler also caught a calico bass and a pickerel at the site. Because the river was heavily polluted back in the '50's -'70's, it is not recommended eating the fish from the area. Catch & release should be practiced. There is a small boat ramp at the dam, that is accessible to small boats, canoes & kayaks. Small motors are allowed. Give it a try.

Stripers are starting to show in big numbers in both Mass. & Rhode Island. Fluke fishing is also picking up along with some impressive seabass.

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


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Runs add up for Rams while dealing Blackstone Valley Tech its first loss of season

UPTON — The Shepherd Hill Regional varsity softball team pounded out 14 hits — six for extra bases, including a pair of home runs — and dropped Blackstone Valley Tech (BVT) from the ranks of the undefeated, beating the Beavers, 14-9, on Friday, May 31.

With the win the Central Mass. Division 1 Tournament-bound Rams improved to 14-5. The loss for BVT, in its final regular-season game, was the first of the season. The 19-1 Beavers will enter the Central Mass. Division 2 Tournament as one of the top seeds.

Shepherd Hill led, 3-2, after the first inning, 6-2 after the second, 7-2 after the third, 8-2 after the fourth and 13-2 heading into the bottom of the fifth inning.

We've been hitting the ball really well lately. We got some runs early and then held on for dear life," Rams' head

coach John Snyder said, alluding to the fact that the Beavers scored seven runs in the final three innings. "That's a good team. They were undefeated for a reason. They can hit the ball. They put a lot of pressure on our defense and we didn't react the way we wanted to at times, but we made the plays when we

Shepherd Hill's offensive attack was led by junior Parker Filo-Loos, who had four hits, including a double, and three RBI. Cayley Fagan also had four hits, including a triple, and an RBI. Sophomore Sam Zannotti was 3-for-5 with a double and a home run, while junior Kelly Cournoyer was 2-for-3 with a bases loaded double (three RBI) and two walks. Junior Kiley Wong-Li also homered in the game.

"Parker is continuing to hit really well; she's been a hitting machine the last four or five games," Snyder said.

Cournoyer's fifth-inning bases clearing double to center field put the Rams ahead, 13-2.

"Hitting is infectious and I think our bench has a lot to do with it. Everyone was really rallying together and getting hits and that momentum carried through to me and allowed me to get my hit, too," Cournoyer said. "Our bench is great. Once the first person gets a hit we all get rowdy and then the second person gets a hit and we get louder and it makes you want to do anything you can to help your team.

"I feel the way the bench is cheering me on definitely gives me more confidence and more focus when I'm at the plate," Cournoyer added. "We knew they were a good team and that we needed to hit to have a chance and we were able to hit today.

In addition to her solid day at the plate, Fagan was gritty and gutsy facing an explosive BVT lineup. The senior was up to the task, however, recording five strikeouts, two coming in the seventh inning to close out the game.

"Coming in knowing they were 19-0 was definitely intimidating, especially because they pound the ball; they have girls that can really hit," Fagan said. "My defense made a lot of plays behind me. Playing a team like that, that's coming in undefeated, makes us want to win more. I played with some of these girls in travel ball so I knew how well they could hit and I knew I would have to stay around the plate and try not to throw anything down the middle."

The Beavers, who finished with 11 hits, were led by senior Alyssa Clark, who singled, homered and drove in four runs. Also having two-hit games were freshman Emma Ballard, sophomore Abby Behrikis and senior Megan

Behrikis and junior Hallie Arpin each drove in two runs.

We didn't play well early. We made four errors in the first two innings. You can't win like that," BVT head coach Peter Cardoza said. "It was an uncharacteristic start to the game for us and the hole was too big for us to dig out of. We'll be fine going forward.'

While the loss was disappointing, to be sure, Cardoza said he believed it won't have any effect on the Beavers' chances to win the Division 2 title.

"This game, in the end, is meaningless," Cardoza said. "It won't affect our seeding. We're the only team in Division 2 with one loss. Everyone else has two or more. This won't affect anything; it's a meaningless game. If we're going to play bad, this is a good game to do so to get it out of our system. We haven't played poorly all year. It's tough to go through a whole season without having a bad game. And, in the end, we still battled back, we still scored a bunch of runs.

The bulk of the grapes are brought in from Italy, California and South America. They are mostly known for their "off dry" fruit wines. blends and unusual 100% fruit or vegetable

wines like Pumpkin, Beet and Rhubarb to name a few. New favorites include their red wines and white wines aged in American White Oak.
