Hitchcock hosts series of Saturday night sound therapy sessions

Sound therapy utilizes aspects of music, tones, and notes to improve one's physical, emotional, and mental health. Healing with sound dates back to ancient Greece when it was used to treat mental disorders. Throughout history, music has been used in many ways — to boost morale, promote productivity, and support healing. The healing powers of sound are vast and mostly untapped in today's society.

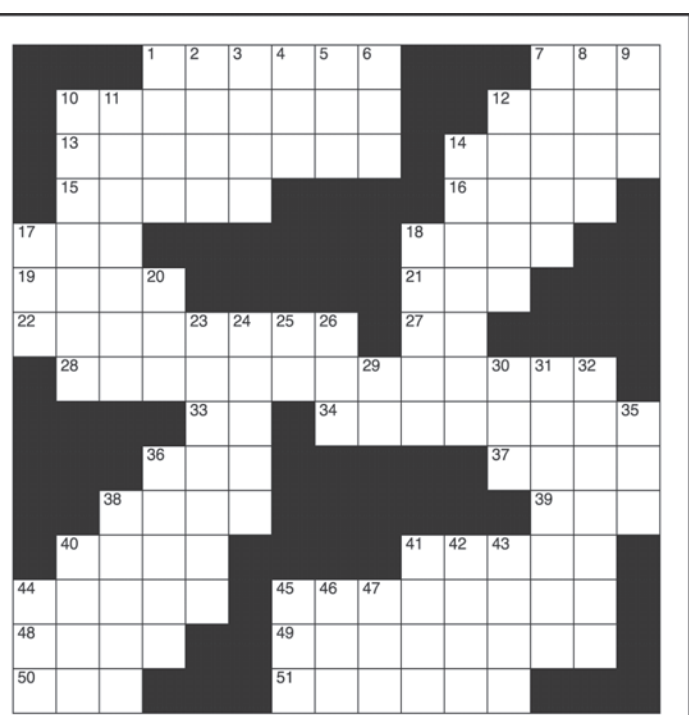

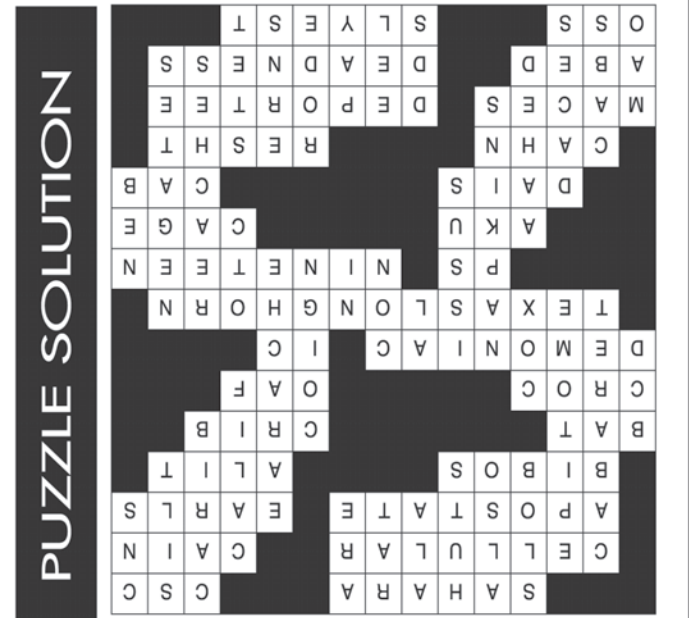

Charlton resident Bridget McGonagle completes intensive research project

WORCESTER — Bridget McGonagle, a member of the class of 2027 majoring in Chemical Engineering at Worces-ter Polytechnic Institute (WPI), was a member of a student team that recently completed a professional-level research-driven project titled Framework for a Volunteer Coordination and Training Portal.

Tantasqua Regional and Union 61 School Districts are committed to identifying children before their third birthday to provide early intervention services for three- and four-year-olds with disabilities. If you have questions or concerns about a child’s development and would like the child screened, please contact the Office of Special Education.

If you suspect that the child may need an evaluation to determine eligibility for special education services, a parent, any person in a caregiving position, or any person in a professional position who is working with that child may request an evaluation, at no cost, through the Office of Special Education.

Investing in Southbridge's young people pays dividends

A fire sprinkler system is not the sort of project that usually captures much public attention.

There is nothing particularly glamorous about pipes, valves and sprinkler heads. Yet in the case of Our Bright Future's planned Southbridge Innovation Hub, that infrastructure represents something considerably larger: the difference between owning a building and being able to fill it with young people, educational opportunities and possibilities for the future.

That is why the \$125,000 Activation Fund grant awarded to Our Bright Future by the Health Foundation of Central Massachusetts is particularly encouraging news for Southbridge.

The money will help install the required sprinkler system in the organization's newly purchased Innovation Hub, clearing the way for a centralized youth development and educational center expected to serve as many as 1,000 students annually.

Those students will have access to STEM education, workforce development, social-emotional learning and other community programming.

There is an important lesson here about what constitutes an investment in public health.

Health is often discussed primarily in terms of hospitals, doctors, medications and access to medical care. Those things are obviously essential. But the circumstances surrounding people long before they enter a doctor's office matter enormously as well.

Does a child have a safe place to go after school? Does a teenager have an opportunity to develop useful skills? Can a young person meet adults who can introduce them to career possibilities they might never otherwise encounter? Are students given opportunities to build confidence, relationships and a sense that they have a future worth working toward?

Those questions belong in conversations about community health, too.

The Health Foundation's latest round of grants recognizes that broader reality. More than \$1 million is being distributed among 10 nonprofit organizations addressing behavioral health, food access, housing stability, youth opportunities and other factors affecting people's well-being. Our Bright Future's project brings that philosophy directly to Southbridge.

The Innovation Hub also represents the kind of community development that can have effects well beyond the walls of one building. Programs introducing students to science, technology and workforce skills can help create connections between education and employment. Young people who discover an interest or aptitude today may become tomorrow's technicians, entrepreneurs, health care workers, tradespeople or business owners.

For a community such as Southbridge, creating those pathways matters. It is particularly valuable when opportunities are available close to home. Not every family can regularly transport children to programs in Worcester or elsewhere. A strong local institution makes participation more practical while giving young people another place within their own community where they can learn, belong and succeed.

There is also something worth recognizing about the nature of this particular grant. Sometimes an organization has the vision, the building and the programming, but a decidedly unexciting piece of infrastructure stands between an idea and its implementation. Helping nonprofits overcome those practical barriers can be every bit as valuable as financing the programs themselves.

Installing sprinklers may not make for a dramatic ribbon-cutting photograph. Filling the building afterward with students building robots, developing job skills, learning alongside one another and discovering what they are capable of certainly will.

Communities frequently talk about the importance of investing in young people. This is what such an investment can look like in practice.

Southbridge's future will ultimately be shaped by the children growing up here now. Giving them more places to learn, develop skills, form relationships and imagine what comes next is not merely a service to those students. It is an investment in the community they will inherit.

Simple budgeting tips that fit real life

If you've just started managing your own finances, recommitted to doing it well or noticed your spending isn't making you as happy as you'd hoped, a budget might be exactly what you need. A simple budgeting framework to start: The 50/30/20 rule

The 50/30/20 rule is a great foundation, but you may need to adjust it a little. If you live in a high-cost city, housing alone might require more than half your paycheck. Or you may have high income and can save more than 20 percent. Think of the 50/30/20 rule as a starting point you can adjust as your life evolves.

Not sure where your money goes?

That's completely normal. If you honestly don't know what you spend each month, try a low-pressure approach first. Spend a few months simply observing. Check your accounts without judgment, noting money coming in and going out. Think of it as a financial check-in rather than a report card. You can't change the past, but you can absolutely adjust for the future.

From there, small steps go a long way. Even spending 15 minutes a week on your budget can make the whole process feel far less daunting.

Make technology your easy button

When the numbers feel discouraging

Sometimes looking at spending brings up more stress than relief. If that happens, start by shifting your perspective. Focus on the expenses that brought you real value — a modest gift that meant the world to a friend or how your rent provides a comfortable, stable life. Then look for changes that align your spending with your values. Substituting expenses, reducing expenses, or creating more income could all be used to help you keep your spending below your income.

Build a buffer

If you can, consider building a small buffer into your budget for unexpected expenses such as birthdays, minor repairs or spontaneous plans. Adding perhaps 3 percent of your income or a set dollar amount, like \$200, helps keep those costs from throwing your whole plan off course.

The bottom line

With a few simple steps, budgeting becomes easier to stick with and more meaningful over time. At its core, it's a way to align your money with what matters while enjoying today and planning for tomorrow.

The great household thermostat negotiations

There are few subjects capable of revealing the fundamental differences between two people quite as efficiently as the thermostat.

My wife and I have been married for roughly three decades. We have successfully navigated mortgages, children, home repairs, family holidays and countless decisions involving considerably more money and consequence than the temperature inside our house. Yet we remain unable to agree on what number should appear on that little box on the wall.

This becomes particularly complicated in August.

New England summers have a way of producing days when the house feels perfectly comfortable at breakfast, slightly tropical by lunch and suitable for growing orchids by late afternoon.

This is when the negotiations begin.

I tend to believe that air conditioning should be used with restraint. I am not against modern technology. I simply have an ingrained suspicion that every degree I lower the thermostat causes the electric meter outside to spin fast enough to affect the Earth's rotation.

My wife takes a different approach. If we own an air conditioner, she reasons, perhaps we should occasionally experience the benefits of air conditioning. It's difficult to argue with that.

I will walk past the thermostat and notice that it has been lowered. I raise it two degrees. An hour later, I walk past again. It has been lowered. Nobody says anything.

This is important. We are not arguing. We are participating in a silent competition involving climate control. Eventually, one of us breaks the silence.

"Did you change the thermostat?"

"No."

This answer is technically incorrect but strategically useful. Then comes the inevitable question.

"Why is it 74?"

I explain that 74 is a perfectly reasonable indoor temperature.

Apparently, it is not.

The funny thing is that nobody ever agrees on what "comfortable" actually means. One person says the house is warm. Another says it feels fine. Someone opens a window. Someone else points out, correctly, that opening a window while the air conditioner is running makes absolutely no sense. The window gets closed. Ten minutes later, somebody turns

on a fan.

This raises another question: If the air conditioner is running and the ceiling fan is running and a portable fan is running, at what point are we simply attempting to manufacture weather?

I remember growing up without any of this. On hot nights, we opened windows. We had box fans that sounded like small aircraft engines. If it was still hot, we complained about it. That was our cooling system.

Nobody checked an app to see what the "feels like" temperature was because we already knew what it felt like. It felt hot. Of course, nostalgia becomes much easier when you're sitting in an air-conditioned room.

I have no intention of returning to the days of lying awake on an August night hoping a breeze might wander through the bedroom window sometime before sunrise. I've become soft. I accept this.

Still, there is something amusing about the amount of thought modern households devote to achieving the perfect indoor temperature.

We can heat our homes in January and cool them in August. We have programmable thermostats, remote controls and fans with six speeds.

And yet two adults who have shared a house for decades can stand beneath the same ceiling and experience entirely different climates.

Perhaps that's the real lesson of marriage.

Compromise is important. Communication is essential. And if you quietly change the thermostat, always remember what number it was on before.

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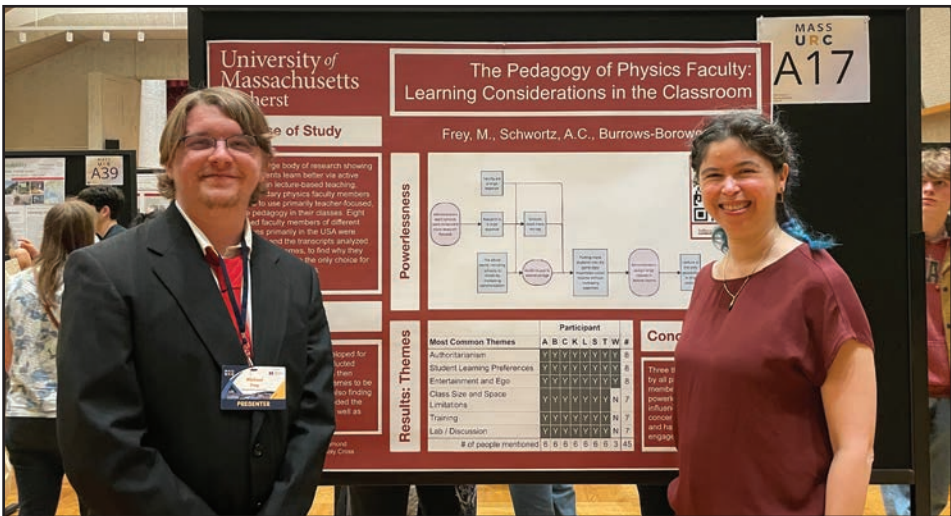
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Three generations of scholars team up to improve physics education

The collaboration began when QCC Professor of Integrated Science & Physics Dr. Andria Schwartz noticed that many post-secondary physics teachers rely heavily on lecture-based lessons instead of active learning. Schwartz discovered little research on the topic and set out to learn more with help from Michael Frey, who was a QCC student at the time, and Dr. Andria Borowczak, Schwartz's former Ph.D. advisor. Together, they conducted a qualitative study involving physics faculty from across the United States. Their findings were published in "Education Sciences," a peer-reviewed international open-access journal, in an article titled, "How to Engage Active Pedagogy with Physics Faculty: Watch Out for Powerlessness."

"Research has shown that active learning helps everyone more than lectures," Schwartz said. "So why do we still use lectures so much?"

Frey was invited to join the project after Schwartz witnessed his intellectual curiosity drives both teaching and research.

"Dr. B is an amazing resource. If I'm stuck, I get on the phone with her, and she sets me straight. Now I'm teaching Michael, and in the process, I'm learning more as well," Schwartz said.

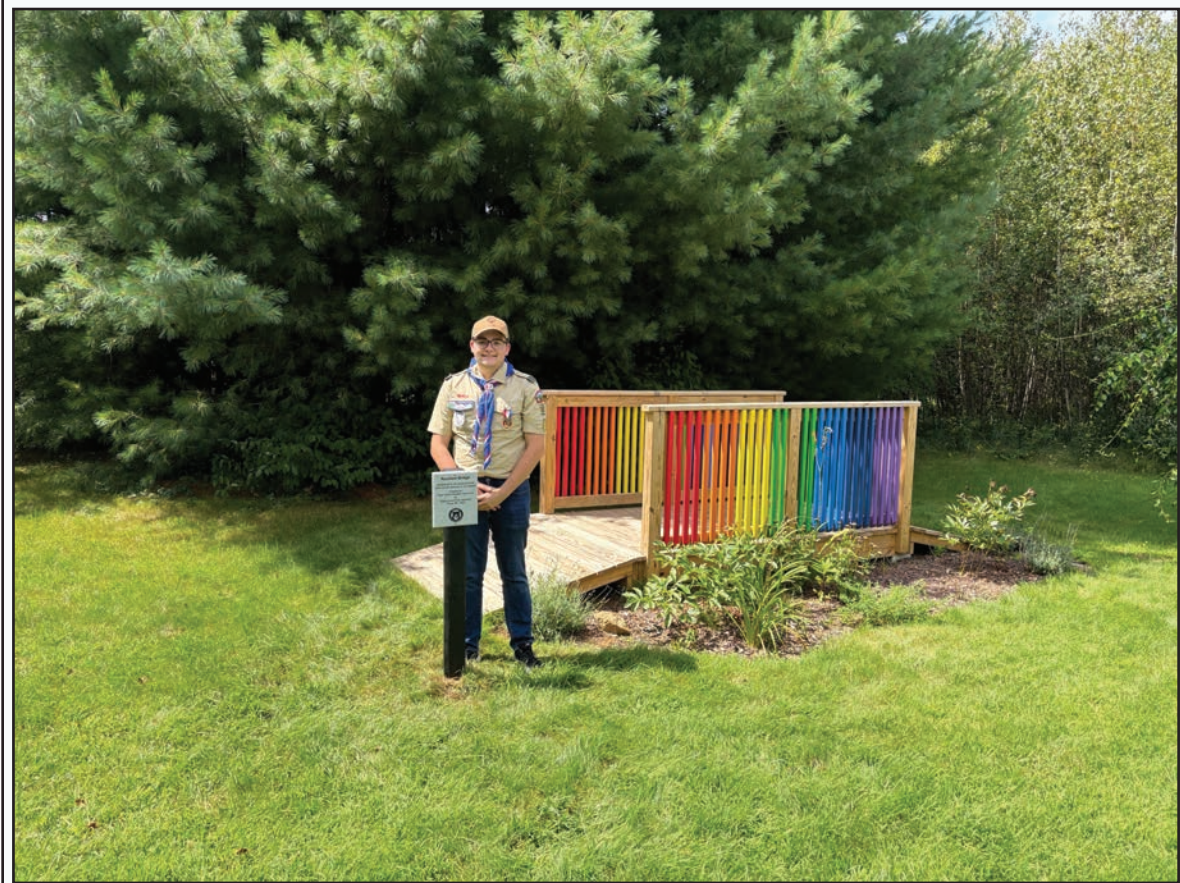
Through their interviews, the team found that many faculty rely on lectures because they feel powerless to make change or believe they lack the time to prepare more in-depth active learning lessons. While perceptions of powerlessness may not always reflect reality, Schwartz noted that time constraints are a genuine obstacle. In addition to teaching, faculty members often balance research, student advising, and service commitments.

"It's important to get this info out there. If people know why it's a challenge, they can design things to get past the challenge," Schwartz said.

Schwartz and Frey presented their findings at the last Massachusetts Undergraduate Research Conference and are already planning a follow-up paper.

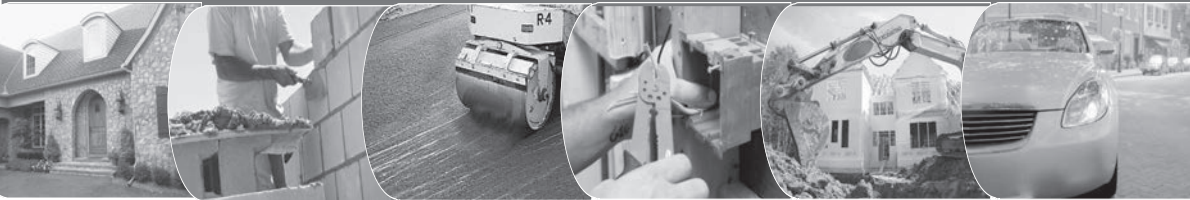
For Schwartz, the project reflects the ongoing cycle of mentorship that

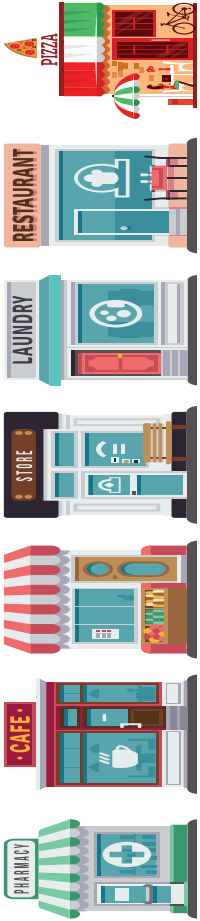

“We are proud to support these ten organizations during this crucial moment,” said Dr. Amie Shei, president and CEO of The Health Foundation. “The Activation Fund grant is designed to help community organizations advance their work in bold and sustainable ways. This year’s recipients have earned the trust of the communities they serve and are providing vital services across Central Massachusetts.”

The grant awards, totaling \$1,018,398, are as follows:

Ascentria Care Alliance - \$85,036 to create a regional Memory Care Center of Excellence by training staff and up to three partnering community organizations as certified dementia care trainers and integrating evidence-based practices into its ongoing workforce development model.

Central Massachusetts Housing Alliance - \$118,411 to furnish and equip its new Resource Center in Worcester, providing people experiencing homelessness with access to showers,

laundry, rest space, and supportive services.

Community Harvest Project - \$101,980 to build a second protected growing tunnel and upgrade irrigation at its North Grafton farm, enabling the organization to grow more fresh produce year-round for hunger relief partners across Central Massachusetts.
