Venezuela filled the basilica with vibrant color, symbolizing the beauty of unity in diversity. Many students proudly wore traditional attire from their heritage, embracing the opportunity to share and celebrate their cultural roots.

The Most Rev. Robert J. McManus, Bishop of Worcester, served as the main celebrant and homilist. Fourth grade students Olivia Guinto and

DCLT initiates business fundraising campaign for conservation land purchase

DUDLEY — The Dudley Conservation Land Trust (DCLT) is initiating a fundraising campaign with local businesses to support conservation land purchase. DCLT is very close to securing the funds to purchase the 21.3-acre Tierney land, which spans Dudley, Charlton, and Oxford. Originally part of a larger parcel owned by DCLT founder, Chet Kulisa, much of this scenic land has already been conserved forever. DCLT expects to finalize the purchase by June 2026, receiving reimbursement from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for half of the costs through the Conservation Partnership Grant program. Other contributors to-date include the Cecelia J. Smolenski-Millette Charitable Trust, Fields Pond Foundation, Bafflin Foundation, Lithia4Kids, and personal donations.

In order to meet this goal, DCLT needs the help of the local business community!

We aim to engage local businesses in our land conservation efforts through financial sponsorship and volunteer experiences for employees. Green spaces make our community a more desirable place to live and work. Plus, partnering with a nonprofit enhances business reputation and demonstrates social responsibility. In addition to land acquisition—our main objective this year—businesses can fund building improvements for Perron House (future DCLT headquarters), land stewardship projects, or event sponsorship.

Local business sponsors will be highlighted on our new website, showcasing their generosity and contributions to our community. As our sanctuaries are primarily in Dudley and Oxford, with the potential for expansion into Charlton, our focus will be on businesses in those towns. Various sponsorship levels are available to suit different interests and resources.

The new Richard Camignani Sr. Park, or Fun Zone, will replace an old

playground that had to be closed several years ago due to its deterioration, damaged equipment, and safety issues.

The playground designers met with kids of all ages before finalizing a plan that incorporates the latest engineering for playground technology, accessibility and adaptability, with

equipment that meets the kids' definition of fun.

Bringing the idea for a new, modern playground to reality was not a solitary effort, nor was it inexpensive. In 2022, the Dudley Woman's Club began a year-long outreach to local businesses and residents to

OXFORD — The pavement of Maple Road will soon be filled with the sound of rhythmic footsteps and the spirit of community remembrance. On Saturday, June 13, the annual JAK-L Strides 5K Run/Walk will return to the Oxford Community Center, aiming to turn miles into momentum for local mental health awareness and suicide prevention.

The event, which officially kicks off at 9 a.m., is more than just a race; it is a dedicated effort to fund vital mental health programs within local school systems. In a time when student well-being is a top priority for educators and parents alike, the proceeds from this year's 5K will go directly toward providing resources for suicide prevention and emotional support for the community's youth.

A fast course for a great cause
For the competitive runners, the

JAK-L Strides course offers a "flat and fast" profile, boasting a minimal elevation gain of only 108 feet. The race features electronic timing for precision, and the top three finishers will receive special prizes.

Organizers have ensured that participants stay supported throughout the 3.1-mile trek, with a water station positioned at the halfway mark. To celebrate the achievement of those taking part, the first 150 participants to cross the finish line will be awarded finisher medals.

Protecting the land that protects us

There is something quietly reassuring about knowing that certain places will stay the way they are.

In Dudley and surrounding towns, residents are fortunate to live among fields, woods, wetlands, and trails that still feel connected to the region's past. These landscapes do more than provide scenery. They shape daily life, support wildlife, protect water resources, and give families room to breathe. That is why the Dudley Conservation Land Trust's effort to secure the 21.3-acre Tierney parcel deserves strong community attention and support.

The land in question is not an isolated patch on a map. It is part of a larger conservation vision that stretches back to the work of DCLT founder Chet Kulisa and others who believed that preserving open space was essential to maintaining the character of these towns. Each protected parcel strengthens the next. Over time, those pieces form a network of green spaces that benefit everyone, whether they hike the trails regularly or simply appreciate knowing they are there.

What makes this moment especially encouraging is how close the project already is to completion. Support from charitable foundations, personal donors, and the Commonwealth's Conservation Partnership Grant program has brought the effort within reach. That kind of progress does not happen by accident. It reflects years of planning, relationships, and persistence by volunteers who care deeply about the region's future.

Now, the invitation to local businesses adds an important new chapter.

When businesses invest in conservation, they are not only supporting a nonprofit mission. They are strengthening the communities where their employees live and their customers spend their time. Accessible green space improves quality of life, supports outdoor recreation, and helps towns remain attractive places to settle and grow. These benefits may be hard to measure on a balance sheet, but they are easy to recognize in everyday life.

The proposed improvements to Perron House as a future headquarters, along with stewardship projects and sponsorship opportunities, show that this effort extends beyond a single land purchase. It represents a long-term commitment to maintaining the resources that define the area's identity. Conservation is not a one-time event. It is ongoing work that depends on steady local participation.

There is also something meaningful about the way this campaign connects neighbors. A conservation trust is not a distant organization. It is made up of residents who care enough to protect what they have inherited and pass it forward. When businesses join that effort, they help reinforce the idea that stewardship belongs to everyone.

The Tierney parcel is not the largest conservation project in the region's history. It does not need to be. Its importance lies in what it represents: another step toward ensuring that future generations will still recognize the landscape they call home.

Opportunities like this do not come along every day. When they do, they remind us that preserving open space is not only about land. It is about continuity, responsibility, and pride in the places we share.

A smelly problem for Auburn

When the United States joined the Allied Forces in World War I, men between the ages of 18 to 45 were required to fill out Registration Cards. For the town of Auburn, there were over 700 registration cards found. These cards held a wealth of information on them, especially who was working where. There were still many who listed farming as their employment either for themselves or working on another farm in town like F. P. Knowles, John Tuck, and Herbert A. Ward. Another of the big employers within the town was Worcester Rendering Company on Southbridge St. This was a business that took cattle, sheep and other animals through a process that slaughtered, melted, rendered fats, bones and such to make butter oil, neatsfoot oil and fertilizer. The company was a branch of the Consolidated Rendering Company [Conrenco] which had about 40 plants in New England in 1903.

According to a newspaper article, the land which the Worcester Rendering Company was located on was "in the low land near A.S. Wolfe's market garden greenhouses and was sold to them by Mr. Wolfe." It was a contentious beginning for the company. Neighbors as far away as Pakachoag Hill complained about the smell that the "west winds" would bring their way on a daily basis. In August of 1903 at the selectmen's meeting, accounts of the odors emanating from the company were given by leading citizens of the town, John MacInnes, Asa W. Ward, J.P. Eaton and Mr. Knowles, all of whom live on Pakachoag Hill.

Eugene Carter, the rendering company expert, explained the improvements that were being made to help get rid of the odor issues. There were two water tower devices that would take away the odor. One was working presently and the other was in construction. A system of catch basins stops the grease and meat from getting into the nearby pond. The railroad was asked to use carefully constructed containers that would contain the odors when the rendering plant products were shipped. The meeting ended with Chairman Eugene Newton saying that some barns in the area were more offensive than any part of the rendering smells and that the company trying to comply with requests for improvements. The selectmen did not revoke the license for the rendering company.

There was an underlining current that Abel S. Wolfe was leading the opposition to the rendering company because the rendering company refused to buy the rest of his land, about 13 acres, that was in proximity to the plant. Wolfe wanted \$300 an acre for the land that he had bought the year before for \$125 an acre. The Worcester Rendering Company felt that it was a bit too much. It was also said that Wolfe put the land up for auction trying to lure the rendering company into thinking it could be bought at a lower price, but there were by-buyers in the audience who would bid the price up higher than what the land was worth. The rendering company didn't purchase the land.

An article in 1906 chronicles the history of the dispute between Wolfe and Whitter against the Worcester Rendering Company, it was listed as an advertisement. The hullabaloo quieted down, and by 1918, there were article advertisements that mentioned the health benefits that soap and soap powders had in safeguarding from diseases. The soap being made by the Worcester Rendering Co. was just the product to clean and disinfect exposed surfaces. Their soap line included laundry, toilet, mill and textile

soaps. Other products mentioned included Mill tallowing, stearine, which helps to separate solid fats from liquid fats and contributes to the texture and stability of the final fat product, case hardening bone, poultry foods, and fertilizer. In 1924, there was an article for increasing output of eggs. It stated, "a large number of experienced poultry raisers were increasing their output by adding two pounds of Royal Worcester Meat Scraps with 10 pounds of good quality dry mash." Of course, the article ended with a plug for Worcester Rendering Company of Auburn. In the late 1930's the company promoted its own dog food brand, Dow's Dog Food and Puppy Biscuits and Dow's Crunchy and Crumpled Dog Food.

"These foods contain every element for keeping a dog in good condition and have long been favorites with dogs and their owners all over the country," so the article states.

Their fertilizer line included Prosperity Brand Animal Fertilizers especially adapted to the requirements of Worcester County soil. The poultry feed was the same name. This same article stated that "the company was among the largest New England distributors of Ajax denatured alcohol, suppling formula 5, the most commonly used anti-freeze for radiators to garages and filling stations as well as to paint and hardware stores.... The trucking and storage facilities of the Worcester Rendering Co. makes it possible for prompt delivery at all time.

The company seemed ready to help with community service as stated in a 1930 article about a children's pageant that was to be presented by the 8th grads from Mary D. Stone school, Julia Bancroft school, and Pakachoag school entitled "Our Schools at Work and at Play" which was done at Town Hall. The last sentence of the article states, "If the pageant is postponed, the regular no-school signal, 3-3-3, will be given on the whistle of the Worcester Rendering Company at 3:30 p.m."

In 1937, another a little-known fact was brought to the public's attention that the Worcester Rendering Company of Auburn, "had buyers traveling throughout the county collecting skunk, red fox, gray fox, silver and black fox, mink muskrat, weasel and otter furs. The qualities of which are ranked among the best in the world and bring premium prices." These furs were from fur-ranching and not wild animals.

The Worcester Rendering Company had its name changed to Corenco Corporation in 1967 then eventually closed in 1969. It had sold ownership of Leesville Pond to J and P Realty Co. who sold it to the town in 1982. Some of the land was sold for Interstate 290 and the Swedish Cemetery. Nothing really remains of the company in town, not even the smell.

The bulletin board by the door

Just inside the entrance of our town library, there's a bulletin board that most people walk past without really noticing.

I try not to be one of them.

It's not much to look at. A sheet of cork. A scattering of pushpins. A collection of flyers printed on everything from bright neon paper to the back side of what used to be someone's grocery list. But if you stand there long enough and read what's posted, you begin to understand something about the place you live that you might otherwise miss.

I stopped in last week to return a book and found myself lingering there longer than expected.

There was a notice for a spaghetti supper. A handwritten card offering piano lessons. A flyer for a church rummage sale with the date circled three different times in blue marker, as if to make sure nobody overlooked it. Someone had pinned up a careful request for help finding a lost cat. Another note announced a fundraiser for a neighbor going through a difficult stretch.

None of these things would make big headlines. But together they told a story.

It struck me that the bulletin board might be the most honest page in town.

Nobody is trying to impress anyone there. The paper curls at the corners. The tape never sticks quite right. Some notices are printed neatly at home, others written in block letters with a felt-tip marker. Every one of them represents somebody who decided to reach out instead of keeping quiet.

That still means something.

Years ago, before everything moved onto screens, those bulletin boards were how people found out what was happening. If you wanted to know when the pancake breakfast was scheduled, or who was collecting coats for winter, or whether someone was offering snow shoveling for a few dollars after school, that's where you looked.

I suppose today most of that information can be found online. But I've noticed that the bulletin board still fills up anyway.

I don't think that's an accident.

There's something reassuring about seeing those little pieces of paper pinned up in a real place where real people walk past them. It reminds you that the town is still paying attention to itself. It reminds you that neighbors are still asking for help and still offering it.

One flyer announced a community clean-up day along a stretch of roadside I drive past all the time. I had no idea it was happening. Another advertised a local concert I might otherwise have missed entirely. A third simply said "Volunteers Needed," followed by a phone number and a hopeful-looking smiley face drawn in pen.

Someone clearly believed someone else would call.

What I admire most about that board is how ordinary it is. Nobody gets paid to maintain it. Nobody organizes the colors or straightens the corners. It grows and changes week by week, quietly reflecting whatever the town happens to need at the moment.

In a way, it feels like a conversation that never quite ends.

Sometimes I think those boards are small acts of trust. A person puts something up there believing that someone else will read it and care. That's not a grand gesture. It's not dramatic. But it says a lot about the kind of place we live.

We still expect each other to notice.

On my way out of the library, I stepped back and looked at the board again before heading through the door. I didn't take down any phone numbers. I didn't sign up for anything that day. But I left with the quiet feeling that the town was doing what it has always done best, which is keeping track of its people in simple, steady ways that don't require much explanation.

raise the money to get the project off the ground. The final price tag for the playground came in at \$704,410.

Dudley town officials worked with the Central Massachusetts Regional Planning Commission (CMRPC) to submit a PARC grant application. The state's PARC program assists municipalities in acquiring and developing land for outdoor recreation. A grant for \$496,650, representing a 70 percent reimbursement, was awarded to the Town in September 2024. The local contribution would be \$207,760.

Dudley voters then had to affirm the total project cost at Town Meeting, which they did the following month.

A groundbreaking ceremony for the Fun Zone was

held last August, and construction is well underway.

We expect families from the surrounding communities will be taking their kids to the new playground, along with Dudley families. This unique project is a community asset that will benefit us all.

We are asking the local businesses to support the Fun Zone with a monetary contribution to help Dudley taxpayers defray some of the cost burden they have agreed to undertake. Equipment Naming Rights are available from \$1,000 to \$50,000, along with Platinum, Gold, Silver and Bronze Sponsorships.


